Water at Zero Flu Deaths Statewide Now 147



Additional winter storms may provide a limited boost to reservoir storage and water deliveries, it would need to rain and snow heavily every other day

Californians' health and safety from more remains in our reservoirs." severe water shortages in the months ahead, the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) today took actions to conserve the state's precious resources. As a result, everyone — farmers, fish, and people in our cities and towns — will get less water. DWR's actions are in direct response to Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr.'s drought State of Emergency. In the declaration, the Governor directed DWR and the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) to act to modify requirements that hinder conservation of currently stored water and allow flexibility within the state's water system to maintain operations and meet environmental

"The harsh weather leaves us little choice," said DWR Director Mark Cowin. "If we are to have any hope of coping with continued dry weather and balancing multiple needs,

Except for a small amount of carryover water from 2013, customers of the State Water Project (SWP) will get no deliveries in 2014 if current dry conditions persist and deliveries to agricultural districts with long-standing water rights in the Sacramento Valley may be cut 50 percent — the maximum permitted by contract — depending upon future snow survey results. It is important to note that almost all areas served by the SWP have other sources of water, such as groundwater, local reservoirs, and other supplies.

"It is our duty to give State Water Project customers a realistic understanding of how much water they will receive from the Project," said Director Cowin. "Simply put, there's not enough water in the system right now for customers to expect any water this season from the project."

DWR also has asked the SWRCB to adjust water permit terms that control State Water Project and federal Central Valley Project operations in order to preserve dwindling supplies in upstream reservoirs for farms, fisheries, and cities and towns as the drought continues.

While additional winter storms may provide a limited boost to reservoir storage and water deliveries, it would need to rain and snow heavily every other day from now until May to get us back to average annual rain and snowfall. Even then, California still would be in a drought, because normally wet December and January have been critically dry – and follow a record dry 2013 and a dry 2012.

This historic announcement reflects the severity of California's drought. After two previous dry years, 2014 is shaping up as the driest in state history. Storage in key reservoirs now is lower than at this time in 1977,

Special CDPH Report

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MP)

- Dr. Ron Chapman, director of the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) and state health officer, announced today the number of confirmed influenza related deaths in the state has increased by 52 to a total of 147 confirmed deaths for the season. Four of the 147 are pediatric deaths. There are an additional 44 deaths under investigation, not yet confirmed

The total number of deaths reported for the entire 2012-2013 influenza season was 106.

Those at highest risk – the elderly, pregnant women, infants, or those with other health conditions - who show flu symptoms should contact their physician immediately in order to get the most effective treatment. Symptoms include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle or body aches, headaches and fatigue.

"This influenza season continues to be a severe one as the increasing number of influenzarelated deaths indicates," said Dr. Chapman. "Once again I urge all Californians to get vaccinated, because it is the best defense against influenza."

Influenza vaccine remains available and there is no widespread shortage of anti-virals for treatment. CDPH continues to closely monitor influenza activity statewide and related resources. Visit a flu vaccine location near you to get immunized. Some local health departments may also offer free or low-cost immunizations. More information on influenza and other respiratory disease surveillance reports can be found on the CDPH website.

The 147 confirmed influenza-associated deaths this season have been reported by some of the following jurisdictions: El Dorado (1), Nevada (1), Sacramento (15).





Placer County Sheriff Special Report



PLACER COUNTY, CA (MPG) -Six adults are being criminally charged for their involvement in a drug lab that resulted in a mobile home fire last Thursday evening in Auburn.

Placer County Sheriff's detectives were called to the scene on Friday after CDF fire officials found evidence of a drug lab at the double-wide

mobile home that had burned to the ground. Detectives located the makings of a butane honey oil lab, where highly flammable butane is used to extract THC from marijuana. The resulting product is honey oil, which is then smoked.

Charges are being filed with the Placer County District Attorney's Office. Names of those involved will not be released as they haven't yet been formally charged. The charges include manufacturing a controlled substance, felony child endangerment, maintaining a drug house, conspiracy and causing an unlawful fire. Two small children were living in the trailer when the fire occurred.

Granite Bay CVS Robber Arrested

PLACER COUNTY, CA (MPG) -The man suspected of robbing the Granite Bay CVS Pharmacy on Jan. 15 was arrested by Placer County Sheriff's detectives yesterday.

