

Snuggles from Muggles





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Water Year 2016: We Suffered 'Snow Drought'

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As California's 2016 Water Year draws to a close, it is ending a fifth consecutive year marked by meager precipitation that fell more often as rain than snow.

Record warm temperatures created an early and below-average runoff that was in large part absorbed by parched soil before ever reaching the State's reservoirs. The water content of the California Sierra snowpack, often referred to as 'the State's largest reservoir,' flows each spring into a series of above ground storage reservoirs that essentially serve as California's water savings accounts in order to meet the growing demands of an uncertain climate future.

These all-too-familiar dry, warming conditions have led State water officials to describe the situation as a California 'snow drought.' A 'water year,' a 12-month time period during which precipitation totals are measured, runs from October 1 to September 30 of the following year. The year is designated by the



calendar year in which it ends.

Water Year 2016 is officially listed in the record books as 'Dry' statewide, even though parts of Northern California experienced average to slightly above average precipitation.

Water officials warn that making seasonal forecasts of precipitation – the ability to predict now if 2017 will be wet or dry (and how wet or dry) - is scientifically difficult, and the accuracy of such predictions is very low; much less than that of a seven-day weather forecast.

Historical records are the only source of facts to study for any indication of what California may see in the form of precipitation in coming months.

Of the 18 La Niña winters since 1950-51, 16 have provided below average precipitation for Southern California's coastal region, and 15 winters have resulted in below average precipitation for Southern California's interior region. Above average precipitation was recorded in 11 winters for the Northern Sierra and in eight years for the Central and Southern Sierra.

Sixty percent of the state currently remains in severe or extreme drought. While mandatory water restrictions today vary across California, making water conservation a California way of life remains a statewide goal and a top priority.

Check Before You Burn

Residential Wood Burning Restrictions Begin November 1

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

The 10th season of Check Before You Burn, the Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District's wood burning law, began November 1 and goes through February. The AQMD will restrict or prohibit burning on days when fine particle pollution is forecast to be high. This law applies to the burning of any solid fuel, including wood, pellets or manufactured firelogs by residents and businesses in Sacramento County and the cities of Folsom, Citrus Heights, Elk Grove, Galt, Isleton, Rancho Cordova and Sacramento through February.

Check Before You Burn to find out if burning is allowed in your indoor or outdoor fireplace, wood stove, fire pit or chimney. Download the free Sacramento Region Air Quality app to check the daily burn status, obtain the daily air quality forecast and get current conditions at monitoring sites in the region.

Wood smoke is bad for your health. It contains invisible particles that are small enough to enter the bloodstream. It is especially harmful for children whose lungs are still developing, older adults and anyone with a pre-existing heart or lung condition. Breathing wood smoke increases the risk of asthma, heart attack, stroke and many other health problems.

There are a few exemptions from compliance with the law: Homes where wood burning is the sole source of heat; financial hardship waiver approved and renewed each burn season by the Air Pollution Control Officer.

There is an exemption on Stage 1 - No Burn days if you use an EPA certified fireplace insert or stove, or pellet stove, and they do not emit visible smoke.

Gold River isn't a company town, but as Aerojet and Intel go, so does our community in some respects. Recent news of Aerojet Rocketdyne moving its headquarters out of Rancho Cordova in the midst of a 10 percent workforce reduction, and Intel axing hundreds of Folsom jobs as part of an even larger corporate-wide layoff, well, that's not exactly the stuff that increases property values or our quality of life.

Chances are good you have a friend or neighbor affected by one of these downsizings, or perhaps a different one in these precarious post-recession times. Maybe that person is you. Virtual hugs if it is. To those who were flat-out laid off without warning, my heart goes out to you. My compassion widens for those 50 and older as they, according to an AARP survey, face particularly daunting prospects for employment.

I'm about to find out quickly if that's true, as I have taken early retirement from Intel, my employer of over 17 globe-trotting years. I am among the fortunate ones affected by the company's largest-ever downsizing initiative, known in Intel-speak as Accelerating Change & Transformation, or ACT. Unlike for some of my

cubicle neighbors at the Folsom campus, and several thousand globally, mine was a voluntary decision. Thank goodness - and a previous boss – for a stellar review last year that I believe kept me off the chopping block ... this

When Intel lowered eligibility for taking early retirement to those 55 years old and with 15 years of service, I was among nearly 6,000 longstanding employees faced with a big decision. It was one I didn't think I'd need to make until 2021, when I would be eligible for the "rule of 75," meaning that anyone whose age plus years of service equaling or exceeding 75 years can quit with honor and special benefits.


