SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - SMUD's Board of Directors elected Heidi Sanborn as President of the Board. Her term as president will run from January through December 2023. Director Sanborn was first elected to the SMUD Board of Directors in 2018 and represents Ward 7, which includes North Highlands, northern Arden Arcade, Carmichael, Antelope and Foothill Farms.

Sanborn is the Founder of the National Stewardship Action Council and has served as its Executive Director since 2015. She is also the founding Director of the California Product Stewardship Council where she worked for 12 years. These nonprofits are dedicated to reducing waste, increasing recycling and advocating for an equitable, circular economy. She was later appointed by State Treasurer Fiona Ma to the Green Bond Market Development Committee in 2019, tasked with raising billions to build climate-friendly infrastructure. She was also appointed by CalEPA to serve on the Statewide Commission on Recycling Markets and Curbside Recycling in June of 2020 and was elected Chair. The voluntary Commission submitted 34 policy recommendations to the California Legislature, many of which were passed in 2021 and 2022 Sanborn has a personal interest in going green. Sanborn and her husband have remodeled their current home to include solar panels, used the SMUD store to replace old lighting with LEDs, and used SMUD rebates for a new heat-pump water heater and HVAC units. She is also proud to be a SMUD Greenergy® customer. Sanborn is also active in the community. She is on the Board of the Children's Receiving Home of Sacramento and is co-chair of the Giving Tree committee of the Kiwanis Club of Carmichael, which recently planted 12 trees from the Sacramento Tree Foundation at Cameron Ranch Elementary Continued on page 4



SMF Launches \$1.3 Billion Expansion Project

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Department of Airports, which operates Sacramento International Airport (SMF), announced on February 1, SMForward, a \$1.3 billion expansion project that will reshape the Airport to accommodate projected passenger growth over the next seven years.

SMForward is embarking on a transformative journey, with the launch of six ambitious projects in 2024, including the construction of a stunning \$140 million pedestrian walkway. This state-of-the-art walkway will seamlessly connect Terminal B to Concourse B, empowering passengers with the flexibility to choose between a leisurely walk to their gate or utilizing the Airport's efficient train system.

Additional SMForward projects include expansions to both Terminal A and Concourse B, which will add gates and new amenities; a new Terminal B parking garage; and a consolidated ground transportation center that will

centralize taxi, rideshare, and off-site shuttle providers into a single area that is walkable from both terminals. SMForward is expected to conclude in late 2027 with the completion of a new \$400 million consolidated rental car facility, allowing passengers access to the Airport's rental car providers without the need to ride a shuttle bus.

SMForward is a major milestone for Sacramento, representing the largest construction program in the airport's history. This ambitious project is not just an expansion, but a

complete transformation of the airport experience for the people of Sacramento and its visitors. The project will bring about significant improvements and upgrades that will enhance the convenience, comfort, and accessibility of the airport for all.

"The airport experience is the first impression many people see when they arrive in Northern California - and the last as they leave," said Cindy Nichol, Director of Sacramento County Department of Airports. "SMForward will change *Continued on page 14*

Sons of Union Veterans Keep Civil War History Alive

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -The Sacramento membership of the non-profit Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) is a fraternal, patriotic and educational organization to help keep the history of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) and its role in the history of California alive.

'We're actively looking for new members throughout California to consider joining us," said Steve Bogart, whose ancestor Sgt. George S. Rhoades, served in Company D, of the 44th Missouri Infantry.

Organized in the structure of a military camp, as the Union Army itself was during the Civil War, members of the General George Wright Camp 22 of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War meet on the first Friday of every month at Sam's Hofbrau Restaurant on 2500 Watt Avenue in Sacramento from 6:30 to 8 p.m.

Members and their guests are welcome to attend monthly meetings. Its organization follows the guidelines of the national SUVCW, with a Camp Commander, Senior Vice-Commander, Junior Vice-Commander, Secretary, and Treasurer, all of whom are elected annually by the Camp members. The camp serves Northern California, Sacramento, and the Central Valley region.

