CHPD Officers Save a Life

January 16, 2012 at 11:21am, Citrus Heights Police Department Officer Schouten and Officer Copeland responded to the report of a car that had fallen off it's jack and onto the chest of a 50 year old man who was working under the car, pinning him to the

Sacramento Metro Firefighters are crediting the officers' quick action as life saving. Captain Eric Rublicava said, "These two officers worked together in the finest tradition of public safety, and saved this mans life."

Sac Metro Firefighters also

responded to the report of a traumatic injury in the 6900 block of Sunburst Way in Citrus Heights. The report was that a car had fallen on a male who was working under the car. The report indicated the car was still on top of the person.

Metro Firefighters arrived on

scene and found two Citrus and found a jack in the garage. Heights police officers, and the Officers used the jack, lifted male out from under the car.



that when they

arrived the man was still pinned under the car. Officers said they quickly looked around

the car, and pulled the man Police officers told the fire crews out who was unresponsive and

not breathing.

Citrus Heights police officers said they were preparing to start CPR, when the man gasped, took a breath and opened his eyes. Metro Firefighters further assessed the patient who was becoming more alert. The male was transported to Mercy San

Juan Hospital. Metro Fire Captain Eric

Rublicava said "The quick action of the officers no doubt saved this mans life. The jack that was used to initially lift the car broke. They had the presence of mind to find another jack, lift the car, and were prepared to start emergency medical treatment once the patient was removed."

SACRAMENTO REGION -Mickaboo Companion Bird Rescue (www.mickaboo.org) is a non-profit Northern California animal rescue, focusing on the intake and rehabilitation of unwanted, neglected, and abused companion birds. The term "companion bird" means essentially any pet bird in someone's home. Mickaboo has almost 300 birds currently available for adoption, ranging from perky little budgies to large majestic macaws.

Birds that come to Mickaboo have often been neglected and otherwise mistreated. Many are ill, with owners unable or unwilling to pay for urgently needed medical care. Monthly veterinary bills run upwards of \$15,000.

Mickaboo provides a spectrum of services to people and birds including: Bird care education, Foster care for surrendered birds, Avian vet care, Outreach to highlight the plight of homeless birds, Adopter recruitment and support and Behavioral consultation.

Mickaboo is hosting a free adoption fair on Sunday, March 18, 2012, 11 am - 4 pm at the Carmichael Public Library, 5605 Marconi Avenue, Carmichael. Take advantage of this chance to meet and greet some of the many birds that are up for adoption. Bird care supplies and a free basic bird care class will be available.

National Pancake Day Celebration

Some Things Just Aren't Fair

SACRAMENTO COUNTY As everyone knows, Sacramento's economy continues to struggle, small businesses are hurting, and we have vacancies in many of our commercial and office spaces. The County must take steps to encourage, foster, and grow business in our region and ensure that small business in our local communities can succeed and thrive.

Recently, however, a Zoning Code amendment was proposed to regulate recycling businesses that I was concerned would cause the exact opposite. While I support establishing standards for operating recycling centers, as doing so would reduce the impacts of new recyclers on adjacent residential neighborhoods and help crack down on recyclers receiving stolen metal and wiring, I was very concerned about the fact that it could have forced recyclers who are playing by the rules to go out of business.

I do not think it is fair, or right, for a local government to change

the rules on a business that has been operating for a very long time at a given location simply because some new, questionable operators have entered their

My concern was compounded by the fact that, at the time the ordinance was proposed, staff could not give a clear accounting of how the ordinance would impact the existing operations in the 4th District. I was not prepared to support this ordinance if I did not know how it might affect the businesses I represent.

Further, I think it is critical to work with the local communities to ensure that the ordinance does not cause harm to a business that the community wants to keep in their area. I am very grateful to the Orangevale Community Planning Advisory Council for having raised concerns about impacts to existing recycling centers, ensuring that the other members of the Board of Supervisors had context for the concerns I was raising.

I am equally concerned about possibly impacting businesses in Antelope, Elverta, and Rio Linda without first obtaining input from their CPACs and Chambers of Commerce. Frankly, it was fortunate that Staff had done outreach in Orangevale, as they had not done so in the other unincorporated communities in Sacramento County, something that will occur prior to this ordinance coming back before the Board.

