'Beneath the Surface'

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The Rancho Cordova City Hall Art Show this quarter has a "Beneath the Surface" theme and many interpretations of that theme came out from the various artists.

Nishanth Vijayanan, 13, who won 1st place in the youth division, painted a picture of an Indian woman with a veil drawn half across her face.

"I noticed the theme was 'beneath' and I thought that the veil would show what's beneath the veil, which is the face," he said. "So, I thought it would be a good subject."

The winner of Best in Show, Emily Goldhahn, is from Montana, and said, "I paint what I know." Her work

shows a gallows frame, or head-frame, that is used in mining.

"There were over 100 mines in Butte that had gallows frames," Goldhahn said. When the mining industry changed from underground mining to open pit or strip mining, it ended up creating a "huge hole in the ground that ate up half the town, literally, called the Berkeley pit."

Around 1983, they quit mining the pit, and it filled up with water.

"It's a huge lake now," Goldhahn said. "It's about a mile deep - but mile high, mile deep! They were mining down a mile from the surface and we're a mile above sea level up there. The town was also known as Mile High, Mile Deep, and that's what I named the painting."

Other winners were 1st place, Linda Nunes, with her oil and

mixed media work called "Stay in the Boat."

"This is what I do full time," Nunes said. As Mother's Day approached, she said, made her think of gifts. "How thankful I am for that big truck that rolls up to our house every Monday and picks up all the things we don't need," Nunes continued. "That's a gift... Technical people, I don't have a brain for that at all, but I so appreciate that they can figure out all those technical things. That's a gift. When I work with value and contrast and line and form, it's just what I do, it's my gift. And it's not any better or any less than anything else, it's just what I do."

Barbara Little took 2nd place with her watercolor titled "Water Lily."

Sac County Introduces Social Host Ordinance

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Board of Supervisors, at its May 11 meeting, introduced an ordinance amending Sacramento County Code Chapter 4.54 to add host liability and penalties for violations of county code relating to fireworks. The ordinance will be continued to the May 24 Board meeting for adoption and will go into effect June 24, 2022.

Strategies to help address fireworks safety concerns in the past have focused on education and mitigation, including press releases, informational handouts and fireworks inspections.

Enforcement efforts have also included illegal fireworks buy-busts, confiscation and citations, arson investigations and proper disposal of illegal fireworks.

However, a public safety tool that has been increasingly used successfully in other jurisdictions is a "host ordinance" that places accountability for sales and/or use of illegal fireworks on property owners.

"Host," as it relates to this ordinance, means a person who knowingly permits or allows fireworks to be lit, exploded or sold on private property owned or controlled by the person, and the person knows or reasonably should have known that the fireworks would have been lit, exploded or sold.

Amending Sacramento County Code Chapter 4.54 creates new host responsibilities that include liability and penalties with increased fines for violations of the county code relating to Fireworks and provides an additional tool for reducing harm caused by use of illegal fireworks. Penalties for violations are as follows:

\$1,000 for the first violation; \$2,500 for the second violation within one year of the first violation; \$5,000 for each additional violation within one year of the first violation; \$10,000 for each violation that occurs within the American River Parkway

The ordinance to add host liability for illegal fireworks allows fire, law enforcement (including park rangers) and code enforcement agencies to hold the owner or person in charge of real property or conducting an illegal fireworks event responsible for costs of response associated with the presence of emergency personnel, the

Clarification on the Safe Stay Site Presentation

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - At the May 11 Board of Supervisors meeting, county staff presented to the Supervisors a list of County-owned parcels that have been reviewed for potential viability to site Safe Stay or Safe Parking programs for persons experiencing homelessness. The presentation was for information only and at the request of supervisors at the Feb. 16 Board meeting to review County-owned land based on object criteria and bring the resulting list of appropriate sites back.

