CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - A \$6 million Aquifer and Storage and Recovery Well will limit future shortages for 44,000 Carmichael Water District customers.

One of many similar projects in Sacramento, the well is being sunk on San Juan School District land at Garfield Avenue. Its operation should begin by late next year.

Construction is necessitated by State restrictions

on drawing from the American River during droughts.

For more than 100 years,

the benevolent artery has quenched local thirst, filled tubs irrigated and gardens.

But climate change and

competing demands from other areas have jeopardized CWD rights to river water.

Last summer CWD covered shortages with water purchased from San Juan Water District. Because the writing is on the wall for such contingencies, the Carmichael agency urgently needs resilient new sources.

"These are 21st Century projects," noted CWD Board President Ron Davis. "Times are changing. We were not allowed

Over 100 Arrested for Human Trafficking and Child Prostitution

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - In 2016, California passed SB 1322, which decriminalized the acts of prostitution for sex workers under the age of 18. Unfortunately, many traffickers use sex workers under 18 because it insulates them. This law, coupled with SB203 (2020), makes it virtually impossible for law enforcement to engage with under-aged sex workers to the point where rescue intervention is restricted.

In 2021, California passed SB 357, which repealed the law that makes it a crime to loiter with intent to commit prostitution, and applicable evidence is no longer enforceable, including dress and geographical location as a reason to investigate acts of prostitution. Law enforcement can no longer use the misdemeanor crime of loitering to investigate and enforce the crime of prostitution. Law enforcement can no longer solely use their expertise in identifying prostitutes through behaviors, even to make detentions of reasonable suspicion.

Despite these challenges, the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office conducted a large-scale operation combating human trafficking and childhood prostitution. In conjunction with allied federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies, including the FBI, HSI, ATF, CDCR Parole, the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office, and Sacramento County Probation, the 7-day operation spanning over three weeks across Sacramento County aimed to rescue victims of human trafficking and targeted sex buyers and human traffickers.

The operation yielded 102 arrests, 31 of which were male sex buyers and three felony sex traffickers. Most notably, three juveniles, ages 13, 15, and 16, were rescued as a result of these operations. It's a Big Deal for Local Causes

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Sacramento's biggest day for individual philanthropy falls on Thursday, May 4. For ten years, Sacramento Region Community Foundation's BDOG appeal has brought huge windfalls for nonprofits.

Because BDOG (Big Day of Giving) is now part of Sacramento vocabulary, it's no surprise that animal charities are big beneficiaries. Sacramento SPCA fetched \$203,000 last year. More than 700 other organizations also panted happily at a combined total of \$13.4 million. This year, 762 causes will benefit.

Since 2023, the annual give-a-thon has raised \$78 million for Sacramento, Yolo, El Dorado and Placer County groups.

"This proves that everyone can impact causes they care about," says SRCF Philanthropy Officer Kelly Siekin.

May 4 is huge for local nonprofits. Recovering from COVID woes and now plagued by inflation,

they'll have a chance to replenish coffers in a single day. Carmichael Parks Foundation last year set a goal of \$20,000 and topped it by more than \$5000. Supporters gave Carmichael Kiwanis Club nearly \$18,500.

Effie Yeaw Nature Center set a local record with \$70,000 in gifts.

Though early BDOG giving kicked off last week, the big dollars surge in on May 4. Backed by business

sponsors, SRCF rewards energetic fundraising with incentive prizes.

"Last year, our supporters set alarms and donated on line between 4 and 5 am," recalls Carmichael Parks Foundation director Sue Boucher. "In that hour, we raised \$4008 and got a \$500 prize."

Choosing from 762 organizations can overwhelm first-time givers. Consider gifts to:

Art Group Helps People Heal at Turning Point

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - A program through one of Sacramento County's Community Outreach Recovery Empowerment (CORE) centers is helping people heal through art. There is a mental health art group helping clients process their issues through art. The CORE program provides specialty mental health services and supports eligible adults in Sacramento County. CORE offers both on-site and field-based services. The art program is one of the services offered on-site. "It is meant to help clients self-soothe and use art as a form of coping while also getting social

interaction with other clients," said Turning Point CORE Program Director Eric Llorente. The mental health art group started about four years ago. Clients meet on Thursdays to socialize with each other while expressing themselves through paintings and drawings. "I have witnessed the positive impact art has on our clients. It is one of our most requested groups as it allows clients time to process utilizing something they love," added Llorente. The mental health art group is just one of the many ways Turning Point helps patients in Sacramento County. All CORE sites provide a 24/7 on-call crisis response system with immediate support.

