**RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)** - Rancho Cordova's Kids Day celebration looked a little bit different this year, but if the long trail of vehicles carrying giggling children was any indication, there is more than one way to have fun.

Due to continuing Coronavirus restrictions, the 31st Annual Kids Day in the Park was transformed to the Kids Day Drive-Through Safari. And though confined to their vehicles, Kids Day visitors still could see animals like a zebra and water buffalo up close, and for many, there was an opportunity to pet a real

camel or even a snake.

Seven towering inflatable animals – including a 20-foot-tall elephant, 25-foot-tall parrot, 15-foot lion and more – provided children an opportunity to learn about wildlife while traveling “My City Safari,” sponsored by the City of Rancho Cordova. Following along with a safari passport, kids learned fun animal facts as well as information about their city.

“It is amazing what can happen when you have 65 exhibitors all trying to make a child smile,” said Shelly Blanchard, executive director of the Cordova Community Council, which organized the event. “It wasn’t our usual Kids Day, but it was

fun nonetheless.”

The event is an opportunity for the Sacramento County Department of Health Services to observe National Children’s Mental Health Awareness Week, and a chance for institutions like the Folsom Cordova Unified School District, George Washington Carver High School and Cordova Recreation and Park District to showcase their many services for kids.

Other exhibitors included faith organization, Rancho Cordova youth sports leagues, private schools, recreation programs and even the Mills Station Arts and Culture Center – all spotlighting offerings and resources for children ages zero to 12 and their families. ★

## City Considers Proposed Dutch Bros Location too Car-centric

**RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)** - It’s no secret that people love Dutch Bros Coffee. At any given moment, lines for the popular drive-thru coffee chain extend several cars deep. The Rancho Cordova City Council loves Dutch Bros too. They just don’t want it at the location the business is proposing due to concerns for pedestrians and cyclists.

Dutch Bros’ possible entrance into the city was the most contentious topic at the Monday, April 19 Council Meeting where members were presented with information from city staff as well as representatives from the Dutch Bros development team who would like to build a drive-thru at the corner of Zinfandel Drive and Folsom Boulevard in what is currently a part of the Grocery Outlet parking lot. The location is near the Light Rail Station.

Nicholas Sosa from the Planning Department (who was also accompanied by Public Works’ Albert Stricker) presented a number of plans and mockups showing a hybrid Dutch Bros attempting to cater to both drive-thru customers as well as pedestrians and cyclists. In their eyes, the latter would be able to relax and sip their beverages with friends and loved ones in a cozy, landscaped patio area. Conscious a drive-thru would increase traffic for an already heavily traveled and chaotic area, it was noted Dutch Bros would pay in some capacity for any modifications to improve traffic flow.

If the following discussion could be summarized as a type of coffee, it would be black... very black.

Referring to past comments councilmembers had given the Dutch Bros development team, Vice Mayor Donald Terry said in his 13 years as a public servant he was amazed how they had so blatantly not heeded their earlier guidance and said he “couldn’t sleep with himself” supporting the endeavor. In what would be echoed by the other councilmembers, he called the location too “car-centric” with the needs and safety of pedestrians “tagged on”. The only way he felt he could approve a Dutch Bros - a business he admires - in the proposed location was if the drive-thru was taken out.

Accessibility, lack of access to other businesses, the fact Dutch

**RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)** - This Rancho Cordova Art at City Hall show includes all works, any subject and any medium, that must be in black and white plus one color. The following are award winners.

Best of show winner **Dr. Edith LeFebvre’s** acrylic painting, *Come Here*, has red as the color choice. “It was an emotive kind of thing,” LeFebvre said, “‘Come here, come here!’ Like something wasn’t right and he was going to take care of everything.” LeFebvre has been painting almost every day since 2005. A tenured professor at California State University, Sacramento, she has a Ph.D. with emphasis in conflict management, persuasion, and intercultural issues. She has always been interested in art. “It gives you such joy, when you’re in your studio and you do something,” LeFebvre said. “Then I get up the next morning and

go into the studio, open the door and go – ‘Whoa! That was really good!’”

