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## Council Reviews School Safety Measures

**CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG)** - At the January 12 meeting, the Citrus Heights City Council heard a presentation from Mike Jones, Director of the San Juan Unified School District's (SJUSD) Safe Schools Team, which works to improve campus safety and create an environment and culture where students feel secure and able to succeed. They develop comprehensive school safety plans, assess school site vulnerabilities, plan emergency procedures and response drills, address issues of bullying, respond to student behavior issues, and address any disruptions affecting school site safety.

"We do it very well with a small group," said Jones. As Director, he oversees the program, which includes one Supervisor, eight Community Safety Specialists, and one Safe Routes to Schools

Specialist. He explained that the program used to involve contracts with the Sheriff's Department to employ off-duty officers as School Resource Officers (SRO), but that practice was discontinued in 2018 due to community concerns, a lack of available officers, and budget issues.

While police training isn't a requirement for employment on the Safe Schools Team, many of the employees do have a background in law enforcement. And Jones said all the Community Safety Specialists are highly trained in emergency response procedures, active threat response, critical incident management, crisis communication and de-escalation skills, behavioral threat assessment, therapeutic crisis intervention, and crime prevention. They are also mandated reporters and trained to recognize child abuse and neglect, as well as signs of

human trafficking.

The Safe Schools Team works in close partnership with law enforcement to investigate direct threats to school safety, address crimes on school grounds, and conduct behavioral threat assessments. The team brings together mental health professionals, social workers, counselors, school administrators, teachers, law enforcement officers, and safety specialists to investigate concerns about students who may be a threat to themselves or to others and to determine the appropriate intervention tactics. Jones said, "I do truly believe that most acts of school violence are preventable," and he views this collaborative team as a key element of locating possible threats.

Jones said that after some "horrific school shootings" across the country in recent years, the Safe Schools Program launched Site Safety and

Vulnerability Studies this school year (2022/2023). All the high schools, middle schools, and K-8 schools have been fully assessed and the elementary school assessments are underway and will be completed by March 1, 2023.

The outcomes of the completed assessments have shown that there are some site vulnerabilities, so various safety improvements should be implemented. Jones said many of the district schools are around 50 years old and "were built to be part of the community. They were built to be open and welcoming, and to have those easements of use, and to be really an extension of the existing community."

But the ease of access needs to be addressed: Jones explained that fencing and gate systems will be put in place at all schools to ensure a single point of entry and exit

## CaIVCB Offers Resources, for Human Trafficking Victims

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - The California Victim Compensation Board (CaIVCB) is promoting national Human Trafficking Prevention Month with a social media campaign and reminders about the support available for survivors.

Three years ago, CaIVCB began authorizing income loss compensation for victims of sex and labor trafficking as a result of Assembly Bill 629, which took effect on Jan. 1, 2020. In that time, CaIVCB has approved 590 human trafficking claims and paid victims \$4,445,861 in lost wages.

"Sex and labor trafficking victims face many challenges as they try to rebuild their lives," said CaIVCB Executive Office Lynda Gledhill. "CaIVCB can help by compensating for lost income or other expenses, such as mental health counseling, caused by the trauma of being trafficked."

To help bring awareness to the problem and make victims aware of the support and resources available, CaIVCB launched a social media campaign and created a media toolkit for others to use.

Human trafficking is the practice of enslaving people for labor, sexual activity, or commercial sexual exploitation. Human trafficking can occur within a country or trans-nationally and does not necessarily involve the movement of the victim from one place to another.

Human trafficking is considered the world's third-largest criminal enterprise, after drug dealing and arms trafficking. An estimated 12.8 percent of all human trafficking cases in the United States in 2021 came from California, according to the National Human Trafficking Hotline.

In an effort to bring attention to this national and global problem, in 2007 the U.S. Senate designated January 11 as a National Day of Human Trafficking Awareness. In 2010, President Barack Obama proclaimed January as National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month.

In addition to income loss compensation, which covers up to \$20,000 for a two-year period, CaIVCB can reimburse survivors for other expenses caused by human trafficking, including medical, dental, and mental health treatment, home security and relocation.

