County **Receives** \$43 Million **Bridge Housing Award**

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The State Department of Health Care Services announced that Sacramento County Behavioral Health Services (BHS) will be awarded more than \$43 million in Behavioral Health Bridge Housing (BHBH) funds to support its continued efforts to address homelessness and improve the lives of individuals living with serious mental illness and experiencing housing instability. With the award of this State funding, County BHS is set to expand interim housing options as an important resource along the continuum to permanent supportive housing to accommodate the growing need for supportive housing and mental health services.

The BHBH award will enable Sacramento County BHS to expand interim housing by adding 110 beds across three Safe Stay communities. This Countysanctioned bridge housing will provide individuals experiencing homelessness with a safe and supportive environment to stabilize their health and safety. Additionally, the funding will facilitate the development or renovation of shovel-ready projects for another 100 beds, including renovated hotels, board and care homes, and sober living facilities. These clean and well-maintained sites will offer on-site supportive services to help individuals transition towards permanent housing.

Bridge housing funds will support individuals in the target population of the Community Assistance, Recovery, a n d Empowerment (CARE) Act who are experiencing homelessness, have serious mental illness, and/ or substance use disorder. The range of services provided will encompass care coordination to enhance both mental and physical well-being, the development of essential life skills, the promotion of income growth, and the facilitation of vocational/educational opportunities and skills. The ultimate objective is to assist participants in transitioning to permanent housing within a ninemonth timeframe.

California Capital Airshow Flies Back at Mather

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The popular California Capital Airshow is back at Mather this September, featuring the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds as its headlining act. The airshow was founded in 2014 and, with the exception of a pause for COVID-19, has been entertaining enthusiasts annually with a variety of modern and historic planes.

This year's airshow is happening on Saturday, September 23 and Sunday, September 24. Admission costs are \$40-\$50 per ticket, but each ticket comes with up to 6 free admissions for youth aged 15 and younger, making it a reasonable deal for entire families who want to enjoy the marvels of air travel and military planes. Tickets are valid for only one day of the airshow, with most acts performing on both days.

Unlike prior years, 2023 tickets are only available online. There will be no onsite sales, and space is limited for both general and VIP ticketing options. High-end tickets used to include a grandstand and bleacher option, but this year has been converted into a new location called The Hangar. This brand-new chalet offers both indoor and outdoor seating areas along the front line of the shows, and also includes private restroom access, beer tasting, and access to food truck purchases. Those willing to spend more can also join the Flight Line and Capital clubs, both of which provide catered food and beverages, as well as premium seating areas.

If you're attending the show on a budget, don't worry. While you must find your own seating, there are plenty of perks to still enjoy both on the ground and by gazing up at the sky. Ground level entertainment this year includes vintage combat aircraft and trainers including warbirds that date back to the 1930s. Beale Airforce Base will also be represented at the show, bringing a Lockheed U-2 'Dragon Lady' and T-38 Talons to admire. Children and families will enjoy the opportunity to walk through a large military transport plane as well as the impressively large cargo holds of the FedEx and UPS planes parked onsite. Lastly, public safety workers and first responders will be interacting with guests, teaching young guests how planes and helicopters are used to save lives.

While there's certainly a lot to do on the ground, the real show is overhead. The airshow features both individual plane hobbyists and professional fighter jet pilots This year's headliner, the United States Air Force Thunderbirds, will roar through the sky in their F-16 Fighting Falcon jets. Their close formations are captivating but new airshow attendees be warned

- these planes get loud. Consider bringing noise-canceling headphones for young viewers as well as those of any age that are sensitive to

The rest of the airshow lineup includes the US Air Force C-17 Globemaster III Demonstration Team, a US Navy F/A-18 Super Hornet TacDemo, a US Air Force A-10 Thunderbolt II, a 1920s-era Barnstormer, and stunt flyer Jim Peitz in a rare Beechcraft F33C

The California Capital Airshow is meticulously organized in order to successfully welcome thousands of guests each year but is also powered strongly by volunteers. Adults aged 18 and older are invited to join in on the fun of volunteering.

