

Dr. Hernando Garzon

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Brave, dedicated, willing and reliable - these words describe the 80,000 licensed or certified Emergency Medical Services (EMS) providers in California. They demonstrate these qualities every day by coming to the aid of others when they are most in need and working to ensure that the EMS system operates well. However, each year, due to circumstance or extraordinary effort, certain individuals among us shine.

Sacramento County EMS Director, Dr. Hernando Garzon was named as the 2020 EMS Medical Director of the Year for his heroic acts and extraordinary contributions to EMS by the California Emergency Medical Services Authority (EMSA) earlier this month.

The EMSA seeks to recognize those individuals through the California Emergency Medical Services Awards Program. The awards program honors special accomplishments, meritorious and heroic acts, innovations or fresh ideas to improve EMS in the state, or other unique and/ or significant contributions by EMS personnel, physicians, nurses, EMTs, other medical providers, local officials, members of the law enforcement community, citizens, and first responders.

Dr. Garzon was selected for his tireless efforts and selfless leadership during the COVID-19 response. Through a long career in disaster response, Dr. Garzon learned how to approach and efficiently mitigate a large-scale incident.

During the pandemic, Dr. Garzon assisted the state by building models and predictive theories, enabling local and statewide leaders to be better prepared to respond to the approaching "storm" of patients. He continued leading one of the largest EMS systems in the state, guiding the development of an "Emerging Infectious Disease" policy that provided direction and clarity to the greater EMS community about a sensible approach to preventing transmission of the COVID-19 virus, mitigating the spread of the disease among the workforce, and safe return to work guidelines.

"I most enjoy working on EMS system-wide and quality improvement issues, because I see that as the key to ensuring the highest quality prehospital care for all people in Sacramento County," said Dr. Garzon. "I also still enjoy Emergency

When asked what a typical work day might look like for him, Dr. Garzon said "between clinical work, EMS work, and COVID-19 work with EMSA/CDPH in the last year, I don't really have a "typical' work day. Of late, they have generally started with multiple conference calls, and a mix of Sacramento and State EMS work, as well as CDPH work for COVID-19. Several times a month I also get to throw in late afternoon Emergency Department shifts to round it out."

Water Saving Can Be Beautiful When You Garden Like Nature Intended

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Spring is the time to fall in love – with California native plants. From golden poppies to vibrant redbuds, they bloom in a rainbow of brilliant hues, brightening nearby hillsides as well as suburban landscapes. And these easy-care plants put on this eye-catching show even during dry years.

"Everything looks fantastic!" says landscape designer Soleil Tranquilli, owner of Tranquilli Gardens and a water-wise specialist. "This is the best time of year to see native gardens in Sacramento."

Refreshed by winter rains, plants native to our Sacramento Valley and Sierra foothills look their best in early spring. That's how nature intended; the better to attract bees. Their flowers provide needed nectar and pollen to dozens of native bee species.

Once established, these cast-iron perennials and shrubs can tolerate the driest conditions. Even in years with normal rainfall, they save water compared to traditional lawn-based landscaping because they naturally need less moisture year-round to look their best. That adaptability is a huge asset.

"Native plants and low water-use plants will be more climate change resilient in the future as well," Tranquilli says. "When you plant natives, you use way less water," Tranquilli adds. "You also spend way less time managing your garden. They are less expensive, too; there's no need for chemical fertilizers and pesticides. It makes it better for us when we make it better for nature."

Need another reason? Rebates from your water provider may be available for lawn removal and landscape makeovers. Learn more at https://bewatersmart.info/ rebates-services/.

Here are Soleil Tranquilli's top five best native shrubs or perennials to grow in Sacramento region - **Bush anemone** (Carpenteria Californica): Evergreen shrub with showy white flowers. Golden currant (Ribes aureum): Can take Sacramento's summer heat with practically no summer water. **Hummingbird sage** (Salvia Spathacea): Produces lots of fragrant pink and lilac flowers in dry shade. **Coffeeberry** (Frangula Californica): Makes a great hedge or divider that bees can't resist. Cleveland Sage (Salvia Clevelandii): Gray-green aromatic foliage contrasts with whorls of blue flowers.

