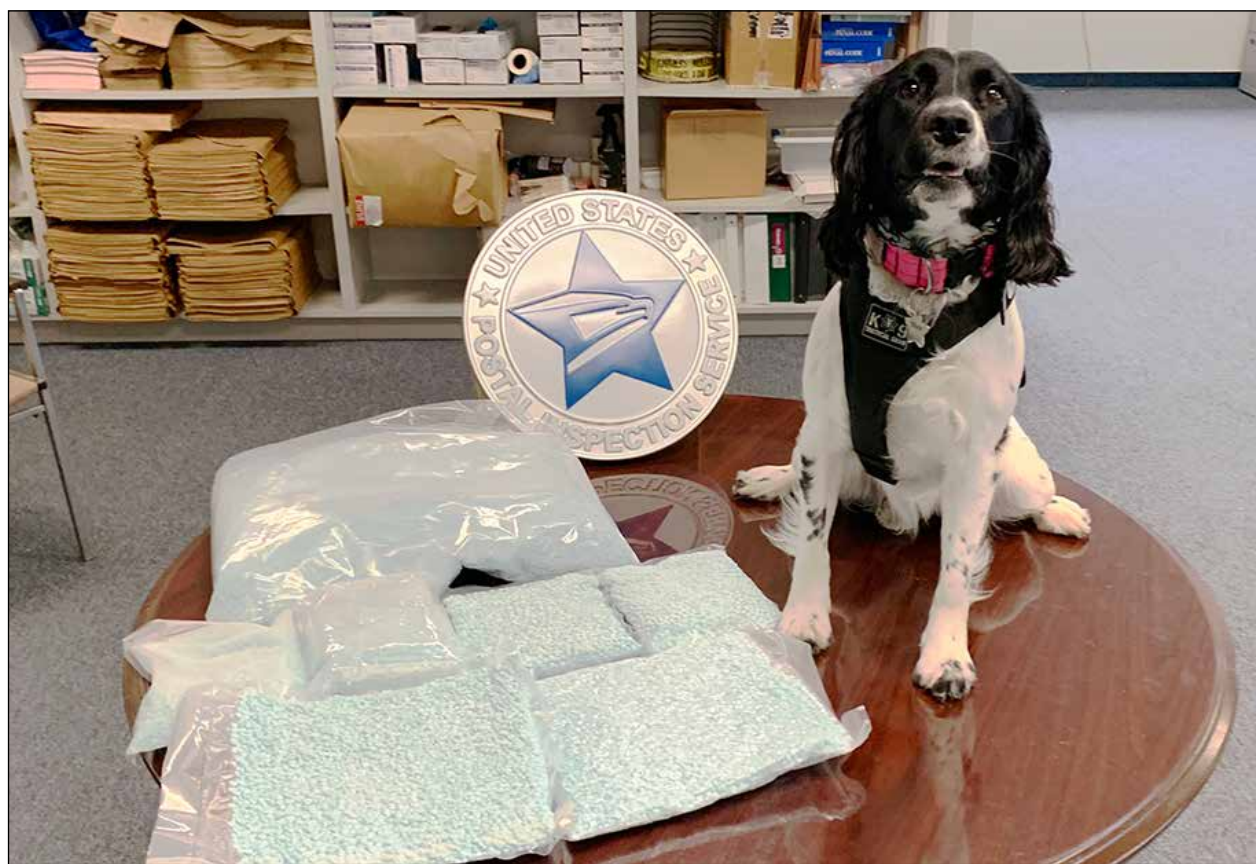

Meet Viva, the Newest Narcotics K9

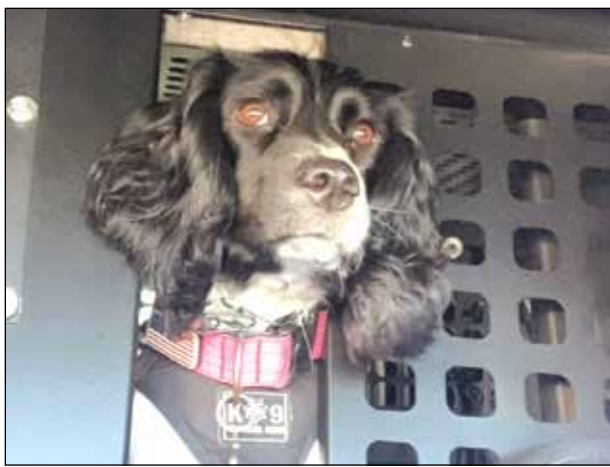


Viva poses with her first drug hit of fentanyl confiscated on January 3, 2023, related to a federal case. Photo courtesy of CHPD

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Viva is the newest Citrus Height Police Department (CHPD) K9 to work for the United States Postal Inspector Service (USPIS). Immediately following the retirement of K9 officer Farley, a black Labrador retriever, and his handler Detective Dave Moran, Viva began training to perform the invaluable service of keeping illegal drugs from reaching the streets of Sacramento and beyond.

Viva is an English springer spaniel imported from Wales, where her mother works as a cadaver dog. She was brought to Las Vegas, then Roseville before being purchased by the Citrus Heights Police

Department.

In order to have a swift transition between the work of Farley and Viva at the USPIS, Viva and her handler, Detective Emily Lombardo, immediately began training together. During an

intensive six-weeks, Viva was trained to sniff out and alert Officer Lombardo to marijuana, cocaine, heroin and methamphetamine. According to Lombardo, although not trained or certified for fentanyl, Viva has alerted her

to this drug under certain circumstances.

