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


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Deadliest Days for Teen Drivers



Recent reports state that nearly 800 Teens Die in Traffic Crashes During Summer Months.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - According to Those deaths make it the deadliest season for a recent national study by AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety, the 100 days between Memorial Day and Labor Day are deadly for teen drivers. An average of 261 teens dies in traffic crashes during each of the summer months, a 26 percent increase compared to the rest of the year. This represents an average of nearly 800 teen deaths during the summer months.

Over the past five years, nearly 4,000 teen drivers and passengers, between the ages of 13 and 19 years old, died in traffic crashes between Memorial Day and Labor Day.

According to the report, teen drivers face a number of safety challenges. Teenage drivers have the highest rates of crashes that result in the death of other people such as passengers, pedestrians or occupants of other vehicles. Risky behaviors increased for 16 and 17 vear- old drivers as the number of teen passengers increased.

Drivers aged 16 and 17 are involved in about seven times as many crashes per mile driven, compared to drivers in their 40s,50s and 60s. Each day in 2012, an average of seven teenagers died as a result of a motor vehicle crash.

The study shows that teen passengers can be a distraction for novice teen drivers, and contribute to teens taking risks behind the wheel. Compared to driving without passengers, a fatal crash risk quadruples when carrying three or more passengers younger than 21. It also doubles when carrying two passengers younger than 21, and increases by 44 percent when carrying one passenger younger than 21.

Campgrounds Now Open for Summer

AUBURN, CA (MPG) - The recreational attractions of the Placer County Water Agency's Middle Fork American River Project are open for the summer.

The project includes campgrounds at French Meadows and Hell Hole reservoirs, high on the western slope of the Sierra near the headwaters of the American and Rubicon rivers; and other attractions ranging down the Middle Fork American River to Oxbow Reservoir, a popular launching area for whitewater rafters.

The pristine, relatively undiscovered area is reached via Mosquito Ridge Road from Foresthill or Eleven Pines Road from Georgetown. French Meadows is situated 50 miles east of Auburn.

Most of the campgrounds are snowbound in winter and are usually accessible from Memorial Day weekend through early October. PCWA officials said the current drought will result in lower than normal lake levels and flows this summer but that sufficient water is anticipated through Labor Day weekend.

Public recreation is a benefit of the PCWA Middle Fork American River Project which stores water and generates hydroelectric energy. The project includes five power plants that produce an average 1 million megawatt hours of energy per year.

Local Water Supplies Threatened by State Action

GRASS VALLEY, CA (MPG) - As the California drought grows more serious, leaders of the Nevada Irrigation District are preparing strategies to preserve local water supplies in face of growing downstream demand.

The drought and the state's May 27 order that stream diversions be curtailed were the subjects of presentations at Wednesday's (June 11) meeting of the NID Board of Directors.

The meeting was attended by several members of the Nevada County and Placer County agricultural communities, who are trying to get through this unusually dry year. Annual agricultural production in NID's two-county service area is estimated at \$98 million.

NID General Manager Rem Scherzinger, General Counsel Jeff Meith and Special Counsel Dustin Cooper briefed the board on Gov. Brown's emergency drought declaration, the state water board's curtailment of junior (post-1914) water right diversions, and a possible July 1 action on senior (pre-1914) water rights.

NID holds numerous senior and

junior water rights – some among the oldest in the state - that are used to divert water into reservoirs and supply homes, farms and businesses in Nevada and Placer

Scherzinger said the current drought and water shortage should be seen as a sign of things to come. He and members of the board said NID must look into all options for securing water including conservation, storage expansion, and building additional water storage, a sentiment echoed by several farmers and ranchers in the audience.

Cooper cited examples of other north state water right holders who are experiencing difficult conditions as the result of the state's curtailment order. He said the State Water Resources Control Board's emergency action used a flawed process that lacked evidence and participation.

Meith noted that a majority of this year's thin but early snowpack runoff had already been captured in NID reservoirs when the state's curtailment order was issued. He said, however, that the order, effective for up to 270 days, could

seriously impact NID's ability to collect water next fall and winter when NID replenishes its reservoirs. State action on senior water rights could further hamper NID's ability to supply its customers, he

Officials said NID would continue its advocacy effort in the state water planning process and consider other options in the protection of local water supplies.

