Area Gas Prices Start Rising Again

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- Average retail gasoline prices in Sacramento have risen 4.4 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.46/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 720 gas outlets in Sacramento. This compares with the national average that has increased 5.0 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.34/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Sacramento during the past week, prices yesterday were 48.4 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 2.9 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 6.1 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 34.3 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

"After weeks of relative stability with little change in gas price nationally, we've seen a new trend develop that has sent the national average to its highest level since mid-October," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "Oil prices have recently surpassed \$100/bbl, a \$6/bbl jump since we began 2014, and unfortunately this new trend may signal the beginning of "March Madness", the time of year that brings large spikes in gas prices. Very few stations have gasoline under \$3/gal, and I expect those few stations will all but dry up over the next couple weeks. The national average will likely rise 35-50 cents per gallon by the time gasoline prices peak in April or May, ahead of the start of the summer driving season that brings the switch to more expensive, cleaner burning summer gasoline," DeHaan said.

GasBuddy operates Sacto GasPrices.com and over 250 similar websites that track gasoline prices at over 140,000 gasoline stations in the United States and Canada. In addition, GasBuddy offers a free smartphone app which has been downloaded over 25 million times to help motorists find the lowest gasoline prices in

PLACER COUNTY REGION, CA (MPG) - Human trafficking has been identified as the largest human rights violation in the history of mankind. It is the fastest growing criminal enterprise in the 21st Century. It is a 9 billion dollar industry. Human trafficking is the second largest criminal enterprise in the world, after drug smuggling and arms dealing. Victims of human trafficking are exploited for the purpose of commercial sex and forced labor. Human trafficking is a form of modern day slavery. It flourishes from the lack of community awareness. Victims are in plain sight. Those who are being trafficked include young children, teenagers, men and women. They can be domestic citizens or foreign nationals. Foreign-born victims can be either documented or undocumented in the United

States. The United States is one of the top U.S. federal law, victims of human traffickthree destination points for trafficked victims. California, New York, Texas and Nevada are the top destination states within our country. Los Angeles is one of the top three points of entry into this country for victims of slavery and trafficking. This trafficking occurs in a triangle from Los Angeles, California to Las Vegas, Nevada, and back to Sacramento, California. The diverse communities of these sprawling cities make it easier to hide and move victims from place to place. This makes it very difficult for law enforcement to locate potential survivors. Sacramento is among the top 5 cities in the United States which is experiencing an epidemic of child trafficking.

Human trafficking is a form of modern-day slavery where people profit from the control and exploitation of others. As defined under

ing include children involved in the sex trade. adults age 18 or over who are coerced or deceived into commercial sex acts, and anyone forced into different forms of "labor or services," such as domestic workers held in a home, or farm-workers forced to labor against their will. The factors that each of these situations have in common are elements of force, fraud, or coercion that are used to control people. Then, that control is tied to inducing someone into commercial sex acts, or labor or services. Numerous people in the field have summed up the concept of human trafficking as "compelled service." Every year, human traffickers generate billions of dollars in profits by victimizing millions of people around the world, and here in the United States.

New Study Details Depth of California's Affordable Home Crisis

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

The California Housing Partnership Corporation released a report February 11th that shows California's private housing market is not providing an adequate number of homes affordable to low- and moderate-income households and calls on California's legislators to take immediate action to meet the housing needs of California's lowest-income residents.

the study "How California's Housing Market Is Failing to Meet the Needs of Low-Income Families," finds that the housing bubble burst and the ensuing foreclosure crisis have not made housing more affordable to lower-income households. In



CDPH Issues Warning About Consuming Certain Cactus Imported From Mexico Due to Health Risk

Special CDPH Report

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- California Department of Public Health (CDPH) Director and state health officer Dr. Ron Chapman has recently warned people not to eat cactus imported from Mexico that were sold at produce companies were likely specific retail and wholesale locations around the state due to the presence of unapproved pesticides.

A recent routine surveillance sample collected by the California Department of Pesticide Regulation (CDPR) isolated as much as 5.8 parts per million of Monocrotophos, an organophosphate based pesticide that has been barred from use in the United States since 1989. CDPR immediately took action to remove all of the product it could locate from store shelves and distribution centers. It has been quarantined and/or destroyed so that it doesn't pose a threat to consumers.

