SMUD Helps Sponsor the **Hubble Space Telescope Exhibit**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Among a crowd of Sacramento leaders. SMUD announced a partnership with the Aerospace Museum of California and a \$50,000 sponsorship to host NASA's Hubble Space Telescope Exhibit for local students to experience a once-in-alifetime STEM education experience.

The announcement came as dozens of area leaders, residents and children got a sneak peek of the exhibit as it opened its doors to the public for Fall 2019.

"This is an incredible opportunity to expose students to science, technology, engineering and math in a new and innovative way," said SMUD CEO and General Manager Arlen Orchard. "Our goal is to help the museum inspire and expose students from all over the region to the expansive possibilities in STEM education and STEM-related careers, so they truly can reach for the stars."

The exhibit features a scaled replica of NASA's Hubble Space Telescope and includes hands-on, interactive activities that allow students to explore the technology used in space to gaze at distant stars, planets and galaxies. They will also be able to learn about the new James Webb Space Telescope and how it will contribute



The exhibit will be on display through December 2019 and is expected to draw thousands of visitors.

In partnership with the museum, SMUD's goal is to reach 15,000 students with this STEM education experience, particularly those in historically underserved communities. A large portion of the grant provides transportation funding for Title 1 schools, the story of aerospace

Continued from page 1 asked how many in the room thought it was a good idea to reduce the criminal consequences for possession of the date rape drug, possession of methamphetamines, theft of a firearm valued at \$950 or less, from a felony to a misdemeanor. No one raised a hand. "How many people voted for the Safe Neighborhoods and Safe Schools Act?" McGinness asked, and said most people raise their hands on this question at his speaking engagements. "If you voted for the Safe Neighborhoods and Safe Schools Act, also known as Proposition 47, you voted for all those things," McGinness said. "And you voted against imposing consequences against people for engaging in certain kinds of offensive behavior." Those included, McGinness said, injecting drugs in public, discarding those hypodermic needles on playgrounds, on streets, on sidewalks, defecating and urinating in public. "And I think the consequences of that, coupled with the horrible opioid crisis, frankly are coming

home to roost." Though the Act was billed as "supported by law enforcement" McGinness said that, in fact, it was opposed almost unanimously by State district attorneys, sheriffs, and municipal police chiefs, numbering in the hundreds. "Could they say, honestly, that there was some law enforcement support?" McGinness asked. "Yes, approximately two or three people, and by the way, the labor groups all opposed it also."

"Now, a person could walk into a retail store, 365 days a year, every



Cordova Luncheon at the end of the event. "There are some things that are plaguing communities to extraordinary degrees," McGinness said in his presentation.

single day of the year," McGinness said, "and steal \$949 worth of merchandise, and they're never going to see a minute in custody. "Don't believe what you read in the summary and title. Please, please read the ballot data.'

McGinness informed the group that typhus, which was eradicated in the 1800s, has now resurfaced in Los Angeles County and added that the water at the confluence of the Sacramento and American Rivers exceeds the acceptable levels of E. coli by a substantial margin and is not safe. "Groundskeepers working at the State Capitol have been assaulted and battered on numerous occasions," McGinness said. "There are homeless people that are doing it, but they're not people who lost their lease because of the increased cost of living... That's something else entirely.'

In summary, McGinnis said, "Please, know what it is for which you're voting."

Caterer for the luncheon was West Coast Events, with co-owners David Maestas and Jan Parker. Maestas has lived in Rancho Cordova for 12 years, and his father was sheriff of Los Angeles County at one time. "(McGinness) always has some words of wisdom to share, and he definitely has experience, so you know he's got a lot of validity in what he says," Maestas said.

McGinness is a graduate of Sacramento's Christian Brothers High School where he played football. He earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Criminal Justice, and a Master of Science Degree at California State University, Long Beach, and graduated from West Point Leadership Institute. He travels extensively throughout California for his consulting work in McGinness Solutions Inc., and has been to Europe and Asia. Catalina Island is one of his favorite





Spend Twenty Minutes With Me

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Attending the 14th Annual California Capital Airshow at Mather Airport on October 5-6, 2019, was a thrilling experience!