After receiving numerous calls from concerned constituents under the impression that these sites were already selected and moving forward, it is necessary to provide context around the presentation and the discussed sites. These misconceptions were further exacerbated by a story posted in the Sacramento

Bee on Monday, May 16 entitled "Sacramento County names potential sites for homeless shelters, from downtown to suburbs" - specifically the notion that the Carmichael location is somehow already in process - which it is not.

Background

During the Feb. 16, 2022, Board meeting, multiple Supervisors requested a report back on staff efforts to identify appropriate sites to expand sheltering opportunities for those experiencing unsheltered homelessness, including an assessment of County-owned land. Using objective criteria that looked at size of the parcel(s), access to utilities, and proximity to existing encampments and/or services, staff divided the 1,673 County owned parcels into three categories: not viable, potentially viable and viable. Only 16 were deemed 'viable' based on initial review; during

the workshop, staff and the Board discussed the need to further refine potential sites based on surrounding uses and with extensive community input. The Board also asked for staff to continue to explore non-County owned land, including the purchase or lease of privately owned sites.

Any recommended site will include enough characteristics that staff believe they could support a viable Safe Stay or Safe Parking community.

To read more about the criteria that identified viable sites, or disqualified sites, please read the staff board letter.

Next Steps

Staff will continue to refine potential sites and bring any viable sites to the Board for review and direction prior to any commitments. Any site being considered will also include robust community engagement with the surrounding neighborhoods and business

owners prior to a final Board decision. Outreach will include community forums to answer questions and hear concerns as well as present plans for any particular site.

The Board also directed staff to continue to engage landowners that have viable private properties that may also be used for Safe Stay Communities to increase the options the county can consider.

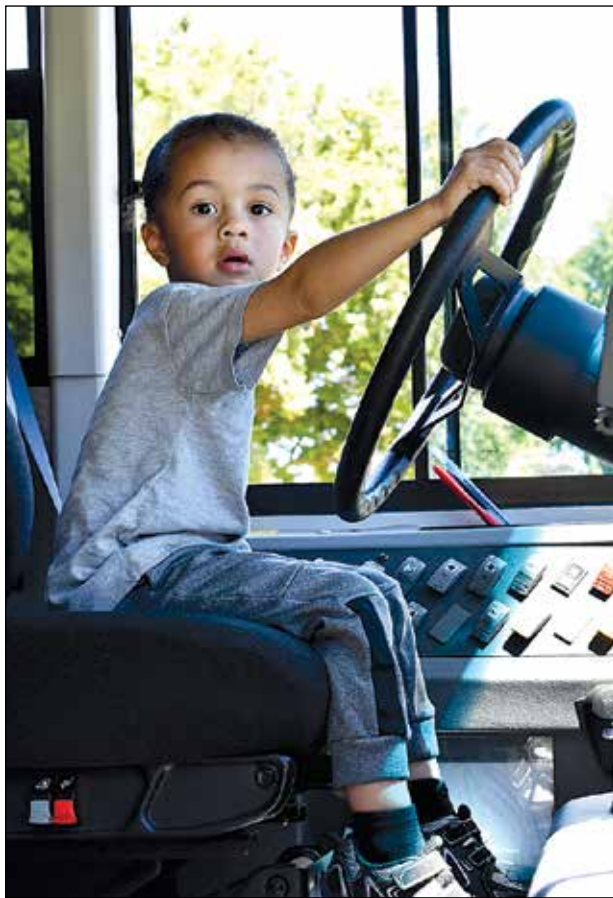
As a reminder, the goal of these Safe Stay Communities is to reduce crime, trash, blight and human suffering. As case studies have shown time and time again through the Pallet model the county has extensively reviewed, when done right, these communities drastically improve the surrounding areas while also providing positive outcomes for homeless persons who reside there.

Law Enforcement Seen Through the Lens

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - In October of 2021, Brandon Luke became Rancho Cordova's Chief of Police, after the retirement of former Chief of Police Kate Adams. He spoke at the Rancho Cordova Luncheon on May 20, talking about his background, his work, his philosophy of policing.