"Airshow volunteers play a vital role in supporting CCA's mission to inspire young people using the power and magic of flight," says Darcy Brewer, Executive Director of California Capital Airshow. "They build a great deal of community around this, all while experiencing the behind the-scenes excitement of producing a massive event."

Volunteers run booths, direct parking, provide information to guests, and so much more. All volunteers receive food vouchers and a commemorative airshow crew t-shirt. Both individuals and groups volunteer each year, but not always without a bit of controversy. The airshow committee actively recruits non-profit groups to raise funds for their own causes by working the parking lot on both Saturday and Sunday. The non-profits receive \$45 per day, per volunteer. The shifts are 11 hours long and no split shifts are permitted.

Tonia Clark was one to call out the airshow on social media. In responding to a recent post asking for non-profit help she said, "That's less than \$5 hour...while it is great that you're helping nonprofits, it appears that it is a pretty good deal for the airshow, considering minimum wage is \$15.50/hr. Are you helping nonprofits or taking advantage of them?"

The airshow has publicly responded in the past, reminding critics that they themselves are a non-profit and are doing what they can to give back to the community, including the aforementioned funds disbursement and also a scholarship program.

Overall, the California Capital Airshow is a quality outing for all ages. Consider coming out and exploring the world of aviation and air defense. But bring your sunscreen and hats, as the warm Sacramento sun will likely be in attendance, too. Tickets can be purchased at californiacapitalairshow.com.

Continued from page 1 Marching Band (CHCMB) executive director, and a retired construction superintendent who has over 50 years of experience in the residential and commercial construction industries, designed and will then build the massive outdoor stage at Rusch Park in Citrus Heights.

He was on hand to answer questions and provide additional information about the project which will be dedicated in the memory of his late wife, Kathy Cook, who was the founder of the Citrus Heights Community Marching Band.

Sunrise Recreation and Park District hired Helix Environmental to conduct an approximately \$30K feasibility study for the project.

"This feasibility study is just one of the factors that the District's Advisory Board will use to determine if it can move forward with adding an amphitheater to Rusch Park," Edmundson said.

The CHCMB was created by Kathy Cook in 2005 to serve as entertainment for the Annual Citrus Heights Red, White and Blue Parade until its final parade in 2019. The community band grew into a year-round, all ages, all talents performing arts experience which performs 20 times a year in events such as parades, concerts, sports events and band competitions. She passed away on August. 25, 2021.

Project construction will also include resurfacing and restriping the existing parking lot on the west end of Rusch Park and raising

the height of baseball field fencing for public safety, Edmundson said.

The new amphitheater, similar in purpose to the public band shell in Carmichael Park, will be approximately twice its size. It will be available for a wide variety of events, including live concerts, weddings, theater productions, rentals, and other public uses.

Cook, who said he preferred design option one, said the new Kathy Cook Amphitheater, when built, would help bring increased business and restaurant traffic to the city of Citrus Heights.

"It will be great for the city and people of the city," he said.

"We will also be repaving the parking lot behind Rusch home off of Rusch Drive and Rosswood Drive, which will help with parking," Cook said. "Also, with the increase of patrons using ride-sharing

services, that will leave more parking spaces open for those who decide to drive there."

CHCMB is accepting donations towards the overall cost of construction. To raise funds, the band is selling commemorative, personalized bricks that start at \$100 each.

"There's ample space for at least 200 bricks to be placed on either side of the front of the stage," Bill Cook said. "We plan to create two walking paths which connect the existing sidewalks to each side of the amphitheater, and we will also be lining the front of the stage and inner walls with bricks."

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Students from Cordova, Mesa and Rio Linda high schools recently rolled up their sleeves to make a difference for single moms and their kids

this summer.

The students, part of SAFE Credit Union's annual corporate summer internship program, painted classrooms and sorted donations for Single Mom Strong at their Single Mom's Empowerment Center in Citrus Heights.

"We are a very small team with a large mission," says Single Mom Strong founder and Executive Director Tara Taylor. "Community support like this makes all the world of difference to us."

The Empowerment Center, home to Single Mom Strong's EmpowerME Preschool & Childcare programs, provides discounted, high-quality preschool and childcare that specifically meets the needs of children

of single parents.