Viva and Lombardo received their official Peace Officer Standards and Training Commission (POST) certification as a team on November 29, 2022. This means Viva knows her job and her handler knows what she is doing at all times. Viva turned one year on December 29, 2022.

Viva is trained to sniff out and alert Lombardo to the scent of drugs on currency sent through the mail to pay for drugs smuggled from California. At the Sacramento USPIS office the team works to intercept all inbound parcels to prevent the movement of illegal drugs and other

Council Approves Assessments for Lighting and Landscape Districts

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG)

- At the July 27 meeting, the Citrus Heights City Council held Public Hearings for the approval of Landscape Maintenance Assessment Districts for Fiscal Year 2023/2024. The proposed resolution would fund maintenance of landscaping, trees, and other vegetation in front of residential parcels within the Assessment Districts 97-01 (Zone 1: Bridgmont; Zone 2: Heather Downs; Zone 3: Verner Glen/Summerhill; Zone 4: Villa CreekrIDGE), 98-01 (Stock Village), 98-02 (Zone 1: Sorenson Ranch; Zone 2: Autumnwood; Zone 3: Mariposa Creek; Zone 4: Wyatt Ranch), and 03-01 (Zone 1: Stock Ranch North; Zone 2: Stock Ranch South; Zone 3: Mitchell Farms). The assessments are collected as part of the property taxes paid for each parcel, ranging in costs from around \$40 per year up to almost \$800. Mariposa Creek pays the highest annual assessment at \$799.18 per year, and Villa CreekrIDGE pays the least at just \$42.50 per year.

Most of these Assessment Districts are currently fully funded by their annual assessments, so there is no fiscal impact to the General Fund for the continued landscape maintenance. However, there are two zones in Assessment District 97-01 in which the assessment fees do not cover the maintenance costs, and the City has to find other funding to fill that gap. In particular, the assessments for Villa CreekrIDGE subdivision off of Oak Avenue always has a shortfall in recent years. But the City cannot raise the assessments without a majority vote in agreement from the property owners, and three attempts by the City to gain those votes have been unsuccessful.

The budget shortfall for the Villa CreekrIDGE zone is estimated to be more than \$15,000 for the 2023/2024 fiscal year, with the City proposing to cover the cost through Gas Tax funding. Councilmember Karpinski-Costa said, "We have subsidized them to about \$125,000 over the years." And she said that she would rather see the Gas Tax funding actually going to road repairs, rather than putting the burden of beautifying these 111 parcels onto the rest of the taxpayers. "They don't want us to decrease the service, but they're not willing to pay." She suggested perhaps removing the landscaping and

New Starbucks Planned for Auburn Boulevard

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - A proposal to build a Starbucks café on three existing commercial parcels on 2.2 acres just inside Citrus Heights' northern boundary on Auburn Boulevard will rely on some future work the city is planning under its Auburn Boulevard Complete Streets project before it can proceed.

Individual business owners within the project area located south of the Auburn Boulevard and Whyte Avenue intersection near the city of Roseville are waiting to learn what the construction timeline will be.

The Citrus Heights Planning Commission approved plans on April 21 for the construction of a new 2,610-square-foot Starbucks at 8550

Auburn Boulevard.

The project's zoning designation for these three parcels is SPA - special planning area within the Auburn Boulevard Commercial (ABC) zoning district and also falls in the Gateway District Commercial Center.

Kevin Payne, a planning consultant who worked with city staff and the

project's applicant, led a presentation on April 21 to the city planning commission about the project.

Access to the new Starbucks café is by a single main driveway off Auburn Boulevard that is located at a new traffic signal intersection which is part of the "Auburn Complete Streets" plan, Payne explained. The main

entrance to the café faces east towards the parking lot, and the drive-thru lane will wrap the building with landscaping on either side.

The café design features a 400-square-foot uncovered exterior patio seating area. Other improvements include the removal of the existing parking lot, installation of new paved drive

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The newest members of the California Highway Patrol (CHP) were sworn in today during a graduation ceremony at the CHP Academy in West Sacramento. The 101 officers are part of the CHP's multiyear recruiting campaign to fill 1,000 vacant officer positions by hiring qualified individuals from California's diverse communities.

"I want to commend these men and women, not just for the hard work they put in the past several months while training at the Academy, but for their willingness to serve the public," said CHP Commissioner Sean Duryee. "These new officers are valued members of the CHP who are committed to improving safety in California for many years to come."

CHP Cadet Training Class I-23 is one of six cadet classes scheduled to attend the Academy in 2023. After completing 26 weeks of instruction at the CHP's live-in training facility, the newly sworn officers will

items, from the Fresno County line to the Oregon border, a distance of approximately 700 miles.

According to Lombardo this form of payment is "easy, inexpensive and can be done in relative anonymity."

Viva's search word to begin sniffing for drugs is "Jelly" and like Farley, whose search words were "Peanut Butter," she lives for her tennis ball reward.

As an example of the importance of the K9's part in fighting the drug war, the U.S. Attorney's Office, Eastern District of California put out a June 16, 2023 press release on a case in which Viva had a large part helping to solve. Following a joint investigation between the USPIS and six other federal and local agencies including the Sacramento, Folsom and Citrus Heights Police Departments, the 10-month investigation ended in the arrest of five Sacramento residents, thanks largely to the work of drug sniffing canines.

Included in the press release, "According to court documents, the conspirators shipped hundreds of thousands of fentanyl pills around the country for more than a year. On several occasions, law enforcement seized packages shipped by Miller, Jones, and their co-conspirators, and found fentanyl pills, often hidden inside children's toys. In total, law enforcement seized approximately 450,000 fentanyl pills connected to the conspiracy through seized shipments and search warrants. Based on additional evidence, law enforcement estimates that members of the conspiracy have shipped more than one million fentanyl pills to

customers in several different states".

