## Failed Silicon Valley Bank, the Newsoms, and Connected Friends

The Silicon Valley Bank failure and shut-down is because of "idiot bank management under an incompetent board," according to Shark Tank star Kevin O'Leary.

"O'Leary joined Fox News hosts Bill Hemmer and Dana Perino on Tuesday to discuss the Silicon Valley Bank failure and the announcement that deposits would be protected," Mediaite reported. "President Joe Biden announced this week that people's 'deposits are safe.'"

## Sheriff Jim Cooper is Tough on Crime

**RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)** - The March Rancho Cordova Luncheon featured Sacramento County Sheriff Jim Cooper, who presented his talk to a packed room at City Hall. Though born in France – his father was in the Air Force – Cooper was raised in Rancho Cordova. "I went to Cordova Gardens, Mills, and Cordova High School, my brothers and sisters all went to Cordova, we're all a Cordova product." He played football at Cordova High. "When you have great coaching, interact with great people, they inspire you and make you want to do great things, they really give you that gumption." He lived in Rancho Cordova until 1989, when his work as an undercover agent took him to Elk Grove.

Cooper said that in his youth he never thought of being a cop but after talking with some off-duty

deputy sheriffs, he thought they were "pretty cool," and they told him he should take the test. "So, I take the test," Cooper said, "and boom! I'm there for the next 30 years."

Cooper was elected in 2022 as Sacramento County's 37th sheriff. In her introduction of Cooper, Shelly Blanchard, executive director of Cordova Community Council, pointed out that he achieved the rank of

Captain, earned a bronze star for his role in the 1991 Good Guys hostage crisis. He was the Sheriff's Department spokesman for four years, he was the first mayor of Elk Grove and a city councilman there for 15 years. In 2014 he joined the California State Legislature as an assemblyman, representing District 9 for nearly a decade.

"We're excited to have Sheriff Cooper as our Sheriff," said Rancho Cordova Chief of Police Brandon Luke. "Even more important for the City of Rancho, we're excited to have him as a connection . . . and the continued support that he provides for the City and the Police Department."

The number one issue, Cooper said, is homelessness. "A big percentage are mentally ill. If you're mentally ill you can't make decisions to help yourself." Some are on drugs, "the hardest thing to get off



 of,” Cooper said, pointing out the difficulty in getting treatment. “You need to have a job to have any benefits. If you don’t have any of that, you’re screwed.” He spoke of the murders in the homeless camps, homeless on homeless, sexual assaults, drug dealing. “Because of COVID and just before that, law enforcement’s been kind of hands off on homeless communities. The big issue was, if you really engaged anything with the homeless, then if you aren’t helping them, then obviously you’re ‘anti-homeless’. There’s a lot of ‘anti rhetoric’ going on, ‘anti anything’. It’s not being anti. If you want help, we’re going to help you. If you don’t want help, we’re going to deal with you and help you, make you want to get help, that’s really what it comes down to.”  
 “You know what the issues are,” Cooper said. Besides homelessness, the results of Proposition 47 have been devastating. “You can go to the store, and as long as you steal below \$950 you can do that all day every day and not go to jail,” Cooper said. While in the legislature, Cooper introduced a bill to reverse that. “A bunch of groups gave money and the measure got beat, it was called Prop 20 that you guys voted on in 2020.”  
 Early release of seriously violent

inmates is an issue. “In California what is not considered a serious or violent crime is raping and drugging a woman . . . drive-by shootings, entrapping of a child. If I stab you or beat you with a baseball bat or a golf club – those are all considered non-violent crimes. You’re eligible for early release. You try to deal with trying to change that . . . instead of getting out early, let’s just do your time.”  
 “So, yeah, I’m kind of a tough on crime guy,” Cooper said. “Really what it is, just not to be afraid to do what’s right, going against the grain sometimes.”  
 Cooper made many important points about the serious crimes and issues plaguing the community. None of them are easy fixes, but what he said in answer to a question about education could also be applied to criminal justice. “Degrees are great, to improve yourself,” Cooper said, “but I would rather have someone with common sense than an armful of degrees. That’s what it comes down to is having common sense and being a reasonable person.”  
 Of all the things in his life that affected where he would end up, Cooper said, “The big one is my foundation . . . growing up here in Rancho Cordova. Without that I would not be where I am or have done some things I did; but I’m a Lancer – I’m a Lancer for Life.” ★

