**RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)** - The BPOE – The Benevolent and Protective Order of the Elks – or popular name, Best People on Earth – Lodge #2484 is nicknamed the “Pony Express Lodge” because its first location on Folsom Boulevard was one of the original Pony Express stops. It has moved a couple of times, to its home at 11440 Elks Circle in Rancho Cordova. The membership was over 300

before, but the two-year shutdown because of COVID was hard on the Lodge. After those years, the membership is now around 217. “We’re like the Phoenix, we’re trying to pull ourselves out of the ashes,” said Jack Melvin, trustee, and chair of the house committee. Exalted ruler John Garrett said the Lodge is getting its life back. “People want to get out after being housebound for two years. They want to have a little fun in life instead of looking at the four walls.”

## Let’s Talk Trash

**RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)** - If you have garbage cans, you should have recently received a green and white bucket due to the new program mandated by SB1383, a California-wide mandate signed into law by Governor Jerry Brown in 2016. Rancho Cordova Public Works manager of operations and maintenance Steve Harriman spoke about the effects of this law at the Rancho Cordova July luncheon.

Harriman listed the life cycle of this program in six steps. (1) You have your pail in the house, you scrape your plate, and the contents of your pail goes into the organics container outside. (2) The container is collected. (3) The material from your organics container is transported. (4) The material is sent to a composting facility, ground up, cleaned of contaminants, and generates compost. (5) The compost is used in agricultural operations and grows food. (6) We consume the food, resulting in food scraps and start the cycle over.

“(The bucket) is a visual representation of the huge

changes coming,” said Annah Rulon, municipal sales manager for Republic Services. “At the very least, if someone hasn’t heard of the program at all, they’re going to say, ‘What the heck is this?’ And they’re going to start asking questions.”

The program does cost money. “We have, in Rancho Cordova,” Harriman said, “two additional collection drivers, two additional vehicles, a route auditor who is going to be flipping lids in the neighborhoods, customer service and outreach,

a kitchen pail which is delivered to each customer, and additional costs for the mixed materials.” Because of the increased costs, Republic Services rates have increased, depending on the size of the container. For the smallest container, 32 gallons, the increase is \$4.95 a month, the medium sized, \$5.90 a month, and for the large, \$7.95 a month.

The bill, introduced in 2016 by Ricardo Lara (D) District 33, now California Insurance Commissioner, requires that California

reduce landfill disposal of organic waste by 75% by 2025. “Which basically means,” Harriman said, “that greater than 20 million tons of organic waste has to go somewhere other than the landfill by 2025. These are extremely aggressive goals.” The bill is a response to the “greenhouse gas” effect noted when organic material goes into a landfill, gets buried and is subject to anaerobic decomposition which releases methane.

The program is not only

# Covered CA Rates to Increase

Premiums for health insurance plans sold through the state marketplace will increase an average of 6% next year, Covered California officials announced.

This rate hike is the largest California has seen since 2019. In the last three years, insurers had kept average increases under 2%.

Rate changes vary by region – from an 11.7% increase in Imperial, Inyo and Mono counties to zero change in Fresno, Kings, and Madera counties.

When premiums increase, an individual’s financial aid usually does, too. Aid is based on household income, so subsidies may offset some of the increase. But people who don’t qualify for subsidies will bear the full cost of the rate hike.

“Premiums are a capturing of what health care costs are, how they vary across geographies and communities, how health care costs are growing over time, which we know in this country are already too high and rising,” said Jessica Altman, executive director of Covered California.

She noted that California’s rate hike is still lower than it is in other states. A recent Kaiser Family Foundation analysis found a 10% average premium increase proposed by 72 insurers in 13 other states.

The rate increase, Altman said, is largely attributed to people resuming doctor visits

and procedures that they postponed during peaks of the COVID-19 pandemic. There is also the cost of general inflation.

About one percent of the increase, however, is attributed to the potential loss of enhanced subsidies from the federal government, which are set to expire at the end of this year. Without the additional aid, people will pay more for their premiums, likely pushing young, healthy people to drop their coverage. And when healthy people leave the marketplace, premiums go up for everyone.

