## Medi-Cal Holding Seniors Back

California living is expensive. So imagine having to get by on \$600 a month. That's essentially what some seniors and people with disabilities have to do in order to access Medi-Cal, the state's health insurance program for low-income residents.

Individuals with significant medical expenses — but whose income is too high to qualify for free Medi-Cal — may still access the program if they pay some of the costs.

That share of cost works like a monthly deductible; people are allowed to keep \$600 for personal use and must spend the rest of their

income on health care expenses before their Medi-Cal coverage kicks in.

"If you make \$1,600 a month, \$1,000 has to go toward paying for your care," said Tiffany Huyenh-Cho, a staff attorney at Justice in Aging, an organization that is urging state lawmakers to update the income rule. Because people using this type of Medi-Cal usually have costly care, for some it's worth paying, but most can't afford it, she said.

In January of this year, the latest month for which state data is available, there were about 81,000 people who were enrolled in Medi-Cal but couldn't use it because they did not meet their share of the cost. The

majority are over 65 or have a disability, data show.

Take Maxine Wells of San Diego — she is 91, and with the help of her son, Keith Wells, she recently applied for Medi-Cal. Her Social Security monthly income of \$2,000 puts her over the limit for free coverage. Keith is still waiting to get official word from the state on his mom's eligibility status, but isn't sure they'll be able to meet her share of the cost.

The dollar amount that people get to keep, \$600 for an individual and \$934 for a couple, hasn't changed since 1989, when the minimum wage was \$4.25 an hour.

## Grand Jury Releases New Status Review

Superior Court of California News Release

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)

When required to respond to a Sacramento County Grand Jury report showing a less than robust record of leadership at the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Grand Jury found that the Board of Supervisors has opted to dodge and deflect. But the Grand Jury's deep concern, plainly stated in that February 2022 report, continues.

In the Grand Jury's newly issued Status Review, it finds that the Board's responses to the Grand Jury report reflect the Board's continuing refusal to acknowledge or accept responsibility for any deficiencies of leadership, accountability or engagement at the outset of the 2020 countywide emergency.

The Grand Jury in its February 2022 report called out the Board for lack of oversight and leadership during the first five critical months of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Grand Jury conducted extensive research and interviews which found: 1) the Board of Supervisors handed off essential decision-making and CARES Act funding responsibility to its County Executive, or his designee; 2) the Board did not receive timely reports on allocation of CARES Act funds; 3) it failed to demand regular public updates on County pandemic activities; and 4) the Board failed to provide public forums to assess the vast array of needs and challenges faced by residents across Sacramento County.

The record of Board sessions speaks for itself: No actions were taken to publicly account for use of emergency funding, engaging with local residents and businesses, and even with its own agency heads, and is documented in the Grand Jury report.

It was this pattern of lack of leadership, engagement and oversight that was contained in the Grand Jury's report, and the basis of its findings and recommendations. The Grand Jury found that in the Board's response, it unfortunately cloaks itself in bureaucratic, misleading, and at times inaccurate statements.

The Board of Supervisors' position that there is 'nothing to see here' reflects the precise leadership and accountability deficiencies outlined in the Report. Sacramento County needs and deserves engaged, accountable

## Sacramento County Recommended Budget Approved

**SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously on June 9 to approve the \$7.3 billion recommended budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23.

"Sacramento County's FY 2022-23 budget works to address many of the needs of our community and includes additional investments in programs and services related to homelessness, mental health, substance abuse and social services for some of the most vulnerable people among us, while maintaining vital and essential existing services," said District Five Supervisor and Board Chair Don Nottoli.

The \$7.3 billion budget consists of \$2.8 billion in Enterprise and Special Revenue Fund appropriations (utility rates, fees and other dedicated revenue), \$3.5 billion in General Fund appropriations (\$936 million in discretionary resources, \$1.1 billion in restricted funds, and the remaining

\$1.4 billion with Federal, State and fee revenue dedicated to specific purposes), and \$1.1 billion in Restricted Funds.

"This approved budget reflects substantial investments in new and enhanced programs based on the Board's priorities and a survey of Sacramento residents," said County Executive Ann Edwards. "In addition to increased funding addressing homelessness, social services and improving the condition of County roads, we were able to set aside more money in the County's 'rainy day' reserve funds."

