

# **Medway High School to Offer First Innovation Pathway in Healthcare and Social Assistance**

Principal John Murray is pleased to announce that Medway High School will begin offering its first state-designated Innovation Pathway next school

Innovation Pathways are designed to give students coursework and experience in specific high-demand industries. The 'real-world' pathways allow great flexibility for students who want hands-on experiences and high-level coursework that will prepare them well for both college and career. Innovation Pathway programs designated by the state include information technology, engineering, healthcare, life sciences and advanced manufacturing.

The Innovation Pathway in Healthcare and Social Assistance will be the first pathway offered at MHS, and will give students access to real-world hands-on training to prepare them for careers in medicine, nursing, emergency medical services and more. Through their participation in the pathway, students will build career awareness, gain skills and participate in classroom and workbased learning.

In the Healthcare Assistance pathway that will be offered at Medway High School, students will take biomedical courses offered in partnership with Project Lead the Way (PLTW). Courses in the PLTW Biomedical Science pathway may include Principles of Biomedical Systems, Human Body Systems and Medical Interventions.

Students in the pathway will participate in an internship with a local healthcare partner for up to 100 hours. They will

"We are excited to implement this Innovation Pathway at Medway High School as a unique offering for our students interested in exploring healthcare or social assistance careers," Principal Murray said. "This initiative will connect them with real-world experience and high-quality instructional materials and will partner well with the biomedical courses offered through our Project Lead The Way program. Students will participate in a truly immersive learning experience that aligns with their interests and prepares them for life beyond graduation."



# Chipotle, medical facility, day care proposed for Medway

There has been a lot of activity near Medway Commons in recent months.

#### **Chipotle (and Starbucks)**

According to a Planning and Economic Development Board notice for public hearing, the applicant is Charter Realty and Development Corporation of Greenwich, CT, which is asking for "approval of drive-thru special permit and a minor site plan for building renovations and site improvements to the former McDonald's building...and for the configuration of the Starbucks drive-thru lane."

The notice says the "applicant proposes to divide and renovate the interior and exterior of the former McDonald's building to accommodate two new restau-

rant tenants. The primary tenant space will be occupied by Chipotle and includes on-site seating and an order ahead, drive-thru pick-up window. The tenant for the second restaurant space is not yet finalized. The building

size will not change. There is no increase in parking."

The plan also calls for "a substantial redesign and re-routing of the Starbucks drivethru lane...an outdoor seating area for Chipotle, additional cross-

walks and sidewalks, landscaping, and construction of a right-turn lane in the driveway area south of the subject building to provide better access to the businesses located in the southern portion of Medway Commons."

### **Bright Path Child Care**

Construction of the new Bright Path Child Care, whose playground now occupies part of the former parking lot at Medway Commons, has nearly finished all town requirements and plans to open as soon as it receives its childcare license from the state.

### Milford Regional Hospital Medical Facility

Across the street, a 2.2-acre site has been carved out of the cow pasture next to Walgreens, and is now known as '68A Main

Street

The Planning and Economic Development Board is working with Milford Whitinsville Regional Hospital for a new Milford Regional Hospital Medical Facility to be built on that site. Town documents indicate the proposed 21,900 square foot building will offer pediatric care, women's health, wellness, emergency care, lab, and x-ray services.

PEDB records show a noise study was performed at the property line, relative to homes on Robin Circle, and it was determined "the expected noise was found to be in compliance." All work must be completed within three years.

### Establish Access When Things Are Good, Not When Times Turn Bad

Planning for the unexpected when things are good is a necessary evil.

This is true for electing work benefits, insurance, estate planning and access to equity.

When engaging in discovery with new clients, I often encounter misconceptions or bias against Home Equity Line of Credit (HELOC).

Their mindset is to seek one only when there is a large home

repair or renovation project. True, it can be used for this purpose and the interest could be tax-deductible. But there's other benefits to consider in using access to the equity you've built as a tool.

Let's take a step back, make we sure understand the tool.

What's a HELOC? - A second mortgage that allows you to borrow money using the equity in your home as collateral - a secured line of credit. There is an underwriting approval process with a hard credit pull and home appraisal, which determine terms including duration (usually 10-15 years), variable rate benchmark (-/+ Prime Rate) and credit limit.

