RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Mayor Garrett Gatewood's message for this year's Rancho Cordova State of the City address was an enthusiastic, full-of-personality update for leaders and citizens who crowded into City Hall last week. The November 3rd annual review he presented was of a

successful fiscal year for the City, and for what lays ahead, with increasing housing permits, developing shopping centers and civic projects in the making.

The mayor wished to highlight the important financial tools that were ensuring an ever more, self-sufficient City:

"Because of Measure H and Measure R, we now no longer have to go to federal or state [governments] for money. Our citizens, our bootstrap

Operation: HOT SPOTS Nails More Bad Guys

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - District Attorney Anne Marie Schubert has announced the results from the 5th annual "Operation: Hot Spots," a coordinated countywide sting operation aimed at reducing the demand side of human trafficking by targeting sex buyers and sex exploiters.

Community-based organizations from the Sacramento Together Against Human Trafficking coalition voiced the need to crack down on sex buyers who fund and sustain the sex trafficking trade. In response, DA Anne Marie Schubert led the effort to organize this countywide operation, with a commitment from local law enforcement agencies to conduct operations throughout the year to reduce sex trafficking.

The District Attorney's Office created training videos for law enforcement agencies featuring experts on human trafficking victims (adults and juveniles), suspect tactics/manipulations, conducting trafficking investigations, and insights on evidence collection for prosecutions. Education was also provided on our community resources and the services available to victims of human trafficking. Victim advocates are involved in the sting operations to assist with intervention and service referrals for individuals victimized by human traffickers.

In October 2021, the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office, Sacramento Police Department, Folsom Police Department, Parole, Probation, District Attorney's Office, California Highway Patrol and FBI worked collaboratively to conduct street and hotel operations targeting sex buyers. The operation included law enforcement postings of fake decoy prostitution ads. The results were:

261 sex buyer responses to fake decoy ads; 22 citations of sex buyers for soliciting for prostitution - court dates are in January 2022; 1 charged with human trafficking of a minor; 1 charged with pandering; 2 opened investigations into pimping and pandering; 2 arrests for carrying a loaded firearm registered to another.

Those convicted of soliciting another for the purpose of buying sex or

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - For many independent artists and makers, 2020 was a devastating blow because of all the COVID-19 related event closures.

Now there is a feeling of hope amongst many of these small businesses because they are able to once again participate in events like the Sacramento Harvest Festival, happening November 19-21 at Cal Expo.

"In 2020, we had a temporary rebrand to 'Harvest Market' which allowed us to operate under the same regulations that Farmer's Markets did," said Nancy Glenn, owner of the Harvest Festival Original Art and Craft Show. "We did unfortunately lose some exhibitors who couldn't weather the storm, but we are starting to see that many of our exhibitors are finally beginning to feel optimistic about the future."

Los Rios Spring Class Schedules Now Online

An Organic Trash Bin State of the City on the Upbeat to Save the Planet

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)

The November 1 Rancho Cordova City Council Meeting descended into trash talking. Organic trash talking.

The Council heard from Public Works Division Manager of Operations Steve Harriman who led a presentation about the Residential Organic Waste Collection Program—a state mandated initiative (not City as Council Member David Sander wanted made clear) with a goal to reduce landfill disposal of organic waste by 75 percent by 2025.

Land organic waste emits methane gas which is a super pollutant and contributor to climate change. Therefore, starting in 2022, the green bin of Rancho Cordova residents living in single homes up to a triplex green bin will now be an organics bin and will be the receptacle for food waste, food soiled paper as well as yard clippings. As always, the bin will stand next to the basic trash and recycling bins. The city is providing a kitchen pail for food to be transferred from indoors to the outside.

Along with hearing the intricacies of the program, Council and staff discussed two options concerning what extra charges would be incurred by the service. With an eye on keeping costs low or with no increase at all for residents or using monies from the general fund, the Council (led by Council Member Linda Budge) also put forth the idea that by now shifting food waste to

another bin (that would be picked up once a week as opposed to every two) could benefit residents' wallets by allowing for a smaller, cheaper, basic trash bin to be purchased.

They also fielded questions and concerns from the public who wanted to know how the city was going to educate the community on the new process, the possibility of self-hauling of the organic waste and any unpleasant smells.

Next came continued discussion on the reinstatement of the Planning Commission, the once defunct body that will review planning applications for design review, use permits and more leaving the Council to focus on other matters. The breakdown of roles and responsibilities between the Council and the Commission, as well as the number of members and term lengths and limits, were discussed with a long stretch centering on how things would play out if either the Council or a developer/applicant questioned the decisions of the Commission.

