RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - A new art exhibit – Rancho Cordova: A Grassroots City – is in place at The Village Green in Rancho Cordova. The exhibit opened with a reception on July 11. The project was conceived and sponsored by SK pharmteco, and its subsidiary, Ampac Fine Chemicals. Ampac president Jeff Butler with others in the company wanted to recognize and feature what their employees are doing outside of their work, as well as highlighting the many creators and innovators of Rancho Cordova. All of this fit in with

the 20th anniversary of the Cityhood of Rancho Cordova. Kathleen Juviler is manager of SK U.S. Communication Global

Development Group. "Some, such as Rancho Cordova Food Locker and Volunteers of America, we have relationships with through volunteer outreach that we've done," Juviler said. "We spoke to business owners and volunteer coordinators and said, 'Who's special here, who's a change-maker, who's a doer, who brings life to this community?' That's how we met all the incredible people we've highlighted." The planners called in an art curation team, Photoville, creative storytellers who worked with the participants to produce photographic storyboards that are present now through August 11 at The Village Green park, 3141 Bridgeway Dr., Rancho Cordova. They contacted Cheryl Gleason and Shelly Blanchard whom they

Local Nonprofit Seeks Help after Fireworks Stand Robbery

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Oksana Melnychuk is a soft spoken and kind woman with big ambition. Besides holding down several professional positions, she is also one of the founders of Hands of Support – an off-shoot ministry of a local church aimed at assisting Ukrainian refugees. Unfortunately, the group's progress was recently halted when their fireworks stand was robbed over the 4th of July week.

With the Russia-Ukraine conflict continuing, the Sacramento region has become home to thousands of refugees in recent months. Melnychuk, who is herself Ukrainian, is part of a team of volunteers who were looking for a way to help.

"We needed food, all the supplies, everything," she stated. "We provide kids camp, youth camp, and food ministry."

The group was also providing another important thing – housing. Using a spare building that was for sale at Revival Christian Center in Rancho Cordova, Hands of Support created a makeshift living space for approximately 400 refugees over the course of four months. Each resident stayed for a maximum of 30 days, and the programming continued until the City of Rancho Cordova shut them down due to code noncompliance.

"We did it silently until someone complained," says Melnychuk, "But the city paid for one month at a hotel for those still living at the church."

With the temporary housing now shuttered, Hands of Support continued to dream big as they held weekly fellowships and planned to raise money to purchase a house that would allow them to continue to offer shelter. Working one of the area's TNT fireworks stands seemed like an ideal fundraiser.

As Melnychuk shared from her own refugee experience, "I came in 2004. I had relatives, but people come here with no one and it's scary."

The fireworks fundraiser started off smoothly but took a turn when the storage container holding the group's fireworks was robbed on the night of Wednesday, June 28. Although sales of the fireworks had barely started, the group discovered the next morning that their complete inventory was gone. In an unrelated incident a few days prior,

Another State Debacle

The State spent \$600 million, but can't say whether it helped

As Gov. Gavin Newsom retools the state's prison system to emphasize rehabilitation, his administration has little evidence that a privately run program for parolees costing taxpayers \$100 million a year works to prevent future crime.

The state does not collect data on whether parolees who participate in the program have found jobs or whether they are returned to prison

for another crime. What state data does show is that only 40% of participants completed at least one of the services they were offered.

The information gap frustrates critics of the governor's policies as well as supporters who want evidence that the state's investments are working.

"At the end of the day, we've come from 160,000 people incarcerated down to 95 (thousand). So, we've had some success," said Assemblymember Reggie

Jones-Sawyer, a Los Angeles Democrat, referring to the decline in the state's prison population since 2011.

"But I also want to ensure the public that they've been safe with all these people not recidivating... And the only way we can do that is to come up with data," he said.

CalMatters' yearlong investigation of the parolee reentry program draws on court records, state reports and data, contracts, tax forms, policy

Help Prevent Public Bicycle and Hiking Easements from Being Abandoned

Save the American River Association News Release

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - One of the last wild-life sanctuaries along the Lower American River is in danger of disappearing. Over 4,000 citizens have signed a petition to stop the fill of this 20-acre floodway. We are very concerned about the Trumark Development Application of June 12, 2023, to build 220 homes in the Central Valley Flood Protection Board's floodway adjacent to our Federally designated Wild and Scenic American River. This property is in the Parkway Corridor Combining Zone, Erosion Zone 4, and subject to erosion of 10' in 10 years.