Most banks/credit unions allow 70% or 80% Loan-To-Value (LTV) minus mortgage balance. For example, your house now appraises for \$800K. At 70% LTV is \$560K less mortgage balance of \$400K means potential \$160K HELOC. At 80% LTV, \$640K - \$400K = \$240K HELOC.

Upon closing, you're provided a checking account to move money into and out of the HELOC as you please. If you do borrow, you will only owe interest for a monthly payment. However, keep the balance at \$0, then no interest or fees.

# And that's the strategy - keep the balance at \$0 for the "what ifs" in life.

Take a dual-income household with slightly positive cash flow each month. When bonuses or RSUs vest, they build savings, pay cash for big expenditures, take vacations, etc. They could be approved for ~\$150K HELOC but choose not to plan and apply.

Then the following happens:

Job-Loss - Instead of coming from a position of strength, you're now at the mercy of a lender - good luck on those terms, even if approved.

**Bank Balance Sheets Gone Mad -** Fall 2008 saw banks stop issuing new HELOCs almost 2

years. Some tried to reduce, even close HELOCs, but regulators stepped as it is secured line of credit. As long as the collateral (house) and borrower uphold terms of agreement, the banks couldn't change terms - even if you lost your job. Same is not true for credit cards.

World Gone Mad - Remember when we'd shut down for 2 weeks to end a pandemic but instead laid off 38 million by end of April 2020? Banks stopped issuing new HELOCs and slowed new mortgages until October. And those with high limit HELOCs at \$0 balance became cash buyers of vacation homes from cash-seeking sellers. More opportunistic planning occurred using cash-out refi in 2021 on new property to lock in a low, fixed rate.

**Economic Downturn** - Banks reduce lending in anticipation of economic slowdowns. Regardless of your opinion on recession, we can all agree banks need deposits in order to underwrite new loans/lines. What's been a

recent problem banks are having to maintain? Deposits. Declining deposits equals declining new lending applications.

There are more strategies to consider for HELOCs. Like using as an emergency savings proxy to reduce opportunity costs or delay/spread out taxation from selling investments over calendar years to meet unexpected cash needs.

Balayage is simply a highlighting technique to get you to the desired look you want. In recent years, though, the word Balayage has become synonymous with dark-rooted, blonde hair, and most clients that request it are actually just looking for that specific style. In reality, multiple techniques are used to attain that look. Balayage, Foilayage, Baby lights, Teasylights and Foil Highlights are all just different names for coloring techniques used to lighten (and sometimes darken) your hair.

These techniques aren't just for blonding anymore. The brunette Balayage is huge this summer and the perfect way for all you darker haired beauties to boost your brown tresses.

With that, let's chat about our two most popular coloring services - Balayage and Foil Highlights.

Balayage, pronounced BAH-LEE-AHGE, means "to sweep" in French, and is, by far, the most requested color service at The b.LUXE Studio. Highlights are hand-painted directly on the hair to create a natural gradient from dark to light. The lightened pieces appear more naturally placed and lived-in, which mimics what the sun does to our hair naturally. This free-form color

#### **FOIL HIGHLIGHTS:**

- Color is usually placed evenly along the whole section of hair, from root to tip.





- · Sheets of foil are used as a platform for color and lightener. They encapsulate and separate highlights to boost lift while processing.

# **Macular Degeneration**

### Causes, Symptoms, and Treatment Options

Macular degeneration, also known as age-related macular degeneration (AMD), is a progressive eye condition that affects millions of people worldwide. It is a leading cause of vision loss, particularly among older adults. Macular degeneration primarily affects the macula, a small area located near the center of the retina responsible for sharp, central vision. This article aims to provide an overview of macular degeneration, including its causes, symptoms, and available treatment options.

### Causes of Macular Degeneration

While the exact causes of macular degeneration remain unknown, several risk factors have been identified. Age is a significant factor, as the condition predominantly affects individu-

als over the age of 50. Genetic factors, family history, smoking, obesity, high blood pressure, and prolonged exposure to ultraviolet light are also associated with an increased risk of developing macular degeneration.