# Challenges Facing Our County

In February, I attended the National Association of Counties (NACO) Legislative Conference to help educate federal officials about the challenges facing Sacramento County and advocate for federal policy and budget support for County programs and priorities. I am honored to represent Sacramento County and the California State Association of Counties (CSAC) on NACO's Justice and Public Safety Steering Committee and Housing Task Force.

The Justice and Public Safety Committee deals with several issues that are

important to me and the Sacramento County residents I represent, including effective law enforcement resources in our communities, the dramatic increase in methamphetamine and fentanyl sales and use, an increase in crime associated with growing homelessness, and solutions to mental illness and addiction that focus on treatment instead of incarceration. I have already been in contact with the US Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Assistance and Executive Sacramento County staff about meeting in Sacramento with Sheriff Jim Cooper, District Attorney Thien Ho, and others to discuss federal support for our efforts to both improve conditions at our County Jail while creating more capacity for treatment-based diversion for low level offenders with behavioral health issues.

The Housing Task Force is a new effort that brings together county officials from around the country to identify best practices

for attracting affordable and market rate housing. The task force members will evaluate best practices and use them to create a platform for advocacy at the federal level. Although counties are very different across the country and even within California, there are many policy objectives that we can all agree on, like the importance of preserving local control, support for infrastructure improvements, and direct funding to counties with flexibility based on need. As you know, Sacramento County is in desperate need of both affordable and market-rate housing.

The NACO conference revealed that there are many federal programs and funding opportunities that California counties can be using to better address our homelessness crisis, increase public safety, support more housing, and improve our roadways. I will continue working hard with my colleagues on the Board of Supervisors, County staff, and CSAC to take advantage of these opportunities. ★

**HUNTSVILLE, AL (MPG)** - As company investments enable significant increases in production, Aerojet Rocketdyne has now delivered the 830,000th Attitude Control Motor (ACM) for Patriot missile system variants, including the Patriot Advanced Capability-3 (PAC-3) Missile Segment Enhancement (MSE).

"We take great pride in our role powering the PAC-3 MSE air defense missile system, and this milestone comes at a uniquely important time as the demand for key defense systems continues to increase," said Eileen P. Drake, Aerojet Rocketdyne CEO, and president. "Our investments to expand production for this critical system will ensure we are able to meet continued demand for our reliable propulsion."

Investments in ACM production, including significant building upgrades, increased manufacturing space, improvements to automated production processes and new state-of-the-art equipment, such as laser welders, filament winders and grinders, resulted in reduced labor hours, and fewer parts and motor transfers within the ACM building. The investments allowed the site to move from two to three production lines, increasing ACM production by 40%.

Each Lockheed Martin PAC-3 MSE missile contains 180 egg-sized ACMs that fire explosively to refine the missile's course and ensure impact. Of the 830,000 ACMs Aerojet

Rocketdyne has delivered since the program's inception, more than 700,000 were produced at Aerojet Rocketdyne's Solid Rocket Motor Center of Excellence in Camden, Arkansas.

In addition to the missile's ACMs, Aerojet Rocketdyne provides the PAC-3 MSE's dual-pulse solid rocket motor and the lethality enhancer. Separate from company investment into ACM production, last year Camden opened a new 51,000 sq. ft. facility where the company is now producing the PAC-3 MSE's revolutionary dual-pulse motor. The new building consolidated multiple manufacturing activities under one roof and added advanced equipment, improving operational efficiency, increasing production capacity, reducing costs, and providing for even safer operations.

# Insurance Commissioner Must Act Now to Prevent Crisis

We've run a family-owned, independent insurance agency for more than 50 years. Those of us in the insurance business know that when customers come to us for insurance what they're looking to buy is security. In the California market today, providing that security has become increasingly difficult and is poised to get much worse without action by our elected Insurance Commissioner.