The directly northern and upriver Tiffany Farms HOA neighborhood is also in Erosion Zone 4. The Tiffany Farms HOA lost 10 feet riverfront bank in 2017 – in just one year.

The Trumark proposal for the Old Kassis site proposes to build a 6' high retaining wall just 20' from the river bluff edge, with 3 prominent gaps to remain at existing grade.

The developer states it will no longer be in a floodway after raising the land. Placing over 40,000 cubic yards import fill plus the collapse of the upper tier alluvial terrace pushing another 234,000 cubic yards of soil into this floodway and expecting a 6' retaining wall to hold 275,000

cubic yards of fill on top of the sand and gravel base with underground water in this riparian habitat adjacent to the river is not a solid investment. In twenty years, the owners may pay the price. Before then, neighborhoods east and west of the parcel will have their health and safety threatened as the floodway will no longer serve to buffer the upcoming rise in water expected to regularly increase as happened this year.

Trumark is required to apply for a variance with the Central Valley Flood Protection Board. We have respectfully requested this variance be denied as it is contrary to the overall mission of the Board

and the original purpose of the designated floodways and contrary to Title 23 California Code of Regulations (CCR) Waters, Division 1, Section 113(b), which prohibits the construction of year-round dwellings within an Adopted Plan of Flood Control absent a Major Variance and Section 107 of the Board's Regulations which prohibits the construction of residential structures within Designated Floodways.

Private projects should not be allowed to set precedent to encroach into the American River designated floodway.

The City of Rancho Cordova's General Plan

states under XI Safety Element, Action S.2.2.4 "Discourage the use of fill to create buildable area within the 100-year floodplain, except in extreme circumstances consistent with all other applicable policies and regulations, and after review to determine potential impacts on wildlife, habitat, and flooding on other parcels."

We live in uncertain times. Insurance companies are withdrawing from California due to increasing floods and fires. "A 1987 follow-up report by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers determined the February 1986 flood was about a 70-year event on the American River and that Folsom Reservoir

was capable of controlling a 63-year flood event in the downstream levee capacity of 115,000 cfs. According to California State Parks, Folsom Dam alone prevented an estimated \$4.7 billion dollars in flood damages." This occurred despite forecasts "for the 1986 water year called for below-normal runoff. Instead, 30,000 acres were flooded in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta."

The photograph included here shows how high the American River rose along the bluff of this property after just one day of the rainfall in January 2023. If the Sacramento River hadn't experienced levee breaks

and reservoirs been empty due to drought, this property would have served as overflow and thereby protect the adjacent neighborhoods as it has during floods in prior years.

We have respectfully requested that the CVFPB do the right thing by upholding the original intent of the California Code and protect the American River as an important health and safety asset to channel the increasing water flow evidenced this year and in the coming years of forecasted increases in flooding.

featured because "they are such staples of the community," Juviler said. "They worked with us to help identify participants."

Glendon said Photoville contacted her, looking for people within the community. "What kind of people do you want?" Cheryl asked them. "How about a 100-year-old?" I gave them Kiyō's number. They said, 'Do you know Conrade Mayer?' I said, 'Yeah, here's his number.' Glendon suggested Courtney Conklin, owner of Rise Up Theater, which is about to move into a dedicated location later this year or early next year.

Three employees of Ampac are included in the exhibit. "Ron (Parrish) is one of our maintenance painters here, he's featured in the exhibit today," Butler said. "He does a number of things with clergy, with disabled veterans." Two other Ampac employees included in the exhibit are Cheryl Agutos, an Ampac operator who has a background working with veterans, and Wendy Lin, an Ampac senior financial analyst.

Lin is also principal and co-founder of Sierra Chinese School. "At the beginning of founding Sierra Chinese School, it was for my son when he was five years old," Lin said. "Now my son has already graduated from college this year." Lin keeps the school going for the younger generation to learn their language and cultural heritage. The school is also for the people of the community who are interested in learning Chinese language, culture, and arts.

There were many Rancho Cordovans worthy of inclusion in the exhibit. Andy Berchielli is president of the Live Steam

Train Club, the Sacramento Valley Live Steamers, which is celebrating its 50th year. He's been involved with the club for 16 years.

