Ideology Need Not Reign Supreme

Alaskan Youth Mission Trip Changes Lives and Builds Relationships

CORDOVA, RANCHO CA (MPG) - The Presbytery of Sacramento in cooperation with the Presbytery of Alaska sponsored a youth mission trip to Metlakatla, Alaska, August 1-10, 2013

The Rev. Jeanie Shaw, pastor at River Valley Presbyterian Church in Rancho Cordova, led a 10-day trip to Alaska that was hosted by the Rev. Larry Emery, pastor of the Metlakatla Presbyterian Church on Annette Island, about 45 minutes south of Ketchikan, AK. The mission trip consisted of 16 youth and 13 adults from six Sacramento area churches: River Valley Presbyterian of Rancho Cordova; Northminster Presbyterian and Bethany Presbyterian of Sacramento; Auburn Presbyterian of Auburn; Woodland Presbyterian of Woodland; and St. Andrew Presbyterian of Yuba City.

Metlakatla is a Tsimshian native village on the island of Annette, off the southeastern most part of Alaska. It is the only native Reservation in Alaska. Metlakatla comes from the Tsimshian word meaning "Salt Water Passage" and was named after another village of the same name in British Columbia, Canada In 1886, the Rev. William Duncan, an Anglican minister serving in Old Metlakatla, was disheartened by the vices brought in by traders that he deemed harmful to his congregation. So he and close to 1000 devoted Tsimshian followers decided to leave Metlakatla. Duncan went to Washington, D.C. and asked the U.S. government to give his group land in Alaska. The U.S. gave them Annette, an island with a calm bay, accessible

GMYPhone Scam Dials in on Older **Adults**

BBB warns to never give out bank account numbers to callers

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Better Business Bureau Serving Northeast California warns older adults to hang up on phone calls claiming to be from a company calling itself GMY after an Elk Grove woman received several phone calls from the company requesting bank account information.

The Elk Grove woman grew suspicious of phone calls her elderly mother was receiving as early as 6 a.m. when she intervened in the communication.

"When I got on the phone, they tried to convince me my mother would be receiving a card to pay for her medical care," said the woman. "They went on to ask for her bank account numbers. I wouldn't give them any information when they refused to tell me their phone number or company name."

The woman eventually spoke to someone identified as a supervisor who told her the company name was GMY. Consumers from across the country have reported similar scams in which the same company name is utilized. In other calls, the company may claim

of St. Andrew.

beach, a nearby waterfall, and abundant fishing. Duncan and his followers canoed nearly 60 miles across open sea to their new island home. They named the village New Metlakatla. Duncan then lobbied the U.S. Congress to establish Annette Island as an Indian reservation and it was granted in 1891. Today, it is the only Indian Reservation in the State of Alaska.

The Sacramento Presbytery team left with the dream of seeing Alaska and the hope of

learning about the Tsimshian culture and community through cultural exchange, hard work, fellowship, and prayer. The team flew to Ketchikan, Alaska to join the Metlakatla youth who had ferried to Ketchikan to greet them. While in Ketchikan, the team was treated to a day of ziplining through the rainforest and a day touring local attractions such as the Totem Heritage Center.

The Sacramento Presbytery team was fortunate to arrive in Metlakatla during its annual Founder's Day celebration. This year marked the first time that both Canadian and Alaskan Tsimshian chiefs and youth together re-enacted the historic 60-mile canoe trek from Old Metlakatla, British Columbia to New Metlakatla in Alaska. The day-long celebration also included traditional singing, dancing and beautiful displays of native regalia.

First City Manager to Retire in January

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - "Ted's tenure here in Rancho Cordova has been tremendously beneficial to the residents of our fine city. We have established an innovative, efficient and award-winning local government in partnership with our citizens under Ted's leadership. I sincerely doubt that we could have been as successful with any other manager. Ted is one-of-a-kind, and we will be forever indebted to him for his massive contributions to our city." - David Sander, City Council Member

Ted Gaebler, Rancho Cordova's first City Manager, will retire in January 2014, following a decade of service to the City and 50 years of public service. Under his leadership, Rancho Cordova has achieved an 88% approval rating and a high degree of support from its citizens.

