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Signage May Soon Point in a Better Direction

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The Tuesday, August 24 City Council Meeting ended up being cut down for time. With talk about a chainsaw wielding local businessman how could it not?

After strained discussion about office, retail and industrial real estate sign usage in the city, Vice Mayor Terry – noting the absence of Council Member Linda Budge and the impending early departure of Council Member Siri Pulipati – decided to push full discussion of the two other planned topics of the night to a future date. Mayor Garret Gatewood was also not present at this Special Meeting/Work Session.

"The signs drew negative impact on his ability to do business," said Council Member David Sander who recalled the plight of a local businessman who found signs promoting the availability of his space that should have been taken down were prompting people to think his business was failing or had moved. After repeated pleas to have them removed, he finally took matters into his own hands—via a chainsaw – and took them down himself.

Some have viewed the proliferation of commercial real estate signs as a blight on the city landscape mainly due to signage never being taken down, especially those tagged with graffiti. After direction to do so from the Council a year ago, city staff had met with the local real estate community to discuss current regulations on placement and potential code amendments.

City staff reported that many of the individuals they spoke with had little knowledge about current ordinances and the conversation, in the words of Economic Development Manager Amanda Norton, actually prompted some to "realize the signs needed to come down." Those who staff talked to pointed to slow communications between the commercial real estate community and outside organizations hired to remove signs, after effects of COVID-19 and general human forgetfulness.

The real estate professionals spoken to also relayed back to staff the leadup time to market a property which includes the signs in question from the time space is available or a tenant chooses not to renew can be anywhere from six to nine months and

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California's Housing Crisis

How much difference will a zoning bill make?

On a few of the vast, verdant lawns in East Sacramento, one of the capital city's most popular and expensive neighborhoods, yellow-and-black yard signs urge passersby to "save neighborhoods" and keep Sacramento "livable and diverse." The message symbolizes a big battle taking place at the state Capitol only a few miles away – whether to do away with sacrosanct single-family neighborhoods to address the California housing crisis.

Senate Bill 9, one of several measures alluded to by the signs, would technically allow as many as two duplexes, two houses with attached units, or a combination – capped at four units – on single-family lots across California, without local approval.

The bill would allow more building where it's now illegal, with the intent of reducing California's fast-rising home prices and increasing access to homeownership through a greater variety of options, according to state Senate

leader Toni Atkins, a Democrat from San Diego who introduced the bill and similar versions in the past.

To lessen concerns from more than 100 cities and neighborhood groups that oppose the bill, Atkins on Monday added a few amendments that give local jurisdictions some veto power over units that threaten public health and safety and curtail potential speculation. The bill – approved by the Senate in May and two Assembly

committees in June – made it out of the Assembly Appropriations Committee and will face a vote on the Assembly floor in coming weeks.

But some analysts say the linchpin of the Senate's housing package would probably have a negligible impact on the California housing crisis, at least in the short-term. As for the nightmare scenario described by opponents? There simply isn't enough evidence to back that up, either.

That's because a change

to zoning means very little in reality, starting with the number of units that would actually get built, these analysts say.

Development would be realistic in only about 410,000 parcels in California at most, or 5.4% of land now occupied by single-family houses, according to a new study by the Turner Center for Housing Innovation at UC Berkeley based on the version of the bill without the new amendments.

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Walking the Walk for 100 Miles for Hope

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Bob Fitzgerald is persistent and consistent.

The 83-year-old retired Air Force master sergeant has logged more than 200 miles walking since the second annual 100 Miles for Hope Challenge kicked off. He has also raised roughly \$1,300 thus far, easily eclipsing his initial goal of \$1,000. Fitzgerald, a member of American Legion Sacramento Legislative Action Post 861, walks at least two miles daily, and completes three miles on two or three days a week. But he's not lollygagging. He averages 16 1/2 minutes per mile.

"When I saw the notice in The American Legion Magazine, I thought, 'Well, shoot, I'm walking every day, anyway. Why not?'" said Fitzgerald, who says he has walked at least 5,000 steps daily since Nov. 9 last year. "I do what I can to support veterans. And the Veterans & Children Foundation (V&CF) sounded like an excellent program to support. 100 Miles for Hope gave me the opportunity to do that."