The recommended budget recognized new or enhanced areas of growth, including annual commitments of: Addressing Homelessness — \$5.3 million to fund new programs and services addressing homelessness in the County; Road Pavement Rehabilitation Projects — \$20 million in one-time Net County Cost transferred from the General Fund to the Roads Fund to fund pavement maintenance and rehabilitation on roads throughout the

unincorporated County. Substance Use Disorder Residential Treatment — \$10 million for the Department of Health Services to procure an additional 156 beds annually for substance use disorder residential treatment; Crisis Stabilization Units — \$5 million for the Department of Health Services to establish a pool for behavioral health crisis stabilization units, which is a service the County is required to provide to Medi-Cal beneficiaries; Mental Health Services Act Full Service Partnership — \$7.5 million in MHSA and Federal match for the Department of Health Services to procure Full Service Partnership programming as a requirement in fulfilling permanent supportive housing commitments; School-Based Mental Health Program — \$4.3 million of Medi-Cal funding for the Department of Health Services to provide increased support to the school-based mental health program, with a planned site expansion to 40 sites; Child, Family and Adult Services

— \$19.1 million to support Child Family and Adult Services' programs, including \$5.4 million to provide enhanced security services at the Centralized Placement Support Unit; Afghan Refugee Assistance — \$3 million in Net County Cost for the Department of Human Assistance to provide services to support new Afghan arrivals in adjusting to their new environment.

During budget deliberations, the Board added additional items totaling \$2.6 million in appropriations, which included: \$1 million for additional scattered sites to house people experiencing homelessness; \$498,072 to provide a fourth staff position in Districts 1,3,4 and 5; \$450,000 for improvements at McFarland Ranch, American River Ranch and Dillard Ranch; \$167,881 to provide a position supporting homeless issues in District 2; \$150,000 to Visit Sacramento for a total annual contribution of \$500,000; \$106,690 to provide

**CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG)** - Wildlife lovers opened hearts and wallets at the recent Effie Yeaw Nature Center Spring Gala.

Supporters enjoying the al-fresco fete also saw deer and wild turkey within yards of their tables. After a scaled-down 2021 event, the non-profit's celebration returned to pre-pandemic format with more than 150 guests.

Good Day Sacramento anchor Molly Riehl was emcee and auctioneer Keith McLane spurred record-breaking auction bids. Paddles were wielded to raise more than \$40,000 for fund-a-need opportunities. Some of these proceeds provide free nature education programs for schools that could not otherwise afford them.

Fundraising was augmented by an auction of art from the "Wild Things" show exhibited at Sacramento Fine Arts Center. Celebrity painters also donated work. Famed Carmichael artist Pat Mahony contributed a river portrait called "Wind Swept Afternoon" that blew away for \$5750. Highest art price of \$7500 was paid for Deladier

Almeida's "Spring Morning" landscape. A small Terry Muir canvas changed hands for \$5000.

In addition to art, vacations and entertainment packages were auctioned. Furious bidding on a Sea Ranch (Sonoma) vacation raised more than \$5000. Four tickets to a "Book of Mormon" performance inspired an \$800 bid. A Placerville truffle hunt - libated by prickly pear mimosas and finessed by Italian truffle hounds - snouted up \$1200.

"We were thrilled by support for our first back-to-normal gala," rejoiced American River Natural History Association President Laurie Weir. "We're grateful to those who donated art and prizes. Member and community response helps us face future challenges with improving confidence."

Administered by the ARNHA, the Nature Center welcomes more than 100,000 visitors per year. Programs are catered for child and adult education. An adjacent 100-acre preserve is a protected home to countless birds, mammals and reptiles.

# Sacramento County to Launch First 'Safe Stay' Site

**SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - The Board of Supervisors approved Sacramento County's first proposed "Safe Stay Community" for persons experiencing homelessness. The new concept community will open at 8144 Florin Road, on the corner of Power Inn and Florin at the former site of a now razed grocery store. The site will house up to 100 Pallet sleeping cabins - both single and double occupancy, bathrooms, and communal gathering spaces. At any point in time, it can shelter up to 125 people.

The Board originally heard this item at its April 26 meeting but voted to delay the item six weeks to allow for more community outreach and engagement.