**Cheryl Gleason**, curator of the MACC, won first place with her oil and cold wax abstract, *Discovery 1*. In her winning piece, she used yellow ochre as the color accent. “During 2020 I had a lot of time to think about the direction that I

wanted to go,” Gleason said. A class in abstract art taught by a woman from Montana, who did not use brushes, helped. “I always wanted to paint looser, but just couldn’t do it,” Gleason said. “It’s easier to be abstract when you don’t have a paintbrush . . . (The class) was so freeing and I feel that now I’m on a path

to where I want to go.”

**Ahana Nayak**, 14, a freshman at Folsom High School, won first place for youth with her photograph, *Time to Smell the Roses*, using red as the color. Nayak may continue studying photography but is still undecided on her plans for the future. Her favorite school subjects are English and math. She may get back into volleyball, basketball, and soccer now that schools are restarting sports.

**Eugene Davis Stevenson III** won second place prize with *I’ve Had Enough*, using photography and acrylic paint, with a pyrrole red emphasis. He calls his current project, *Capturing Coronavirus*. “What this image is trying to portray is that the person here is trusted more with the health of people than they trust themselves,” Stevenson said. “This is the kind of effect, and this is the kind of toll that it takes on them.” His project will depict medical professionals, healthcare

## Wild Life Care Association Sends Animals on their Way

**SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)** - The composition roof is on the new aviary, all the wood framing and most of the bird safe wiring. The insides will be finished by the volunteers. Meaning, all natural wood perches, getting the feeders and water bowls mounted inside. Final touch, painting. It was voted on a darker green color, to blend with their wild life theme.

The second trip to Aviary building site was to get more info on how the building is coming along. I went inside the Care center for pictures of the different kind of animals currently being cared for. First, I heard pith, pith, pith of the air hammer and the generator running hard. Then I saw Jim Brown taking off some support boards, now that the Aviary could stand on its own. I wanted to know more about how he got the supplies. Jim told me a Facebook group supporting all updates on what is happening with The Wild Life Care Association, had raised the donations. Over \$8000 dollars was raised for this project. This would go for the wood, nails, bird wire and whatever odds and ends that would be needed. So they started building. I mentioned last week, the crew building the aviary, are volunteers from Wells Construction Company. They worked SMOOOTTHH around each other, comfortable! They bought the wood from 'Homewood' in Rocklin, a huge help with supplies.

Over my shoulder, I told him it was looking very good, and walked into the nursery.

There I was met by Terri Muzik who would be my escort. Before we could see the animals, she mentioned to me, all volunteers who worked around Skunks, Raccoons, Foxes and Bats, must, have a current rabies shot.

Also, stay quiet, "inside voices", to keep the animals calm. She then took me inside where I met, Zoe Stephens, the nursery supervisor, getting ready to hand feed a baby mourning dove. "Formula to feed animals, comes in a powdered form, mixed with warm water and then fed by syringe. Sometimes though, babies are so new born, the formula has to be fed through a tube that is placed down to their stomach. We get them fed one way or the other!!!" she said.

With the new animal drop offs and then when they are ready to move on you never know what you will see when you come to work. A fun thing. There's many sized



containers for the different sized animals. From newborns to injured animals. From birds to, a current run on opossums. I saw baby opossums that did not even have their eyes open yet, in line to be fed. I also saw a two month old opossum being held before feeding.

There is very, very little interaction between animals being cared for and the caretakers. Their very goal is to get them back in the wild, so as little touching as possible. Heading out of "baby station", Terri started telling me a funny story that goes along with keeping the animals on the wild side. She told of water misters in the outside aviary. They are hooked up and work BUT, not unless it's really, really hot outside.

"Why"? I asked. She said, "because there are no water misters in the wild."

No, of course not.

"We try not to get the birds used to things they won't run across once released. We don't want them so happy and comfortable they decide to stay here".

I was laughing as I visualized wild birds kicked back, the water misters going, a full bowl of feed, and water. Would you want to leave? Also, "Do you know what they call a flock of Crow's"? I shook my head no. "They are called a MURDER of crows!" Guess that's why scary movies use black crows when something

chilling is about to happen. We went to a little office where we could finally talk with adult voices. She reminded me the volunteers run the day to day. Some have been here for years but, ALWAYS, looking for more people who want the excitement of caring for the young, or sick or injured animals. If you're out there and want to work around the animals, call us at: 916-965-9453 or come by 5211 Patrol Rd. Sacramento, CA, and ask how you can help. We've received animal baby formula in cans, someone sent a whole box of the cans, some give towels, crates, water dishes, food dishes, etc. Especially, we need old newspapers for

We shook hands and I told her, "Remember me if some extraordinary animal comes in, and I'll be back." Please be good and kind to each other, until next week. ★

# District Attorney Anne Marie Schubert to Run for Attorney General

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Sacramento County District Attorney Anne Marie Schubert has announced she will be a candidate for Attorney General of California in 2022. Schubert made her announcement Monday morning while flanked by numerous crime victims, including victims of the infamous Golden State Killer.