SAFE's corporate internship program gives area high school students a behind-the-scenes look at the credit union's operations while providing hands-on job and job-seeking skills. Each year advisors arrange for the interns to volunteer, instilling the importance of corporate citizenship.

"Our internship program strives to teach interns not only about our day-to-day and back-office operations but to also provide them with a big picture of what it means to work for a socially responsible company," says SAFE Credit Union Financial Educator Savannah Brown.

Mesa Verde High School senior and intern Nicole Vasques says her internship has been a great opportunity and is thankful volunteering is part of the program. "I think it's nice giving back to the community too," she says. "It's great to know we are here to help single parents."

The students spruced up the organization's two heavily used preschool and pre-K classrooms. The rooms provide space for up to 27 children each day and students enrolled in summer camps.

"We have 3- to 4- and 5-year-olds playing and running around all day, so clearly the walls get dirty," Taylor says. "We are really grateful to have the students come here to make sure the rooms stay warm and inviting. This makes such a huge difference."

Rio Linda High School Senior Jaiden Domingo says he enjoyed how the internship gave "a chance for us to give back to the community."

"More companies should give back," he says.

Danielle Yeater a senior at Cordova High School, said the opportunity to help out at the facility "shows that SAFE is a good company willing to get people out to volunteer."

At the Empowerment Center, Single Mom Strong serves nearly 800 local single mothers by hosting community events to create connections, providing life and career coaching, and disseminating free professional clothing.

During their twoweek SAFE internship held through Friday, students learn about banking principles, receive resume-building guidance and engage in mock interviews and ice breaker practice sessions. They learn about marketing from professionals and this year will create a group marketing project for SAFE's three high school student-run branches, also at Cordova, Mesa and Rio Linda high schools. The interns will go on to work in the student-run branches this coming school year.

Mesa Verde High School Senior Nohemy Garcia says she mostly valued learning about the interview process during her internship including, to "not to be someone else. Show your own personality."

The nonprofit Single Mom Strong began supporting single parents seven years ago, opening its Single Mom Empowerment Center five years ago. "We believe high quality childcare and early childhood education should be available even on a single budget income," says Taylor.

Citrus Heights Arts Seeks to Enrich Culture Arts

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Citrus Heights Arts, a local non-profit organization, is actively working towards promoting and supporting the cultural arts in the city and the surrounding area.

Its director and founder, Gigi Rayford, mother of Citrus Heights city council member Porsche Middleton, describes its overall mission to "enrich the cultural life by providing opportunities for individuals of all ages and backgrounds to engage with the arts."

Rayford sees a thriving cross-generational local arts scene in Citrus Heights which needs more opportunities to come together and thrive.

Citrus Heights Arts was founded in 2016 and continues to host monthly events at the Sylvan Community Center at 7521 Community Center on the third Saturday of each month.

The nonprofit actively uses a wide range of social media to promote its ongoing events, workshops, and upcoming classes which Rayford said have resumed since the recent pandemic.

Rayford said she visualizes the non-profit Citrus Heights Arts as a broad networking community in the city where artists throughout can come together to collaborate and share their work with the public in whatever setting they might imagine.

"Through our programs and events, we aim to create a space where artists and art enthusiasts can truly connect, collaborate, and grow together," she said.

Citrus Heights Arts, in collaboration with Sunrise Marketplace and Marketplace at Birdcage announced plans to present ArtBeat, its own very first art and music festival in the Birdcage Shopping Center on Saturday, July 15th, but the event was cancelled due to a high heat weather advisory in the greater Sacramento area.

"Although the (July 15th) event didn't take place as planned, we remain committed to fostering the artistic spirit and

showcasing the incredible talents within our Citrus Heights community," Rayford said.

"We (Citrus Heights Arts) continue to host regular art exhibits at the Sylvan Community Center throughout the year, showcasing the work of local artists in a variety of mediums, from painting and sculpture to photography and digital art. All of our exhibits are open to the public and free of charge," she said.

Past public events have included Cookies with Santa Claus, and a celebration of Black History Month with performances by musicians, dancers and local artists.

"We have offered a variety of workshops and classes for artists of all levels, covering topics such as painting, drawing, printmaking, all taught by experienced artists and educators in a supportive and engaging learning environment," she said.