Independent insurance agents serve consumers by learning their needs and then searching out policies that ensure those needs are met. In a healthy, competitive market, consumers are well served. Today in California, such a market does not exist. Consumers are left with fewer options, and thousands of small businesses like my family's, are finding it increasingly difficult to serve them.

The California Department of Insurance had a moratorium for more than two years and did not review rating plans submitted by insurers grappling with rising inflation and claims costs. In December, the Department began reviewing rating plans and has now approved 11 plans. This is good news and helps keep California's insurance market functioning, but more than 80 rating plans remain in the Department awaiting action. While they wait, insurance companies are operating under pre-pandemic, pre-inflation rate plans, paying out more in claims than the income they are taking in from premiums. Not surprisingly, insurance providers are pulling back from the California market.

As a result, California is on the brink of a coverage crisis that will severely limit consumers' options or even prevent them from obtaining the security they seek.

Allstate paused new auto policy sales through independent insurance agents in California and dropped monthly payment options, requiring consumers to pay at least half their policy premiums up front.

Geico closed 38 local offices and stopped selling new auto policies through call centers. Progressive Insurance pulled back its advertising

to limit new policies. Several carriers removed their companies from the software independent agents use to get new policy quotes.

The situation in the homeowners' insurance market is much the same. Allstate recently told agents to pause offering new policies in California and others will likely follow suit.

This is a clear call to action for newly re-elected Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara. He has the opportunity to act on the backlog of rate plans so more companies will offer more policies in our state. Ultimately, it's this competition among providers that will lead to varied options and better pricing for consumers.

Make no mistake: This is a California-only problem. Other states have approved new rating plans accounting for today's reality of inflation, supply-chain delays and a spike in traffic fatalities and the severity of auto accidents. If this reality persists, insurance carriers will simply stop doing business in the only state in which they lose money on every product they sell.

The Insurance Commissioner has a constitutional responsibility to ensure that California has a healthy, robust and functioning insurance market by reviewing and approving rate plans that adequately reflect the cost of covering claims.

If that duty isn't carried out, there are consequences. We're already starting to experience them, and a full-blown market meltdown is looming. Insurance agencies, many of which are small, family-owned businesses are feeling it now, as it takes longer and much more work to find new coverage for clients, if they can find it at all.

Inaction will lead to cascading economic effects: auto sales will plunge when buyers can't find car insurance, lenders won't issue mortgages to homebuyers who can't insure their property, business loans will dry up. Consumers will be left frustrated and insecure.

We are on the cusp of a crisis. On behalf of consumers and Independent Insurance Agents, I urge the Insurance Commissioner to approve the rate plans needed for new policies. ★

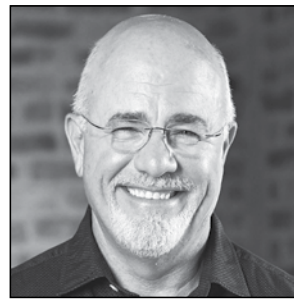

I'm sorry you're going through this, but I hope it will teach you and your folks a valuable lesson going forward. There's nothing wrong with giving money in a situation like this, as long as you're not enabling bad behavior by doing so. But a loan between friends or family is something I never recommend.

If they choose to hold a grudge there's really not a lot you can do, especially if you took longer than agreed upon to pay them back. It just takes more time with some people—and in some cases even parents—for those kinds of things to heal. You have to remember, in their minds there's an element of responsibility and trust involved here. But considering it's your mom and dad we're talking about, I'd say they'll lighten up and become a little easier to be

around with time.

Until that happens, though, maybe you could look for chances to mention your new approach to finances during conversations with them. Even something as simple as an off-hand remark about how much you were able to put into savings from your recent paychecks may encourage them to see things in a different light. Letting them know you're actively working to change your ways and gain control of your finances could mean a lot to them. Give it a try!

protect jobs, people's livelihoods, and the entire innovation ecosystem that has served as a tent pole for our economy.”