Certainly, theft is a significant problem in this region. Not only are people stealing bottles and cans out of our recycling bins – a practice that robs the

refuse haulers of revenues that keep rates lower - but thieves are stripping copper wire out of street lights and houses, manhole covers out of streets, catalytic converters off of cars, and just about any other place one finds valuable metals. Just recently, memorial plaques honoring local fallen soldiers and law enforcement officers were stolen from Carmichael Park.

This ordinance is well intended and the County does need to set standards regarding storage of materials and hours of operation for recycling centers next to residential areas. I do not doubt that some of the recycling centers in more developed areas of the County are having impacts for their residential neighbors, both because of noise and transient activity associated with the operation.

It is critical that the County's actions not throw out the good with the bad, and cause longstanding businesses that are positive members of their communities to cease operation.

I am hopeful that you will assist me in crafting a responsible ordinance by contacting my office with your thoughts. I am also in the community as frequently as possible, and hold regular community meetings every month. I meet with residents of Orangevale on the first Friday of every month at 7:30am at Annie's Breakfasts and Steaks. I hope to see you there and look forward to hearing from you.

Sudden Cardiac Arrest Survivors, Savers Reunite at Mercy San Juan

SACRAMENTO REGION – They are members of a unique club. When someone experiences sudden cardiac arrest outside of a hospital setting, American Heart Association statistics show that only about 8 percent survive. These survivors live to see their family and friends only because they were fortunate enough to have someone nearby who knew exactly what to do.

On Feb. 13, the Mercy Heart & Vascular Institute hosted its first Sudden Cardiac Arrest Survivors Reunion at Mercy San Juan Medical Center. The event gave seven sudden cardiac arrest survivors the opportunity to share time with people

who had saved them. Their savers knew either how to perform CPR or had access to an automated external defibrillator (AED) needed to shock their heart back into a rhythm, so the patients had a fighting chance once they reached the hospital. Survivors were also reunited with the nurses and doctors who cared for them in the hospital.

Association was on hand to stress the importance of knowing CPR and to award special framed certificates to the 11 savers in attendance.

The American Heart

Included among the sudden cardiac arrest survivors were Louis Mahinay, 65, of Citrus Heights.

In August 2010, he collapsed after the third inning while playing softball at Sacramento Sports Complex. Umpire Tom Bussey immediately started chest compressions. Luckily, his softball league mandates that every team includes an EMT-trained player. Fellow player John Mohamed (an EMT) helped with mouthto-mouth resuscitation while Bussey continued chest compressions. An AED was used by another player. Paramedics arrived and took him to Mercy San Juan. He received two stents and then received an implantable cardioverter defibrillator. He's back to playing softball 2-3

times per week.

"Caring" for the Troops

CITRUS HEIGHTS - The Greater Sacramento Area Chapter of the Gold Star Wives held a community packaging day for city and area employees to participate in and prepare packages for our troops in Afghanistan.

Chapter President Tonya Wagner was married for two years to Army Sgt. John Karibo. Karibo was going to Viet Nam when the plane he was on went down somewhere between Guam and the Philippines, leaving behind Wagner and their 20-month-old daughter Kimberly Steinman-Elmquist, herself a Blue Star Mom. The packing party event began at 11:00 a.m., and during the first hour, eight Sacramento Metro Fire Station firemen and 10 women from the Civilian Emergency Response Team (CERT), as well as a host of other people, had prepared 51 packages.

Included in each box were toiletries, magazines, newspapers, books, and numerous food items, some of which were tuna, canned fruit, chili, chips, nuts, canned meat and still more to make the service men and women feel right at home. The 72-year-old Wagner purchased most of the items with her \$1200 winnings at Thunder Valley Casino, she said. Her 10-year-old job as a volunteer president of the area chapter of Gold Star Wives is to



keep people informed of military benefits, she explained. "It's more a social gathering to show survivors that someone cares," she said.

She accepted the role for the agency "because no one else would do it."Wagner does do some fundraising for the care packages along the way. "I sell candy bars to support my habit," she said regarding the care packages. She packs them everywhere she goes, including neighborhood meetings, bingo and most anywhere people will be assembled. She sells the candy bars for a dollar each.


Wagner is also the president of the Residents' Empowerment Association of Citrus Heights (REACH) as well as Northwest Neighborhood, Area 1, both as a volunteer. She volunteers at the Citrus Heights Community Center and she has a part-time job to boot.