# UC Davis Health Improving Eye Care for People with Diabetes

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Diabetes affects 34.2 million people in the United States. Diabetic retinopathy, a diabetes complication that affects blood vessels in the eye, is the leading cause of blindness in adults. Early detection and treatment are critical to prevent vision loss but fewer than 50% of the 3.2 million Californians with diabetes undergo their recommended yearly eye screening. Glenn Yiu, a professor of ophthalmology at UC Davis Health, hopes to increase that number significantly.

The UC Office of the President announced Yiu received a \$2 million grant to lead an interdisciplinary program, the Collaborative UC Teleophthalmology Initiative, or CUTI. The project, part of UCOP Multicampus Research Programs & Initiatives, is in partnership with medical centers at UC San Diego, UC San Francisco and UC Los Angeles. CUTI builds on a screening program Yiu launched at UC Davis Health in 2018. The goal is to expand eye care access for diabetics, particularly for underserved populations. The project will utilize digital medical equipment for teleophthalmology or “remote” ophthalmology.

### How Teleophthalmology can be used for Screenings

A key feature of the CUTI program is integrating digital eye screenings into routine care at primary care facilities or clinics for patients with diabetes. The screening is simple and just requires the patient to look into a special camera. Known as a fundus camera or retinal camera, the machine takes high-resolution images of the interior of the eye. The images can detect changes that may signal diabetic retinopathy and other eye conditions. After the digital image is

taken at the primary care office or clinic, the results are sent to an off-site eye care provider for evaluation and diagnosis.

will work with community clinics and Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) to reach underserved members of the community.

community clinics, such as Clinica Tepati and Paul Hom Asian Clinic, that provide care in Sacramento’s inner-city neighborhoods. UC Davis

awareness and acceptance of telehealth. He thinks this technology can reduce in-person health visits and improve access and adherence to preventative eye care.

The interdisciplinary CUTI team includes members from the four different UC campuses with expertise in public health, clinical informatics, and health economics who can address obstacles in clinical workflow, technology integration, and financial sustainability.

The retinal images taken during the four-year study will be collected in a centralized repository for research using artificial intelligence. Artificial intelligence may be able to identify eye diseases and predict the risk of cardiovascular events and strokes simply from images of the eye’s interior.

“The introduction of artificial intelligence is another exciting development in teleophthalmology,” Yiu said. “The incorporation of AI for automated image interpretation allows for faster and more sensitive diagnosis of early eye disease.”

Remote diabetic eye screening is already available at UC Davis primary clinics in Midtown, Folsom, Elk Grove, and the Lawrence E. Ellison Ambulatory Care Center. Yiu and his team believe that remote eye imaging may be used in the future to screen for other eye conditions such as glaucoma and age-related macular degeneration (AMD). Over the four-year program, they hope to spread the word to improve awareness about preventative eye care.

“We are excited to start this project and hope to find a way to scale it up for all of California. Our long-term goal is to make it easy for people with diabetes to get their annual eye screening, so we can help people avoid preventable blindness.” ★

Since launching a separate pilot teleophthalmology program at UC Davis in 2018, Yiu has improved diabetic eye screening rates by more than 15%, helping to make UC Davis Health one of the top performers in the country.

### Screening for Underserved Patients

In addition to eye screenings at primary care facilities at UC health systems, the program