My original intent was to focus and write about the 75th anniversary of the D-Day invasion which was one of the highlights of the show. As it turned out, I was distracted by a documentary that was being filmed about the WASP organization. As I eavesdropped, I became more and more interested in the Women's Airforce Service Pilots who were very instrumental in adding to the success of the United States Air Force.

I have never heard of this military group, but by show's end, I became quite a fan. The WASP organization was formed in 1942 with 23 women making up the first graduate group of Service Pilots. Their job was to ferry and test aircraft and to train other personnel in their use. While this group became part of history by being the first women to fly military aircraft for the United States, their organizational mission was just beginning. The title of this article is attributed to Kimberly Johnson, one of the keepers of the official archives of the WASP organization located at Texas Women's University in Denton, Texas. Kimberly told me a fascinating story about Colonel Paul Tibbetts, the pilot of the Enola Gay and the B-29 Superfortress, (the plane that dropped the atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan during World War

plane to fly and the male pilots were finding excuses not to fly it," said Kimberly. Colonel Tibbets had to find a way to convince his pilots to start training and becoming familiar with the aircraft. He turned to the WASP's and found that Dorothea Moorman and Dora Daugherty were willing to fly the B-29 and encouraged the male pilots by telling them it was safe to fly. "Imagine the look on the male pilots' faces when two ladies stepped off the plane!" she concluded.

I had the privilege of learning so much more about the WASP's and came to realize that more than 25,000 women signed up to join the first class! The WASP's were official members of the United States Air Force, but it took more than 60 years before Congress bestowed upon the group the Congressional Gold Medal for contributions made during World War II.

One of the WASP display highlights was a B-25 Mitchell medium bomber available for visitors to climb aboard and visit the cockpit. This is where I found pilot and Boeing engineer Vera Martinovich. She flew the B-25 from its base in Madras, Oregon to Mather Airport and was experiencing her first airshow. The plane is part of the Erickson Aircraft Collection, an organization with "a wide variety of WW II Aircraft," which began in the 1970s.

As I climbed into the cockpit area, I asked Vera if she experiences "any visitors" when she is flying the B-25? "I think about those 20-year old WASP's talk-



Volunteers serve at local schools approximately two days per week for two to three hours a day throughout the school year, tutoring and tracking progress for groups



Other comparisons, fair or not:

• Headline acts – CA: Cover bands performing on six of 17 nights is embarrassing for the state fair representing the world's music industry mecca. The 11 other acts have loyal followings, I'm sure, but would be cast off as has-beens if judges eaten just another couple of mouthfuls, they probably would have done what my wife and I did and throw the rest away in a classic example of accelerated diminishing returns. Just those few bites had us feeling as if we ate a pair of oven mitts. Came this close to going on the Gravitron to purge myself, but that would have been \$10 wasted on the dessert and another \$5 for the ride. IA: The \$4 Cookies and Cream Wonder Bar, winner of the fair's "Best New Deal," was heaven

The donated 10 letters now grace the Cal Expo entrance along Exposition Boulevard, but lack the gravitas worthy of an event with roots dating back to 1854. IA: Founded the same year, the Iowa State Fair has the beloved butter cow. A stable since 1911 when J.K. Daniels sculpted the first high-fat heifer, the most photographed symbol of the fair draws long lines every year in the Agricultural Building. Tradition comes in the form of 600 pounds of low moisture, pure cream Iowa butter.

California tops Iowa in terms of population, agribusiness and tax revenue, but when comparing our state fair with theirs, there's really no comparison. Is the California State Fair a dog with fleas? Not at all. The Sacramento fair and food festival has its merits, and kudos to Cal Expo's board of governors for putting on as good a show as it does on a shoestring budget. Perhaps if Gov. Gavin Newsom would redirect some dollars away from supporting the non-taxpaying citizens and non-citizens of California, our outdated and dilapidated fairgrounds could get the extreme makeover it needs.

Of course, even if our fair was adequately funded, there's no guarantee of restored success. I'm afraid we Californians are too conditioned to be cool, not corny, and in the state fair business, corn beats cool. Moreover, as a population, we here don't have the

goods to match the homegrown heart and tradition that's in every Iowan's DNA. Maybe someday.