The contaminated cactus was sold and offered for sale to

consumers and wholesale customers locally at La Superior SuperMercados in Sacramento, Stockton, Woodland and Pittsburg between 2/6/2014 and 2/12/2014

Whole cases of the cactus purchased from the wholesale labeled with a supplier sticker that stated "Comercializadora De Chiles, Selectos Nieto S. De R.L. De C.V." Product sold in the retail stores was sold in bulk bins without any specific branding or labeling.

Washing or peeling the cactus prior to preparation as well as some cooking methods (boiling) can remove some of the pesticide, however, since consumers are unable to measure the effectiveness of these procedures, it is not recommended that consumers try to salvage any of this contaminated product. If consumers have any of this product remaining in their possession, they should return it to the place of purchase or dispose of it in the

to date, but symptoms of acute poisoning may include sweating, headache, weakness, nausea, vomiting, hypersalivation, abdominal cramps, and diarrhea. Consumption of Monocrotophos can lead to neurotoxicity and permanent nerve damage.

CDPH and CDPR are working with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to identify the growers and importers responsible for shipping pesticide contaminated cactus into the United States, so that future shipments can be examined and verified that they are in compliance before making their way into the marketplace.

CDPH recommends consumers experiencing any ill effects after consuming cactus products consult their health care provider. Consumers that observe the product being offered for sale are encouraged to report the activity to the CDPH toll free complaint line at (800) 495-3232. For more information see www.cdph.ca.gov

Placer County Sheriff Special Report

Home Invasion in Loomis; Three Suspects Apprehended

PLACER COUNTY, CA (MPG) -

Two Loomis residents were bound and held at gunpoint during a home invasion robbery at their Creekside Lane residence this morning. Within minutes of freeing themselves and calling the Placer County Sheriff's Office, all three suspects were arrested as they drove on Interstate 80 in the victims' stolen cars.

At 12:18 p.m. today, the male and female who live in the home called 911. Details are still sketchy, but they said they had been duct-taped to chairs for several hours. The victims reported that the suspects, two men and one woman, aimed an AK-47 at the victims' heads during their captivity. The suspects took personal property, weapons and the victims' two

Deputies swarmed the area, including Interstate 80, to watch for the cars. A few

minutes later, they spotted the two victim cars on westbound 80, just east of Douglas Blvd. Freeway traffic was halted for several minutes while a male and a female suspect were taken into custody. With the assistance of the Roseville Police Department, the third suspect was arrested minutes later at a carwash near Riverside and Cirby Way. Weapons were found in the cars.

The victims did not require medical attention. The investigation is ongoing. The mug shots are not available as the suspects are still being interviewed and haven't yet been booked into the Placer County Jail. Suspects: Juan Jose Guerrero, 33, Lenny Enrique Saldana, 20, and Anna Rita Velasquez, 26, all from Willits, CA.

Charges to be filed against the three will include robbery, burglary, conspiracy, vehicle theft, grand theft, assault, possession of stolen property, making criminal threats, etc.

Bail: Guerrero and Saldana: \$200,000. Velasquez: No bail - she had a warrant out of Sonoma County. She was additionally charged with possession of a controlled substance and bringing a controlled substance into the jail.



Senator Nielsen Introduces Drought Relief Legislation for HOA Residents

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Despite the recent rainfall in Northern California, California continues to face unprecedented low water levels in its reservoirs. Water districts across the state have either implemented mandatory conservation plans or are in the process of implementing one. For residents living in communities governed by homeowners associations (HOA), this means that they are caught between breaking the water reduction mandate

to comply with their Covenants, Conditions & Restrictions (CCR) to keep their lawns greens or pay their HOA potentially hefty

To relieve homeowners of this dilemma, State Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Gerber) introduced Senate Bill 992 to prohibit HOAs from assessing fines for brown lawns during a governordeclared drought.

'Californians truly want to do their part in conserving water during this drought from taking shorter showers to not watering our lawns," said SenatorNielsen. "Unfortunately, the folks residing in some HOA communities are required to water their lawns or be subject to steep fines for unmaintained yards."