"I am running for Attorney General because California's criminal justice system is in chaos," said Schubert.

"When policy makers and reckless prosecutors talk tough about protecting all of us, yet turn around and refuse to take action

to protect any of us - that's chaos. When politicians talk tough and tell you they will protect the vulnerable, yet they refuse to make hate crimes, domestic violence, child abuse, human trafficking of a child and rape of an unconscious person a violent crime - that's chaos. When politicians pass law after law or issue directive after directive that erode criminal accountability and public safety - that's chaos. When convicted murderers are celebrating in their jail cells that they're going to get out of prison because of these policies - that's chaos.

"Let me be clear - the newly appointed Attorney General helped create this chaos by voting for and supporting policies and laws that are not only destroying the rights

of crime victims but are destroying public safety in this state."

In his introduction of Schubert, Marc Klaas, father of murder victim Polly Klaas, said: "Today is a great day for California. One of our state's most accomplished prosecutors and a hero to crime victims has decided to run to be California's top public safety official. Anne Marie Schubert's passion for victims and for justice is unsurpassed. Her record and accomplishments are unrivaled."

While Anne Marie Schubert may be best known for the successful investigation, arrest and conviction of the Golden State Killer and for leading the successful effort to expose the state's \$30 billion EDD scandal, she has spent over 30 years as a top prosecutor, protecting kids from sexual predators and human trafficking and making sure violent criminals are held accountable for their crimes. She is an international expert in DNA/Cold Case investigations and prosecutions.

Schubert's experience stands in great contrast to recently appointed Attorney General Rob Bonta, a former State Assemblyman who was appointed to the job in spite of having no experience in public safety or as a prosecutor.

Bros would become the fifth drive-thru in the area were issues Councilmember David Sander had with the proposed plans. He also felt they didn't encourage at all a community patio environment. In fact, Councilmember Sander had trouble exactly pinpointing the patio amongst the drawings.

Councilmember Siri Pulipati noted the buzz Dutch Bros endears amongst people and joked, "the youth of the city will throw me out" if she didn't support it coming to Rancho Cordova but also asked why Dutch Bros wasn't looking at other locations.

Mayor Garrett Gatewood told the Dutch Bros development team he "will fight for you in other locations" but stated it was not the right location for safety reasons.

Public Comment was also negative with one participant referring to "suicide lane".

Councilmember Budge showed only a slightly less negative view of the location from the others when she said the "unused, ugly parking lot" needed something to promote activity.

The Dutch Brothers development team tried to paint a brighter picture of the situation expressing their desire for compromise although the location didn't appear to be one of them or taking out the drive-thru aspect for that matter. A representative from Property Nine Development said to look at the energy put into the plans as "passion" by those involved and not as disappointment - a callback to Vice Mayor Terry's words.

With little light at the end of the tunnel for now, the Dutch Bros plan was given back to staff and the development team to address the many concerns raised and present again at a future date.

The bulk of the rest of the meeting was taken up by reviewing staff recommendations for the Community Enhancement Fund (CEF) - a somewhat laborious process that prompted Vice Mayor Terry to ask for brevity in comments from all present so the Council Meeting could end by 10:00 pm (they missed it by about ten minutes).

Along with Community Enhancement Analyst Stacey Delaney, the council went through a spreadsheet detailing the 82 applications which included monies requested, monies recommended by staff or no recommendation at all. Comments could be made from the public, the applicant and of course, the Council. Furthermore, the Council could pull an application for further discussion on May 3. In preparing their recommendations, staff looked at the return on investment, if the applicant could carry out the project, if they were leveraging other funding sources and partnerships and many other facets.

The funds requested from applicants total \$5.3 million and staff recommend in the realm of \$2.1 million. The Council has until May 17 to make their final approvals.