For Viva's part, Lombardo related that since December 1, 2022, she has alerted to over \$550,000 in US Currency/suspected drug proceeds, over 31 pounds of fentanyl, 28 pounds of marijuana, 14 pounds of methamphetamine, 1.6 pounds of cocaine, 4 grams of MDMA and 2 grams of heroin.

While her day may be filled with chasing down narcotics, what makes it all worthwhile is chasing down and capturing her bright yellow tennis ball after every find. Finding drugs is her job, the tennis ball is her reward.

Lombardo shared in an email that she has been working at CHPD since 2006 and, along with Detective Dave Moranz, was one of the first officers hired. She moved here from Monterey County where she was a deputy sheriff for five years, including working patrol and corrections, just short of 22 years.

In an email, CHPD Police Chief Alex Turcotte said of the team, "Detective Lombardo and her K9 partner Viva have proven to be an invaluable asset to the United States Postal Inspector Service (USPIS). Their exceptional teamwork, dedication, and specialized skills have elevated our ability to safeguard the integrity of our nation's mail system. With their unwavering commitment to duty, I have full confidence in their ability to protect and serve, ensuring the safety and security of our postal service."

I am extremely proud to have detective Lombardo and Viva representing the Citrus Heights Police Department on the USPIS task Force. ★

replacing it with rock formations that wouldn't require ongoing monthly maintenance.

Mayor Tim Schaefer said, "That's really something to carefully consider how we move forward on this. Again, they have had an opportunity to increase this upon themselves to maintain that, but they refuse to do so."

Regina Cave, of the General Services Department, said that one of the biggest challenges for this specific zone is that it's a heavily renter-occupied neighborhood, so ballots for assessment increases are sent to the homes but the owners likely do not live on site. And she cautioned that while the Council could decide to decrease the landscaping services if those parcels are unwilling to pay the cost, but that decision "could have adverse impacts on our efforts to increase the beautification of the city" since those areas face the public right-of-way.

Vice Mayor Bret Daniels said it was "ludicrous" that the City would use Gas Tax funds to cover these costs: "I just don't see how it's fair to anybody." He agreed that Gas Tax funds should be used exclusively for road maintenance.

Cave explained that the Gas Tax funding can be used for other ancillary transportation costs, and historically it has been used for landscaping costs throughout the city: "We spend about \$20,000 a month just on basic maintenance of our landscape system utilizing Gas Tax funds, so this is not out of the norm to use it."

Mayor Schaefer suggested just sending a bill to the property owners for the actual cost per parcel and seeing if any of them pay it.

Councilmember Karpinski-Costa said she would rather see them vote for an increase, as the other districts have, because they understand that costs have increased over the years and so payments must increase to cover those services.

Mayor Schaefer pointed out that they haven't voted to approve an increase in any of the three previous attempts. He said, "If we just continue, if we adopt this and don't try anything new, we're never going to get anywhere."

Cave suggested that the Council could approve the current resolution for Fiscal year 2023/2024, and then before the next fiscal year, they could send a notice to the property owners to explain that the City cannot continue to cover the high cost, and encourage them to approve an increase on their

assessment fee—while also making it clear that without an increase, the City may have to remove the landscaping.

There were no public comments on this item, and the Council voted unanimously to approve the Landscape Maintenance Assessment Districts for the current fiscal year.

The Council then considered a resolution to approve the Citrus Heights Lighting District (CHLD) Assessments for Fiscal Year 2023/2024. The assessments are paid annually through property taxes to fund the operation and maintenance of streetlights and safety lights in the Citrus Heights Lighting District (CHLD), including the cost of electricity, replacement of bulbs, and repair and replacement of damaged light poles and other equipment. The costs are shared across all parcels in the city, but properties in neighborhoods with streetlights pay more—\$17.88, versus \$2.56 for properties without streetlights. Those assessment fees have remained unchanged since 1996 with the passage of Proposition 218, which requires a two-thirds vote of the people for an increase because it is considered a special tax.

Due to stagnant assessment fees, increasing costs for electricity, and ongoing costs for repairs to aging equipment, the proposed Fiscal Year 2023/2024 budget for CHLD Assessments has an expected shortfall of over \$132,000, which the City proposed to pay out of Measure A funds.

Vice Mayor Daniels said, "The number one job of government is public safety." Lights make cities safer, he said, so he wondered why the City hasn't found ways to secure funding to install streetlights in every neighborhood and levy a standard assessment for every property. "I wish we could find some energy to move in that direction," said Daniels.

Mayor Schaefer pointed out that some people don't want more streetlights in the city because they consider it to be light pollution. He said that it would cost millions of dollars to install streetlights throughout the city, which would require a tax measure to fund it, and he was not sure that many residents would vote to support that. "There needs to be some kind of balanced approach to this," he said.

There were no public comments on this item, and the Council voted unanimously to approve the Citrus Heights Lighting District Assessments for the current fiscal year.

The next City Council meeting is scheduled for August 10. ★

aisles and parking areas, construction of a drive-thru lane, concrete sidewalks, new landscaping and a new trash enclosure for each building.

According to a project narrative which was prepared by the architect McCandless & Associates of Woodland, Calif., café users will access the site from the parking lot and drive-thru lane. Some 38 parking spaces are included in the project that meets the city's minimum requirement for the proposed use.

Within the existing 6,840 square-foot multi-tenant commercial building built in 1960 is divided into two by a breezeway with a 1,447 square-foot structure on one side, that is occupied by Sam's Liquor and Food, and 5,263 square-foot portion which has four individual tenant spaces.

