Mural in the Making

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - A colorful new mural is taking shape along the full length of a beige concrete block retaining wall facing Uplands Way across from Boston's Pizza in the Sunrise Village Shopping Center in Citrus Heights.

Artist Jacob Lewis, a resident of Tulare, and a fine arts graduate of Sacramento State University, talked about the mural between individual bursts of colorful spray paint on an ongoing project that's likely to keep him busy through September. He's working on the project part-time, also that will open in mid-2024. training to be a tattoo artist.

His completed mural will eventually wrap around both sides of the

main block retaining wall, Lewis said. The wall he's painting now wraps around a curved entrance to the plaza where a new marquee sign has been erected.

It's too early to count the number of spray cans he's likely to use for the overall project, Lewis admitted. The bed of his pickup truck was filled with a fresh supply of cans for just a day's work.

Once that first portion of the mural facing Uplands Way is done, Lewis will start work on another mural on the reverse side of the wall which will face a new Milano Nail Salon

"I'm still finalizing the design for that phase of the mural project and those murals on the lower retaining

walls," Lewis said.

Lewis' mural design and color choices for the project were approved by Merlone Geier, the property owner/manager of the shopping plaza.

"I'm collaborating with (Merlone-Geier's) property manager Tiffany Clement in the approval and design of the murals and the specific themes they address," Lewis said.

Lewis especially wanted to recognize a fellow Tulare resident, Layla Splawn, a commercial real estate broker who recommended his mural work to Merlone-Geier for their consideration.

"I'm excited to be working on this project," Lewis said. "There's a sense Continued from page 3

Council **Approves Guidelines for Affordable** Housing **Developments**

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - At the July 13 meeting of the Citrus Heights City Council, during Comments by Council, several members reflected on the City's successful 4th of July celebration.

Vice Mayor Bret Daniels commended City staff for their hard work getting the first annual Stars and Stripes Celebration off the ground: "I don't know if we could have done it any better, honestly. I was so excited, so proud, so happy." And Daniels said he is "already excited about next year."

Mayor Tim Schaefer echoed those sentiments, adding that he was very moved during the rendition of the Star-Spangled Banner: "I started getting choked up when I looked out in the crowd, and everybody was standing up with their hands on their hearts. This is a very patriotic community."

Before approval of the Consent Calendar, Councilmember Jayna Karpinski-Costa asked that Item 10, the Appointment to Fill a Vacancy on the Citrus Heights Education Committee, be pulled for a separate vote.

The Council previously established the Citrus Heights Education Committee to examine the feasibility of a Citrus Heights School District (despite dissenting votes from Councilmembers Karpinski-Costa and Porsche Middleton), and seven community members were appointed to the committee during the June 22 meeting. However, Mayor Tim Schaefer's appointment, Thomas Scheeler, resigned from the committee on June 27, leaving one vacancy.

Mayor Schaefer reviewed the list of applicants and selected James Remick to fill the vacancy, pending approval from the Council. The Council voted 3-2 to ratify the appointment, with Councilmembers Karpinski-Costa and Middleton dissenting.

The Council then held a Public Hearing to consider a Resolution Confirming the Report of Delinquent Solid Waste Charges and Ordering the Collection of Delinquencies on the Property Tax Roll.

Another State Debacle

The State spent \$600 million, but can't say whether it helped

As Gov. Gavin Newsom retools the state's prison system to emphasize rehabilitation, his administration has little evidence that a privately run program for parolees costing taxpayers \$100 million a year works to prevent future crime.

The state does not collect data on whether parolees who participate in the program have found jobs or whether they are returned to prison for another crime. What state data does show is that only 40% of participants completed at least one of the services they were offered.

The information gap frustrates critics of the governor's policies as well as supporters who want evidence that the state's investments are working.

"At the end of the day, we've come from 160,000 people incarcerated down to 95 (thousand). So, we've had some success," said Assemblymember Reggie Jones-Sawyer, a Los Angeles Democrat, referring to the decline in the state's

prison population since 2011. "But I also want to ensure the pub-

lic that they've been safe with all these people not recidivating... And the only way we can do that is to come up with data," he said.