Christopher Erik Sullivan, 26, of Roseville, entered the drug store, located at 8455 Auburn Folsom Road, at 7:28 p.m., approached the cashier and asked for all of the money from the register. No weapon was seen, as the suspect had both

hands in his pocket. He fled the store on foot. Through evidence from the scene, detectives were able to identify Sullivan as the suspect.

Once he was identified, detectives found he was already in custody at the Placer County Jail for felony grand theft he committed in Roseville on Jan. 22. Sheriff's detectives interviewed him yesterday, then charged him with felony robbery. His bail is set at \$115,000.

LaMalfa Comments on President Obama's State of the Union Address



WASHINGTON, DC - REP. DOUG LAMALFA (R-CA) issued the following comment on the President's State of the Union

At the beginning of the President's speech, I agreed with many of the goals and points he laid out. While I was pleased to hear him speak of streamlining regulations, his actions don't match the rhetoric. House Passes Farm Bill Compromise that Ends Direct Subsidies, Reforms Food Stamps

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) - Rep. Doug LaMalfa (R-CA) voted January 29th in favor of the Federal Agriculture Reform and Risk Management Act, which passed on a bipartisan vote of 251-163. The bill, HR 2642, saves \$16 billion by ending direct subsidy payments to farmers, closes food stamp loopholes to save \$8 billion and ensures that rural counties receive funding the federal government owes them under the Payments In Lieu of Taxes program. However, LaMalfa noted that while he

believes further reforms are needed, the bill represents a compromise with the Democratcontrolled Senate.

"While I would have preferred a bill that generated more savings and included larger reforms in the food stamp system, I believe that we've achieved as much as the Democrat-led Senate will allow. 

1 to 2 long, oval-shaped seedless watermelons **Cutting board** Green dry erase marker Kitchen and paring knives Melon baller **Assorted cookie cutters** (X, O and heart shapes), if desired

Wooden skewers **Toothpicks Strawberries** Fruits to make fruit salad filling

Large bowl and spoon Wash watermelon under cool running water and pat dry. On cutting board, place watermelon on its side and cut off 1/4 to 1/2 inch from stem end being careful not to cut too deep into white part of rind to provide

sturdy base. With marker, draw scalloped line around width of middle of watermelon. Use paring knife to cut along marker line, then separate the two halves. Use melon baller to scoop out watermelon for your base.

Cut top half of watermelon in half and use dry erase marker to draw large set of lips on one half. Use paring knife to cut out lips. Once you have general shape, carefully carve away rind. Use paring knife to shape lips into more finished look.

Cut remaining 1/4-inch-thick slices and cut hearts, X's, O's or other shapes, discarding rind.

Attach lips to top of base using wooden skewers and toothpicks.

Slice strawberries lengthwise into 1/4-inch slices, keeping strawberry tops on for decoration, if desired. Attach slice of strawberry with green top to center of each scallop using toothpick. Use rest of strawberry slices in fruit salad for fruit bowl.

Place fruit bowl on serving platter, fill with fruit salad and garnish with slices of fruit cut into hearts, X's and O's, if desired.



This year Bob Seger will celebrate his tenth anniversary as an inductee into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. The honor is his because of his hardscrabble, up-by-the-bootstraps life story; the way he can forge lyrics that are a combination of personal autobiography and everyman's experience; and of course, there is the legendary intensity with which he delivers his melodies.

Of equal legend are his songs: "Turn the Page," "Night Moves," "We've Got Tonight," and "Still the Same" - tunes that launched Seger to worldwide fame, carried him to the top of the charts, and gave many of us a soundtrack for our coming of age years.

My personal Seger favorite is "Like a Rock." Most people today associate this iconic song with Chevrolet pickup trucks. I associate the apropos lyrics with the evening of my high school graduation: "I stood there boldly, sweatin' in the sun, felt like a million, felt like number one; the height of summer, I'd never felt that strong, like a rock."

And then the refrain that Seger screams into the microphone, a refrain about himself as a younger man: "Like a rock, I was strong as I could be; like a

rock, nothin' ever got to me; like a rock, I was something to see; like a rock."