During public comment, worry that the Commission would be nothing more than a set of "mini-me's" of the Council was one of the concerns raised. Still, the Planning Commission looked to be largely on schedule to come back to fruition.

Communications and Public Affairs Director Maria Chacon Kniestedt brought a Redistricting proposal from Sacramento County for input from the Council before a meeting the following day

where information was to be presented to the Sacramento Board of Supervisors. Sacramento County Board of Supervisor District boundaries must be redrawn every 10 years using U.S. Census data, in order to make the five districts as equal in population as possible, so each member represents about the same number of constituents. Of three maps shown, the Council chose the one that would keep the city within one district.

Finally, the Council ended the night by approving Amendments to the fiscal year 2020-2021 Operating Budget.

At the beginning of the night new Police Chief Brandon Luke was introduced to the city. "I'm excited to join an already proven and demonstrated leadership team with the Rancho Cordova Police Department, Sheriff's East Division [and] also to work alongside the men and women that have routinely served this community with the utmost professionalism," Luke stated.

During Council Reports, Councilmember Siri Pulipati put a spotlight on the shortage of bus drivers in Folsom Cordova Unified School District and Elk Grove School District, which has been yielding chaotic running times. Unfortunately, similar news was relayed by Councilmember Linda Budge at her recent Regional Transit meeting.

Councilmember David Sander met with the California League of Cities on homelessness policy and affordable housing. On a broader scope, he mentioned his work with the National

city, pulled ourselves up and we now can take care of our roads forever! We will always be in that position." He thanked residents for their support of the measures.

"We've completed construction on the Final Phase of Folsom Boulevard," Mayor Gatewood told the audience, adding with a sigh of relief "THANK GOD!" that the long project was finally over.

Gatewood continued to speak to those concerned about the economic recovery and job market, announcing: "If you are interested in training, Rancho Cordova has something for you... we are the place... Rancho Cordova will find a way to train and employ you."

With his now signature "Big Dreams" theme, Gatewood reiterated to the audience, "Big Dreams are becoming realities right here in Rancho Cordova, and that's thanks to the hard work of many individuals." He gave a public welcome to the newly appointed Rancho Cordova Chief of Police, Brandon

M. Luke, and told the crowd, "You live in one of the safest cities in the region."

Finally, Gatewood turned to the upcoming holidays which won't be cancelled this year due to COVID, exclaiming, "I am happy to announce that the events are BACK, BABY! And, SO AM I! including the best one, the one I became Mayor for," he said humorously, "which is the lighting of the Christmas Tree. I want to be there to turn the switch. I've waited five years for this, people! This is it; THIS IS MY YEAR!"

Shelly Blanchard, Executive Director of Cordova Community Council, said, Gatewood's message for the year had a "special meaning" after "all the twists and turns caused by the coronavirus pandemic... and that it contrasted to the negative message we are usually bombarded with in the national news."

JV Football Program Building for the Future

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Imagine you have been given the task to take a squad of approximately 31 young men, most of which have never played any organized football before and it's three weeks before the season starts. Also, imagine that once you have singled out your best players, the Varsity has the ability to call them up to their level because the JV is a feeder program. This is the task that Chris Grijalva took on as he accepted the head JV Coach for the Cordova Lancers. Coach Chris attended and played football at Cordova High School from 2007-2011 where he was a running back and defensive back. Shortly after graduation Chris joined the Navy as a Submarine Logistics Specialist. After eight and a half years of active duty, Chris wanted to step into public service. Hearing that many of Cordova's coaches had stepped back from coaching due to the pandemic, Coach Chris jumped at the coaching opportunity of what he calls "these amazing kids"

Coach Grijalva has taken the core values he learned during active duty and implemented them into the Junior Varsity program. "Our main goal as a coaching staff is to produce productive citizens in society. Our core values are respect (earn it and give it), Integrity (tell the truth and face the truth), and persistence (get up never give up). Football is merely a tool to teach life lessons," says Coach Grijalva. He's very proud of his team and tells them every practice. He treats them as a Varsity squad and sets the bar high. Being a young and inexperienced group of young men, this high bar challenge was difficult at first, but they have yet to disappoint the also young coaching staff. "Our job as JV

coaches is to focus primarily on the fundamentals of football so when they reach the Varsity level, they can hit the ground running. I truly believe that if this group of sophomores and freshmen stays together, they will be strong playoff contenders," said Coach Grijalva.