Get Ready for the Unexpected with a Disaster Go Bag

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (**MPG**) - Don't think you need an emergency kit? Think again, say families who needed one.

Flashlights, bottles of water, a first aid kit, and ready-to-eat meal packs line the Royal family's dining room table. The family isn't going camping—they're preparing for disaster by putting together a "go bag."

Preparing in advance with a disaster-ready kit has helped families nationwide through extreme and abnormal weather events, which experts warn are on the rise.

Having lived in California all their lives, Sacramento residents Warren and Laurie Royal know the possibility of disaster. The Royals have even seen the Sacramento Valley impacted by disasters outside of fire season. "We have had our share of surprises. In the past, floods have devastated parts of the Sacramento Valley," said Warren. "Preparing a go bag can be somewhat daunting. Our family has found the resources regarding disaster preparedness on the website jw.org especially helpful. Practical, common sense suggestions are available to make preparation and execution of a disaster plan much easier."

"Having a personal preparedness plan increases your chances of staying safe," according to a training program from the Columbia University's National Center for Disaster Preparedness.

Jolted awake by a neighbor's urgent knocking, Aaron and Jacqueline Pate were horrified to see the encroaching flames of the fast-moving Woolsey fire that had been miles away when they went to bed. It burned to within 100 feet of their Westlake Village home in 2018 as part of California's deadliest wildfire season on record.

"Because we had go bags, we weren't running around trying to pack things at the last minute," said Jacqueline. "We had the time we needed to comfort our kids and get everyone safely into the car." disaster-preparedness help they received as Jehovah's Witnesses, both through periodic reminders at their congregation meetings and from tips for putting together go bags on the organization's website, www.jw.org.

"Life is precious, so we encourage all to heed the Bible's advice to take practical steps to protect ourselves from danger," said Robert Hendriks III, spokesman for Jehovah's Witnesses in the United States.

Go bags also have proven useful in the opposite circumstances as "stay bags."

Safe Swimming Pool Tips for Families

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Summertime is swimming time. As families enjoy gatherings and newly-opened swimming pools, Sacramento County Public Health reminds parents and caregivers to practice water safety tips in and around pools. Even inflatable pools can be dangerous for children.

In Sacramento County, 70 percent of drowning deaths occurred in children under the age of five, according to the Safe drains in pools and spas; Kids Program of Greater Ensure all pools and spas -Sacramento. Drowning is the leading injury-related cause of death for children ages 1-4, and many

of those deaths occurred in backyard pools or spas. Here are a few tips to


keep children safe while swimming in pools:

Watch your children at all times or designate an official Water Watcher who can swim to monitor children in or around the pool. This should be an adult who is 18 years old or older. Their ONLY job is to supervise children in the water - they should not be reading, texting or playing games on their phone; Teach children to stay away from both in a backyard and any public pool you may visit - have drain covers; Keep a phone nearby for use in

an emergency; Enroll your children in swimming and water safety lessons; Learn infant and adult CPR; If a child is missing, check the pool/spa first; Own a pool? Install proper childproof barriers, covers and alarms on and around your pool and spa; Cover pools and spas when not in use; **Remove ladders** for above ground pools when not in use.

How to End California's **Homelessness Crisis**

Homelessness is a growing problem in virtually every state. Nowhere is it more pressing than in California, which in the past three years spent more than \$13 billion, roughly \$30,000 annually for each homeless person, to address it. Tragically, its "housing first" approach is a colossal failure. Overall, says the state auditor's office, California's homelessness programs are disjointed and poorly managed. Despite little progress, policymakers keep throwing more money at the problem. Rather than adopting California's current government-centric approach, other states should learn from its mistakes by embracing reforms that directly tackle the core issues. Many homeless suffer from mental illness and substance abuse struggles that require creating a pathway to recovery. Unfortunately, the legal precedent of Martin v. City of Boise is creating a "right to live on the streets," Policy changes such as California's voter-approved Proposition 47 have effectively discouraged the enforcement of shoplifting items up to \$950, creating a means for the addicted or mentally ill homeless to support their habits. Instead of enabling homelessness, states should ensure appropriate punishment for those who violate the law. However, interactions with law enforcement should be viewed as opportunities to connect homeless individuals with the help and resources they need. One innovative approach is homeless courts that "sentence" offenders to treatment, then expunging their records once successfully completed, as proposed in the California's Compassionate Intervention Act. At the same time, the developing "right to sleep on the street" needs to be challenged through legal channels.