The CORE Community Wellness Centers serve as a walk-in entry point for individuals contemplating mental health services and ongoing support for individuals transitioning from the Mental Health Plan. The Wellness Center serves as a hub for individuals seeking meaningful activities. Turning Point also provides an opportunity for those who reach their recovery goals to volunteer or seek employment with the centers. There are several CORE centers throughout Sacramento County. You can read more about who is eligible and the services provided by CORE at the Sacramento County Department of Health Services website. ★

Reward of \$10,000 Offered in Scott Lee Cold Case Homicide

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Twenty-two years ago, Scott Joseph Lee was murdered as he arrived home to his apartment in Orangevale. On March 26, 2001, at approximately 11 pm, Sacramento County Sheriff's Deputies responded to an apartment complex at 8721 Greenback Lane regarding possible carjacking and shooting. At approximately 10:45 pm, 23-year-old Scott Joseph Lee was driving to his apartment. During the drive, Scott was speaking with his sister. During the phone conversation, Scott's sister heard an unknown male voice demanding the victim give him something and glass breaking. She also heard the victim tell the suspect to "just take it." The victim's family went to the apartment complex and eventually located Scott on the ground next to one

of the apartment buildings. The victim had been shot several times and was not conscious. Fire personnel arrived and declared him deceased at the scene. To date, investigators have not been able to identify the suspect(s) in this case. Tips leading to an arrest are eligible for a CASH reward of up to \$1000, and tipsters remain anonymous. Tips are paid in cash, and you are never asked for identification. Contact Sacramento Valley Crime Stoppers at (916) 443-HELP (4357), 1(800) AA-CRIME, or TIPS. Cold River Flows Require Caution During Spring Snowmelt

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - With the near-record California snowfall, water flows will be significantly higher in rivers and streams as the spring snowmelt accelerates. Outdoor recreationists should remain aware and cautious of as higher flows mean dangerously cold, swiftly moving water.

Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) urges those who venture near or into water to take extra precautions, especially around hydroelectric facilities and dams, where flow conditions can change rapidly. As trout-fishing seasons generally opening in April, anglers are especially encouraged to take precautions.

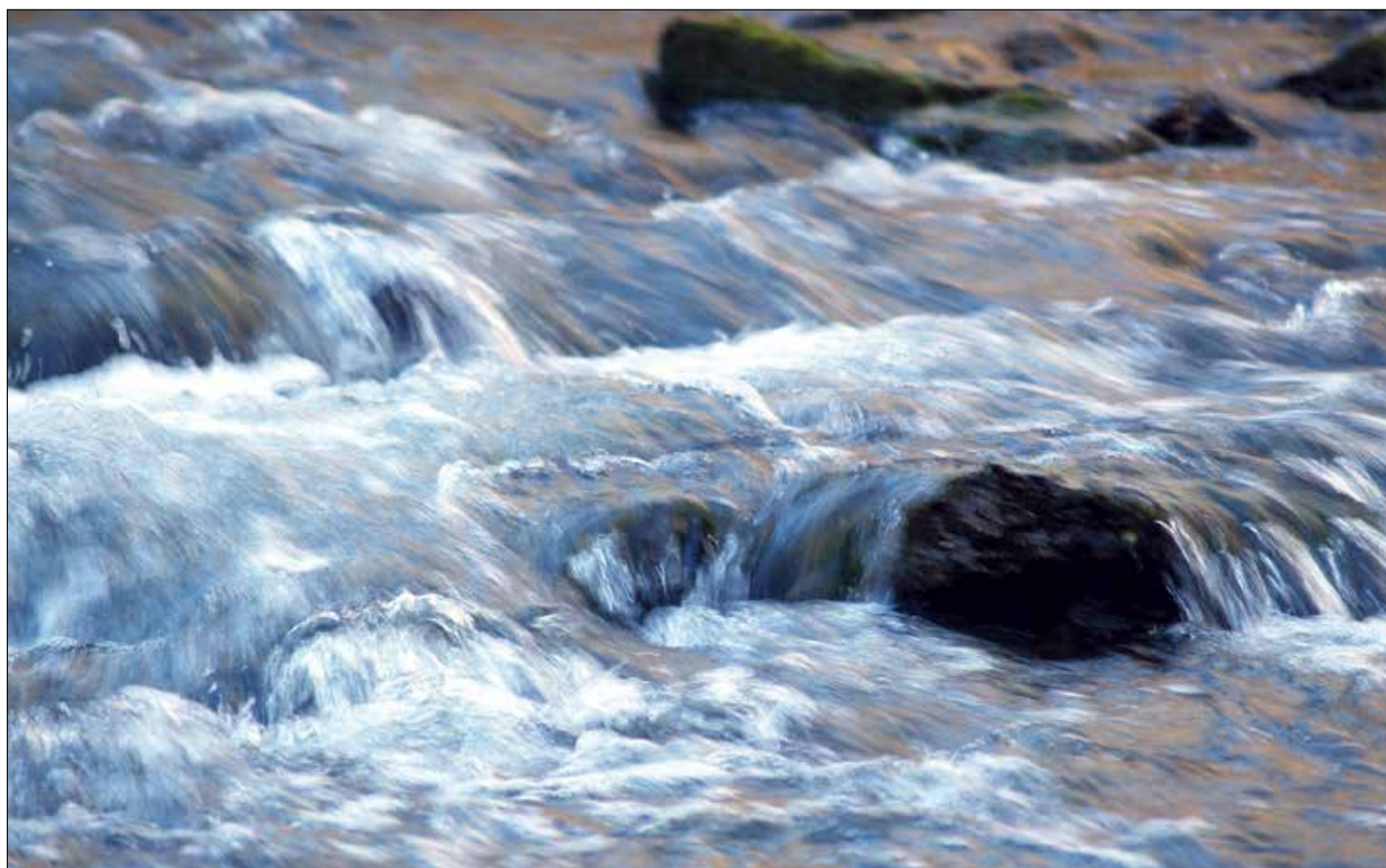
“The abundant snowfall is good for California but will result in much higher flows and potential flooding when warmer weather arrives,” said Jan Nimick, PG&E vice president of Power Generation. “We encourage everyone recreating in or near water to be situationally aware and have a plan to quickly and safely escape in case of changing water flows and cold temperatures.”