"There are no complainers, no petitions, and no gadflies at council meetings," said Gaebler. "We have done a really good job of building a city government that is responsive to the community."

Although Ohio is Gaebler's home state, he briefly spent time at Berkeley under a leadership program for students aged 17-23, as the second youngest student on campus. He later graduated from Miami


University in Oxford, where he met his wife, Bonne, on the first day of school. They recently celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary.

Thereafter, he spent more than 20 years as an appointed government official in Oregon, Ohio, Maryland, Pennsylvania, as well as California. He owned a government consulting company in San Rafael for 13 years, and served as Vice President for Business Development for ACS. In 2000, he became the CEO for Nevada County.

"My first professional years were in the tumultuous 1960s, when people were changing things by riots and burning down cities. I thought, 'There must be some way that somebody with a managerial background can change governments peacefully from within.' So, I tried to make sure I always focused on helping my work force change."

He earned a Master's Degree in Government Administration from the Wharton Graduate School of Business, and studied the best practices performed in this country and around the world.

1992 Gaebler co-authored the publication, "Reinventing Government: How the Entrepreneurial Spirit is Transforming the Public Sector" (http:// tinyurl.com/lrvzsvc). It rose to number

6 on the New York Times Bestseller List and was translated into 22 different languages. From 1993 to 1999, he was invited to speak in 39 countries. The book continues to have a huge impact on the way people perceive government management.

After leaving Nevada County, and while briefly serving as the interim City Manager for East Palo Alto, Rancho Cordova invited him to serve as their first city manager.

"They wanted somebody who deeply and thoroughly understood county government, had new town experience, had served in a Central Valley city - in my case, Visalia – and was a senior in the business who could teach the council and staff about what professional management could do and what the partnership between a professional manager and local elected officials could be like."

He's particularly proud of the centrally located building, which sits in the middle of a business park, so people perceive the city government as a business. It's also home to the Chamber of Commerce, Recreation and Park District, Assemblyman Ken Cooley and a private business. "There's no excuse to be late for a meeting.'

Last fall, on its annual Best Small & Medium Workplaces list (recognizing companies with exceptional workplace cultures), Fortune magazine's Great Place to Work® placed Rancho Cordova 12th of 25 best small workplaces in the United States. In fact, it was the first local government agency to appear on the list.

If he could offer a few words to the next city manager, they would be, "Continue

RANCHO CORDOVA. Ca (MPG) - Cowboy action shooter Don Pergande of Rancho Cordova has won the championship for the SASS Western Regional competition in the Cattle Baron category. The event took place in Chorro Valley, San Luis Obispo, Aug. 7-11, and this is the third consecutive year he has won that prize.

SASS, the Single Action Shooting Society, foremost in Cowboy Action Shooting, is interested in preserving the history of the Old West through

competitive scenario target shooting. They participate in the "spirit of the game" by wearing clothing consistent with the late 1800s and selecting an alias to illustrate their Old West identity.

After retiring from the U.S. Postal Service in 1992, Pergande and his wife moved to Magalia in Northern California. A friend invited him to the Redding Gun Club to watch target shooting, and his interest continued to grow. He practiced diligently, joined SASS, and picked out his alias **Obispo.** Photo by Margaret Snider of De Sabla Don, after Eugene

De Sabla, 1903 Butte County hydroelectric plant construction supervisor.

In 2007, Pergande signed up for his first official match, a big one in Susanville, at the age of 70. "I had a lot of trouble with [my rifle] and

I was brand new and didn't know quite what I

was doing," Pergande said. "Even with all those problems I was good enough to take first place in my category, the first match I went to, and I was really kind of thrilled about that."

Pergande was into motorcycles all his life and at that time had a Harley, only a year and a half old. Driving home from Susanville after that shoot, something just clicked, and after being involved with motorcycles for 54 years, he sold his Harley to a friend and turned to Cowboy Action Shooting.

Since his first win, in 69 matches Pergande has racked up 32 first place awards, 15 second,


> 8 third, 1 fourth and 7 fifth place.

> > "All of our shooting is done against a clock," said Pergande, "as fast as you can do it, without missing the target."