In other business, directors:

• heard a water supply update from Water Operations Manager Chip Close who reported that NID water storage is at 86 percent of capacity (near normal for this time of year) but is expected to dip to 50 percent or less by late October. The district is urging all customers to reduce their usage by 20 percent until the drought is over.

The next regular meeting of the NID Board of Directors will be held at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, June 25, at the NID Business Center in Grass Valley. NID board meetings are open to the public.

the leading cause of death for teens in the United States, we are urging parents to be more involved with their teen drivers," said Cynthia Harris, spokesperson AAA Northern California. "Studies reveal that parents, who set limits on their teen's initial driving privileges, will lower risky driving behavior, traffic violations, and crashes among novice drivers."

AAA recommends that all states adopt and enforce a comprehensive three-stage graduated license system (GDL) for novice drivers that limits nighttime driving and driving with young passengers. "She," by a Brand New Film Production Group in Auburn

AUBURN, CA (MPG) - On June 2, 2014, a brand new film production group in Auburn, California, CineFabula (cinefabula.com), released their first short film, SHE. An online comedy short about a nine-to-five office resident who, upon hearing a description of a movie about a man who falls in love with his operating system, then sets out looking for love in all the cyber spaces. After encounters with various technologies we discover why he conducts such a quest.

The genesis of the project came from a meeting of local physician, Mark Vaughan, M.D., Placer High School teacher and author, Jason Sinclair Long, and software developer, Jeff Dickerson. They all shared a common interest in cinema and had various levels of prior experience with film. They met March 16, after Vaughan had learned of an online short film competition sponsored by RODE microphones of Australia. The competition will award three large prize packages of production equipment totalling \$70,000 in value. Prizes will be awarded based on selection by a panel of judges and by popular vote on the My Rode Reel website. A third prize will be awarded for

the best behind-the-scenes video featuring use of a Rode microphone in the production of the short film

After an hour of various idea pitches and running out of available time, Long described the idea of making a comedy based on the idea of a character having a relationship with his operating system. Vaughan came up with the idea for the reveal at the story end. Long had the script competed in its final form in no more than two days. Production then took place at Placer High School, Auburn Regional Park, and in a private home over the following two months. The cast is composed of all local actors, including Mark Vaughan, Jason Sinclair Long, LeeAnn Vaughan, and Becca Rowland.

Vaughan, the director and editor, says of the project, "SHE for me is not only a great story about contentment, it is about an opportunity to collaborate with some great people and become better friends." The group has high hopes, and is doing all they can to get online votes in an effort to win the popular vote prize. What's new? What's loud? What's colorful? Is that \$50 fountain really worth the money and how long is it? The patriotic, pyrotechnic perplexity starts June 28.

With such a wide variety of product out there, how can you ensure that your display will be a Yankee doodle dandy that doesn't have your money literally going up in smoke? Once again the Messenger Publishing Group put each of the new state-approved items to the test, along with other items likely to catch your eye from behind the chicken wire at stands that bear the names TNT and Phantom.

Fireworks are listed by price and rated on a 5-star scale for performance, duration, distinctiveness and overall comparative value. Judges included firefighters of Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District, Station 65 in Rancho Cordova, where the test was conducted.

- or fix a "dud." Never carry fireworks in your pocket.
- Never point or throw fireworks at another person.
- Soak used fireworks overnight before disposing.



Fire Prevention Starts with a Plan

he cooler temperatures of fall may be on their way, but cooler weather also brings an increase in home fires. According to the National Fire Protection Association, more than half (54 percent) of home structure fire deaths occur in the cooler months of November through March.

The International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC) recommends that every household have an escape plan in place, yet, in a recent survey by Omnibus, 44 percent of people reported that they did not have an escape plan for their home.

On average, families have less than three minutes from the time the first smoke alarm sounds to escape a fire. "Every second counts when it comes to escaping a home fire," said Chief Metcalf, president and chairman of the IAFC. "That's why families need to have an escape plan in place, and ensure they have working smoke alarms to provide those critical early warning signals in the event of a home fire.