## Types of Macular Degeneration

There are two main types of macular degeneration: dry (atrophic) AMD and wet (neovascular) AMD.

### **Dry AMD**

mon form, accounting for approximately 85-90% of cases. It is characterized by the gradual breakdown of the macula due to the accumulation of drusen, yellow deposits beneath the retina. As the condition progresses, central vision becomes blurred, making it difficult to perform tasks such as reading or recognizing

### **Wet AMD**

Wet AMD is less common but more aggressive than dry AMD. It occurs when abnormal blood vessels develop beneath the macula and leak blood or fluid, leading to rapid and severe vision loss. Individuals with wet AMD may experience distorted or wavy central vision, a dark spot in the center of their visual field, or rapid visual decline.

### **Symptoms and Diagnosis**

The early stages of macular degeneration often present no noticeable symptoms, making regular eye exams crucial for early detection. As the condition progresses, symptoms may include:

- Blurred or distorted central vision
- Difficulty reading or performing activities that require fine detail
- Dark or empty areas in the central visual field

- Decreased brightness or intensity of colors
- Difficulty recognizing faces

A comprehensive eye examination, including a dilated pupil examination, visual acuity test, and imaging tests such as optical coherence tomography (OCT) or fluorescein angiography, can help diagnose macular degeneration and determine its type and severity.

### **Treatment options**

Macular degeneration is a progressive eye condition that affects the central portion of the retina, called the macula. Although there is no known cure for macular degeneration, there are several treatment options available that can help slow down its progression and manage the symptoms. Here are some of the common treatment options:

### **Anti-VEGF Therapy**

Anti-vascular endothelial growth factor (anti-VEGF) drugs are injected into the eye to reduce the growth of abnormal blood vessels in the retina. These drugs include medications like ranibizumab (Lucentis), bevacizumab (Avastin), and aflibercept (Eylea).

Anti-VEGF therapy has shown significant success in stabilizing or improving vision in many cases of macular degeneration.

### Photodynamic Therapy (PDT)

This treatment involves the use of a light-activated medication called verteporfin (Visudyne). The medication is injected into a vein, and then a laser is applied to the abnormal blood vessels in the retina to activate the drug, causing the vessels to close and reduce their leakage.

#### **Laser Therapy**

In some cases, laser therapy may be used to target and destroy abnormal blood vessels in the macula. This treatment is known as focal laser photocoagulation.

### Implantable Miniature Telescope

For individuals with end-stage macular degeneration in both eyes and severe vision loss, an implantable miniature telescope (IMT) may be an option. The IMT is surgically placed in one

eye to improve central vision by magnifying the images that reach the healthy portion of the retina.

#### **Low Vision Aids**

These include devices such as magnifying glasses, telescopic lenses, and electronic visual aids that can help individuals with macular degeneration make the most of their remaining vision.

#### **Lifestyle Changes**

Certain lifestyle modifications can help manage macular degeneration. These include quitting smoking, eating a healthy diet rich in antioxidants and nutrients (e.g., leafy green vegetables, fish, and fruits), exercising regularly, maintaining normal blood pressure and cholesterol levels, and protecting the eyes from harmful ultraviolet (UV) light.

#### **Supplements**

The AREDS study conducted by the National Eye Institute and concluded in 2001. It showed that the AREDS formula can reduce patients' risk of the advanced form of AMD by about 25 percent. The formula helps protect people's central vision, which is needed for reading, driving, recognizing faces and other daily activities.

The AREDS 2 study, which concluded in 2011, tested several antioxidant nutrients that earlier research had suggested might protect the eyes: lutein, zeaxanthin, and omega-3 fatty acids. Omega-3 fatty acids are produced by plants and are present in oily fish such as salmon. Lutein and zeaxanthin are carotenoids,

a class of plant-derived vitamins that also includes beta-carotene, and are present in leafy green vegetables. The body uses these nutrients to maintain the health of the retina, the part of the eye that can be damaged by AMD. The AREDS 2 research team did find that the risk of developing advanced AMD was reduced by about 18 percent in study participants who took the variant that included lutein and zeaxanthin but no beta-carotene, compared with participants who took the variant that had beta-carotene but no lutein or zeaxanthin. And those participants whose diets were low in lutein and zeaxanthin at the start of the study, but who took a variant with lutein and zeaxanthin during the study, were about 25 percent less likely to develop advanced AMD, compared with similar participants

who did not take lutein and zea-

The researchers say that removing beta-carotene from the AREDS formula and adding lutein and zeaxanthin will result in a single formula that is safe and effective for all AMD patients. Another recent AREDS report showed that the benefits of taking the AREDS formula appear to be long-lasting. Participants in the first AREDS study who took the original formula daily for five years continue to enjoy a 25 percent lower risk of developing advanced AMD.