Joseph Makunga is Site Director for Sierra Service Project. He works with SSP Executive Director Megan Taylor. SSP has been partnering with the City of Rancho Cordova since 2015 to complete home repairs. Makunga said on his Photoville exhibit display, "I think about my first time volunteering when I graduated high school. I didn't know how easy it was to do an act of service for somebody."

The Swing Collective provided music for the opening night of the exhibit. "We're a 19-piece, classic swing jazz band," said co-manager Glenn Lewis. "We play different places around town. We rehearse at the Mills Station Art and Culture Center, that's kind of our home base."

SK pharmteco is a global contract development and manufacturing organization specializing in the production of active pharmaceutical ingredients, advanced intermediates, and cell and gene therapy for the pharmaceutical industry. "SK pharmteco is a U.S. based, U.S. Company," Butler said. "Its headquarters are right here in Rancho Cordova. Ampac Fine Chemicals, we've been here in this area for over 80 years doing what we're doing . . . Actually, we're right there at Hazel Avenue, right there where Aerojet has been forever." Butler stated that subsidiary Ampac Fine Chemicals, the U.S. subsidiary, has about 730 employees, SK pharmteco globally has about 1,600 employees, of which about a third are here in the Sacramento area. ★

another ministry of the church called God Will Provide had their trailer stolen.

Despite the extreme setback, Hands of Support received more fireworks from TNT and attempted to recoup the loss. "It was a fundraiser and then we started to fund the fundraiser," said Melnychuk.

For TNT's part, representative Jim Castilone stated that the TNT employees collected personal donations for the group, and TNT lowered the margin percentage by half, charging Hands in Support 25% instead of the usual 50% that groups are deducted from the final sales. As of press time, Hands in Motion potentially owed TNT approximately \$10,000, pending a meeting with the company to see if anything else could be done to ease the financial burden.

While the fireworks were housed in a secure metal storage container with a square lock, they did not have an overnight watchman on duty as TNT recommends for all groups participating in the week-long fundraiser. When asked about the situation, Melnychuk expressed concern for the group's

volunteers and level of morale following such a devastating loss.

"For me, the fundraising - I worry about killing the excitement of those who helped. They worked all week and there's no money."

As Hands of Support works through their challenges following the fireworks vandalism, Melnychuk has seemed to retain her tough and inspiring spirit in the same manner the world has observed in many Ukrainians who have shown strength and resilience through impossible circumstances in recent years. She speaks with hope about their continued dream

to still purchase a home for refugees.

"It's needed. Right now, they are talking about where and how to find it."

The group does not currently have a website, but a fellow Christian group, Royal Stage Performing & Visual Arts, has offered to field donations and pass them on. Those wishing to help should make a donation via royalstage.org or Venmo @royal-stage-arts, and making a note in the comment section that the donation is for Hands of Support. All donations are tax-deductible and will go towards helping Ukrainian refugees find friendship, practical life resources, and temporary housing. ★

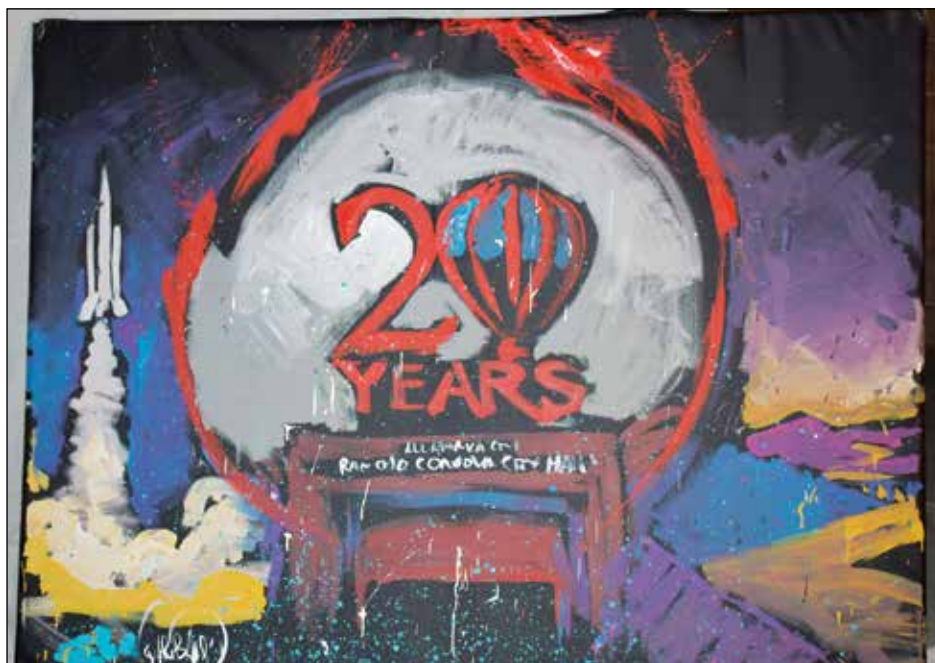
RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - On Saturday, July 1st the City of Rancho Cordova celebrated its 20th year of cityhood. In honor of this historic milestone, the City commissioned performance artist and speed painter David Garibaldi to create three large paintings. Garibaldi, who grew up in the Sacramento area was asked to focus on the history, progress and cultural diversity of the city.