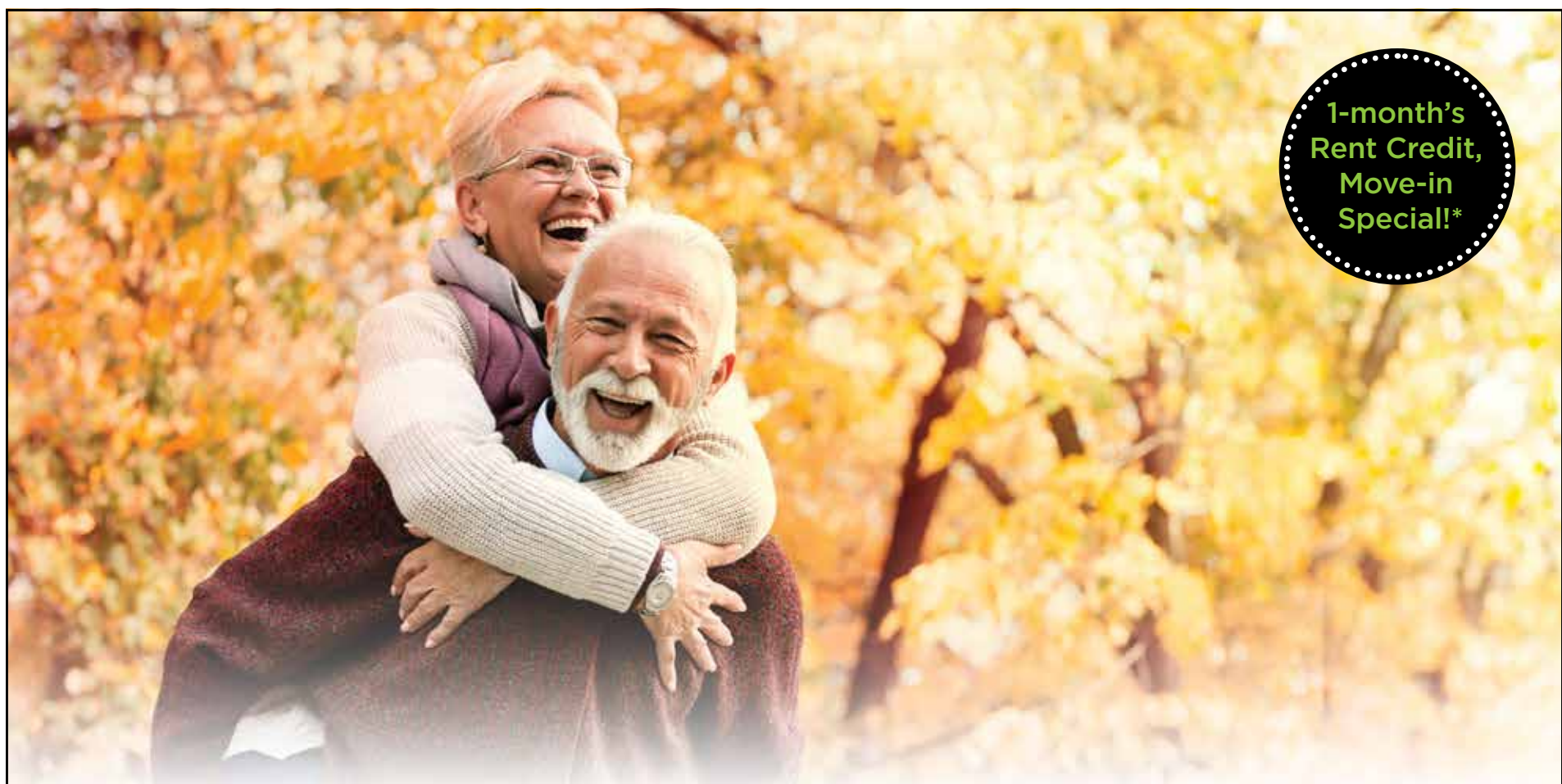

Health is also working with Communicare Health Care Centers, a FQHC, to provide remote diabetic eye screening to rural areas of California’s Central Valley. The region has limited eye care access. UC San Diego and UC San Francisco will also be engaging with community clinics in addition to primary care centers.

### Training and Identifying Barriers

Because eye screenings are not a routine part of primary care, the program will train health care providers and identify the barriers that prevent the widespread adoption of remote eye screening. Yiu noted that the COVID-19 pandemic increased

# Blood Supply Sinks to Lowest Level in a Year

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - The blood supply for about 900 hospitals nationwide recently dipped to its lowest level in a year at Vitalant, triggering a blood emergency for the nonprofit blood services provider. Eligible donors of all blood types, especially type O, are needed now to schedule an appointment and donate in the days and weeks ahead to prevent delays for patients who need transfusions.

Changes in the way people work, live, and play since the start of the pandemic created lasting challenges to maintaining an adequate blood supply. As many people continue to work remotely, blood donations at business-hosted blood drives are down by 50% in 2022 from 2019, a decline of 90,000 donations. Overall, the number of people donating with Vitalant has dropped about 20% in the last three years, while patients' needs remain strong.

Mitzy Edgcomb, Vitalant's west division vice president, reports, "The frequency of emergency blood shortages is a grave concern for all of us. Because blood is perishable with no artificial substitute, the blood supply must be constantly replenished. Despite extraordinary outreach efforts in the last few months, blood inventory continues to be dangerously low."