The "Change Your Clock Change Your Battery" program aims to help keep families safe by sharing the reminder to replace the batteries in your home's smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors each year when you change your clocks for daylight saving time. It's part of the Energizer philosophy — that's positivenergy — which represents the company's commitment to making a positive impact on the world. Here are some additional tips from the IAFC and Energizer to help protect your family room by room.

Change Your Clock Change Your Battery

Daylight saving time ends Sunday, Nov. 3, 2013, and marks the 26th anniversary of the "Change Your Clock Change Your Battery" program, created by Energizer and the International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC). This program reminds people to change the batteries in their smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors when they change their clocks.

Other fire safety prevention measures include:

- Test your smoke alarms. Make sure all alarms work by pushing the test buttons.
- Clean the smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors. Ensure the sensitivity of your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors by cleaning them each month with a vacuum.
- Count Your Smoke Alarms. Be sure there is at least one smoke alarm installed on every level of your home, including one in every bedroom and outside of each
- Change Your Flashlight Batteries. Keep flashlights with fresh batteries at your bedside for help in finding the way out and signaling for help in the event of a fire.
- Replace your smoke alarms. The IAFC recommends replacing smoke alarms every 10 years and having a combination of both ionization and photo electric smoke alarms to keep you alert to all types of home fires.



Make a Plan

Draw a floor plan of your home and find two ways out of every room. Sketch the exit routes clearly on the floor plan. A downloadable escape plan grid can be found on the Energizer Bun Facebook page. If an upstairs window is one of the escape options, make sure you have a fire escape ladder long enough to reach the ground. Make sure every adult knows how to use it. Ad should be responsible for helping younger children. Assign an outside meeting place so if the family escapes from different routes, you can quickly locate each other.

Use the following checklist to eliminate as many fire hazards in your home as possible:

Bedrooms

In a recent study, almost half (44 percent) of families did not know the peak time for home fire fatalities is when most people are asleep (between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m.). So, in addition to making sure you have smoke and carbon monoxide detectors within hearing distance of your bedrooms, take the below steps to fire-proof the bedrooms themselves:

- Do not trap electrical cords against walls. Heat can build up, posing a fire hazard.
- Use only lab-approved electric blankets and warmers. Make sure cords are not worn or coming apart. Do not leave electric blankets switched on all night unless they are marked "suitable for all night use."
- Keep bedding, curtains and other combustible items at least three feet away from space heaters.
- Never smoke in bed.
- Replace mattresses made before the 2007 Federal Mattress Flammability Standard. By law, mattresses made since then are required to be safer.
- Have a working smoke alarm in every bedroom and outside each sleeping area.

Living Room

- Do not overload electrical outlets.
- Never run electrical cords under carpets.
- other signs of damage.

that will not catch fire. Blow candles out

- During a power failure, do not use candles or oil lamps for light. Keep battery-operated flashlights and lanterns in easily accessible places. Candles used for light in the absence of electrical power cause one-third of fatal home candle fires.
- Make sure you have a working smoke alarm in each room, including the living room.

Kitchen

Cooking is the leading cause of reported he fires and home fire injuries in the United States, according to research by the Nation Fire Protection Agency.

- Never use extension cords to plug in coc ing appliances. They can overload the ci cuit and start a fire.
- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- Keep anything that can catch fire away fi the cooktop. This includes potholders, or mitts, wooden utensils, paper or plastic bags, food packaging, towels and curtain
- Keep the cooktop, burners and oven clea
- Loose clothing can dangle onto stove burners and catch fire. Wear short, close fitting clothing or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking.
- Have a fire extinguisher installed in or n your kitchen, and be sure every adult far member knows how to use it.

Garage

- Store all combustible materials away fro regular sources of heat, such as water heaters, space heaters, boilers and furnace
- Keep wood finishes, spray paint, paint thinners and other flammable products in a dedicated storage container with a closed door.
- Store all combustible materials in their proper containers and be sure they are clearly marked.
- Keeping the garage tidy can also help keep it safe. Get rid of stacked boxes, newspapers, recycling and trash. They can be instant fuel for a fire.

Sharing faith, in Christian terms, is known as "evangelism." This is the English rendering of a Greek word meaning "to proclaim the good news." That's a problem, because the news isn't always good.