To complement these efforts, states should partner with private nonprofits

that have successfully helped many transition off the streets. Even President Barack Obama has acknowledged that "the private and philanthropic sectors are responsible for some of the best thinking, innovation, and evidence-based approaches to ending homelessness."

Shelters to Shutters represents exactly what he was talking about. The Vienna, Virginia, nonprofit emphasizes job placement and housing based on the mantra that "the solution truly needs to be about both." Another strategy initiates contact with the homeless by providing necessities, including bag storage, transportation, Internet access, and a sitting room. While offering these services, the Crossroads Welcome Center in Tennessee determines each client's needs and tries to direct them to institutions for further care.

Given the severity of today's crisis, the homeless need to be relocated with an urgency. San Diego's use of large tents that serve as transitional housing for about 700 a night and cost roughly \$11.3 million shows how this can be done.

California's infamous unaffordability problems are also a causal driver of homelessness. Policymakers nationwide should implement regulatory reforms that lessen excessive living costs to alleviate the economic pressures driving too many people into the streets.

The Environmental Quality Act, the biggest barrier to homebuilding, increases costs, and

causes extended construction delays. It, as well as similar laws elsewhere, is overdue for reform.

States should pursue zoning regulatory reform to simplify multi-layered restrictions, speed up the building-permit process, and ease restrictions on building duplexes, triplexes, and granny flats in order to expand the stock of affordable housing. Eliminating rent control would also meaningfully expand the supply of housing and reduce costs, particularly in cities where housing is the most expensive.

Sustainably addressing the homelessness crisis in California and every state is a moral imperative and an economic necessity. Current conditions are the unintended consequence of policies implemented by state and local governments. Though the situation is dire in California, the good news is states can make a meaningful difference if they reject the Golden State's illadvised policies. Adopting the right policies should be at the top of every state's legislative to-do list.

2. Come to believe that a power greater than our ego could restore us to sanity.

After struggling to find joy and happiness, many begin to realize a power beyond their own may be the only solution to finding joy and happiness.

3. Made a decision to turn our will and lives over to the care of God.

Almost in despair, we turn to this source outside of ourselves to find a solution to fear and dissatisfaction.

4. Make a fearless examination of what is preventing us from surrendering our life to the care of god as you understand God.

What is causing the unhappiness and what can I change to find joy?

5. Admit to God, to ourselves, and to another person, the nature of our fears, resentments, worries, anxieties and grievances.

Admit to God and to another human the

exact nature of what we are doing to ourselves to cause failure.

6. Ask god to remove the barriers to a full and rich life.

Once we recognize the exact nature of our fears, we ask God to simply remove them.

7. Acknowledge both the light and dark elements of our nature.

Accept our internal weakness, our shadow, our human frailties as well as the goodness of life we have.

8. Take responsibility for our choices.

SASD Addresses Increase in Cockroaches

Sacramento Area Sewer District

SACRAMENTO REGION. CA (MPG) - The Sacramento region has seen an increase of cockroaches this season and because these pests like dark, damp places, Sacramento Area Sewer District (SASD) is taking measures to address cockroaches in the sewer system.

The Sacramento Area Sewer District (SASD owns and operates 4,600 miles of sewer pipelines, including 67,000 sewer manholes. Many dark and damp environments, including landscaping, storm drains, crawl spaces, and sewer systems. can attract cockroaches. Over the years, SASD has used several cockroach control methods to address customer concerns and discourage cockroaches from inhabiting the sewer system.

What is SASD doing to control cockroaches?