So, for now, let's look forward to July 12-28, 2020 when we can again risk embarrassment and our lives to celebrate the land of plenty that is California. Then, if you want to see how a state fair should be done, check your coolness at the airport and head 2,400 miles east to corny Des Moines from Aug. 13-23. Look for me – I'll be the guy wearing Tommy Bahama while wolfing down one of their famous pork chops on a stick. Actually, at just \$7 a pop, make that two.



COOKING TIPS FOR A SAFE THANKSGIVING

#1 THAWING

Thawing turkeys must be kept at a safe temperature in the refrigerator. The "danger zone" is between 41 and 135°F — this is the temperature range where foodborne bacteria multiply rapidly.

#2 PREPARATION

After working with raw poultry, always wash utensils and work surfaces, as well as your hands with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds before touching other foods.

#3 STUFFING

For optimal safety, cook the stuffing outside the turkey in a casserole dish. However, if you place stuffing inside the turkey, do so just before cooking, and use a food thermometer. Make sure the center of the stuffing reaches a safe minimum internal temperature of 165° F.

#4 COOKING

Always thaw turkeys completely in the refrigerator. Set the oven temperature no lower than 325°F. Place turkey breast-side up on a wire rack in a shallow roasting pan. Check the internal temperature using a food thermometer – the center of the stuffing and meaty portion of the breast, thigh and wing joint must reach 165°F at a minimum.

#5 LEFTOVERS

Perishable foods should not be left out of the refrigerator for more than 2 hours. To reheat turkey, cut the meat into smaller pieces and keep legs and wings whole - before serving the turkey. Be sure to reheat all your leftovers to a minimum of 165°F.

MERIDA, MEXICO (MPG) -They held a World Summit of Nobel Peace Laureates last month in Mexico and a softball game broke out.

If the above phrasing sounds familiar, Rodney Dangerfield liked to joke, "I went to a fight the other night, and a hockey game broke out." After attending what was billed as a forum to "address global issues with a view to encourage and support peace and human well-being in the world," only to walk away disappointed, I knew that by borrowing from the late comedian, I'd have the perfect, albeit sad introductory line.

The batters of my metaphorical softball game were the Nobel Peace Prize winners whose three days in the Yucatan Peninsula included sit-downs with the press. The credentialed journalists were the pitchers, and by throwing mainly softball questions, the mostly Mexico-based contingent squandered the rare opportunity of asking tough and/ or insightful questions to the distinguished do-gooders. In all, 30 Nobel Peace Prize laureates attended the event, representing themselves or

Trump's mistake, Walesa said, is "forgetting that people behave like interconnected containers of water." He elaborated. "There is a great disproportion in development in the world. It's not Mexico's fault of this disproportion. It's the United States' fault. We need to move the water from one container to another. We need to level the disproportion."

Walesa didn't sound like he'd put money on Trump winning a Peace Prize this year or any year. Despite efforts to keep the peace, namely making historic inroads with North Korea and in the Middle East, all without war breaking out, Trump seems to be on the same prizeless path as some past Republican presidents. Reagan engineered the end of the Cold War, and Richard Nixon, by normalizing relations between the U.S. and China, forced the Soviet Union to yield to pressure for detente with the United

The last GOP president to win the Peace Prize was Theodore Roosevelt in 1906. Since then, Woodrow Wilson, Jimmy Carter and Barack Obama have been so honored in addition to Vice President Al Gore all Democrats. This from an organization that as late as last month's World Summit of Nobel Peace Prize Laureates said the selection committee has no political

winning organizations. The softball field, just to close out the sports-related figure of speech, was next to the working press room inside a world-class convention center in Merida, capital of the

state of Yucatan. Poor organization and logistics made covering the event a living hell, but of greater importance to you readers is how the Nobel Peace Prize winners responded to the questions that didn't kowtow to the people of honor, few and far between as they were. Most journalists asked pandering softball questions like this one to Dr. Bernice King, the youngest child of revered Dr. Martin Luther King: "As a privileged white woman who can't relate to the struggles of people of color, what can those like me do to help?" Knowing the organization, that eye-roller will probably get that woman a permanent invitation to all future World Summits. That would be a travesty with the white journalist already feeling so privileged and all.