There was a subtext to the evangelization method I was taught that went something like this: "God is really ticked off with you. He's mad as hell - literally. And if you don't pray this prayer, believe the way I believe, and don't hurry to the baptismal waters as quickly as possible, then he will likely strike you dead before I'm finished talking to you." I would then scurry away before God's vengeance fell like fire on the sinner and I was caught in the collateral

damage. Again, there wasn't much good news in such confrontations, because there was no sharing of God's love. Love? Forget it. God didn't love, God hated. God didn't invite, God demanded. God didn't plead, God prosecuted. God wasn't pursuing wayward children as a heartbroken parent; God was dogging hardened criminals like a trigger-happy bounty hunter, a ready execution order I no longer share with others my faith in an angry, perpetually irritated

God who only wishes to stamp out humanity because I no longer believe in such a Deity. In light of Jesus, and the love of God he came to reveal to the world, evangelism can radically change. We are now "compelled by love," to employ a phrase from Paul.

We share our faith not to coerce, force, intimidate, or to instill terror. We share our faith because of and for love's sake - the only worthy compulsion. We have learned that God loves us, remarkably so, and loves our neighbors with equal measure. This love changes us; cures our dysfunction; and gives us new life. It really is "good news."

This reminds me of an ancient story about a man named Demosthenes, a skilled orator from Greece. But he was not always a skilled wordsmith. As a young man he had a terrible speech impediment. This became painfully evident when his inheritance was stolen and he had to argue His speech was so bad, they gave him an ambiguous nickname in the Greek, meaning either "stutterer" or "sphincter" (While neither is flattering, I prefer the former over the latter). He was laughed out of the courtroom. But Demosthenes was determined. He secluded himself in a cave and began studying the methods of the great orators of the past.

He stuffed rocks in his jowls, a crude form of speech therapy, forcing himself to slow down when he talked. Then he shaved off one side of his facial hair so that he would be too embarrassed to go into public. That way, he had to remain in isolation practicing until his hair grew back, and would face no one until he was properly prepared for the task. This would be a Before we breathe a word about the gospel or "good news," we should be properly prepared.

What is the proper preparation? Well, it's not about having all the theological answers or a collection of "gotcha" responses to objections. It's about having God's love consume our hearts.

When we can share the love of God by speaking of the ever-loving Christ, while loving those to whom we speak, only then are we ready to open our mouths, and not a minute sooner.

If we must, we will shave our heads and hide our faces. Let us go live in a secluded cave, if need be. Maybe we should stuff our mouths full of stones (or at least cover them with duct tape). It would simply be a good idea not to speak a word about religion, church, God, or the gospel until love is the means, message, and motivation for everything we say.

If we can shut our mouths for just a little while, it just might open our hearts – to the love of God - which really is "good news" for all.

Grilled Tahitian Fruit Foster

What You Need

- 1/4 medium pineapple 1/2 medium mango
- 1/2 large papaya
- 2 medium bananas 4 slices pound cake
- 1/2 c butter, plus additional for melting
- 1/2 c packed brown sugar 2 tbsp passion fruit syrup or passion fruit cocktail concentrate
- 1/4 c rum (dark or spiced) Vanilla ice cream Toasted coconut

Directions

- Cut pineapple and papaya
- into roughly 1" x 1" strips. · Remove pit from mango.

- Leaving skin on, cut the fruit in 1" crosshatch pattern then flip inside out. Halve and peel bananas.
- · Brush pound cake with butter. Place fruit and pound cake onto a very hot, well oiled grill, starting with the pineapple (it takes the longest to cook).
- · Remove fruit when it develops grill marks and pound cake when it is lightly toasted and has grill marks. Place on counter to cool slightly then cut fruit
- into 1" pieces. Melt butter in pan. Using a wooden spoon, add brown sugar, passion fruit syrup

- and stir together.
- · When the mixture begins to bubble and thicken, add the fruit and coat well. Cook until the fruit is slightly softened.
- · Move pan off heat, add the rum and return to the stove.Catch a flame from the gas stove or a long lighter. Stand back when ignited and flambe the fruit. Let flame die down and the alcohol cook out.
- Place pound cake on a plate. Top with ice cream. Scoop fruit liberally on the top and garnish with toasted coconut.