At the beginning of the night, proclamations were given to Sierra Donor Services for their organ transplant work, the Sacramento Public Library in celebration of librarians and library workers, and to outgoing Community Prosecutor Shauna Franklin who Mayor Gatewood humorously told he was going to keep with the city for "another ten, twenty years" due to her much appreciated work. Her replacement Lauren Miller was also in attendance.

In recognition of Arts, Culture and Creativity Month, Shelly Blanchard of the Cordova Community Council reported the exploits of the city's art community and what lay on the horizon. Similar in his sentiment about Community Prosecutor Franklin, the Mayor told Blanchard forbade her from ever retiring.

Public comments concerning items not on the agenda came from Andranik Poladyan who hoped the city would adopt a resolution to recognize the 1915-1917 Armenian Genocide and Laine Himmelman of Habitat for Humanity who shared a story how the organization had helped with the roof repair for a Rancho Cordova Senior couple with the assistance of the aforementioned CEF.

Opening Council Reports, Councilmember Sander declared it had been a "very busy two weeks" as many things slowed down by COVID-19 were all coming back at once. Federal policy meetings regarding jobs, transportation and rescue funding he took part in focused on cities like Rancho Cordova. Councilmember Pulipati attended a career panel, a women's empowerment meeting and met with the Chamber of Commerce to see how they could continue to grow the relationship between the Chamber and the Council. A "groundbreaking" water reclamation project to provide water for county agriculture purposes was reported by Councilmember Budge after her meeting at the Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCo). She also gave comments regarding her Regional Transit meeting on the annexation of Elk Grove into the regional transit district and a new voting structure.

During his report, Vice Mayor Terry said there was no significant instance of COVID-19 with student or staff for the Folsom Cordova School District hailing the county "as a shining example of how to do this the right way." He also mentioned the Children's Museum would soon have a "soft" re-opening with limited capacity and for members only. Terry also gave a recent presentation to sales agents at a Builders Industry Association (BIA) meeting "selling" Rancho Cordova to the new home industry.

On a sadder note, City Manager Cyrus Abhar thanked Council and everyone who had sent condolences due to the recent passing of his mother. Suggested by Councilmember Budge, the meeting closed in memory of her. ★

# Metro Fire Arrests Suspect in Overnight Arson Fire

**RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)** - The Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District (Metro Fire or the District) Fire Investigations Unit arrested John Paul Walters on April 24, 2021 after an early morning house fire in Gold River. Reported at approximately 5:00 am Metro Fire personnel were able to prevent the fire from spreading to nearby vegetation and residences.

In conjunction with the Rancho Cordova Police Department and Sacramento County Sheriff's Office, a suspect in the fire was identified and located and subsequently arrested. He was booked into the Sacramento County jail on two charges of Arson to an Inhabited Structure (PC 451.b).

The occupants of the home on Discovery Village Ln. in Gold River were alerted to the presence of a fire by working smoke

alarms which allowed them to escape without injury. The home sustained significant damage as a result of the fire and the occupants were displaced as a result.

The following are four tips to help you clean your finances and grow your money. **Deep clean your budget** - The first step to deep clean your budget is to organize and take inventory of your finances - review your income, your debts, and how much you owe.

Discuss with your whole family ways you might be able to reduce expenses such as cancelling certain streaming services or cutting back on special treats. Instead, use that money to pay off any debt, or set a goal to save toward that debt payoff. Keeping track of your budget is the best way to stay on track with your financial goals.

Remember it usually takes about three months of budgeting before you can make it stick.

**Sweep away bad spending habits** - Bad spending habits can lead to debt. For example, impulse buying or certain spending habits (like not working with a monthly budget) could cause you to lose track of your money. While small purchases may not seem significant at the time, they can quickly add up. Review your bank statements and calculate how much money you spend each month on habitual or impulse spending. Try to cut

down on these purchases by 10%, or try to give them up for a certain time period and see how you are impacted.

Not having a budget puts you in the position to "spend as you go." If you don't plan ahead, you could come up short.

**Refill your emergency fund** - An emergency fund is very important, especially in the tumultuous times we've been in for the last year. Even if you set aside a small amount, every little bit helps. Take baby steps. It's important to get your family involved as well, especially as it can help teach children to save starting at an early age.

Ideally, an emergency, or rainy day fund, would cover 3-6 months of essential living expenses. Identify what those essential living expenses are for you and your family and set a plan to dictate how much you need to save each month or each week to reach that goal.