Specifically, SB 992 responds to news reports that some HOA residents are facing fines of between \$100 to \$1,000 for yards that are not "well-maintained."


In California, HOAs are governed by the state's corporation codes and the Davis-Stirling Act which provides a guideline

to establish how the association will be run by their own conditions and restrictions. Nielsen's proposed measure temporarily exempts homeowners from complying with these codes.

"While I respect the autonomy of HOAs to self-govern and maintain standards of appearance within their developments, I am more concerned about the non-essential water-use during the current drought. Californians, especially those on wells, are deeply concerned that they will not be able to wash their dishes and flush their toilets," Nielsen

There's an Alternative



In his State of the Union speech to Congress last month, President Obama drew widespread attention for pledging to use his executive authority to advance his priorities. He insisted he intends to act with or without Congress, and listed well over a dozen actions he plans to take by executive order. "Wherever and whenever I can take steps without legislation to expand opportunity for more American families," he said,

Washington moving again. As you'd expect, others are alarmed by this approach. The President, they say, is trampling on the constitutional separation of powers, grabbing powers for himself that were meant to be shared with Congress. They

gives Congress a primary role in making policy.

The problem with this debate is that it's missing a key part of the equation. Yes, our system needs a strong presidency. But it also needs a strong Congress. We are best off as a nation when the two consult, interact, and work together as powerful branches.

In truth, every president in recent memory has expanded the power of his office and been accused of a power grab. They've had plenty of motivation to do so. The modern world demands quick, decisive action. Americans tend to support presidents who act forcefully. Congress is complex, convoluted, and hard to work with; it is far easier for an administration to act on its own. Even members of Congress often defer to the President, counting on him to address issues they don't want to tackle or can't agree upon.

And presidents have wielded executive orders to great effect. Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, FDR's Works Progress Administration, John Kennedy's Peace Corps, affirmative action under Kennedy, Lyndon Johnson and Richard Nixon, Ronald Reagan's enshrining of cost-benefit analysis as the key to regulatory review — all came

about through executive orders. Yet there are limits to this approach, because in the end there is no substitute for legislation. Presidents cannot write a budget, raise the minimum wage, or reform entitlements by themselves. Because executive orders lack the permanence and force of law, they can be hard to implement and can be summarily cancelled by a later president. They are more subject to legal challenge than legislation. And most important, executive orders are a

unilateral exercise of power and do not benefit from a process of consensus-building and consultation with voices independent of the President's.

Consensus-building can't happen in a vacuum, however. Without a strong Congress able to find its way effectively through the thickets of lawmaking, this President and his successors will surely continue to address the nation's challenges on their own. The question is, how far down that road can we go before Congress becomes irrelevant, with too much power — and too much potential for the abuse of power - in presidential hands? Like our founding fathers, we should be skeptical of the concentration of power.

Politico recently detailed a spate of executive orders planned by this administration, which would affect everything from how power plants operate to how we commute to how the environment will be regulated. Taken together, they will "push deeply into everyday life" for Americans, the article noted.

Whether a president oversteps his authority with these and other executive orders is inevitably colored by whether you agree with the proposed order. But my point is different. It is that the march toward presidential unilateralism, whether the president is a Democrat or a Republican, dangerously undercuts our constitutional system. Before we give up on the separation of powers, let's try strengthening Congress. This may not be the easy route, but if we don't take it, representative democracy itself is in doubt. ★

"Pitchers and Catchers report!" It's as sure a sign of the coming spring as erupting dandelions and fledgling fruit blooms. And as inhumane as this winter has been - as brutal as it remains in many locales – spring could not get here quickly enough, groundhog shadows and eminent March snowstorms be damned.

Yes, the return of baseball is a bellwether of warmer days, even if baseball itself should expect a somewhat chilly reception these days. Critics say the games are too long and frankly, painfully tedious. Smart, run-scoring strategy has been replaced by brutish free-swinging for the cheap seats, say baseball's purists. And don't even get tongues wagging about a certain Yankee third baseman.

For my own part, I've had a suspicion about the game for some time now. After the baseball players strike of the mid 1990s I fell off the wagon. The more recent scandals involving performance enhancing drugs and the obscene amounts of money paid to mere mortals for throwing and striking a rawhide ball have done nothing to reclaim my confidence.