Luke has 28 years of law enforcement experience. He started out with Nevada Highway Patrol and after that was a police officer with UC Davis, before going to the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office in 1999. He started in Custody because that's where you go when you start in the Sheriff's office. Every time he was promoted - to sergeant, to lieutenant, to captain, he was sent back to Custody to help start out the new and impressionable people coming in from the Academy.

He worked in the SRO (School Resource Officer) program. After that he went to the Narcotic Impact Division, Gangs, Youth Services. "I thought again this is the best," Luke said, "the finest I could have, and I don't want to go any further than this." He went from there to be the Sheriff's assistant. There he got to see the political side of law enforcement, relationships, collaborations with community members and different organizations. Then he was promoted to Captain - and went back to Custody. But now he was in charge of the main jail division. He learned more. That was where he first worked with Matt Tamayo, who is now his assistant chief in Rancho. It seems indicative of Luke's attitude that he refers to the prisoners in Custody as his "cliente."

He has been a part of the Sheriff's Activity League, behavioral mental health boards, coached basketball teams. He has been a POP officer, an investigator, a gang detective. He has

interacted with faith-based organizations, different community organizations. Luke said, "I've been very fortunate to be mentored by the right people . . . I felt comfortable going into those different organizations and different groups to talk with them

about their expectations, how it fits with law enforcement. Conrade Mayer, Cordova High School in-house suspension and behavioral supervisor, came to the luncheon to hear Luke speak. "We've run into each other out in the community, and

he's very active, which is good for community policing," Mayer said. "Kudos to him for getting involved in as many things as he can." Luke said that everyone sees law enforcement through the lens of their own experience. "What

is your lens on how you see law enforcement?" Luke asked. "It's not right for me to tell you. It's not my place. Everybody here has a different lens based on their experience."

The time came when public attitude turned against law enforcement. People would ask him, "What do you do professionally?" Luke would tell them he was a lawman. "People turn and walk the other way," Luke said. "People roll their eyes. That's not how it was when I got into this profession." Then he got selected to come to Rancho Cordova. "It can't be this good," Luke said, "that people show how much they appreciate their law enforcement on a regular basis . . . What I'm trying to share with you is the appreciation that you guys show is something special. It's not around the County, it's not throughout the County. And I'll impress upon you to continue to do what you do because we, as a department, we appreciate it. We recognize it, and we acknowledge it."

Mayer said about Luke's community policing focus, "People see you, get to talk to you and feel like there is a relationship there, that there is an understanding. I think that's all anybody can ask is that we understand their job, they understand our life."

Luke grew up in Fresno, California, played basketball in high school, and went on to graduate from Fresno State University. He liked working with youth and coached at a young age. Luke was influenced most as a child and youth by his mother, who was strict and gave him the form and structure he needed. "She has had a lot of expectations for me," Luke said. "At the front end, she didn't want me to go into law enforcement, because the dangers always were a concern to her. She's always been a big supporter for me." ★

Former Grapevine-Independent Publisher Lois Hawkes Passes Away

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Lois Hawkes, a former owner of the Grapevine-Independent Newspaper and 60-year resident of Rancho Cordova, passed away May 11 at Kaiser Hospital in Sacramento. She was 89.

Lois Hawkes was the widow of colorful Grapevine-Independent Newspaper publisher and columnist Doug Hawkes, who died in 2009. Lois had a long working relationship with the Grapevine-Independent as well, serving at various times as Circulation Manager, Typesetter and Copy Editor. It was an era when two local newspapers were vying for readership—The Grapevine-Independent and the now-defunct Rancho Cordovan.

Both Lois and Doug Hawkes worked for the newspaper from its earliest days in 1968. The Hawkes family ultimately became owners of the paper for the full decade of the 1980s.

She was born Lois Mae Holto Feb. 16, 1933, in Grand Forks North Dakota, the fifth of six Norwegian-American children born to Hilda and Gunder Holto.