Experts recommend setting aside 10% of your paycheck if possible. If that is not possible, then do whatever you and your family can do comfortably, even if it is a small amount.

**Detox your debt** - None of us like to have debt hanging over our heads. One of the best ways to handle debt is to evaluate if you need debt consolidation. Ask yourself - *Are you getting overwhelmed with debt you already have? Are you missing payments? Are you having trouble making payments on time? Are you confusing the due dates?* Debt consolidation brings all of those different interest rates and due dates into one lump sum loan with a fixed rate, fixed loan amount, and one due date.

By being intentional and really paying attention to your finances, these tips can help put you on the right track to watch your money grow instead of watching your money go. ★

# How Do You Know You're Ready for Retirement?

An intriguing find once emerged from a RAND Corp. survey on Americans and their working conditions. It turned out that 40 percent of employees 65 and older had previously retired, but something lured them back to the working world.

In some cases, financial troubles might have been the cause. But often the reason is that people neglect an important component in their retirement planning. They don't think about what they will do with their extra time, or how they will give their life the meaning and purpose work provided, says Patti Hart, co-author with her husband, Milledge, of *The Resolutionist: Welcome to the Anti-Retirement Movement* (www.antiretirement.com).

"Money is certainly important, but it's not the only thing that determines whether your retirement is a success," she says. "It may be that you are financially ready to retire, but are a long way from being emotionally ready."

The Harts offer tips for figuring out when to retire and for making sure you're successful when you do:

**Know your catalysts.** Identify milestones or signs that will let you know you are ready to embark on a new post-work life, Milledge Hart says. Yes, that could be when you've accumulated a certain amount of savings. But it might also be related to when your spouse quits their job, or when your

children graduate college and head out on their own. Maybe your plan is to work until your health gives out. "Knowing your catalysts can mean the difference between successfully transitioning to a fulfilled life after your career is over, or boomeranging back to the full-time workforce simply because you didn't know why you quit to begin with," he says.

**Plan ahead to avoid separation anxiety from work.** For many people, moving from the excitement and fulfillment of a career to the quietness of retirement is too much, Patti Hart says. They develop a form of "separation anxiety," longing for their old way of life rather than venturing boldly into the new one. "You need to make a plan for what you want to do in your new post-career life so you aren't floundering when you get there," she says.

**Get comfortable with the uncomfortable.** At work, people are thrown into uncomfortable situations and have no choice but to face them head on. In retirement, it's easier to avoid discomfort, but doing so diminishes your confidence, and you miss out on opportunities for personal growth and fun, Milledge Hart says. "It would seem counterintuitive to think that being uncomfortable brings happiness, but it does," he says. "Go at life as if it's an adventure - because it is. When you accomplish something you didn't think you could, you get a jolt of endorphins that drives you to your next challenge."

**Learn to be your own best friend.** Even when

people want to try a new hobby or activity, they sometimes are afraid to do it alone. "In retirement, you might not have the social network you once did," Patti Hart says. "You may long for a good friend you can rely on." But if you think about it, she says, you already have that friend - yourself. So as you prepare for retirement, be ready to go solo on occasion. "When you get to this stage, you will often find that some things on your list are on your list alone," she says. "No one in your universe shares your interest or has the time to join you. That's all right. If you are going to continue to grow, you need to sometimes feel like you did something completely on your own."

"Don't convince yourself that in retirement you are going to be destined to a life of watching evening game shows and baking pies, unless of course that is what you love to do," Milledge Hart says. "My advice is nothing is off limits, so reach for the stars. Look forward rather than backward, and embrace the new you."

# California Reverses, Now Shutting Prisons

As signatures on petitions It was 1981 and then-Gov. Jerry Brown had a problem. California's 12 prisons were bulging at the seams with more than 28,000 inmates, thanks largely to tougher sentencing laws he signed, and he was told to expect another 20,000 more inmates within a few years.

The state hadn't built a new prison in two decades, stretching back to when Brown's father, Pat Brown, was governor. The Department of Corrections, as the prison system was then called, wanted Brown to launch a major prison construction program to handle its rapidly growing inmate load.

The young governor, nearing the end of his second and final term, was reluctant to ask voters for billions of dollars in bond money to build new prisons. His state architect, Sim Van der Ryn, had even refused to endorse plans for new prisons, reflecting opposition by those on Brown's left flank.