Vitalant notes that new donors and those who

haven't donated recently are critical to end blood shortages and help our blood supply return to more stable, pre-pandemic levels.

In addition to societal shifts, recent blood drive cancellations forced by severe winter weather and illnesses have compounded the shortage. Blizzards, rain/wind/flooding and extreme cold caused more than 2,000 donations to go uncollected in December and early January.

Donors of every blood type are critical to ending this shortage and maintaining an adequate supply. The need is most acute for type O blood and platelets. Type O-positive is the

most transfused blood type while O-negative can help patients of any blood type. Donated platelets, which often help cancer patients, must be used within a week.

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# Californians' Patience on Homelessness Wears Thin

Last week, a viral video showed the owner of a San Francisco art gallery using a water hose to spray a homeless woman camped outside the doorway of his business.

The gallery owner, Collier Gwin, semi-apologized later, telling a television interviewer, "I totally understand what an awful thing that is to do, but I also understand what an awful thing it is to leave her on the streets."

Gwin said he and other business owners complained to police about her blocking the sidewalks and business entrances. Efforts had been made to help her get off the streets, but nothing has worked.

"We called the police. There must be at least 25 calls to police," Gwin said. "It's two days in a homeless shelter, it's two days in jail, and then they drop them right back on the street."

Finally, after the woman once again refused to move, in frustration Gwin sprayed her down.

Gwin obviously did the wrong thing, but the incident dramatized the frustration that millions of Californians feel about the squalid encampments of homeless people that have become the defining feature of urban California.

Gov. Gavin Newsom acknowledged the growing resentment as he introduced his new state budget last week. "People have just had it," he told reporters. "They want the encampments cleaned up."

"People are dying on the streets all across this state," Newsom said. "The encampments, we've got to clean them up, we've got to take ownership, we've got to take responsibility."

In the last two state budgets, Newsom and the Legislature have committed \$17.5 billion for housing and services to the estimated 170,000 homeless Californians – about \$100,000 each. However, as Newsom's new budget acknowledges, "Despite unprecedented resources from the state and record numbers of people being served by the homelessness response system, the population of unhoused individuals grows faster than the population exiting homelessness."

The new budget adds several more billion dollars, but suggests that local governments are still not doing enough – a theme that Newsom has pursued in recent months.

Last year, he rejected all of the plans that local governments had submitted, saying they fell well short of actually making real progress on reducing the upward trend. After a showdown meeting with local officials, he agreed to release more state aid.

"The first iteration of these plans made clear that more ambition is required – and more direction from the state is necessary," the budget declares.

"Accordingly, the administration plans to work with the Legislature this year to advance homeless accountability legislation."

The budget suggests that cities failing to meet their state quotas for zoning land for new housing might lose state financing for homelessness programs.

"If we can't clean up the encampments and address what's happening chronically on our streets, I'm going to be hard-pressed to make a case to the Legislature to provide them one dollar more," Newsom told reporters.

That threat doesn't sit well with local government officials. The League of California Cities issued a sharp reaction, saying, "one-time investments will not solve the crisis" and adding, "We need ongoing state funding and a coordinated approach with clearly defined roles and responsibilities for all levels of government that supports long-term solutions."

The exchanges suggest there is still no consensus on what combination of actions would have a visible impact and all of the politicians involved are engaged in some blame-shifting as the voting public's patience with the squalor wears thin.

Newsom knows that if the crisis is not resolved, it will leave an indelible mark on his governorship and haunt whatever future political career moves he might make.

# Bera Gets \$32 Million for Projects

**WASHINGTON, DC (MPG)** - Representative Ami Bera, M.D. (CA-07) announced that he secured \$32,787,591 in federal funding to support 15 local Sacramento-area projects in the Fiscal Year 2023 government funding package that passed the House of Representatives on December 23, 2022. The funding package previously passed the Senate and now heads to President Biden's desk for his signature into law.

# SacCounty Shelter/Weather Respite for Unhoused

**SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - Sacramento County has moved its evacuation shelter/weather respite for unhoused guests to Cal Expo (1600 Exposition Blvd., Building 8) as of Thursday, Jan. 12.

This location has cots, blankets, water, and snacks for guests, as well as crates for pets.

