

Taking Strides Against Domestic Violence

Walking in someone's shoes is not always an easy thing to do, especially if you're a man marching in women's high heels. That's exactly what 620 men did last spring to raise awareness of domestic violence and sexual assault at WEAVE's 2014 Walk a Mile in Her Shoes event. Through sponsorships, they raised over \$237,000 to fund many programs the organization provides to victims of abuse.

WEAVE's 2015 fundraising event, scheduled for Sunday, May 3rd, 2015, is slated to top last year's efforts; their goal is to have 1.000 men participate. This will not only bring additional money to the group, but it will break a world record. The organization is accepting registration forms now.

Walk a Mile in Her Shoes is an international event in which men embrace the opportunity to raise awareness about the serious causes and effects of sexualized violence, which

has reached epidemic proportions in every city in our nation. Between 2001 and 2012, 6,488 troops were killed in Afghanistan and Iraq, and 11,766 women were murdered by current or former partners—that's nearly double the amount of casualties of war.

Domestic violence is not a singular incident. Statistics show us that it's a continuous problem, deeply rooted in our culture for decades. This black mark on our moral report card is as American as apple pie. Too many women and children have been held captive for too long by physical violence, financial abuse, emotional abuse, or all three. Organizations such as WEAVE are working tirelessly with law enforcement, social services, health and welfare, and many other federal, state and private sector institutions to serve victims, identify abusers, and educate the public in an effort to combat future tragedies.

According to the California Partnership to End Domestic Violence, approximately 40% of Children are also an at-risk group; the average age of forced prostitution through trafficking is 13. Statistics show that some 300,000 young boys and girls are forced into the sex industry, and the number is increasing. According to FBI published information, criminals who normally would deal in illegal drugs or weapons have now turned to human trafficking. women experience some form of partner violence in a lifetime. Young women 18-24 years of age were significantly more likely (11%) to be victims of physical intimate violence in the past year. A report made by the California Student Survey (CSS) showed a prevalence of teen dating violence. At least one incident was reported by 5.2% of 9th grade girls and 8.2% of 11th grade girls. Additionally, among students with steady boyfriends, the rates

of dating violence increased to 8.8% in the 9th grade and 12.8% in the 11th grade. These figures are disturbing, and they warrant educational intervention. The hope is that early education of these young men about these issues will help them change their ways and prevent them from becoming adult abusers.

Although domestic violence and sexual assault can happen to any woman in any relationship Continued on page 6

Placer Food Bank Collects More Than 50,000 Pounds of Food

Thunder Valley, Whitney Oaks Help Shatter Record

PLACER COUNTY, CA (MPG) -Thunder Valley Casino Resort and Whitney Oaks Golf Club announced that they have broken Placer Food Bank's record for the largest amount of food collected during a food drive. AUBURN, CA (MPG) - J Ross Parrelli brings back the rare originality and attitude that defines great musicians. Maus Lady Makes **Creatures Small and Smaller**

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Of the 10,000 shoppers who swarmed the recent Holiday Show of Hands fair at St. John the Evangelist Church in Carmichael, hundreds made a bee-line for the 'Maus Haus" booth.

A vendor at every St John's fair for 36 years, Diana Boud (55) basked in the "oohs" and "aahs." The tiny mice and bunnies that crammed her miniature shelves were objects of mass affection.

The former Carmichael, now Auburn, resident grew up stitching clothes for her Barbie dolls. As a St John's parishioner, she offered rodent creations at the church's first craft fair. "I'm a dreamer," she admits. "I'd always loved little animals—the mice in Cinderella were my favorites. My sister passed away in an auto accident, and I found crafting to be very therapeutic. I saw the first St. John's show advertised in the church bulletin. I didn't know whether anyone would like my miniatures." At the debut 1979 event, every whiskered unit sold. Boud had accidentally cornered the craft market on adorable. Noses twitching, pink-eared and toothy, her Beatrix Potter-like critters scuttled straight into sentimental hearts. To regular customers, she is known simply as the Maus Lady.