Finally, after months of negotiations and debate within his administration, Brown took a minimalist approach, asking the Legislature to place a \$495 million prison bond issue

on the 1982 ballot, enough to build space for about 10,000 more inmates, a fraction of the projected need.

Voters approved the measure, and over the next two decades the number of prisons tripled. However, the state sidestepped the need for voter approval with a clever, if deceptive, system of financing that borrowed many billions of construction dollars. Under the "lease-revenue" system, a state agency legally separate from the prison system issued bonds to build prisons, then leased them to the corrections department.

Even though most inmates came from urban counties, particularly Los Angeles, their politicians resisted having new prisons. The single Los Angeles County prison was built in the remote Antelope Valley.

Therefore, most new prisons were located in rural communities eager for the payrolls that the human warehouses generated, with the first in Avenal, a tiny Kings County community that had once been an oil boom town.

Despite the frantic pace of prison construction, the inmate population still outpaced the number of new cells and eventually grew to six times what it had been in 1981, declining only when, during Brown's second governorship, federal judges intervened and declared that the overcrowded conditions were illegal.

Over the last half-decade, thanks to more lenient sentencing laws (some sponsored by Brown

2.0), diversion of felons into local jails and early releases due to COVID-19, inmate numbers have declined sharply to 94,000, scarcely half of the 173,000 peak and very close to the system's original design capacity.

It's now time, Gov. Gavin Newsom says, to start shutting down some of the state's three dozen prisons, citing the inmate decline and billions of dollars in looming costs to rehabilitate older facilities.

The first to go will be the 68-year-old Deuel Vocational Institution near Tracy. This month, it was announced that the second will be the California Correctional Center in Lassen County.

The Legislature's budget office projects that three more could be shuttered by 2025 and the local economic impacts could be heavy, particularly in rural areas. However, just as with the closure of unneeded military installations in the 1990s, that must be a secondary consideration. It's unfair to taxpayers to keep obsolete facilities open just because of their jobs.

That said, rural communities accepted prisons that politicians from urban areas refused and the state should foster the redevelopment of its prison sites for positive purposes, rather than leaving them as decaying eyesores of a previous era.

# Homicide Investigation on 9500 Block of Folsom Boulevard

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - At approximately 8:27 p.m. on Tuesday April 13, 2021, the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office Communications Center received a call from a multi-residential complex on the 9500 block of Folsom Boulevard in the County of Sacramento. The caller stated they could hear screaming and a physical disturbance in a neighboring unit.

Deputies responded to the specific residence and found an adult male victim with severe trauma and obviously deceased. Additional arriving deputies saw a subject of interest leaving the area in close proximity to their arrival, set a perimeter, detained the person without

incident and have since booked them into the Sacramento County Main Jail on a single count of homicide.

CSI and the Sacramento County Crime Lab collected evidence, patrol deputies interviewed witnesses and Homicide Detectives are investigating. There is no further information available at this time.

The identity of the victim in this case will be released by the Sacramento County Coroner's Office after identification and notification of next of kin.

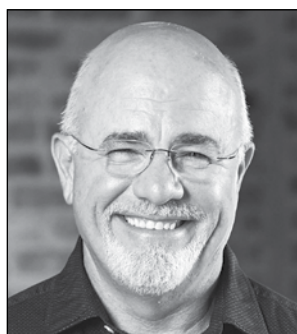

Live Like the Money isn't There

Dear Dave, I'm 24, single, and I make \$60,000 a year. I'm also debt-free and live in an apartment, plus I have about \$550,000 in a brokerage account that's made up of 75 percent mutual funds and 25 percent single stocks. The money in the brokerage account was originally an inheritance of \$280,000 that has grown since I received it in 2007. Am I putting my money toward the best investment possibilities right now?

Dear Drew You're in a nice place! I'm glad you're taking your finances and your future so seriously. First of all, I don't

play around with single stocks. There's just too much risk there for me. Since I don't invest in single stocks, I don't recommend others do it, either. I look at two things when it comes to investing - real estate and mutual funds.

I always pay cash for income-producing real estate. And when it comes to mutual funds, I invest in good, growth stock mutual funds with a solid track record of at least 10 years. Now, I don't get mad at people if they want to dabble in single stocks a little, but I wouldn't recommend having more than 10 percent of your investment portfolio wrapped up in them. The numbers on playing single stocks are just not that good for the individual, and besides that, I don't like losing money!