CalMatters' yearlong investigation of the parolee reentry program draws on court records, state reports and data, contracts, tax forms, policy experts, interviews with vendors and communication with several current and former program participants some of whom are back in prison.

- · Corrections department data is outdated, inaccurate or doesn't exist. When the department provided CalMatters with a roster of more than 400 locations providing rehabilitation services, we visited 23 of them, finding some with inaccurate addresses, one with a padlocked gate in front of a seemingly closed site, another that appeared to be abandoned, and three where employees said they were no longer providing rehabilitation services.
- Department officials struggled to explain how many people enrolled in the program in 2020-2021. The department published an annual report noting 17,650 participants. Dana Simas, a department spokesperson at the time, told CalMatters the program served 9,516 people. The department later revised that number to 8,213.
- State data show only two out of five parolees who participated in the rehabilitation program in 2020-2021 completed at least one service offered to them. Based on how the state collects data, it's unclear if anyone finished all of the services offered to them. A spokesperson said the corrections agency "is unable to provide further completion information."
- · State officials rarely review the operations of the four companies that operate the program, state accountability reviews show. Records show state officials only documented reviews of three of the more than 400 statefunded reentry homes and treatment facilities from 2018 to December 2022.
- · Some of the nonprofit vendors that manage reentry homes lease their facilities from their own executives, according to public records, raising "red flags" among experts who say the arrangements could signal financial conflicts of interest.
- The state's July 2022 list

several with suspended business licenses and nonprofit status revoked years ago by the California Department of Justice — effectively barring them from doing business in California.

The rehabilitation program for parolees formally launched in 2014 under the name Specialized Treatment for Optimized Programming, often referred to as STOP. It is a voluntary program that serves less than a quarter of the roughly 35,000 inmates released from prison each year. Many of the parolees live at the homes; others visit outpatient

The STOP program for parolees, which has cost the state about \$600 million in the past decade, is run by four large contractors. Those companies also contract with nearly 200 nonprofits, private companies or community organizations to provide housing and rehabilitation services for parolees in roughly 450 homes and treatment centers.

the program. "GEO Reentry Services is proud to operate California's Specialized Treatment for Optimized Programming ... on behalf of the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation," wrote Monica Hook, GEO's vice president of communications. "GEO Reentry connects participants in 18 counties with housing, education, and treatment services to support successful reentry and recidivism reduction."

The California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation officials ignored multiple requests for an interview.

Instead, a department's public affairs official responded to emailed questions with emailed responses and fulfilled many public records requests.

After CalMatters' inquiries, department official Terri Hardy said by email that the department would begin to track recidivism and the employment rate among vendors from managing reentry homes and treatment facilities.

Hardy also said by email the department is "currently working on a report that addresses STOP programs." She added that the department said it has created a tool to "better track" whether the four primary contractors are conducting annual reviews of reentry homes and treatment facilities, which are required.

"CDCR understands the importance of oversight and accountability in this program," Hardy said by email. "Since STOP was created in 2014, CDCR has continually worked to make the system better."

Advocates for the program maintain it is a good investment for the state. They say it provides a soft landing for parolees who otherwise would be on their own and competing for scarce housing in California's high-priced market.

California's spending on the parolee program swelled over a decade of reform in the state's All of the contractors told participants in the STOP and prison system, when Govs. of reentry homes included CalMatters that they were proud that it would prevent unlicensed Brown and Newsom backed CalMatters.org.

policy changes that shortened criminal sentences and steered more resources to rehabilitation.

The new policies slimmed down California's overburdened system, allowing Newsom to close a prison and begin shutting down three more.

California discloses recidivism data on a three-year cycle but the latest report is outdated. In fact, the most recent report describes people who were released from prison in 2017-18 — before Newsom took office.