Then a real question from the press was asked. My first of two called on MLK's daughter to substantiate claims she made earlier at the World Summit about the leader of the Free World: "You have repeatedly called President Trump a racist. Can you give one example of something racist he has said or done?" King fumbled with her response, often looking to her handlers for help.

"Um, I mean there's

tinue to trip King up. She seemed to ramble and contradict herself.

"Out of his mouth I have heard him denounce white supremacy. I've heard that," King said. "Whether or not he denounces it in a way that pushes away those who support him is another discussion. Those are the examples I have. It's hard for somebody to believe he's not racist. I can say that just because There are some things he's done policy-wise that's helped to uplift some of the black community. The First Step Act in terms of prison reform Racism is prejudice plus power. Racism is when you think an entire group of people is inferior to you or your peer group. I don't know if anyone has examined that. Does President Trump feel that all blacks or Mexicans are inferior as a group? That's a question we have to ask and determine."

My second question for King, a quasi-lighthearted one, made the civil rights activist laugh out loud, which, all professionalism aside, was pretty cool. I asked, "When the family sits down for Christmas dinner, what's the conversation like with Cousin Alveda at the table?" Alveda Celeste King, for those who don't watch Fox News, is a civil rights activist, former Georgia congresswoman and a vocal supporter of the President. The 68-year-old niece of MLK has defended Trump on many occasions,

including on national TV

"Because our family has such strong unconditional love for each other we do not let those kinds of things tear us apart as a family," she said. "We have strong, vehement disagreements about how President Trump conducts himself. She is a Christian and she is also a minister, but at the end of the day she does what she does. I say what I need to say, she says what she needs to say."

King then spoke much like the minister she is and her father was: "One thing I've learned about different opinions and ideologies is if you sit down and listen long enough and shut down your right to be right and allow yourself to hear what a person is saying, you might discover a bit of truth. That's how my father developed his philosophy of non-violence. He was able to read and study a lot of different philosophers and theologians. Even those he didn't agree with. So, if we're going to create a more humane world, we have to learn to do that. Alveda has taught me because she's so strong in what she feels and believes. We had a discussion over Labor Day weekend, and I sat and really listened to some of the things she was saying, and as I thought about them holistically there was some truth in that, and I had to acknowledge that. We have a tendency with people we disagree with to disagree with them fully. If there's something specifically that

These presentations consist of an overview of the changes to voting in Sacramento County due to the Voter's Choice Act, instruction on how and when to update their voter registration, as well as general information about their voting options for the upcoming 2020 election cycle. These presentations are intended to educate our senior popto exercise their right to vote in 2020.

More about the **Voter's Choice Act**

Sacramento County is one of the original five counties in California that implemented the Voter's Choice Act in 2018, expanding voting opportunities for all residents. VRE saw positive results in the primary and general election in 2018 and looks forward to improved ease and access for voters as we enter the 2020



Election cycle.

As a reminder, here are the changes the VCA allows:

Choose how, when and where you want to vote.

By Mail: All registered voters will receive a ballot in the mail. Place the voted ballot inside the envelope provided, sign the envelope and return – your postage is paid!

Vote Center: With the ulation to prepare them passage of the California Voter's Choice Act, traditional polling places have been replaced with Vote Centers that are open for up to 11 days, including Election Day. This means voters can choose when, where and how they want to vote - at ANY Vote Center in the County. Avoid the lines, vote early!

At the Vote Center you can drop off your completed ballot OR vote in person. There is even weekend voting!

Vote Centers open for 11

Vote Centers open for four days.


Drop Boxes - Voted/ signed ballots may be placed in any of the 57 secure Drop Box locations throughout Sacramento County.

Eligible residents can also register to vote, update their registration and cast their ballot at a Vote Center, even on the day of the election.

A complete list of locations can be found online and will be provided in the Sacramento County Voter Information Guide that will be mailed out prior to the election.