The federal government’s American Rescue Plan last year provided California with around \$3 billion designated for two years of additional financial aid through Covered California. The new law helped further reduce what people paid for their monthly premiums, driving more people to sign up for health insurance. It also expanded who was eligible for savings to include middle-income individuals.

Currently 1.7 million Californians buy their coverage through the state marketplace. Covered California has

estimated that if Congress does not renew the American Rescue Plan subsidies, about 1 million people will see their premiums double and about 220,000 would likely drop their coverage.

“(The rate increase) for the subsidized population is almost divorced from what they pay out of pocket. What’s more important is what happens with the (American Rescue Plan) subsidies,” said Christine Eibner, a senior economist for the RAND Corporation, a think tank.

Altman said the sooner Congress acts

the better the chance of avoiding consumer confusion in the fall. Covered California usually sends renewal notices to enrollees beginning in October, ahead of the sign-up period, and having clarity for people by then is key.

“There have been references both ways, ‘Will it be permanent? Will it be temporary? Will it stay in the current form?... Or will there be some adjustments to it?’ – and we really don’t know,” Altman said about the conversations happening in Washington, D.C.

California’s 2022-23 budget includes \$304

million for middle-class marketplace enrollees that would kick in if Congress does not renew the aid. While helpful, it would not fill the hole the annual \$1.7 billion federal aid would leave, Altman said.

Covered California also announced that another insurer, Aetna CVS Health, will join the state marketplace and be an option for people in El Dorado, Fresno, Kings, Madera, Placer, Sacramento and Yolo counties. Meanwhile, Anthem Blue Cross will expand into San Diego County. ★

about unusable organic waste material. "Quite startling to me, is that we throw away almost 6 million tons a year of edible food in California," Harriman said. "This is at a time when many Californians, adults and children, are food insecure. A lot of wonderful, edible food ends up getting thrown away." Establishing an edible food recovery program is required as well. Carrie Johnson, director of the Cordova Food Locker, will be working with the City on that."

There have been assorted reactions to the program, but Peter Lane, mixed media teacher at Mitchell Middle School and resident of Rancho Cordova, has started on the program and loves it. "I love the idea behind it," Lane said. "I'm curious to see how it's being implemented on a global scale, and how that will roll over to, let's say, a school, and . . . how we're going to separate our food that way."

Here are a few questions by those attending the luncheon, with answers by Harriman that may be abbreviated because of space considerations.

**Question:** What are some of the biggest hurdles you might encounter with this program? **Answer:** The hurdles are many. On

the one hand we have the legislature saying, 'You must divert this material from the landfill and process it,' and then we have a regulatory and environmental review framework in California that makes it incredibly difficult to site and permit and operate these facilities. Education is a major hurdle, helping people to understand. **Question:** What happens to people who are not compliant? **Answer:** 30 days. (laughter) It does require some sort of enforcement mechanism . . . I think it's going to be a while before we get to the point where we're actually using our code enforcement. Our first step is really to educate and help people out. **Question:** I can see many benefits in the overall program here, but what is the actual end game here? Is this all about climate change? **Answer:** For the legislature, yes.

Harrison emphasized education and outreach to the community and praised public information officers Maria Kniestedt and Danielle Hale for their work together with himself and Republic Services.

"Trash has become really complicated," said Harriman, "and if people don't understand it, it's just not going to work." For questions, please contact Steve Harriman, 916-851-8716, sharriman@cityofrancho-cordova.org. ★

The local Lodge is a member of the Rancho Chamber of Commerce. "We also work very closely with the City," Melvin said. "The City has given us some grants to upgrade our building when we moved back in, like air conditioning our back bar, a whole brand-new grant. We've been so grateful for it."

The building, ready for use, is available for rental – with a capacity of 200 seated guests, a commercial kitchen for catering, full-service bar and lounge, and abundant parking space. "It can be used for going-away parties, anniversaries, graduations, memorials," said Melvin. "Just call and tell us what you need." There are discounts for nonprofit organizations. To inquire about hall rental, use the phone number and e-mail above.