In addition to meeting socially, SUVCW members wear the blue dress enlisted and officer uniforms of the Grand Army of the Republic era as they participate in historical re-enactments within the state and perform official honors and ceremonies throughout the year.

Bogart acknowledges ancestors in his family who served opposing sides during the Civil War and has fulfilled the role of chaplain in both the Sons of Union and Sons of Confederate groups. He's a former member of the California State Military Museum in Old Sacramento and a recipient of the California Military History medal.

"I'm proud of their individual military service during the

Civil War, and I feel it's important to honor them and their legacy," he said.

"Our Sacramento-based (SUV) group began in 1995," he said. 'Many of our members can trace their ancestors to those served during the Civil War in Union volunteer infantry units from the states of Indiana, New York, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts, just to name a few."

In the Sylvan Cemetery at 7401 Auburn Blvd in Citrus Heights, the resting place of almost 1,400 Veterans, has some of its earliest burials from survivors of the Civil War. Nine soldiers who came to the area after the Civil War ended and are buried there.

"SUV members have been involved in four gravesite dedications of Civil War soldiers at the Sylvan Cemetery in Citrus Heights where a memorial headstone was... placed on a soldier's grave where there was none, and a full civil memorial grave ceremony was then held," Bogart said.

"In doing so, our members honor the history and legacy of heroes who fought and worked to

save the Union," he said.

A rifle color guard of the SUV has also fired at numerous annual Memorial Day and Veteran's Day ceremonies held there annually, he said.

The National Organization of the SUVCW now oversees the operation of 31 departments, each consisting of one or more states, along with a department-at-large, a national membership-at-large, and over 200 community-based camps.

In California, the history of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) at Sutterville, in the Sacramento area is a fascinating one.

Sutterville, known as Sutter and Sutter City, was located on the Southern Pacific Railroad about 2.25 miles south-southwest of the city limits. Pioneer John A. Sutter had Lansford W. Hastings and John Bidwell lay out the town in 1844, south of his embarcadero on a low bluff overlooking the Sacramento River. When the town of Sacramento developed at Sutter's embarcadero, Sutterville fell into decline.

Its fortunes quickly changed

when Camp Union became California's most prominent provider of troops for camps in the West throughout the years of the Civil War.

A third of California's 15,000 volunteers who served in the GAR trained at Camp Union, located at Sutterville Road and Land Park Drive. The site has since been designated a state historical landmark.

Members of the 5th Infantry **Regiment California Volunteers** were organized at Camp Union on October 8, 1861, and trained by Brevet Brigadier General George W. Bowie for duty in Arizona, New Mexico, and Texas against the Confederate forces. The camp operated from 1861 until it was evacuated due to the flood waters from the Great Sacramento Flood of 1862.

The 5th Regiment joined the California Column and marched across southern New Mexico Territory to Texas. There it occupied Franklin, Texas until the regiment was mustered out in December of 1864.

Towards the end of the Civil

War, Camp Union became a discharge center for returning troops until the post was closed and abandoned in 1866.

In all, members of the 5th Regiment California Volunteer Infantry spent much of their time in service in the western United States, attached to the Department of the Pacific and Department of New Mexico.

Hereditary membership is available to a male descendant, 14 years of age (6 to 14 for Juniors), who descends from a soldier, sailor, Marine or member of the Revenue Cutter Service (or directly descend from a brother, sister, half-brother, or half-sister of such Soldier, etc.) who was regularly mustered and served honorably in, was honorably discharged from, or died in the service of, the Army, Navy, Marine Corps or Revenue Cutter Service of the United States of America or in such state regiments called to active service and was subject to the orders of United States general officers, between April 12, 1861 and April 9,1865.

"We're a very active group in California," Bogart said. "A number of men have also participated in the Civil War re-enactments both at Fort Point in San Francisco during Civil War Days and as Friends of Civil War Alcatraz in recognition of its defensive role during that war,"

Men with an interest in joining the SUVCW but who do not live in an area where an SUVCW Department or Camp exists, may join as "members-at-large," Bogart said.