In addition to serving as an evacuation center, Cal Expo is welcoming unhoused individuals in search of weather respite from throughout the County through partnerships with the City of Sacramento, 2-1-1 Sacramento, and community-based outreach organizations

Additional locations will be opened as needed.

The County of Sacramento activated its motel voucher weather respite program ahead of the original storm on New Year's

Eve and is currently sheltering more than 350 people.

In addition, the County increased capacity at its North A Shelter on Dec. 31 and will welcome new guests as beds are vacated. This location will accommodate pets.

The Outreach and Engagement Center (3615 Auburn Blvd.) opened as a 24-hour weather respite center as of Wednesday, Jan. 4. Walk-ups are accepted, and families and pets are welcome.

The North Fifth shelter lobby (700 North Fifth St.) is operating from 8 p.m. to 8 a.m. It also will accept walk-ups. (Please note that North Fifth is for adults only and is unable to accommodate pets.)

People can use SacRT light rail and buses for free to go to and from any weather-respite location. The SacRT light rail station at Watt/I-80 station connects to bus Route 1, which has a stop near the City's OEC. ★

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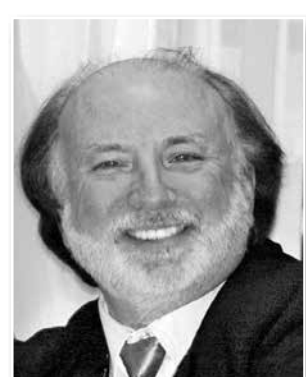

Rates, APR, terms and conditions are subject to change without notice. Other conditions apply. A \$525 early closure fee will be assessed if the line of credit is closed within three years from the date of opening. An annual fee of \$85 will be assessed on the first anniversary of the HELOC and annually thereafter during the draw period. 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# How to Report Property Damage

**SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - Severe storms have caused widespread damage, flooding, and power outages across the Sacramento region. The Sacramento County Office of Emergency Services (OES) needs help from residents who sustained property damage in assessing the full extent of storm damage. These reports will be used to determine when and where a Local Assistance Center (LAC) may be established.

A LAC is activated following major disasters to support residents and businesses that have suffered disaster-related losses or damages. It provides recovery direction, assistance and resources to residents when recovering from a disaster.

Before the LAC can be stood up, a

decision must be made regarding location. This will be determined based on where the most storm damage occurred. To report damage to homes or businesses within Sacramento County go to, <https://report-ca-sacramento.orion-central.com/>. All information will be sent to OES and reported to State and Federal emergency response agencies. This is not the same as a report for insurance.

County OES is coordinating with all local partners to collect public property damage assessments and are preparing to deploy assessment teams to identify and document areas impacted by storm damage.

To report downed trees on public property and roads, call 311 or go to <https://311.saccounty.gov/>. You can also report flooded roads to 311. ★

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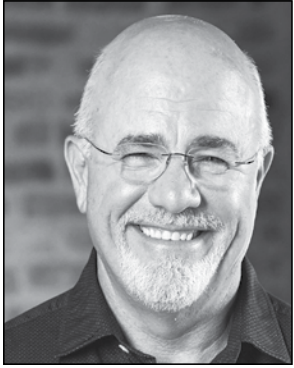
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**Let's tweak that idea a little**

Dear Dave,

I am on Baby Step 2, and I started a YouTube channel earlier this year that led to a new opportunity to make additional income. I try on and review clothing, and I'm paid \$30 for each clip that's anywhere from 30 seconds to two minutes long. Right now, I have about 1,000 viewers. This requires me to buy items from several brands. I usually return the items when I'm through filming, but I'm currently funding this with a credit card I only use for this project. I only pay the minimum each month until I get the refund, so at any given time there can be up to \$4,000 on the card in rotation. I make about \$86,000 at my normal job, so is this an okay way to fund my project and chalk it up as a business expense?

**Dave Ramsey Says**

Dear Amber,

You're taking a risk here, from a business perspective, by playing around with \$4,000 in debt to make \$30 a pop. That's inordinate. And you shouldn't be paying for the clothes in the first place. These brands should be giving you clothes to review – that you keep – for the marketing exposure, but I'm not sure you've got enough eyeballs on you yet to justify them giving you the clothes for free.