Most California rivers are fed by snowmelt, making them cold even in summer. Simple actions can save lives, such as recognizing if the water is too cold or swift, knowing your limits, wearing a life jacket or simply by not entering the water when conditions seem unsafe.

Below are some water safety tips:

Know the Risks

Prevention is the best way to save a person from

drowning. By the time a person is struggling in the water, a rescue is extremely unlikely and places the rescuer at risk; Sudden immersion in cold water can stimulate the “gasp reflex,” causing an involuntary inhalation of air or water. It can even trigger cardiac arrest, temporary paralysis, hypothermia and drowning. When faced with swift water, even the strongest swimmers can be easily overwhelmed; Cold water entering the ear canal can cause vertigo and disorientation. This can confuse swimmers, potentially causing them to venture deeper into the water;

Cold water also reduces body heat 25 to 30 times faster than air does at the same temperature and causes impairment that can be fatal.

Learn About Self-Rescue Techniques

If you do fall into the water, here are some survival tips:

Don’t panic. Try to control your breathing; don’t gasp. A sudden, unexpected fall into cold water causes an involuntary gasp (or torso) reflex. It takes less than one-half cup of water in a person’s lungs to drown. If you remain calm, you have a greater chance of self-rescue;

If you have a boat, stay

with it. It will help you stay afloat and will be seen more easily by rescuers. If it’s capsized and a portion of the craft is above water, try to climb on top;

Stay afloat with the help of a life jacket, regain control of your breathing and keep your head above water in view of rescuers;

If possible, remove heavy shoes. Look for ways to increase buoyancy such as by holding onto seat cushions or an ice chest;

If you’re in the water with others, huddle together facing each other to help everyone stay afloat and keep warm;

If you do fall into a river

without a life jacket, keep your feet pointed downstream and turn onto your back;

If you fall into the water with waders on, roll onto the shore. Wear a belt with waders.

Know Your Limits

Swimming in open water is more difficult than in a swimming pool. People tire more quickly and can get into trouble;

Many unseen obstacles can be lurking below the water’s surface. This is especially the case during spring and early summer snowmelt. Rising water can make these obstacles even more treacherous. Guided trips

for inexperienced paddlers are recommended.

Wear a Coast Guard-Approved Life Jacket

Conditions change quickly in open water and even the best swimmers can misjudge the water and their skills when boating or swimming.