She sewed full time for years, hitting up to 15 street festivals annually. Now, employed as a Sutter Hospital medical assistant, Boud supplies only two events: her St. John favorite and a Grass Valley Christmas show. Each fair bespeaks around 200 critters and 600-plus hours of sewing. Boud is constantly challenged to raise the bar from cute to cuter. A mouse in a nurse's uniform and a

bunny housecleaner are recent creations. A ballerina mouse twirls in pink tulle. A mommy mouse hauls a swaddled baby. From her diaper bag peeks a microscopic bottle.

For seasonal appeal, Boud produces Easter bunnies, broomstickriding Halloween mice, pilgrim Thanksgiving mice (yes, they landed at Plymouse Rock), and inevitably, a Christmas Santa Maus. A macabre head-hunter mouse was once commissioned. It sported a grass skirt and a string of shrunken mouse heads

Seldom more than four inches high, Boud's critter bodies are cut from felt. Tutus and frou-frou follow. As every stitch is hand set, each creation requires more than three hours in the sewing


room. Mouse prices range from \$24 to \$34, and at fairs, collectors jostle four-deep to wave credit cards with abandon. "Perhaps I should charge more," Boud mulls. "Two of my bunnies sold for

over \$80 each on e-Bay. 44 Seldom more than four inches But I don't like to seem greedy. And I love that so many people can enjoy my work. Hearing the oohs and aahs makes up for all those lonely hours sewing."

Beginning with mice, the crafter progressed naturally to bunnies (longer ears make them an inch bigger than mice) but the menagerie stops

there. "I've tried bears," she laments. "But my bears somehow ended up looking like mice. I guess I'm the Maus Lady and that's that."

Responses to 2013-2014 Grand Jury Report

PLACER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Placer County Grand Jury has released the Response Report to the 2013-2014 Grand Jury Final Report. The 18 investigations covered in the Final Report generated more than 50 responses from elected officials, boards of governing bodies, government department heads, and school superintendents.

The 2013-2014 Final Report was released in June 2014 and contained 18 investigations and mandated facility inspections. California Penal Code requires that elected officials and governing bodies that are the subject of a grand jury investigation submit a response to the investigation's findings and recommendations. This Response Report includes all the responses submitted to the grand jury.

There were 52 responses submitted to the grand jury. The investigation "Anti-Bullying Policies in Middle and High Schools: Are They Effective?" generated the most responses covering the Placer County Office of Education as well as 12 different school districts. In general, the responses indicated that many of the recommendations had already been implemented or were in the process of being implemented.

The investigation "Special Fire Districts: Open-Meeting and Ethics Laws Compliance" garnered 12 responses covering nine different fire districts in Placer County. The responses point out that the recommendations from this investigation have been helpful in assisting districts to comply with these complex meeting laws.

'The publication of the Response Report is an important step in assuring that the citizens of Placer County understand what actions government departments are taking in response to the recommendations from the Grand Jury," said Sharon Stanners, foreperson of the

2014-2015 Grand Jury.

The Response Report and the 2013-2014 Final Report are available on the Placer County Grand Jury website at www.placer.courts.ca.gov/ grandjury/2013-2014/2013-2014.html. Hard copies of both the Final Report and the Response Report are available by request through the Grand Jury Office at (530) 886-5200.

Under California law, the primary civil function of the grand jury, and the most important reason for its existence, is the examination of all aspects of county and city government, including special districts and joint powers agencies. The Placer County Grand Jury is an investigatory body with the authority to act as a watchdog on local government, investigate citizen complaints, and assist in criminal matters at the request of the district attorney.

Crocker-Kingsley Competition at Blue Line Arts Alpine Named to ACWA Post 75 California Artists Selected

ROSEVILLE, CA (MPG) - Blue Line Arts in Roseville will host an exhibition of work from the prestigious Crocker-Kingsley Art Competition starting January 9 and continuing until February 21. The exhibit features 75 works and six prize winners selected from 1300 California entries.

The Crocker-Kingsley competition dates back to 1927. Juror and acclaimed artist Gregory Kondos curated this year's collection, noting that "each exhibit features such strong work." 