Seger captures the years of youth, perfectly. It is a time of unbridled optimism, strength, and arrogance. A young man or woman can do anything, be anything, try anything, and overcome anything. No challenge is too big, too tough, or too much body and soul are as solid rock.

Honestly, a young person needs this kind of bravado. He or she needs a kind of audacious swagger when life is just getting started. But he or she will also learn – life teaches everyone this lesson – that the do-everything, dare-anybody, defy-anything ability of youth, doesn't last.

We live a little while and experience a few disappointments. We bury loved ones, lose a job, a marriage, a house, a career, or a fortune. We are betrayed by a friend, a business partner, or a lover. We suffer, hurt, age, have our hearts broken, or muddle through a couple decades of muted frustration.

Then we learn, and this learning is as absolutely necessary as youthful strength, that we really aren't "like a rock" at all – at least not anymore. The challenges of life are indeed too big, too tough, and too much. We learn that life, like erosion, has a way of reducing the hardest stone into sand.

Admittedly, this realization might cause you to hit the booze or pills and collapse into a hopeless stupor – many past the prime of youth do exactly that. But the recognition of weakness and personal limitation – that we won't always be "standin' arrow straight, chargin' from the gate, and carryin' the weight" - is not cause for despair. It is liberation.

It is deliverance from the "tryharder-and-do-more" life. It is a release from the gladiator's ethic of "I have to kill myself (or others) to overcome." It is freedom from the totalitarianism of "If it's going to be, it is up to me." In short, it is surrender, and surrender is true faith and true life.

"If you try to hang on to your life," Jesus said, "then you will lose it." This "hanging on" includes personal arrogance, strength, ambitions, and our selfreliant approach to life. We learn to let these go, not because we have hopelessly given up, but because we have given over. We have exchanged our failing abilities and life for the power of God and his life.

In the end, we won't always "stand boldly in the sun." We retreat into the darkness. We aren't always as "strong as we can be," because we face things in life that are stronger than we are. Our steady hands will grow shaky and our clear, bright eyes will grow dim. But it's all okay if we have learned to live differently, if we have learned to live a life entrusted to the Rock that is Christ.

'Spiritual Pregnancy' Author Shawn Tassone Rides Wave of Mind-Body Medicine

At least a hundred years before health care reform became all the rage, religious reformer and medical pioneer Mary Baker Eddy spoke of a growing interest in "a higher mode of medicine."

Little did she know it would take so long for many of the changes she envisioned to find the broad support and practical application we're seeing today, particularly within the field of mind-body medicine.

Just one bit of evidence can be found in the publication earlier this month of "Spiritual Pregnancy," a book that superimposes Joseph Campbell's mythical "hero's journey" over the three trimesters of pregnancy, drawing special attention to the spiritual awakening that takes place throughout this process. During an interview last year, Shawn Tassone, one of the book's two authors, spoke about the unexpected and often dramatic nature of progress in all aspects of life, including medicine.

His inspiration came from an advanced math class he took where an exploration of S-curves taught him that the nearer ocean waves approach land, the closer they become, the larger they grow and the faster they move until, at last, they come crashing onto shore. Years later, he noticed these patterns appearing again, this time in his practice as an OB/GYN.

In 2002, Tassone and his wife began running a busy

women's health clinic in Arizona, a veritable proving ground for the latest advances in medicine. But in 2009, it was the advances being made in a different although related arena that led him to enroll as a graduate student in the College of Mind-Body Medicine at San Francisco-based Saybrook University.

It was at Saybrook that Tassone began working on a "narrative biopic" about Dr. Larry Dossey, best-selling author of a number of books on health and healing and the man widely credited with infusing the term "nonlocal mind" into the modern-day vernacular Broadly defined, "nonlocal mind" refers to the presumed source of a variety of interactions that are beyond the comprehension of the physical senses, including intuition, synchronicity (simultaneous occurrences) and spontaneous healing. According to Dossey, it's this ability to affect physical cure for yourself and others by means of a singular nonlocal mind – or Mind for those who consider this a divine consciousness – that represents what he describes as the most advanced era of medicine.

