New Wine, Spirits Bottle Recycling Bill Clears

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Senate voted on May 25, 2022, unanimously to approve legislation written by Senate President pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins, D-San Diego, and co-written by Sen. Bill Dodd, D-Napa, to add wine and distilled spirits bottles to California's recycling program.

"I am really pleased that so many of our Senate colleagues recognized the importance of this common sense bill that benefits our environment and consumers," Sen. Dodd said. "With SB 1013 we can increase the recycling rates of millions of bottles that would otherwise wind up in our landfills or be illegally discarded. I look forward to seeing this bill with all its benefits for California pass the Assembly and be signed by Gov. Newsom."

"SB 1013 is historic change that is 40 years in the making," Pro Tem Atkins said. "I want to commend the wine industry, distilled spirits industry, environmental advocates, and other groups who have come together to support this landmark proposal. We will continue working with stakeholders as the bill moves through the Assembly to make sure remaining concerns are addressed, and then, hopefully, 2022 will be the year we can pop a cork and celebrate this overdue improvement to California's recycling law."

The California Beverage Container Recycling and Litter Reduction Act, established in 1986, encourages consumers to recycle beverage containers by requiring them to pay a deposit for eligible bottles. According to a 2019 report, curbside programs received approximately \$172 million from the so-called Bottle Bill in 2017, including \$15 million that is annually provided from the Beverage Container Recycling Fund.

Although the program includes beer, it does not include wine or spirits. It is estimated that California generates more than 500 million wine and spirits bottles each year, with less than 30% being recycled and over 300 million wine and spirits bottles going into landfills. Under Senate Bill 1013, wine and spirits bottles would be added to the program, leading to more recycling, increased business for recycling

inspired by the local flora of the nearby Sacramento River. This drought tolerant and native palette reduces the need for irrigation and on-going maintenance, as well as attracts pollinators like butterflies and hummingbirds.

A primary tenet of

sustainable design is improving the health and wellbeing of the community. The new complex brings back an integral piece of community recreation and exercise. With two distinct pools, residents will find something

for everyone: whether it is lap swimming, swim and safety classes, aquatic fitness, swim clubs or just cooling off during the hot Rancho Cordova summers. Swimming is one of the best exercises because it engages the whole body. Water-based exercise

Rancho Cordova Pays Tribute to Fallen

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Rancho Cordovans paid tribute to American men and women who have given their lives in defense of the country during a moving Memorial Day Observance held at the Cordova High School Performing Arts Center on Monday.

A group of 18 veterans were honored with the dedication of memorial bricks, which will be installed at the Veterans Memorial Plaza, located in front of the medical center – an annual tradition. They will join more than 2,000 which have now been placed at the plaza.

Returning after a two-year pandemic break and hosted for the 14th year by 96-year-old World War II veteran Robert Burns, Lt. Col., US Army (Ret.), the gathering was an emotional mix of music, tributes and special recognition of Korean War veterans by dignitaries from the Korean Consulate.

War veterans by dignitaries from the Korean Consulate.

“We are so fortunate to be living in the United States of America, the most wonderful country on earth,” said Burns.

“We honor those who have protected our freedoms, giving generously to our nation. Some gave all. And remembering them is what Memorial Day is all about.”

Burns was also honored

for his outstanding national service in the U.S. Army, which included tours of duty in World War II, Korea and Vietnam.

Kelly Hughes, Sgt., U.S. Army (Ret.), a retired medic from Dustoff Unit

168, shared four compelling stories of valor he witnessed during his own distinguished military career. His comments drew a standing ovation.

The Rancho Cordova River City Concert Band

provided a musical backdrop to the event, which included a world live premiere of “Proudly They Served,” an original piece of music written for band by Jerry Brubaker, who was commissioned to write the piece. It was written and performed with the help of a Community Enhancement and Investment Fund arts grant from the City of Rancho Cordova.

As is the custom on Memorial Day, veteran organizations placed memorial wreaths, prayers were shared for fallen warriors, and patriotism was celebrated.