On a very warm evening where earlier in the day temperatures soared to 109 degrees, Garibaldi brought his passion and energy to the amphitheatre at Village Green Park. After being introduced by Rancho Cordova Mayor Linda Budge, Garibaldi took the stage in front of a large crowd of enthusiasts and started to wield his paint-filled brushes to the music of various popular musicians.

With each slash, stroke and dab

The audience was completely mesmerized and engaged as they could only guess what the subject matter was going to end up as.

The first painting that Garibaldi created was an image of the Mills Station Arts & Cultural Center better known as "The MACC". The MACC, in its 6th year of operation, has been the home to many local artist showcases, live musical performances, traveling exhibits focusing on history, culture, and social justice, as well as artist workshops, movies and theatrical plays performed by local theatre groups. Cheryl Gleason, Art Director and Curator of The MACC said, "For a city with a focus on the arts, it was important to represent the arts in our 20 years of cityhood with David Garibaldi. The heat didn't phase him, and the crowd loved the performance."

The second painting featured four very unique individuals dressed in different cultural attire. These four people, two women and two men represent the vast cultural

diversity of the city. A blue-like halo inspired by the City's infinity logo surrounds them.

Dave Ramsey Says

Let's Shift the Focus

Dear Dave,

I graduated from college six years ago with a business degree. Currently, I'm in data analytics making about \$40,000 a year and have \$155,000 in student loan debt. Do you have any recommendations as far as refinancing my student loans and getting the interest rates and monthly payments down?

- Austin

Dear Austin,

I'm not trying to be mean here, but what in the world are you doing in data analytics that pays so poorly? Most of the folks I know in that area make a ton more. And you're going to need to start making a whole lot more to pay off \$155,000 in student loans.

For starters, you

shouldn't be looking at this from a what-can-I-do-to-make-this-manageable perspective. You don't want to give this Sallie Mae nightmare a haircut, then tell her to sit in the corner all nice and pretty. You want her to leave! Now, there's nothing inherently wrong with refinancing to get a lower interest rate, or lower payments, if you do it the right way. But in most cases that translates into keeping the debt around forever. You need a better plan.

Instead, let's shift the main goal from that to paying this thing off as fast as possible. That means big, hairy chunks of payments on the principal. And that'll probably mean picking up an extra job or two, because right now you've got what I call a shovel-to-hole ratio problem. The hole you're in is a big one—a \$155,000 one. And you're working with a \$40,000 shovel. You need a bigger shovel, and a lot of extra

work, instead of trying to keep these loans around like they're pets. What can you do—for a short period of time—that's legal, moral and will make you the most money the fastest?

On the day job side of things, you may want to consider looking for a position with a different company, Austin. You're way underpaid if you're in data analytics and making just \$40,000 a year.

Something Is Clearly Off with California's Homelessness Spending

California put aside \$7.2 billion to address homelessness in the 2021-22 state budget. Last year, there were an estimated 172,000 homeless statewide, which equates to spending nearly \$42,000 per homeless person.

Spending of this magnitude – which only accounts for state money – is sufficient if it were applied effectively. The worsening crisis indicates that something is off with how the state spends its resources.

This perspective is important in light of a comprehensive homeless survey by UC San Francisco. Many of its findings are enlightening, but too many of its suggestions call for more spending.

It strains credulity to believe that spending \$42,000 per person is insufficient, but if bumped up to \$45,000, all will be OK. California does not have the worst-in-the-nation homeless crisis because it spends too little.

Continued calls for more government subsidies supporting the state's ineffective housing-first approach will waste money while failing to alleviate the emergency.