And have you taken your kids to a game lately? To park, \$30. For tickets, \$75, \$60 for sodas and snacks. And forget the souvenirs.

All That Once Was Good

I can't swing that kind of cash. What makes all of this so difficult to take is the fact that some of my fondest memories center on professional baseball.

I'm not old, but old enough to remember sitting in the now demolished Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium trying to snag foul balls off the bats of Brett Butler, Dale Murphy and Bob Horner – all for a few turnstile dollars. But I can count on one hand how many times I've been back to a stadium

Some of my fondest memories were also made at church; in the little "church in the wildwood" of my formative years. The pew bottoms were made of old wooden slats that creaked and groaned during the service, pinching this little boy's behind and picking holes in my mother's pantyhose.

The church's water fountain was a natural spring found down a path behind the sanctuary, and a trip to the toilet was a similar trek. On hot August nights I can recall the fiery summer revivals in that old house of worship – fiery in preaching and temperature – as I struggled to understand all that was going on (between explorations for spearmint gum in my grandmother's purse, of course).

Was this church "better" than what I have experienced as an adult? Probably not. Was it simpler, more sincere? Probably so. Major League Baseball and much of the church in America have arrived at the same place. Both are more driven by market and commercial forces than by a true sense of what they are. They have

largely been taken captive by the consumer, by self-indulgence, and vanity. We are all the worse for it.

My children used to thrill me on the baseball diamond every spring, even when they were picking flowers in the outfield or putting their mitts on the wrong hand. There was an enjoyment, a purity in their play, that while unprofessional, was much more real than anything happening at the ball parks of big business. This is my same longing for the church. For I still love it and pray that it become truer to its roots and more authentic.

Terence Mann, James Earl Jones' character in "Field of Dreams," may have captured the sentiment best. Standing in that enchanted cornfield turned baseball diamond, he says, "They'll walk out to the bleachers; sit in shirtsleeves on a perfect afternoon. They'll find they have reserved seats somewhere along one of the baselines, where they sat when they were children and cheered their heroes.

"They'll watch the game and it'll be as if they dipped themselves in magic waters. The memories will be so thick they'll have to brush them away from their faces. This field, this game: it's a part of our past. It reminds us of all that once was good; and it could be again." May it be so.





Can You Heal Your Body With Your Mind?

After years of suffering from a debilitating disease, not to mention multiple surgeries and countless doctor's appointments, author Danea Horn made a commitment to herself: "You will heal yourself with your mind." Unfortunately things didn't work out as planned, as she found herself consumed with such an overwhelming sense of guilt for not seeing any improvement that she ended up changing course and relying on a more conventional if still inspired approach.

Ironically, Horn's conclusion that the mind is not something that can or should be relied on to cure the body is not too far off from what Mary Baker Eddy - the 19th century religious reformer she largely credits with coming up with such an idea – thought herself.

Referring to the human mind

to as the divine Mind or God, Eddy insisted, "This mind is not a factor [in healing the body]."

This is not to say she completely dismissed the role of an individual's consciousness in healing. Eddy did see a big difference, however, between a mind fixated on - even intimidated by – a predominantly matter-based view of existence and the thought that is willing to see things from a more divinely inspired perspective.

"Discard all notions about lungs, tubercles, inherited consumption, or disease arising from any circumstance," suggests Eddy in Science and *Health*, "and you will find that mortal mind, when instructed by Truth, yields to divine power, which steers the body into health."

In remarks made a few weeks ago at The Commonwealth Club in San Francisco, Horn pointed to the "deep seeded need for control" that makes the idea of using our minds to heal our bodies all the more alluring. But it is the relinquishment of just such a mental power grab that Eddy saw as essential to healing. In other words, "Not my will, but thine, be done."

The downside to such a notion is that we may assume it absolves us of any responsibility, putting the blame on God for all outcomes, good or bad. For Eddy, though, handing things off to the Divine wasn't so much of a "Here, you

as opposed to what she refers do it" kind of proposition as it was a conscious recognition of His will operating in one and all, giving us the ability to see whatever situation we are confronted with in a life-affirming, health-inducing light.