The Intercept just reported Tuesday Gov. Gavin Newsom failed to mention that President Biden's announcement also protected his own businesses in Silicon Valley Bank.”CADE, Odette, and PlumpJack, three wineries owned by Newsom, are listed as clients of SVB on the bank's website. Newsom also maintained personal accounts at SVB for years, according to a longtime former employee of Newsom's who handled his finances, and who requested anonymity to avoid professional reprisal.”

Newsom also neglected to say that he

and the First Partner have even deeper ties with Silicon Valley Bank – Silicon Valley Bank President of Capital John China gave \$100,000 “Behested” gift to the Newsom's nonprofit, California Partners Project, Open the Books discovered, the Globe reported.

Notably, a 2019 IRS Form 990 for Newsom's California Partner Project reports only \$50k in total gross receipts. This seems inaccurate given the new information of Newsom's behested payments. The Globe did not find any record of 2020-2021 IRS Form 990 filings on the IRS website, but did find IRS Form 990 filings with the California Office of the Attorney General Charities registry. ★

## Is Silicon Valley Bank's Failure An Omen For California?

It would be difficult to overstate Silicon Valley's financial importance to California.

The San Jose-centered high technology industry exploded four decades ago as California's manufacturing sector, which had boomed during and after World War II, was shrinking.

It became the state's single most powerful economic engine, creating products and services that transformed California and had immense global impact. A few days ago, Gov. Gavin Newsom described it the “tent pole for our economy” and for once he wasn't exaggerating.

As other economic sectors and other regions stagnated, Silicon Valley boomed. Without it, California could not have become the fifth – and very possibly the fourth – most powerful economy in the world.

Silicon Valley's mega-corporations, such as Apple, Google and Twitter, sucked in immense amounts of money from every corner of the globe – not only making investors very rich, but creating countless jobs and pumping hundreds of billions of dollars into the state treasury as high income tax rates tapped into the new wealth.

However, there's reason to wonder whether Silicon Valley has reached its peak.

In recent months, Silicon Valley's corporations have been laying off workers and venture capital activity has slowed. A few weeks ago, a local industry organization, Joint Venture Silicon Valley, issued its annual report on the region's economy, stressing a transition from a cauldron of start-up companies to dominance by a few giants.

“Tech is going through a painful period,” Russell Hancock, president of the organization said, adding hopefully that “there is no way to construe what is happening as a crisis” for the tech sector.

That was happening before Silicon Valley Bank, which was founded in 1983 as the region began to boom and rode the wave into becoming one of the nation's largest financial houses, suddenly collapsed last week.

The bank experienced a run from depositors and could not raise enough cash to meet demand. State and federal financial regulators quickly stepped in, shuttered the bank and began seeking a buyer. Its failure sent shockwaves through Silicon Valley because of the bank's prominent role in financing start-up companies and providing cash for payrolls and other expenses.

Relatively small depositors were covered by insurance, but hundreds of corporate customers had deposits over the \$250,000 insurance limit and suddenly were unable to make withdrawals.

The immediate crisis was

averted on Sunday when federal authorities arranged for Federal Reserve loans that would allow depositors to make full withdrawals. They also made money available to shore up other specialty banks that might be vulnerable to depositor runs.

Despite the emergency action, however, Silicon Valley Bank's failure is a serious blow to the tech industry because of its pivotal role in financing innovation as a direct lender, as a financial service provider and as a midwife for attracting venture capital.

Federal authorities are looking for a buyer to absorb Silicon Valley Bank, quite possibly one of the nation's larger banks. Even if a buyer emerges, however, the new owner would not have an intimate relationship to the region's yeasty culture of aggressive innovation.

The bank's owners prospered by deeply immersing themselves into that culture but that narrow focus made it vulnerable to outside economic factors. When the Federal Reserve System began raising interest rates to battle inflation, the bank's portfolio of bonds lost value. When the bank was forced to sell those devalued bonds to meet withdrawal demands from depositors, it went into a death spiral.

The question is whether the bank's failure is a harbinger of Silicon Valley's decline.