A 38,000-square foot grocery commercial space to the right of Jo-Ann Fabric and Crafts is nearing completion, but its name has yet to be publicly disclosed.

Sunrise Village Plaza, at the corner of Madison Avenue and Sunrise Boulevard in Citrus Heights is owned by the San Francisco-based Merlone-Geier investment company. The center is undergoing a \$15-20 million remodeling and expansion project which also includes new landscaping and upgraded signage. Asphalt paving of the center parking lot has finished, and landscaping work has now begun.

City Sport Club is operated by Irvine-based Fitness International LLC, the same entity that operates the LA Fitness chain of

health clubs.

The Bay Area-based City Sport Club has locations open in Antioch, Concord and Hayward,

with its first local club in the in Elk Grove. Sacramento area at 5114 Arden Way in Carmichael. Another new facility is scheduled to open soon

The new Citrus Heights City Sport Club is expected to be double the size of its Carmichael location. Membership pre-sale is likely to open in April with a targeted opening date in late July, said a regional representative who spoke by phone.

Some retail stores in the plaza, located along Madison Avenue, including a Little Caesar's pizza, a coin-op laundry and a liquor store remained open during the recent construction. Completion of additional exterior work on the retail locations of Habit Burger, Sourdough & Company and Teriyaki to Go continues to move forward, according to Larry Moorefield, which was delayed by recent winter rains.

Newsom Shuns Blame for California's Unseemly Issues

Gov. Gavin Newsom's obvious efforts to raise his national profile have taken two forms – touting California as a societal model and criticizing red states such as Florida and Texas for their supposed shortcomings.

Increasingly, Newsom employs a third tactic – shifting blame for California's less seemly aspects.

That tendency is particularly evident in something that Californians rate as one of their top concerns – its worstin-the-nation incidence of homelessness, manifested in thousands of squalid encampments in the state's cities.

While running for governor in 2018, Newsom promised to appoint a cabinet-level official to concentrate on homelessness but later, when reporters pressed him, responded, "You want to know who's the homeless czar?" Newsom. "I'm the homeless czar in the state of California."

Despite that self-appointed role, as homelessness continued to grow, officially approaching 200,000 people but probably much higher, Newsom began shunning responsibility.

Last year, he blamed local officials for a lack of effective action, at one point suspending state funds. He later restored the money but continued to castigate them.

"If we can't clean up the

encampments and address what's happening chronically on our streets, I'm going to be hard-pressed to make a case to the Legislature to provide them one dollar more," Newsom said as he introduced a new state budget in January.

Another example of Newsom's fingerpointing occurred last week as a congressional committee dominated by Republicans delved into why states – particularly California – handed out billions of dollars in unemployment insurance benefits to fraudsters.

The state auditor had issued a report citing the Employment Development Department's "poor planning and ineffective management" for shortcomings in handling unemployment insurance claims. But the current EDD director, Nancy Farias, sent the committee a four-page letter blaming Donald Trump's administration for as much as \$30 billion in fraudulent payments.

"Unfortunately, the Trump Administration expressed no interest in establishing (a) coordinated national response when these (emergency pandemic unemployment) programs were initiated in 2020, leaving states to fend for themselves against a clear pattern of sophisticated, international criminal syndicates at work," Farias' letter, which no doubt was approved by the governor's office, said.

A third example of blameshifting also popped up last week when Fresno County District Attorney Lisa Smittcamp cited Newsom's support for lenient prison policies that allowed the alleged killer of Selma policeman Gonzalo Carrasco to be released after serving just six months of a 64-month sentence for a previous crime.

"Today, Governor Gavin Newsom, and every legislator in the state of California who supports this over-reaching phenomenon they try to disguise as legitimate criminal justice reform, has the blood of this officer on their hands," Smittcamp said.


"The governor and his political allies who continue the quest to close state prisons are increasing the incidents of violence to everyone who lives in, or visits, the state of California," Smittcamp continued. "No city or county is safe from the wrath of this misguided thinking, and this mismanaged prison system."