"It makes sense to me that at some point that wave is going to break, or hit a break-point where nonlocal healing has to happen," said Tassone, relating this concept to his earlier research. "I don't think it's something that you can avoid.

"The question that I have is, has it been there the whole time and we just discovered it? Or is it something we invented? I would venture to say it's probably been there the whole time. We just weren't able to incorporate it."

As surprising and as futile as it may seem to people like Tassone, there are still quite a number of people doing all they can to keep this wave from reaching shore.

Last year he wrote a column for Psychology Today detailing a case of his involving a woman suffering from severe pelvic pain. Long story short, rather than operating on her, which was Tassone's first inclination, he chose an approach that dealt directly – and successfully – with

the patient's troubled thought.

"What I discovered that day was the mind holds so much power over pleasure and pain,"

Unfortunately, the response he received from mostly women readers was so vitriolic, a number of comments had to be removed from the website.

"I got so distraught about all these threats because these women were saying to me, 'You are so wrong for saying that pelvic pain is all in your head,' said Tassone. "I wasn't saying that at all. In a way, it was almost worse than [the] response I get from doctors when I tell them about mind-body medicine.

"So, what I took away from that [experience] was that, even though there is definitely a physical and mental component to pain, we as a society are more geared to fix the physical and unconsciously ignore the mental, maybe because that's easier to deal with."

Despite this resistance, however, the wave that Mary Baker Eddy envisioned so many years ago keeps coming. Whether it's being propelled by people like Shawn Tassone, or the thousands if not millions of others who for years have recognized this connection between our thoughts and our physical well-being, it appears to be getting closer, higher, faster.

"The Bible says, 'Doctor heal thyself,'" said Tassone, "but I think that what it [should be] is, 'Patient heal thyself.'

"If patients would make the transition themselves and push this issue, that's when I think that wave is going to crash.". ★

DWR Drops State Water Project Allocation to Zero, Seeks to Preserve Remaining Supplies

one of the two previous driest water years on record. Yesterday's Sierra snow survey found the snowpack's statewide water content at only 12 percent of average for this time of year.

Lake Oroville in Butte County, the principal SWP reservoir, is at 36 percent of its 3.5 million acrefoot capacity (55 percent of its historical average for the date). Shasta Lake north of Redding, California's and the federal Central Valley Project's (CVP) largest reservoir, is at 36 percent of its 4.5 million acre-foot capacity (54 percent of average for the date). San Luis Reservoir, a critical south-of-Delta reservoir for both the SWP and CVP, is at a mere 30 percent of its 2 million acre-foot capacity (39 percent of average for the date).

Key facts on water deliveries and impacts:

• Never before in the 54-year history of the State Water Project has DWR announced a zero allocation to all 29 public water agencies that buy from the SWP. These deliveries help supply water to 25 million Californians and roughly 750,000 acres of irrigated farmland.

• Deliveries to senior water rights holders in the Sacramento Valley -- all agricultural irrigation districts – were last cut in 1992.

• The only previous State Water Project zero percent allocation was in 1991 for agriculture, but cities that year received 30 percent of requested allocations

• "Carryover" water stored by local agencies and water transferred from willing sellers to buyers in critically short areas still will be delivered, as will emergency supplies for drinking, sanitation, and fire protection.

Regulatory Actions Sought

In a formal petition delivered earlier this week, DWR and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) asked the SWRCB to adjust requirements for freshwater outflow in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta in order to preserve stored water that may be needed later in the year for health and safety needs and to provide cold water upstream for protection of salmon and other species. The existing Delta water quality standards, contained in Water Rights Decision 1641, were not written with these extraordinarily dry conditions in mind. The DWR and Reclamation petition seeks adjustment to the water quality and flow requirements for February, along with a request to establish a framework to make further requests and adjustments as the drought evolves.

The petition also seeks flexibility in management of a water quality regulation that requires closure of the Cross-Channel Gates along the Sacramento River near Walnut Grove from February 1 through May 20. Under the current extremely low flow conditions, open gates can help ameliorate salty conditions in the Delta. DWR and Reclamation propose to close the gates should storm runoff boost flows or if fish monitoring indicates closure is needed to protect threatened species.