> The good news for Horn is that she is doing much better and has written a book designed to help other women cope with the stress of illness. Interestingly, of the 10 strategies she outlines, her encouragement to "find gratitude" echoes something St. Paul suggested a good two thousand years ago that links this particular frame of mind with better health:

> "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things... and the God of peace shall be with you."

Human Trafficking Hits Sacramento Region Hard

Human trafficking is considered to be one of the fastest growing criminal industries in the world.

Labor trafficking occurs in diverse contexts that encompass all forms of labor or services. Common places where forced labor has been found in the United States include domestic servitude and small-scale "mom and pop" labor operations, to more large-scale operations such as farms and factories. Certain labor brokers that supply labor to multinational corporations have also been identified as an emerging type of labor traffickers. Sex trafficking includes commercial sexual exploitation of children (CSEC), as well as every instance where an adult is in the sex trade as the result of force, fraud, or coercion. Sex trafficking occurs within numerous venues in the broader sex industry, commonly found in street prostitution, online escort services, residential brothels, and brothels disguised as massage businesses. Under U.S. and international law, commercially sexually exploited children found in the sex trade are considered to be victims of trafficking, even if no force or coercion is

Because human trafficking is considered to be one of the fastest growing criminal industries, the U.S. government and academic researchers are currently working on an up-to-date estimate of the total number of trafficked persons in the United States annually. With 100,000 children estimated to be in the sex trade in the United States each year, it is clear that the total number of human trafficking victims in the U.S. reaches into the hundreds of thousands when estimates of both adults and minors and sex trafficking and labor traf-

ficking are aggregated. Like drugs and arms trafficking, human trafficking is a market-driven criminal industry that is based on the principles of supply and demand. Many factors make children and adults vulnerable to human trafficking. However, human trafficking does not exist solely because many people who are vulnerable to exploitation. Instead, human trafficking is fueled by a demand for cheap labor or services, or for commercial sex acts. Human traffickers are those who victimize others in their desire to profit from the existing demand. To ultimately solve the problem of human trafficking, it is essential to address these demand-driven factors, as well as to alter the overall market incentives of high-profit and low-risk that traffickers currently exploit. Why does demand thrive? Labor trafficking and sex trafficking of U.S. citizens and foreign nationals persist and thrive for a number of reasons, including: 1.Low Risk: When the community is unaware of this issue, when government and community institutions are not trained to respond, when there are ineffective or dormant laws to address the crime, when safety nets for victims do not exist, and when law enforcement does not investigate and prosecute the crime, human traffickers perceive little risk or deterrence to affect their criminal operations. 2. High Profits: When individuals are willing to buy commercial sex, they create a market and make it profitable for traffickers to sexually exploit children and adults. When consumers are willing to buy goods and services from industries that rely on forced labor, they create a profit incentive for labor traffickers to maximize revenue with minimal production costs. Left unchecked, human trafficking will continue to flourish in environments where traffickers can

the supply chain of the products we buy, elements of exploitative child labor or forced labor may be present. As economies around the world integrate, it has become faster and easier for goods produced with forced labor to enter the global market. In the U.S., labor traffickers exploit and enslave both foreign nationals (some of whom enter the U.S. legally) and U.S. citizens. In many cases of labor trafficking, consumers provide the demand, and thus the profit incentive, to the traffickers. These consumers can include companies that sub-

contract certain types of services, end-consumers who buy cheap goods produced by trafficking victims, or individuals who use the services of trafficking victims. By changing purchasing choices and asking questions about how our products were made, consumers have the power to reduce these types of demand and help stop human trafficking.

Traffickers often threaten foreign national workers with arrest and deportation, even workers who have the legal right to work in the United States. Labor traffickers use violence, threats, lies, and other forms of coercion to force people to work against their will in many different industries. Common types of labor trafficking include people forced to work in homes as domestic servants, farmworkers coerced through violence as they harvest crops, or factory workers held in inhumane conditions with little to no pay. In the United States, these forms of forced labor are more prevalent than many people realize. However, Polaris Project and others working in the human trafficking field are learning more on a daily basis about the different types of labor trafficking that exist amongst us. In the United States, the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 (TVPA) defines labor trafficking as: "The recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services, through the use of force, fraud or coercion for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage or slavery."