Basically, it sounds like you're trying to put yourself in a position to be an influencer. And the way influencers get paid is by monetizing eyeballs. Obviously, YouTube and other platforms will pay you if you can get the eyeballs. But 1,000 viewers really aren't a lot these days. You're getting there, though, and I'm glad you're working at it and trying to make things happen.

You make good money, Amber. I want you to set aside \$2,000 or \$3,000 for this business, maybe out of the business income, and prime the pump one time. By that, I mean open a separate checking account that's

for your clothing exchange process only. Here's the thing, let's say you bought \$1,000 worth of stuff from one of these companies, and they suddenly decide they're not taking it back. You just ate that \$1,000. And guess what else? Now, you really have credit card debt.

There are three things you can always be sure of in business. One, it's going to cost twice as much as you think it will. Two, it's going to take twice as long as you think it will. And three, you are not the exception to these things. While we're at it, add this to the list of stuff you can always be sure of – you'll never find me advising or endorsing credit card debt!

**Social Security Matters**  
**Will My Work Earnings Affect My Social Security Benefits?**

**Dear Rusty:** I am presently 67 years of age and am still working full time. I am receiving Medicare coverage, but I have not yet applied for monthly Social Security payments. I have been told that I can take SS payments even if I am still working. Is that correct? Is there a limit to how much I can earn each year and still receive SS payments? **Signed: Working but Wondering**

**Dear Working:** Social Security's so-called "earnings test" applies only to those who haven't yet reached their full retirement age. At 67 years of age, you are already past your SS full retirement age (FRA) of 66 years and 2 months, which means there is no longer a limit to how much you can earn from working. Regardless of how much you earn, your monthly Social Security benefits will not be

affected, so you can claim your Social Security at any time and not worry about your benefits being affected.

You should also know that because you haven't yet claimed your Social Security, your monthly benefit has been growing since you reached your full retirement age in October of 2021. You've been earning Delayed Retirement Credits (DRCs) at the rate of .667% more benefit for each month you have delayed claiming, so your benefit now at 67 would be over 8% more than it would have been at your FRA last year. And, if you wish to, you can continue waiting to claim SS and continue to earn those DRCs to get a still higher benefit. But DRCs stop when you reach 70, when you would get your maximum Social Security benefit – about 31% more than your FRA amount – so never wait past age 70 to claim.

To recap: because you've already passed your full retirement age you can claim your SS benefit now (e.g., to start in January) and get a benefit which is 8+% more than you would have gotten if you claimed at your full retirement age, or you can continue to wait and get an even higher

amount by claiming even later. Which way to go depends a lot on your current financial needs and your life expectancy. If you don't urgently need the money now and are in good health and expect at least average longevity (about 84 for a man your current age), then waiting longer to claim would be a smart move. But if you need (or want) the money now, then claiming at this time would also be a wise choice. In either case, you don't need to worry about your earnings from work negatively affecting your monthly Social Security benefit – they won't.

# Getting More Covered

Hundreds of thousands of Californians previously shut out of Covered California — the state program that offers discounted health insurance — soon can participate because the eligibility requirements are changing.

Prior to the new rules, individuals who had access to an employer-based health insurance plan through a family member were not eligible for Covered California. Employer plans are often expensive for spouses or children, driving up the cost of coverage for those family members. Those caught in this unaffordable “family glitch” have few choices: buy the expensive plan, try to buy a bare-bones plan separately or go without health insurance.

In April, the Biden administration issued guidelines to fix the near-decade-long problem and last month the federal government adopted the regulation. Starting in January 2023, if a family’s premium costs more than 9.12% of the household income the family could be eligible for federal subsidies, or discounts, through Covered California.

According to the UC Berkeley Labor Center, the “glitch” impacts an estimated 615,000 people in California, mostly women and children from low and middle-income families. The center estimates that about 400,000 of those people would be eligible for financial assistance through Covered California based on their income.

“For the people impacted, it could be worth hundreds of thousands of dollars,” said Anthony Wright, executive director of Health Access California, a consumer rights group. “It really does have an impact on the health and well-being of the family and their finances.”

A state analysis by Third

Way, a national think tank, found that a California family of four with \$53,000 in annual earnings would likely save about \$4,340 a year in health insurance premium costs. The report shows that lower-income households would see the most significant savings.