Rooster Tails Fishing Club Breakfast Meeting

AUBURN, CA (MPG) - The Rooster Tails Fishing Club breakfast meeting will be held on Friday, January 16 at the Auburn Elks Lodge, 195 Pine Street, Lincoln Way in Auburn. The doors to the Lodge open at 7 a.m. with a \$13 wide-selection buffet breakfast served at 8 a.m. The presentation begins at 9 a.m. sharp and will feature Pro River Guide Brett "Bones" Brady, owner of Bare Bones Fishing Guide Service and one of the Rooster Tails Fishing Club's skilled guides. The breakfast meeting is open to the public.

The Rooster Tails Fishing Club, Auburn, is proud to have several full-time pro fishing guides as club members; they are able to offer professional advice to members and guests on catching a variety of fish species. At the January breakfast meeting, Brett "Bones" Brady will host a special presentation on fishing for white sturgeon.

Sturgeon can live more than 100 years and weigh over 500 pounds, reaching lengths of 15-feet or more. Sturgeon has been referred to as "primitive fishes" since their characteristics have remained relatively unchanged since their earliest fossil records; they are literally living dinosaurs. They are prized for their quality table fare as well as for their roe (caviar) and their rod-bending fight when hooked.

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife regulates the harvesting of all sturgeon, including prohibiting catching the threatened green sturgeon, which are protected and illegal to keep. Anglers may take or possess any legally caught white sturgeon between a slot target of 40- to 60-inches long measured from the nose to the tail-fork. All others must be immediately released unharmed.

One of "Bones" Brady's specialties is fishing for sturgeon on the Sacramento River from Verona to Colusa when they start moving up the river in January to spawn. These illusive fish are cautious and difficult to catch during daylight hours, which is why "Bones" Brady prefers to fish for them at night. His clients enjoy top-of-the-line equipment, including a fully equipped 21-foot Design Concepts Jet Boat powered by a fuel-injected 350 horsepower Chevy engine cranking out 330 horsepower to get his clients to the fish in a hurry. Using state-of-art electronics, "Bones" locates holding-fish and provides quality gear including G. Loomis and Lamiglas rods, Pflueger reels, and variety of lures and baits. He limits his evening boat trips to just two anglers and provides all tackle, bait, special tags, and

accommodations necessary for a successful trip. The boat limit is two sturgeon, which can result in multiple pounds of fish!

The 30 year old, 180-plus member Rooster Tails Fishing Club of Northern California, Inc. is a nonprofit organization that meets the third Friday of each month to educate, entertain, and enhance the fishing experience. Unlike many bass and fly fishing clubs that concentrate on very specific types of fishing, the Rooster Tails Fishing Club provides a balanced mix of fishing techniques presented by fishing experts targeting a variety of fish species on multiple types of waters. 

What Medicare Does (and Doesn't) Cover

SACRAMENTO REGION (MPG) -Medicare helps pay for a wide variety of medical services and goods in hospitals, doctor's offices, and other healthcare settings. But it doesn't cover everything, and it's useful to know what is and isn't included.

Services are covered either under Medicare Part A or Part B. If you have both Part A and Part B, you can get many Medicarecovered services whether you have Original Medicare or a Medicare health plan.

Part A is Hospital Insurance and it helps pay for:

- Inpatient care in hospitals; • Inpatient care in a skilled nursing facility (not custodial or
- longterm care); • Hospice care services; • Home health care services:
- Inpatient care in a religious

nonmedical health care institution.

You can find out if you have Parts A and B by looking at your Medicare card. If you have Original Medicare, you'll use this card to get your Medicarecovered services. If you join a Medicare health plan, in most cases you must use the card from the plan to get your Medicarecovered services.

Part B (Medical Insurance) helps cover medically necessary doctors' services, outpatient care, home health services, durable medical equipment such as wheelchairs and walkers, and other medical services.

Part B also covers many

preventive-care services.

Under Original Medicare, if the yearly Part B deductible (\$147 in 2014) applies, you must pay all costs (up to the Medicare-approved amount) until you meet the Part B deductible before Medicare begins to pay its share.