Individuals who buy commercial sex acts create the demand for sex trafficking. Many sex buyers may be unaware, illinformed, or in direct denial of the abusive realities of sex trafficking situations as they exist within the broader sex trade. When sex trafficking is present, victims are often subjected to violence, threats, controlling behaviors, false promises, lies, and manipulation perpetrated by the traffickers/pimps. Popular media, including certain books, movies, television shows, and music, sometimes glamorize

and romanticize the commercial sex industry without properly acknowledging the presence of sex trafficking. This glamorization then fuels the demand for paying someone else to have sex with them. Additionally, it is common that victims of trafficking will not discuss their situation with customers or ask for help because they are trained by their traffickers to lie and keep up the act. As a result, "johns" may not fully realize the truth behind the facade, or the pain behind the smile. In communities and places where there is a demand to buy sex, sex traffickers directly respond to the demand by seeking to offer a "product" to be sold for profit. To sex traffickers, the "product" they sell are the women and children they control.

How can you recognize the victims of human trafficking in your city? Victims of human trafficking may look like many of the people you see every day. They can be young children, teens, men or women. By looking beneath the surface and asked yourself some questions you may be able to help identify potential victims. Is the person often accompanied by another person who seems controlling? Is the person rarely allowed in public except for work? Can you detect any physical or psychological abuse? Does the person seem submissive or fearful? Does the person lack identification or documentation? Is someone else collected the person's pay or holding their money for "safe keeping"? If you get the opportunity to speak to the person alone, asking these questions can help you determine if you may be dealing with a victim: Can you leave your job or situation if you want? Can you come and go as you please? Have you been threatened if you try to leave? Has anyone threatened your family? What are your working or living conditions like? Where do you sleep and eat? Do you have permission to eat, sleep, or go to the bathroom? Is there a lock on your door so you cannot get out? Does someone prohibit you from socializing or attending church?

If you suspect that someone is a victim or Human Trafficking call the National Human Trafficking Resource Center at 1-888-3737-888. This hotline can help victims safely and securely begin to rebuild their lives by connecting them to basic services which include: Housing, Healthcare, Immigration Assistance, Food, and Employment as well as Legal Assistance. Victims of human trafficking who are not U.S. Citizens are eligible to receive benefits through the TVPRA to the same extent as refugees. Victims who are U.S. citizens may already be eligible to receive many of these benefits. Gaining the trust of a victim of human trafficking is an important first step for providing assistance. Confidentiality is vital for victims of human trafficking.

The Sacramento Rescue and Restore Victims of Human Trafficking Regional Program, which is administered by the Sacramento Employment and Training Agency (SETA), offers training and outreach on human trafficking, services to victims and referrals to resources. STRENGTH IN UNITY

For a moment life seemed surreal. It's Friday afternoon, my friend Greg and I are having coffee in Peet's coffee-shop on 19th Street in Sacramento. Yesterday, my wife was diagnosed with Stage III, Level C, ovarian cancer. Her surgery is scheduled for Tuesday. As Greg and I are talking, I share with him: (1) I know there are profound spiritual lessons in this for both my wife and me; (2) I have to do it differently this time; (3) I have to accept this and "let everything be as it is." The only thing I can do is be "consciously present with her."

After walking away from a fundamentalist church as a teenager, by age 40 I felt something missing from my life and started looking for answers. I started going to a small Unity church in Modesto and later Carol Ruth Knox, a guest speaker, delivered the Sunday talk. For the first time in my life, I heard a message that resonated to the core of my being. I knew this was Truth, capitalized, emboldened and underlined.

A few months after that first meeting, I bought a small business in Walnut Creek, near her church. Over the next few years, her teachings on "Non-duality," "Progressing Spiritually from Victim to Victor to Vehicle," and "The Dark Night of the Soul" changed my life and the way I see God. This helped me see that my wife's cancer would have a profound spiritual impact on us both.

I had been a caregiver about

30 years before and it didn't go well. I tried to do everything myself and avoid the pain by "stuffing" my feelings and numbing out with alcohol. Part of "doing things differently" was to recognize I couldn't fix my wife. I could take care of many of her physical needs: cooking, driving her to doctor's appointments, buying groceries, cleaning house, etc. I realized this time I needed to take care of myself, if I was to remain strong enough to take care of her. I would ask for help or hire someone to do the routine chores.