2) DON'T GO ALONE. WHILE HOSPITALIZED, APPOINT A COMPANION IF POSSIBLE. You need someone to speak up and ask questions... especially the first night after surgery when you're too sick to do it yourself. If the companion can perform simple tasks like tidy the bed, the nurses will love you for

3) BE ALERT HOW INFECTIONS TRANSMITTED. Germs, like MRSA, enter the skin through surgical wounds or intravenous (IV) lines inserted in your body to deliver drugs, fluids, or nutrition. Any break in the skin is a potential "port of entry" for infection. If the skin around a surgical wound, IV line, or catheter looks red, swollen, hot or painful, or if you develop chills or feel feverish, alert hospital staff

O N INSIST CLEANLINESS. It can feel awkward to ask your visitor, doctor, or nurse to wash their hands and/ or use gloves before touching you, but good hand hygiene is the best way to avoid infections. If you have your own bottle of hand sanitizer, you can offer someone a squirt, which is less awkward than sending them back to the dispenser in the doorway.

5) PUT ON YOUR THINKING CAP WHEN YOU PACK. Bring your cell phone and/or tablet (put it out of sight when you leave the room...these things can go missing) charger and an extension cord. Hearing aids and dentures also get lost in the shuffle. Look at www. ThePatientPod.com to see what other stuff you need to keep your things safe and stay in control.

6) CRITICAL TO WASH YOUR HANDS IN THE HOSPITAL. Clostridium difficile or C. diff is a bacteria carried by some of us in our digestive systems. When they get C.diff infection, they get explosive diarrhea that ends up spraying everything in the room (sorry folks, but Pat's father died of this). C.diff Spores can last for months on hard surfaces, where they can re-infect the next patient. Hospitals are way less clean than you think. Visit www.hospitalinfection. org. Pat's advice is bring your own bleach wipes (one of the few things that kill C.diff spores) and wipe things down. Got some more tips for you to consider, and I'll cover them in Part II of "Avoiding a Fatal Hospital Trip." Keep them handy and hopefully, you can share with someone you care about, especially you. In the meantime, stay well!

A MILLION WAYS TO DIE IN THE WEST (Rated R) A Film Review by Tim Riley

Seth MacFarlane, the creator of "Family Guy" and "Ted," knows his way around comedy and satire, proving his willingness, even eagerness, to also delve into the swamps of grossout humor and raunchy excess.

"A Million Ways to Die in the West," in which MacFarlane has the unlikely starring role of an inept but oddly smart sheep farmer in the dusty, remote desert region of the Arizona territory in 1882, seeks to emulate another famous Western satire.

The comparisons to Mel Brooks' classic "Blazing Saddles" are inevitable for many reasons, not the least of them being that scatological humor is in the mix, though MacFarlane, also the director and screenwriter, goes farther in bad taste than Brooks would ever contemplate.

Not to belabor the point, but MacFarlane clearly doesn't have the measured comic timing or even boundary-pushing sensibilities of Mel Brooks, who seemed to instinctively know just how far to go with his routines.

For some odd reason, unlike Mel Brooks' supporting roles as the lecherous Governor and an Indian chief, MacFarlane thought it a good idea that he should be the central focus of "A Million Ways to Die in the West," as if he were somehow indispensable to the plot.

MacFarlane's sheep farmer Albert Stark, unable to keep his flock from wandering aimlessly

through town and on other lands, is better suited as a narrator. He starts off like a visitor from another planet describing, in colorful language, the woeful hardships of the Old West.

Irreverent comedy is the trademark of MacFarlane's work, and here he seems to be at his best when he appears to be the outsider or the inner voice, such as when he spoke the dialogue for the stuffed teddy bear in the hilariously raunchy "Ted," or here just casually observing the lunacy around him.

Indeed, there are many ways to expire in the West, from pistols at noon and ambushes from gunfighters to runaway tumbleweed that slits one's throat or the horns of a rampaging bull taking out the random vendor of snakeoil remedies at the County fair.