One Pergande's of compatriots, known by the alias of Pancho Sin Lefty, said that when he started out in the game, he would see Pergande scoring high every time. "An older shooter," Lefty said, "is not usually at the top of the list, as the younger folks can move faster and have better eyes.'

He began following Pergande's lead, buying the same kind of guns, AND watching how he worked

When in line at the grocery store or movie theater or boarding a plane, we wait until we are told "next." We are working on year number 11 of our City's history and the "next" thing(s) we are working on are the entertainment center, another road into Mather, the Veterans Village at Mather, and gathering names of Rancho Cordova Veterans . . . NEXT! The theoretical line in life never ends. Waiting to hear our turn to be "next" is the hardest part of all.

We are all living a story. When you are living the story, you don't have time to refine the details or give it the colors you think it

should have, or be brave and heroic and strong and say the words when they needed to be said. Finding something to eat, sleeping, changing clothes or going from one place to another is not exciting or inspiring. Life can often be slow, dull and repetitious.

All of us have arrived at a moment when we wish we had done or said something different. It is much easier to write about different parts of your story with a pen and paper than it was when you were living it. Governor Brown Signs 5 Bills Authored by Assemblyman Cooley Today

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - - On Wednesday, August 28th. Assemblyman Ken Cooley announced that Governor Jerry Brown, in one day, signed into law five bills he authored this year: AB 117, AB 918, AB 1030, AB 1248 and AB 1289.

"My bill package this year has focused on a variety of issues that make government more accountable, relieve some of the bureaucracy, and focus on the quality of life policies that matter to my constituents," said Cooley. "We have a great system, but we all know it needs improvements. Really, I have focused on making what we have better.'

AB 117 is a taxpayer protection measure to improve state agency efficiency and administration by requiring the Department of Finance to issue training and reporting guidelines for the professionalization of independent monitors. When the independent monitor requirement of seniors and functional needs

was added as a taxpayer protection in 2011, it was one of the most important safeguards added to the state's basic fiscal administration law in almost 30 years.

AB 1248 is a companion taxpayer protection bill authorizing the State Controller to work with local governments and stakeholders to develop best practice internal controls designed to prevent and detect financial errors and fraud in local government agencies.

AB 1030 saves California Community College Districts time and money by allowing the option for student association leaders to appoint a trustee to the governing board for the balance of the term, to ensure a student voice in decision making. If a student trustee seat becomes vacant during the term, this bill now allows an appointment instead of holding a midterm election.

AB 918 increases the safety

persons in an emergency or natural disaster by directing the Office of Emergency Services to include in the State Emergency Plan best practice procedures regarding emergency and evacuation procedures.

"As the most populous state in the nation, it's important that we be ready to respond to emergencies and natural disasters as quickly as possible," said Cooley. "In those situations, we must not forget about our senior citizens and people with disabilities. In recent disasters elsewhere in the nation, these people have been overlooked in the wake of a crisis, and that is not acceptable."

Finally, Governor Brown signed Assemblyman Cooley's AB 1289, designating the California Vietnam Veterans Memorial, next to the Capitol Park Rose Garden, as the official state Vietnam Veterans War Memorial

"Our team was invited to witness this special celebration, and we served their community by running many of the Founder's Day games," notes Rev. Shaw. "We were treated to a potlatch - a traditional feast and giftgiving festival practiced by the Tsimshian people for generations - and dined on traditional dishes of salmon, halibut, crab, deer stew, salmon egg soup and fry bread. But the highlight for us all," she added, "was experiencing the extraordinary Tsimshian people."

During the visit, our youth team ran a Vacation Bible School for the youth of Metlakatla. The theme was Superheroes of the Bible and was supported by costumed youth dressed as Captain America, Superman and Flash. Our contractor, Northminster's Don Havis, entered the Superhero

pantheon as "Handyman," and achieved superhero status with his construction accomplishments and that of his youth superhero workers. Mission work projects included clearing and preparing a vacant lot that turned a trash dump into a functioning parking area for the community, cleaning out the attic, fixing the floors, railings and stairways, repairing plumbing, and removing an old cast iron stove from the almost 100-year-old Metlakatla Presbyterian Church.

