During the past year, the City of Rancho replaced all parking lot lighting with induction bulbs that will result in an estimated 60% annual KWH savings, installed Smart Clocks on sprinklers that will adjust run times based on current and future weather conditions to reduce water consumption, and scaled back schedules for building equipment and increased occupancy set points to reduce

Local Woman Rallies Community to Help Stomp Out MS

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- After personally raising over \$11,000, a Sacramento woman walked 50 miles in three days to help raise money and awareness as part of a fundraising event for Multiple Sclerosis.

The full-time working mother, Janine Wong, created "Team Lysie" to support a close family friend, Alyssa Gomez (24), who this past year was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis (MS), a chronic, unpredictable and disabling disease of the central nervous system with no known cause, cure or prevention. MS symptoms can vary greatly but typically range from numbness in the limbs and extreme fatigue, to loss of balance and muscle coordination or paralysis. Members of Team Lysie included Alyssa's mother Silvia, and Janine's daughter Danielle who volunteered as a Registered Nurse during the event. The group joined about 200 other walkers who participated in the 2013 National Multiple Sclerosis Society's Southern California Challenge Walk MS on September

The 2013 Challenge Walk MS was designed under the theme, "Connecting MS Through The Years," and split up amongst three days. Walkers dressed in costumes from their favorite decade, and each of the 50 mile-markers throughout the walk displayed interesting or monumental information discovered about MS through the years. The Challenge's first day, 20-mile walk began at the Carlsbad Flower Fields and ended at the San Diego Marriott Del Mar Hotel. Walkers received free massages by volunteer masseuses from Kaplan College, and proceeded to dinner filled with inspiring speeches from fellow Walkers, a team costume contest and other fun games and prizes.

The second day, 20-mile walk continued from the hotel and finished at Sunset Point in Mission



Approximately 200 walkers participated in the 2013 Challenge Walk on September 27-29.

Bay, where buses shuttled walkers back to the hotel for a dinner and entertainment, where Olympic cyclist Maureen Manley shared her story on how she discovered and deals with her MS diagnosis. The final day, 10-mile walk started back at Sunset Point, and the entire group of 200 walkers crossed the finish line as one united body around noontime at Embarcadero Marina Park South, located behind the San Diego Convention Center in Downtown San Diego.

In order to participate in the Challenge Walk, each Walker had to raise a minimum of \$2,500 in donations; a key reason as to why they call it a "Challenge" walk. However, for Janine and Team Lysie, this hurdle appeared to be nothing more than a speed bump.

Janine explains, "Previously Alyssa was very involved in her community, having coached for her alma mater, the El Camino High softball team, and helping manage Charity Bingo with her father

for over five years. Upon her diagnosis, she had to take a leave from Charity Bingo and I was asked to help in her absence; which is where I got the idea to use them to help raise money for the Walk. They were very supportive and let us have an "MS Night" twice a month on El Camino High's Booster night, where we give the customers \$10.00 off of their bingo buy-in if they will donate \$10.00 to MS. "

The entire Charity Bingo and El Camino community rallied around the cause, and Team Lysie raised over \$11,000. Yet Janine found even strangers to Alyssa and the Gomez family were more than eager to donate to the Challenge Walk efforts; when the company Custom Ink received Janine's graphics for their Team Lysie t-shirts, Custom Ink personally contacted Janine to get more information on how to donate to her efforts.

Even further, through the

Charity Bingo Hall Janine met a man named Wind Walker, who works closely with The Forgotten Warriors and other non-profits for veterans and their families and has many connections throughout Sacramento. He was touched after hearing about Alyssa and her

battle with MS, and although the MS Challenge Walk was different than his normal causes, he took her story to heart. On August 24, at 5:30pm he invited Janine and Alyssa to join him on an Access TV Sacramento segment to bring the MS Challenge Walk to public awareness and call other non-profits to help Janine and her team in their MS fundraising efforts.