Safe stay communities are temporary shelter settings for unhoused community members. These communities are built as a safer and more sanitary environment and offer critical services oriented towards exiting to permanent housing. Each site will include 24/7 security, case management services, on-site power, sanitation and food services. The County will develop good neighbor policies for the operator and occupants.

"This is an important first step in implementing Safe Stay Communities throughout the County," said District 2 Supervisor, Patrick Kennedy. "This project will ensure people experiencing homelessness in the area will be put in a stable environment and are

connected to services to help get their lives in order. We are fully committed to making this and other Safe Stay Communities a success for our neighborhoods, business districts and our homeless neighbors."

Guests for every Safe Stay Community will be brought in from the immediate neighborhood, not only providing direct relief to the community, but providing local and dignified shelter in an area the guest is familiar with.

The County is concurrently standing up Encampment Services Teams who will connect people living unsheltered into the communities and are already providing deeper connections to County behavioral health services, connection to benefits like CalFresh, CalWorks, Medi-Cal, etc., linkages to longer-term shelters, and flexible funding to help support individuals' transition into permanent housing. Ultimately, all sites should be considered as a stepping stone to stabilize and support individuals on a pathway to permanent housing.

"It is vital that we get this right, both in terms of ensuring the surrounding community feels listened to, and to best serve our unsheltered constituents," said First District Supervisor Phil Serna who represents the north side of Florin Road in the area where the Safe Stay campus is proposed. "It is absolutely incumbent that the 'Safe Stay' campus be a great neighbor to nearby residents, businesses, educational campuses, and places of worship. It's why that as

the third vote to approve the county's first 'Safe Stay' site, I was insistent critical 'good neighbor' policy elements be adopted." said Supervisor Serna.

While homelessness can be successfully addressed by providing stable, affordable housing, combined with appropriate support services, this approach can take many years. Safe Stay Communities provide immediate safe and hygienic locations for persons experiencing homelessness to live and access services. The communities also provide a consistent location for service providers and outreach workers to engage on a more regular basis with occupants.

Additionally, some of the broader community benefits anticipated by having this safe space community include a reduction in trash and debris, the mitigation of environmental and health hazards, and the ability to restore land previously occupied by unsanctioned encampments to its intended use.

Work will begin on the site in the near future, including the assembly of the cabins, followed by additional infrastructure, such as electricity and sewer, through the summer/fall - we anticipate moving guests sometime in November if there are no delays. # Placer Native Among 5 Marines Killed in Aircraft Crash

**GLAMIS, CA (MPG)** - Five United States Marines tragically died in an aircraft crash Wednesday, June 8, in Glamis, California, during what was supposed to be a routine training session.

One of the five victims was identified as Capt. John J. Sax, 33, of Placer, California. The other four victims were: Cpl. Nathan E. Carlson, 21, of Winnebago, Illinois, a Tiltrotor Crew Chief. Capt. Nicholas P. Losapio, 31, of Rockingham, New Hampshire, an MV-22B Pilot. Cpl. Seth D. Rasmuson, 21, of Johnson, Wyoming, a Tiltrotor Crew Chief. Lance Cpl. Evan A. Strickland, 19, of Valencia, New Mexico, a Tiltrotor Crew Chief.

John Sax graduated from Granite Bay High School and went on to become a MV-22B Pilot for the Marines. John Sax is the son of West Sacramento native and five-time MLB All-Star, Steve Sax.

"It is with complete devastation that I announce that my precious son, Johnny, was one of the five US Marines that perished on Wednesday, June 8, in the Osprey Military crash near San Diego," Steve Sax said in a statement published Saturday by CBSLA-TV. "For those of you that knew Johnny, you saw his huge smile, bright light, his love for his family, the Marines, the joy of flying airplanes and defending our country! He was my hero and the best man I know, there was no better person to defend our country."

Steve Sax said when

his son John was a boy, he dreamed of being a pilot and would get distracted by planes flying overhead during his Little League baseball games.

"There was never any doubt from a young age that Johnny would be a pilot and his passion was to fly!" Steve Sax said in a statement. "This loss will change my life forever and is a loss to not only the Marines but this world!"