I absolutely could have let the deadline to accept a generous retirement package pass, but all indicators pointed to this being unwise if for no other reason than I'd be gambling that my job would be safe at a company that, according to news reports, is two-and- a-half times more likely to lay off people over 40. While federal law protects workers over 40 against discrimination based solely upon their ages, it doesn't protect them against losing jobs if their pay grows too large at a business seeking to cut costs. So, it's not far-fetched to speculate that although ACT calls for the reduction of 12,000 heads, more corporate carnage could be around

It's all about industry indicators and company survival. By axing low performers as a first blow, then skimming the higherearning cream secondarily, Intel believes it's on better footing to refocus from the fading PC market to data centers, mobile gadgets and other emerging technologies. For the sake of my former colleagues in Folsom and around the world, let's hope the CEO is right. And who knows? If the company comes out of this transformation stronger and my Intel friends tell me the water's fine next autumn, I just might want to come back after the one-year rehiring ban is over. Then again, maybe I won't. My hope is to find greener pastures before I'm put out to pasture, and, fortunately, there's contract work to be had in the interim.

So, to all the human resources folks out there, plus any recruiters, hiring managers and others with whom I'd be wise to network, let it be known that there's still plenty of high-octane gas left in the tank powering my career in public relations, executive and corporate communications, and writing. Yes, it's a shame that my professional fuel gauge couldn't hit "empty" at Intel, but c'est la vie.

They say retirement is when you stop living at work and begin working at living. They also say that in retirement you will find less money, but the hours are better. Well, to whoever "they" are, inspirational as those quotes may be, I'm not planning to take Social Security benefits for another 10 to 15 years, and, frankly, I see myself working even after I'm welcomed at the Pearly Gates. Hmm. I wonder if Saint Peter has a LinkedIn

I'm 23, and I lost a good job a few days ago due to layoffs. My wife has been a stay-at-home mom with our 10-month-old daughter, and we have very little in the way of savings. What can we do to keep our heads above water?

I'm really sorry you're going through this. I've been there, so I know this is a scary time for you. There are some short- and longterm goals to think about in a situation like this, but let's look at the immediate future.


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

Battlefield 1 **Breaks Out of** the Trenches

The mega-blockbuster franchise of Battlefield has dominated the wallets and filled the free time of shooter fans since the series' inception fourteen years ago. Battlefield consistently reinvented the genre, starting the long trend in the early 2000s of World War II-based shooters with Battlefield 1942, poking fun at the dark tone of modern-war shooters with the sitcom-like Battlefield: Bad Company, and introducing a disaster movie flare and a dynamically changing map with the spectacular "levolutions" in Battlefield 4. But last year's Battlefield: Hardline was not well received; it seemed like the team at EA DICE had misplaced their secret sauce and lost their close attunement to the desires of the gaming community. This year's Battlefield 1 feels like recuperation, an attempt to bring the series back to the right foot with the gaming community. As a result, it offers a fascinating look at the how the changing demands of the videogame world have resulted in one of the most critically acclaimed Battlefield games to date.

The praise heaped upon Battlefield 1 is largely due to its World War I setting. Despite the popularity of World War II, the original Great War has received comparably little exposure or exploration in the world of gaming. Despite the fact that Battlefield I plays much like a highly-polished version of the WWII games that flooded the market ten years ago, in today's market it still feels fresh and rejuvenating. For the past few years gamers have lamented "same"-ness in big-budget shooters. Most tend to take place in a near-future sci-fi setting,

filling lackluster stories with tech jargon and convoluted conspiracies. Games like Evolve and Call of Duty: Black Ops III can be plenty of fun, but ultimately there are only so many robots/aliens/soldiers that you can shoot, and only so many futuristic gadgets to play around with, before everything starts to blend together.


The limited technology available during WWI brings the shooter genre back to basics, creating an experience that feels approachable while still offering a prolific variety of weapons and vehicles. Most importantly, the dull or confusing stories that gamers have criticized in past years' shooters have been replaced with a more characterdriven focus. Unlike the sci-fi wars of the future, WWI was an historical event whose massive scars still remain on the world today. The aging gamer population is, by this point, more than well aware of their history, and as a result the Battlefield team was forced to be more sensitive when constructing their game's storyline. Battlefield 1's "short story" approach breaks up the single-player campaign into five chapters, each presenting a vastly different perspective

on the war. Though it's disappointing that the player is never dropped into a German point of view, the diverse cast, which includes an African-American, a Bedouin rebel, and a British tank driver, lends Battlefield 1 a personal, human touch.