Adult Supervision

Actively supervise children in and around open bodies of water, giving them your undivided attention. Do not assume that someone is watching them. Appoint a designated “water watcher,” taking turns with other adults. Use the buddy system and never swim alone. ★

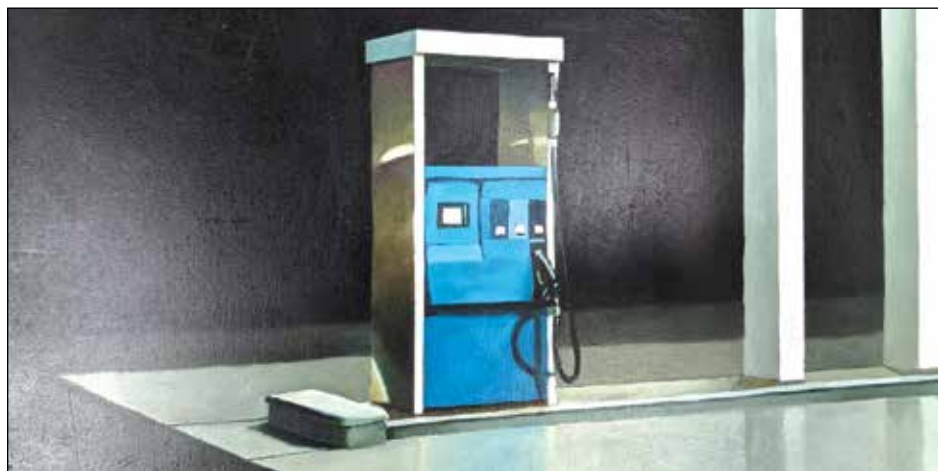

High Living Costs Solidify California's Two-tier Economy

Why California is what it is – a state with an immense economy but equally immense socioeconomic divisions – is the topic of perpetual academic, media and political debates.

There is one factor, both a cause and an effect, that cannot be debated: California is an enormously expensive place in which to live and work. And if anything, the relatively high inflation that has plagued the national economy in recent years has exacerbated the angst that Californians were already feeling as they struggled to make ends meet.

Gov. Gavin Newsom's crusade against gasoline refiners, accusing them of price-gouging, exploits that angst by virtue signaling to his constituents that he's sympathetic to pain in their wallets. However, the state's high fuel prices are just a tiny fragment of the state's high cost of living and its corrosive effects.

How high? Insure.com, a website that analyzes insurance costs, recently updated its comprehensive, state-by-state guide to living costs of all kinds, and revealed that it costs 46.8% more to live in California than the national average – the third highest behind Hawaii's 85.5% and 54% in the

District of Columbia.

Its high cost of living is the single most important reason why California, despite its world class economy, has the nation's highest rate of functional poverty, as measured by the U.S. Census Bureau. Its supplemental poverty index is weighted for the cost of living and California's high costs, especially for housing, drive the state's ranking.

Moreover, when the near-poor are added, well over a quarter of Californians are suffering from serious economic stress, according to the Public Policy Institute of California.

High living costs, again particularly for housing, are also a major factor in California's outflow of population to other states and thus its recent loss of population.

"Since 2015, California has experienced net losses of over 500,000 adults who cite housing as the primary reason, according to the Current Population Survey," PPIIC fellows Hans Johnson and Eric McGhee noted in a recent report. "About half of those who leave the state buy a house in their new state, whereas only one-third of those moving to California buy a house."

California is several million housing units – the exact number is often debated – short of what it needs to house its people, even despite recent population drops. Despite much ballyhooed efforts at the state level to increase production, the gap between supply and demand remains largely unchanged, thus putting upward pressure on rents and home prices.

According to the World

Population Review, California's average rent, \$1,586 a month, is the third highest in the nation, topped only by Hawaii and the District of Columbia, and also third highest behind those two markets in median home price at \$538,500.

High home prices make ownership an impossible dream for millions of California families, thus explaining why the state has the nation's second lowest level of families living in homes that they or their families own, 54.6%. New York is the lowest at 53.6%, thanks to New York City's rental-dominated housing market.

A new study by Moneywise, a website devoted to consumer finance, reveals that first-time home buyers in California would have to cough up the nation's second highest average down payment, \$98,904, topped only by Hawaii's \$110,360.

California's extremely high housing hurdles not only explain why so many residents are fleeing to other states, but why it's so difficult for working-class families to build generational wealth via home ownership. It solidifies the state's two-tier economy – white and Asian Californian majorities in its over-class and Black and Latino Californians dominating the underclass.