The greatest gift I could give to her and to me was to remain conscious throughout the experience. I said to God, "Okay, I am going to

be present for all of this. I am going to feel it all." My promise to my wife was, "I will be consciously present with you and hold your hand throughout." As we move forward in time each of us will face a 'dark night of the soul,' a moment when we can feel alone in the Universe. How to find mental, physical and spiritual strength to cope, survive and assist those in need as a caregiver is just the beginning of finding strength in Unity.





You two are not on the same page about money. THE MONUMENTS MEN (Rated PG-13)

A Film Review by Tim Riley

Fighting the Nazis to save Western civilization? How can you miss with such easy targets as Adolf Hitler and his uncivilized henchmen embarked on a mission to destroy art treasures that define the very essence of European culture?

Assembling a hardy band of soldiers to go behind enemy lines during World War II should be something like "The Dirty Dozen." The result would have been plenty of high stakes action.

On the other hand, "The Monuments Men," directed by and starring George Clooney, is more like "Ocean's Eleven," yet mostly absent the tension and excitement of a Vegas casino heist caper fraught with peril and fear of failure.

Of course, another slight problem for creating daring wartime exploits is that the experts of the art world are older guys who have the professional background and necessary grounding in cultural affairs that would elude the typical draft-age Army recruit.

Based on Robert M. Edsel's bestselling nonfiction book "The Monuments Men: Allied Heroes, Nazi Thieves and the Greatest Treasure Hunt in History," the film is intended to be a true account even though the names of the principal figures are pseudonyms.

Sanctioned by the American

government, as President Roosevelt and General Eisenhower came to understand the importance of saving cultural heritage, a group of middle-aged and out-of-shape of art historians, architects and artists was organized.

The answer to saving cultural treasures was the formation of the Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives (MFAA) group, in which George Clooney's Frank Stokes, a leading art historian at Harvard's Fogg Museum, was a natural leader given his wartime experience in World War I.

Stokes organizes a group of like-minded individuals, who are too old to be drafted or serve voluntarily as soldiers, but since they may come under fire, they have to go through basic training.

Stokes is joined by Matt Damon's art expert James Granger, John Goodman's sculptor Walter Garfield, Bill Murray's architect Richard Campbell, and Jean Dujardin's art dealer Jean Claude Clermont, a French Jew based in Marseilles.

Other members of the group include the colorful Hugh Bonneville's British aristocrat Donald Jeffries, a flawed man seeking a second chance, and Bob Balaban's art historian and theatrical impresario Preston Savitz.

The only real soldier and young person in the MFAA group is Dimitri Leonidas' Sam Epstein, recruited because he speaks German, knows his way around the battlefront, and comes in handy as the driver.

As to be expected from past film outings, Clooney affords his character and that of Matt Damon several opportunities to engage in playful bantering, even though they remain earnestly serious about the mission.

Damon's Granger gets extra comic mileage with his mangling of the French language, which he apparently learned in Montreal, to the point that no French person wishes to engage him in their native tongue.

The Monuments Men find a valuable, if somewhat wary and skeptical, ally in occupied France with Cate Blanchett's Claire Simone, a curator at the Jeu de Paume museum in Paris. which the Nazis had converted to a warehouse of stolen art works.

Risking her life to secretly catalog the locations of pilfered art, Simone wants to be sure the Allies won't simply keep the recovered masterpieces for their own collections of art.

In the late stages of the war, fearing his own demise and Germany's loss, Hitler issued the so-called Nero Decree that everything the Nazis had amassed was going to be destroyed, so that nothing would fall into the hands of the victors, including the art treasures.

Understanding the implications to civilization, Granger and Simone forge an unusual bond, not a romantic love one, but rather a mutual love of art and culture, along with a passion to save masterpieces for a noble reason.

Not satisfied with being the catalyst behind the Monuments Men mission, Clooney's Stokes also gets the benefit of uttering the most exalted dialogue, sermonizing about the great value in a civilized world of saving art treasures.

"The Monuments Men" arguably could have used more action and excitement, but then this is not a war epic. A sense of urgency to saving the priceless works of art is the film's saving grace.