"It is with heavy hearts that we mourn the loss of five Marines from the Purple Fox family" said Lt. Col. John C. Miller, Commanding Officer of VMM-364, in a news release. "This is an extremely difficult time for VMM-364 and it is hard to express the impact that this loss has had on our squadron and its families."

"Our primary mission now is taking care of the family members of our fallen Marines and we respectfully request privacy for their families as they navigate this difficult time. We appreciate all the prayers and support from the strong extended Purple Fox family and want them to know that more

information will be forthcoming on how to help."

The five Marines were based at Marine Corps Air Station Camp Pendleton, CA, and were flying on a MV-22B Osprey aircraft at the time of the crash. All five were assigned to the Marine Medium Tiltrotor (VMM) Squadron 364, Marine Aircraft Group (MAG) 39, 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing (MAW), according to a news release from the Marines.

At the time of the mishap according to the Marines, the MV-22B Osprey and crew were conducting routine flight training and that the cause of the crash is under investigation. The crash occurred in Imperial County which is about 115 miles east of San Diego and about 50 miles from Yuma, Arizona.

John Sax served in the Marines for five years and eight months. He was awarded with the National Defense Service Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal and Letter of Appreciation. John Sax is survived by his 20-month-old daughter and his wife Amber, who is pregnant with their second child. ★

# Medi-Cal Holding Seniors Back

"It was shocking to hear it hasn't been updated since then," Keith Wells said.

Older adults like Wells also qualify for Medicare, the federal health insurance program for seniors and people with disabilities. But Medicare doesn't cover all her needs or at-home care. Wells, a former beauty shop owner, suffers the aftermath of a heart attack, which left her heart muscle damaged. She has chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), dementia and anxiety. Medi-Cal would supplement her Medicare coverage. About 1.4 million Californians are enrolled in both programs.

California has put forth sweeping and first-in-the-nation policies to expand health insurance coverage to more people. It has one of the lowest uninsured rates in the country — about 6% of California residents don't have health insurance. Still, pockets of people continue to struggle to afford the coverage and care they need, meaning they go without it.

Aging advocates say older adults tend to live on fixed incomes but are sometimes subject to rules that haven't kept up

with the current cost of living.

Aging and health advocates are now asking legislators and the governor's office to allow Medi-Cal recipients who need to pay a share of cost to keep more of their income. Assembly Bill 1900 by Assemblymember Dr. Joaquin Arambula, a Fresno Democrat, proposes to raise the monthly limit from \$600 for an individual, which is about 55% of the federal poverty level, to \$1,562, or 138% of the federal poverty level.

This adjustment would require federal approval, according to the Department of Health Care Services, which oversees the Medi-Cal program.

Arambula's bill made it out of the Assembly last week and is now before the Senate. "This is simply a matter of fairness for Californians who are struggling to make ends meet and need access to health care," Arambula said about his bill in the Assembly Health Committee hearing earlier this year.

Linda Nguy, a policy advocate with the Western Center on Law and Poverty, said it would be difficult to pass the bill if funding for it isn't included in this year's state budget. Funding for this proposal

was not included in the governor's May revision of the budget.

However, the version of the budget released by the Legislature's Democratic leaders allocates \$31 million to reduce the share of cost for this population. The Legislature and Gov. Gavin Newsom must now come together and hammer out a final budget.

The Legislative Analyst's Office has estimated that this proposal would cost anywhere between \$53 million and \$151 million, of which half would be paid for by the state and the other half through federal funds. Without that funding, Arambula's bill would likely get stuck in the Senate's fiscal committee, Nguy said.

At least nine other states and the District of Columbia allow people who pay a share of cost for Medi-Cal (Medicaid in other states) to keep a higher amount for personal use than California does, according to the Kaiser Family Foundation.



# Scandalizing The Little Ones

In the New Testament, Jesus Christ says:

“But he that shall scandalize one of these little ones that believe in me, it was better for him that a millstone should be hanged about his neck, and that he should be drowned in the depth of the sea.”

This quote from our Savior seems appropriate to our present-day cultural crisis, as we observe the outrageous and unjustified controversy cooked up by the “woke” Left over Florida’s new parental rights bill which prohibits the indoctrination of small schoolchildren in transgenderism and sexual deviancy. Governor DeSantis’ effort to protect young kids as young as five from having the public schools corrupt their young minds with such dangerous cultural Marxist ideologies should be applauded, not condemned.