When a customer calls (916-875-6730) with a concern about cockroaches in the sewer system, SASD investigates within 2 hours. If the investigation confirms cockroach activity, SASD uses a number of proactive and reactive measures including:

Fogging and Baiting: SASD works with qualified pest control specialists to perform a pest control treatment where an insecticide fog is released that instantly kills roaches in the manhole, and bait is left behind to kill other roaches. After the treatment, we monitor for the effectiveness and re-treat when necessary; Manhole Painting Pilot Project: Recently, SASD implemented a new proactive pest control method called "manhole painting" that has the potential to be a more effective long-term cockroach control solution; Preventative Maintenance Program: In locations where SASD's sewer pipes have a repeat history of cockroach activity, SASD performs ongoing inspections and cleanings to further address the issue.

What is "manhole painting"?

Manhole painting is a pest control treatment process where latex paint that contains an insecticide is applied to the inside walls of a manhole. The goal is to provide a longer-lasting insecticide to

eliminate cockroaches over time. As part of a pilot project, 1,100 manholes were painted throughout SASD's service area, with the goal of fewer roaches in the sewer system and fewer customer concerns. Once manholes are painted, SASD will conduct ongoing inspections to determine how effective this new method is. The pilot continued through December 2020 and SASD will implement this approach on a broader scale across SASD's service area.

Are these cockroach control methods safe?

Yes. SASD's mission is to protect public health and the environment. As part of that commitment, SASD has worked with the Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District and others to ensure all eradication methods meet local, state, and federal requirements for the protection of public health.

What if I see cockroaches after SASD has already come out?

If fogging and baiting was performed: Please allow 7-10 days from the date this was completed before calling to report cockroaches. While this method is highly effective, it may take several days to work completely; If the manhole was painted: Please allow three weeks from the date SASD came out to perform the inspection. As the goal is to provide a longer-lasting insecticide that kills cockroaches as they continue to enter the area, allow time for the treatment to affect as many cockroaches as possible. At the threeweek mark, SASD will come back out to re-inspect the manhole and determine the appropriate next steps; SASD does not address cockroach issues on private property. If you see cockroaches on your property or in your home, please consider performing pest control treatment or contacting a pest management company, just as you might do for any other propertyinvading pest like ants, wasps, termites, or ticks.

"It is important for individuals to continue taking their medications as prescribed," says Quist. "Those with questions or concerns regarding medications and heat should contact their prescribing clinician."

Don't get caught unprepared as temperatures keep reaching into the triple digits. Have a plan to stav cool, stav hydrated and be aware of the signs and symptoms of heat-related illness. ★

The Impending Crisis: The Censored Truth California has a Segregation Problem

Deeply blue California's top political figures, from the governor downward, portray the state as a model of multicultural integration.

In fact, however, as a new study from UC-Berkeley's Othering & Belonging Institute reveals, most California metropolitan areas have high levels of racial segregation in housing and it has become more pronounced over the last two decades. Oddly, too, California's segregation tends to be highest in areas most likely to lean to the left politically.

The Los Angeles-Long Beach-Santa Ana metropolitan area, the study found, is the nation's sixth most segregated region of 200,000 residents or more. Other California areas with high levels of segregation include San Francisco-Oakland (25th), San Diego (38th), San Jose (45th) and Sacramento (82nd).

Of the 11 California regions on the report's "high segregation" list, only two, Bakersfield (37th) and Fresno (72nd), hew to the right politically. The San Luis Obispo-Paso Robles area, which also is somewhat conservative politically, is one of only two regions in the nation deemed to be highly integrated, the other being Colorado Springs, which is a Republican bastion.

Okay, so California is not the exemplar of integration it often pretends to be. But isn't the state trying to make its housing patterns more inclusive?

Officially, yes. State housing guidelines and recent legislation seek more integration of multi-family housing into what have been exclusively single-family neighborhoods as determined by local zoning laws. A mixture of housing types, it's argued, would create more neighborhood diversity.

Those efforts, however, have faced stiff opposition in suburban communities where single-family homes predominate, with the fiercest resistance in suburbs dominated by Democratic voters, such as Marin County.