One hundred percent of donations for 100 Miles for Hope goes right to the foundation. Since its creation almost a century ago, the V&CF has delivered over \$30 million in assistance to disabled veterans and military families. The foundation funds the work of 3,000 accredited American Legion service officers who provide free assistance to veterans seeking help with their earned VA benefits. It also provides

Temporary Financial Assistance grants to minor children of active duty or American Legion members.

Fitzgerald, who has been an American Legion member for more than 30 years, knew that his family members and friends would be more likely to donate through familiar mediums than an app that others used. So, he turned to Facebook and other means to ask for support to reach his initial goal of \$1,000.

"Family members donated because I asked them to - but also because they believe in the cause, supporting veterans and children," Fitzgerald said. "My friends donated because they respect the fact that I am a veteran and I support veterans causes. They are all very patriotic and support veterans as well."

His supporters quickly surpassed the fundraising goal, so Fitzgerald increased it to \$1,500. He's confident that in the final weeks of the 100 miles campaign, he will reach that goal.

Supporters can make a tax-deductible donation that goes directly toward supporting the nation's disabled veterans and military families who face financial crises.

"I would encourage everyone, if they are looking for something to support, to look at The American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation," Fitzgerald said. "I can't think of a better way to donate your money. A large percentage (100 percent) goes to benefit the foundation."

Fitzgerald encourages everyone to participate any way they can: walking, donating, doing yoga, fundraising, cycling, whatever it takes to embrace fitness, improve wellness and support the foundation.

"Persevere - get off the chair and do it," he advised. "And don't give up. I'm almost 84 years old and if I can get up and walk two miles every day at a fairly fast pace, there's no reason why a lot of other people can't." SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County's Bradshaw Animal Shelter is participating in Clear the Shelters - a series of adoption events and adoption fee specials to alleviate the high impact of their animal intake between Monday, Aug. 23, 2021, and Sunday, Sept. 19, 2021.

On Aug. 28, the shelter hosted a successful adoption event, which they named Kitty Palooza, and offered limited walk-in adoptions on a first-come, first-serve basis. During the event, more than 40 cats and kittens found loving forever homes. This was the first time the event was held since the pandemic forced closure and limited walk-in services in 2020.

In addition to the adoption event, the shelter is offering sponsored adoptions through an anonymous donor and the shelter's non-profit affiliate TEAM Bradshaw from Aug. 31, - Sept. 19, 2021. Adoptions are by appointment only and potential adopters can view available shelter and foster pets online by visiting the shelter's website. Ten Artists Host Open Studios this September

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Ten artists will present their work at Open Studios at the MACC from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday and Sunday, September 18 and 19. Mick Martin and his band will open the weekend on Friday night with a concert at 7:30 p.m.

David Peterson has always called himself an artist, "From the days when I scribbled on the walls, through high school and junior college," Peterson said. "I was going to be a great artist." Life interrupted, and he came back to art at age 60. At Open Studios, Peterson will be painting watercolors all sizes, from postcards to full size. "I'm not painting 'to sell'," he said, "but to record our neighborhoods and times in my loose fast style of watercolor."

Christine Kerr can't pin down her influences and inspiration to one person. "Probably the most influential people in my artistic life at this point are my students and family," Kerr said. She teaches art at Christian Brothers High School. "My students are exceptionally skilled, creative, and hard-working. Seeing them work through challenges and create such incredible artwork every day inspires me to work harder and lead by example."

Judy Gustafson is a ceramic artist. "I have just completed a very hectic two-month pottery production schedule, 180 pieces," Gustafson said. "After I set up at Open Studios, I will take advantage of the break and enjoy hanging out with the other participating artists at the MACC." Gustafson said her fellow artists, "Give me inspiration and gentle nudges to think even farther outside of the box."

Cheryl Gleason, MACC Event Coordinator/Curator, is a serious artist as well. While Gleason has said, "I feel that now I'm on a path to where I want to go," that path may lead many places, since her works are constantly evolving into new forms. Gleason has recently shown at a sculptural show at ACAI Gallery in Fair Oaks, and also at a community art exhibit, Exhibit It! at the Pence Gallery in Davis.

Sheri Kindsvater works in glass. "Discipline, glass, art and science are hand in hand," Kindsvater said. "When you work with a kiln you put everything together and then let the kiln do its thing. Eighteen hours or more later you get to see the result.

Redoing or undoing just isn't possible."

Edith LeFebvre works intuitively. "I think the best piece of advice is paint for yourself," LeFebvre said. "If you try to paint what you think other people would like or would buy . . . I don't think it works. I paint sometimes and I go 'I don't like it but you're mine and you're my child.' . . . I'm really curious about what the heck's in my head, and that's how I paint. I think that's why it's such an adventure."