"This past year has been very eve-opening for me," Janine confesses. "I never even knew what MS was until about 12 months ago! Alyssa is so young and the news of her having MS was shocking. It's unsettling because I want to be able to "fix it," but I've learned with MS that isn't an option. So I'm trying to do the next best thing; I walked 50 miles in this year's Challenge Walk, and I'll continue to raise money to help find a cure and walk for Alyssa and others who can't."

This was Janine and Team Lysie's first year participating in the National MS Society's Southern California Challenge

About The Challenge Walk

The 2013 Challenge Walkers raised a cumulative total of over \$751,000 dollars. Since the event's inception in 2002, when 179

local walkers raised \$496,000, the Pacific South Coast Chapter's Challenge Walk has raised a cumulative total of more than \$10 million dollars. The National MS Society said about 60 of the 200 walkers during this year's 12th annual Challenge Walk have been diagnosed with MS, the most common neurological disease leading to disability in young to middle aged adults like Alysa. Statistics also show that most people are diagnosed between the ages of 20 and 50, and more than twice as many women as men have MS.

The Pacific South Coast Chapter's Challenge Walk MS is among the highest dollar fundraising amounts of any of the nine other Challenge Walk MS events organized by the 50-state network for MS Society chapters in the U.S. The Southern California Challenge Walk MS, organized by both the San Diego-based Pacific South Coast Chapter and the Los Angeles-based Southern California & Nevada Chapter, is the only Challenge Walk west of the Mississippi River. 

Sacramento Zoo To Welcome New Jaguar



Tikal says 'hello"

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- The Sacramento Zoo invites the public to wish an old friend farewell and to meet a new Sacramento resident. Mulac, the Zoo's male Jaguar, will be moving to the Brevard Zoo in Florida. Mulac moved to the Sacramento Zoofrom the Audubon Zoo in 2002. His last day on exhibit will be September 21st. After Mulac's departure, zookeepers will introduce Tikal, a young male Jaguar from the San Diego Zoo to his new companion, Tina, the Zoo's resident female.

Guests may begin seeing Tikal on exhibit as early as September 22nd but will not see Tina and Tikal on exhibit together until the two have undergone an extensive "meet and greet" process. Before the two Jaguars can begin to live comfortably together, zookeepers will acclimate them first to the smell of each other, then they will be allowed visuals of one other. After Tina and Tikal are comfortable with the sight and smell of each other they will begin sharing the same space under the watchful eyes of zookeepers.

Sacramento Zoo participates in the Association of Zoos and Aquariums Jaguar Species Survival Plan® (SSP). Tikal's arrival was recommended by the SSP, and while Tikal may

someday be a father, his role here for now will be a companion for Tina, an older Jaguar. Social interactions will be important for Tikal as he continues to grow into adulthood; at 16 years of age, Tina (who is considered post-reproductive) will act as a mentor to Tikal, rather than

Jaguars are an endangered species

with estimates indicating that more than 10,000 still exist in the wild; however their numbers are rapidly decreasing as a result of habitat destruction and illegal fur trade. In appearance Jaguars are often confused with leopards – both cats have a similar brownish/yellow base fur coloring that is marked distinctively with spots – the jaguar's spots are rosettes, which are spots within spots. Jaguars are stockier, have larger heads and shorter tails. They weigh 80-130 pounds and can live about 11 years in the wild and up to 22 years in captivity.

Open since 1927, the Sacramento Zoo is home to more than 500 native, rare and endangered animals and is one

of over 200 accredited institutions of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums. Located near the corner of Land Park Drive and Sutterville Road in William Land Park, the Zoo is wholly managed by the non-profit Sacramento Zoological Society. Abandoned Babies Laid to Rest at The Charitable Side of Gaming Sacramento's Garden of Innocence

SACRAMENTO REGION (MPG) -

"Bringing communities together to make sure no child leaves this earth without someone who cared. That is what Garden of Innocence National is all about," reads their mission statement.

A community did come together on September 21, 2013 at the East Lawn Sierra Hills Memorial Park in Sacramento to pay respect and lay to rest twenty abandoned babies and to dedicate the new Garden of Innocence (GOI) at this site.