At age 10, Lois boarded a train with her family, moving from North Dakota to live in a city she had only seen in picture books—San Francisco. Father Gunder Holto—a WW1 US Army veteran—had been recruited by legendary “Kaiser Shipbuilding” in San Rafael. Many Midwesterners like Gunder in those years were relocated to work at West Coast armament companies to help America win WW2. Lois attended school in the big City, and on weekends and during summer explored the streets of downtown San Francisco near her Civic Center neighborhood.

A year after WW2 ended, she and her family returned to Grand Forks, where honor student Lois graduated a year early from Central High School, Class of 1950. For a short time, she was a performance “couples” roller skater in her old home town. But memories of beautiful California quickly lured her back to the Golden State, while most of her family stayed firmly planted in the cold North Dakota hinterland.

As a teen now living in the warmth and among the palm trees of Los Angeles, Lois quickly found steady work while staying with her favorite sister Lorraine. It was a

booming time for the young and dynamic SoCal area of the early 1950s.

Now 20 years of age, Lois met future husband Doug Hawkes at a dance in downtown Pasadena. Doug Hawkes was an undergraduate at well-heeled Occidental University in nearby Eagle Rock—a school attended by young Barack Obama three decades later. By summer, Lois and Doug were married in, and had a “Honeymoon in Vegas.” It was a Las Vegas just learning it might one day be the marriage capital of the nation.

It was a time in the 1950s when gamblers and vacationers dressed formally. It was understandable when celebrity comedian Red Skelton apparently mistook young, glamorous Lois for movie star Debbie Reynolds in a casino. Lois was impressed when her new husband took her to a Vegas show and they listened to a famous crooner of the era, Al Martino, at the Sands Hotel.

Martino two decades later played singer Johnny Fontaine in “The Godfather” movie.

After the couple’s first child was born in 1954, a regional sales job for Doug drew the Hawkes family north to Oakland and San Francisco. A few moves and children later, Lois and Doug settled into their long-time home in a shiny new suburb called Rancho Cordova. The year was 1962 and Rancho Cordova was booming with tract home projects and rapid population growth. The completed Hawkes family featured children Anne, Mitchell, Linden and Jeffrey. All would attend local schools and graduate from Cordova Senior High School.

Lois, never a stay-at-home mom, worked in the 1960s at the fondly-remembered “Pied Piper” variety store in Cordova Village on Folsom Blvd. Her children were swimmers and baseball players, so Lois became a volunteer for the Cordova Swim

Team and Rancho Cordova Little League, and joined a neighborhood Garden Club. When salesman husband Doug switched careers to start writing for the local Grapevine Newspaper, Lois became his assistant circulation manager. The energetic 5-0, 110-lb. Lois delivered heavy bundles of Grapevines to young paper carriers all over Rancho Cordova.

Wanting full time work when her children were teenagers, Lois landed an executive secretary position with a nearby heavy equipment leasing firm, George M. Philpott and Company. She and husband Doug joined the local Elks Lodge, and thus Lois became a member of the Rancho Cordova Emblem Club. While with the Philpott Co. at special events, she rode the “Goodyear Blimp,” attended the 1972 World Series between the Cincinnati Reds and Oakland A’s, and attended many San Francisco Giants games at windy Candlestick Park. She would work in the construction business 15 years.

Husband Doug and eldest son Mitch purchased the now “Grapevine-Independent” newspaper from Lin Corey in 1979. Six years later, Lois joined the staff. She wore many hats at the family-owned business—front office, circulation manager, typesetter and copy editor—a lot of work, but a typical mix of jobs for owners of weekly newspapers in that era.

After a decade, the Hawkes family sold the newspaper to Robert Ling. Lois then found work at Woolworth Garden Center for the next 6 years, while still finding time to assist the Grapevine-Independent Newspaper on circulation nights.

In 1994 Lois was hired by Mervyn’s Department Store on Olson Drive, and worked 14 years at the jewelry counter. The nationwide chain Mervyn’s closed all stores during the “Great Recession” of 2009.