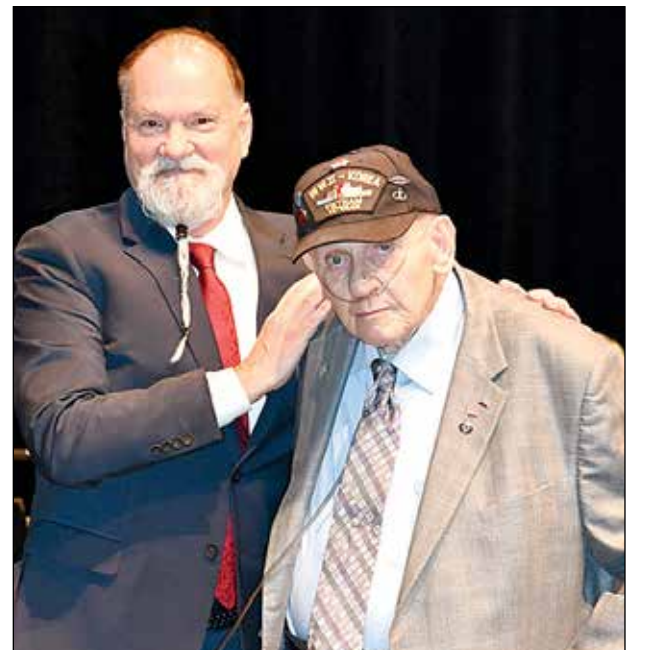

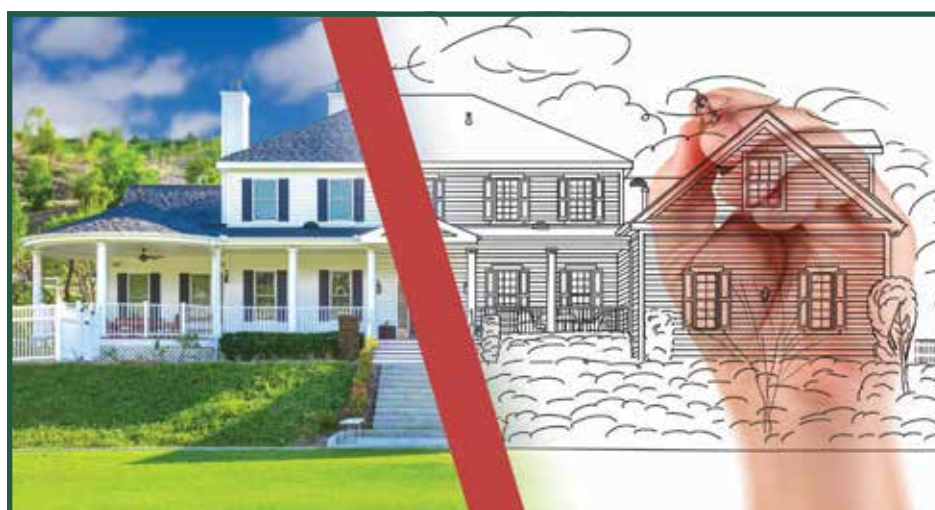

ALA Report Doesn't Tell the Full Story, Includes Misleading Data

Sac Metro Air District News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District, Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District, Placer County Air Pollution Control District, Feather River Air Quality Management District, and El Dorado County Air Quality Management District have issued a joint response to the American Lung Association's recent release of its annual State of The Air Report and the Sacramento Bee's coverage of the report on April 22, 2022.

The Air Districts address the report's ranking of counties based on air quality data that is skewed by extreme but short-term wildfire data and the increasing international transport of pollution that raises background concentrations, resulting in a misleading picture of air pollution emissions in the Sacramento region. The Bee's article omitted these factors as well. While air quality and public health are absolutely impacted by wildfires, to assign an "F" grade without naming the reason doesn't tell the full story. It also unnecessarily undermines public confidence and denies true progress.

Response From the Air Districts of the Sacramento Region:

"Thanks to innovative projects and programs by Sacramento region air districts and their partners, air quality has improved significantly over the past several decades and will continue to get cleaner in the future. Despite the challenges of wildfire and increasing transport of pollution, coupled with sharp increases in population and vehicle miles traveled, the Sacramento region has made great strides in moving toward and meeting strict state and federal health-based air quality standards.