The defining moment of the introduction, where the narrator states "behind every gun site is a human being," offers a moment of quiet sensitivity that shooters rarely offer. Even the bombastic, explosive multiplayer battles carry heavier emotional baggage; the game never lets your forget that you're reenacting historical battles where real people died.

Compared with the genericlooking gritty-sci-fi of this year's Call of Duty, Battlefield 1 seems to understand that those of us who enjoy games are demanding more depth from our experiences. Our biggest, most expensive games no longer have an excuse to settle for mediocrity either in story or in originality. In a year full of excellent videogames, Battlefield 1 stands to be a turning point, and one of 2016's most influential titles.

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Farming Without Getting Dirty

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

F. Scott Fitzgerald is quoted, "I care not who hoes the lettuce of my country if I can eat salad!" There's not much dirt and no hoeing at Rainsville Farms and the salad greens are the best. As a bit of a lettuce snob – it needs to be fresh, crisp & very clean. This farm delivers on all the above and is located on a cement slab.

Fred Chevaz, a Data Service Manager, retired after 33 years from VSP Vision Care. He wanted out of the corporate world and was looking for a place for his energies and his expertise. After researching franchises that did not give him the control he desired, he returned to his family roots in farming. His grandfather was a lifelong farmer in Rainsville, New Mexico raising his family of nine children.

Fred always had a backyard garden and loved giving his crops to neighbors, colleagues and friends. His research led him to Freight Farms in Boston that provides completely outfitted containers for hydroponic farming. This company founded in 2010 "manufactures high volume crop production units made from up-cycled freight containers". The vision is to provide a perfect environment in a small footprint 365 days a year regardless of climate.

The 40' refrigerated container comes complete with all the tools to farm. There is not a hoe or shovel in sight, but there is Bluetooth capability, instruments that measure the nutrients in the water, a system that controls the water, LED lights and a great big panel that probably takes an IT person to manage. The container was shipped from Boston and is now parked off of Douglas

Rd. in Rancho Cordova. Inside red and blue lights are on at appropriate times which allow the best growth for the lettuce. Fred spends about 10 hours a week on his farm and is able to manage it daily from his home.

He begins with pelleted seeds that almost have 100% germination. There are six varieties of Butter lettuce including Red Cross, Selanova, Green, Red, Green Oak leaf and Alkindus. Fred also has Basil and Mini Romaine. The seeds once sprouted are transferred to towers hanging vertically in the controlled air temperature of 62 degrees. The system uses 300 gallons of water a month as it recycles through the towers. A quarter of the farm is harvested each week and so there is a constant rotation of crops.

This enterprise only began in July of this year. Chefs love having access to fresh micro greens that are delivered within in a few miles of the farm. Marriot and Claim Stake Brewery have already signed on. This is a family company with his son providing graphic design and web management. His 10 year old twins help him plant the seeds. His farm is the only the second in the state after Google. He is planning on adding two more containers as we all become more conscious of where our food comes from.

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No On Prop 57: Hold Politicians Accountable

Proposition 57 is not only dangerous for the residents of California, voting it into law would reinforce a precarious trend by our state's highest elected officials to transfer their failings in the prison system to the law-abiding people of

The popular debate regarding Proposition 57 seemingly hinges on the topic of paroling inmates and whether those inmates are violent or non-violent. Under Prop 57 guidelines, 7,000 inmates would be immediately released, according to the Associated Press, with thousands more to follow. It would release criminals who have committed domestic violence, human trafficking and sex with minors, among other deplorable crimes. But even more egregious than Prop 57 proponents trying to categorize the above offenses as "non-violent" is the deception and political bullying that has powered this ill-conceived proposition.

The Prop 57 pushers are claiming the only opposition comes from state's district attorneys who have ulterior motives. Once again, Brown and his politicos are trying to fool the general voting public with mistruths. Proposition 57 is opposed not only by district attorneys but by peace officers' associations up and down the state. The California Police Chiefs Association opposes Prop 57 as well as several individual Sheriffs who have been strong enough to stand against the Governor, despite his not-so-discreet intimidation tactics. The Southern California Alliance of Law Enforcement (SCALE) is also opposed to Proposition 57 because of its detrimental effect on public safety.