In the game of football, there are multiple things that could go wrong with each snap of the ball. The coaches weren't surprised when the squad lost their first three games. Still trying to figure out which positions most of the players are best at, the team hit some early obstacles that caused the cancellation of four of their ten games. One of the biggest challenges was finding one player to take on the roll of quarterback. Freshmen Donovan Schiffner having what the coaches call "good athletic ability" was given the job. Donovan did a great job but lacked some of the instincts that an experienced quarterback brings to the position.

The coach's prayers were answered midway through the short 6 game season when Freshman transfer Izaiah Bennett took over as quarterback and led the team to back-to-back victories against Valley and Johnson. "Every week the team has gotten better and better and many players have come a long way from never playing before" said Coach Grijalva. Some sophomore standout players this year were Aiden Gilson, Isreal Martinez, Edward Perez, Ruvyn Kravchuk, and Noah Sloan. Some Freshmen standouts were Armani Curtis, Lavon Bunch, Isreal Martinez, Isaac Adeloua, Kenneth Bell, Victor Cubero, Andrew Vivanco, and Isaiah Martinez. With the varsity team having 20 seniors graduating, this crop of sophomores and freshmen are definitely the future of the Big Red Lancer football program.



On November 3, 2021, I gave my State of City address, and I want to share the highlights with you. My theme for this year is "Dream Big Together," and together with help from community leadership, staff, and citizens, we have achieved many dreams to make Rancho Cordova an amazing place to live, work, learn and play.

First, Rancho Cordova is a great place to live. We concluded Fiscal Year 2020/2021 with over 650 home permits issued. Also, four housing projects are in development including The Preserve, The Ranch, Suncrest and Rio Del Oro. Special building projects include the Rancho Cordova Retirement Residence, Anatolia Marketplace, and Stone Creek Village. Completed infrastructure projects include the Zinfandel overpass, Folsom Boulevard corridor, Gateway sign, and repaving part of Sunrise Boulevard. We receive comments about the cleanliness and beauty of Rancho Cordova. This occurs through landscaping, cleanup and graffiti removal. Our Public Works Team has been given awards from the American Public Works Association and the American Society of Civil Engineers. Also, we are happy to welcome our new chief of police, Chief Brandon Luke, to Rancho Cordova.

agreeing to engage in an act of buying a person to engage in an act of prostitution, face a maximum penalty of 180 days in county jail, will be subject to search and seizure, and may be ordered to stay away from the involved locations or known "stroll" areas.

"Human traffickers and sex buyers have remained a significant public safety threat throughout the COVID-19 pandemic," said DA Anne Marie Schubert. "We are committed to continuing sting operations through the Sacramento Together coalition to target sex traffickers and buyers as well as maximize our efforts to protect and serve victims of sexual exploitation."

Sacramento Together is a coalition of more

than 30 community-based organizations, law enforcement, state and local public agencies, meeting regularly and working together to combat human trafficking and exploitation in our community.

The coalition works to combat human trafficking and exploitation by working together to treat, educate and remove children and young adults from life threatening situations. Working collaboratively, the coalition coordinates and maximizes community response efforts as well as all of our regional assets to better serve victims of sexual and labor exploitation. DO YOU HAVE QUESTIONS ABOUT REAL ID?



The DMV has answers! Changes to the deadline, limited-time fee waivers, and a simplified application process have all been recently announced. Read below for details on how to get your REAL ID.

Q: I Paid The Fee To Renew My Driver's License Online Last Year, But Offices Were Closed Due To COVID-19, So I Couldn't Get a REAL ID. Will I Have To Pay A Fee Again To Upgrade To The REAL ID This Year?

A: No! For a limited time, customers who have recently renewed a driver's license or identification card that is not federally compliant will be able to upgrade to a REAL ID for free! If you paid a fee to renew a driver's license or ID card between since March 2020, you will qualify but you must act now - the free REAL ID upgrade is only available until the end of the year.

The DMV is offering this free upgrade as a part of their continual efforts to accommodate customers who faced barriers due to COVID-19. It's important that everyone who is eligible and wants one can get a REAL ID. In May 2023, anyone flying domestically, visiting a military base or other federal facility will need a form of federal ID, like a REAL ID, to do so.

The process to get a REAL ID is also easier than ever - it is now possible to begin the REAL ID application and upload your documents online before visiting a DMV office to complete the process. Making your visit at the window 10 minutes or less.