Perhaps appropriately so, Sacramento County Board of Supervisor Roberta MacGlashan recognized Wagner as one of Outstanding Senior Volunteers last year. She does have a wish list of items for the care packages, if anyone would like to donate. Reviewing the CARE packing list, she has thought of everything used at home to send to the troops, including foot powder, hand lotion and nail

Capitol Pops Concert Band Receives Grant

SACRAMENTO REGION -The Louise Hess Foundation of the Sacra-mento Region Community Foundation has awarded a \$1,500 grant to the Capitol Pops Concert Band, the Fair Oaks-based community band celebrating its 15th year in 2012.

CPCB Director Jerry Lopes, who has served as the band's director since its first rehearsal on Feb. 6, 1997, announced the awarding of the grant.

The one-time grant will be used for the band's upcoming concert season, which will feature more than a dozen free-to-the-public performances throughout the greater Sacramento region. The band recently resumed rehearsals in preparation for this year's series of concerts.

The CPCB season will begin with the band's 15th anniversary concert on April 21, 2012, in the gym at Rusch Park in Citrus Heights. Other performances include concerts in Roseville, Carmichael, Fair Oaks and other Sacramento-area locales.

Under the baton of Lopes, CPCB concerts feature Broadway show tunes, movie themes, marches and patriotic songs, as well as old/new popular standards. Through two decades, the band has performed at venues and events throughout the Sacramento area, including the Sacramento Jazz Jubilee and the annual Fourth of July celebration in Royer Park in Roseville.

About 75 musicians in the selfsupporting, nonprofit CPCB span a wide range of ages, from students to nonagenarians. Concerts also feature musician soloists and vocalists. The CPCB scholarship fund provides private music lessons for interested students.

Citrus Heights City Council Minutes

CITRUS HEIGHTS - The Citrus Heights City Council voted unanimously to ban medical marijuana dispensaries within the city limits while crime statistics for 2011 were reported by the Citrus Heights Police Department's Police Chief at the meeting on Feb. 9th.

A brief history regarding dispensaries was presented to the council, with adopted regulations as far back as 2004. The city had one inquiry at that time. In 2006, the then council voted to not allow dispensaries, and in 2010 the city adopted a moratorium. At that time, over the next two years, the city received a number of emails for and against allowing dispensaries.

Council members Steven Miller and Mel Turner both stated federal law as the reason for their vote in favor of the ban, while all council members agreed to the ban for various reasons. There were no speakers at the meeting for or against the issue.

Police Chief Christopher Boyd said on the 13th that "there is no evidence or research that suggests that legalizing marijuana or dispensaries would be beneficial to public safety."

Also on the agenda was a statistical report from the CHPD's Chief Boyd, discussing crime rates in the city last year. The 34 statewide cities with populations of 75,000 to 100,000 were ranked,

with Citrus Heights coming in first for larceny and property crimes. There were 279 property theft crimes per month, and 28 property crimes per month. Boyd said that although property crime is high, it has been lowered 15% over last year and each year since the department was formed. Also, motor vehicle theft was down 33% over 2010, with an overall ranking of 8th.

Violent crime including homicide and rapes was ranked 13th. Overall, there was one homicide in Citrus Heights last year on March 2 when white supremacist David Lynch was shot to death. Police have not made an arrest in this case. Also, there were 15 forcible rapes.

The CHPD issued 390 Driving Under the Influence tickets, and there were 11,737 traffic citations issued last year, which was up 18% from 2010. Overall, crime went down in Citrus Heights by 16 %.

"It was an excellent year for us in terms of crime reduction," Boyd told the council.

Chief Boyd also discussed the Domestic Violence Response Team. When the police receive a call, they take a trained counselor from the Domestic Violence Intervention Center to engage the victim in ways of finding help and for help with the crisis. Nearly 800 calls were received last year, and with this partnership, half of the victims followed up to receive help. "We're

getting assistance," Boyd said at the meeting. "We give so much credit to the officers in the field

and our partnership with DVIC." While at the meeting, two officers were presented by the council with a Certificate of Recognition for saving a man underneath a jacked car which fell on him. Community Service Officer Aaron Copeland and Officer Jeff Schouten combined efforts to find another jack, reelevate the car and then pull the thankful man to safety.