A separate report by the California State Auditor in 2019 found that prisoners who completed recommended cognitive-based therapy rehabilitation programs recidivated at about the same rate as those who did not. The auditor recommended six legislative actions for lawmakers to ensure rehabilitation programs set performance targets and reduce recidivism.

Lawmakers have not made many of the recommended

of visual movement throughout the mural I'm painting."

The mural content will reflect the stores located in Sunrise Village with a general theme of "food and fabric." Specific whimsical touches that Lewis said he had yet to add, will include a black and white hopscotch field.

"The murals are going to be an important focal point for shoppers entering Sunrise Village from Uplands Way," Clement said.

The choice of a mural project also sought to address past issues of vandalism and periodic graffiti tagging along the length of the block retaining wall, she

The Sunrise MarketPlace Business

District is assisting Merlone-Geier with some funding for the project, said Kathilynn Carpenter, its executive

"Our goal has been to bring more public art to the Sunrise MarketPlace District," Carpenter said. "We currently have five completed murals in the District, along with our art-wrapped utility boxes."

Overall construction plans for a sports gym and a retail grocery store also to open in Sunrise Village are continuing to move forward, Clement said. "The owners of (City Sports) gym have revised their original construction plans to a higher-end, branded facility," she said. "I can't comment concerning the retail grocer as that's subject to a non-disclosure agreement at this time."

handles the City's waste pickup services, and residential customers whose accounts are more than three months past due are considered delinquent. The City helps Republic Services collect those charges by submitting a list of delinquent accounts to Sacramento County. Those charges are then collected by the County as part of the property tax payment, sent to the City of Citrus Heights as part of their share, and then forwarded to Republic Services as reimbursement for the costs of service to those accounts.

The Public Hearing was scheduled to give affected residents an opportunity to dispute their inclusion in the report or the amount of their overdue balance. City staff mailed notices of the Public Hearing to each affected property owner, but there were no comments during the Public Hearing.

There are currently 1,002 delinquent accounts, with a past due balance of \$503,346. After late penalties of \$50,334, the total due is \$553,681. Delinquent accounts can still be settled before the final list is submitted to the County in August.

The Council voted unanimously to confirm the report of delinquent charges.

The Council next heard a presentation on the Affordable Ownership Program Guidelines, which will define the process for creating and preserving affordable homeownership opportunities in Citrus Heights. Community Development Director Casey Kempenaar explained that it is "best practice to have rules in place as we deal with different developers and make sure that they understand what the rules are as we get into these discussions," so that everyone is clear about the expectations. The proposed

Guidelines outline the roles and responsibilities of the developer, the buyer, and the City.

Affordable housing is defined as units sold to families with household incomes of up to 80% of the area median income (AMI). For example, a family of four with an income of up to \$85,750 would be considered low income and would qualify for affordable housing under these guidelines.

When developers build affordable housing units in Citrus Heights, the City is responsible for complying with State laws by monitoring those units, assuring that they remain affordable for low-income residents for at least 45 years, and submitting reports to the State. This creates a significant workload for City staff, so these Guidelines allow the City to require that developers provide funding to cover that cost.

The Guidelines also specify that housing applicants for these affordable units must be first-time homebuyers. Those who live and work in Citrus Heights will be prioritized first, followed by those who live in Citrus Heights, those who work in Citrus Heights, and finally other applicants. Buyers will also be required to attend a Homeowners Orientation, an educational class where they will learn the basics of homeownership.

The Guidelines will apply to housing developments proposed on surplus land, such as the Sylvan property, as well as any housing developments requesting concessions or permit streamlining in exchange for including affordable housing units.

The Council voted unanimously to approve the Affordable Ownership Program Guidelines.

The next meeting of the Citrus Heights City Council is scheduled for July 27. ★



CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Purpose-Built Trade Co., a family-owned, East Bay Area industrial clothing outfitter, is poised to open its first retail store location in Sacramento County at 6425 Sunrise Boulevard in Citrus Heights.