Although the counties in our region received poor rankings, these rankings are flawed and do not reflect the real, tangible improvements in air quality that have been made possible by the efforts of our districts and residents. While we value our partnership with the American Lung Association, we are extremely disappointed that the ALA report fails to recognize that the region currently meets federal health-based air quality standards for short-term particle pollution and is on track to meet similar standards for summertime ground-level ozone pollution within the next several years. That is no small feat and certainly worth a passing grade. We are equally disappointed that the Sacramento Bee article about the report did not acknowledge these factors or recognize the region's air quality accomplishments.

Our Districts are committed to combating climate change and improving air quality and public health outcomes for all residents, especially in our environmental justice communities. It is important for the ALA report to honestly reflect the significant challenges the region faces, while we continue to work together to find innovative new solutions to improve public health."

Historical Air Quality Data Shows Dramatic Air Quality Improvement in the Region

Between 2000-2022, the Sacramento Federal Nonattainment Area (SFNA) population grew 30.57% resulting in an increased number of vehicle registrations, and motor vehicles in the region. The SFNA is comprised of all of Sacramento and Yolo Counties, the eastern portion of Solano County, the southern portion of Sutter County, the western slopes of El Dorado and Placer Counties up to the Sierra crest and includes five local air districts.

Because cars, trucks and trains are the largest source of emissions in the region, Sacramento region air districts have developed creative and innovative strategies to ensure the region can continue to grow due to an increased population but at the same time reduce air pollution, combat climate change, stimulate economic prosperity and improve the quality of life for residents.

According to the state's historical data, the number of smoggy summer days that exceed the current 2015 ozone standard has declined from 81 days in 2000 to 47 days in 2020. Even with the 2020 data, which had high measurements due to summer wildfire smoke impacts, this shows a strong downward trend that is expected to continue over the next several years.

Innovative Air Pollution Reduction Strategies Are Making a Difference

Sacramento region air districts have implemented numerous successful and innovative programs within the region

to reduce air pollution that impacts our health, environment, and local economy.

A few examples include: Infusing millions of dollars into the region each year to support and incentivize electric vehicle conversion and infrastructure builds for businesses, public agencies, school districts and residents. Requiring the use of the most stringent emission control equipment on major stationary sources, which means less pollution coming out of the stack. Working with both public land managers and private landowners on prescribed burn activities to reduce excess vegetation and restore fire resiliency to the land. On-going support for the utilization of forest woody biomass wastes to fuel electricity generation and reduce wildfire size, severity, and pollution.

Implementing mandatory or voluntary residential wood burning reduction programs. Creating clean, safe, and reliable transportation options by providing access to electric vehicles, carshare services, transit, and ride share for communities most in need in the region. Building out the region's zero and near zero emission infrastructure with the development of electric vehicle chargers, hydrogen fueling dispensers, and natural gas fueling stations.

This is achieved through: enforcement of local, state, and federal air quality regulations, implementation of incentive programs to reduce emissions, air quality monitoring, efforts to reduce wildfire impacts, and land use/development reviews. The district works in concert with the five Sacramento-area air districts with a goal of moving the region into attainment of ambient air quality standards. SCPH Investigating Travel-Related Monkeypox Case

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Division of Public Health is investigating a case of monkeypox virus related to travel in Europe. Confirmation testing from CDC and CDPH is pending. Based on symptoms and preliminary testing, monkeypox confirmation is likely.

The patient is isolating at home and is not in contact with any other people. Risk to the general public is very minimal. The individual under investigation recently traveled to areas in Europe where cases of monkeypox have been confirmed.

Transmission of monkeypox virus occurs when a person comes into contact with the virus from an animal, human, or materials contaminated with the virus. The virus enters the body through broken skin (even if not visible), respiratory tract, or the mucous membranes (eyes, nose, or mouth). Respiratory droplets generally cannot travel more than a few feet, so prolonged face-to-face contact is required. Monkeypox is

an extremely rare diagnosis in the United States.

"This case appears to be related to recent travel to Europe," said Dr. Olivia Kasirye, Sacramento County Public Health Officer. "Public Health is working with CDPH to conduct contact tracing, and risk to the general public is extremely low."

Monkeypox does not occur naturally in the United States and cases in the US are very rare. US cases are related to international travel or importing animals from areas where the disease is more common.