After your deductible is met, you typically pay 20 percent of the Medicareapproved amount of the service, if the doctor or other healthcare provider accepts assignment. ("Accepting assignment" means that a doctor or other provider agrees to be paid directly by Medicare, to accept the payment amount Medicare approves for the service, and not to bill you for any more than the Medicare deductible and coinsurance.)

You'll pay more if you see doctors or providers who don't accept assignment. And there's no yearly limit on what you pay out-of-pocket.

If you're in a Medicare Advantage plan (like an HMO or PPO) or have other insurance. your costs may be different. Contact your plan or benefits administrator directly to find out about the costs.

Under Part B, Medicare pays for many preventive services (such as screenings for cancer and heart disease) that can detect health problems early when they're easier to treat. You pay nothing for most covered preventive services if you get the services from a doctor or other qualified provider who accepts

However, for some preventive services, you may have to pay a deductible, coinsurance, or both.

Medicare doesn't cover everything, of course. If you need certain services that aren't covered under Part A or Part B. you'll have to pay for them yourself unless:

You have other insurance (or Medicaid) to cover the costs;

You're in a Medicare health plan that covers these services.

Some of the services and goods that Medicare doesn't

- Long-term care (also called custodial care);
- Routine dental or eye care;
- Dentures; Cosmetic surgery;
- Acupuncture;
- · Hearing aids and exams for

fitting them.



and circumstance, there are specific groups that should be noted. In a survey conducted by the American Psychological Association, it was discovered that over 40% of women with disabilities were more likely to experience severe partner violence than those without disabilities. Many of these victims are in wheelchairs or suffer from conditions that prohibit them from running or defending themselves, making them the most vulnerable. Another group of women who suffer at the hands of their male domestic partners are female veterans. It has been found that women who served in the military may experience higher rates of interpersonal violence, sexual trauma, and related health challenges than those who have not served. The leading cause of murder among pregnant women is intimate part-

We don't have to be victims of domestic violence and intimidation, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking to feel the effects of it all. There's a financial element to this growing crime segment. Nationally, women lose eight million days of paid work every year because of the abuse perpetrated against them by current or former male partners. This loss is equivalent to over 32,000 full time jobs. When a woman is treated for intimate partner violence, the cost of initial care is approximately \$948. Domestic violence is the third leading cause of homelessness among families in the United States. Between 1995 and 2005, the cost of domestic violence against women in the nation was \$5.8 billion. Today, that number has advanced with more than a 30% increase in domestic violence, and unfortunately the numbers are rising.

Hetween 2001 and 2012, 6,488 troops were killed in Afghanistan and Iraq, and 11,766 women were murdered by current or former partners—nearly double the amount of casualties of war.

ner violence. Victims of sex trafficking are perhaps the largest growing segment of male and female casualties due to sex slavery. Children are also an at-risk group; the average age of forced prostitution through trafficking is 13. Statistics show that some 300,000 young boys and girls are being forced into the sex industry, and the number is increasing. According to FBI published information, criminals who normally would deal in illegal drugs or weapons have now turned to human trafficking. A measure of dope or an illegal gun can only be sold once, whereas a young boy or girl can be sold 10-15 times a day.

In 1978, WEAVE opened as a grassroots private organization to serve
survivors and families of domestic violence in Sacramento County. Their
services were used by countless victims who until then had nowhere to turn.
Most thought abuse was just a way of
life. The members of WEAVE realized
that abuse has many facets. In 1988, they
began serving victims of sexual assault,
and today it's the sole rape crisis center
in Sacramento County. Five years ago,
WEAVE became part of Sacramento's
Rescue and Restore Coalition to provide
services to domestic and international

victims of human trafficking. Through dedication and hard work, the organization has grown into a nationally recognized agency. Their critical services include a 24-hour support and information line; a confidential, emergency safe house; walk-in triage services including a lethality assessment and therapeutic counseling services; legal advocacy; youth and community prevention education programs; and more.