The survey confirms some things we already know, such as most of the homeless in California (78%) are unsheltered. It also provides essential information to help sustainably address homelessness, such as the pivotal role housing unaffordability plays in driving the problem.

Solutions require policymakers to leverage all we have learned to adopt a more innovative structure

for addressing the grim conditions.

The UCSF Benioff Homelessness and Housing Initiative does recommend some innovative policies, such as establishing homeless courts as also advocated by Gov. Gavin Newsom. While neither a perfect nor sweeping solution, a court system ordering treatment programs for the homeless could make a difference.

If the effort has the necessary scope and force, it can help move homeless people suffering from mental illness and addiction into a setting of care rather than the current invisible asylum of "the street, the jail, and the emergency room."

Other suggestions merely throw money at the current ineffective government-run programs, a poor strategy bound to fail. Instead, California should fund well-run and fully accountable private sector groups that help homeless people gain control, address any issues and then become self-sufficient. The "California Way" bias has blinded lawmakers from successful initiatives in other states and tailoring them to West Coast needs. Partnerships and nonprofits in Virginia, Tennessee and elsewhere have shown that they can sustainably address homelessness through novel methods, flexibility and personalization.

Another flaw is the government's focus on "controlling the cost of housing" rather than removing disincentives driving the housing shortage. As rising inflation reminds us, you don't lower the cost of anything by throwing money at people. We need to incentivize more housing supply by lowering costs and construction time through deregulation and avoiding

harmful policies like rent control that worsen housing unaffordability.

The richest target for deregulation is also the state's most firmly entrenched law: the California Environmental Quality Act. While well-intended when enacted in 1970, it has become a destructive force derailing "the possibility of homeownership" among the "hardworking members of Latino, Black and other minority communities," says Jennifer Hernandez, an environmental and land-use lawyer who has documented CEQA's long list of litigation abuses.

Both Newsom and before him Gov. Jerry Brown have publicly supported CEQA reform, which is a start. A better plan would be a legislative initiative to repeal and replace.

Concerns that dismantling CEQA would invite environmental mayhem are overblown. Fresh legislation relying on the volumes of knowledge gained in protecting the environment since CEQA became law, and including provisions that would prevent it from becoming another tool for abuse should not be beyond the abilities of lawmakers.

Spending \$42,000 a year per homeless person is wheel-spinning on a grand scale. It shows a lack of reflection and a poverty of ideas. The progressive policy framework has made no progress on homelessness. It shouldn't be too much to ask lawmakers to rethink their premises.

experts, interviews with vendors and communication with several current and former program participants — some of whom are back in prison.

CalMatters found:

- Corrections department data is outdated, inaccurate or doesn't exist. When the department provided CalMatters with a roster of more than 400 locations providing rehabilitation services, we visited 23 of them, finding some with inaccurate addresses, one with a padlocked gate in front of a seemingly closed site, another that appeared to be abandoned, and three where employees said they were no longer providing rehabilitation services.
- Department officials struggled to explain how many people enrolled in the program in 2020-2021. The department published an annual report noting 17,650 participants. Dana Simas, a department spokesperson at the time, told CalMatters the program served 9,516 people. The department later revised that number to 8,213.
- State data show only two out of five parolees who participated in the rehabilitation program in 2020-2021

completed at least one service offered to them. Based on how the state collects data, it's unclear if anyone finished all of the services offered to them. A spokesperson said the corrections agency "is unable to provide further completion information."

- State officials rarely review the operations of the four companies that operate the program, state accountability reviews show. Records show state officials only documented reviews of three of the more than 400 state-funded reentry homes and treatment facilities from 2018 to December 2022.
- Some of the nonprofit vendors that manage reentry homes lease their facilities from their own executives, according to public records, raising "red flags" among experts who say the arrangements could signal financial conflicts of interest.
- The state's July 2022 list of reentry homes included several with suspended business licenses and nonprofit status revoked years ago by the California Department of Justice — effectively barring them from doing business in California.

The rehabilitation program for parolees formally launched in

2014 under the name Specialized Treatment for Optimized Programming, often referred to as STOP. It is a voluntary program that serves less than a quarter of the roughly 35,000 inmates released from prison each year. Many of the parolees live at the homes; others visit outpatient centers.