The federal government is footing the bill for the expansion and pays subsidies directly to the health plans based on Covered California’s marketplace prices. The Congressional Budget Office reported that it would cost \$44 billion over the next 10 years to cover family members previously impacted by the family glitch.

Covered California pays for outreach to families, including those who have been caught in the glitch, said Jessica Altman, executive director of Covered California. Covered California has a \$109 million annual budget for marketing and the bulk is spent during open enrollment to outreach to

Californians to sign up or renew coverage.

Open enrollment started this week and runs through Jan. 31, 2023. Coverage can begin as early as Jan. 1.

California health advocates have been trying to solve the glitch at the state level for years but it was too expensive for the state to pay the cost. The federal government had to decide to fix it and fund it.

This change should help reduce the number of uninsured people in California. The state has experienced the steepest decline in the number of uninsured since the federal Affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare, launched in 2013. Since then, some 35 million people have enrolled in health plans nationwide, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

The state’s rate of uninsured residents dropped from 17% in 2013 to 7% in 2021. More than half of the 3 million still uninsured in California are

eligible for some sort of coverage, according to UCLA Center for Health Policy Research and UC Berkeley Labor Center. The remainder, about 1.2 million, are undocumented immigrants who are ineligible for coverage through the exchange, although some may now qualify for public programs.

Any change that increases coverage for Californians, especially children, is a boon, Wright said.

“This is a big deal toward the goal of a government guarantee that everybody has access to affordable health coverage,” Wright said of the policy change. “The more we get rid of asterisks and exclusions the better.”

The change comes as employers continue to shift insurance costs to families. According to a Kaiser Family Foundation survey, premiums for family coverage increased 22% between 2016 and 2021.

Nationally, about 5 million individuals are eligible only for unaffordable employer-provided

insurance. More than half of those are children. Among adults, more women than men are caught in the glitch.

“It created an unaffordable situation for a small but meaningful group of people,” said Christine Eibner, a senior economist focused on health care at RAND, a nonprofit research organization that published a report about the issue in 2015. “Most of them were enrolling anyhow and paying the higher premium. They could be paying 15% to 20% of their income.”

In California, of the estimated 615,000 who are stuck with high-priced employer insurance plans as their only option, researchers estimated that about 87,000 are uninsured, Altman said. About 35,000 are in the individual market paying full rates and the majority are paying for that expensive employer-sponsored coverage, Altman said.

“There are families that can save thousands of dollars — middle-income families, lower-income families — that it’s going to

make a significant change for,” Altman said. “There is value in helping people who have coverage to connect with lower-cost coverage.”

If people are uninsured or have expensive coverage they are less likely to get the care they need.

Those who stretch their budgets to sign up for employer-based plans may take the least expensive plan with higher deductibles or catastrophic coverage, Wright said. That could result in people going to the doctor less or not using the plans they have because they would still have to pay out of pocket.

“We believe it’s important to have the whole family covered,” Wright said. “There is a real result of not having coverage. The uninsured live sicker, die younger and are one emergency away from financial ruin.”

The Affordable Care Act requires employers with at least 50 employees to offer health insurance to them and their dependents. Spouses are usually included but not required under the law. In California, 47% of people are enrolled in an employer-provided plan. A national study published in the Health Affairs Journal found that families spend an average of 16% of household income paying employer-based premiums.

Before the latest change, the Affordable Care Act allowed employees to obtain insurance through discounted state programs if their employer health plan cost more than 9.1% of their income, which is considered unaffordable. Employers face penalties if their workers are obtaining insurance through those state programs.

Also, prior to the latest change, the law did not define affordability for family members and employers faced no penalties related to the cost of premiums for family members. ★

where visitors must check in through the office during school hours. And standardized classroom door locks will be installed so all rooms can be secured from the inside without a key. And improved building signage and pathway markings will make it easier for emergency responders to navigate the school sites.

Jones said the SJUSD Safe Schools model is leading the way in school safety improvements, and many other districts are following their lead. Newer schools in the SJUSD already meet many of these safety guidelines, but \$10 million has been earmarked from existing bonds to implement these improvements at older sites. Project development for the fencing is underway, but it will take some time to meet design and code requirements. New signage and door locks are being addressed immediately and are ongoing through district maintenance.