Deborah Kelly lost both her job and her business when Covid hit, so she decided to go back to art full time, using recyclables and on-hand items. "The more I am able to see everyday items as art materials, the more excited I become to create these assemblages," Kelly said. Kelly taught jewelry for five years and incorporates this in her art. She is working toward art being a greater part of her income in the future.

Janet Regan does fine art gourds and fused glass works. She had three art pieces in the recent Member's Show at the MACC, and three works now hanging at City Hall in the "Abstractions" show.

Uli Smith recently started sharing her work publicly. "I plan to have an interactive piece in my 'studio' where people will be able to contribute to a painting with me," Smith said. Ron Hall felt like an artist in the 5th grade when kids gathered around his desk and started having him draw them "stuff." He works in acrylic. "I am inspired to create art that captures people in an intimate moment or setting," Hall said. "Whether it is creating a musician, a ballerina, or a person sipping tea in the early hours of the morning, I love to create a sense of flow and rhythm in each piece of art I create."

That could add a total of 700,000 new units across California, if every single homeowner for whom the change made sense chose to develop. "Overall, that's a sliver of the 7.5 million single-family homes throughout the state," said David Garcia, policy director for the Turner Center.

One of the new amendments – which requires owners to live in the home for at least three years before they could split their property and build as many as four units – cuts the potential total of new units by 40,000, or 6%.

The analysis was conducted using current land values and development costs, so the number of feasible units could change. But Garcia said that was unlikely in the near-term. The study found that the typical property owner could not afford to build a second unit, much less a third or fourth. Other barriers: The new split lot couldn't be less than 1,200 square feet, and historic districts, fire hazard zones and some rural areas would be barred from development.

"You would not see the wholesale bulldozing of single-family homes, as we've seen characterized in many of the public comments in committee hearings," Garcia said. "There's just no financial basis for that fear."

Many critics of the bill – including Livable California, a group that supports single-family neighborhoods and local control – emphasize that the legislation doesn't require that any units be affordable or capped at a certain price. So, it would only really benefit wealthy people and developers, they say.

The bill's supporters push back by asking: Where are neighborhood groups during battles over affordable housing projects? Often on the opposing side.

While there aren't any units set aside for the lowest earners, the bill's backers say that market-rate housing ultimately helps create affordability for everyone. By adding a unit that a middle-class family can afford, it opens up a less expensive unit for a family one step below them on the economic ladder.

While duplexes are still legal across Sacramento on corner lots, the duplexes, fourplexes and even six-unit buildings that dot her block near the park were built prior to the single-family zoning ordinance that outlawed them.

Would adding more of those buildings now lower rents? While more market-rate housing on the regional level has indeed been found to lower prices over time, the jury is still out at the neighborhood level, explained Robert

Wassmer, chairperson of Sacramento State University's master's program in urban land development.

But Wassmer, who also lives in East Sacramento, said the unspoken argument against the bill really revolves around property values in higher-end neighborhoods. And he found in a 2018 study the greater the number of occupants in a household, the lower the home values.

"They're worried about their property values going down, and liberals can't dismiss that. For many people, that's their nest egg. That's their retirement," he said.

While the bill previously said it was up to cities to mandate that homes be occupied by their owners to undergo a lot split, the new amendment requires it statewide. The idea is to prevent speculation by corporate groups that have already bought up about 17% of the state's housing stock.

Researchers who focus on gentrification and zoning say while concerns about displacement are valid, these zoning changes have happened in only a handful of places so there's just not enough evidence to predict what would happen if this bill becomes law.

As their COVID-19 project last year, Jeff Harris and his teenage daughter removed the roof of the two-car garage behind his 32-year River Park home in Sacramento and added a 700-square-foot apartment.

Then came the complaints. One neighbor, concerned about their privacy, asked that there not be any windows on one side. The real estate agent selling the property behind his also called to ask whether there would be any windows overlooking her clients' yard "because that might kill the sale," he said.

Harris isn't only a homeowner, but the city council member representing East Sacramento, so the debates over the small addition to his backyard helped inform a much bigger discussion at City Hall: whether Sacramento, and now the state, should allow homeowners to build up to four units on their single-family lots. The City Council isn't expected to vote on the zoning change until next spring, after months of community outreach.