It's important to note that the choice of treatment depends on the type and severity of macular degeneration, as well as individual factors. If you or someone you know has macular degeneration, it's crucial to consult with an ophthalmologist or retina special-

ist who can provide personalized recommendations and guidance based on the specific situation.

### Gaetano's Bakery Brings North End Quality to Holliston

Nestled at the junction of 16 and 126 is Holliston's answer to the best Italian pastries and cookies.

Gaetano's Bakery highlights their fancy Italian pastry, cookies, and cakes, but this unassuming shop holds so much more. "We make everything here," says Gaetano. "Cakes and cupcakes, cream puffs, cannoli. We've got pizzas and calzones if you want to stop by for lunch. Bakery assistant Amber Rose adds, "Plus, Gaetano makes the best cup of cappuccino in town."

Gaetano (that's his first name, by the way) moved to Holliston in 2017, and he's been a part of the community ever since.

Gaetano has been professionally baking for over 40 years. He began as a young boy working with at his father at a bakery in the North Shore. "Summertimes, with no air conditioning,

it used to be a thousand degrees in back." He laughs when he remembers. "We'd spend the whole day hauling bread in and out of ovens, but I found something there that never let me go."

For Gaetano, the joy of baking is not just in the cookies, but in the community. The bakery has a family atmosphere, with lots of laughter and regulars known by name. "We get to know our customers," says Gaetano. "They tell us about their lives."

"Gaetano talks to everyone as if he's known them all his life," says Amber. "You could be the pope, or you could be walking in the store the first time, and he talks to you the same." Gaetano says that's because he's Sicilian. "It's a comfortable atmosphere. We're always laughing about something, joking around, just making everyone feel welcome."

Customers tend to stop in the first time for coffee and a cookie, just to try it. "But then they start coming back for everything," Gaetano says. "Birthday cakes, cookie trays for parties, wedding

cakes—whenever they're getting together with family or friends, they think of us first."

Amber says, "My favorite customers are the ones who want a box of cookies and then go back and forth in front of the cases. 'A few of these. Some of those. Oh, do you have these, too?' They get so excited. For some customers, these cookies are nostalgic, and tasting them again brings them right back to their childhood."

A sign over the display case says, "I'll have one of everything." It's a gift made by a loyal customer.

The biggest sellers are the pistachio macaroons. Gaetano says, "Come Thanksgiving and Christmas, people stand in line out the door, waiting for cookies to come out of the oven. Customers will be walking outside

with the box lids open and the hot cookies steaming in the cold."

Amber adds, "One customer brings them to tailgate parties." It turns out, he brought them once, and ever since, everyone demands he bring nothing else. "He came in asking for five pounds to take on a plane to Philadelphia. The host said, 'You're bringing those pistachio cookies, right?' and he said, 'I guess I am."

Another customer came in with an emergency request for a wedding cake. "Normally there'd be no way to do this," says Amber. "We need at least a week's advance notice. But because it was such a unique circumstance, Gaetano got it done in a few days. The community is that important to him."

A glance at the online menu shows an overwhelming selection of cookies, pastries, and cakes that rotate through the bakery. While not every option is available every day, if a customer knows they're coming in for one specific item, they can call ahead. "We're flexible," says Amber. "Moreover, if it's not on the menu, just ask. Nine times out of ten, Gaetano can make it."

One break with tradition is the list of allergy-friendly offerings. The menu offers gluten free bottomless cheesecakes, gluten free cannoli, gluten free cakes, and even vegan options for froyo. The famous pistachio macaroons? Also gluten free.

"It's about making what people love, in the way they need it, when they need it." says Gaetano. "People tell me what they want, and I'm here to bake it for them."