As far as the story goes, the nerdy Albert is getting dumped by his vacuous girlfriend Louise (Amanda Seyfried), because she's fallen for the oily, obnoxious proprietor of a mustache toiletries supply store. Neil Patrick Harris, delightfully funny as a fancy dude overly impressed with his handlebar whiskers, plays the part of the odious Foy.

Albert unwisely challenges Foy to a duel, though he sets the showdown date for a week hence, in anticipation that he may be better prepared than the last time he was confronted by a vicious gunslinger.

Still living with his parents on the homestead, Albert's only real friends are the odd couple of Edward (Giovanni Ribisi) and Ruth (Sarah Silverman), neither one of them adept at guns or advice for romance.

The ongoing joke, played to extremes, is that Ruth is the most popular prostitute in town, given

to performing all sorts of perverted sex acts later recounted in some detail. Meanwhile, she and Edward have not had sex because they are saving themselves for marriage.

Having contemplated leaving the dreadful town of Old Stump for the more appealing San Francisco, Albert is dissuaded from leaving by the sudden appearance of the very pretty and smart newcomer, Anna (Charlize Theron), who is attracted to the sheep farmer's gentle manner.

Having arrived in town to hide out while her mean, vile gangster husband Clinch (a taciturn Liam Neeson) is trying to stay a few steps ahead of the law, Anna reveals nothing about her past, though her alleged bodyguard tries to pass himself off as her brother but soon ends up in jail for killing several people.

Anna's presence is fortuitous for Albert because she's as talented with guns as any sharpshooting desperado. Her skills go far in helping Albert overcome his ham-fisted handling of weapons, where target practice is an exercise in futility.

Filmmaking is often an untidy business, and there are scenes that seem more like filler than essential to the plot. One such extended scene is Albert being captured by Indians before they realize he speaks their language, and then he ends in a wild state of hallucination after too much peyote.

"A Million Ways to Die in the West," trying to live up to its title, may be the only movie ever to show an unfortunate bystander being killed by a giant block of ice. Crazy stuff happens in the Old West and MacFarlane aims to show much of it, and often to hilarious effect.

Very few comedies will ever measure up to the zany comic standards of "Blazing Saddles," and so let's put that aside and just enjoy the wacky humor of Seth MacFarlane as best we can. There are plenty of reasons to laugh, and even to gag in disbelief, in this film.

What Our Country Needs From the Press

These days, the scandal involving long wait times at VA hospitals can feel like some made-in-Washington spectacle generated by politicians looking for headlines. But it isn't. It had its genesis in a late-April report on CNN that as many as 40 veterans may have died waiting for appointments at VA hospitals in

This investigative piece was notable for two reasons. It's been a while since a news story so quickly provoked such a storm of public indignation that a cabinet secretary — deservedly or not - had no choice but to resign. And it's a reminder of just how important old-fashioned shoe-leather reporting remains to our system of government, especially when it uncovers official misdoing.

One of the basic truths about our representative democracy is that it does not work without solid information. Public officials, both elected and appointed, need to know what's happening in the communities they serve, and the people who live in those communities need to know what the government they elect and fund is doing in their name.

A lot of forces try to distort that flow of information, or even block it altogether — from officials who aren't living up to our expectations to politicians counting on public ignorance to lobbyists and advocates hoping to sway public opinion. This is why the press — and by this I mean print, broadcast and online journalists — is so crucial to our country's health. It is, or ought to be, a steady, dispassionate, truth-seeking, skeptical and tough-minded force for public understanding.

In an ideal world, our media would focus on the serious side of the news. It would explore and highlight the substance of issues, not simply the politics of issues. It would detail the facts underlying a story, rather than dwelling on the personalities at play in the story. There is a place for entertainment that plays off the news — as people like Jon Stewart and Stephen Colbert have amply demonstrated — but in their search for an audience, news executives shouldn't let it become a substitute for dogged reporting and the traditional values of accuracy, truth and fairness.