Newsom quickly fired back, referring to the plea bargain that Smittcamp's office accepted: "She should blame herself. I've been listening to this for years from her. She has the prosecutorial discretion. Ask her what she did in terms of prosecuting that case."

Smittcamp persisted, saying, "Governor Newsom continues to demonstrate his ignorance and lack of understanding of how the criminal justice system works. His arrogant and defensive response is proof positive that he is attempting to deflect responsibility for his failed policies."

It is outrageous that the alleged killer, a self-proclaimed gang member with an extensive criminal record, was released after just six months. And it does exemplify the uber-lenient penal policies California has adopted in recent years, begun by former Gov. Jerry Brown and continued by Newsom.

Social Security Matters Will Social Security Be There for Me?

Dear Rusty: I am 56 and hope to hold out to get maximum Social Security at age 70. However, with all of the talk of Social Security funds being depleted, is it wise to continue with this mindset? Will there even BE Social Security benefits for folks in my age bracket? Should I think about starting Social Security benefits as soon as I am eligible? I am employed; however, I don't have a large amount of savings. I contribute to my company's 401(k) and receive the match, and I own my own home (almost paid off) with an estimated \$250,000.00 in equity, but I won't be able to stay in the home long term. Any insight you can provide would be greatly appreciated. Signed: Weary Worker

Dear Weary Worker: I don't suggest changing your strategy due to fears of Social Security not being there – it will be. Although the program is facing some future financial issues, the very worst that could happen is that everyone's benefits might be cut by 20+% if Congress fails to act to restore the program to solvency before the Trust Funds are depleted in the early to mid-2030s. In my opinion, Congress will not likely fail to act because to do so would be political suicide. The fact is, they already know how to fix Social Security's financial issues; they just lack the bipartisan spirit and political fortitude to do so until they extract every possible ounce of political capital from the issue. So, it's largely a matter of how long Congress will wait to reform the program.

Right now, the Social Security Trust Funds hold about \$2.8 trillion in reserves to ensure full benefits will be paid. But Social Security now pays out more in benefits than it receives in revenue, so the extra money needed to pay full benefits is taken from those reserves. What is needed is reform which addresses the reality that people today are living much longer and collecting benefits for much longer than the program is structured to accommodate. Many possible solutions are on the table in Congress, including raising the full retirement age a bit to deal with the reality of people living much longer, and increasing the program's tax revenue by withholding a bit more from American workers. The eventual reform will likely include some variation of both, as well as other "tweaks" which further guarantee the program will be there for future generations.

As for the thought of claiming your benefits as soon as you are eligible (age 62), be aware that Social Security has an "earnings test" which applies to anyone who collects benefits before reaching full retirement age (FRA). If you are working full time when you first become age-eligible, vou likelv wouldn't be able to collect benefits because your benefit amount would be insufficient to pay the penalty for exceeding the earnings limit (\$1 for every \$2 over the limit) within one year. And, as you may already know, your age 62 benefit would be cut by about 30% from your FRA amount, while your benefit at age 70 would be about 76% more than your age 62 benefit.

So even if the worst case scenario happens (which it almost certainly won't), an across the board cut of 20+% to your age 70 benefit would yield a higher monthly payment than that same cut to your age 62 benefit amount. So, I suggest you stick with your current strategy to continue working and wait as long as practical to claim your benefits (up to age 70). As an aside, AMAC (Association of Mature American Citizens) has, for years, been proposing (to Congress) its "Social Security Guarantee Plus" which would restore Social Security to solvency for generations to come and would not require an increased payroll tax rate. Congressional reaction has been generally positive, leading us to be hopeful for a reasonable solution to the problem.

California Climate Credit Approved for High Winter Bills

PG&E News Release

OAKLAND, CA (MPG) - Residential customers will automatically receive the California Climate Credit earlier than usual this year. The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) approved distributing the credit as soon as possible, instead of the annual April timeframe. The Climate Credit is part of California's efforts to fight climate change. Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) is pleased to administer the credit to help reduce customer energy bills. This credit will help offset higher than normal natural gas and electricity bills, which have been increasing due to higher demand and tighter natural gas supplies, especially on the West Coast.