Always keeping busy, Lois started an Internet business in 2009. She sold a wide range of items on eBay for the past 13 years.

Honored by the new City of Rancho Cordova, the widowed Lois accepted the plaque for Doug Hawkes at the Rancho Cordova Sports Hall of Fame induction ceremony in 2016.

Lois Hawkes is survived by three sons, two grandsons and two great-grandchildren. She was preceded in death by husband Doug (2009) and daughter Anne (2019). ★

Newsom's Rosy Budget Ignores Troubling Trends

The truly astonishing tax revenue numbers cited by Gov. Gavin Newsom last week as he unveiled a revised state budget bring to mind an old adage: "The bigger they are, the harder they fall."

So much money is pouring into state coffers from personal and corporate income taxes and sales taxes that Newsom said the state will have nearly \$100 billion more than it needs to finance ongoing spending, twice as much as his original budget, proposed in January, estimated.

"You've never seen a number like this," Newsom told reporters.

True enough, and it poses a potential problem that could be just as monumental. Big budget surpluses generate big demands for new spending from the advocates of educational, social welfare and medical services. But if spent on new entitlements, they become liabilities when, inevitably, the economy cools and revenues decline.

Boom and bust budgets plagued the state for decades as personal income taxes became the largest revenue source with much of them coming from a relative few high-income taxpayers. Their incomes, largely from capital gains

on investments, were and are more volatile than those of ordinary people and when they declined, it had a disproportionately heavy impact on the state's finances.

The revised California budget projects \$214.2 billion in direct general fund taxes, with personal income taxes supplying 64% of that. Roughly half of those income taxes come from the top 1% of taxpayers, fewer than 200,000 people in a state of nearly 40 million residents.

In introducing the revised budget, Newsom said he is "very mindful" of potential volatility and is responding by putting more money into reserves and making very few new permanent and long-term spending commitments.

About half of the projected surplus must, by law, go to public education and expanding the "rainy day fund" and other reserves to nearly \$40 billion. That leaves an estimated \$49 billion of so-called "discretionary income" that could be spent on anything he and legislators want.

Newsom says his budget would devote 94% of that pot of money to one-time allocations or paying down debt to avoid long-term commitments that could backfire should the economy cool and revenues decline. "This is important," he said of that strategy.

Yes it is, because the advocates of expanded entitlements and their legislative allies contend that the surplus is a golden opportunity to fill gaps. Within minutes of Newsom's budget press conference (which was 132 minutes long,

incidentally) advocacy groups were expressing disappointment.

The question posed by the astonishingly high revenue numbers is whether the good times — at least the good times for high-income taxpayers — will continue.

As the budget revision was being finalized, the world, the nation and California were experiencing some troubling trends that Newsom acknowledged.

"This May revision reflects a significantly upgraded revenue forecast due to recent cash trends and improvement in key economic indicators," Newsom told the Legislature. "However, the forecast has become more uncertain given Russia's war on Ukraine, high rates of inflation, and anticipated actions by the Federal Reserve to raise interest rates. In addition, capital gains as a percent of the state's personal income are at levels last seen in 1999 — just before the dot-com bust. Furthermore, the May revision forecast was finalized before the recent declines in the stock market."

California is not an economic island and those potentially negative factors are beyond the state's control. However, the budget's very rosy revenue projections ignore them and assume that the golden geese, California's high-income taxpayers, will continue to prosper and continue laying golden eggs.

New Study Finds Nearly 60% of Office Workers Staying at Their Jobs

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) - Some 47 million Americans voluntarily left their job last year, as the COVID-19 pandemic ushered in what has become known as the "Great Resignation." As the debate continues as to whether this is a lasting workforce trend or just a blip on the radar, a new survey released last month by the data management platform Kizen shows that most office workers appear content with their current job.