The STOP program for parolees, which has cost the state about \$600 million in the past decade, is run by four large contractors. Those companies also contract with nearly 200 nonprofits, private companies or community organizations to provide housing and rehabilitation services for parolees in roughly 450 homes and treatment centers.

All of the contractors told CalMatters that they were proud of the work that they do with the program.

"GEO Reentry Services is proud to operate California's Specialized Treatment for Optimized Programming ... on behalf of the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation," wrote Monica Hook, GEO's vice president of communications. "GEO Reentry connects participants in 18 counties with housing, education, and treatment services to support successful reentry and recidivism reduction."

The California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation officials ignored multiple requests for an interview.

Instead, a department's public affairs official responded to emailed questions with emailed responses and fulfilled many public records requests.

After CalMatters' inquiries, department official Terri Hardy said by email that the department would begin to track recidivism and the employment rate among participants in the STOP and that it would prevent unlicensed vendors from managing reentry homes and treatment facilities.

Hardy also said by email the department is "currently working on a report that addresses STOP programs." She added that the department said it has created a tool to "better track" whether the four primary contractors are conducting annual reviews of reentry homes and treatment facilities, which are required.

"CDCR understands the importance of oversight and accountability in this program," Hardy said by email. "Since STOP was created in 2014, CDCR has continually worked to make the system better."

Advocates for the program maintain it is a good investment for the state. They say it provides a soft landing for parolees who otherwise would be on their own

and competing for scarce housing in California's high-priced market.

California's spending on the parolee program swelled over a decade of reform in the state's prison system, when Govs. Brown and Newsom backed policy changes that shortened criminal sentences and steered more resources to rehabilitation.

The new policies slimmed down California's overburdened system, allowing Newsom to close a prison and begin shutting down three more.

California discloses recidivism data on a three-year cycle but the latest report is outdated. In fact, the most recent report describes people who were released from prison in 2017-18 — before Newsom took office.

A separate report by the California State Auditor in 2019 found that prisoners who completed recommended cognitive-based therapy rehabilitation programs recidivated at about the same rate as those who did not. The auditor recommended six legislative actions for lawmakers to ensure rehabilitation programs set performance targets and reduce recidivism.

Lawmakers have not made many of the recommended changes.