Symptoms of Monkeypox include fever, headache, muscle aches, backache, swollen lymph nodes, chills and exhaustion. Within 1-3 days (sometimes longer) after the appearance of fever, the patient develops a rash, often beginning on the face and then spreading to other parts of the body. The incubation period (time from infection to symptoms) for monkeypox is usually 7-14 days but can range from 5-21 days. The illness typically lasts for 2-4 weeks.

Newsom, Legislators Given Stark Budget Warning

The Capitol is agog about Gov. Gavin Newsom's declaration that California will have a nearly \$100 billion budget surplus.

"You've never seen a number like this," Newsom told reporters as he unveiled his revised 2022-23 budget proposal.

Nearly half of the surplus must, by law, go to schools. The governor and legislative leaders are now busily negotiating how to spend the other \$52 billion. They agree on giving a big chunk of it back to Californians but are arguing over how much and who will get the checks and/or cash cards.

However, the Legislature's own budget advisor, Gabe Petek, is warning the politicians that they should be very careful because the budget could be in big trouble in the years ahead. If they ignore his advice, there could be a fiscal meltdown of epic proportions.

Petek believes that the governor's revenue estimates – on which the huge surplus estimate is based – could be too optimistic because he ignores a very real threat of recession. Petek also faults the governor's budget for ignoring long-term effects

of the Gann Limit, a constitutional provision that imposes tight controls on revenue windfalls.

"Although predicting the next recession is impossible," Petek says in a report released on Tuesday, "economic indicators currently suggest a heightened risk of recession within two years. Past recessions – with the exception of the one induced by the pandemic – have resulted in cumulative revenue losses of tens of billions of dollars. In two recent recessions, in fact, total revenue losses were around \$100 billion."

"Under our estimates of revenue and spending in the out-years, the state would have a very narrow operating deficit in 2023-24, a small operating surplus in 2024-25, and a larger operating deficit in 2025-26," Petek says.

Although Newsom's budget makes passing reference to the possibility of recession, it assumes that the state's recovery from the pandemic-caused downturn will continue to be strong, and thus will generate a strong flow of revenues.

Petek reserves his sharpest criticism, however, for the budget's lack of a plan to cope with the effects of the Gann Limit. Once the calculated limit is reached, any revenue beyond that point must be either returned to taxpayers or spent on a few exempt categories.

"These requirements would far exceed the state's narrow operating surpluses – and would compound operating deficits," Petek notes, adding that without corrective action "the state likely would have

significant budget shortfalls in the out-years."

As drafted, Newsom's budget avoids triggering the Gann Limit in 2022-23 by clever accounting, but Petek warns that it's likely to hit home within the next few years, forcing Newsom – assuming he's re-elected this year – and the Legislature to reduce spending on other programs to meet Gann Limit requirements.

Although Newsom and legislative leaders have indicated they may ask voters to repeal or modify the Gann Limit's stringent requirements, "In the meantime, we strongly caution the Legislature against passing a budget with a structural deficit stemming from unaddressed State Spending Limit (Gann Limit) requirements," Petek says.

He suggests that one way to make the budget more resilient to both recession and Gann Limit requirements is to devote more of the surplus to reserves, which would mean spending less of it on things that the governor and legislators want, such as a massive election year give-back of cash to voters.

"Economic indicators point to a recession on the horizon within the next two years, not three-to-four years from now," Petek warns. "The state has a \$52 billion surplus this year – now is the time to prepare for these looming budget problems."

centers and reduced processing costs. The expansion would also cut greenhouse gas emissions by almost 200,000 tons of carbon dioxide while reducing litter of wine and spirits containers, a visible

SB1013 is supported by a number of groups. It passed the Senate with unanimous, bipartisan support. It heads next to the Assembly. ★

Senator Pan Joins Public Health Advocates for the PublicHERO Initiative

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - State Senator and Health Committee chair Dr. Richard Pan joined California Can't Wait, a coalition of public health officials, local public health leaders, frontline workers, and health equity advocates for a virtual press conference urging Governor Newsom and state lawmakers to dedicate a small fraction of the state's \$97 billion budget surplus to one-time Public Health Equity Readiness Opportunity (PublicHERO) initiative investments. The public health and equity advocates said on top of boosting the state's annual commitment to core, local public health services, California must dedicate one-time funds to recruit, retain, educate and train the next generation of public health workers to respond to existing and emerging public health threats.