The location of a new Starbucks café may create competition for "Just Tea It," a distinctive family-owned boba tea shop which opened in the plaza in August 2019, its owners say.

"There will be an extended amount of time before any construction plans and/or timeline are known, but it's several months out," said Marisa Brown, CH city communications officer, describing the project's status on behalf of the city planning department.

A closed 106-square-foot Java Detour coffee kiosk and a substantial portion of an existing commercial building which houses Sam's Liquor and Food will be demolished, Brown said.

The other building with Waggin Tails and Just Tea It will remain, but the overall building will get a facelift,"

Brown said.

Waggin' Tails Doggie Day Care, next to the liquor store has undergone a change of ownership, according to former owner Andrea Cermak. "The new owners were scheduled to take over on July 16 from Cermak and will do business as "The Nature of Dogs." Neither a representative for the liquor store nor the owner of the new pet sitting business were available for comment.

According to construction plans, an existing open pet exercise yard already in use dog day care business will remain in place.

Brothers Jeffrey and Jason Liang, along with their parents, Jack and Amy signed a three-year lease in 2019 and opened Just Tea It in May of that year just across from the now shuttered Big Lots store on Auburn Boulevard.

The Liang family also owns and operates Aquarium Depot further down Auburn Boulevard in Citrus Heights.

"The site was quite an ugly duckling, a closed sandwich shop, but our family felt the location had a lot of promise, given what we know of the city's plans

for the redevelopment of Auburn Boulevard, and we decided to open," Jason Liang said.

Gray exterior paint featuring a large painted green leaf logo with the words "Just Tea It - Boba and More" entices customers who travel north on Auburn Boulevard.

Parents Jack and Amy had been in the restaurant business for over 30 years, and as a family, turned the ownership and day to day management of Aquarium and Reptile Depot to their two sons who continue to make the business thrive.

The family weathered the pandemic, reduced hours at Just Tea It for a time and closed off their dining area to help their business survive, Amy Liang said.

The shop's menu was reduced for a time, but milk tea and coffee, smoothies, fruit teas, slushies and a selection of Gunther's Ice Cream are served.

"It was rough going for a time during the pandemic, and we're drawing our regular customers back," she said. "It's very much wait and see to see if we can remain in business and thrive once this new Starbucks opens here." ★

California Voters Support Parental Rights by Overwhelming Margins

CHINO HILLS, CA (MPG) - In May 2023, Real Impact completed a Rasmussen Poll targeting California voters to uncover the true perspective of parents regarding public school districts' secretive habits. Educators keeping information regarding children's gender transitions from parents have exposed the reality of deception in public schools across California. Parents are beginning to realize that public schools will assume the role as parent, especially in districts where parents have been trusting or uninvolved.

According to the recent poll is a drastic revelation: 82% of respondents disagree with this statement: "A person loses their parental rights when a child enters public school." Parents are meant to work in tandem with the school district. "Public schools are certainly not meant to be a secret society for our youth to confide in and Californians agree," said Karen England, President of Capitol Resource Institute. "There is no reason teachers and administrators should hold higher authority over children's well-being or mental health. In fact, Californians do not believe educators should hold ANY authority over their children."

This leads to the next set of questions where 88% of respondents support schools notifying parents if their child has a change in mental condition, like showing symptoms of depression or suicidal thoughts. 69% of surveyors support schools notifying parents if their child identifies or requests to be identified or treated as a gender that doesn't align with their biological sex. And likewise, another question exposed that 68% of participants oppose teachers and school administrators keeping information about a child's gender identity secret from the parents. That is a huge majority. These questions

directly juxtapose educators attempting to vilify parents who have already come forward about the school district keeping gender transition secrets for their children. These polling numbers make it clear that most California parents strongly wish to be directly involved with their children's mental health and well-being during and after school hours.

Parents across California have been made aware of the lack of communication coming from educators and administrators in public school. According to this poll, a whopping 84% of surveyors support a local law that required parents to be notified of any major change in a child's physical, mental, or emotional health or academic performance. Parents have lost confidence in the safety of their children in the public-school setting and are looking to local policy changes to protect their rights as parents. The poll also finds that 64% of respondents disagree with this statement: "There is no such thing as someone else's child. Our nation's children are all our children."

"Parents are not willing to forgo parental rights over their children in any capacity," said England. "Our children do not belong to the nation. They belong to the parents and no educator or administrators should ever come before those rights."

That is why CRI has partnered with Real Impact and other pro-parental right organizations in California to affect change at the local level. The California Coalition for Parental Rights are all working together and launching a policy that will ensure schools notify a parent if their child is seeking to transition their gender while at school. Schools should not be in the business of keeping secrets from their parents.

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Lil' Bits Microgreens, a new Citrus Heights small business local food startup farm is delivering four varieties of fresh, nutrient-dense microgreens to their customers' doorsteps.

Owners Brice and Lorena Baxter started their business in January 2023 by offering four varieties of nutrient-dense microgreens originally by referral through their friends and through social media.

Business has "grown" steadily with delivery to a customer base in Fair Oaks, Orangevale, Citrus Heights, Roseville, Folsom, Rocklin, Granite Bay, Rancho Cordova, and Gold River. The couple is now looking to reach out to attract the commercial market, marketing their microgreens to local restaurants and grocers in the area.

"Microgreens are the earliest stage of a vegetable plant's development, after the sprouting stage," Baxter said. "They are 'living foods,' and purposefully utilized in their most nutritious and delicious state where their nutrient content is more concentrated."

Product choices of 60g of broccoli, 100g of sunflower, 100g of peas and 75g of crunchy mix cost \$6 each and are delivered in individually sealable containers.