It was a transformative experience for all involved. For 10 days, children went without computers, iPods and cell phones and focused their energy instead on direct personal communication; urban sophisticates met with remote fisherman; fast food aficionados dined on salmon and halibut and loved it; reluctant local children became advocates and chose to sleep on the church floor with their

new Sacramento friends.

"Every day of our trip brought more and more youth from the island," noted Camille Cable, an adult leader from River Valley Presbyterian. "Even after our return to Sacramento, friendships continued with Alaskan and Sacramento vouths exchanging texts and promising to keep in touch. We can't wait to go back"

Rev. Emery couldn't have been more pleased at the outcome of this cultural exchange. He is already planning a trip to Sacramento with the youth of his congregation. The success of the mission trip may open the door to other youth mission trips from around the country. "But I'm reserving Founder's Day for our Sacramento friends and we welcome the Presbytery of Sacramento to come back every year for this special occasion.'



modern technology With offering so many new ways to view and enjoy entertainment content previously confined to a television set, it's no wonder that streaming media companies like Hulu and Netflix have become major players in the TV game.

Not that many years ago, Hulu began to offer a user-friendly model for enjoying TV series running on other networks. As Acting CEO Andy Forssell told TV critics recently, Hulu "was all about last night's TV." The program you missed on FOX or NBC could be seen the next day.

Popular for current and vintage TV shows, Hulu now finds itself up against cable providers offering "Video on Demand," and so Hulu started to look for opportunities to offer programs, even from other countries, that have been missing from traditional television.

Hulu CEO Forssell observed that Hulu is "really not a network, we're not a studio, we are a distributor at heart," and that Hulu is all about trying to "connect people with content they love, no matter where it comes from."

However Hulu wishes to define itself, the obvious thrust of its streaming video content is to focus on upcoming original programs, of which there are ten shows to roll out the rest of this year during the major networks' customary fall season.

First out of the block this summer is "The Awesomes," an animated show for adults that combines the thrills of comic book storytelling with the irreverent comedy that springs from the minds of Seth Meyers ("Saturday Night Live") and Michael Shoemaker ("Late Night with Jimmy Fallon").

Seth Meyers gives voice to Prock, the son of America's greatest superhero, who wants to follow in his father's footsteps but is utterly unqualified for the job. With the help of the dimwitted

Muscleman (Ike Barinholtz), Prock puts together a team of D-list superheroes, trying to keep federal funding for his outfit.

"The Awesomes," though it has its moments of comic amusement, is not particularly awesome, but that's because there's not enough inspired lunacy to distinguish this series from the standard animated superhero fare found on any number of similar shows on cable channels.

There's an argument to be made that there is nothing original on TV anymore. Everything is derivative, or so it often seems. A case in point is Hulu's "Quick Draw," a comedic half-hour western set in 1875 that centers on a Harvard-educated sheriff and his quest to introduce the emerging science of forensics to an unruly Kansas town.

In the early days of the FOX network, a series called "The Adventures of Brisco County, Jr." starred Bruce Campbell as a Harvard-educated lawyer-turnedbounty hunter who was hired to capture an outlaw's gang. Humor was a big part of the show.

Similarly, "Quick Draw" is campy and cheeky, with John Lehr's Sheriff Hoyle constantly reminding the unimpressed yokels that he was educated at an elite school. He has no compunction feeling intellectually about superior, boasting that he graduated 327th in his class.

The citizens of Great Bend, Kansas include the brassy blonde owner (Allison Dunbar) of the town's brothel, who runs an oddsmaking wager line on when the new sheriff will meet an untimely death.

Sheriff Hoyle also boasts of getting a B-plus in sharp shooting at Harvard, which he says is an actually an A anywhere else. Meanwhile, he's assisted by reluctant Deputy Eli (Nick Brown) to hunt down Cole Younger and his murderous gang.

Have you ever wondered about the person inside a mascot's

uniform, whether at a high school game or in pro sports? Well, later this fall, "Behind the Mask" takes viewers on a behind-the-scenes adventure into the colorful world of sports mascots.