"At Citrus Heights Arts, we believe that everyone deserves access to the arts, regardless of their background or financial means."

Rayford said she continues to talk to local business owners about where public art exhibits or temporary installations might be featured for wider public view.

"I believe that the arts have the power to inspire, educate, and unite people, and I'm committed to fostering a thriving arts community in Citrus Heights," Rayford said.

"Art is more than aesthetics; it's a mirror reflecting our collective dreams and a bridge connecting us to our past, present, and future," Rayford said.

"Whether you're an artist, a volunteer, or a donor, there are many ways to support the mission of our non-profit Citrus Heights Arts to help us create a thriving arts community here in Citrus Heights," Rayford said. "If you believe in the power of the arts to transform lives and enrich communities, as I do, I encourage you to get involved with Citrus Heights Arts."



Is there any flexibility in your rule about not spending more than 25% of your take-home pay on rent or monthly mortgage payments? I live downtown in Washington, D.C., and I'm finding it's pretty hard to do here. I make about \$90,000 a year, but I'm spending a little over \$2,000 a month in rent. Rent is my largest expense by far, and I don't spend a lot of other money, so I'm still able to save a little and do other things. Can you give me your opinion about this approach?

Dear Tanner,

True, I advise people to spend no more than 25% of their take-home pay on housing. Math still works in every city and state in the country. You don't get a pass on math just because you live in Washington, D.C., even though Congress and a lot

of other people there think you do.

But there's really nothing magical about 25%. The purpose behind it is, I don't want you to be house poor. If you find yourself still able to save and invest because you keep other financial aspects of your lifestyle so low, then you're okay. The problem with most people starts when they've got a high cost of housing, and those payments put a real squeeze on their budgets. It doesn't leave them enough room to save up to buy the next car, so that car becomes debt. The same thing happens with Christmas and vacations and everything else. They don't have enough extra money to save for things because a huge chunk of their income is flying out the door every month wrapped up in rent or a house payment.

Now, you're telling me your situation works for you because you've made room in your budget and live a very frugal lifestyle by choice. That's cool. I'm not mad at you about that. But here's the thing: Whatever you spend on rent disappears. And the more money you burn, the less you've got on hand for other things.

I'm not exactly sure how you adjust that in your situation. Maybe you move outside the city and commute, or perhaps you add a roommate into the equation. Or, maybe you're fine with how things are and that's the way you want to live. That's okay too. But my reasoning behind the 25% figure—which is actually more of a guideline than a rule—is so you don't become house poor. I want you to be able to save, invest and give generously. Plus, I want you to own your own home one day.

And you won't be able to do that if everything you make is going toward big payments!



Social Security Matters

When Should My Wife Claim Social Security?

Dear Rusty: My wife will be 65 next year, and her full retirement age is 66 years plus 10 months. Can she collect 50% of my Social Security benefit at her full retirement age and then get her own higher personal amount at age 70? Her own amount at her full retirement age is \$1,100 per month but her age 70 amount is \$1,800. My Social Security is \$2,300. Suggestions welcome. Signed: My Wife's

Helper **Dear Helper:** Your wife cannot separate her spousal benefit from her personal Social Security retirement benefit – whenever she claims she will be automatically deemed to be filing for both her own benefit and her spousal entitlement. Thus, she cannot claim her spousal benefit first at her full retirement age and defer claiming her own SS retirement benefit until she is 70. When your wife should claim is, essentially, a decision which should consider the urgency of her need for the money, her life expectancy, whether she will be eligible for a spouse benefit from you, and whether she is working.

If your wife claims before her full retirement age (FRA) and is working, she'll be subject to Social Security's "earnings test" which limits how much she can earn before some SS benefits are taken away (Social Security's earnings test goes away at FRA).

Average life expec-

tancy for a woman your

wife's age is about 87. If your current \$2,300 benefit is a result of you taking your Social Security at your full retirement age or earlier, then your wife will receive a small "spousal boost" from you. If she claims at her full retirement age, your wife's total Social Security payment will be 50% of the amount you were entitled to at your FRA and that will be her permanent amount, except for annual COLA increases. However, from what you've shared, your wife's age 70 amount is considerably more than her maximum spousal benefit so, if her life expectancy is long, that suggests she may wish to consider waiting

own maximum benefit. By doing so, your wife will get more in cumulative lifetime benefits if she achieves average life expectancy.