# Medway Nine aiming for a tournament invitation

Coach Mike Coppinger, whose Medway High baseball teams have had their share of ups and downs for the last four years, is hoping his current edition of the Mustangs earn a state tourney berth and stage some surprises in the playoffs.

was a junior-laden squad itching to get another chance to win a state crown. But a tourney return never materialized in 2020 because the Covid-19 pandemic forced cancellation of all spring sports.

"That was such a disappointment for those seniors," said Coppinger. "That group lived for baseball and they formed one

Coppinger and his players have experienced a roller-coaster ride for four seasons and what they've learned from it was how to be resilient, how to become mentally tough and how to overcome adversity.

The Mustangs qualified for tourney play in 2019 and ended their season by losing in the state championship final, 3-1, to Taconic. That Medway team of the best teams I've ever had in my nine years as Medway's coach. They wanted another chance to play in a state final. It was difficult to see those kids be denied."

When the Mustangs opened their 2021 campaign, they were very young, mostly all sophomores. Coppinger didn't know what to expect. What he got were two extremes.



"We won a game early on, then suffered a 10-game losing streak," he recalled. "We finished 4-14. An open tournament followed where any teams, regardless of their records, could compete."

Medway displayed lots of resilience after that devastating shutout in 2020. All they did was advance to the sectional semifinals by defeating East Bridgewater, Apponequet and Fairhaven before bowing to Middleboro. "We were playing our best at tourney time," Coppinger offered.

Last year, the Mustangs posted a 7-11 record, qualified for the tourney because of the strength of their schedule, and split a pair of games, downing Middleboro then losing to powerful Medfield.

Coppinger's 2023 edition was awaiting word on a tourney berth at Local Town Pages' deadline — they had a 5-8 record after 13 games. Once again, the Mustangs' strong Tri Valley League schedule and their margin in defeats give them an opportunity to earn a slot in the 32-team field.

At the start of the season, the 37-year-old Coppinger listed three goals for his forces, whom he labeled as "young and scrappy."

"Our goals were to be competitive in every game and maintain a strong focus against teams like Norwood and Hopkinton," he said. "We also wanted to finish .500 or higher and get a tourney berth. My last objective was to develop the kids into fundamentally sound baseball players and good citizens, too."

Medway's team strengths include pitching (three left-handed starters), experience, hitting and an outstanding pitcher/defensive centerfielder in captain Luke Frauton, a TVL all-star last year who'll play for Worcester Polytech. In 26 innings, Frauton had a 1-3 record, a 2.66 E.R.A. and 29 strikeouts at Local Town Pages' deadline. His hitting stats include a .424 batting average, 12 runs scored and 11 stolen bases.

"Luke throws in the mid-80 mph range," Coppinger said. "As a junior last year, he had a 3-2 record, an E.R.A. of 2.05

and 47 strikeouts in 30 innings. His fastball, curve and change-up are effective, he challenges hitters and his control and velocity are good. He works hard every day and he leads by example."

Two other left-handed pitchers are seniors Jack Reynolds, who also plays right field, and Sean Anderson who, at 6-foot-5, is a big target at first base. Last year, Reynolds had a 2-3 record, a 3.38 E.R.A. and 27 strikeouts in 31 innings.

"Jack is hitting .296 with four RBIs," Coppinger said. "He's tough, works hard, is dependable and his control is good whether he's throwing a fastball, curve or change-up. Sean has had a bounce-back season. He's been competitive in his outings and his defense at first base is excellent So far, he's pitched 13 innings, has a 2-1 record and an E.R.A. of 4.42."

Sophomore catcher Jason Bedard has been a pleasant surprise. "He's a competitive and tough kid who's batting .273," said Coppinger said. "He does a good job and is a calming influence when pitchers need to be settled down. Reserve catcher

Charlie McKeown has had some key pinch hits and he maintains a superb attitude. His arm is strong and he's respected by his teammates."

Three sophomores, who gained valuable experience last year, include Nolan Flotta (pitcher-left fielder), John Farrell (pitcher-shortstop), and Garrett O'Mara (pitcher/utility).