For natural gas residential customers, the credit will be \$52.78, and for electric residential customers, the credit will be \$38.39. Customers who receive both services will receive a total credit of \$91.17.

"PG&E recognizes our responsibility to serve our customers safely and reliably while keeping their energy bills as low as possible. With the price PG&E pays for natural gas rising this year, this credit is great news for PG&E customers, who are likely noticing higher than average bills," said Vincent Davis, PG&E's Vice President of Customer Operations and Enablement.

California requires power plants, natural gas providers and other large industries that emit greenhouse gases to buy carbon pollution permits from auctions managed by the California Air Resources Board. The California Climate Credit is customers' share of the payments from the state's program.

Customers do not need to do anything to receive the credit, it will automatically appear as an adjustment on a customer's bill under the Adjustments Section on the Detailed Charges page.

Ways to Reduce Energy Bills

Here are several tools that customers can use now to manage winter bills:

Make sure you're on the right rate plan. Get a personalized Rate Plan Comparison to find the best rate plan for how your household uses energy. Budget Billing keeps bills predictable by leveling out monthly payments to offset high seasonal bills. Bill Forecast Alerts are notifications sent by email, text or phone notifying the customer if their monthly bill is expected to exceed a specific amount set by the customer.

Flexible payment arrangements. Extend your bill due date or make a payment arrangement. Access your online account for details.

Residential customers receive the Climate Credit twice a year, typically in April and October.



With Public Input, SAFE Grants \$5,000 to Help Curb Homelessness

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - On Jan. 30, 2023, SAFE Credit Union awarded Sacramento Cottage Housing Inc. a \$5,000 grant to fund new educational courses for its formerly homeless clients to learn important life and financial skills.

The grant was awarded through the credit union's Community Sustainability Grant Program, which provides funds to Sacramento region nonprofits with programs that support education, healthcare, and veterans. To engage the community and our members in our corporate giving initiatives, SAFE invited the community in December to determine the two grant recipients offering education programs that address inequities. Voters chose Sacramento Cottage Housing Inc. and the Construction Industry Education Foundation each receive to \$5,000 grants.

"The grant that SAFE is giving is such a gift and blessing for Cottage Housing," says Sacramento Cottage Housing Program Director Cynthia Hunt. "It is another tool that we can use to engage our residents on an everyday basis to address the causal factors that led to their homelessness so we can watch them bloom like the flowers in our garden."

Based in Sacramento, Cottage Housing works to lift unhoused people into independence and self-sufficiency. They

provide shelter, security and programs to families and individuals to help them focus on personal and professional development to gain confidence. At the heart of their program are two communities: Serna Village in North Highlands and Quinn Cottages near downtown Sacramento.

Part of their program includes Life Skill Development classes that provide applicable lessons on parenting, healthy eating, budgeting, and employment skills. SAFE's grant will go to create a new course on independent living skills and a second course of the residents' choosing.

The courses are designed in part to provide knowledge and skills needed for the residents to move forward on a more solid financial footing.

"I think financial freedom for our participants is giving them all the tools they need so they can live a life where they won't have debt, can make purchases and know how they're spending their money," Hunt says. "And to be able to do the things they want and to teach those tools to their children."

The grant to Cottage Housing was one of eight totaling \$95,000 awarded to nonprofits from SAFE in 2022.

Community "Our Sustainability Grant Program provides funding to programs that seek to make our communities economically stronger by giving people the tools and resources they need to live fulfilling, healthy lives," says SAFE Community Impact Manager Amanda Merz. "Cottage Housing is providing essential work to address the causal roots of homelessness in our community through programs that truly work. As all parents or adults, we have daily needs, grocery, shelter, transportation, repair bills, electricity to keep the lights on plus a host of other things. And occasionally you feel the desire to splurge, maybe a weekend getaway. Maybe we spend more than we can afford, but there's always the credit card!

Eventually the debt builds grows, the budget stretches, and you make "interest only" payments occasionally; but even minimum payments on the credit card, at 8-18% interest, the amount owed balloons! But it's okay. That hoped for wage increase in six months will ease the burden. However, you know that you can't continue this way and that eventually your debtors will require a "day of reckoning." You pray that your lenders will simply forget about you!