Additionally, an announcement proclaiming Feb. 26 as Spay Day in the Sacramento area was made, with pet owners earning under \$35,000 per year able to get cats spayed or neutered, flea prevention treatment and micro chipped for \$15 while the same services for dogs will be \$20. Council Member Dr. Jayna Karpinski-Costa shared statistics with the council indicating that there are 63 million households in the US with pets, and 5 million are euthanized a year at shelters. She said that 19% of animals found by shelters are returned to their owners and that 38% find a new home.

Further, Council Member Jeannie Bruins, who serves on the History and Arts Commission, said that they will be forming a non-profit organization for performing arts. And 42 acres behind Costco on Auburn Blvd. at Stock Ranch is slated to become a Nature Preserve in the future.

Stock Ranch Nature Preserve Update

CITRUS HEIGHTS – Planning for the Stock Ranch Nature Preserve is underway, with anticipated readiness for the public in about one year.

The National Education Facility Grant for \$518,000, made possible through Prop. 84, will be used for benches, a bird viewing station, both garbage and recycle cans and signage providing an education to visitors along the 48-acre preserve. According to Associate

Planner Casey Kempenaar, a virtual tour is available with a link on the city's website home page.

"We are working on the design right now," he explained, noting that construction is scheduled to start this coming summer. He said they will keep the existing trail and add the educational information on signs along this trail. For example, he said there would be a sign explaining the use of the wetlands and one about the oak trees as examples.

Council member Dr. Jayna

Karpinski-Costa said that the first mayor of Citrus Heights, Bill Hughes, would be delighted to see this coming together. Hughes passed away suddenly in Nov.,

"This is the jewel of the city," she said recently, adding that the location behind Costco on Auburn Blvd. is centrally located in the city. She also noted that the preserve is a real "gem."

On Jan. 28th, a tour was held and more than 300 people attended to see the area.





Stopping SNAP Fraud in its Tracks

Commentary by Kevin Concannon, Undersecretary for Food, Nutrition and Consumer Services

Americans expect and deserve a government that ensures their hard-earned tax dollars are managed with accountability and integrity. Without that commitment, we risk undermining public confidence in the value of SNAP, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program - formerly known as food stamps. This critical nutrition program helps millions of people in need put food on the table through tough economic times until they can get back on their feet. In support of this commitment, and as part of the Obama Administration's ongoing Campaign to Cut Waste and root out fraud and abuse in federal programs, USDA announced new steps to strengthen anti-fraud efforts in SNAP.

In that same spirit, I am pleased to report on the first quarter results of our anti-fraud efforts in 2012. From Oct. 1 through Dec. 31, 2011, we penalized - with fines or a temporary disqualification – more than 225 stores found violating program rules, and we permanently disqualified over 350 stores for trafficking SNAP benefits.

ited problem in SNAP – the violating stores represent less than ½ of one percent of more than 230,000 food stores authorized to redeem benefits – we have a zero tolerance policy for fraud. USDA's Food and Nutrition Service conducts ongoing surveillance and investigation, to find bad actors and remove them from the program. In fiscal year 2011, FNS reviewed over 15,000 stores, and permanently disqualified over 1,200 for program violations.

As Undersecretary of the Food. Nutrition and Consumer Services, at USDA - the federal agency that oversees the state administration of the program - and having run the program at the state level in Maine, Oregon, and Iowa, I know firsthand the importance of SNAP. I don't tolerate fraud and abuse in the program, and neither do the American taxpayers.

So last December I announced new and expanded anti-fraud activities to strengthen USDA's commitment to promote and preserve the integrity of SNAP, a critical nutrition assistance program that feeds more than 46 million low-income and working Americans.

To adapt state-of-the-art technology to identify suspicious activity, we awarded a 10-year

While fraud is a relatively lim- contract to further develop the next generation of fraud detection systems. We are in the process of developing even stronger sanctions and penalties against retailers that misuse the program, we are increasing documentation requirements to verify identity and assure business integrity as well as researching high-risk stores using tax and business databases, and we recently updated our policies to clarify that advertising the sale of benefits through social media is a violation.

To round out our aggressive steps to combating fraud and trafficking, we recently launched a Fighting SNAP Fraud website (www.fns.usda.gov/fightingsnapfraud) help raise awareness of the issues and provide a direct portal to report suspicious activities. Public assistance is vital to wiping out fraud and trafficking. If you see suspicious activity, report it. Or persons can always call our fraud hotline, at (800) 424-9121.