Political pontificating about gas prices really misses the point.

Big Problems for California's Income-Based Utility Rates

Last week the Globe reported that Southern California Edison, Pacific Gas & Electric and San Diego Gas & Electric had just filed a proposal to create income-based utility billing.

Currently, utility bills are based on electricity and gas consumption. The utility companies are now proposing income-based utility billing so that higher-income earners pay for more than they use, subsidizing the rates for lower income customers.

This outrageous proposal isn't the only of its kind. The Biden Administration is proposing a tax (penalty) for having good credit. Mortgage borrowers with good credit will pay higher fees so borrowers with lower credit scores can get loans.

We reported on a 2021 report from the University of California at Berkeley recommending that the state link California's highest-in-the-nation electricity bills to customer incomes – ie. your ability to pay.

Authors Severin Borenstein (an economist), Meredith Fowlie, and Jim Sallee of the UC Berkeley and the Energy Institute at Haas admit that California's electricity rates are so high, lower-income households pay a larger share of their income on electricity.

Rather than using all available energy sources to create energy abundance, the Berkeley report proposes "cutting back on the volumetric per-kilowatt-hour charges on customers' bills and recovering the missing money through constructs tied to customers' income."

And the Legislature and Governor approved this scheme through AB 205, which was signed by Gov. Gavin Newsom in June of last year claiming it was needed because the wild swings in utility prices that California experiences.

California has the highest electricity rates in the country. "Those costs could rise even faster over the next decade, as utilities harden their grids against wildfires, grow their share of net-metered rooftop solar and add other costs that will be passed through to utility customers," Next 10 reported over two years ago.

Since we reported last week, many have recognized "the state's perpetual march toward a collectivist state," as Jon Coupal just reported.

Coupal, President of the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association, explains AB 205 is even worse because the bill "bypassed many of the normal procedures for

enacting legislation. It did this because it was a so-called 'budget trailer bill.'"

"While the 'budget bill' is constitutionally mandated to be enacted by June 15, it only passes by that date for one reason – so the legislators can continue to receive their paychecks."

"Moreover, after the enactment of the budget, there are so-called 'junior budget bills' amending the fake June 15th budget as well as last-minute 'budget trailer bills' directing the spending of billions in ways that the budget bill itself did not direct."

"AB 205, the 'energy trailer bill,' received scant public attention and no meaningful public hearings were held. But its impacts are profound, and not in a good way."

Is this new utility charge a tax or fee?

Coupal explains: "Trying to shoehorn an income component into utility rates converts 'ratepayers' into 'taxpayers,' and Californians have had their fill of high taxes."

The difference between a tax and a fee is more than semantics.

Taxes are imposed for generalized government services like education, public safety, transportation, and even for a reasonable safety net for the less fortunate.

But a "fee" or "charge" has always correlated to the receipt of a specific service.

There is some good news in the face of California's race to Marxism. Coupal explains:

"A coalition of taxpayer and business organizations have already qualified the Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act (TPA) for the 2024 ballot. Among its many provisions is not only further clarification of what a 'tax' is but also a provision that requires any tax to be approved by a legislative body rather than some administrative agency or other authority not directly accountable to voters."

California's politicians and unelected agency leaders are limiting energy sources rather than using an all-of-the-above approach to energy production in California: Oil, gas, coal, nuclear, hydroelectric, solar and wind.

If all we are allowed to use is renewable energy for electricity production – a deliberate energy shortage – statewide shortages and rolling blackouts inevitably become the new California normal. "We are being conditioned to accept this as normal by some very evil leaders," we said. Fortunately, Jon Coupal says "this battle on behalf of California's beleaguered taxpayers and ratepayers is not over." ★

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Response to League of California Cities on Corporation-Backed Ballot Measure Threatening Voter Rights

Last month, the Carmichael Times March Edition included a special release by the League of California Cities regarding the Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act.

Unfortunately, what we saw in the League's release was more of the same. Spreading misinformation and narratives not based in fact, let's set the record straight.

So, what does the Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act do? In short, at the local level it restores the key provisions of Prop. 218, requiring special taxes placed on the ballot by citizen initiative to obtain a two-thirds vote of the electorate once again.