Teaching personal finance at the university, I've seen it all, families struggling financially, having autos repossessed, inability to afford a home, debt burdens, and bankruptcy. They muse, "If only I had learned to live on a budget." In fact, all states in the USA (except Vermont) require a balanced budget! California, the sixth largest nation-state in the world, has a yearly balanced budget! (Though having worked for the Governor's Department of Finance, sometimes the revenues might be bit overestimated, and expenses underestimated, but still basically balanced.)

Hopefully you're aware that the United States has no requirement to balance its budget. But are you aware that the debt of the national government is your debt? As the citizen owners of our government, we are also going into debt. And are you aware of just how much debt the USA has?

USA debt has dramatically increased in the past 30 years and is currently \$30.2 trillion (\$30,200,000,000,000) and rising! Your individual fair share is \$90,853!! And we, our children, and grandchildren will be paying for that bill! Now, suddenly it's not just a big number about a distant government, it's about YOU!

And this, \$30.2 trillion does NOT reflect our unfunded liabilities that exceed \$100 trillion, and that in less than ten years our interest on the debt will be \$1 trillion a year (that's interest only!)

At this moment, Medicare will be insolvent by 2026 and Social Security by 2030.

Again, this is a MASSIVE burden upon future generations, unless you think the USA government is somehow exempt from the basic rules of finance.

If you and I spent money so recklessly, you know that our "house of cards" would soon come tumbling down. Perhaps those from whom we (the US government) have borrowed won't want their money back? Perhaps they'll say, "Aw, shucks USA, that's alright, you don't have to pay me back?" Maybe. But then, again, some of us may still believe in the "tooth fairy."

The immediate result of this debt is slower growth; compromised national security in an already very dangerous world; more of a gap between the haves and have not's; increasing taxes from Washington; and the federal government will cut spending only to give more unfunded mandates to the states. Ultimately, taxpayers and the states will bear the burden.

Just as a lender looks at your financial ability to pay for a loan, or debt to income ratio, we can look at the financial stability of the USA by comparing our debt to our "gross domestic product or GDP" (the total of goods and services created by the US economy annually). It should normally be 30-40%. Today it's 129% and growing. Is the day of reckoning upon us?

Commercial Vehicle Parking Prohibition

The City will be considering an ordinance adding a section to the Citrus Height Municipal Code at Section 94-281 which would prohibit parking of Commercial Vehicles (Semi-Trucks, Truck/Trailers, STAA Trucks, and similar) on all public streets within the City Limits. Commercial Vehicles will no longer be able to park within the Citrus Heights City limits after the effective date of this ordinance (anticipated to be April 9, 2023).

For purposes of the ordinance, parking of commercial vehicles will no longer be permissible within Citrus Heights. The prohibition will allow commercial trucks to make deliveries to commercial businesses and/or deliveries within residential zones for bona fide repair, alteration, remodeling or rehabilitation, or construction of any building, structure or home/business improvement upon such restricted streets for which a building permit has been obtained or for such other work not requiring a building permit.

As a new member of the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, Assemblyman Hoover also plans to propose an audit of statewide homelessness spending in the near future to provide more accountability and determine which programs are effective at reducing homelessness.



Intellectual Property Protections Will Decide Control of the Global Economy

America is the world's most innovative country. Or at least it was.

By many measures, that title now belongs to China. The authoritarian powerhouse issued more patents than the United States for the first time in 2019, and it has left us in the dust ever since.

In recent years, China has also outpaced the United States in the number of scientific publications published in peer-reviewed journals, the number of scientists and engineers graduating with advanced degrees, and other similar metrics.

The trends all point in the same direction: China aims to out-innovate the United States in the most critical technologies of the future.

Worryingly, those innovations will very likely determine control of the 21st-century global economy. In the past decade, China accounted for nearly three-quarters of all patents related to artificial intelligence. In biotechnology -- Chinese firms now account for about 18% of cancer drugs in the early stages of development worldwide, triple their share in 2015.