Taken together, these steps underscore USDA's commitment to combat fraud, waste and abuse and inspire the confidence in government Americans deserve. I'm proud to say that USDA takes protecting taxpayer dollars very seriously and we are working hard to make sure others do, too.

Governor Brown Served with Summons in Second Amendment Lawsuit

SACRAMENTO - On Thursday, February 16th Governor Brown was formally served with a Federal Summons requiring him to explain to the Court why California's ban on openly carrying a loaded firearm in public places should not be overturned.

The Governor has 21 days to file his answer with the court, his

deadline is March 9th.

The following week, a motion for a preliminary injunction will be filed by the Plaintiff in the lawsuit, Charles Nichols – President of California Right to Carry a Second Amendment Advocacy group.

The hearing on the motion for the preliminary injunction will take place in early April. If the injunction is granted, California's 1967 ban on openly carrying a loaded

firearm can no longer be enforced until the Federal Court judge issues his final decision in the lawsuit.

California's recently enacted ban on openly carrying unloaded handguns would also be rendered

unenforceable. If the preliminary injunction is denied, Mr. Nichols will immediately appeal the denial of the injunction to the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals.

While traveling in Central America, I had the opportunity to worship at an international, interdenominational, Englishspeaking church. The congregation contained Africans, Italians, Spaniards, Latinos, Americans, and Asians. We sang old Irish hymns and modern, Australian worship choruses.

The service was a mixture of Lutheran, Reformed, and Pentecostal elements. The welcome was given by a Canadian, a German read the Scripture lesson, and an American did the preaching. It was a wonderful, diverse experience, and for a little while I thought the kingdom of God had

This, I thought, is what worship should be: People of various Christian traditions, streaming together from all tribes and nations, gathered in an idyllic setting, worshiping Christ together. Then the sermon began, and things changed.

The pastor's sermon could have been heard in many an evangelical congregation in North America. It was about who was "right" and who was "wrong," who was "in" and who was "out." He summed up his sermon, and his philosophy for life, with these words: "Real life is full assurance that you will go to heaven when you die. That is the gospel." At great risk of being misunderstood, I could not disagree more.

The Gospel According to Jesus

As those words were spoken in that Latino church, the surrounding countryside had just endured its worst flooding in five decades. Gang graffiti clung to the walls and sidewalks just steps from the church's front door. Thousands of people were trying to survive grinding poverty.

To say to all these people and in all these of conditions, that "real life" is checking out of this life for the next one, is a mockery of reality and a refusal to heed the gospel that Jesus actually proclaimed. When Jesus began preaching his gospel in the Galilean hills, his message was clear and singular: "The Kingdom of God is at hand. It is here and now," he said. "It is today."

Jesus' intention, it seems, was not to rescue people from earth, per se, transporting them to a far removed heaven. His intention was to put heaven inside of people. A gospel that ignores this fact – and this current world – because our status in the next world has been properly secured, is a distortion of Jesus' redeeming message.

Thus, the gospel according to Jesus, is not just about a harp-playing, cloud-riding, hymn-singing, glory-praising, pie-in-the-sky heaven. It is holistic, all-encompassing deliverance, now. I'm not denying the existence of the afterlife; no, not at all. But I do not believe that we have to die to personally experience the life God has for us.

Jesus' first disciples did not have the benefit of two-thousand years of Christian tradition and theology. All those disciples had were Jesus' words: "Follow me, for the Kingdom of God is at hand." They had no promises of a big heavenly payoff. No fluttering angels' wings, no crossing over the River Jordan to the Hallelujah Shore, no promises of golden streets or pearly gates, no "full assurance that you will go to heaven when you die." All they had was the invitation of Jesus to "Follow me." For them, that was enough.

This may sound strange – it sounds a bit peculiar to my own ears – but even if there was not a heaven, I would still be a follower of Jesus. Why? Because I believe that how Jesus taught us to live and the life he has to give, is the greatest hope for our world today. He offers redemption, in all its magnificent and diverse manifestations, as more than the blessed hope of heaven. He offers it as the blessed hope for people today.

So the choice before us plain: We can give up on the present, pack our bags, and wait for the paradise rescue from above; or we can join Jesus in bringing some of that not-here-yet of God's heaven to the here-and-now earth. The choice, I think, is clear for the present — not the future — is the arena in which we follow Christ. Today — not tomorrow — is where we live out the gospel according to Jesus.