"Our business name, Lil' Bits Microgreens not only represents our products but also embodies our passion for making nutrition accessible and enjoyable for everyone in our community," Baxter said. "Just like tiny, vibrant puzzle pieces, our microgreens contain an abundance of nutrition that form an essential part of a healthy lifestyle."

Customers select the type and quantity of microgreen they wish to order and provide their contact information. The couple then promptly responds by email to arrange terms payment and time of delivery.

"In that way, we can get started on growing each customer's special order, so it's ready, when you're ready, she said. Single orders without a weekly subscription can also be placed. All orders over \$20 get free delivery.

"As avid proponents of health and wellness, our journey into the world of microgreens began with a unique combination of backgrounds in economics, nursing, and senior care," Baxter said.

"We witnessed the transformative power of raw vegetables on the health of seniors, and we were inspired to take action and create a business that could positively impact the well-being of our local community." Researchers say a diet

Defendant Sentenced for Rape by Force, Rape of Unconscious Person

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On June 23, 2023, the Honorable Ernest Sawtelle sentenced Andrey Prudnikov to 12 years in prison. On May 1, 2023, a jury convicted Prudnikov of the rape of an unconscious person and rape by force.

On May 21, 2020, the then 19-year-old victim was asleep on a couch at a friend's house when her group of friends went out to get firewood for the firepit. One of the friend's brother, Andrey Prudnikov, lived at the house and was alone with the victim. The victim woke up when she felt someone on top of her and touching her sexually. When the victim began to

comprehend what has happening, she realized she was being raped by Prudnikov. The victim was able to push Prudnikov off of her and run for help. Prudnikov fled the area, but he was caught approximately one month later. DNA evidence linked Prudnikov to the sexual assault. Prudnikov committed the acts with sophistication and planning by locking the doors to the house to prevent anyone from walking in and closing the shades to hide what he was doing.

The aggravating factor that the victim was particularly vulnerable was found true based on the facts that the victim felt she could trust the people in the house, felt safe while she slept and was asleep when the rape began. ★

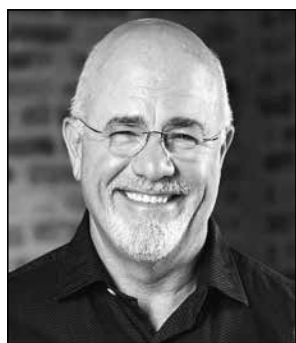

I'm a widow, and I retired recently. My husband took care of most of our finances. We never had any debt, but after my husband died and I started learning a little bit more about how money works, I'm concerned too much of it may be invested in CDs. The total nest egg is a little over \$1.5 million, with \$300,000 of that in CDs. There's also a \$317,000 annuity, a 403(b) and around \$900,000 in IRA mutual funds. I want to learn even more about financial matters, so how do you think I should handle things going forward?

(Certificates of Deposit) give you stability, if nothing else. They're generally considered a safe, low-risk investment, but they don't really give you the best bang for your bucks. So, with all this money in different areas, you're definitely diversified.

In my mind, it's just a matter now of wrapping your arms around it all and developing a deeper understanding of things going forward. I'd urge you to find an investment professional in your area with the heart of a teacher. I'm talking about someone who wants to help people, and is interested in more than just making money off fees or commissions.

It sounds like you understand the value of learning about this stuff, and I'm really impressed by that. It's a smart and necessary thing. From here on

out, every time you see an investment person—whatever it may be—your goal should be to leave the room smarter, and with more financial understanding, than you had before.

Naomi, I'm truly sorry about your husband. But you two did an amazing job with your finances over the years. You're worth well over \$1.5 million, and you have no debt. So, you're basically set for life.

Be wise, and be careful, Naomi. God bless you!

Governor Signs Bill to Strengthen Domestic Violence Restraining Orders

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Governor Gavin Newsom recently signed into law Assembly Bill (AB) 467, a bipartisan measure authored by Assemblymember Jesse Gabriel (D - Encino) that will strengthen the ability of judges to grant and modify domestic violence protective orders.

"At a time in which violence against women and domestic abuse have increased to record levels around the world, it is crucial that we ensure domestic violence restraining orders are offering the fullest possible protection," said Assemblymember Gabriel. "This legislation will clarify a judge's authority over these orders, and extend the amount of time a court can modify the orders to ensure that we are providing ample protection to victims of domestic abuse."

Santa Clara County District Attorney Jeff Rosen, sponsor of the bill, hailed the new law as crucial to make sure that victims of crime can petition the court to change the terms of restraining orders during the 10-year lifetime of those orders. In some instances, victims will need more protections from the court, and in others fewer. District Attorney Rosen said, "Giving judges the ability to modify

their own court orders will help victims of domestic violence manage the protections to keep them safe. We are so grateful to Assemblymember Jesse Gabriel for championing this important new law."

Ambiguity in current law has left some courts confused as to when and for how long they have authority over domestic violence restraining orders and when they can modify provisions related to contact between the restrained person and the protected person, which can either be a "peaceful contact order" (PCO) or a no contact order (NCO). Victims often seek to modify the order from PCO to NCO or vice versa.

Some courts have determined that if the defendant is no longer serving a sentence and is not on probation, they do not have the jurisdiction to modify the order, even if both the victim and defendant request it. This confusion in current law is detrimental to both victims and defendants. AB 467 gives sentencing courts the authority to modify the terms of a peaceful contact order or no contact order and make modifications to the order throughout the duration of the domestic violence protective order.