Undoubtedly, the Left’s current campaign to convince 5-year-old boys that they are girls and vice versa, that they should undergo “gender reassignment” surgery, or that young teenagers should receive so-called “puberty blockers” (which are actually just a form of chemical castration) would, in a saner day in this nation be classified as child abuse and child endangerment and prosecuted in the courts.

Of course, the entire purpose of the Left’s drive to target America’s children is because the final arrival of their cultural Marxist “utopia” cannot be attained without capturing the youth. Every communist leader from Lenin to Mao has emphasized the need to capture a nation’s youth and its educational institutions in order to guarantee the passing of the “old order” and the inauguration of a new amoral, godless state in which only government is worshipped.

“He immediately set plans in motion to de-Christianize Hungary. Reasoning that if Christian sexual ethics could be undermined among children, then both the hated patriarchal family and Church would be dealt a crippling blow. Lukacs launched a radical sex education program in the schools. Sex lectures were organized, and literature handed out which graphically instructed youth in free love (promiscuity) and sexual intercourse while simultaneously encouraging them to deride and reject Christian moral ethics, monogamy, and parental and church authority. All of this was accompanied by a reign of cultural terror perpetrated against parents, priests, and dissenters.”

Lukacs was, of course, a follower of the cultural Marxist philosophy of Antonio Gramsci, the Italian communist who helped found the so-called “Frankfurt School.” Gramsci is the revolutionary who coined the term “long march through the institutions” to describe his strategy of sabotaging the religious, moral, and cultural foundations of Western Christian societies before launching the attack on capitalism. As a result of Lukacs’ atheistic and nihilistic propaganda program for Hungary’s public schools, much of that nation’s youth descended into delinquency, becoming bullies, thieves, sex predators, murderers, and sociopaths.

Today’s “woke” revolutionaries are merely heirs to the old Gramsci-Lukacs Bolsheviks who saw – in the words of author and

past presidential candidate Patrick Buchanan – Christianity as the “heat shield of capitalism,” which must be annihilated before the so-called “class struggle” could come to full fruition. What better way to achieve this objective than banning religious education from the schools and introducing sex education, unmoored from any religious or moral traditions instead. Of course, it is questionable whether the old cultural Marxists would go even as far as their modern contemporaries who outright deny science and argue that gender is not biologically determined, and that people should determine their own sexual identity.

Comprehensive Sex Education (CSE) is the Far Left’s latest scheme to scandalize our children and destroy their innocence, while challenging their parents’ authority and values. CSE is bent on radically sexualizing children as young as five. Its materials are explicit and pornographic. This is what Governor DeSantis of Florida is fighting against. # Voters in SF and LA Voice their disgust

It may be tempting to make too much of what happened Tuesday in California’s two most prominent cities, San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Right-wing media are screaming that the overwhelming recall of San Francisco’s uber-progressive district attorney, Chesa Boudin, and businessman Rick Caruso’s top finish in a field of 12 candidates for mayor bodes well for a Republican comeback in this deep blue state.

That’s not going to happen.

However, it’s also tempting to make too little of Tuesday’s voting patterns in those two cities. Progressives rationalize Boudin’s ouster and Caruso’s strong finish as attempts by the Trumpian right to seize control. In fact Boudin tried, and failed, to make that case to his city’s voters.

Rather, both outcomes reflect legitimate concerns by voters, including those who consider themselves to be left-of-center Democrats, that the quality of life in both cities has deteriorated and that their elected leaders have failed to recognize and confront that fact.

Deterioration is especially stark in San Francisco with rampant drug use that

is taking a heavy toll on human life, squalid camps of the homeless dominating city sidewalks and a wave of burglaries and smash-and-grab robberies that goes unpunished.

Writer Nellie Bowles vividly captures the San Francisco crisis and why ordinarily progressive San Franciscans became disgusted in a lengthy article that Atlantic magazine published today.