More than 130 participants and cemetery staff from surrounding cities and as far away as Fresno, CA made the journey to the new GOI memorial just outside of Citrus Heights, to be part of a morning created to bring people together to accomplish an urgent goal - to give abandoned children the dignity they deserve in their death despite the very short and loveless life they may have had in life.

This goal was accomplished during a poignant ceremony following months of preparation by the Garden of Innocence National organization including acquiring each baby's individual final resting place, and giving each a personality of their own with a name, a special poem written for them and a unique urn built and donated by Sacramento Area Woodworkers to hold their cremated remains.

To fulfill the need for involve community in this experience, stories in the media and even on Craig's List called for volunteers and invited those interested to gather and participate in giving was intermingled with several

these previously abandoned and forgotten children a proper celebration of their short lives.

The service, the same format repeated at GOI memorials around the United States began with a welcome from Victor Hipolito Jr., East Lawn Director. More than 50 men, women, and children created a solemn "Chain of Love", each participant pausing for a moment as they held each of the 20 urns before passing it on to their neighbor.

As this was taking place, the Knights of Columbus, a Catholic men's fraternal service organization with a heart for children's needs provided the ceremony with an additional sense of dignity as they slowly and silently processed around the circle and 'stood guard' over the entire proceedings.

The ceremony continued with the reading of poems written for each child by volunteers previously recruited from Sun City, and writers and poetry clubs throughout California. One poem written for 'Hannah' came from Uganda.

Adults, children and even families, read the poems. Following each recitation, the reader opened a small white box and released a Monarch butterfly, most of which immediately took flight while others lingered.

One poet, George McGehee, a minister and writer was so moved when heard of the project from Inspire, his Christian writer's club, that he wrote his tribute to 'Michael' and traveled the 40 miles from Acampo, near Stockton to read it.

The reading of the poems

musical interludes by local musicians and a message of spiritual affirmation by Rev. Ramona Goodge, Center for Spiritual Awareness. Alan Fisher, president of East Lawn Sierra Hills Memorial Park then dedicated the Garden to the children it will

Finally it was time to place each baby in his or her final resting place. Inside each urn, a small 12" by 12" blanket tightly enfolds the cremated remains. Urns were placed in their own white plastic protective 16" x10" x10" 'vault', and individually filled with stuffed animals and sprinkled with red rose pet-Permanent personalized grave markers will be placed on

It was an inspiring sight as one white dove, then three, then 20 doves were released into the sky. The first dove signified 'spirit', the next three, the 'holy father' followed by the final twenty.

This service comes in the wake of media coverage given to the story of the burial in of "Baby Rosie" in Auburn, CA on Sept. 18, 2013. Two park workers found Rosie's perfectly formed body on July 8 in a Roseville park. Since then, the issue of abandoned deceased babies and children has re-gained media and public

The 20 children buried this day came from the coroner's office, after being still born in surrounding hospitals. Parents leave their babies at the hospital as they cannot handle the grief of the loss or cannot afford the burial. Formerly, indigent or abandoned adults and children were buried in an unmarked section of the cemetery; now babies and younger children will rest at the GOI. Sierra Hills will handle abandoned children's burials for eleven counties surrounding Sacramento

Each burial would cost at least \$3,000 today. Over a dozen volunteers are required to plan and run a GOI memorial service, even to bury just one baby. Volunteers are always welcome.

The initial Garden of Innocence was created in 1998 with the first memorial park in San Diego, CA. In 2005 founder Elissa Davey, and Dr. Netreia Carrol initiated the National Garden of Innocence program after hundreds of inquiries US & Canada to come to their community and help start a garden there. Their goal is have a memorial park in every state.

At present there are GOI sites in 25 California counties five other states. More are being designed, built and dedicated as they strive to fill the many requests from throughout the United States and Canada to help create a Garden of Innocence in their community.