The unknown factor is your life expectancy because, as your widow, your wife will be entitled to 100% of the amount you were receiving at your death, instead of the smaller amount she is receiving on her own or as your spouse. If life expectancy is long for both of you, then your wife maximizing her own benefit by waiting until age 70 to claim is a prudent choice. But if your, or your wife's, life expectancy is shorter, then your wife claiming at her full retirement age

Gavin Newsom Channels Jerry Brown With Constitutional Amendment Proposal

When Proposition 13, California's iconic property tax limit measure, went before voters in June 1978, the state's governor, Jerry Brown, denounced it.

declared. "It's a long-term disaster, winning exactly one tax increase."

Two months later, after voters overwhelming endorsed the measure. Brown did a 180-degree pirouette, declaring himself a "born-again tax cutter."

"No new taxes," Brown promised. "Voters have told us they want a tax cut. They don't want a shell game."

Facing re-election to a second term later that year, file for whatever reason, Brown sponsored a state tax is now embracing his own cut to obey, he said, the popular mandate.

Two months after winning re-election, Brown delivered his inaugural address and proposed an amendment to the U.S. Constitution requiring the federal government's budget to be balanced.

"A constitutional convention to propose an amendment to balance the budget is unprecedented, but so is the political paralysis that prevents necessary action," Brown said, blaming deficit spending for a sharp increase in inflation "as destructive to our social well-being as an invading

Legislature to pass a resolution supporting his call for a constitutional convention, touching off a circus-like round of legislative hearings.

It was carefully orchestrated political theater, clearly aimed at carving out a platform for Brown's second run at the presidency in 1980 by portraying incumbent President Jimmy Carter as a spendthrift out of touch with popular support for austerity and tax cuts.

Brown garnered much media attention for his newly minted cause but his "It's a ripoff," Brown 1980 presidential run was a delegate to the Democratic convention. Carter later lost the presidency to Brown's predecessor as governor, Ronald Reagan.

Gov. Gavin Newsom, who is obviously trying to raise his national political proamendment to the U.S. Constitution, adding gun control provisions emulating those in California.

It would raise the legal age for gun ownership to 21, require universal background checks, impose minimum waiting periweapons ban.

"We want to go on the offense and be for something and build a movement that's bottom up, not top down," he told Politico in advance of his announcement in June.

More recently, as a resolution was drafted in the Legislature to support Newsom's crusade, he cas-Thereupon, Brown tigated the U.S. Supreme California newspapers.

beseeched the state Court's gun control decisions, much as Brown had pinned inflation on Carter 45 years earlier.

> "This Supreme Court is that bad," Newsom said. "The Bruen decision was that bad. When I say code red, this is code red. California's led the nation on common sense gun safety laws.

> "And we have the receipts," Newsom added. "The efficacy of those laws is demonstrable. The data bears out - California's gun death rates significantly declined since California's leadership in this space."

The cause-and-effect relationship Newsom poses is questionable, because there are many other factors affecting violent crime. Moreover, the state's gun control laws are not as bulletproof as he implies.

California's assault rifle ban is something of a joke. The targeted firearms are readily available in gun stores after undergoing a few cosmetic alterations that do nothing about their lethality. While law-abiding gun owners must go through paper hoops to buy new firearms, there's a vigorous illicit market that allows the feloniously inclined to buy all the guns they want.

Like Brown's effort, Newsom's gun crusade ods and institute an assault is just a political stunt designed to garner him more national media attention. He has zero chance of getting his gun control amendment introduced, much less adopted, and he knows it.

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Huong Lan Sandwiches is opening a new location in Citrus Heights. The popular Vietnamese sandwich shop already has locations in Rancho Cordova, Folsom, Sacramento, and Davis. The new Citrus Heights spot will be in the Copperwood Square shop-

Tim Lam, the owner of the new Citrus Heights location, already owns locations in Folsom and South Sacramento. Other members of the Lam family own more spots in Davis, Newark, Fresno and beyond. There is also a popular Rancho Cordova location.