WEAVE encountered an increased need to house families surviving violence while they worked to make new lives for themselves. In 2009, they built a 12,000-square-foot safe home featuring 18 family suites with onsite support services and a charter school complete with a Nature Explore classroom. To further serve survivors, WEAVE initiated construction of Next Step Housing Village, a long term housing option for families

graduating from the safe house programs. In 2013, WEAVE received a \$1 million grant from the Emergency Housing Assistance Program to purchase and renovate eight apartments to use as emergency shelter options for victims with unique barriers such as service animals. 2013 also saw the launch of Low Bono, a low-cost legal assistance program.

For the past 15 years, WEAVE's Suited for Success program has provided professional clothing and career development to hundreds of women in Sacramento County who have experienced violence. The program grew from the need to assist victims of violence in attaining economic independence. Lack of financial freedom is a common factor that binds abused women to their abusers. Many of WEAVE's clients leave all their belongings behind when they flee their threatening situation; they often arrive with only the clothes on

Suited for Success awards clients \$100 worth of professional work clothes from WEAVE Works Recycled Fashion, a professional attire thrift store operated by WEAVE volunteers. This addresses the catch-22 faced by many women who need to rebuild their lives: if a woman does not have a job, she cannot afford career clothing, yet without proper attire for an interview, she cannot get a job. Obtaining employment is a critical step for victims working to reclaim their lives and support their families.

This article was written to bring awareness to the national problem of domestic violence, not to paint a picture where every man is an abuser. The fact is, most men are kind, generous, and loving toward their female companions. Still, it is what it is, and the statistics are staggering. To combat this problem in our neighborhoods, everyone needs to be on board. If you're a man who wants to take advantage of an impactful way to ensure women in your community are protected from a life of fear and violence at the hands of their partners, don a stylish pair of heels and "Walk a Mile in Her Shoes!"

Adult Literacy: Chuck's Story

He began work early every day, his alarm clock jarring him awake at 4 a.m. The drywall business was booming, and Chuck's boss kept him busy. The crew raced from one job to the next. At the end of the day Chuck usually collapsed in front of the television. Sometimes he was so tired he fell asleep while eating his dinner. It took a superhuman effort to keep going...but Chuck had few choices. He'd dropped out of high school because he just couldn't keep up: Chuck had never really learned to read.

Then life got worse. Chuck injured his dominant shoulder. He couldn't work and he was out of options. Unable to read, no job, no driver's license (the drywall

crew boss had shuttled them to their workplaces), and - worst of all - injured and feeling helpless, Chuck became depressed and isolated. But then he confided his problems to a friend, and was saved by his pal's advice: "Get some help - call your library." Chuck made the call. As his shoulder healed, his self-esteem healed as well. His reading coach gave him the encouragement he needed to build his reading and writing skills. When his coach could see that Chuck was ready to work again, he encouraged Chuck to apply for work, helping him create a résumé and complete job applications. It worked!

Using his new-found skills and confidence, Chuck was hired for a job that required record-keeping as well as physical labor, a job Chuck never imagined he could do ... before he found free, confidential, private, one-on-one reading help at the library. And now Chuck is working towards a

new goal: he plans to get his driver's license. And he can afford with his new, better-paying job to buy a vehicle.

to buy a vehicle.

Nikos Kazantzakis was a Greek writer and philosopher who penned the fabled book, "Zorba the Greek," which would later become a treasured film starring Anthony Quinn. A second book of his was also adapted by Hollywood: "The Last Temptation of Christ," a Scorsese flick that got Christians all over North America up in arms (Not to mention that the original book got poor Nikos excommunicated from his beloved Greek Orthodox Church).

The controversy surrounding Kazantzakis has more than ostracized him in faith circles, and that is tragic, for he was an incredibly astute, wise man with much to offer, even in death. You'll find his grave on the island of Crete in his ancestral village. It's a simple, plain site with a wooden cross and a capstone with ten Greek words. Translated into English it reads, "I want nothing. I fear nothing. I am free."