Sierra Hills East Lawn is one of four local East Lawn sites. Founded in 1904 at 43rd & Folsom in downtown Sacramento, the other two are on Fruitridge Road in Sacramento and Elk Grove. ★

When some people think of video game fans, they imagine stereotypes of anti-social introverts playing for hours in a dark room. But the industry has evolved far beyond these popular culture-driven caricatures. Gamers are a community and some are using their virtual worlds to improve the real world by establishing a number of game-related charities that have helped millions all over the

The Humble Bundle is probably the most famous. Every week, it posts a selection of video games available for download, and people can pay as much or as little as they'd like to acquire them. The Humble

Bundle usually identifies a number of charities, and the buyer can allocate his or her funds to go to whichever ones they wish. Pay more than the average, and additional games or content is unlocked, raising hundreds of thousands of dollars weekly.

In a similar niche, the UK-based GamesAid also occasionally sells games to raise money for smaller charities that help disadvantaged children. However, they have also expanded their fundraising by reaching out in the gaming community through industry events and by selling game-related memorabilia on eBay.

Child's Play is an organization set up to help those who don't have games for them to play at all. Established in 2003, Child's Play works similarly to the Make A Wish Foundation. Hospitals provide wishlists to Child's Play of the goods that their hospitalized kids want, and Child's Play seeks to fulfill as many requests as possible either through monetary donations or by letting people directly fulfill wish-list requests on Amazon. Though the majority of requests tend to be video games, it's also possible to find books, toys, or even nail polish on the lists. Whatever the children desire, Child's Play aims to deliver.

The gaming industry has garnered more than its fair share of criticism, accused of "desensitizing" people to violence or keeping them from physical activity. Yet, these examples of gamers motivated by charity shows that some good has sprung out of the interactive entertainment community. There are already numerous ways to participate in gaming's long-hidden charitable side, with more assuredly to come.

Governor Brown Signs Bill to Increase Minimum Wage in California

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Acting to help California's working families, Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. on September signed AB 10 by Assemblymember Luis Alejo (D-Salinas), which will raise the minimum wage in California from \$8.00 per hour to \$10.00

"It's a special day to stand with workers who are laboring for all of us and laboring at a very low wage. Turning that wage into a \$10 an hour wage is a wonderful

thing," said Governor Brown prior to signing AB 10 in Los Angeles. "It's my goal and it's my moral responsibility to do what I can to make our society more harmonious, to make our social fabric tighter and closer and to work toward a solidarity that every day appears to become more distant." AB 10 will raise California's

minimum wage in two one-dollar increments, from \$8 per hour today to \$9 per hour, effective July 1, 2014 and from \$9 per

hour to \$10 per hour, effective January 1, 2016.

Governor Brown worked diligently with the bill's author and legislative leaders over the past month to secure passage of AB 10. He was joined at today's bill signing ceremonies in Los Angeles and Oakland by Assembly Speaker John A. Pérez, Assemblymember Luis Alejo and dozens of workers. ★

Governor Slams Business with Huge Minimum Wage Increase

NFIB study shows job loss will follow once minimum wage goes up

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -The National Federation of Independent Business/California voiced strong opposition to Governor Brown's signing of Assembly Bill 10, which would increase California's minimum wage by \$2.00 per hour. The bill is effectively one more tax increase on California's hurting small business owners.

"Small business owners' hopes have once again been dashed with a stroke of Governor Brown's pen," said John Kabateck, NFIB/ CA Executive Director. "After spearheading the effort to raise our state income tax to the highest in the nation, Governor Brown vowed to be more prudent this year. Increasing the minimum wage by a staggering 25% violates that promise and will only cement California's status as the worst place to start a business."

Small businesses are still struggling to crawl out of the economic recession and are already facing a myriad of hurdles,

including the highest income and sales tax in the country, uncertainty from the Affordable Care Act, which takes effect in January, and higher energy costs from cap-and-trade, to name just a few. Now their bottom line will be further reduced along with the accompanying payroll taxes.

"It is my understanding that the Legislature limited public employee union pay increases this year, saying that the state just could not afford more," added Kabateck. "But then they turn around and hit businesses with a 25% increase over the next two years! This is sheer hypocrisy from our elected leaders.'