The outcome o f California's housing war remains in doubt. However, as California pursues - at least on paper - more integration in housing, it seems to be encouraging more segregation in political representation through a concept called "community of interest" or COL

When California's Citizens Redistricting Commission, created by a statewide ballot measure, first tackled the redrawing of legislative and congressional districts in 2011, it assumed that one of its jobs was to identify COIs and make them a dominant factor in redistricting.

The commission is just again, using still-to-bereleased data from the 2020 more emphasis on COIs, although how to define them remains uncertain.

The current commission is staging "COI input meetings" around the state and seeking participation but admits in its latest invitation that "there are no clear rules on how to define a community of interest."

It's assumed that under federal law, redistricting plans must not inhibit the ability of ethnic and racial groups to elect representatives. To insulate the new maps from legal challenge, the commission will use data on concentrations of potential voters (over the age of 18 and citizens) to create "majorityminority" districts that, in effect, preordain the election of legislators and congressional members from the designated communities.

Although California's overall population has seen only scant growth over the last decade, whites have continued to decline proportionately while Latino and Asian populations have increased. Thus, as the state's leading redistricting expert, Paul Mitchell, has written, "it's more likely than ever that the data will tell (the commission) there are more majority-minority districts that need to be drawn than ever in light of heightened segregation within our cities and counties."

So on one hand, California officialdom says it wants to lessen segregation in housing, but on the other hand it wants to reinforce racial and ethnic segregation in legislative and congressional districts. That's California in a nutshell.

Supreme Court, NCAA Decisions Embolden Advocates for College Athlete Compensation

Advocates for college athlete compensation in California are on a hot streak. First the state passed a first-in-the-nation law allowing players to sign paid endorsement deals, and 20 states followed its example. Now, with both a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision and a National Collegiate Athletic Association rule change challenging the idea that students shouldn't make money from athletics, legislators are pushing to move up the effective date of the California law to this fall and expand it to cover community laws adopted across the councollege athletes.

been weakening over time, not tion that will provide clarity on a only with just player movements, advocate movements, but also because of litigation that's currently playing out," said Eddie Comeaux, a professor of higher education at UC Riverside who studies college athletics.

The NCAA has previously barred athletes from earning money for their performance, aside from scholarships. But the Supreme Court's 9–0 ruling June 21 allows colleges to also cover as

much as \$6,000 per year in education-related expenses for athletes, such as laptops and study abroad programs. While it didn't directly strike down the NCAA's amateurism model, a concurring opinion from Justice Brett Kavanaugh signaled a willingness to do so, spurring hope among advocates that more avenues for player compensation could be on the horizon.

Then Wednesday, the NCAA announced that it won't penalize athletes for taking advantage of state laws like California's that allow them to profit from the use of their name, image and likeness.

"With the variety of state try, we will continue to work "The amateurism ideals have with Congress to develop a solunational level," NCAA President Mark Emmert said in a press release.

> "The Supreme Court's ruling basically told the NCAA you've got to follow the law, you're not immune to antitrust, you cannot be a monopoly," said state Sen. Nancy Skinner, the author of the Fair Pay to Play Act, which passed the California Legislature in 2019. She's now pushing a bill that amends the law to take

effect Sept. 1, rather than in 2023. It passed the Assembly's higher education committee this week, and would need to receive a twothirds vote by the Assembly and be signed by the governor to become law.

State laws giving college athletes the ability to pursue money-making opportunities also went into effect Thursday in Georgia, Florida, Alabama, New Mexico and Mississippi.

Athletes on the Sprter app can sign endorsement deals, sell social media shoutouts and book in-person experiences such as a training session with fans. It's just one of a number of ventures already sprouting up as the new NCAA rules take effect this week. Hanna and Haley Cavinder, twin sisters who play for Fresno State's basketball team, told ESPN they had already signed their first endorsement deal with Boost Mobile on Wednesday.

Unlike the original Fair Play to Pay Act, Skinner's new bill would afford California's community college athletes the same freedom to profit from their name, image and likeness as their peers at four-year universities. The bill has the support of the California Community College Chancellor's introduced when Kamlager was office.