Councilmember Bret Daniels asked for more details about the

decision to move away from the SRO model in 2018. Jones explained that with the high cost of SROs and their lack of availability, the District decided to shift to a model that offered the “biggest bang for their buck” by focusing on supportive resources and prevention. Daniels said he was pleased to hear about the planned improvements to gates and fencing: “I think that’s critical. You’ve got to harden the target.”

In October 2022, the Council asked the CHPD to determine the possible cost of placing an armed officer at each of the 12 school sites within the city. Chief of Police Alex Turcotte presented the results of that report, which he made clear did not offer any recommendation for action but simply answered the question of potential cost. Turcotte said, “While the campuses are within our jurisdiction, currently our public schools are part of the San Juan Unified School District, and they technically have jurisdiction over their schools and are a

major stakeholder in the security of their schools, and they would have a place at the table with this discussion.”

Chief Turcotte said it would require a total of 15 new CHPD employees: one officer per site and three additional administrative support employees. The CHPD estimates that it would cost \$1.8 million just in equipment and materials to field that number of new employees — and then the ongoing cost would be approximately \$2.58 million per year at current salary and operating costs.

Councilmember Daniels asked if it would really cost \$90,000 for each new police vehicle. Chief Turcotte said, “Yeah, cars are expensive. That’s the full build-up of a patrol car.”

Councilmember Porsche Middleton pointed out that the costs didn’t even include pensions, human resource costs, or potential expansion of CHPD office space. And as the estimate is based on today’s prices and doesn’t include potential

inflation, she said it could end up being “more and more expensive.”

Mayor Tim Schaefer asked if every cubicle space in the current department building was being utilized, and Chief Turcotte confirmed that the department is probably “at capacity.”

Councilmember Daniels said he wanted staff to move forward with examining possible funding sources for an armed-officer program at local schools. He said having a dedicated officer on each school site would prevent a possible tragedy, but then he followed up by saying it would also benefit the larger community “to have 12 police officers strategically placed throughout the city who can respond to something else in an immediate need.”

Councilmember Jayna Karpinski-Costa said it was more important for the school district to improve fencing and implement other hardening measures. “Just to put a person in a building doesn’t protect children,” she said. And she pointed out that

only about one-third of children in Citrus Heights actually attend schools within the city. So, putting officers in Citrus Heights schools would leave many of the City’s children unprotected by this measure since they attend schools outside the city.

Councilmember MariJane Lopez-Taff said that the City, the CHPD, and SJUSD have a good collaborative partnership and the focus should be on supporting that work rather than seeking funding sources for a separate solution to the problem, especially when the Safe Schools Team has “an effort underway.”

Mayor Schaefer said it would be better to have too much security than not enough. While he liked what they heard from Safe Schools, he said that school shooters are often students who were bullied and the red flags were missed, so he “couldn’t sleep at night” without taking that threat seriously and looking at every possible preventative measure. ★

"As I look to the year ahead, I know we have a great deal to accomplish, and I look forward to working collaboratively with my fellow Supervisors, county staff, residents and our community partners to address the many issues facing the communities and people we serve."

In addition to electing a new Chair and Vice Chair, three County Supervisors were sworn in for four-year terms.

This sworn in at the event were Phil Serna, First Supervisorial District with the Oath Administered by Ashley Soltani; Patrick Kennedy, Second Supervisorial District, with the Oath Administered by Maurice Reed; Patrick Hume, Fifth Supervisorial District: with the Oath Administered by retiring supervisor Don Nottoli.

The Board Chair responsibilities include the following: Presides over the Board meetings; the Vice Chairperson assumes the role in the

Chairperson's absence or inability to act. If the Chair and Vice Chair are absent or unable to preside, the members present will select a member present to act as temporary Chairperson.

Responsibilities also include: Acts on procedural matters or questions; Recognizes a member of the board desiring to speak on an item; Is entitled to vote on all matters before the Board, participate in discussion relating to any matter, make motions without

relinquishing the Chair, and second any motion without relinquishing the Chair.

The Board Chair sits on other boards or commissions as a representative of the County of Sacramento and is the point of contact for questions from the public regarding the meetings (i.e., coordination of resolutions or presentations and general questions not specific to a district, etc.).

The Chair and Vice Chair serve annual terms in each capacity. ★