"Nolan was our most consistent hitter last year (.327)," Coppinger said. "He's improved his fielding and runs the bases well. A right-hander, he's strong and throws hard in relief. John is a right-hander who has good command of his fastball, curve and change-up. Relying on a strong arm at shortstop, he's made some big plays, thanks to a high base-ball IQ.

"Garrett is versatile, able to pitch and play the infield and outfield. He also throws hard (80 mph) and his control is topnotch. He's fast and the sky is the limit for him. He's 1-0 as a pitcher, has 10 strikeouts and a 1.27 E.R.A."

Relying on an athletic philosophy that stresses the importance of winning, Coppinger believes that "teamwork and giving 100 percent make winning happen." Life lessons he hopes his players learn are overcoming challenges, being resilient and mentally tough, and leadership.

Coppinger learned some valuable life lessons during his playing days. He pitched three no-hitters for Medway High and was a TVL all-star. At Merrimack College, he excelled on the mound as a sophomore and junior, but an injury forced him to play second

base in his final season.

As his coaching career nears the 10-year mark, he probably would prefer less ups and downs. In the recent past, Medway's baseball teams have provided him with some roller-coaster moments. As Forest Gump would say, they're "like a box of chocolates; you never know what you're going to get": One year they're in the state final; the next they fall victim to Covid; then they start another season by losing 10 straight games.

A 2023 tourney berth for the Mustangs no doubt would provide some drama. And also some lessons on mental toughness and resilience.




# **Protect Your Home Against Deed Theft**

As home transactions pick up speed as spring continues, and in light of recent publicity relating to "deed theft," Norfolk County Register of Deeds, William P. O'Donnell, today, reminds residents about the Registry's Consumer Notification Program

Deed theft can take different forms. The most common type of fraud preys on people who are in danger of losing their owner's signature on a deed and records it in the registry of deeds. A forged deed is not valid and conveys nothing. If a buyer or a lender rely on a forged deed and don't do their due diligence on a property's title, they are out of luck. They, not the legitimate property owner, will ultimately lose any money paid to the thief. Forgery is a felony in all fifty states, punishable by jail

property and mortgage fraud was one of the fastest growing white-collar crimes in America."

Information on "Consumer Notification" can be found on the Registry website, www.norfolkdeeds.org under the heading "Services". The Registry Customer Service Department can assist anyone who would like to set up the notification for their property.



property, usually rental property, through foreclosure. The owners are told that they qualify for a "short sale," a process where the foreclosing lender settles for less than the amount owed on the mortgage, and that if they sign the deed over to a third party, they can avoid the foreclosure. The owner signs a deed over to the third-party scammer, not realizing they are still responsible for the debt, and the scammer, rather than negotiating the short sale, collects and keeps the rental payments until the lender eventually forecloses.

Another type of deed theft targets elderly people who sign over their property without realizing what they are doing. This is often done by a family member. Deed theft is a serious crime that can result in the loss of one's home and equity. Homeowners should be aware of these scams and talk to a lawyer before signing any papers that have to do with their property.

Less common is forgery, where a scammer fakes a home-

time and heavy fines. The court may also require restitution for damages caused by the forgery, such as the costs of clearing the title

Companies now offer paid subscription services that will check public records and let a property owner know if a deed has been recorded that changes who owns their property. It is not title insurance, and most of the time, if a fraud has happened, it won't offer any extra services.

"Our mission at the Registry of Deeds is the safety and security of all property records," Register O'Donnell said. "We recognize that there are unscrupulous individuals who may try to take advantage of the property rights of others. In 2015, we at the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds initiated a Consumer Notification Service, a free service whereby subscribers sign up to be notified when any document is recorded under their name. This initiative came about in response to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (F.B.I.) indicating


"I want to reiterate that our free notification service, like the paid services, does not protect against fraud but will at least alert the owner if a fraudulent deed has been recorded," Register O'Donnell concluded. "This way, the homeowner can take steps right away to combat the fraud. Also, owners should always be aware of what they are signing when it comes to any document that may affect the title to their real estate and should scrutinize any company that promises to alleviate debt if you sign over a deed to them. In Massachusetts, a deed should always be signed in front of a notary public. Massachusetts notaries are obligated to request identification from the party signing the deed."