If I woke up in your shoes, I'd move the 25 percent you have in single stocks into good mutual funds. And I wouldn't use a brokerage

account. I'd stick with a quality financial advisor, one who has the heart of a teacher. I think you'll end up doing better with your money in the long haul this way. It might be a little boring, but boring is good when it comes to stuff like this. Exciting means you stand a good chance of losing a lot of money.

You've got a good income, especially for a single guy who's 24, so I'd make those adjustments and live like the inheritance money wasn't there. Stay away from debt, live on a reasonable budget, and make sure you're putting 15 percent of your income away for retirement. Then, when it's time a few years down the road, use some of that inheritance money to pay cash for a nice home.

If you can manage to do all that, the money you inherited - even with buying a home - will likely grow to millions of dollars by the time you're ready to retire.

SMUD Asks Customers to Make Call Before Digging

SMUD News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Spring is the time to begin outdoor projects. From small projects like planting a tree or building a fence, to big ones like putting in a swimming pool, be sure to call 811 before you dig.

Notifying Underground Service Alert (USA) North a minimum of two full business days before beginning to dig will determine if there are any dangerous or costly underground utilities in the area. The service is free by phone or internet.

Whether you are doing the job yourself or hiring a professional, be smart and dig safe by calling 811 or visiting usanorth811.org to request a utility-locate before each ground disturbance job; using the website via smartphone for your notification can also save you time. The notification is valid for 28 days, so if the excavation

project goes beyond this timeframe, notify USA North again to renew your ticket.

SMUD and other area utilities such as gas, water, and telecommunications will respond to determine whether they have underground facilities within your project area, and if so, the locations will be marked at the excavation site. Underground utility lines are not always located in the street; some utilities may be located in back or front yard easements or even driveways. Digging into an underground utility line can cause power outages and/or personal injury or death.

Be aware, it is the law to notify USA North via 811 before you dig. Besides the legal requirement, it's the way to stay safe and avoid financial and legal responsibility for repairs and/or injuries. For more information, visit usanorth811.org.