According to the survey, 57% of so-called "knowledge workers," or those who use a computer for at least 2 hours a day in their work, said they have not quit or even considered leaving their current job in the past year. An equal percentage also believe that they work the right amount of hours. Conversely, 37% of respondents considered quitting and 6% said they left their job. Of those who have considered quitting, the survey found most are young adults, people in urban areas and those going into a physical office.

"Leaders are navigating a totally new paradigm for attracting and retaining team members, and so understanding what employees value and appreciate is key," said Kizen co-founder and CEO John Winner in a news release.

Kizen (www.kizen.com) uses a no-code data platform and an intelligent business assistant to help companies

streamline business processes and boost productivity.

While 24% of these workers reported no job dissatisfaction, top complaints among those who expressed some level of discontent included: workplace culture and pay (19%), issues with management and lack of opportunities to advance and recognition (16%) and lack of flexibility (12%).

Earlier this year, the Pew Research Center found that a majority of workers who quit their job last year cited low pay, no advancement opportunities and feeling disrespected at work as major reasons for leaving.

When it comes to achieving a work-life balance, the Kizen survey also found that outside of financial security and compensation, the benefits workers valued most included more flexibility for activities outside of work (15%), a sense of purpose and opportunity to serve others (12%) and having the opportunity to be around likable colleagues (10%).

"There's no one-size-fits-all approach to satisfying employees, who value different aspects of work depending on their interests and circumstances. But flexibility and a sense of purpose seem to be powerful tools for recruiting talent and building a fulfilled, happy workplace," Winner added.

As for those who quit their jobs last year, one new survey found that approximately one in five workers regretted the decision. ★

Man Pleads Guilty to COVID Relief Fraud, Embezzlement and Unemployment Fraud

U.S. Attorney's Office, Eastern District of California

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Aaron Ashcraft, 42, of Sacramento, pleaded guilty to one count of wire fraud and one count of bank fraud in a scheme to defraud the Paycheck Protection Program of over \$1.2 million in COVID-19 relief loans guaranteed by the Small Business Administration (SBA) under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, U.S. Attorney Phillip A. Talbert announced.

According to court documents, Ashcraft carried out the fraud scheme between May 2020 and April 2021. As part of his scheme, Ashcraft submitted to SBA-approved lenders at least seven fraudulent Paycheck Protection Program loan applications in the names of purported businesses. In the applications, Ashcraft falsely represented that each of the purported businesses had employees and monthly payroll expenses. To support the Paycheck Protection Program loan applications, Ashcraft submitted fabricated records including Internal Revenue Service forms, checking account statements, and payroll summaries. In total, Ashcraft requested over \$1.2 million in Paycheck Protection Program loans and obtained approximately \$920,000.

In addition to Paycheck Protection Program fraud, Ashcraft admitted that, from September 2017 through June 2020, he embezzled at least approximately \$780,000 from his former

employer – a street-sweeping company in Sacramento. Ashcraft held multiple positions at the company, including chief financial officer. As chief financial officer, Ashcraft had access to the company's business credit card accounts. Without authorization, Ashcraft used those accounts to pay for personal expenses.

Finally, Ashcraft admitted to defrauding the Maine Department of Labor. According to his plea agreement, in July 2020, Ashcraft applied for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance, falsely claiming that he lived in Maine and was unable to work due to COVID-19. To support his application, Ashcraft submitted falsified IRS forms in which he represented that, in 2019, he operated a business in Maine that received over \$160,000 in income and made a net profit of over \$66,000. In total, Ashcraft fraudulently obtained unemployment compensation of over \$58,000.

As part of his plea agreement, Ashcraft agreed to pay restitution as follows:

A total of \$919,598 to three SBA-approved lenders; \$45,979 to the SBA; \$779,832 to his former employer; and \$58,050 to the Maine Department of Labor.

U.S. District Judge Kimberly J. Mueller is scheduled to sentence Ashcraft on Aug. 22, 2022. He faces up to 20 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine for wire fraud and up to 30 years in prison and a \$1 million fine for bank fraud.