'Students should not have to sit by and watch others profit off of their hard work and labor without being equitably compensated for it, just because they participate in college athletics – and that includes our many community college student-athletes as well," spokesperson Rafael Chávez said in a statement to CalMatters.

California's two public university systems, the University of California and California State University, said they were monitoring the bill. "UC continues to work with Senator Skinner, and members of the state Legislature, to ensure that the University is prepared for an accelerated implementation date of Sept. 1," spokesperson Ryan King said in a statement.

Some advocates for college players want to go even further. A bill this year by state Sen. Sydney Kamlager would have required colleges to pay their athletes a royalty for use of their name, image and likeness if the revenue a sports program generates is more than double the amount it awards in athletic scholarships. The bill,

an Assemblymember, would also have beefed up enforcement of Title IX, the federal law barring sex discrimination in sports and other educational programs, and placed a cap on salaries for college coaches.

It stalled in the Assembly. But the recent decisions by the Supreme Court and NCAA could pave the way for California to take more aggressive action on athlete compensation going forward, said Ramogi Huma, the executive director of the National College Players Association, which advocates for the rights of college athletes.

"A 9-0 decision saying that this is an exploitative industry and college athletes deserve more compensation should be a green light for the state of California to once again reshape college sports in a way that's more equitable for players," Huma said.



An American Aviation Hero

Museum Hosts African Americans in Aviation



MCCLELLAN, CA (MPG) - An exhibition detailing contributions to aviation by African Americans touched down last week at the Aerospace Museum of California. Contained in a restored 1937 Pierce Arrow trailer, the program was viewed by more than 600 people in four days.

Trailer and curator Chauncey E. Spencer II began the educational pilgrimage in Palm Desert last year. "African Americans in Aviation" has since presented in 25 cities in 18 states. Repurposed as a minitheater, Spencer's vintage trailer screens a documentary on his Greatest Generation father's achievements for flight and humanity. Against all odds in the 1930s, the pilot/civil rights activist found wings. He then opened the door for other African Americans to fly. Preserving this part of Americana is a labor of love – and family pride – for the pioneer's son.

The elder Chauncey E. Spencer was raised by a poet mom and a business entrepreneur dad in Lynchburg, Virginia. Like millions of his generation, he was galvarelations officer for the Army Air Corps and continued the job as a civilian after the war. His work earned a 1948 Exceptional Civilian Service Award – the highest civilian honor given by the Army – for his fight against segregation in the military. He later became a Sheriff's Deputy and was appointed Commissioner for San Bernadino Police Department. Soon after his death in 2002, Spencer's Lynchburg home was made a National Monument.

Spencer and White's serendipitous encounter with Harry Truman was critical to the formation of the famous Tuskegee Airmen, whose heroism remains part of military legend. Deployed in Italy and North Africa, the airmen earned Silver Stars, Distinguished Flying Crosses and Bronze Stars. Purple Hearts were numerous and 66 Tuskegees gave their lives. They are today honored by Tuskegee Airmen Inc Chapters all over America. Placer Chapter spokesperson, Lanelle Roberts Brent (daughter of Tuskegee legend George "Spanky" Roberts), was among members welcoming Chauncey Spencer and his Pierce Arrow to McClellan. "His father's story is historic,"

nized by the feats of aviation pioneers. When he sought flying lessons, an instructor told him: "We don't teach coloreds to fly, as they don't have the intelligence."

"Of course, that hurt my father," says the younger Spencer. "But it didn't break him." The Lynchburg family moved heaven and earth to pay for flying lessons. As US entered WWII, massive pilot-training programs were initiated – but only for white applicants. Spencer and fellow pilot Dale White began a campaign for change. They found sponsors for a 10-city flight, geared to encourage Black Universities to teach aviation. The only aircraft the pilots could rent was a battered Lincoln Page biplane. When the WWI relic failed in flight over Ohio, sheer pilot skill achieved a miraculous and safe landing. The journey eventually ended in Washington DC, where a chance meeting with Senator Harry Truman did not just change White and Spencer's lives. The encounter reshaped a nation's military future.