Two Fatal, Fentanyl Related Overdoses Reported in North Sacramento

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On Friday, July 21, 2023, the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office responded to two assist calls for service with the Sacramento Metro Fire Department in the northern part of Sacramento County. The first incident occurred at approximately 9:10 AM, where Sheriff's North Patrol Deputies responded near the 3600 block of Elkhorn Boulevard to assist with a 46-year-old male lying unresponsive behind a business. Fire personnel arrived on scene and conducted life-saving measures; unfortunately, he was

pronounced deceased on scene.

The second incident occurred at approximately 1:15 PM, where Deputies responded to a location near the 7400 block of Watt Avenue to assist with a 16-year-old male juvenile lying unresponsive behind a dumpster. Fire personnel arrived on scene and again conducted life-saving measures; unfortunately, he was also pronounced deceased on scene.

Both cases appear to be fentanyl overdoses. The Sacramento County Coroner's Office will determine the cause of death in both incidents and forward its findings as prescribed by law. They will also release the names of the deceased after notification has been made to his next of kin. ★

County Transportation Funding Experiences Boost

Sacramento County News Release

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - So far 2023 has been an excellent year for Sacramento County transportation efforts as many area projects have found needed funding to keep moving forward. This year, nearly \$100 million is earmarked to improve roads, provide neighborhoods access for those who walk and bike, and build electric vehicle charging stations at Sacramento International Airport.

The 2023 funding from the California Transportation Commission (CTC) and the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG) will help pay for parts of ten different projects within the County. The awards were given to a mixture of individual projects and joint efforts between agencies.

California Transportation Commission Awards - \$70,038,000

Local Partnership Program - US 50 Gold Line Corridor Enhancement Project - \$25M - SacDOT joint grant with SacRT. Project Summary - SacDOT will receive \$15 million to go toward making improvements at the Hazel Avenue and Aerojet Road interchanges with Highway 50. Sacramento Regional Transit (SacRT) will receive \$10 million for improvements along the Light Rail's Gold Line;

Trade Corridor Enhancement Program - Sacramento County WattEV Innovative Freight Terminal Project - \$33.6M - Airport. Project Summary - The largest award in the area will allow the Sacramento County WattEV Innovative Freight Terminal (SWIFT) to build a publicly accessible electric vehicle (EV) charging facility on a 118-acre parcel of land in south of Interstate 5 and immediately south of Sacramento International Airport;

Trade Corridor Enhancement Program - Grant Line Road Safety and Freight Mobility Project - \$3M - Capital SouthEast Connector JPA. Project Summary - The Grant Line Road Safety and Freight Mobility Project (Project) is a rural freight improvement project in eastern Sacramento County. The funds will go toward the ultimate transformation of 2.6-miles of Grant Line Road from a narrow, two-lane rural road into to a divided four-lane roadway with a separated multi-use path from Douglas Road to White Rock Road. The Project modifies the existing signals at the Grant Line Road intersections with White Rock Road and Douglas Road and adds a new signalized intersection at Raymer Way;

Active Transportation Program - Stockton Boulevard Bicycle and Pedestrian Project - \$363,000 - SacDOT. Project Summary - The County requested funding for Project Approval and Environmental Document to evaluate the feasibility of a Class IV separated bikeway, sidewalk infill, and signalization of one intersection along Stockton Boulevard between Florin Road and Mack Road/Elsie Avenue in South Sacramento County;

Active Transportation Program - Elkhorn Boulevard Complete Streets - \$8.075M - SacDOT. Project Summary - Construct a Class IV separated bikeway on Elkhorn Boulevard from Watt Avenue to Don Julio Boulevard, sidewalk infill, ADA improvements, and implement Safe Routes to Schools and community education and encouragement programs in the North Highlands neighborhood.

SACOG Awards - \$24,876,000

Revolving Match - US 50 Gold Line Corridor Enhancement Project - \$4M

contingent on receiving CTC award above - SacDOT joint grant with SacRT;

Community Design - Arden Way Phase 1 and 2 - \$1M plus a \$458,000 SGIP match - SacDOT. Project Summary - In Sacramento County, on Alta Arden Expressway from Howe Avenue to Fulton Avenue. The project will include sidewalk gap closures, buffered bike lanes, and pavement resurfacing;

Maintenance and Modernization - Alta Arden Expressway Phase 1 - \$4M - SacDOT. Project Summary - In Sacramento County, on Alta Arden Expressway from Howe Avenue to Fulton Avenue. The project will include sidewalk gap closures, buffered bike lanes, and pavement resurfacing;

Transformative - Jackson and Bradshaw Safe and Rural Connections - \$3M - SacDOT - Project Summary - The Project is intended to provide operational and safety improvements at the intersection of Jackson Road and Bradshaw Road in Sacramento County. The project would add a travel lane and turn lanes at the intersection;

Transformative - Stockton Boulevard Multimodal Partnership and BRT Corridor - \$5.2M - Joint grant with City of Sacramento, SacDOT, and SacRT. Project Summary - In Sacramento (City and County), on Stockton Boulevard, from Florin Road to Alhambra Boulevard: Multi-modal and safety improvements, including bus lanes and/or other transit enhancements, bicycle lanes, and pedestrian upgrades. The project will also include an alternatives analysis phase for the bus rapid transit (BRT) and BRT-lite treatments along the longer Sacramento Regional Transit District's Route 51 alignment between South Sacramento and the Sacramento Valley Station, which includes Stockton Boulevard (between Florin Road and Broadway), Broadway (between Stockton Boulevard and 8th Street), and segments of 7th, 8th and 9th Streets;

Regional Active Transportation Program - Bell Street Safe Routes to School - \$8.676M - SacDOT. Project Summary - Construction of approximately 12,500 linear feet of sidewalk infill along various segments of Bell Street between Edison Avenue and Hurley Way in the West Arden community, including a segment on 2419 Wyda Way. Construction and reconstruction of new curb ramps and extensions, traffic signal modifications, a new pedestrian signal, a new Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon, striping and re-striping bicycle lanes, and new bicycle detectors will also be implemented at four intersections along Bell Street where they do not currently exist. The non-infrastructure element includes education and outreach to students and parents of the nearby schools on pedestrian, bicyclist, and motorist safety.