In Citrus Heights, Huong Lan will be located in part of a 5,400-squarefoot building, which will be split with a hair and nail salon. The space faces a busy corner Starbucks location and is also anchored by Planet Fitness and FoodMaxx. The end space location also includes a drive-thru - a feature that is currently unique only to the Folsom location. Lam did not respond to interview requests, but is represented by Broker Andy Jonsson, who recently told the Sacramento Business Journal the restaurant hopes to open within the next six months.

Huong Lan features a traditional Vietnamese quick-stop eatery menu, including pho and vermicelli bowls. But the true superstar of the chain's menu is its Banh Mi sandwiches. These

sandwiches come in a variety of combinations, and all are sold for under \$7, with the majority in fact costing only around \$5. This is a major pull for customers, considering the fact food prices have dramatically increased in recent years.

Huong Lan's Banh Mis are also popular because they bake their bread in-house. Some customers from the surrounding locations have reported a bit of a delay when ordering one of the sandwiches while more bread is being baked, but all agree it's worth the wait.

Steven Osterback, a regular visitor of the Folsom location, calls the chain "clean, friendly, authentic and fast." And as for that bread, "It's the best bread I've had in Folsom."

Another unique feature to Huong Lan is that you don't always have to wait until lunchtime to enjoy. While hours have not yet been announced for the Citrus Heights location, the Sacramento location opens at 7 am so customers can grab a Banh Mi Op La (french roll served with ham and sunny side up eggs) for breakfast. Other locations within the chain open at 10 am and also include this dish on their menus.

If you're new to Vietnamese cuisine, don't be intimated by the authentic names for the dishes - Huong Lan's colorful menus include accurate photos of every drink and plate sold. It's a great spot for newcomers, and Citrus Heights residents will soon be able to experience for themselves what's so great about this longstanding chain.

agencies such as Primary Care for medical support, the Department of Human Assistance (DHA) for benefits, Managed Care Providers for Enhanced Care Management (ECM), and additional linkages to enhance the provision of services. These collaborations ensure that individuals experiencing homelessness receive the necessary support and resources to improve their overall well-being.

"Through the power of compassion and investment, the \$43 million bridge housing award to Sacramento County is a significant step in transforming lives and communities," says Sacramento County Behavioral Health Director Dr. Ryan Quist. "This funding will help behavioral health expand comprehensive bridge-housing supports for those in need."

To address the diverse needs of individuals experiencing homelessness, a phased approach will be adopted for individuals entering the

program. New participants will enter Safe Stay beds, sober living facilities, or board and care homes to stabilize their health and safety and determine eligibility for housing programs. Once stable, they will move to other BHBH interim beds, where they will receive life skills training and housing navigation services. Finally, participants ready for permanent housing will receive intensive housing navigation services, utilizing rental assistance funds from the grant, to secure and transition into stable housing.

The \$43 million BHBH award to Sacramento County is another significant step towards addressing homelessness and providing vital support to individuals living with serious mental illness and experiencing housing instability. With expanded interim housing options and comprehensive services, this funding has the potential to transform lives and create lasting positive change within the community.










A Battle Lost, But a War Not Over — Save Our Capitol! Continues

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As hard demolition of the historic Capitol Annex began early in July, former state legislators, business leaders, preservationists, environmentalists, and others continue to express their disapproval of the \$1.2 billion Capitol Annex Project. Despite pleas by a supermajority of Californians to reconsider this damaging project, particularly in light of a budget deficit, the Legislature has continued to bulldoze ahead.

"The Capitol Annex certainly had issues, but this was to be expected for a building that was built more than 70 years ago, and had never been properly maintained; however, what the Legislature has failed to tell the public is that the entire premise for demolishing the Annex was built on a lie," said Richard Cowan, former Chair of the Historic State Capitol Commission and representative of Save Our Capitol! "After multiple Public Records Act requests, there is no documentation that shows the building could not have been rehabilitated for a fraction of the proposed \$1.2 billion cost. Instead, the Legislature used "Demolition by Neglect" shamefully to destroy this iconic building that was listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Yet, because of a court decision that found the Legislature violated California's landmark environmental quality act, the Legislature is not allowed to build the new Annex until a revised final Environmental Impact Report which complies with CEQA is certified—meaning the Legislature is bulldozing forward with demolishing an historic building despite having no approved building plans."