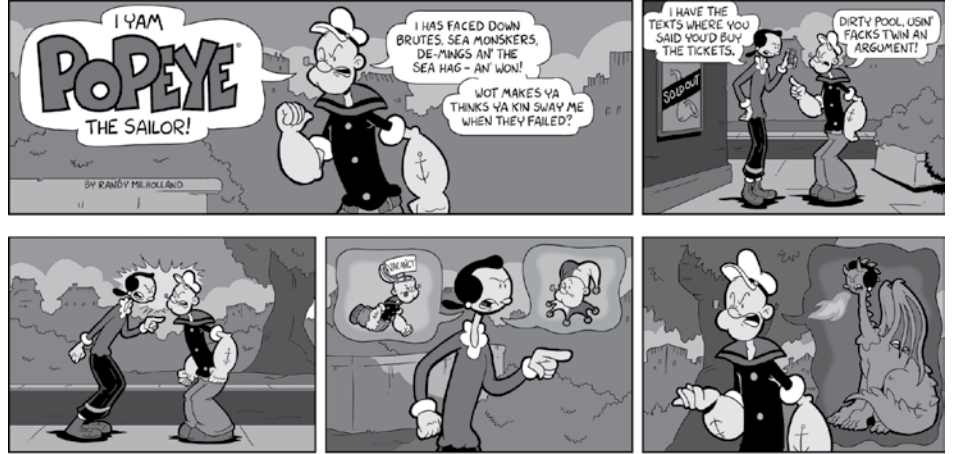

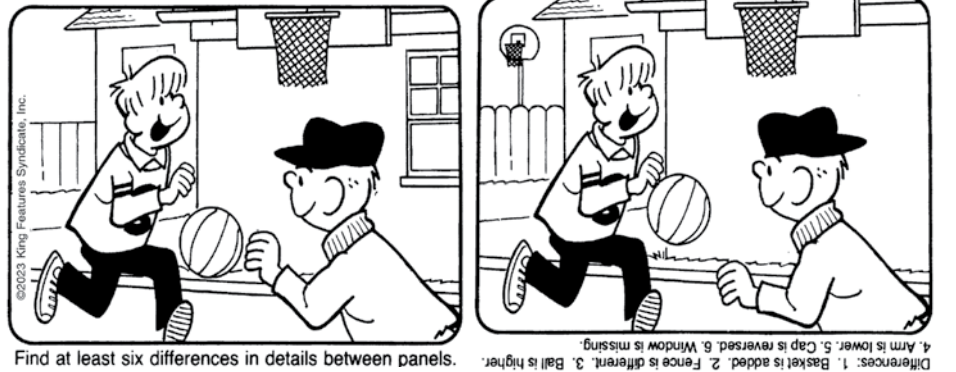

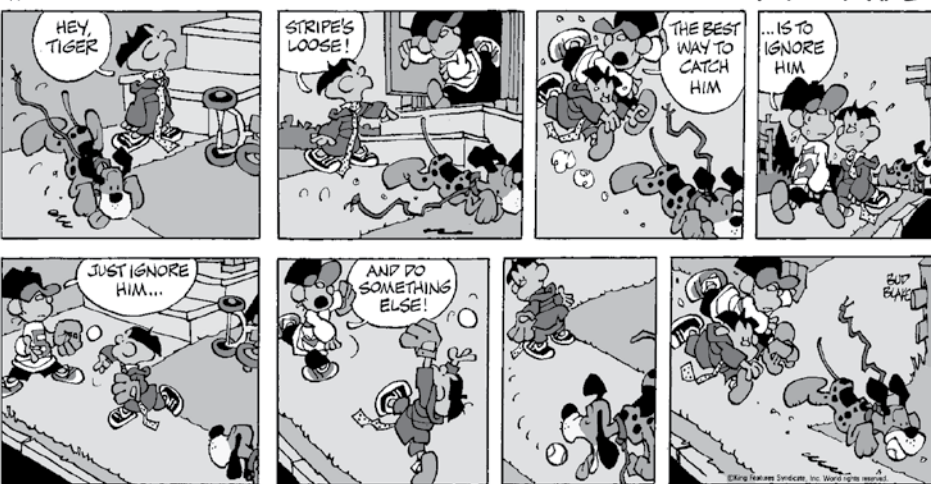

State's Cannabis Enforcement Taskforce Aggressively Combats Illegal Market

California Department of Fish and Wildlife News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Building upon the momentum in Q1 2023, the Unified Cannabis Enforcement Taskforce (UCETF) seized more than \$109 million in illegal cannabis in Q2 2023. This total represents a 104 percent increase from the \$52 million in unlicensed cannabis and cannabis products in Q1 2023.

Additional highlights from the period April 1, 2023, through June 30, 2023, include a 130 percent gain in the number of plants eradicated and a 375 percent increase in the number of firearms seized. The complete details of UCETF's Q2 2023 results are listed below.

"This well-orchestrated taskforce continues to reach new heights on shutting down a variety of illicit operations that range from dispensaries to indoor grow houses to outdoor cultivation sites among other facets in the illegal supply chain," said David Bess, Chief of Enforcement for the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW). "These enforcement numbers speak volumes on the dedication, perseverance, and organization of this multiagency taskforce. I could not be prouder of what we are accomplishing as a team."

"Our enforcement efforts are becoming increasingly diversified along the illegal cannabis supply chain as we served warrants on several unlicensed dispensaries in this quarter in addition to unlicensed cultivation operations," stated Bill Jones, Chief of the Law Enforcement Division for DCC. "As the taskforce continues to evolve and the combined resources of our partners plays an even greater role in our operations, we will be disrupting the illegal market at several different points along their supply chain."

"The Department of Toxic Substances Control brings its mission to safeguard public health and the environment to the Unified Cannabis Enforcement Taskforce, playing a crucial role alongside dedicated partners in promoting responsible growth of the cannabis industry," said DTSC Chief Investigator, Hansen Pang. "Through our expertise in addressing environmental concerns, including contamination, hazardous waste, and banned pesticides, we collaborate to eliminate the adverse impact of the illegal cannabis market."

UCETF is supporting the legal cannabis market by investigating and disrupting illegal grow sites as well as shutting down illegal manufacturing, distribution, and retail operations. By working closely with state, local, and federal law enforcement agencies, UCETF's enforcement actions protect consumer and public safety, safeguard the environment, and deprive illegal cannabis operators and transnational criminal organizations of illicit revenue that undercuts the regulated cannabis market in California.