“They did it because (Boudin) didn’t seem to care that he was making the citizens of our city miserable in service of an ideology that made sense everywhere but in reality,” Bowles wrote. “It’s not just about Boudin, though. There is a sense that, on everything from housing to schools, San Francisco has lost the plot – that progressive leaders here have been LARPing left-wing values instead of working to create a livable city. And many San Franciscans have had enough.”

Bowles noted that Boudin’s recall was foretold by the recall of San Francisco school board members who were preoccupied with symbolic acts of political correctness, such as changing the names on school buildings while ignoring the effects of school closures due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

“I used to tell myself that San Francisco’s politics were wacky but the city was trying – really trying – to be good,” she wrote. “But the reality is that with the smartest minds and so much money and the very best of intentions, San Francisco became a cruel city. It became so dogmatically progressive that maintaining

the purity of the politics required accepting – or at least ignoring – devastating results.”

Boudin himself came close to acknowledging why he lost, albeit with a tinge of rationalization, telling the San Francisco Chronicle, “Voters were not given an opportunity to choose between criminal justice reform and something else. They were given an opportunity to voice their frustrations and their outrage and they took that opportunity.”

What about Los Angeles? It has suffered from the same chronic problems that plague San Francisco and a political leadership that has been equally ineffective in dealing with them. Caruso, a very wealthy shopping center developer, tapped into widespread frustration, particularly about crime, in a deluge of self-financed media ads.

Los Angeles’ notoriously low voter turnout also helped Caruso garner more than 40% of Tuesday’s vote, topping Congresswoman Karen Bass, the candidate of the city’s Democratic leadership, by several points.

However, with neither getting a majority, they are headed for a runoff in the November election, when turnout will be higher. That will be a truer test of whether Angelenos are ready for the change that Republican-turned-Democrat Caruso promises but Bass and her supporters shouldn’t ignore the quality-of-life backlash.

## UC Davis Health Clears Way for Construction on Hospital of the Future

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - UC Davis Health started clearing the way today for what will be the region's most advanced hospital tower – the UC Davis Medical Center's California Tower.

Crews started demolition of multiple temporary buildings on the site of the future tower. It's a necessary step to make the site ready for a California Tower groundbreaking in 2023 and open to patients in 2030.

The \$3.75 billion tower is a replacement for existing parts of the hospital that must be closed due to state seismic laws. Approved by the UC Board of Regents in January, the tower will be added to the eastern side of the existing UC Davis Medical Center. It will feature a 14-story hospital tower and five-story pavilion, adding to a hospital complex that has been expanding eastward and serving the neighborhoods at this location for over 150 years.

"This project incorporates lessons from the pandemic and those lessons will help us to deliver superior care for Northern Californians for the next 50 years," said David Lubarsky, CEO of UC Davis Health. "The California Tower will triple our ICU capability, making half of our patient rooms ICU-ready. This investment will be a cornerstone in the critical care we provide

our patients and the region moving forward."

The new additions reflect UC Davis Health's long-time commitment to education, research, patient care and community health. They complement the health system's mission of improving health for all. The project is also the result of state seismic safety mandates, which put a deadline on hospitals to either upgrade their existing facilities or construct new buildings.

The California Tower adds to the Medical Center's existing University and Davis Towers and will add approximately one million square feet of additional space. It will include operating rooms, an imaging center, an expanded pharmacy, additional burn care units, and about 400 single-patient rooms. The new rooms will replace others being taken out of service in older parts of the building. With 646 beds currently, the UC Davis Medical Center will continue to be the largest hospital in the Sacramento area. It will have a total of 675-700 inpatient beds when the project is completed.

More than 250 of the rooms are being designed for greater flexibility in the event of a patient surge such as during a pandemic, massive wildfire, radiation leak or other major event. These adaptable rooms will easily convert into intensive-care-unit rooms with air isolation so that they could be used to care for patients of any level

of hospitalization.

"As the COVID-19 pandemic has taught us, embracing the unexpected is a common theme in medicine," said Lubarsky. "Having the adaptability of patient rooms to meet a critical care surge means these new facilities will be positioned to meet the region's needs for the next 50 years."

"This project will further harness the advantage of UC Davis Medical Center being one of Sacramento County's largest employers to increase community wealth-building and strengthen our surrounding neighborhoods," said Brad Simmons, chief administrator of UC Davis Medical Center. "This project will help improve health outcomes for area residents and ensure a robust health care safety net for historically marginalized populations, especially when it comes to providing specialty care hospital services."