Following the court's decision, the Department of General Services (DGS) was required to recirculate a revised Environmental Impact Report to

allow the public to fully review and comment on the plans for the Capitol Annex, West Steps, and new underground parking garage. The Recirculated Draft Environmental Impact Report (RDEIR) became available on April 8 for public review and comment. On April 18, DGS held an informational hearing about the RDEIR changes, and received additional public comments during hearings on May 16 and June 6, with the official comment period closing on June 15. Individuals, organizations, and legislators submitted comments criticizing the proposed new Annex designs, citing concerns with aesthetics, compatibility with the historic Capitol, and safety of the planned glass skin exterior. Equally significant to the historic Capitol's preservation, comments also were made regarding the destruction of the iconic West Steps for a visitor center, and concerns raised that trees have already died when they were supposed to be protected and relocated.

"The proposed renderings for the visitor center have shown that

the West Steps will be unidentifiable and the Plaza, which provides California's citizens with a place to assemble, rally, and demonstrate will be greatly impacted, as space will be limited (Appendix C, Pgs. 201-203). California Highway Patrol officers have stated that the design will not allow people to gather on the proposed lower level, as it will block an entrance/exit and grossly limit demonstration capacities," said Kate Riley, representative for Public Accountability for Our Capitol. "We absolutely cannot allow this vital place that has been used for decades to exercise our First Amendment rights to be closed off and changed for the worse. Future generations deserve better."

Public comments also pointed out the problems with the placement of the visitor center, as well as the discrepancies within the

"In addition to destroying the historic integrity of the West side of Capitol Park, locating the entrance to the visitor center below the Historic Capitol Building, drastically changes the appearance of its West (primary) façade. It is no longer the front of a beautiful 1874 building with stairs leading up to a grand portico and equally grand entrance doors. Instead, it is an 1874 building sitting incongruously on top of the 21st century entrance to the visitor center, the flat roof of which has a large skylight in the center of it and expands out into what once was the historic West Plaza." (Karen Jacques, Preservation Sacramento.)

"Given the substantial changes to the design and the increased impacts that result, the revised EIR should not have been limited to the subjects that the Court identified, but instead requires subsequent evaluation of all environmental impacts, as provided under CEQA Guidelines 15162." (Nicole Sauviat Criste, Terra Nova Planning and Research, Inc.)

"The new West Entrance for the Visitor Center covers the original Greek Revival architecture including the columns, capitals, cornice, doors, and other historic and significant features. The proposed West Entrance destroys the existing historic West steps, the West lawn, plaza, and the major entry to the Capitol. The West Plaza and Capitol Steps of the original restored Capitol—the site of innumerable marches, speeches, and celebrations—will be eliminated by a Visitor Center with a themepark-style entrance." (Milford Wayne Donaldson, an award-winning Architect, Former California State Historic Preservation Officer (CA SHPO), and Former Chair of the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, appointed by President Obama.)

"The new Annex disrespects and overshadows the iconic dome with its large size and reflective glass façade. It denigrates the most important historic governmental landmark in California. The new Annex is substantially over size for the existing historic Capitol and results in the diminution and loss of the historic character of the Capitol." (Milford Wayne Donaldson.)

Former legislators continue to come out in opposition to the controversial Capitol Annex Project. Most recently, former State Senate President Pro Tempore, Don Perata, penned a letter to Governor Gavin Newsom urging him to reconsider the project, and move forward with alternative designs that don't waste money or decimate state history. Former Congressmember Sam Farr also has expressed his disapproval of the project as a whole, stating, "At this pivotal time, rather than erase this irreplaceable site of historic governance by historic individuals, I urge you to embrace and to protect the State Capitol in its entirety."

Save Our Capitol! is dedicated to saving the entire historic West side of the Capitol. While the historic Annex has been thrown away by the Legislature, the West Lawn, West Plaza, and West Steps still can be preserved and remain a pivotal place for California politics, and, importantly, the historic site for the people to participate in self-government at the people's Capitol.