In 2023 UCETF has seized \$161,921,709.44 in unlicensed cannabis through the serving of 113 search warrants. The taskforce has also eradicated 173,499 plants and seized 23 firearms.

Created in 2022, the Unified Cannabis Enforcement Taskforce has been charged by the Governor to better align state efforts and increase cannabis enforcement coordination between state, local and federal partners. The Taskforce is co-chaired by the Department of Cannabis Control (DCC) and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) and coordinated by the Homeland Security Division of Cal OES. The taskforce includes more than two dozen local, state, and federal partners working together to disrupt the illegal cannabis market. ★

Poor Choices Behind The Wheel Result in Tragedies

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The results of the California Highway Patrol's (CHP) recent Independence Day Maximum Enforcement Period (MEP) are a sobering reminder of the consequences resulting from unsafe driving behaviors.

Sixty-eight people were killed in crashes throughout the state during the Independence Day MEP, which began at 6:01 p.m. on Friday, June 30, and concluded at 11:59 p.m. on Tuesday, July 4. Tragically, nearly half of the total number of vehicle occupants who died within CHP jurisdiction were not wearing a seat belt.

With unsafe speed being the number one contributor to crashes in California, the CHP placed a special emphasis on its enforcement during the recent MEP. CHP officers issued more than 9,700 speed citations throughout the long Independence Day weekend.

Additionally, impaired drivers were removed from California's roadways at an alarming rate during the holiday enforcement effort. CHP officers made 1,224 arrests for driving under the influence, which is an average of one DUI arrest every five minutes.

"The results of this MEP are concerning and reinforce the need for responsible behavior behind the wheel," said CHP Commissioner Sean Duryee. "All of these deaths were preventable, and the loved ones they leave behind will be forever impacted. Traffic safety is everyone's responsibility, and these statistics show us how much work there is still to be done. The CHP is committed to making California's roadways safer for all who use them."

To help protect those who are traveling on California's roadways during the holidays, the CHP implements six MEPs per year. The next MEP is scheduled for Labor Day weekend. Throughout the holiday weekend, all available uniformed members of the Department will be on patrol to enhance public safety, deter unsafe driving behavior, and, when necessary, take appropriate enforcement action.

Keep yourself and others who are on the road safe by buckling up, driving at a speed safe for conditions, avoid distractions behind the wheel, and always designating a sober driver.

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of Safety, Service, and Security. ★

"Top States for Business" Report Gives California an "F"

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - In CNBC's annual "Top States for Business" ranking, California's ranking reflects the reality of our economy, which is led by our tech industry and venture capital dollars but bogged down by our ongoing cost of living crisis, high taxes, and unfriendly business policies.

"California's competitiveness, our ability to attract and retain businesses, as well as to provide employees with an affordable quality of life, continue to show clear warning signs thanks to our ongoing cost-of-living crisis," said Rob Lapsley, president of the California Business Roundtable. "This ranking is an annual reminder of the state's precarious future and economic solvency. Just like the state budget, our business climate relies almost exclusively on the highly volatile Bay Area's tech region to grow or attract business."

According to the survey, California received an "F" in cost of living and business friendliness which directly reflect the impact of the policies that are being passed by state and local government. In addition, the state economy received

a "D+" and our cost of doing business scored a "D." The only categories in which California excelled were access to capital and technology and innovation, where we scored an "A+" for each.

"Our overall rankings should come as no surprise to the governor and Legislature, who continue to push higher taxes, fees, and expensive regulations onto businesses," Lapsley continued.

In just the past 30 days, the governor and Legislature have ensured businesses will pay one of the highest tax increases in state history by refusing to provide state funding to pay off the state-created Unemployment Insurance Fund debt (learn more here) and increased labor and litigation costs by proposing to refund the Industrial Welfare Commission in the state budget (learn more here).

"The governor and Legislature's policies continue to give clear signals that California is not a friendly place to expand or grow jobs. Technology and innovation, combined with access to capital, have disguised many of the major impacts that our policies are having on all other sectors in our economy. This report clearly reflects the harm these policies are having on businesses and working families," Lapsley concluded. ★

The procession made its way

towards Hagan Community Park which would be the evening's epicenter for one of the region's most awaited fireworks displays. Blanchard said that the number of fireworks used during the show was over 4,000 aerial shells.

With the help of corporate sponsors, community volunteers and participants, Rancho Cordova now celebrates the nation as an incorporated City for two decades and counting. ★