The 7,665-square-foot freestanding retail building fronts Sunrise Boulevard and is just north of Greenback Lane in what was the former location of Pier 1 Imports and a SleepFirst Mattress store, according to

Chain link fencing is visible from Sunrise Boulevard and a portion of the parking lot is fenced off by the project contractor, Huff Construction Inc. of Modesto, which is dividing the building into three separate retail suites

The property has direct full access from multiple points along Sunrise Boulevard and its large parking area is shared with three restaurants, Texas Roadhouse, Buffalo Wild Wings and Red Lobster.

Purpose-Built Trade Co. will occupy the larger center suite. Two other adjacent partially built out suites, each measuring about 3,800-square feet, are to be leased separately.

Purpose-Built began in the East Bay city of Concord as East Bay Work Wear, according to owner/founder Chris Johnson. Other Bay Area retail locations include Pleasant

Hill, Livermore, Oakley and Modesto. "Our company mission is simple: We Support Blue Collar", according to remarks by Johnson on the company's website.

Purpose-Built specializes in work and construction boots, men's apparel, women's apparel and footwear, and accessories such as belts, insoles, suspenders, socks, hats, high visibility clothing and gloves for the

Its retail stores also offer a large selection of specialty apparel such as flame-resistant (FR) gear, tactical, rain gear, moisture-wicking, and high visibility (hi-vis) apparel and

"We set out to build a family-friendly shop, stocked with all the gear you'll need from head-to-toe to feel safe, be comfortable, and proud to get the job done both on and off the job site," Johnson said about his company. "Our men's clothing is like wearable equipment, wrapping you in durability and reliability, and keeping you comfortable and ready – both on and off the jobsite."

Purpose-Built offers 10 percent union, military, senior or first responder discount on in-store and online purchases.

"At Purpose-Built, we pride ourselves on outfitting the people who keep the economy running," Johnson has said.

Other merchandise will include a range of men's, women's, kids, footwear and accessories including brands such as Carhartt, Wrangler, Ben Davis and Pendleton. Timberland Pro, Danner, Carhartt and Wolverine boots.

An opening date is anticipated later this fall, workers at the site said.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Summer has arrived, and rising temperatures are sure to follow in Sacramento County. As the mercury rises, it's important for pet owners to take proactive steps to ensure the well-being and safety of their beloved fourlegged companions. This summer, make sure you're aware of the potential dangers posed by extreme heat and provide essential care to keep your pets cool and comfortable during the sweltering summer season.

Unlike humans, dogs and cats can't sweat to keep cool. Instead, dogs cool themselves off by panting, and both dogs and cats regulate their temperatures through the pads of their feet. As temperatures soar, pets are at a higher risk of heat-related illnesses, such as heatstroke, dehydration, and burned paw pads.

Here are some tips for keeping your pet safe in the

Never leave pets in parked cars: Even on seemingly mild days, the temperature inside a parked car can escalate rapidly, turning it into a deadly heat trap. Leaving pets unattended in cars, even with the windows cracked and even for a short period, can have fatal consequences and is against the law in California. If you need to run errands, leave your pets at home where they are safe and comfortable. Check out this video on how hot it gets in cars;

Hydrate: Make sure your pets always have access to plenty of fresh, cold water;

Avoid peak heat hours: Schedule outdoor activities and walks during cooler parts of the day, such as

early mornings or evenings. Asphalt and concrete surfaces can become scorching hot and burn your pet's paw pads, so be mindful of the ground temperature before venturing out. Test the surface with your hand, and if it's too hot for you, it's too hot for your pet;

Avoid extreme heat: When temperatures get above the 90s, take your pet inside. For outdoor pets, be sure to provide them with plenty of fresh, cold water in a tip-proof water dish and shade for them to cool down;

Use sunscreen: Pets get sunburned just like people, and if your pet has light skin or fur, they can be particularly susceptible to a painful burn and even skin cancer. Use sunscreen on sensitive areas, such as ears or nose, to make sure your pets are protected;