Q: Which documents will I need to get a REAL ID?

A: The DMV has made it easier than ever to get a REAL ID. Recently the DMV also announced that you no longer need to supply your social security card - just your social security number. To apply, you will need to provide ONE identity document that includes your date of birth and your full name - like an original or certified birth certificate, or a valid US passport. You'll also need to provide TWO documents that show your name and address to prove you're a California resident. You can use cell phone and utilities bills, your mortgage, bank statements, or even your vehicle registration.

You can start your application online today and find a complete step-by-step checklist of all approved documents at REALID.dmv.ca.gov. If you upload your documents online before visiting a DMV office to complete the process, your time at the window will be 10 minutes or less.

Reinforce the Pandemic's Partnerships for Innovation

Beating Covid-19 has certainly taken longer than most of us were hoping, but we've turned the corner, and it's never too early to begin the critical exercise of assessing "lessons learned."

Clearly, in numerous critical areas, we were unprepared for the pandemic's arrival. Nevertheless, as a nation, we rallied and the ways in which we did so, properly reinforced, will see us through the end of this public health emergency and leave us better prepared for the next one.

The most distinctive characteristic of our rally to beat Covid-19 was partnership for innovation. We learned we needed to do many things differently and that

we needed to coordinate our efforts across sectors that don't always work together easily or well. Going forward, we need political leaders and their industry counterparts to reinforce the partnerships that have developed and strengthen the climate for innovation.

No one relishes thinking back to the early months of the pandemic when uncertainty and fear were running high, but even then, as we learned what we needed the hard way, we worked together to make it happen.

Take for example the acute problem of the shortage of personal protective equipment. The United States had failed to restock and was dangerously dependent on foreign suppliers.

But within weeks, new suppliers quickly stepped up, converting production lines to manufacture masks and gloves.

We can and must do better to avoid being caught short by shortages again. Some PPE makers are now in danger of failing because demand has let up. Let's end the boom-bust cycle with a steady commitment from federal, state, and local officials to stock up and keep surge capabilities available.

Another problem posed by this pandemic has been how to get people the consistent and coordinated care they need when medical offices and clinics have had to close doors to avoid becoming clusters for the spread of the virus. The ability to pivot to telemedicine has

no doubt saved lives and health care dollars. We need to keep this option open by renewing and expanding insurance coverage for telemedicine.

Perhaps the single most important partnership for getting us through the pandemic was the one between the federal government and pharmaceutical industry to create, test, produce, and distribute vaccines as quickly and safely as possible. The "lesson learned" here is that we all benefited from an existing ecosystem promoting innovation that was already feeding world-class research facilities, leading-edge technology, and top scientists.

We must preserve this ecosystem for innovation and avoid dramatic cuts to health

care providers in the midst of a pandemic.

We have also learned that the need for partnership extends beyond our borders. Though underfunded, COVAX, the global initiative to inoculate the world against Covid-19 directed by Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, the Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations, and the World Health Organization is a model to build on.

Let's not go back to Square One. Instead, let's recognize and fortify these partnerships for innovations that will protect us into the future.

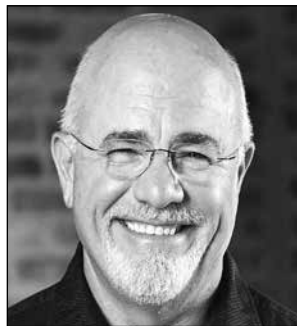

Joint Statement from Agencies Regarding Pfizer Vaccine for Children

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Health and Human Services Agency Secretary Dr. Mark Ghaly, and Director of the California Department of Public Health and State Public Health Officer Dr. Tomás J. Aragón, issued a joint statement on the Western States Scientific Safety Review Workgroup's recommendation to administer Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccines for children ages 5-11.

"Vaccines are how we end this pandemic, and the ability to vaccinate more children who have remained vulnerable to COVID-19 strengthens our fight against this deadly virus. Californians ages 5-11 can now get the same robust protection that has helped save countless lives. The vaccine has been administered safely to millions of people ages 12 and up, and federal and state medical experts agree that the clinical trials have been rigorous in demonstrating that the vaccine is safe and effective for children ages 5-11. Last year's winter surge was devastating in our state, and it is critically important that all eligible Californians supercharge their protection against COVID-19 ahead of the winter months. By getting more family members including children ages 5-11 vaccinated, we can celebrate the holidays safely and help avoid preventable hospitalizations and deaths."