The minimum wage increase passed with strong union support. Their negotiated wages are usually based on the state's minimum wage.

"Small business owners will now be forced to make tough choices including reducing employee hours, cutting positions entirely, and for many, closing their doors altogether.

And make no mistake, small business owners vote and will remember those who supported this bill next November during election time."

A recent study showed 68,000 jobs lost in California if the minimum wage is increased.

For more than 70 years, the National Federation of Independent Business has been the Voice of Small Business, taking the message from Main Street to the halls of Congress and all 50 state legislatures. NFIB annually surveys its members on state and federal issues vital to their survival as America's economic engine and biggest creator of jobs. What Congress Needs to Do About the NSA

Washington is beginning to debate the proper extent of government eavesdropping powers in the wake of Edward Snowden's revelations about the NSA. It's hardly as robust a discussion as it should be, but it's a desperately needed start.

The colossal effort to monitor Americans' communications has been going on for at least seven years, under two presidents. It constitutes an expansion of government power without precedent in the modern era. Yet while some members of Congress were informed about it — and all had the opportunity to learn — none saw an urgent need for public discussion. This is astounding. It took the actions of a leaker to spur any real airing of the matter on Capitol Hill.

Even now, it seems unlikely that Congress will make significant policy changes. That's because all the nation's key actors and institutions appear to approve of the surveillance programs. By its silence, Congress clearly supported them. Presidents Bush and Obama backed them. The intelligence community, a powerful voice on national security issues, has resolutely defended them. The courts that are supposed to keep them in line with the Constitution

have been deferential to national security authorities, raising a few questions from time to time, but in the end approving all but a handful of tens of thousands of data-gathering requests. the intelligence community. It needs to exercise greater oversight and insist on more transparency, more information, and more constraint on surveillance programs — defining what is truly relevant to an inves-

And the American people, by their lack of widespread outrage, have signaled that in this one case, at least, they believe the government can be trusted to keep us safe.

In short, Congress — the forum where issues of such national importance should be hashed out — missed its chance to lead a reasoned national debate over how extensive we want surveillance over Americans' communications to be. It's unlikely that genie can ever again be forced back into its bottle.

Yet even the director of national intelligence, James Clapper — who once denied point-blank to Congress that the government collects data on millions of Americans — now sees the need for some sort of change. "We can do with more oversight and give people more confidence in what we do," he said in a mid-September speech

Yes, indeed. Here's the problem: once given power, the government rarely yields it. So you have to think not only about its present use, but how it will be used a decade or even more from now. Even if you concede that the current administration and its intelligence leadership have been responsible stewards of the powers they've been given — and I don't — that is no guarantee that the people who follow them, or the people who come after that, will be equally trustworthy.

This means that Congress has some challenging work ahead. It needs to restore the proper balance between effective intelligence-gathering and intrusion into Americans' privacy. It needs to demand more thoroughgoing accountability from

the intelligence community. It needs to exercise greater oversight and insist on more transparency, more information, and more constraint on surveillance programs — defining what is truly relevant to an investigation, creating more stringent definitions of which communications are fair game, and finding ways to assure Americans that protecting their privacy and civil liberties need not mean the wholesale vacuuming-up of every domestic phone and email record in existence.

There is no place for the timidity Congress has shown so far on these issues.

Our system depends on a vigorous Congress. The administration argues that it can provide rigorous intelligence-gathering oversight, but it has yet to prove it can do so — and in our system of checks and balances, it's not enough to have one branch of government overseeing itself. Congress, the courts, and the presidentially appointed Privacy and Civil Liberties Board all have to step up to their responsibilities.

Americans should demand action to strike a better balance between privacy and security. In the past, the congressional overseers of the intelligence community have been captivated, if not captured, by the people they're supposed to be supervising. Same with the courts. And the administration has hardly been forthcoming. That means it's up to the American people to insist that our leaders do their jobs. It's no less true today than it was at our founding: the price of liberty is eternal vigilance.