Create a cool environment: Provide your pets with a cool and comfortable place to retreat from the heat. Keep them indoors, preferably in air-conditioned rooms. If air conditioning is not available, use fans or open windows to improve air circulation;

Provide adequate shade: Make sure there is always access to shaded areas when pets are outdoors. Trees,

canopies, umbrellas, or pet-specific shade structures can offer protection from direct sunlight and help keep them cool;

Be your pet's lifeguard: While swimming can help pets get exercise without overheating, always supervise pets when swimming either in a pool or in waterways. Dogs can get tired swimming, particularly in rivers where they have to fight against currents. To avoid drowning, make sure they wear life jackets and keep them out of the water when flows are high;

Watch for signs of heat**stroke:** Familiarize yourself with the symptoms of heatstroke in pets, which can include excessive panting, drooling, glazed eyes, a rapid pulse, lethargy, vomiting, and collapse. If you suspect your pet is suffering from heatstroke, move them to a cool area, apply cool (not cold) water to their body, and seek immediate veterinary attention.

Let's Shift the Focus

Dear Dave,

I graduated from college six years ago with a business degree. Currently, I'm in data analytics making about \$40,000 a year and have \$155,000 in student loan debt. Do you have any recommendations as far as refinancing my student loans and getting the interest rates and monthly payments down?

– Austin

Dear Austin,

I'm not trying to be mean here, but what in the world are you doing in data analytics that pays so poorly? Most of the folks I know in that area make a ton more. And you're going to need to start making a whole lot more to pay off \$155,000 in student loans.

For starters, you

shouldn't be looking at this from a what-can-I-doto-make-this-manageable perspective. You don't want to give this Sallie Mae nightmare a haircut, then tell her to sit in the corner all nice and pretty. You want her to leave! Now, there's nothing inherently wrong with refinancing to get a lower interest rate, or lower payments, if you do it the right way. But in most cases that translates into keeping the debt around forever. You need a better plan.

Instead, let's shift the main goal from that to paying this thing off as fast as possible. That means big, hairy chunks of payments on the principal. And that'll probably mean picking up an extra job or two, because right now you've got what I call a shovel-to-hole ratio problem. The hole you're in is a big one—a \$155,000 one. And you're working with a \$40,000 shovel. You need a bigger shovel, and a lot of extra work, instead of trying to keep these loans around like they're pets. What can you do—for a short period of time—that's legal, moral and will make you the most money the fastest?

On the day job side of things, you may want to consider looking for a position with a different company, Austin. You're way underpaid if you're in data analytics and making just \$40,000 a year.

Message from City Manager Ash Feeney on Recently Adopted City Budget

Dear Citrus Heights Community,

After unanimous approval by City Council, we are embarking on our next two-year budget cycle. I am pleased to present the Biennial Budget for Fiscal Years 2023-2025 and share with you how we have approached this important planning work as well as what you can expect to see from and for your city over the next two years.

First and foremost, this budget reflects the Citrus Heights commitment to fiscal prudence. Despite continued increases in maintenance and operating costs, the City has continued its efforts to create cost-effective expenditures to offset rising costs. This balanced budget carefully examined historical expenditure trends, as well as current and foreseeable operating needs. Lean budget principles were utilized to create even more efficiencies to ensure dollars were maximized in areas of greatest need. The approved budget achieves a new level of city fiscal health by increasing reserve levels from the minimum policy standard of 17% to a more fiscally prudent target minimum of 25%. This ensures funds are available in times of economic uncertainty, address necessary operational needs, and to position the City to take advantage of strategic infrastructure grant opportunities that have matching requirements, thereby maximizing return on city funds.