The series focuses on four mascots: Lebanon High School's Rooty the Cedar Tree, UNLV's Hey Reb, minor league hockey mascot Tux the Penguin, and NBA mascot Bango of the Milwaukee Bucks.

"Behind the Mask" tells the moving stories of these real-life Clark Kents, capturing their highs and lows, both inside the suit at games and outside the uniform at home and regular life. The tales are funny, entertaining and at times poignant.

A lot of Hulu's original programming comes from the United Kingdom. One show produced by the BBC that looks very promising is "The Wrong Mans," centered on two lowly office workers caught up in a deadly criminal conspiracy. By the way, it is a comedy with a twisted sensibility.

Part of the appeal of this show is that one of the main characters is played by James Corden, a truly gifted comedian. I had the great pleasure of seeing him as the leading man in the Broadway show "One Man, Two Guvnors," arguably one of the funniest stage productions ever. Corden won the Tony Award for best actor in that show.

In "The Wrong Mans," Mathew Baynton's Sam discovers a ringing phone at the scene of a horrific car crash. Answering the phone turns his world upside down, as he and Phil (Corden) soon realize it's up to them to save the day.

Sam and Phil are in the wrong place at the wrong time, with the wrong skills to get involved in sleuthing. Now you know why the show is called "The Wrong Mans," a comedy that seems ever so right.

Several other new programs are on the horizon for Hulu. "Mother Up!" stars Eva Longoria as a disgraced former music exec who transitions from the towers of Manhattan to the carpool lane of suburbia.

I'd like to tell you more about "Mother Up!" and a slew of other new series, but Hulu has not yet provided screeners for review. Nevertheless, there may be a few good reasons to check out Hulu for more than just the next-day airing of TV programs.





Bankruptcy Just For Her?

Dear Dave,

My husband and I would like to buy a home in the next year or so. My credit is in pretty bad shape, so we've decided to work on getting his credit in better shape in order to qualify for a mortgage loan. I have \$104,000 in debt, and \$92,000 of that is in student loans. He has \$13,000 in debt, with \$7,000 of that a repossession on a car for which he was a co-signer. Can I file bankruptcy on my debts only? – Latrell

Dear Latrell.

You can't file bankruptcy on certain, specific items. By the way, student loans are not bankruptable. Even if you filed, you would still have all that debt hanging around your neck.

I want you to own a home, but I don't want your home to own you. Neither one of you have done very well with money so far, and at this point I'm afraid a house would be a curse instead of a blessing in your lives. I would encourage you to build a stronger financial foundation before you buy a house. In short, this means you need to get out of debt, save money, and start living on a budget.

Latrell, buying a house when you're broke and deeply in debt is never a good idea. I'm not trying to be mean, but I really think you're asking the wrong question. I don't want you



to try and use bankruptcy as some kind of escape from this situation. Right now, I want you to change your behavior with money and get things cleaned up with a good, organized financial plan in your lives. - Dave

The Ever-Changing **Budget**

Dear Dave,

Should a budget change every month?

- Anonymous
- Dear Anonymous,

Yes, it should. Your life changes every month, and your budget should reflect the ebb and flow of your life.

Now, some things will stay the same. Your house payment or rent should fall into this category. If you have a car payment, which I hope you don't, that would be the same too. There shouldn't be a big difference in the amount you spend on food most months though. You might spend more in this category during November and December thanks to the holidays, but overall it should remain pretty steady.

The biggest fluctuation you may see is in your utilities. I heat my house with natural gas, so the bill is much higher during the winter months. It's just the opposite during the summer. We burn electricity to run the air

conditioner, so the electric bill is higher in summer.

This is part of the reason I urge people to do a budget on paper, on purpose before the next month begins. You may look at the upcoming month and realize the kids have soccer pictures scheduled. There may be a school trip planned, or they may need back-to-school clothes and supplies.