"I want to thank Governor Newsom for his commitment for \$300M annually for public health departments for ensuring that we build our public health infrastructure. With the emergence of a suspected case of monkeypox in Sacramento County from an individual who recently returned from traveling abroad in Europe, it is a good reminder of the critical work that our public health and medical professionals do daily to keep our community safe and healthy from infectious

diseases," said Dr. Richard Pan, California State Senator and Chair of the Senate Committee on Health. "Beyond the \$300M the Governor is proposing, we need to also help shore up our existing workforce. Well-funded and fully staffed public health departments equipped with necessary viral surveillance and testing tools help us quickly identify emerging health threats, and isolate infectious individuals, helping protect life and treat people resulting in the best possible health outcomes."

The California Can't Wait Coalition stressed the urgency to rebuild California's local public health workforce after the pandemic exposed how a decade of disinvestment in local public health departments left them understaffed, under-resourced and underprepared to protect and save lives. Historic underfunding coupled with stress, burnout, and harassment during the pandemic has had a significant impact on the public health workforce and is projected to cause additional public health workers to leave their field. In fact, the recent de Beaumont Foundation and the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials Public Health Workforce Interests and Needs Survey of nearly 45,000 state and local public health workers found that:

More than half of public health employees report at least one symptom of post-traumatic stress disorder; Many public

health workers, especially executives, report bullying, threats, and harassment; and, nearly 1 in 3 public health employees say they are considering leaving their organization within the next year

On a call with news reporters today, Kim Saruwatari, Public Health Director of Riverside County, said her county has been unable to hire a public health lab director, preventing an expansion of crucial public health services to protect the health and well being of their communities.

"We do not have enough qualified public health lab directors to meet the demand that exists today let alone when we look forward to our aging workforce that may be retiring and moving on," said Kim Saruwatari, CHEAC President and Riverside County Public Health Director. "Our public health labs are critical and often unknown to the public. They play a critical role in our day to day operations and emergency response. We have to be able to recruit and retain lab directors, public health microbiologists, public health nurses, and all of our public health positions so we can protect and serve the public."

Dr. Karen Relucio, President of the Health Officers Association of California and Public Health Officer in Napa County said California is experiencing an exodus of public health staff that has gutted local public health and must dedicate resources in development

of our public health workforce pipeline.

"Sixty-two local public health officials in California's cities and counties have left their positions since the start of the pandemic. This includes 21 health officers, 20 agency directors, and 21 local health department directors," said Dr. Karen Relucio, Public Health Officer in Napa County. "This great resignation has affected more than just senior leadership and has gutted the public health workforce from top to bottom. In order to sustain public health operations, it is more important than ever to invest in public health workforce pipelines and workforce development to attract future public health staff and future public health leaders and to retain the staff that we have."

Michelle Gibbons, Executive Director of the County Health Executives Association of California said the Public Health Workforce Interests and Needs Survey demonstrates why California must invest in the PublicHERO initiative.

"Nearly 1 in 3 public health employees say they are considering leaving their organization within the next year. This highlights why we need our PublicHERO initiative," said Michelle Gibbons, Executive Director of the County Health Executives Association of California. "We continue to call on state lawmakers and Governor Newsom to dedicate resources to our Public HERO

Initiative to develop our workforce pipeline to ensure local public health departments have the capacity to respond to public health threats and deliver on the promise of health equity."

The news conference took place a day after Sacramento County officials announced the first suspected case of monkeypox in California. Officials emphasized that while the disease presents a low risk to the public at this time, Sacramento County's swift response and work to educate the public illustrates why a robust public health workforce is essential. Public health response including testing and contract tracing as new communicable disease threats emerge keeps Californians safe.