In addition to the guiding principle of fiscal prudence, this budget is aligned with our strategic focus areas: community image, addressing blight and homelessness, economic development, community connection, and infrastructure improvements. This budget provides significant General Fund expenditures for street repairs for the first time in the City's history, starting with \$2,000,000 in FY 23/24 and increasing to \$4,000,000 in FY 24/25. These funds augment and enhance other funding sources that have been used for street repair and roadway resurfacing projects. While this is a new level

of progress, the poor roadway conditions throughout the City are a continuing challenge. To improve all Citrus Heights roads to a satisfactory pavement industry-standard citywide would cost more than \$90,000,000. Additionally, there would be ongoing significant annual maintenance costs in excess of \$13M annually for adequate maintenance, with spikes in certain years to address larger roadway conditions. The City does not have a current revenue stream to fully address these pavement challenges. However, we have implemented strategic pavement management strategies that give the most return on investment. Critical to project planning, the adopted budget also reallocates needed staffing to General Services Department to build capacity for increased infrastructure investment and delivery of projects. As capacity grows, the City Council may allocate additional General Fund reserve monies toward infrastructure improvements. Significant roadway projects in the pipeline will help make visible progress on this important issue in the next few years.

This Biennial Budget for FY 2023-2025 builds on our foundation of aggressive strategic goals and continues the forward progress the City of Citrus Heights has made post-pandemic, highlights of which include:

Fully funding and staffing Citrus Heights Police

Department after previous cutbacks; Obtained over \$23,000,000 in grant funding awards in FY22/23, a city record! Launched the Beautification Crew to combat blight and beautify our community: Restarted and increased city-produced event offerings for community connection; Investments in necessary Police Department fleet vehicle replacement and critical upgrades to the Communications Center; Creation of a \$1,000,000 Business Attraction Incentive Program to attract new restaurants, breweries, and entertainment; Advanced Sunrise Tomorrow Specific Plan efforts through the development of infrastructure studies and financing strategies, which were funded through competitive grants; Began construction of the Arcade Cripple

Numerous other accomplishments are highlighted in the budget book, which can be found at www. citrusheights.net/budgetbook. City staff continues to advance strategic objectives, consistent with the adopted City Council Three-Year Goals and the Focus Area Work Plan, that strive to improve the quality of life for our residents and businesses. Forward progress on quality of life and community vibrancy is top of mind for our team as we serve the Citrus Heights community. Rooted in the dream and vision for a better future that were established by city founders more than 25 years ago, I am honored to serve with our team to focus on delivering on the promise of tomorrow as we forge an exciting next chapter for Citrus Heights.

I want to acknowledge our team whose dedication and care created these successes, and who worked extremely hard to create a pragmatic, community-facing budget that will achieve even more in the next two years.



Something Is Clearly Off with California's Homelessness Spending

California put aside \$7.2 billion to address homelessness in the 2021-22 state budget. Last year, there were an estimated 172,000 homeless statewide, which equates to spending nearly \$42,000 per homeless

Spending of this magnitude – which only accounts for state money - is sufficient if it were applied effectively. The worsening crisis indicates that something is off with how the state spends its resources.

This perspective is important in light of a comprehensive homeless survey by UC San Francisco. Many of its findings are enlightening, but too many of its suggestions call for more spending.

It strains credulity to believe that spending \$42,000 per person is insufficient, but if bumped up to \$45,000, all will be OK. California does not have the worst-in-the-nation homeless crisis because it spends too little.

Continued calls for more government subsidies supporting the state's ineffective housing-first approach will waste money while failing to alleviate the emergency.

The survey confirms some things we already know, such as most of the homeless in California (78%) are unsheltered. It also provides essential information to help sustainably address homelessness, such as the pivotal role housing unaffordability plays in driving the problem.

Solutions require policymakers to leverage all we have learned to adopt a more innovative structure for addressing the grim harmful policies like rent

The UCSF Benioff Homelessness and Housing Initiative does recommend some innovative policies, such as establishing homeless courts as also advocated by Gov. Gavin Newsom. While neither a perfect nor sweeping solution, a court 1970, it has become a system ordering treatment programs for the homeless could make a difference.

If the effort has the necessary scope and force, it can help move homeless people suffering from mental illness and addiction into a setting of care rather than the current invisible asylum of "the street, the jail, and the emergency room."