"How are we going to deal with the infrastructure upgrades? How are we going to mitigate parking? How are we going to collect the trash?" Harris asked. "And I can tell you, almost every city in California right now is broke." ★

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A Morning Like No Other - Ground Zero at 20 Years

After a long night of late work well into the morning, I was in a deep sleep. The repeating ring of the telephone awakened me. I received an alarming telephone call from a close friend frantically trying to get my attention. She said "just get up and turn on the TV. You won't believe what is happening". She was absolutely right.

white leather couch in my small rental home in Roseville, tuned in as the world was tuned it, to the disaster in New York as it unfolded live for everyone to see. We were all New Yorkers that day.

I had previously lived in Manhattan. After returning to California, I traveled to New York City often to teach classes at The Learning Exchange and spiritual training centers as a part of my ministry. I also met with many clients as a spiritual life coach each visit. Through these visits I became friends with so many great people who lived in The City. I stayed at their homes, got to know their families, learned about their lives, loves, and fears. Many of them worked in the immediate area of the Twin Towers.

As I sat there watching the towers fall along with the rest of the world, I had no idea if any of those friends or members of their families were being crushed under the weight of that destruction. It was a personal anguish and horror felt by millions simultaneously. It was a grief embedded forever. And we as a nation vowed to never forget.

Everything changed for everyone during those hours. Terrorism had come to our shores, and those whom we had charged to protect us failed miserably. We have been paying for their failures ever since.

And for those who paid the ultimate price, giving their lives to save others inside and around the Twin Towers? And for all the First Responders who witnessed the death and destruction at the end of

their fingertips and right before their own eyes? What did they get from so many after only 20 years? Many forgot.

Yes, life goes on, but as individuals we do not. Our time is limited. We are here to understand life, liberty, love, and loss. We are here to understand joy and grief. These become the web that builds our evolution, our DNA that we pass on to those who follow us. If we do not teach our emotional history to our children, good and bad, they will suffer repeating our mistakes and the feeling of betrayal from us for not forewarning them.

Enter our current day Neon Nation. Have we lost our way in one generation? Does the "Shiny thing" distract us so easily because it is too hard for us to focus on the truth and explaining it to others

as our society crumbles around us?

A few months after 9/11 I traveled back to New York to offer support to any of those friends who needed it. I traveled to the site while the clean-up was still underway. I saw the scorched church and cemetery. There were still many "Missing" flyers posted to walls and lampposts. I saw the many memorials around the site. When I found one memorial that listed all of the names of those lost I read every one of them. I thank God to this day that not one of my friends was on that list.

The history of Ground Zero is complex and still unfolding. The more the years fall away the more important it is that we reveal as much as we can about that fateful morning and all that led up to it.

When someone kills

your son or daughter, husband or wife, it doesn't matter what political party they belong to. It doesn't matter what religion they belong to. It doesn't matter their motive. All that matters is your loved one is gone forever. Grief takes over. And no one can ever really fill that void. It never truly heals. You just learn how to manage it in the silent times, alone with your Creator.

All those who lost a loved one during those tragic days only asked one thing from us. Never Ever Forget.

On this remembrance weekend 20 years later, take a few moments in silence to share the grief and the weight of the losses experienced by so many on September 11, 2001. If only with that simple action, love will prevail. ★

Devious you were, making me think you were gone. You just found a dark corner to hide in waiting for your chance to wreak havoc in my life. You found your chance when my marriage started to fail and the only escape I had from my sense of loss was to drown my feelings in your deceptive embrace.

According to CalFire, the Caldor Fire is 20% contained, has burned over 200,000 thousand acres, and has destroyed close to three thousand structures in its way causing mandatory evacuations in and around the South Lake Tahoe area.

"Local businesses may be overwhelmed with the influx of customers following recent evacuations in the South Lake Tahoe area and other communities experiencing these wildfires. We want to help businesses avoid potential problems

as our community comes together to help one another in a time of need," said Lori Wilson, President of the Golden Gate Better Business Bureau.

Industries affected by the consumer protection laws during a state of emergency include, but are not limited to, hotels and other lodging accommodations, gas stations, grocery stores, and rebuilding industries.

If you need to make preparations to stay at a hotel:

Know that according to California law, under Penal Code 396, 30 days after a state of emergency is declared, it is illegal for a business or other entity to sell their goods or services for more than ten percent of their regular rate. This includes hotels, motels, the sale of food items, gasoline, and any goods or services used for emergency cleanup, emergency supplies, and building materials.