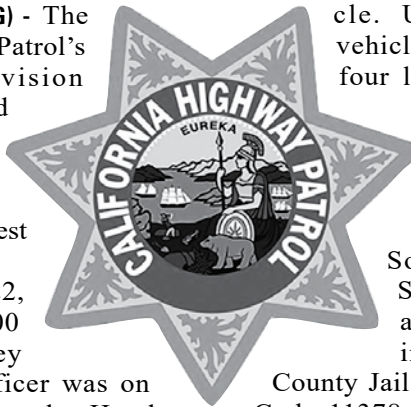

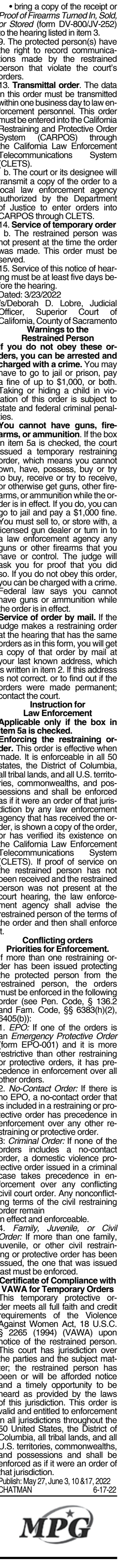

UC Davis Health Clears Way for Construction on Hospital of the Future

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - UC Davis Health started clearing the way today for what will be the region's most advanced hospital tower – the UC Davis Medical Center's California Tower.

Crews started demolition of multiple temporary buildings on the site of the future tower. It's a necessary step to make the site ready for a California Tower groundbreaking in 2023 and open to patients in 2030.

The \$3.75 billion tower is a replacement for existing parts of the hospital that must be closed due to state seismic laws. Approved by the UC Board of Regents in January, the tower will be added to the eastern side of the existing UC Davis Medical Center. It will feature a 14-story hospital tower and five-story pavilion, adding to a hospital complex that has been expanding eastward and serving the neighborhoods at this location for over 150 years.

"This project incorporates lessons from the pandemic and those lessons will help us to deliver superior care for Northern Californians for the next 50 years," said David Lubarsky, CEO of UC Davis Health. "The California Tower will triple our ICU capability, making half of our patient rooms ICU-ready. This investment will be a cornerstone in the critical care we provide our patients and the region moving forward."

The new additions reflect UC Davis Health's long-time commitment to education, research, patient care and community health. They complement the health system's mission of improving health for all. The project is also the result of state seismic safety mandates, which put a deadline on hospitals to either upgrade their existing facilities or construct new buildings.

The California Tower adds to the Medical Center's existing University and Davis Towers and will add approximately one million square feet of additional space. It will include operating rooms, an imaging center, an expanded pharmacy, additional burn care units, and about 400 single-patient rooms. The new rooms will replace others being taken out of service in older parts of the building. With 646 beds currently, the UC Davis Medical Center will continue to be the largest hospital in the Sacramento area. It will have a total of 675-700 inpatient beds when the project is completed.

More than 250 of the rooms are being designed for greater flexibility in the event of a patient surge such as during a pandemic, massive wildfire, radiation leak or other major event. These adaptable rooms will easily convert into intensive-care-unit rooms with air isolation so that they could be used to care for patients of any level of hospitalization.

"As the COVID-19 pandemic has taught us, embracing the unexpected is a common theme in medicine," said Lubarsky. "Having the adaptability of patient rooms to meet a critical care surge means these new facilities will be positioned to meet the region's needs for the next 50 years."

"This project will further harness the advantage of UC Davis Medical Center being one of Sacramento County's largest employers to increase community wealth-building and strengthen our surrounding neighborhoods," said Brad Simmons, chief administrator of UC Davis Medical Center. "This project will help improve health outcomes for area residents and ensure a robust health care safety net for historically marginalized populations, especially when it comes to providing specialty care hospital services."