Other suggestions merely throw money at the current ineffective government-run programs, a poor strategy bound to fail. Instead, California should fund wellrun and fully accountable private sector groups that help homeless people gain control, address any issues and then become self-sufficient. The "California Way" bias has blinded lawmakers from successful initiatives in other states and tailoring them to West Coast needs. Partnerships and nonprofits in Virginia, Tennessee and elsewhere have shown that they can sustainably address homelessness through novel methods, flexibility and personalization.

Another flaw is the government's focus on "controlling the cost of housing" rather than removing disincentives driving the housing shortage. As rising inflation reminds us, you don't lower the cost of anything by throwing money at people. We need to incentivize more housing supply by lowering costs and construction time through deregulation and avoiding Research Institute.

control that worsen housing unaffordability.

The richest target for deregulation is also the state's most firmly entrenched law: the California Environmental Quality Act. While well-intended when enacted in destructive force derailing "the possibility of homeownership" among the "hardworking members of Latino, Black and other minority communities," says Jennifer Hernandez, an environmental and land-use lawyer who has documented CEQA's long list of litigation abuses.

Both Newsom and before him Gov. Jerry Brown have publicly supported CEQA reform, which is a start. A better plan would be a legislative initiative to repeal

and replace. Concerns that dismantling CEQA would invite environmental mayhem are overblown. Fresh legislation relying on the volumes of knowledge gained in protecting the environment since CEQA became law, and including provisions that would prevent it from becoming another tool for abuse should not be beyond the abilities of lawmakers.

Spending \$42,000 a year per homeless person is wheel-spinning on a grand scale. It shows a lack of reflection and a poverty of ideas. The progressive policy framework has made no progress on homelessness. It shouldn't be too much to ask lawmakers to rethink

Social Security Matters

My State Pension Eliminated My Social Security Survivor Benefit

Dear Rusty: My husband of 21 years died in January 2022 at the age of 70. We were both retired at the time of his death, and they immediately stopped his Social Security payments. After many calls to Social Security asking why I was not receiving his benefits, I was finally told since I have my own pension from the State of Ohio that I would receive none of my husband's Social

Security. I cannot see why my OH retirement has anything to do with my husband's Social Security. I do get a small payment from SS based on my past earnings before I worked for the State of Ohio. Is there any chance of fighting this since we were married when they took money from his earnings for SS? If I wanted to write to an elected official to see if these rules could be changed, who would I write to or call? Signed: Upset

Dear Upset Widow: Unfortunately, your entitlement to a Social Security survivor benefit from your husband is affected by a provision known as the Government Pension Offset, or "GPO," which affects any surviving spouse with a

federal, state, or local government pension earned without contributing to the Social Security program. Ohio is one of 26 states which have opted not to participate in Social Security, thus exempting state employees from paying Social Security taxes on their earnings. The OH state pension which resulted from your state employment means that any Social Security benefits earned outside of your state employment are reduced. The GPO reduction to your survivor benefit is severe – a reduction by 2/3rds of the amount of your Ohio state pension, which can - and often does - completely eliminate any SS survivor benefit you might otherwise be entitled to.

For clarity, the monthly SS payment your husband was receiving at his death stops automatically. At that point, your eligibility for additional SS benefits from your husband was assessed and, because of the GPO, Social Security offset your potential survivor benefit from your husband by 2/3rds of your Ohio state pension, which apparently eliminated your survivor benefit. As unfair as this may seem to you, note that the same thing happens to any surviving spouse who also has their own earned SS retirement benefit - their personal SS retirement benefit offsets their SS survivor benefit, so a spouse with a regular SS retirement benefit higher than their deceased spouse's benefit gets no surviving spouse benefit.