When it comes to a budget, there's no easy out. Things change from month to month, and you need to think, plan ahead, and itemize so your budget is an accurate reflection of your life! - Dave



Sierra Club Opposes Peripheral Tunnels Through the Delta

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - West Sacramento is the Delta's northernmost city by boundary, says West Sacramento Mayor Christopher Cabaldon. The city's drinking water is drawn from the Sacramento River. Lois Wolk (D-Davis), whose California Senate District included West Sacramento pre-redistricting, is proposing an alternate plan for conveying fresh water from northern California to Southern California. She has said she does not support the peripheral tunnels plan as proposed by Governor Jerry Brown. That plan calls for pumping more Sacramento River water through the Delta. Wildlife advocates, such as California Fish & Wildlife, worry how that will impact both the river, and the Delta's fragile ecosystem.

Dear Carol:

Something strange happened recently during the state's march to build a pair of peripheral tunnels around the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. The tunnel proponents moved the tunnels.

With a certain amount of fanfare and one of those press-only press conferences, Secretary of Resources John Laird announced that the administration now proposes to move the pathway for

the big tunnels that will draw river water from above the Delta and deliver it to south of the Delta.

The move would push the tunnels eastward and away from at least one farm still in production. Now the tunnels would run through Stanton Island – active feeding and resting space for Sandhill Cranes.

That crane space happens to be owned by The Nature Conservancy (TNC), the first environmental group to embrace the peripheral tunnels as a grand solution for the Delta. That embrace, by the way, came a few years ago, long before any details, including the environmental assessment of the proposed tunnels, were available.

Stanton Island will be a crane resort no more once the digging begins for the twin tunnels. Those tunnels are four stories high and, together, capable of moving water at the rate of 9000 cubic feet per second.

People, including the administration's water experts, have assumed for quite some time that Sierra Club has been officially opposed to the Delta tunnels. Make no mistake; we want something to be done to stop the Delta's ecosystem crash. It's the largest estuary along the west coast of North and South America. It's a

key link to environmental health in our state and beyond. But until very recently, despite our open criticism of the proposed project, we haven't taken a position.

We delayed taking a position because we wanted to see the details of the proposal for the tunnels and hoped for the best. More than a year ago, we listed seven key questions involving costs, timing, impacts and operations that need to be answered. In May of this year, most – but not all – of those questions were addressed in some form in volumes of documents that will ultimately make up the draft environmental impact report for the peripheral tunnels proposal.

The Club's process for policymaking is notoriously deliberate and often slow. But that's a good thing. Our volunteers take seriously the notion that every viewpoint needs to be aired, heard and considered. In July, after many, many months of conversation and debate – in person, on conference calls and via long email chains – the policymaking body of Sierra Club California, which includes representatives from every part of the state, voted to oppose the peripheral tunnels proposal.

There you have it. We are officially opposed to the proposal

to build two giant tunnels that will move water from the Sacramento River system, around the Delta, and to the south. We are taking this position because there is too much certainty that the tunnels will further degrade the Delta environment. There is too little certainty that it will solve the essential water supply problems all Californians face as we grapple with climate change.

That's all Californians. Too often, California's water supply issue has been framed as one of Northern California vs. Southern California. That framing is a devious way to distract likeminded Californians from solving our key problem: What do we need to do to help everyone in the state conserve a precious resource while enhancing the economy and protecting the environment?

There are a lot of answers to this question, and none of them include becoming more dependent

on exports through or around the Delta.

For instance, we all need to devote more resources to water conservation. That means going beyond low-flush toilets. We need industrial-scale improvements in water conservation, new investment in fixing the old, leaking infrastructure in our cities, and employing more and better recycling.

We need to make better, wiser use of farmlands. There are parts of the state where farmers ought to have a chance to farm solar productively in exchange for reducing their water demand for conventional crops.

We need to stop polluting the clean water we have. We need to clean up the groundwater supplies around the state that are not potable because of past pollution.

And we need to seriously consider water impacts when we decide as a society which industries we want to grow. Why are we even allowing fracking in this state when that activity is so heavily dependent on sucking up massive amounts of clean water, polluting it, and then casting it aside as waste?

These are just a few answers, but you get the idea.

As long as everyone in the water world stays focused on that old standby, the notion of creating a new way to move water around or through the Delta, Californians will be shortchanged. It's time for the state's water leaders to take a new tack. Abandon the costly peripheral tunnels and invest in the answers that we can all live with, that will make every region more sustainable, and will support all Californians.