In 2021, the California Can't Wait coalition successfully advocated for \$300 million in ongoing state funding to rebuild California's decimated public health infrastructure, a commitment that was kept in Governor Newsom's May Revision budget proposal this month. As scientists expect COVID-19 to become endemic and with the clear need to address the social determinants of health that led COVID to have such devastating impacts on communities of color, it's clear California must do more. The PublicHERO initiative would support the SMARTER plan to stay ready for future waves of COVID-19 and build the diverse pipeline of public health workers needed to address health disparities. ★

Conflicting orders Priorities for Enforcement. If more than one restraining order has been issued protecting the protected person from the restrained person, the orders must be enforced in the following order (see Pen. Code, § 136.2 and Fam. Code, §§ 6383(h)(2), 6405(b)):
 1. *EPO*: If one of the orders is an *Emergency Protective Order* (form EPO-001) and it is more

restrictive than other restraining or protective orders, it has precedence in enforcement over all other orders.
 2. *No-Contact Order*: If there is no EPO, a no-contact order that is included in a restraining or protective order has precedence in enforcement over any other restraining or protective order.
 3. *Criminal Order*: If none of the orders includes a no-contact order, a domestic violence protective order issued in a criminal case takes precedence in enforcement over any conflicting civil court order. Any nonconflicting terms of the civil restraining order remain in effect and enforceable.
 4. *Family, Juvenile, or Civil Order*: If more than one family, juvenile, or other civil restraining or protective order has been issued, the one that was issued last must be enforced.
Certificate of Compliance with VAWA for Temporary Orders This temporary protective order meets all full faith and credit requirements of the Violence Against Women Act, 18 U.S.C. § 2265 (1994) (VAWA) upon

notice of the restrained person. The season may be over for Cordova, but there is still one more chance to see a couple Lancers in action locally before they move on to college. Combs and Jernigan were both selected to play in the 51st Annual Optimist High School Baseball All-Star Games on June 12.

The two Lancers will be playing for the small schools' South Team with first pitch at Army Depot Park scheduled for 4 p.m. General admission is \$10, \$8 for seniors (65+), \$5 for students, \$3 for kids under 12 and free for kids under 5. ★

Sander Meets with President Biden at NLC Conference

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Rancho Cordova Council Member David Sander attended the National League of Cities (NLC) Congressional City Conference in March 2022, an organization in which he serves as Second Vice President.

Nearly 1,300 representatives from cities, towns and villages across the nation joined the annual conference to listen to national leaders, advocate and strategize for their communities, and learn best practices from one another.

In his national role as the NLC's Second Vice President, Council Member Sander provides support to local leaders throughout the country and has the opportunity to influence federal policy. Council Member Sander advocated for the City of Rancho Cordova, Sacramento Region and cities in general at the conference, as well as brought back updates, ideas and opportunities.

President Joe Biden spoke at the conference about the American Rescue Plan, the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, economic recovery, and the role of local leaders during the pandemic and the recovery of the nation's cities, towns and villages. Rancho Cordova received funding through these programs to provide support in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as rebuild and strengthen infrastructure.

As NLC's Second Vice President,

Council Member Sander had the opportunity to speak with President Biden about creating a new federal-local partnership, as well as with Speaker Nancy Pelosi.

"Traditionally, the federal government partners with states because it's easier. There are only 50 states but 19,000 cities, towns and villages," said Council Member Sander. "President Biden said to me, 'You've got the hardest job in the world as a city councilman and a mayor, and I'm your greatest champion as the president.' Speaker Pelosi responded by adding 'More resources from the federal government is better. Cities have many needs.'"

Council Member Sander also met with the U.S. Department of Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg to discuss how small jurisdictions should determine what infrastructure funding resources to compete for. They spent the meeting strategizing and learning how to best implement the available resources.

"It's a critical time for cities because there are so many dollars flowing from the federal government to local jurisdictions that we haven't seen before," said Council Member David Sander. "Many cities are desperate and have had long-term projects that they haven't been able to address.


While Rancho Cordova is more fiscally stable, we also have long-term projects that these resources could be spent on."

In addition to discussing federal funding opportunities, the conference covered several other topics, including best practices on broadband to support digital equity, a project Rancho Cordova broke ground on in February, to energy efficiency and clean energy.


The most impactful moment of the conference was when Council Member Sander joined NLC's Board to meet with the Mayor of Lviv, Ukraine Andriy Ivanovych Sadovyi. Council Member Sander learned that Mayor Sadovyi's city of 1 million people has 200,000 refugees and expects that number to double in the near future. He remembers the impact of Mayor Sadovyi's words when he compared Ukraine to America.