These are not easy times for journalists, however. I don't pretend to understand all the forces that are reshaping what we see, hear and read in the news media, and I know that news executives are struggling with a host of formidable economic and social challenges. Yet if the line between news and entertainment gets blurred, if loud opinion replaces accurate reporting, and if journalists take the easy road of covering politics and the horse race rather than the core of policy-making — substance, consensus-building, and the painstaking search for remedy — then representative democ-

racy is in trouble. New organizations and websites are trying to make up some of the ground that's been lost in the years of news-industry turmoil: investigative outfits like ProPublica and the new wave of "explanatory" and data-driven sites like Vox and 538.com. But their very presence suggests that they see a void to be filled. These days, only a handful of news organizations in the country have the resources — both human and financial — to spend weeks or months chasing an investigation. Given the cuts that have stripped newsrooms of the expertise they once contained, I sometimes wonder whether the kind of reporting that brought us Watergate and uncovered the Enron scandal could still occur.

Because make no mistake: we need maximum oversight. You and I need it if we're to be certain that misdeeds cannot hide in the darker corners of government. And Congress needs it if it's to carry out one of its core responsibilities: overseeing the operations of government. All of us rely on the press to check abuses of power, see that laws are properly implemented, hold officials accountable, and tell those officials when their policies and operations are failing or going astray. Without a strong independent press, those in power could simply tell us what they want us to know and we'd be none the wiser. And that is no state of affairs for a democ-

One, it would help ensure that families and others can go to court and seek a gun violence prevention order to temporarily stop someone close to them who poses a danger to themselves or others from purchasing a firearm.

Two, it would help ensure that families and others can also seek a gun violence prevention warrant that would allow law enforcement to take temporary possession of firearms that have

Three, it would help ensure that law enforcement makes full use of all existing gun registries when assessing a tip, warning or request from a concerned family member or other close associate.

Senator Boxer is pleased that similar legislation has been introduced in California by Assemblywoman Nancy Skinner (D-Berkeley), Assemblyman Das Williams (D-Santa Barbara) as well as state Sen. Hannah-Beth Jackson (D-Santa Barbara). ★




Dear Karen,

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20th Annual Lassen-Applegate Emigrant Trail Ride



The trip is open to all four-wheel drive enthusiasts and their families. It is not a difficult route; however, there are a few places where four-wheel drive will be required or where trail committee instructions must be followed.

IMLAY, NV AND SURPRISE VALLEY,

CA (MPG) - As early as the 1840s, farmers and gold seekers loaded their possessions, a few women, children, dogs and cats in covered wagons and began what would become an arduous journey toward the Pacific Ocean. The trickle of emigrants beginning in 1841 would turn into hordes of dreamers after the discovery of gold in California in 1848. The overland emigrant trek would take five to six months crossing mountains, deserts, rivers, and some of the most hostile country in the world.

Now SUV and other four-wheel drive owners can relive the gold rush era as they travel the famous Lassen-Applegate Emigrant Trail, marveling as such sights as the beautiful Black Rock Desert, the majestic High Rock Canyon, Double Hot Springs, Soldier Meadows and so much more.

This exciting 200-mile journey begins on Friday, July 18 through Monday, July 21 and is hosted by the High Rock Trekkers Four-Wheel Drive Club. The trip begins near Imlay, NV and followed the same wagon train route used by Peter Lassen in 1849. The trip concludes in Surprise Valley, CA near

Cedarville in Modoc County. This was also an alternate route used by early pioneers to reach central

"For me, this trail is very special and as a historian, I get to relive the past by thinking of John C. Fremont, Kit Carson, and Thomas "Brokenhand" Fitzpatrick and many other brave men and women as they made this difficult journey from small towns throughout the Midwest," explained Warner Anderson, trail boss from the High Rock Trekkers. Anderson said the trip is open to all four-wheel drive enthusiasts and their families. It is not a difficult route; however, there are a few places where four-wheel drive will be required or where trail committee instructions must be followed.

"The emigrants wrote in their diaries such good descriptions of their trip that we can identify the majority of key points of interest in the history of this route," Anderson said.

Camping the first night will be at Double Hot Springs, former camping area for all of the pioneer wagon trains and the second night participants will spend the evening at Stevens Camp, which provides toilets, spring water, and possible

hot showers. Participants will need to bring their own tents and sleeping bags.