This is timeless wisdom, for the things we desire, the things we want, the things we think we need, and the things we chase imprison us. The pursuit, the game of acquisition - and we're usually chasing emotional rather than material things -

actually steals our happiness. The pursuit is a dead-end, and

Nothing to Prove

only when we have given up, reaching high and reaching low, given out, and given over, can we ever be happy and free.

Now, if a Greek philosopher's epitaph is too highbrow for your tastes, then maybe you will be better served by the words of Kris Kristofferson as sung by Janice Joplin: "Freedom is just another word for nothing left to lose." And usually the last thing we lose is our wretched insecurity that has us forever chasing after fool's gold, playing for the fickle crowd's applause, or trying to climb some unsurmountable mountain to showcase our strength.

No, there's nothing wrong with ambition, for it has its place. There's no shame in having God-given abilities; be thankful for them. The problem is when we go scrambling for accolades and approval, when we become something of stage actors trying to obtain that elusive appreciation, recognition, and validation. The problem is when we feel we have something to prove to others - that we are capable or lovable. Then, we have imprisoned ourselves.

The imprisoned soul may appear to be a person of great drive and focus. He or she may be sacrificial and benevolent, but as Helen Shucman said, this person is "affected by everything." There is so sense of identity or grounding, no internal peace, no satisfaction. They are shaky, hungry, feel inadequate, insecure, and afraid.

Thus, they go hustling for love and try to shake down approval from every person and situation they encounter; here and there, trying this and trying that, straining for everything. They are trapped. Only when the striving ends will such poor souls be

The good news is, this can happen. We can quit doing and saying things we don't mean, clutching to approval we don't need, wasting time and energy we don't have. We can be free from the merciless crowd, free from our own pride and insecurities, free to become people who no longer need the flattery of others; others who are as fractured as we are, others who give their approval which lasts for about five minutes, and then the exhausting, self-caging exercise must begin again.

Simply, you can't kiss every pretty girl or boy. You can't win every game. You can't make every person love you (or even like you). You can't react to every sound in the cacophony of voices that call to you. You can't prove to every person you meet how lovable, capable, smart, sexy, accomplished, and worthy you are.

Try to do all of this, and you will be an ego-driven, self-centered maniac; or you will be as fragile as glass, a needy little imp that never experiences a single moment of rest. Either way, you will never be free. It's only when you have let everything go, when you have nothing left to prove, that you will have something truly to live for.

AUBURN, CA (MPG) - For my Never Give Up show on Auburn Community TV, I talked about scams aimed at seniors. Louise Schnur, the proud 84-yearold author of the book From Darkness to Light, told the story of how she survived being harassed by mail scammers. Schnur and I joined Police Chief John Ruffcorn to educate seniors and others in Auburn of various

Mailed scam letters play on words to lure seniors into giving money. Ruffcorn said that if you give money once, more and more scam letters will follow. Ruffcorn also said that many senior names are put into a pool and sold to different kinds of scammers.

Schnur was fooled once and gave \$5. After her first \$5 donation, 60 more letters followed. She got suspicious early on and took action like a true

the letterhead read "The Seniors Center," so she took the letter to the local senior center. There, director Barbara Crowell told her the letter was a scam because the scammer added an "s" to the word "senior" to make people believe it was from a reputable source. Crowell said, "Seniors are very vulnerable because they came from an era when they believed folks easily."

Schnur systematically identified 19 phony organizations and directors. One scam director's name that frequently appeared was Dan Perrin from Washington, D.C. His name appears on www.RipOffReport. com, stating his involvement in mail scams since 2012.

Schnur was determined to educate her friends and neighbors about scam letters, so she gathered them together to show them examples of what a scam looks like. She showed them the outside of an envelope that said "Emergency response needed." Inside the four pages were phrases like "Save your social security" or, appealing to people's emotions, "My dear friend is begging you for help." Schnur added, "Always question the words 'not tax deductible.' A

scam buster. She noticed that donation is always supposed to be tax deductible."