Water rights permits require the SWP, operated by DWR, and the CVP, operated by Reclamation, to ensure that outflow from the Delta meets an average of 7,100 cubic feet per second (cfs) beginning February 1. Outflow is composed of flows from all tributaries to the Delta, some of

which are directly controlled by DWR and Reclamation.

Under the petition, DWR and Reclamation project that outflows will be able to meet an average of 4,500 cfs during February, which is the level currently being achieved in January. To help meet this level of outflow, DWR and Reclamation will export from the Delta a maximum of 1,500 cfs, which will be used to serve health and safety needs.

The petitioners note that they do not believe there is an adequate water supply to meet all obligations under the SWRCB's Water Rights Decision 1641. Without adjustment, "there exists a substantial risk that by late spring 2014 and into 2015 the Projects' major reservoirs will be drafted to dead pool or near dead pool levels at which point reservoir release capacities will be substantially diminished." Dead pool level refers to the condition when water can no longer be released from a reservoir using gravity.

The petition seeks to minimize adverse impacts to the cold water stored in reservoirs for downstream fisheries and to allow for some level of salinity control later in the season. Otherwise, water project operators risk losing entirely the ability to control salinity in the Delta.

"As Governor Brown has directed, we will work closely with our state, federal and local partners to meet health and safety needs and deliver what water is available to critically dry areas," said Director Cowin. "Even though it's dry everywhere, California agencies have traditionally been willing to transfer any water they can spare to more needy areas. Today is a stark reminder that we all have to save every drop we can in our homes and places of work. Conservation is always important, but today it's an absolute necessity."

necessity."

In addition to the actions announced today, Reclamation yesterday decided to preserve rescheduled water supplies that CVP farmers had banked as a hedge against dry conditions. Director Cowin praised the decision, saying: "In an increasingly complex situation, affirming the ability of water districts to preserve water supplies as a hedge against drought is good water management."

Authority for Changes

California law authorizes the SWRCB to grant temporary changes in permits when it finds an urgent need for the change and the change can be made without injury to other lawful users of water or without unreasonably affecting fish, wildlife, or other instream beneficial uses. The law requires consultation with representatives of the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. The change must also be found to be in the public interest.

Water Allocation History

In December, DWR estimated it would be able to deliver 5 percent of the slightly more than 4 million acre-feet of State Water Project water requested this year by the 29 public water agencies that purchase water from the project. They are located in Northern California, the Bay Area, San Joaquin Valley, Central Coast, and Southern California.

The 5 percent projected allocation—now reduced to zero—tied with calendar year 2010 for the lowest initial allocation ever.

The initial 2010 delivery estimate, made on the heels of the 2007-2009 drought, was eventually increased to 50 percent as winter storms developed.

The final SWP allocation for calendar year 2013 was 35 percent of requested water amounts. In 2012, the final allocation was 65 percent. It was 80 percent in 2011, up dramatically from an initial allocation of 25 percent. The final allocation was 50 percent in 2010, 40 percent in 2009, 35 percent in 2008, and 60 percent in 2007. The last 100 percent allocation - difficult to achieve even in wet years because of Delta pumping restrictions to protect threatened and endangered fish – was in 2006.

The federal CVP, which supplies much of the state's agricultural water, is expected to announce its initial allocation next month. It also will be dismal, especially for irrigation-dependent farms on the west side of the San Joaquin Valley.

Water-short Valley farmers are expected to fallow thousands of acres, sending negative economic ripples through communities dependent on the agricultural economy.

Farmers also will pump increasing amounts of groundwater, further depleting overtapped aquifers. Governor Brown directed DWR to monitor groundwater levels, land subsidence and land fallowing as the drought persists.

Conservation Key

"We need everyone in every part of the state to conserve water," said Governor Brown in his January 22 State of the State address.

When Governor Brown declared a drought State of Emergency earlier this month, he directed state officials to take all necessary actions to prepare for water shortages. This week, CAL FIRE announced it hired 125 additional firefighters to help address the increased fire threat due to drought conditions, the California Department of Public Health identified and offered assistance to communities at risk of severe drinking water shortages and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife restricted fishing on some waterways due to low water flows worsened by the drought. Also this week, the California Natural Resources Agency, the California Environmental Protection Agency and the California Department of Food and Agriculture also released the California Water Action Plan, which will guide state efforts to enhance water supply reliability, restore damaged and destroyed ecosystems and improve the resilience of our infrastructure.