The reasons for joining the Elks are many, but chairman of the board and trustee Norm Mayers gave two. "We've got a great, great group of people, and the second (reason) is to find ways to give back to the community." There are many Lodge activities throughout the year for members and their guests, such as the twice a month Pasta Night, and the shrimp and rib dinner held recently, at which veterans could attend for half price. The annual crab feed was held in February 2022, there is a theater group and Dixieland Jazz Night. There is pub grub at the bar, which is open for major sports events. There are poker and corn-hole tournaments, and holiday parties. There are some events that the

Lodge supports local food banks and veterans organizations, Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts.

The Elks Lodge was started in New York in the 1800s by a group of actors. Now with more than 2,100 lodges nationwide, the Elks donate over \$200,000,000 in goods and services every year and are second only to the U.S. government in awarding scholarships. The very first Veterans Hospital was built and donated to the U.S. Government by the Elks.

"I joined for the RV parks," said Mayers. "A lot of Elks Lodges have places to park at a reduced rate. I got involved about 8 or 9 years ago and I'm chairman of the board now. I've got a lot more out of the Elks by being an active member than just taking advantage of the RV parking. The nice thing is that with over 2,000 lodges around the country . . . you walk in there and . . . it's like you've been missed. You end up being brothers and sisters with every other Elk around the country. It's a nice feeling." ★

## Troubled Bullet Train Project Given a Reprieve

In 2019, just weeks after being inaugurated as California's governor, Gavin Newsom issued what many took as a death knell for the state's troubled bullet train project.

"But let's be real," Newsom told legislators in his first State of the State address. "The current project, as planned, would cost too much and respectfully take too long. There's been too little oversight and not enough transparency."

"Right now, there simply isn't a path to get from Sacramento to San Diego, let alone from San Francisco to L.A.," Newsom said. "I wish there were. However, we do have the capacity to complete a high-speed rail link between Merced and Bakersfield."

It seemed as though Newsom wanted to finish the initial phase in the San Joaquin Valley and then give up on a statewide link between the San Francisco Bay Area (and perhaps Sacramento) and Southern California.

The reaction from project supporters, particularly construction unions, was swift and sharply negative and Newsom claimed that reporters misinterpreted his intentions.

"I just think people in

the media should pause before they run headlines and actually consider the facts and maybe even ask the person that's stating things before they run with things," Newsom said. "That's the deep lesson I learned in this."

He insisted that he wasn't abandoning a statewide system, but wanted to concentrate first on completing a working portion in the San Joaquin Valley. That limited goal, however, also has vexed the governor as costs continued to rise and work slowed to a crawl.

Seizing on Newsom's words, President Donald Trump's administration tried to claw back a nearly \$1 billion federal grant for the project that predecessor Barack Obama had awarded. When Joe Biden became president, the grant was restored.

Last year, Newsom asked the Legislature to appropriate the \$4.2 billion remainder of a \$9.95 billion bond issue that voters approved in 2008 to build the system, but legislative leaders balked, saying, in essence, that it would be money down a rathole and would be better spent on local and regional transit projects.

The stalemate over the bond money lasted for a year but in June, Newsom bought off legislative naysayers by providing \$3.65 billion from the state's huge budget surplus for the local projects in return for freeing the bond money.

However, the compromise also included an inspector general's position to oversee the High Speed Rail Authority,

which outside critics have faulted for delays and cost overruns.

"They know that with the inspector general that they're going to be watched," Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon, one of the sharpest critics, said. "They're going to be held accountable."

There has been some construction, including a bridge over the San Joaquin River near Fresno, but having tracks that will carry trains is years away and heavy expenses loom for electrification and rolling stock. Newsom has also expanded the San Joaquin section on both ends to Merced in the north and Bakersfield in the south, which carries its own price tag.

It could be a decade, or more, before trains actually begin carrying passengers between the two cities, but without connecting Bakersfield to Los Angeles and Merced to San Francisco, the segment would be little more than an amusement park ride.

As it stands — and as Newsom said in that 2019 speech — there are no plans to finance multi-billion-dollar extensions to make the bullet train a real transportation alternative. He seems to be content to provide enough money to maintain construction for the remainder of his governorship and leave it to his successor — or successors — to decide what to do after that.