"Mayor Sadovyi said remember your own revolution, Americans. Remember you fought for freedom. You fought for democracy. You won against a huge power. We in Ukraine are doing the same. We fight for our freedom and democracy. We are like you," said Council Member Sander. "We broadcast that to the attendees, and there was not a dry eye or untouched heart in attendance."

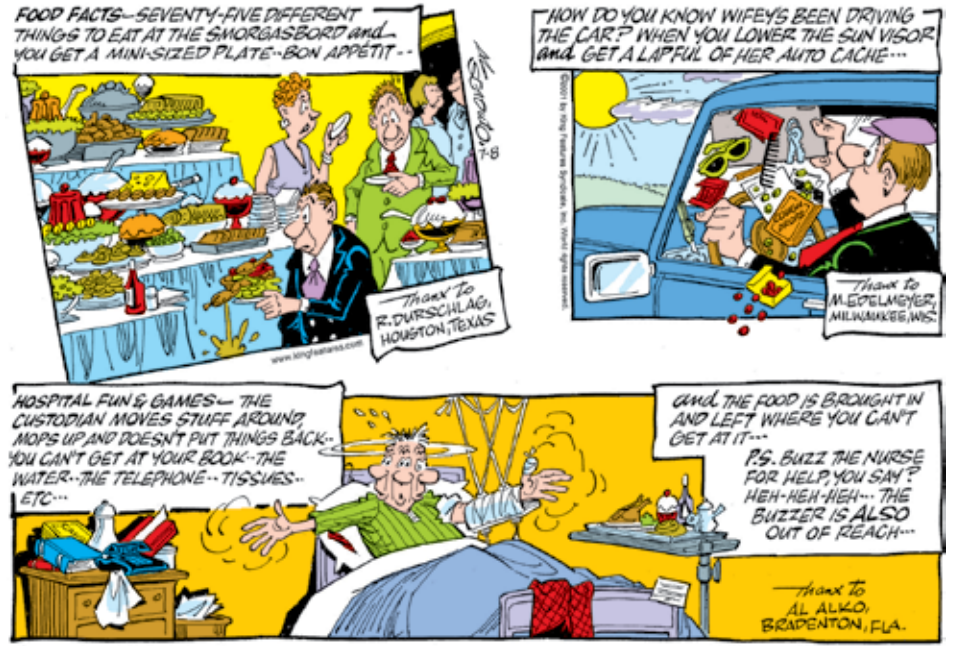

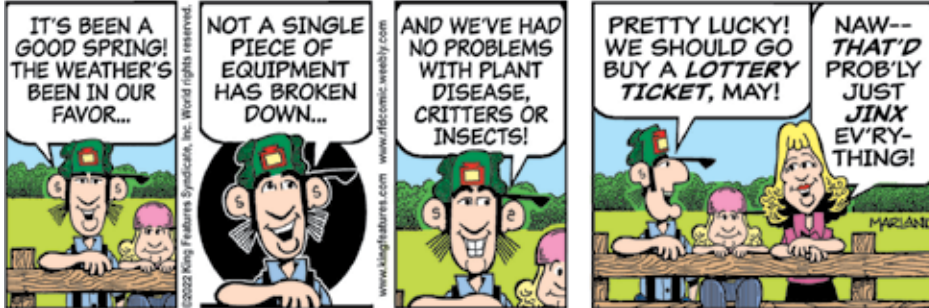

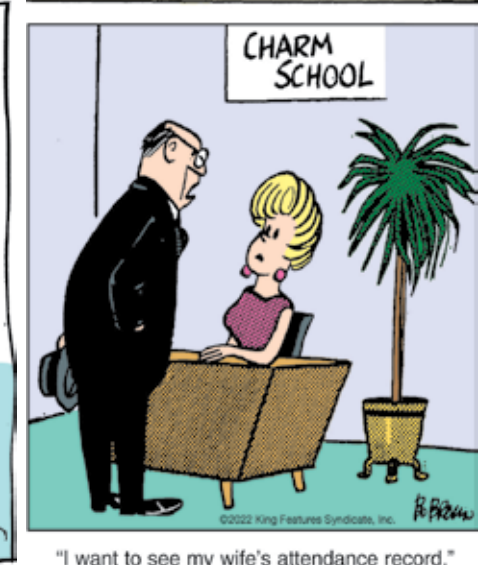