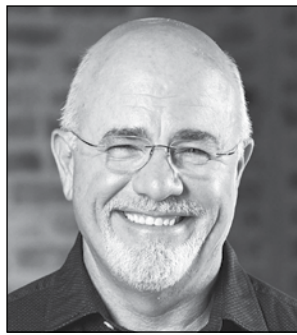

Teaching the Value of Work

Dear Dave,

What are your views on teaching children good work habits? Many of our friends don't require their kids to help out or work around the house, but we both strongly feel that instilling a strong work ethic early in life is one of the best things you can do as a parent for your children.

Dear Deshay,

I'm so glad you both feel that way. Our culture has made many great advances to ensure the happiness and well-being of children. But too many parents today are so centered on what their children want that they have lost perspective on what their children need.

Perspective, or looking at life over time, demands

that you teach children to work. Teaching a child to work is not child abuse. We teach them to work not for our benefit, but because it gives them dignity in a job well done today and the tools and character to win as adults in the future.

In my mind, children should be taught to work just like you'd teach them to bathe or brush their teeth—as a necessary life skill. An adult who has no clue how to tackle a job and finish it with pride is every bit as debilitated as an adult with body odor or green teeth. If your child graduates from high school, and his or her only skill set consists of playing video games, eating fast food and believing the world owes them something, you've set up your child to fail.

Another benefit of teaching a child the wonder of work is they may grow to lose a little respect for those who refuse to work. I'm not talking about folks who lost jobs due to unforeseen circumstances and are trying to

get back on their feet, or someone who genuinely cannot work. I'm talking about folks who refuse to look for, or accept, gainful employment.

My wife and I noticed that our kids, as they grew older, didn't pursue relationships with people who didn't understand the value of work and demonstrate the character traits of mature, hardworking people. And that was wonderful news to us!

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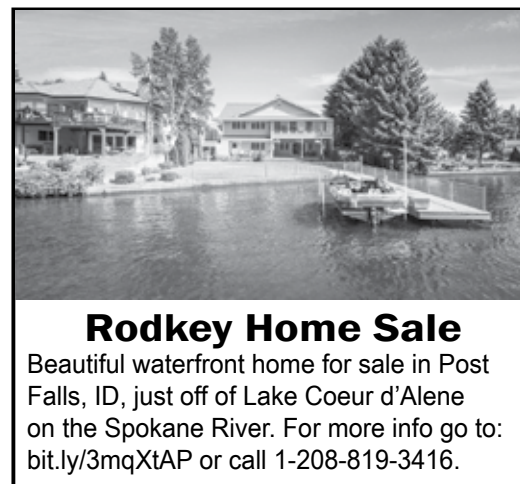

then remain for up to 30 days after sale or lease. Staff continually mentioned the community who they engaged expressed their commitment to work with the city to foster a successful ongoing collaboration and partnership beneficial to both parties.

The proposed code amendments included no more than one on-site for sale or lease sign and permitted per property frontage and only to be displayed for the period while the unit, building, or property is being marketed for sale or lease ending 30 days after it is sold or leased. As well, the sign would be pushed from the right of way from formerly three feet to 5 feet.

During public comment, resident Helen Whelan Bashaw brought up concern about the signs as easy targets of graffiti of which both the city and the real estate community expressed their steadfast desire to address defacement swiftly.

When Council weighed in, Councilmember Sander relayed another negative anecdote about giving a tour of Rancho Cordova to an outsider who felt the city was failing as a business location—due to the abundance of commercial real estate signs. He also initially felt the research and engagement staff had performed was unsuccessful. “I don’t think this has progressed things for us in any way,” he bluntly said.

Sander felt a loophole existed in the code language that could possibly allow for someone to put up a sign for ten years under the guise of marketing. He also showed annoyance over the “lack of appearance” from the real estate community at the meeting.

To combat his unease, Chamber of Commerce CEO Diann Rogers “zoomed” in to say the real estate community was very willing to do what was needed to get rid of any problems and justified the lack of industry representation to not weigh down the night’s discussion with multiple appearances allowing staff to speak for them. Despite Roger’s words, stakeholder Chris Lemmon did appear offering himself as a resource to answer any questions and gave kudos to the staff and the real estate community.