One more thing: In addition to moving the tunnels, the latest proposal also calls for reducing their length from 35 miles to 30 miles. That's a good trend. Keep cutting and we'll be rid of that crazy peripheral tunnels idea for good.



Q. I'm not sure how much I'll have to pay for my vehicle registration and I'm trying to budget for it. Is there a way to find out how much I'll have to pay?

A. Yes. By going online https://mv.dmv.ca.gov/ at FeeCalculatorWeb/index.jsp,you will find a vehicle registration fee calculator which allows you to calculate an estimate of vehicle registration fees and determine Vehicle License Fees (VLF) for tax purposes. Additional calculators are also available for new purchases, vehicles from out of state, and renewals.

Q. I have recently noticed a lot of vehicles for sale in a vacant lot near the local business where I frequently shop; it looks terrible and is clogging the area with cars, traffic and trash. What can I do about reporting this nuisance?

A. You may be observing Curbstoningactivity, therepeated, unlicensed "flipping" of unsafe, used cars for profit. Curbstoners are unlicensed dealers who buy and sell vehicles without a license, proper permits or legally established place of business. Be suspicious of vehicles suddenly parked in undesignated areas. If you suspect wrongdoing you are encouraged to report the suspected unlicensed dealer activity (Curbstoners) to the Department's Investigations Division. Please complete the Record of Complaint Form (INV 172). Follow the directions for completing the form and mail it to an Investigations office in

your area, the address listing is included on the form: http:// apps.dmv.ca.gov/forms/inv/ inv172.pdf

Q. Is it legal to drill a camera into a California license plate? The camera would be pointed through the "o" in California. The hole would probably be about a 1-inch hole. The camera will be used as a backup camera. Our car audio shop usually installs them in the license plate frame, but this customer wants to put it in the license plate itself.

A. It's not legal because it constitutes tampering with a California license plate. It's against the law to tamper or obscureanyportionofaCalifornia license plate. And since we are on the subject of license plates, remember that California law requires all passenger vehicles to have a license plate in the back and another one in the front.

Q. I am frequently seeing Disabled Parking Placards being misused by drivers who are not disabled, but who use the placards that belong to someone else. Those drivers illegally use disabled parking locations and free metered parking spaces, thus making them unavailable to the individuals truly in need of these spaces. How do I report these individuals?

A. If you see or know of Disabled Parking Placard abuse, the DMV encourages you to report it. Try to obtain the license plate of the vehicle, the location of the incident, and a detailed description or picture of the driver. Follow the directions for completing the Record of Complaint Form (INV 172) and mail it to a DMV Investigations office in your area – see address listing on the form: http://apps. dmv.ca.gov/forms/inv/inv172. pdf

Interest License Plate ordering program allows you to request your plate choice, the department has the right to refuse any combination of letters and/or letters and numbers that may carry connotations offensive to good taste and decency, or which would be misleading or in conflict with any license plate series now issued. All plate orders go through a manual review process before plates will be manufactured.

One of the biggest reasons a plate configuration will be rejected, is customers substitute numbers for letters or vice versa. This is not allowed as it may be confused with an already existing plate. For example: IKIDDIE cannot be substituted for 1KIDDIE or vice versa.

O: I lost mv driver license? Do I need to return to a DMV field office to get a new one?

A: Yes, as part of the Department of Motor Vehicles' ongoing effort to protect your identity, an in-office visit is required. This is to ensure record security and protection against identity theft by verifying who is applying for the duplicate driver license. An important reminder, make an appointment before you visit the DMV. Save Time, Go Online. consistent. He doesn't miss very much," Lefty said.

A scenario generally includes shooting five rounds with each of two handguns, 10 rounds with your rifle and 10 with your shotgun, with multiple targets. There are a number of variables in each contest, and best time depends on the movement and shooting positions required. There are penalties for missing a target, and also procedural penalties.

"If you screw up and do them wrong, that's what they call a procedural," Pergande said. "You're penalized 10 seconds for that."