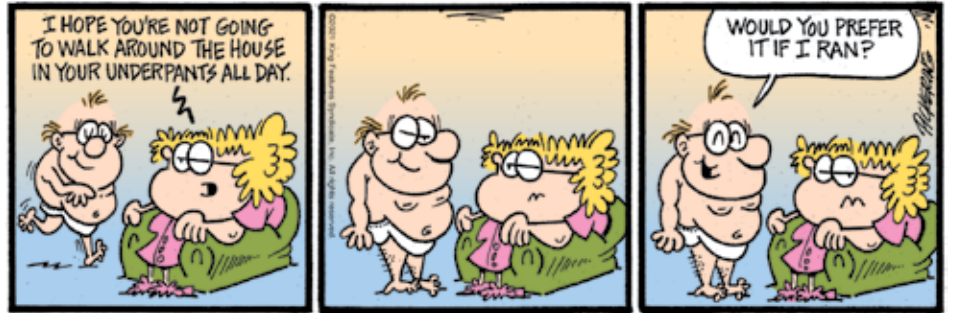

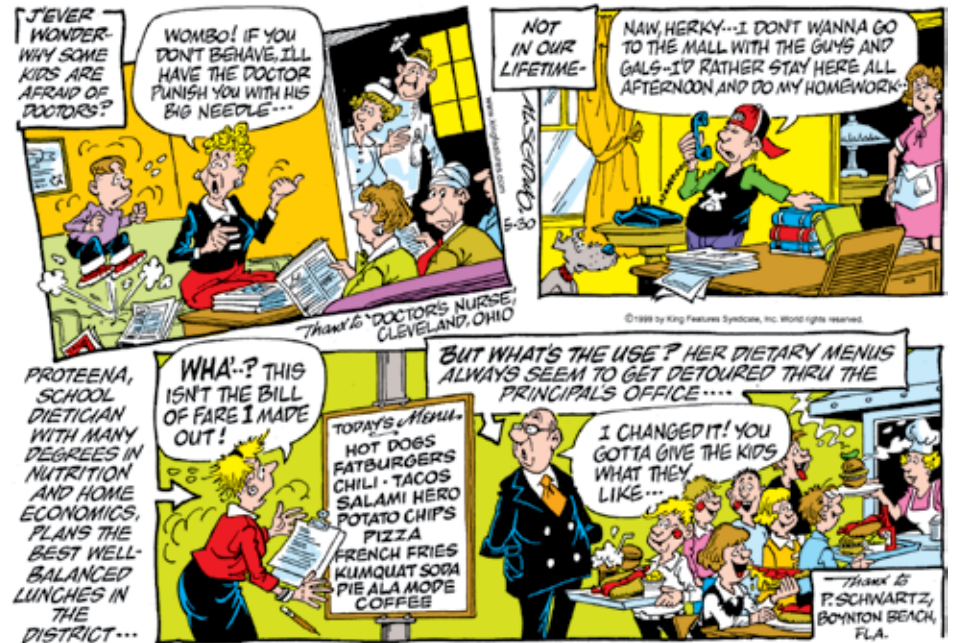

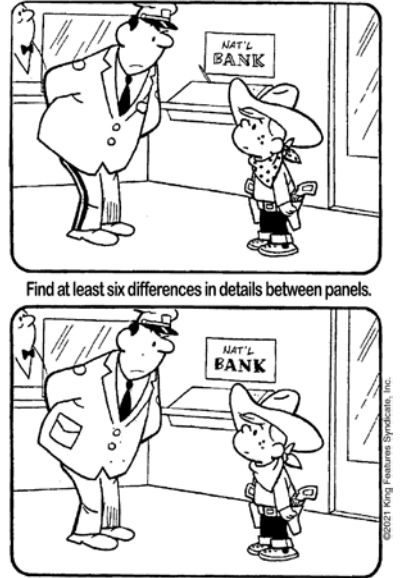

## Ask Toni

### What Is Medicare's "Lifetime Reserve Days?"



Toni King

*Toni:*

Can you explain why a hospital employee from the medical claims division asked my husband Phillip to sign a form stating that he is now in his "Lifetime Reserve Days" while he is waiting for his lung/heart double transplant?

Phillip went in the hospital in October for congested heart failure only to discover that his heart and lungs can no longer support him. The wait on his double transplant is taking longer than expected and I am concerned that the hospital will send him home or to a nursing home to wait and he will not receive the correct medical care. Please explain what Phillip needs to do. He is covered by a Medicare Supplement and he has had no problems with that plan.

*Thanks, Susan from Tulsa, OK*

*Ms. Susan:*

The hospital staff had Phillip sign the form about the "lifetime reserve days" because once he is past the Inpatient Hospitalization 60 Lifetime Reserve days, then Medicare stops paying and the stay is his responsibility.

Susan, there is a notice written in the summary of benefits for a Medicare Supplement and it states: **"\*\*NOTICE: When your Medicare Part A hospital benefits are exhausted, the insurer stands in the place of Medicare and will pay whatever amount Medicare would have paid up to an additional 365 days as provided in the policy's "Core Benefits." During this time the hospital is prohibited from billing you for the balance based on any difference between its billed charges and the amount Medicare would have paid."**

Medicare Part A covers an inpatient hospital stay with a \$1488 deductible for days 1-60. Yes, an inpatient hospital deductible of \$1488 can happen 6 times a year. This includes a semiprivate room and board,

general nursing and miscellaneous services and supplies.

If your Part A-Inpatient Hospital stay is longer than 60 days, then for days 61 thru 90 Medicare pays all but \$352 per day, and for days 91 and after, Medicare will pay all but \$704 per day with the 60 "lifetime reserve days" to be used. Once the Medicare lifetime reserve days are used, there are not anymore "inpatient hospital benefits". You will pay all the cost of the remainder hospital stay.

Since he has a Medicare Supplement, Phillip will have the additional 365 days of "inpatient hospital benefits" that only a Medicare Supplement insurance plan has and will pay.

What a blessing that Phillip has a Medicare Supplement and he and his doctors together can pick how and where to have his heart and lung transplants and which rehab/skilled facility he will select while recuperating.

If your Part D plan does not cover your new transplant prescription drugs, then who will pay.... You will! Please verify that your new prescriptions will be on your current Medicare Part D plan. Take your time and explore your Medicare prescription drug availability with your transplant physician's office or transplant facility's caseworker.