Prop. 218 was settled law, undisputed by cities and counties, and created a clear framework that provided taxpayers certainty on new and higher taxes, while giving local jurisdictions the ability to raise both general and special taxes. In fact, local governments were so comfortable with the framework of Prop. 218, and their ability to raise necessary revenue under its provisions, that the League of Cities sided with the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association and defended Prop. 218's taxpayer protection provisions in the court case that created the loophole in Prop. 218.

In addition, the Act clearly clarifies the existing definition of what is a 'tax,' and requires either voters, or the local governing body, to approve all taxes and exempt charges. Despite the clear intent of the voters when they passed Prop. 13, Prop. 218, and Prop. 26, the courts have, for the last decade, created significant loopholes that directly contradict what voters approved at the ballot box.

Lastly, to preserve local control and predictability of tax dollars, the Act requires local property tax revenue to stay in the county in which it is collected. There have been repeated attempts to direct this revenue to the state for redistribution back to the counties, forcing some counties to lose millions of dollars in local property tax revenue. Thanks to Prop. 13, local property tax revenue is one of the most predictable and stable funding sources for a county. The Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act ensures these dollars and the certainty they provide stay within the county in which they were generated.

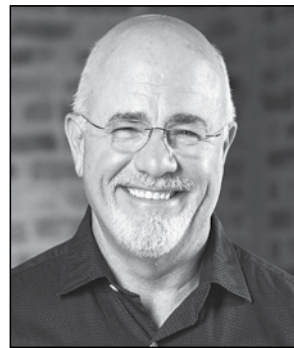
The Act also applies many of these same provisions at the state level, requiring voters to approve all statewide taxes passed by the Legislature and requiring the Legislature to approve all fees and other charges, as defined by the measure.

California has an affordability crisis, and it's only getting worse. With families across California struggling and the cost of living continuing to skyrocket, we must act now.

The Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act will guarantee voters, not politicians, have the final decision on whether or not to raise taxes, maintain current revenue streams, and ensure transparency and accountability on future tax and fee increases.

No amount of dissembling by the League of California Cities can alter the fact that the Taxpayer Protection Act preserves the letter and spirit of Propositions 13 and 218.

to take river water for two or three-months last year. Our strategy is to develop new wells."

Drilling 600 ft to ground water will access the vast natural aquifer that extends below Sacramento. During rainy seasons, water percolates through soil to replenish this reservoir. The CWD well will also inject excess surface water underground. Project construction will include a chlorination facility, piping and a back-up generator to serve the facility during electrical outages.

Costs will not tap out consumer budgets. The California Department of Water Resources will contribute \$4 million. Another \$2 million in Federal funding comes from the Bureau of Reclamation.

Congressmember Ami Bera was among groundbreaking VIPs. "When my family moved to Sacramento in 1965," he said, "we thought about water problems in terms of flooding. Now we don't just have flood risk – we also have drought seasons. Wells are the best way to take advantage of groundwater and to store water in wet years."

The La Sierra project, he explained, will benefit Carmichael and other water-needy districts. "We are all in this together," he said.

Work is projected to cause minimal interruption to Garfield and Engle Road traffic. CWD will break ground for more district aquifer projects over the next several years. Their locations are not yet confirmed.

Education Committee Approves Bill to Help Students in Underperforming Schools

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Assemblymembers Josh Hoover (R-Folsom) and Greg Wallis (R-Palm Springs) announced March 23, 2023, the passage of Assembly Bill 237 (Wallis and Hoover), which provides more educational options for students in underperforming schools. It was approved on a 5-0 vote in the Assembly Education Committee.

"It is critically important that we increase educational options for families within the traditional public school system," said Assemblyman Hoover. "This bill breaks down barriers for struggling students and allows parents the flexibility to find a school that better fits the needs of their child."

"Students and families are being left

behind in situations that are beyond their control," said Assemblymember Wallis. "Our most vulnerable students deserve the opportunity to find a new school that will help them bridge the achievement gap and succeed with the support they need. This bill will provide that opportunity."

Specifically, the bill would prohibit a home school district from vetoing an interdistrict transfer for an underperforming student at an underperforming school. It now moves to the Assembly Appropriations Committee for consideration.

Josh Hoover represents Assembly District 7, which includes the cities of Citrus Heights, Folsom, and Rancho Cordova and the unincorporated communities of Carmichael, Fair Oaks, Foothill Farms, Gold River, Mather, McClellan Park, North Highlands, Orangevale, and Rosemont. ★

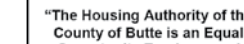