A missed target will add 5 seconds, and a safety issue, such as loading too many rounds in your rifle and having a live round left at the unloading table, would be a 10 second penalty. Safety is a primary consideration at every shoot.

Pergande has upgraded his weapons and now uses two single action revolvers, 1873 clones of the old Colts; an American Winchester 1873 rifle and a 12 gauge double-barrel shotgun, a coach gun

like the guards on the stagecoaches would carry.


Pergande's wife Jean supports her husband's interest and, in fact, the two have a ritual that they carry out before each competition. She pulls his ear lobe as a reminder, and says, "Take two and save five, no Ps, limpio, and have fun."

Translated into regular English it means for him to take two seconds to calm himself to avoid a five second penalty, no procedural errors, and shoot the match clean (limpio means clean in Spanish).

Now 76, he said that 2013 will be his last year on the circuit for a while since he will be having shoulder surgery and won't be able to compete immediately after.

While Pergande doesn't pretend to be in the Old West, he enjoys the action and the competition. Some competitors wear elaborate Old West gear, but Pergande's outfit is simple.

In Washington, Ideology Need Not Reign Supreme

As I speak to people about the Congress, one question arises more than any other: Why is Congress gridlocked? People are perplexed and disappointed with its performance, and are searching hard for an answer.

dysfunction are complex. But the fundamental reason is that differences in ideology real principles about both and government and governance exist among the voters. At heart, the reason it's become so hard for Washington to act is that the two parties are being driven by fundamentally incompatible views.

Conservatives place a heavy emphasis on liberty, individual freedom, and self-reliance. They have little confidence in government's ability to play a role in improving society or the economy, and many of them look upon government as destructive, a force that undermines our basic freedom. They are fearful of centralized power, opposed to redistribution of any kind, and opposed to new government programs — or even to improving existing government programs they'd rather see cut. They reject entirely the notion

The roots of Congress's of raising taxes or imposing no trouble with the notion of Americans find themselves new regulations on the private sector.

> Moreover, a belief has taken hold among some conservatives in recent years that compromise accommodation are and betravals of their cause. This has put great pressure on GOP leaders not to budge in their negotiations with the White House and Senate Democrats.

Meanwhile. on the "progressive" side—a label that has come to supplant "liberal," in part because Republicans in the 1980s and 1990s were so effective at demonizing liberals — there is much greater emphasis on using government to narrow economic disparities and help those at the bottom of the income scale. They emphasize its role in providing equality of opportunity for all and individuals' responsibility to the community around them. Because they have more confidence in government as a constructive force, they have

expanding government's scope to improve Americans' lives.

In fact, unlike conservatives, they think government can expand freedom when it's properly applied, by reining in the power of monied interests. While they do not favor a radical centralization of power in the federal government, as some conservatives charge, they are more willing to accept government action — and the legislative compromises that make it possible. Because they have less confidence in the market to solve all problems, they support both the taxes they believe necessary to run programs they like, and regulations to limit the private sector's more predatory impacts on the environment or society.

The gap between these views appears unbridgeable. It is not, nor are the differences between the two sides as wide as they appear.

is because most That

somewhere between the extremes, able to see merit in both conservative and progressive ideas. When I was in office, I often found myself thinking that many of my constituents were conservative, moderate, and liberal all at the same time. That hasn't changed. As a whole, Americans do not want excessive government or heavy-handed bureaucracy, but they do want programs that help them, like Social Security and Medicare. They are dedicated to both individual freedom and opportunity and to community obligation, and they don't see them as mutually contradictory. More than anything else, especially these days, they want to see moderation and cooperation from their political leaders.

There may be dysfunction in Washington, but the system can still work. When policy makers gather (I've seen this countless times) ideology

fades, pragmatism rises, and the question becomes. What can we do to fix the situation? That's where most Americans find themselves. They do not see government as evil, though they are often disappointed in its practice and its practitioners. They are wary of excessive government, but again and again they turn to government at some level to help solve the problems they complain about, and they want it to work effectively and efficiently.

In the end, Congress usually ends up about where most Americans are and want it to be. So I'm not surprised to find how, when dire problems confront them, both conservatives and progressives in Washington find their inner pragmatist.