California will begin vaccinating children ages 5-11 today with 500 organizations across the state receiving their first shipments through next Monday. The state was allocated 1.2 million pediatric doses from the federal government with adequate supply to vaccinate all newly eligible Californians becoming available in the coming weeks. The state has more than 4,000 locations ready to vaccinate children ages 5-11 as supply increases and is leveraging existing infrastructure and partnerships used to administer vaccines to teens and young adults. This includes working closely with medical providers, local health departments, schools, community partners and others to administer vaccines safely and equitably through mobile clinics and vaccine pop-ups in the hardest-hit communities across the state.

Parents are encouraged to call their child's health care provider to schedule a COVID-19 vaccine appointment. Parents can also visit MyTurn.ca.gov or call the hotline at 833-422-4255 beginning tomorrow to find a nearby vaccination site. The COVID-19 vaccine is free for all Californians regardless of insurance and immigration status. All Californians are strongly encouraged to get vaccinated or complete their vaccination series, get a booster when eligible, and get a flu vaccine, which can be administered at the same time.

Turning 65 ... Is Medicare Annual Enrollment Time for Me?

Hello Toni:

I turn 65 in April and overwhelmed by all the mail I am getting this year for Medicare Annual Enrollment. What do I do? The mail from companies says theirs is the best, but they all offer the same thing with dental, vision and gym membership.

One Medicare Advantage commercial on TV says that they can put \$144 back in your Social Security check. I am not receiving my Social Security check and wonder how I can get the \$144.

If I do not enroll in Medicare at the right time everybody says I will get a penalty that will last the rest of my life. How does someone know what is the right decision for their situation? Look forward to your answer.

Matt,

The answer to your question is you can do **NOTHING!!! NADA!!!** during the Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (aka Open Enrollment) because **you are not 65** yet and have not enrolled in Medicare.

Next year's, Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (aka Open Enrollment) is when you can make a change to your Part D plan, change, or enroll in a Medicare Advantage plan with or without a Medicare Part D prescription drug plan.

You **MUST** have already turned 65 or under 65 and enrolled in Medicare to enroll or change either a Medicare Part D prescription drug plan or Medicare Advantage plan during Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (aka Open Enrollment).

Since you are turning 65 in April and will be in your **Medicare Initial Enrollment Period** that is a **7-month period** that begins 3 months prior to April, the month of April and 3 months after. January is 3 months prior to April, which is a good time to begin enrolling in Medicare and exploring which Medicare option best fits your specific medical and prescription drug needs.

Talk with your medical provider to discover what type of Medicare plan whether Medicare Advantage plan with prescription drug plan or Original/Traditional Medicare with a Medicare Supplement and a stand-alone Medicare Part D plan is right for your health situation and the prescriptions you are taking.

As we say at the Toni Says® office, "Medicare is not a cookie cutter, one size or plan does not fit everyone." The insurance companies market their specific Medicare plans and want you to believe that theirs is perfect for you.

Parents: The Secret to Drug-Free Youth

On average, kids first try drugs between the ages of 13-15. Statistics like these can be terrifying to parents who are trying to keep their children drug-free in a world that glamorizes getting high. While statistics around teen drug abuse are troubling, there is one ray of hope that continues to bring adolescent drug use down: Parents. Research repeatedly shows that parents are the number one influence in their child's life. So armed with the knowledge that you really can make a difference, let's talk about the "how" of helping your child stay drug-free.

Set clear expectations

Help your child stay drug-free by setting clear rules and expectations. Talk to your child about family rules concerning drugs, marijuana, alcohol, inhalants, and other risky behaviors. Set clear consequences about what happens when those rules are broken. School-sponsored programs should NOT be the first time your child hears about or considers the consequences of drug use. Research shows that you should talk to your child about the harms and dangers of drugs as early as nine years old.

Come up with a plan

With your child or teen come up with a plan for when they will be confronted with the choice to participate in risky behaviors. Talk out and act out different scenarios with your child before they face these tense situations with peer pressure and emotional stress on their own. You might get some pushback from your older teens about roleplaying. Share your personal experiences or other stories that will help your teen feel empowered to say "no" in high-pressure situations.

The plan to stay drug-free should also include steps for what to do if your child makes a mistake or finds themselves in a bad situation. Growing up my family had a code word that we could text to our

parents that meant "come get me right now!" When I would find myself in a tricky situation I would send off the code word in a text to my dad. Within a few seconds, my dad would call asking me to come home. That way I didn't have to come up with excuses of why I was leaving early--I just blamed my "uncool" parents.