The funding windfall will not only boost local transportation projects but help pave the way for future housing and building projects, which rely on roads being built before that construction can begin. The Building Industry Association and construction community are expected to benefit from these projects with more job opportunities in the future.

Construction of these projects will start to come to life over the next few years. Each grant will not pay for the entire project, as many funding sources are sought to offset the construction, but these dollars are expected to push the projects forward to allow a much-needed boost to improving the County's transportation infrastructure. ★

California's 63-Year-Old Higher Education Plan Could Use A Reality Check

As California's population exploded in the 1950s and 1960s - surpassing New York to become the nation's most populous state in 1962 - its political leaders responded with sweeping plans to satisfy burgeoning demands for public services.

New freeway routes were plotted to carry millions of additional cars. State and local bond issues were drafted to build schools for the baby boom. New dams and canals were designed to increase water supplies. And, a master plan was written to unify California's colleges and universities.

Six decades later, California's population is nearly three times larger, but stalled at just under 40 million and has been declining slowly.

Many of those once-planned freeways never got past the planning stage, public school enrollment is declining, the California Water Plan has mostly been built (but still has a bottleneck in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta), and the much-vaunted Master Plan for Higher Education remains on the books but never achieved the seamless pathway to low-cost, universal student access it envisioned.

While the demand for higher education is huge, and while the state's

economy rests on having a highly trained and educated workforce, the state's three collegiate systems - the University of California, California State University and more than 100 locally managed community colleges - remain more competitive than cooperative.

If anything, friction among the systems has been increasing as they squabble over academic turf and compete for financing in a state budget that struggles to pay for all of its spending.

The 1960-vintage master plan, whose two political fathers were UC's legendary president, Clark Kerr, and then-Gov. Pat Brown, delineated the roles that all three would play.

UC would be the state's premier research institution while providing high-intensity undergraduate and graduate educations, with degrees up to doctorates. CSU would educate teachers, engineers and other professionals and offer both baccalaureate and master's degrees. Community colleges would provide two-year associate degrees, prepare students for transfer to four-year schools and also offer job-oriented, sub-professional training.

Demands from students that outstripped supply and budgetary pressures have eroded the demarcation lines. Community colleges have begun offering some limited baccalaureate degrees, encountering stiff opposition from the state university system, while state universities have sought, with some success, to award doctorates, thereby encroaching on UC's jealously guarded turf.

Virtually every legislative session is marked by at

least one conflict over competing ambitions of the three levels. One current measure, Assembly Bill 656, which has passed the Assembly and is pending in the Senate, would give CSU broad new authority to award doctorates.

Meanwhile, there has been constant friction over the transfer of credits from one level to another, with community college graduates often frustrated about gaining admission to four-year schools, despite the master plan's promise.

Although there's an official goal of boosting the number of community college students transferring to four-year schools from 89,000 to more than 120,000 by 2022, a year later fewer than 100,000 were making the transition, CalMatters recently reported.

"Of the students enrolled in a community college in California who said they wanted to transfer to a four-year university, an average of 9.9% went on to enroll at a four-year institution in 2021, the most recent data available," reporters Adam Echelman and Erica Yee found.

UC is opposing a measure, Assembly Bill 1749, that would make transfers easier.

These two situations - competition for degree authority and the difficulty community college students face in transferring - indicate once again that the Master Plan for Higher Education is broken. If it's worthwhile having such a plan, it should be worthwhile to make it relevant to 21st-century realities, not 1960s theories.

Next Phase of Recycled Water Begins for California

State Water Resources Control Board News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Achieving a major milestone in the state's efforts to maximize the potential of recycled water, the State Water Resources Control Board announced on July 11, 2023, proposed regulations that would allow for water systems to add wastewater that has been treated to levels meeting or exceeding all drinking water standards to their potable supplies. The process, known as direct potable reuse, will enable systems to generate a climate-resilient water source while reducing the amount of wastewater they release to rivers and the ocean.

Gov. Newsom's all-of-the-above Water Supply Strategy, which includes the goal of recycling and reusing at least 800,000 acre-feet of water per year by 2030.

This turning point in California's history with recycled water, which began in the mid-20th century with the use of recycled water for crops, comes after an expert panel of 12 scientists and engineers evaluated work by the State Water Board's Division of Drinking Water and determined that the proposed regulations are protective of public health. The regulations are the most advanced in the nation and reinforce California's position as a leader of innovative solutions to climate challenges. They are now open for public comment

and subject to revision based on that input.

"This moment has been some time in the making because we have been careful and thorough to produce regulations that ensure, down to a chemical level, that water treated to these standards will be pure and wholesome," said Darrin Polhemus, deputy director for the Division of Drinking Water. "In fact, the extensive treatment requirements we've proposed mean that direct potable reuse processes in California will produce water of higher quality and lower risk than many traditional drinking water sources."

Direct potable reuse relies entirely on immediate, multi-barrier treatment that can recycle wastewater to drinking water

standards in a matter of hours. This contrasts to the method currently being deployed in major projects launched throughout the state, called indirect potable reuse, which further improves treated wastewater over time through groundwater recharge or dilution with surface water. While no formal direct potable reuse projects can be initiated in California until the regulations are adopted, water agencies in Santa Clara, San Diego and the city of Los Angeles have launched pilot projects in recent years.