Cost for the trip is \$275 per adult, \$150 for children seven through 14 and children under seven are welcome free of charge. The cost includes all meals from breakfast on Saturday through breakfast on Monday. In addition to tents and sleeping bags, participants are encouraged to bring a CB radio, camera, folding chairs, snacks, refreshments, and drinking

The trip in fully insured and operates under a permit from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). Proceeds from the event help support the California Association of Four-Wheel Drive Clubs' Conservation and Education Foundation.

The trip is limited to the first 25 vehicles on a first-registered, first-served basis. BOE Relocation Bill Sails off Assembly Floor

Several Other BOE-Supported Bills Clear Houses of Origin

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- Legislation to relocate the California State Board of Equalization (BOE) from its troubled headquarters building at 450 N Street in Sacramento has passed off the Assembly floor with ample bipartisan support.

During Assemblymember Roger Dickinson's floor speech, the author of Assembly Bill 1656 used a corroded waste-water pipe from the building to highlight why this BOE-sponsored legislation is critically needed. The bill provides the necessary authorization to relocate and consolidate Sacramento-area staff to one campus.

"I would like to thank Assemblymember Dickinson for championing this legislation for the health and welfare of our employees and for helping the taxpayers of California who are on the hook financially for a building in need of constant mitigation," said BOE Chairman Jerome E. Horton. "This is one of the only high-rise buildings in America with permanent scaffolding surrounding it to protect employees and the pedestrian public."

"Why should the state's taxpayers continue shouldering the burden of paying for constant repairs on this building?" asked Board Vice Chair Michelle Steel. "It makes no sense to keep paying for this."

The BOE has already spent roughly \$60 million taxpayer dollars on building repairs and remediation. Total costs related to repairs and relocation during construction are estimated at approximately \$115 million, which does not include lost employee productivity.

"This measure is an important step to address the needs of our employees charged with collecting a good portion of the state's revenue, who should not have to endure working in their current environment," said Board Member Betty T. Yee.

"Let's end this craziness and get out of this money pit," said BOE Board Member George Runner. "Assemblymember Dickinson's legislation has bipartisan support and makes good sense for the health of our employees and the fiscal health of our state."

About 1,900 employees are working in the N Street headquarters building. There are approximately 750 other capital-based employees who work in satellite offices throughout the Sacramento area. This legislation would seek to consolidate all of these employees on one campus, increasing efficiency and productivity.

Elected in 2010, Chairman Jerome E. Horton is the Fourth District Member of the California State Board of Equalization, representing more than 8.5 million residents in Los Angeles County. He is also the Board of Equalization's Legislative Committee Chairman. He is the first to serve on the Board of Equalization with over 21 years of experience at the BOE. Horton previously served as an Assembly Member of the California State Assembly from 2000-2006.

Elected to the Board of Equalization in 2006 and reelected in 2010, Michelle Steel serves as Southern California's elected taxpayer advocate. In December 2007, Steel discovered the Board of Equalization had delayed the return of millions of dollars in security deposits owed to California businesses. Procedures were changed due to Steel's decisive leadership. Following her investigation, the tax agency refunded tax security deposits to over 5,500 small businesses. To date, over \$100 million in security deposits have been returned

to taxpayers.

Board Member Betty T. Yee was elected to her post in November 2006. Her district includes many of California's coastal counties, from Del Norte to Santa Barbara, and includes the entire San Francisco Bay Area. Ms. Yee previously served as Chief Deputy Director for Budget at the California Department of Finance, covering a wide array of state and local finance policy matters.

Elected in November 2010, George Runner represents the State Board of Equalization's Second District. He is a leading advocate for California taxpayers. Runner has worked to improve California's tax policies and practices and to create and retain more private sector jobs in our state. Prior to his election to the Board, Runner served twelve years in the State Legislature, authoring the well-known California Amber Alert and California's Blue Alert. As a thoughtful conservative, his legislative priorities included improving the economy, business growth, education excellence, and public safety for all Californians. As a member of the Senate Revenue and Taxation Committee, Runner consistently led the fight against tax increases and supported tax relief for families and businesses.

The five-member California State Board of Equalization (BOE) is a publicly elected tax board. It hears business tax appeals, acts as the appellate body for franchise and personal income tax appeals, and serves a significant role in the assessment and administration of property taxes.