Show you care

Lastly, be involved in your child's life. Every time your child or teen leaves the house you should be asking questions about who they will be with, what they are doing, and if parents will be present. When you know your child and are an active part of their life, having tough conversations becomes a lot easier. Building and maintaining trust between you and your child starts with becoming part of their world. Have fun together, talk together, and ask them questions about their day. When you show your child you care about every part of their life they are more likely to open up to you about the things that are troubling them.

Helping your child stay drug-free doesn't have to be overly complicated. As their parent, you have the power to influence their decisions now and in the future. Don't shy away from hard conversations about family rules and expectations, but instead see it as your chance to help shape your child's future.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Highway Patrol (CHP) recently announced the graduation and deployment of its 10 newest canine teams. The ceremony at the CHP Academy in West Sacramento is the culmination of 400 to 600 hours of intense training for each officer and their canine partner.

"After weeks of rigorous training, these new teams are ready to assist in the CHP's mission of protecting and serving the State of California," said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. "Our canines are a tremendous asset to the Department, and the addition of these 10 teams to our existing resources will supplement the already highly effective canine program."

The CHP uses its canines to perform a variety of functions, including detecting human scent, contraband, and explosives. A canine team can improve the safety and effectiveness of officers as well as saving time and money. The CHP canines are also used to assist allied agencies in apprehending criminals, detecting explosives or drugs, and in locating "at-risk" missing persons.

This is the only graduation in 2021 for CHP canine teams trained in handler protection and narcotics detection or handler

protection and explosive detection. The canine teams completed between 11 and 15 weeks of intensive training at the CHP Academy, depending on their specialty.

All handlers are CHP officers with departmental experience ranging from 4 to 15 years. The graduating canine teams represent the following CHP Divisions: Valley, Golden Gate, Central, Southern, Border, and Inland. Following this graduation, the CHP now has 48 canine teams deployed throughout the state.

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of Safety, Service, and Security. ★

Caltrans Launches Highway Litter Removal Program

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Caltrans announced a new Clean California pilot program that offers Adopt-a-Highway volunteers up to \$250 for picking up highway litter. The Adopt-A-Highway program has been one of the longest-standing and successful government-public partnerships in the state. Since its inception in 1989, more than 120,000 Californians have cleaned and enhanced over 15,000 shoulder-miles of roadside. The new pilot program will augment the overall goals of the Clean California program by providing additional resources to maintain and beautify the state's roadways.

"Clean California is all about restoring pride in public spaces and making a difference in our communities, and that goes hand in hand with volunteering," said Caltrans Director Toks Omishakin. "Through Caltrans' Adopt-a-Highway program, volunteers can pitch in to clean and beautify our

roadsides, and we're proud to offer an incentive for even more people to help Clean California."

Part of Governor Gavin Newsom's California Comeback Plan, Clean California is a sweeping \$1.1 billion, multiyear clean-up effort to remove trash, create thousands of jobs and engage communities to transform roadsides into places of public pride. Since July, Caltrans has collected nearly 2,500 tons of trash and made more than 600 conditional job offers as part of the program.

Adopt-a-Highway volunteers help create cleaner and more beautiful roadsides by removing litter, planting trees and flowers, clearing graffiti, and thinning overgrown vegetation, and also help prevent litter and other pollutants from entering state waterways through stormwater drains. Whether completed by an individual or group, Caltrans will award stipends up to \$250 total per litter collection event for activities such as:

- \$250 for each adopted highway segment;
- \$62.50 for each ramp, or up to \$250 for all four ramps;
- Up to \$250 for clean-up activities at other locations, such as along bike paths or at park-and-ride facilities.

Caltrans will require volunteers to submit information – including date, location, amount of trash collected, number of volunteers, hours worked and pictures – following eligible clean-up activities to receive a stipend. Adopt-A-Highway participants are limited to one payment a month.

As part of the pilot program, the stipends will be available to Adopt-a-Highway volunteers in Butte, Colusa, El Dorado, Glenn, Imperial, Nevada, Placer, Sacramento, San Diego, Sierra, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba counties. Caltrans expects to expand the program statewide in the coming months.

There is no cost to participate in the Adopt-a-Highway program. In addition to clearing litter, Adopt-a-Highway volunteers have maintained 1,500 acres of vegetation and planted 100 acres of trees and 36 acres of wildflowers since 1989. Caltrans installs signs displaying the name of the person, family, organization or business on the segment of adopted highway. ★