When "Albert Nobbs" rolled into Sacramento the other week, the gender-bending drama had already been playing in larger cities for over a month and had just been announced as a threetime Oscar nominee. One of those nods going to Glenn Close for Best Actress would not count as a spoiler alert as any moviegoer not already knowing that she plays the masculine title role would have to be as clueless as a bill from the doctor's office. But the movie's nominee for Best Supporting Actress? That's Janet McTeer, an exquisite thespian, but not so recognizable that when Hubert makes his entrance, masquerading as a male painting contractor, the average moviegoer would immediately think he's a she.

The lack of surprise and overdue local release are made up by effecting performances by the aforementioned leads and a strong supporting cast playing mostly myopically challenged characters, and it's because they are in circa 1900 Dublin that Albert and Hubert must live a lie.

For 30 years Albert has worked as a devoted and rigid hotel butler, fooling everyone from gossipy staff to snooty guests. She lives an isolated

existence in a room at the top of the hotel, her only pleasure seeming to be stashing her day's pay under a floorboard -- money that will buy a tobacconist's shop one day if the screenplay Close co-write allows our crossdressing protagonist to realize her dreams. She's opened up to no one, but that changes when Hubert is hired on. Following a traumatically bumpy night when the two were forced to bunk together, Albert and Hubert reveal their secrets, which for the new arrival include being married to a woman. Albert is fascinated and moves forward in fomenting a romance with Helen (Mia Wasikowska), a pretty, young maid who, because Albert has no past romantic experience, is blind to her saucy ways and unsavory relations with new-hire Joe (Aaron Johnson).

The melodrama unfolds in cringing fashion. The second half is joyless with intermittent moments that hold interest, like when Albert finally dons a dress

and still appears out of place. As with all of her fellow "Best Actress" Oscar nominees (except for the marvelous Viola Davis in the equally marvelous "The Help"), Close is bigger and better than the rest of the movie. The story is never as interesting as the choices made by the main characters, even with a predictable outcome. Director Rodrigo Garcia's previous film, "Mother and Child," was vastly superior, though, too, suffers from a nonlinear approach. While "Albert Nobbs" (rated R for sensuality, nudity and language) is well-intended, it's not very deep.

Close, meanwhile, has poured her heart and soul into the film, and it shows. Her decades-long quest to bring the story to the screen is rewarded with an arguably career best performance. Sure, she played the role before on the Off-Broadway stage, winning an Obie in 1982, but for the movie she's star, producer, cowriter and even lyricist of the theme song. If only the rest of the movie had Close's passion.

SACRAMENTO REGION Let's talk about planning and preparing for a successful year of growing herbs and vegetables in your yard.

Step 1: What do you want to grow? Make a list. Keep a log. Any planting strategy requires a good basis garden plan and a simple record of each year's crops. Keeping track of the garden on paper enables the gardener to practice crop rotation more effectively, to determine the success of different varieties, to better control pest problems, to calculate the best planning schedules, and to anticipate harvest times. Keep the entries short, but personal.

Step 2: Where do you want to grow them. You need a southern with good organic compost at least twice a year. Step 4: How to plant your gar-

in raised beds, and in containers. Remember to amend your soil

den. Plant your garden in a north south orientation. Tallest plants like corn or trellised tomatoes at the edge of the north side and the lowest plants at the south end of the garden. The next question is whether you are starting your plants from seed or buying transplants. Seeds can be started in a green house months before going into the ground. Wait to plant your transplants until after the last

Step 5: Water. Too much is just as bad as too little and erratic watering is even worse. A soaker hose or low spray is the best watering method. Some vegetables need to be watered every day. some every other day. I recommend keeping the whole garden lightly moist.

Step 6: Weeds choke the life out of plants. Practice weeding early in the morning and weed often. Use landscape fabric or mulch.

Step 7: Insect/fungus control. Disperse Marigolds throughout the garden. They are pretty and beneficial. Organic Neem Oil is an insecticide, fungicide, and a miticide can be used. You can spray on an edible product, wash it off

Step 8: Harvest. Pick your ripe vegetables early in the day and pick them often. Most vegetables reach peak flavor before they're fully ripe. It is better to pick early in the day rather than late in the day.