A Case in Point

Wronged at Work!

THEY SAID I'M TOO OLD, SOTHEY **DUMPED ME**

"I'm too young to retire....but I'm too old to get a job."

A dilemma confronts millions of talented Americans. They are smart, experienced and ready to work. Yet they are jobless and unable to get hired due to their age. Many of them worry that they are not only unemployed, but unemployable in a job market that has a fetish for youth.

Age discrimination is a widespread and destructive prejudice in today's workplace. Job descriptions use code words such as "fun-loving," "high energy," or "recent college graduate." Young, unmarried employees without children are more likely to work weekends, evenings and holidays at lower rates of pay. Employers believe that younger employees will lower the costs of health insurance. Years of experience, maturity and responsibility are perceived not as valuable assets but as excess

Here's a comment from Mark Zuckerman, the 28-year-old founder of Facebook: "I want to stress the importance of being young and technical. Young people are just smarter." A senior executive at Twitter, Melissa Daimler, told the Commonwealth Club in San Francisco that said she couldn't comment on what older-generation workers want at their jobs because they don't work at Twitter, nor does Twitter target them for hire. The average age of a Twitter employee, Ms. Daimler said, is 30.

A partner at a prominent venture capital firm in Palo Alto told a conference audience, "People over 45 basically die in terms of new ideas."

I found similar comments from employers in the court records of recent age discrimination lawsuits:

• A director of sales said that the company needed "race horses, not plow horses," and that the plaintiff's sales techniques were unacceptable because they were "old school" and resulted from "a graying of the sales force."

• The plaintiff was described as an "old geezer" who "didn't fit the mold of a young, aggressive type manager."

• The plaintiff was told that management "was looking for younger, single people" and that 'you wouldn't be happy here in the future."

Statistics suggest the scope of the prejudice. The state's Department of Fair Employment and Housing (DFEH) tracks discrimination filings by categories. In 2002, DFEH recorded 3,282 complaints of age discrimination. In 2012, DFEH logged 5,605 age discrimination complaints, an increase of 71%.

One discharged employee who fought back in court was Brian Reid, a 52-year-old manager at Google who was fired nine days before Google announced plans to go public. According to his lawsuit, Reid's supervisors called Reid a "poor cultural fit," an "old guy" and a "fuddyduddy" with ideas "too old to matter."

Mr. Reid sued Google for age discrimination and asserted that his unvested stock options would have been worth at least \$45 million if he had stayed there. The case ultimately settled out of court for an undisclosed amount.

Another case that I'm following closely is being argued in Alameda County. In May 2008, Lawrence Livermore Laboratories fired hundreds of experienced employees, including nuclear weapons scientists, researchers, assistants, and

others with long years of service. Earlier this year, a jury awarded a \$2.7 million verdict in favor of five ex-employees. The litigation is continuing with about 125 former employees, most aged 40 and over, as plaintiffs.

Both federal and California laws protect employees from age discrimination. The regulations apply to anyone over the age of 40 at the time of the discriminatory conduct, and apply to employers with five or more employees.

The federal law is called the Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967 (ADEA). California's age discrimination laws are codified in Government Code sections 12940, 12945 and 12945.2. Remember that complaints of discrimination must be filed with DFEH within one year from the date of the discriminatory act. You can file your complaint yourself, or you can retain an attorney to file on your behalf. After filing with DFEH, you can also choose to pursue a private lawsuit against the employer on the basis of age discrimination.

I have always liked history so perhaps this part will be more like a chapter in a history text book: talking about a few of the things that happened 40 years ago in 1973 and a few of the changes that have happened up until today in 2013.

We know how fast everything is changing today. Knowing that it took decades to change our knowledge of the sciences in the past, I can only try to imagine how much will change during the next 40 years. Just remember, even with the advances we have made and will be made in the future, the people who live in "The City of Rancho Cordova" and the rest of the world will be depending on each other first.

That is the letter that I have written for Rancho Cordovans of 2053 . . . but I wanted to share it with you.