Governor Brown has called on all Californians to voluntarily reduce their water usage by 20 percent and the Save Our Water campaign has announced four new public service announcements that encourage residents to conserve. Last December, the Governor formed a Drought Task Force to review expected water allocations and California's preparedness for water scarcity. In May 2013, Governor Brown issued an Executive Order to direct state water officials to expedite the review and processing of voluntary transfers of

JACK RYAN: SHADOW RECRUIT (Rated PG-13) A Film Review by Tim Riley

The brutal realities of war in the rugged terrain of Afghanistan, as told in "Lone Survivor," hits the audience right in the gut in this unvarnished tale of heroism and courage under the harsh light of Peter Berg's direction.

The director brilliantly captures the unforgiving essence of a Navy SEAL operation that went horribly wrong when a reconnaissance team of four brave soldiers became trapped under fire in the mountains of the remote Hindu Kush region of Kunar province.

Based upon the first-person account of Marcus Luttrell, "Lone Survivor," at least as a title, downgrades the element of suspense, but not enough that the ill-fated mission is relieved of all sense of shock and trepidation.

The opening scene is a fitting prologue that explores in excruciating detail the rigors of the intensely grueling training process, where only those with the greatest mental and physical toughness emerge as full-fledged SEALs.

The point of this exercise is to set the stage for what follows in 2005 when Marcus Luttrell (Mark Wahlberg) and three of his battle-ready fellow soldiers are dispatched on a mission to capture or kill a top Taliban leader responsible for slaying U.S Marines.

The other elite soldiers include

commanding officer Lt. Michael Murphy (Taylor Kitsch), gunner Danny Dietz (Emile Hirsch), and sonar technician Matthew "Axe" Axelson (Ben Foster), all of whom report to Lt. Commander Erik Kristensen (Eric Bana).

Character development is somewhat limited by the circumstances of the wartime setting. We get a glimpse of the camaraderie between the men at the base camp, mostly the usual male bonding and joking around, but not a lot of perceptive insight.

On June 28, 2005, the fourman surveillance team of Operation Red Wings boarded a helicopter so that they could be dropped into a remote mountainous area with the mission to identify Ahmad Shah, a highlevel Taliban operative that the American military was most anxious to neutralize.

The four SEALs arrive safely on the ground, but soon discover that their radio equipment and satellite phone are not functioning regularly, leaving them isolated when having to make key decisions or relay vital information back to headquarters.

Another immediate problem is that three goat herders grazing their flock stumble upon the men's hiding place, plunging the mission into immediate jeopardy. The SEALS are forced to make an urgent life-and-death decision – how to treat the intruders under the rules of engagement.

In one of the film's most compelling scenes, the soldiers debate the choices facing them. Instantly, they know that protocol dictates they must release civilian noncombatants, but these

guys look more sinister and suspicious than simple farmers.

Still, killing the unarmed prisoners so that they could not alert the Taliban was morally objectionable, to say nothing of how the soldiers could be crucified by public opinion and the official rules if they killed innocent

Ultimately, the goat herders are cut loose, and the SEALs began an arduous climb to what they hoped would be safety. Soon, hellfire rained down on them.

The Taliban, bolstered by more than a hundred fighters, launch an assault that results in an intense firefight from machine guns, mortars and rocket-propelled grenades. The Americans are seriously outnumbered and outmatched in firepower.

But the hardy band of Navy SEALs hold off the enemy hordes for quite some time, a blood-splattered affair that puts the Americans in a courageous last stand that offers no way out since help is not imminently on the horizon.

Even when the cavalry arrives. in the form of an assault helicopter, the Taliban have already gained the upper hand and blast the rescue team out of the sky, killing another 16 Marines.

Even after falling down mountainous hillsides, pummeled by rocks and falling debris, Luttrell, badly wounded, miraculously escapes to small village where he's hidden by a tribe willing to stand up to the Taliban thugs.

For a war movie that seeks to put the audience in the thick of the action, "Lone Survivor" has adroitly accomplished the mission. Director Berg delivers an unflinching look at the brutality of warfare.