FYI, the State of Ohio has an obligation to make clear that by not paying into Social Security your future SS spousal/survivor benefits are affected. Without knowing how that was presented to you during your OH state employment, here's a quote from Ohio's Public Employee Retirement System (OPERS) website: "If you are eligible for Social Security benefits and are receiving a retirement benefit from OPERS, your Social Security benefits may be affected by the Government Pension Offset or the Windfall Elimination Provision. The Government Pension Offset may also affect you if you are eligible for Social Security benefits through your spouse. The Windfall Elimination Provision may affect you if you qualify for Social Security benefits due to your own work history."

In any case, you are certainly not alone in your feelings about how your Social Security benefits have been affected by the GPO. This provision was enacted in 1983 and has been challenged in just about every Congressional session since that time, without success. In fact, there is a legislative bill active in the current Congress - H.R. 82 - The Social Security Fairness Act - which was introduced on the House floor in January and "referred to committee" for consideration. Like all preceding WEP/ GPO reform bills, this one sits idle in Committee. If you wish to add your voice to those who oppose the GPO, you should contact your Congressional Representative to solicit action on H.R. 82.



SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - In CNBC's annual "Top States for Business" ranking, California's ranking reflects the reality of our economy, which is led by our tech industry and venture capital dollars but bogged down by our ongoing cost of living crisis, high taxes, and unfriendly business policies.

"California's competitiveness, our ability to attract and retain businesses, as well as to provide employees with an affordable qualify of life, continue to show clear warning signs thanks to our ongoing cost-of-living crisis," said Rob Lapsley, president of the California Business Roundtable. "This ranking is an annual reminder of the state's precarious future and economic solvency. Just like the state budget, our business climate relies almost exclusively on the highly volatile Bay Area's tech region to grow or attract business."

According to the survey, California received an "F" in cost of living and business friendliness which directly reflect the impact of the policies that are being passed by state and local government. In addition, the state economy received a "D+" and our cost of doing business scored a "D." The only categories in which California excelled were access to capital and technology and innovation, where we scored an "A+" for each.

"Our overall rankings should come as no surprise to the governor and Legislature, who continue to push higher taxes, fees, and expensive regulations onto businesses," Lapsley continued.

In just the past 30 days, the governor and Legislature have ensured businesses will pay one of the highest tax increases in state history by refusing to provide state funding to pay off the state-created Unemployment Insurance Fund debt (learn more here) and increased labor and litigation costs by proposing to refund the Industrial Welfare Commission in the state budget (learn more here).

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The results of the California Highway Patrol's (CHP) recent Independence Day Maximum Enforcement Period (MEP) are a sobering reminder of the consequences resulting from unsafe driving behaviors.

Sixty-eight people were killed in crashes throughout the state during the Independence Day MEP, which began at 6:01 p.m. on Friday, June 30, and concluded at 11:59 p.m. on Tuesday, July 4. Tragically, nearly half of the total number of vehicle occupants who died within CHP jurisdiction were not wearing a seat belt.

With unsafe speed being the number one contributor to crashes in California, the CHP placed a special emphasis on its enforcement during the recent MEP. CHP officers issued more than 9,700 speed citations throughout the long Independence Day weekend.

Additionally, impaired drivers were removed from California's roadways at an alarming rate during the holiday enforcement effort. CHP officers made 1,224 arrests for driving under the influence, which is an average of one DUI arrest every five minutes.

"The results of this MEP are concerning and reinforce the need for responsible behavior behind the wheel," said CHP Commissioner Sean Duryee. "All of these deaths were preventable, and the loved ones they leave behind will be forever impacted. Traffic safety is everyone's responsibility, and these statistics show us how much work there is still to be done. The CHP is committed to making California's roadways safer for all who use them."

To help protect those who are traveling on California's roadways during the holidays, the CHP implements six MEPs per year. The next MEP is scheduled for Labor Day weekend. Throughout the holiday weekend, all available uniformed members of the Department will be on patrol to enhance public safety, deter unsafe driving behavior, and, when necessary, take appropriate enforcement action.

Keep yourself and others who are on the road safe by buckling up, driving at a speed safe for conditions, avoid distractions behind the wheel, and always designating a sober driver.