Our economic and national security depend on retaking the lead -- and keeping it. Unfortunately, instead of promoting policies that support and protect American innovators, many in Washington fail to acknowledge the inextricable link between innovation and intellectual property protections.

Strong IP protections deserve much of the credit for transforming the United States from a colonial backwater into the richest nation in the world. Our Founders saw patents and other IP protections as so important; they embedded IP protection into the Constitution itself.

It was a wise move. IP rules protect inventors -- and their investors -- from others stealing their work. Without copyrights, few authors or artists would pour their sweat and tears into creating masterpieces, since others could undercut them with impunity.

The same dynamic holds true across every IP-intensive industry. Broad fields of invention are highly risky, expensive, and failure-prone, yet easy to copy once the investment is made and the failures overcome. Without the temporary exclusivity afforded by intellectual property rights, America's best and brightest would have no incentive to create new breakthroughs.

Historically, American workers and consumers have reaped rich rewards from America's strong IP system. Our IP-intensive industries accounted for \$7.8 trillion of GDP in 2019. And over the next decade, job creation in IP-intensive industries is expected to outpace other industries.

But this forecast is hardly guaranteed. Americans' intellectual property is under attack from abroad and here at home.

This past summer, the Biden administration helped push through an initiative at the World Trade Organization to waive IP protections for the mRNA vaccines that saved millions of lives around the world.

In Congress, meanwhile, lawmakers have called on President Biden to effectively nullify the intellectual property of our nation's top research universities - a move guaranteed to chill research benefiting many industries including climate, energy, and pharmaceuticals.

Weakening IP protections, or even stoking doubts about America's commitment to strong IP rights, will hurt innovators raising venture funding, whether that innovator is an individual developing new cybersecurity tools, or a clean energy startup working to fight climate change.

We come from opposite political parties -- but we've both dedicated our adult lives to promoting and protecting intellectual property. It's the lifeblood of our economy. Any lawmaker who wants to increase innovation in the United States must understand the need for strong IP rights. They are inextricably linked.



What Are 'Red Flag' Laws and How Can They Prevent Gun Violence?

California's red flag law, which allows people to obtain gun violence restraining orders (GVROs), went into effect seven years ago. Since then, GVROs have been credited with deterring at least 58 potential mass shootings and other types of gun violence in California, including suicides. Currently, 19 states and the District of Columbia have red flag laws, also known as extreme risk protection order laws.

But what are they, and how do they work?

"Red flag laws are a tool law enforcement and others can use when somebody is clearly at high risk of doing something with a firearm, but they can't be arrested because no crime has been committed and they don't appear to need a mental health hold or qualify for one," Amy Barnhorst said.

Barnhorst is a psychiatrist at UC Davis Health and an expert on violence prevention. She is vice chair of Community Mental Health and the director of the BulletPoints Project, which teaches clinicians how to prevent firearm violence. She remembers the days before California's red flag law. "When somebody was making threats about hurting people at their school or even threats of suicide, there wasn't much that could be done," Barnhorst said. "Red flag laws have changed that. With the law, there is something that can be done about people who are making threats or have concerning behaviors."

Obtaining a gun violence restraining order

Gun-related deaths remain high in the U.S. The Gun Violence Archive, which tracks firearm violence in the U.S., reports 648 mass shootings, 20,176 homicides, and 24,090 suicides in 2022.

about 80% of cases, people who commit mass shootings or suicide make their intentions known in advance to family members or friends or via social media. "It's really important that if you are concerned about a student in your school, or you're a concerned parent, teacher, employer, or somebody who's worried about someone, know there is a way to intervene and reduce the risk. But you need to tell someone, such as law enforcement, who can act," Barnhorst said.

"If you're in California, and there is someone you're concerned about who may be at risk of firearm injury, and they Research has found that in have access to guns, you can go

to the Speak for Safety website. It can help walk you through how to pursue a gun violence restraining order," Barnhorst said. The website has different tabs you can select for your relationship to the person at risk, such as employer or co-worker, family or household member, law enforcement or teacher or school employee.