The reasons to oppose this by the deceptively named

First, this proposition got on the ballot through the convenient bending of rules and deadlines normally required to define and submit a valid proposition. Proposition 57 was originally written to apply only to juveniles, in an attempt to have more flexibility in sentencing. In a sweeping move, Gov. Brown took a juvenile proposition and completely revamped it into legislation that would release thousands of violent adult criminals and alter the Constitution of the State of California. He vastly changed the scope and spirit without resubmitting a new proposition. Voters must understand the gravity of this deceit.

Second, the disingenuouslynamed Proposition 57 misleads the public by claiming to be a "public safety" act intent to only affect "non-violent" criminals. However, the proposition does not define "non-violent" and the only effect it will have on "public safety" is a negative one

And finally we must oppose the practice of our elected officials to continuously push the ill-effects of their failures onto the hard-working people of this state. For the third time, state officials are attempting to transfer the state's obligation to fix its prison system to local jurisdictions and communities.

Brown enacted Assembly Bill 109 (AB109) and required individual counties to be responsible for inmates who should have been in state prison. Sheriff Departments were forced to overhaul their jail systems – systems designed to house people who were awaiting trial or were sentenced to less than year – into regional state prisons that hold multi-year, sentenced prisoners. This caused the release of thousands of inmates in already-full county correction facilities.

Second, voters were conned

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safe neighborhoods and schools. While it has done next to nothing for any school, it has certainly made neighborhoods less safe. It is essentially impossible to punish criminals who commit the types of offenses that plague California residents such as identity theft, burglary and vehicle theft, leaving thieves free to repeatedly victimize our neighborhoods. Under Prop 47, the state did not shift its responsibility to house criminals, it downright abandoned it.

And now, with the Governor and his politicos pushing Prop 57, the good people of this state are at jeopardy of once again taking the brunt of the state's prison failures. The problem with our state prison system is a complex one. It cannot be fixed by an elusive ballot measure that attempts to disguise "solutions" as something more than what it is: the simple turning of the key for thousands, upon, thousands of criminals.

SCALE represents more than 35.000 law enforcement professionals in Southern California. We are the men and women who answer the daily calls for service. We are the men and women who leave our families each day in order to protect yours. And we share in your frustrations that there is very little we can do to protect you from repeat offenders who have gotten a free pass from AB109 and Prop 47.

We, like you, are tired of elected officials forcing the burden of their ill-conceived legislation onto law-abiding Californians. We urge you to VOTE NO on Proposition 57.

This week I had several meetings across town and for some reason I miscalculated and ended up with a 2-1/2 hour gap between meetings. I hate to waste time, so I remedied the situation by stopping at a small coffee shop for a cup of Joe.

I ordered my coffee and when the waitress brought it, I began to think about coffee. Why did God give us coffee?

Then my mind went back to my grandfather, whose greatest gift to me was a love of coffee. Nobody loved coffee more. I remember one of his favorite quotes, "You can always tell a man by the coffee he drinks."

Anathema to my grandfather was the idea of instant coffee. No man, in his opinion, would ever drink anything of the kind. "If a man would drink instant coffee," my grandfather perked, "there's no telling what else he would do. Never trust a man who drinks instant coffee."

Grandfather always kept a fire in the old wood cook stove and on the back of the stove he kept his coffee pot, a large 2-gallon pot — one of those old-fashioned percolators long since gone out of style. The coffee was always on, and no matter when you stopped in to see him, he always had "fresh" coffee brewing.

Actually, the coffee was only fresh on Sunday. On Saturday night, he routinely emptied the coffee pot and prepared fresh coffee for Sunday morning.

He had an old coffee grinder and ground the coffee beans on Saturday night. He put some other things in the coffee. One thing I know he put in was a crushed eggshell. What it did to his coffee, I have no idea, but grandfather was sure it was an important ingredient.

The freshly ground coffee beans were put in, the pot filled with fresh water and set on the back of the stove to slowly perk. This coffee would last the entire week. The coffee was so strong on Sunday that if it did not wake you in the morning, you were dead.

Before retiring each evening my grandfather took care of his coffee. He would freshly grind a few coffee beans, sprinkle it on top of the old coffee grounds and then add a newly crushed eggshell. Then he would refill the coffee pot with water.

My grandmother once tried washing the coffee pot. When my grandfather saw her, he became furious, "Never wash that coffee pot," he spouted,

When my grandfather died, I looked at his old black coffee pot and discovered two things. One, the original color was blue. And two, although it was originally a 2-gallon pot, it only could take three quarts of water. The "character," so important to my grandfather, had built up so much over the years its capacity was diminished.

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


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
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