The California Tower project is expected to create hundreds of construction jobs and thousands of new health care positions for the surrounding community, a benefit of being home to an anchor institution like UC Davis Medical Center. Anchor institutions are place-based, mission-driven entities like universities and hospitals that leverage economic power alongside human and intellectual resources to improve the long-term health and social welfare of surrounding communities. ★

Folsom Native Spends Memorial Day Honoring Fallen Military Members

Established in 1931, the United States Navy Ceremonial Guard is the official Ceremonial Unit of the U.S. Navy and is based at Naval District Washington Anacostia Annex in Washington, D.C.

According to Navy officials, the Ceremonial Guard's primary mission is to represent the Navy in Presidential, Joint Armed Forces, Navy and public ceremonies under the scrutiny of the highest-ranking officials of the United States and foreign nations, including royalty.

Sailors of the Ceremonial Guard are hand selected while they are attending boot camp at Recruit Training Command in Great Lakes, Illinois. The Ceremonial Guard is comprised of the drill team, color guard, casket bearers and firing party.

Varsity Softball Team Achieves 3-Peat

Lancers win GSL with unbeaten record

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Congratulations to the Cordova High School varsity softball team for capturing sole possession of the Greater Sacramento League (GSL) Championship with a 6-4 victory at home against West Campus on May 9.

The Lady Lancers wrapped up the 2022 regular season two days later with an 18-0 road victory at Florin. The win gave Cordova a perfect league record at 10-0 and their third GSL championship in a row, better known as a "three-peat." Back in 1989, the term "three-peat" became a registered trademark owned by Pat Riley, the former coach of the Los Angeles Lakers, and has been an achievement rarely accomplished in sports over the years.

"(Assistant) coach Beamish and I are beyond proud, and we feel as long as everyone is moving together,

then success takes place," said head coach Kim Little.

The CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Division II Softball Playoffs brackets pitted the No. 15 seeded Lancers against No. 2 Saint Francis in Sacramento. The Troubadours were victorious 8-1 on May 17, ending Cordova's season. The Lancers were

only able to get two hits off Saint Francis senior pitcher Hope Jenkins, who is being recruited to play Division I college softball.

The first Cordova hit was a double by junior outfielder Leiana Hobart and the second hit was a single by senior reliever Diane Salinas. Both hits off Jenkins were in the top of the

seventh inning, breaking up a possible no hitter. Junior pitcher Cassandra Seifert took the loss on the mound for the Lancers after pitching five innings and allowing five hits, seven runs (four earned) and three walks with eight strikeouts.

The final record for Cordova was 17-9 overall. The Lancers' starting lineup

had all nine players record at least 48 at bats, a .316 batting average, 18 hits and 10 runs batted in, respectively.

The following is the statistics from the top nine hitters. Junior shortstop Mariah Hopkins: .542 avg, 32 hits and 23 RBI. Sophomore infielder Abigail Perona: .469 avg, 23 hits and 13 RBI. Senior outfielder Kelissa

Lee: .469 avg, 30 hits and 23 RBI. Hobart: .458 avg, 33 hits and 22 RBI. Salinas: .435 avg, 30 hits and 31 RBI. Freshman first baseman Niya Brown: .417 avg, 20 hits and 12 RBI. Senior outfielder Laemya Banks: .412 avg., 21 hits and 10 RBI. Senior outfielder Noelle Gifford: .380 avg, 19 hits and 15 RBI. Junior second baseman Alyssa Soliven: .316 avg, 18 hits and 10 RBI.

The Lancers will have six players departing in the Class of 2022. The following seniors will be graduating: Salinas, Banks, Gifford, Lee and catcher Rose Briggs.

"Next year looks bright still, a lot of returning players with experience from this year's team. We'll miss the seniors we are losing but confident we should be ok," Little said when asked about the outlook of next season.

I, also think next year looks promising and a potential "four-peat" look great. ★