Truman was impressed by the two pilots and their wizardry with their outdated flying banger. He lobbied President Franklin D. Roosevelt (via his powerful wife Eleanor) to end Negro ineligibility for civil pilot training. As a result, Congress passed a program that included funding for aviation studies in Black colleges. Nearly 1000 Black airmen and thousands of support staff soon formed in segregated squadrons. Aged 30, Spencer Sr was deemed too old to deploy. He served as a race

says Roberts. "Without his meeting and impressing Harry Truman, we might not have achieved the integrated military that we have today."

Notes Spencer: "I'm sharing a part of our history that often gets overlooked. It's important to remember the heroes who were willing to take the first brave steps on a journey that continues today." The Palm Desert resident's own journey continues from city to city; state to state. Supported by the non-profit National Colleges Resources Foundation, his next excursion comes later this month, at the invitation of the famous air show in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Spencer tows his 19ft monument to his father's courage embellished with iconic Tuskegee Airmen images - behind a Chevy Colorado truck. On the road, truck and trailer are constantly saluted. "People honked and waved and gave me thumbs-up all way home from Sacramento," reports the chauffeur. "I guess they're proud the museum is giving recognition and inclusion to all Americans."

Chauncey Spencer makes himself available as a speaker, educating in history and equality. "When we stop calling each other Black or White and start calling ourselves Americans," he attests, "our country will be headed in the direction it needs to go."

Warning to Remote Workers: Out of Sight Could Mean Out of Job

Although debate continues about whether the business world will return to normal even after most people have the COVID-19 vaccine, the expectation is that many companies will soon call employees back to the office.

Some workers may still get to work part-time from home, and some businesses will make remote work permanent. But tension between owners and workers is building as it becomes evident many employees are resistant to giving up working from home. In a survey, 65% said they want to work remotely full-time after the pandemic. And in a poll conducted by LiveCareer, 29% of working professionals said they would quit if they couldn't continue working remotely.

But those who push back against ownership's preference to return to the office might paint themselves into a corner, especially if they aren't in a position to quit, says Rod Robertson, Managing Partner of Briggs Capital (www. briggscapital.com), international entrepreneur, and author of Winning at Entrepreneurship: Insider's Tips on Buying, Building, and Selling Your Own Business.

"The expected stimulus money will dissipate by the third quarter and as companies continue to struggle, the cuts will begin," Robertson says. "Once we reach herd immunity, companies will be deciding whether it makes sense to keep expensive office space.

Robertson says employees who continue to work mostly from home should do these things to keep their performance and communication levels high:

would be wise to take the extra a distance all the time is going to lower your skill level, your engagement, and your productivity. Employees need to make the time to have facetime in the office and stay in the groove with ownership and management. You can't do that as well at home relying on technology."

> Show the human touch. "When we achieve herd immunity, faceto-face meetings with co-workers, managers and clients should be 20 to 25% of someone's portfolio of time," Robertson says. "Zoom meetings are a pain because you

have to set them up. Remote employees should prioritize live voice communication with colleagues, managers, and clients in order to stay in the game. Picking up the phone to talk with someone keeps the relationship alive and brings more clarity than constantly texting or emailing."

Push your boss to measure you quantitatively. "Woe to the remote employees who believe they are not under increasing scrutiny – downsizing is on the way," Robertson says. "The good employees working at home will

have more reporting mechanisms in place. Show your boss your genuine enthusiasm by being proactive and coming up with more measurables for your performance."

Do extracurricular work. "The question is, how can you be front-and-center with the boss?" Robertson says. "One way is to do extracurricular work by bringing relevant and helpful articles to ownership. Develop a thesis for those articles to show that you're a thought leader. Executives and managers are flooded with emails, so the smart employees send a synthesis of an article that's to the point.

"Businesses can't afford slippage," Robertson says. "Once there is herd immunity, the remote work issue shouldn't be just about where employees feel they are most comfortable, but how they can be the most valuable and effective."