"We've seen real enthusiasm and interest from major urban water agencies, who are the ones that will take direct potable reuse forward, adding it to their water supply portfolios to increase

resiliency," added Polhemus. "California has been a leader for years in water recycling, and this last step—going directly from treatment to usage as drinking water—builds on that experience and the expertise of scientists and engineers who have worked with recycled water for many years."

The board will consider adoption of the regulations before the end of the year.

The State Water Board's mission is to preserve, enhance and restore the quality of California's water resources and drinking water for the protection of the environment, public health, and all beneficial uses, and to ensure proper resource allocation and efficient use for present and future generations. ★

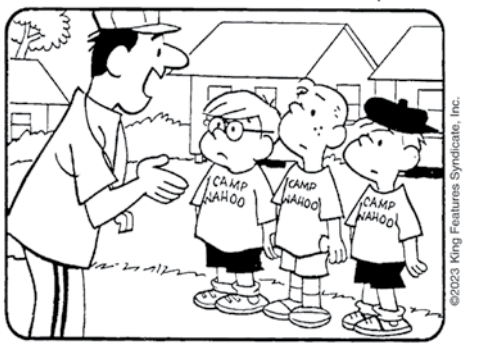

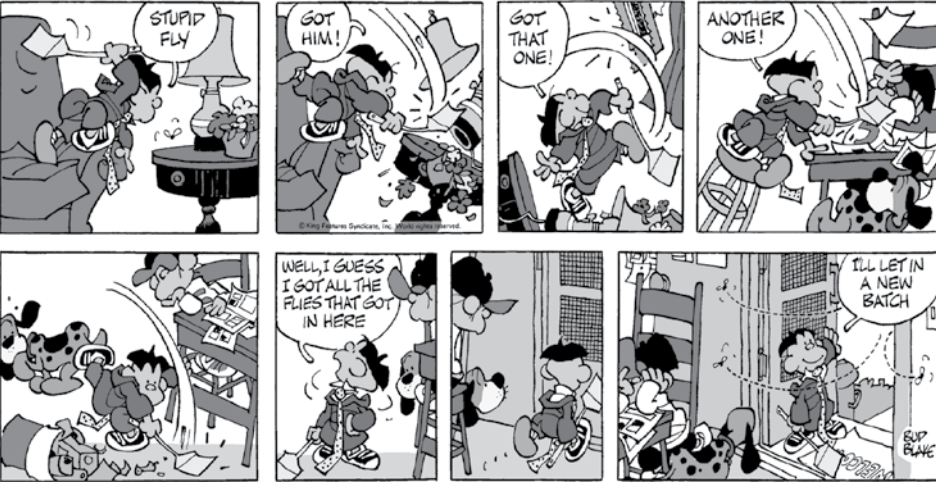

Medicaid Enrollment to Plummet. What Beneficiaries Need to Know

Millions of Americans will soon lose Medicaid coverage, as some pandemic-era provisions that kept people continuously enrolled in the program expire.

But those who find themselves newly ineligible for Medicaid have plenty of other options for affordable coverage. Licensed, professional agents and brokers can ensure they secure health plans that meet their needs and budget.

The looming exodus from Medicaid is a product of the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, which Congress passed in March 2020. It offered additional federal funding for Medicaid as long as states did not disenroll anyone from the program for the duration of the public health emergency.

This continuous coverage provision, and the enhanced federal funding, swelled Medicaid's rolls. Total enrollment in December 2022 was 85 million – up from approximately 64 million in February 2020.

This past December, Congress gave states the green light to review the eligibility status of people enrolled in their Medicaid programs beginning in April. States have 12 months to return to "normal," pre-pandemic eligibility and enrollment rules.

The federal government will gradually scale back the extra Medicaid

dollars it has been sending to the states – until that enhanced match disappears entirely at the end of this year.

As a result, millions of people may have to find new health plans. The Department of Health and Human Services estimates that up to 15 million people may lose Medicaid and CHIP coverage.

About 45% of this group – 6.8 million people – will likely remain eligible for Medicaid. They'll just need to reconfirm their eligibility for the program with their state Medicaid agency. Many beneficiaries are unaware of this requirement. They may ignore phone calls or letters from the state seeking to verify their eligibility. Or they may have moved and neglected to update their address with the state. In the end, they can be purged from Medicaid without knowing.

About 8.2 million Medicaid enrollees will need to find replacement coverage. Many will be able to do so through work. HHS projects that about 5 million will migrate from Medicaid to employer-sponsored insurance.

Another 2.7 million will likely be able to get subsidized coverage through the Affordable Care Act's exchanges. More than 60% of that group, HHS estimates, could qualify for zero-premium plans.

Of course, it can be difficult to wade through all

the insurance options on the exchanges – or to figure out how to confirm eligibility for Medicaid.

Licensed, professional agents and brokers can help these millions of folks weigh their health insurance options. They have the knowledge and expertise to assist people with re-enrolling in Medicaid, if eligible – or to claim all the subsidies to which they may be entitled through the exchanges. Better yet, their services are generally free for consumers.

According to the most recent data from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services,

agents and brokers account for 71% of exchange enrollees. Consumers find their advice extremely valuable. A study from the Urban Institute found that 80% of adults who received external information about the exchanges said insurance agents and brokers were more helpful than other resources.

As states begin to cull their Medicaid rolls, it's critical that those who have relied on the program over the last few years understand all the affordable health insurance options that remain available to them. Agents and brokers can ensure that they do.