The California Courts website also has information in English and Spanish about how to obtain a GVRO.

"In many cases, law enforcement can get an emergency GVRO on the scene, and they can remove any firearms from the person at risk at that time," Barnhorst said. "If the judge determines that the person is at risk, the judge can continue the prohibition. The guns will continue to be kept away for the duration of the order, which can be renewed after a year or longer in some cases."

Barnhorst explains there is due process during all stages of the legal procedures. "People who have had their firearms removed can appear in court to give their side. If the judge determines they are not a danger, the prohibition can be lifted, and the firearms returned," Barnhorst said. She notes GVROs are civil court actions. They don't involve the criminal courts, and they don't become part of a person's criminal record.

Most people don't know about GVROs

Despite the potential to reduce mass shootings and suicides, the use of GVROs in California has been limited. One of the biggest barriers appears to be the lack of awareness about them. A recent survey found that nearly two-thirds of the respondents did not know about GVROs, although 70% said they would consider using one in a high-risk situation.

"The GVRO law empowers people to play a role in preventing firearm violence among friends, family members, co-workers and classmates by providing a tool to remove firearms from crisis situations," said Veronica Pear, an assistant professor at the Violence Prevention Research Program at UC Davis. Pear studies violence prevention and has published numerous studies about the efficacy of red flag laws. "However, the law can only save lives if it is used, and for that reason, education is key," Pear said.

Sac County Earns State Prohousing Designation

SACRAMENTO COUNTY. CA (MPG) - The California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) announced on Friday, February 3, 2023, that Sacramento County has earned the state's Prohousing Designation. Sacramento County, along with Placer County and the City of El Cerrito, joins seven other jurisdictions recognized for a commitment to policies that increase housing supply such as accelerating production, promoting equitable and sustainable zoning and land use, reducing development costs and providing financial subsidies. Sacramento County is also now eligible for the Prohousing Incentive Pilot (PIP) Program that rewards Prohousing communities for such commitments.

To earn the Prohousing Designation, cities and counties must demonstrate they are promoting climate-smart housing in a variety of ways, including but not limited to streamlining multifamily housing development, up-zoning in places near jobs and transit to reduce emissions, and creating more affordable homes in places that historically or currently exclude households earning lower incomes and households of color.

Sacramento County's application highlights include the modification of development standards and other applicable zoning provisions to promote greater development intensity. In addition, the county provides impact fee reductions for residential development and permits "missing middle" housing in

typically lower-density, single-family residential zones. Lastly, the county uses holistic planning strategies in an effort to reduce vehicle miles traveled and greenhouse gas emissions.

"The Planning and Environmental Review Division has been hard at work updating its Zoning Code to allow for streamlined residential development," said Troy Givans, Sacramento County Community Development Director. "These updates have allowed for an expedited permitting process, which we believe will accelerate housing development in the unincorporated County."

"The County offers a one-stop shop for fee deferral/waivers for County of Sacramento, Sacramento Area Sewer District, Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District, and Sacramento County Water Agency impact fees on regulated affordable residential projects to allow for streamlined fee deferral/ waiver process. In addition, the County's participation in Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP) provides additional

financing tools to ease development impact fees for public infrastructure needed for residential projects."

The State of California budget for the fiscal year 2019-20 established the Prohousing Designation Program as part of a spectrum of support, incentive and accountability measures to help meet California's housing goals. Increasing the availability of housing statewide is critical to bettering the quality of life of all Californians and to ending homelessness. Communities that earn the Prohousing Designation receive incentives in the form of additional points and/or other preferences in the scoring of competitive housing, community development and infrastructure funding programs administered by HCD.

Prohousing jurisdictions are also eligible for community development resources through the new PIP Program. The competitive program has \$25.7 million in additional flexible funding available to help accelerate housing production and expand the preservation of affordable housing \star

the airport's skyline, but it also sets the stage for the airport's growth and our region's as a whole."

SMFoward creates jobs and economic opportunities for local businesses and serves as a catalyst for further development in the region.