> I, too, received a scam telephone call. The phone message said that it was from the I.R.S. Criminal Division, and alleged that I was in serious trouble for tax fraud. I knew it was a scam because I only receive Social Security and do not file. I reported them to the I.R.S. Fraud and Scam Division at (800) 829-0433

> Chief Ruffcorn also addressed the issue of professional panhandler scammers who look like homeless people. They drive from their homes to street corners and take money intended for the homeless. Ruffcorn said, "Give your money instead to faith-based organizations that provide a variety of assistance."

You can report mail scams to the U.S. Postal Inspector at (877) 876-2455. Don't answer phone calls from numbers you don't recognize, the same goes for letters. The scammers don't break the law when sending scams, only when they cash your checks. So be like Louise Schnur and think before you open your wallet.





Cook undisturbed for 2-3 minutes, until edges look set. Then place pan in preheated oven until set in center, about 10 minutes.

Mix together scallion greens with remaining 1/4 cup sour cream. Serve frittata in wedges topped with a dollop of scallion cream.

Sweet Potato Rice Casserole

Servings: 6

- 1 can (8 ounces) crushed pineapple in natural juice, drained (reserve juice)



Berg's website launched in the middle of September and is based around a calendar of events for the area, hiking and history blogs.



Dear Savvy Senior,

Jim Miller

A coworker was recently telling me about a tax credit she got last year for simply contributing to our company's 401(k) plan. What can you tell me about this, and who's eligible? - Over 55

Dear Over,

It's called the "retirement saver's tax credit," and it's a frequently overlooked credit that's available to low and moderate-income individuals and families who make saving for retirement a priority. Here's how it works.

If your contribute to a traditional or Roth IRA, or an employer sponsored plan like a 401(k), 457, 403(b), SEP plan, SIMPLE IRA or other retirement-savings plan, the retirement saver's tax credit will allow you to claim 10, 20 or 50 percent of your contribution, depending on your income, up to a maximum of \$1,000 per person or \$2,000 per couple.

To qualify, you must also be at least 18 years old and not a full-time student, and were not claimed as a dependent on someone else's tax return. And your adjusted gross income in 2015 must be \$61,000 or less as a married couple filing jointly, \$45,750 or less if filing as head of household, or \$30,500 or less if you're a

single filer. These income limits are adjusted annually to keep pace with inflation.

To get the 50 percent credit, you'll need to have an income below \$18,250 if you're single, \$27,375 if you're filing as head of household, and \$36,500 for couples in 2015.

The 20 percent credit rate applies to individuals earning between \$18,251 and \$19,750; for head of household filers it's \$27,376 to \$29,625; and for couples it's \$36,501 to

And the 10 percent rate is for individuals with an adjusted gross income between \$19,751 and \$30,500; for head of household filers 29,626 to \$45,750; and couples it's between \$39,501 and \$60,100.

Double Tax Break

You also need to know that the retirement saver's tax credit can be claimed in addition to the tax deduction you get for contributing to your employer's retirement plan or a traditional IRA. Here's an example of how this works.

Let's say you're married and have an income of \$37,000, and your spouse is not working. If you contribute \$1,000 to your company's 401(k) plan, your adjusted gross income would be reduced to \$36,000 on your tax return. You would also be able to claim a 50 percent

retirement saver's credit, which is worth \$500, for your \$1,000 401(k) contribution.

Keep in mind though that this is a tax credit, not a deduction, so it lowers your income tax dollar for dollar. It is, however, a nonrefundable tax credit, which means it cannot reduce the amount of tax owed to less than zero.

How to Claim

To claim the credit, you will need to fill out Form 8880 (see irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/f8880. pdf) and attach it to your 1040, 1040A or 1040NR when you file your tax return. Don't use the 1040EZ Form.

If you think that you would have qualified for the credit in previous years but didn't claim it, you can file an amended return as far back as 2011 and still get the credits. A 2011 amended return is due by April 15, 2015. See IRS Form 1040X (irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/i1040x. pdf) for instructions on how to

file an amended return. And for more information on the retirement saver's tax

credit, see IRS Publication 590 "Individual Retirement Arrangements" (irs.gov/pub/ irs-pdf/p590.pdf). If you don't have Internet