The California Tower project is expected to create hundreds of construction jobs and thousands of new health care positions for the surrounding community, a benefit of being home to an anchor institution like UC Davis Medical Center. Anchor institutions are place-based, mission-driven entities like universities and hospitals that leverage economic power alongside human and intellectual resources to improve the long-term health and social welfare of surrounding communities. ★

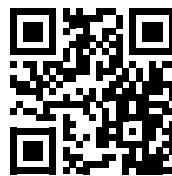

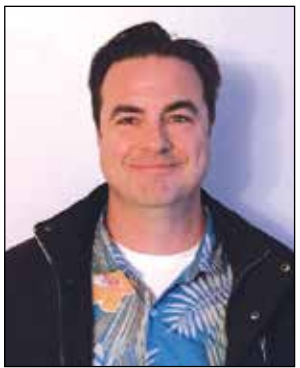

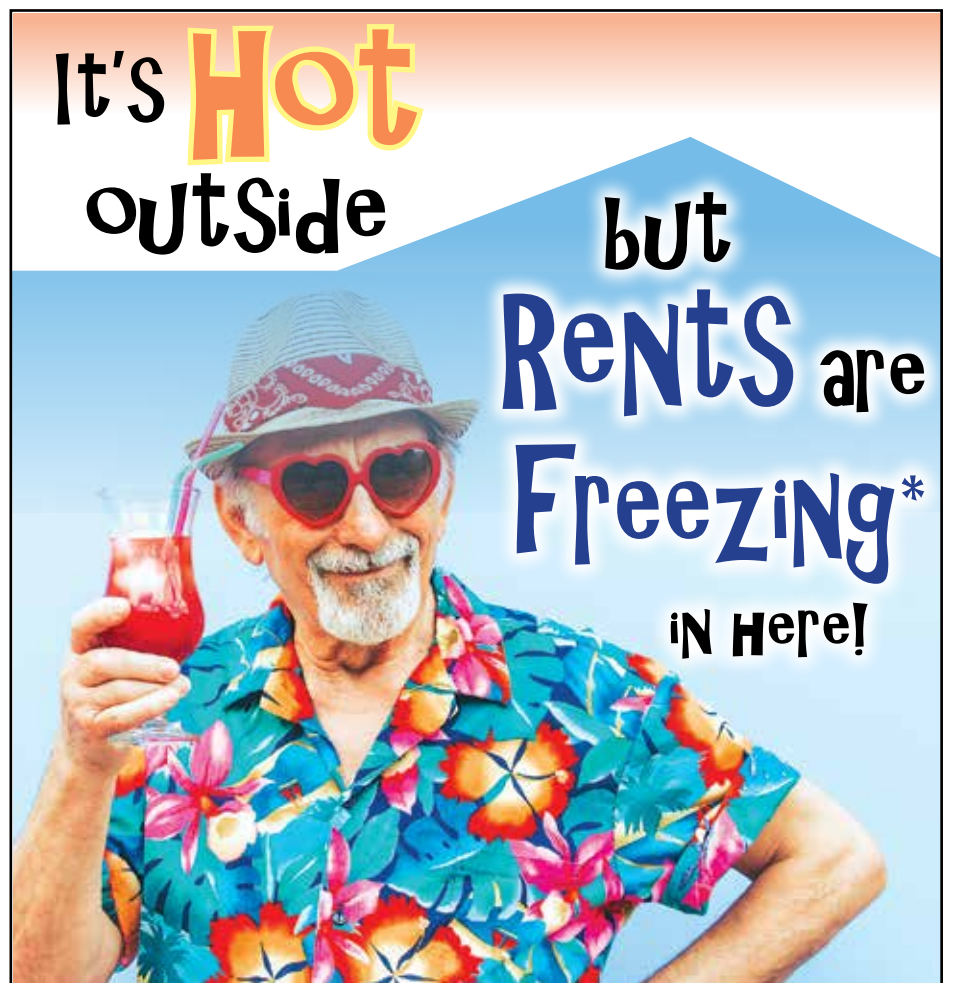
"Sites and departments across the district can always count on Aaron to quickly fix