Vice Mayor Terry said he “never had one comment” about sign misuse from people and expressed a disinterest in using time to discuss the subject even going so far as to suggest Sander and Councilmember Linda Budge work with staff in a subcommittee instead.

Progress was made however with Council ultimately asking for some clarification on the marketing leadup time put into code verbiage which Economic Development Manager Norton agreed to and would bring back the topic with updates as an action item at a later date. Even Councilmember Sander appeared satisfied with the direction the discussion took.

The positive outcome was balanced with the inability to give full discussion to the night’s other two topics: Reinstating a Planning Commission and Parking Policy Updates and Electric Vehicle Charging Stations. There was enough time solely for the former’s staff report to be presented but without discussion and a complete move of the latter to a future date. ★

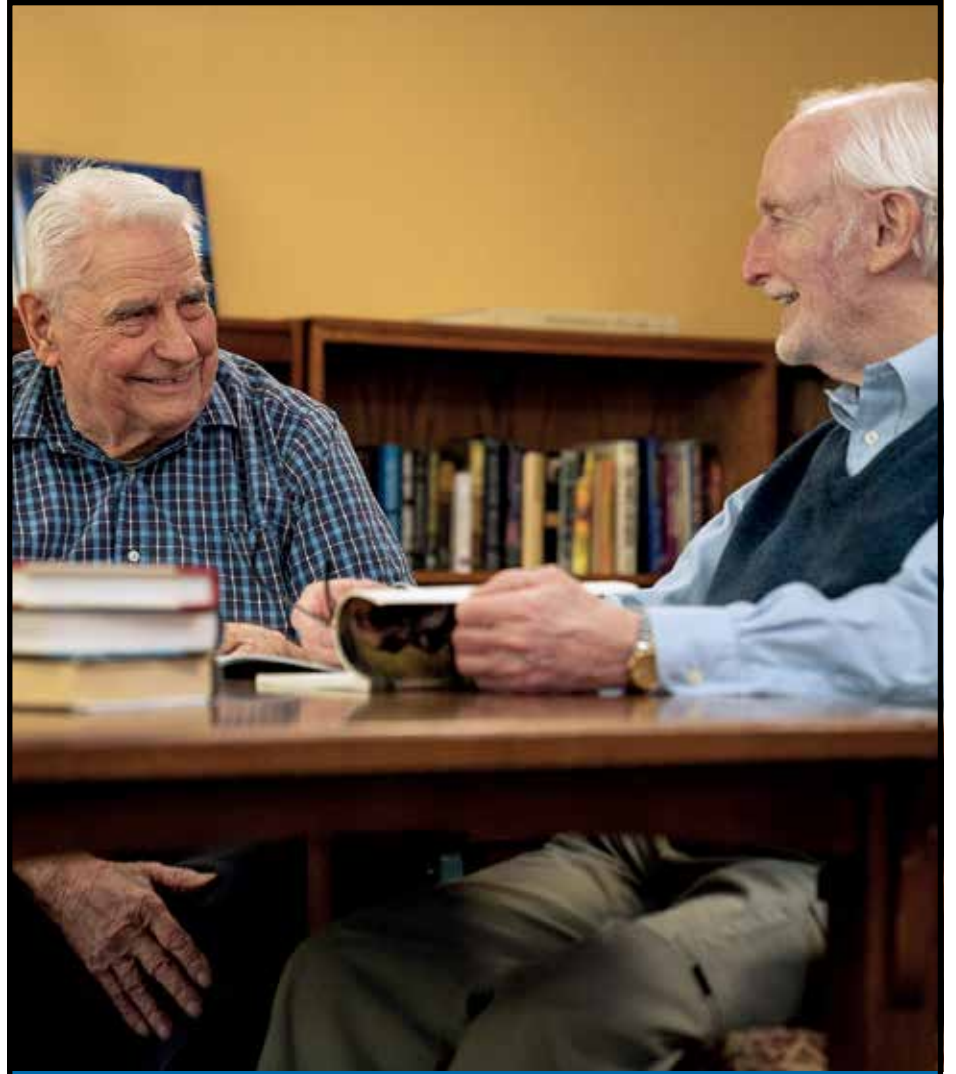

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - September 11, 2001 - A day that could be remembered solely for the tragedy and the disbelief we experienced together as a nation, yet so individually through our television screens, over and over again as the images replayed. Yet, there were also the helpers, those who brought unity, love and even song on the Capital steps in the wake of the billowing dust, ash and loss. There were the helpers.
