PLACER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - BMX racers from all over California have been training all year long to qualify for the upcoming BMX State Finals, set to take place at Oak Creek BMX in Roseville September 13th through 15th. Over 700 riders will be participating in this tournament, forecasting the largest State Finals ever. ABA BMX and Placer Valley Tourism have partnered up to bring this exciting competition to Placer Valley.

California is the mecca for

BMX riders. It has only been five years since the sport has been recognized and included as an Olympic event, and the sport continues to grow here; the qualifying tournament, the State Doubles, had the most participants ever. Every BMX track in California will be represented by one or more qualified riders in the Finals.

Riders are competing for the awards of the day-novelty backpacks, enormous custom trophies, and even high-end

Legendary Farm Worker Icon Passes

By UFW President Arturo S. Rodriguez and CCF President Paul F. Chavez

Jessie De La Cruz was an icon of the farm worker movement and one of the first women organizers of the UFW who never faltered in her wholehearted devotion and loyalty to Cesar Chavez and La Causa since the union was founded five decades ago. Her entire life was a triumph against the cruel exploitation and bleak poverty she knew toiling as a migrant farm worker from early childhood, including crippling labor with el cortito, the infamous short-handled hoe.

Jessie inspired thousands of people by drawing upon the same virtues Cesar Chavez demonstrated, most notably her simple humility. She never sought the spotlight or public recognition for her many contributions, preferring instead to do the hard, grinding work on the frontlines of the farm workers' struggle.

She first met Chavez when he was conducting a housemeeting, speaking with farm workers about forming a union, at the home in Parlier she shared with her husband, Arnold, in early. Jessie was serving coffee when the Cesar asked her to sit down and take part in what was going on. That was when her life changed. Encouraged by Cesar, Jessie became one of the best organizers the union produced, from organizing in the fields to boycotting grapes and other products in the cities She worked with the UFW across the state and with Cesar at his office at La Paz in Keene, now the National Chavez Center and Cesar E. Chavez National Monument.

De La Cruz embodied Cesar Chavez's conviction that ordinary people have within them the ability to do extraordinary things. If consistency is a value, then she was a saint. Our heartfelt condolences and solidarity go out to Jessie's family, some of whom continue her legacy by serving farm workers and other working people.

Fake Contractors Get Surprised at CSLB Sting

Eight face illegal contracting charges

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) – The net cast by the Contractors State License Board (CSLB) to catch unlicensed contractors in a Roseville undercover sting operation this week bagged not only phony contractors, but turned up a number of real ones who, despite having CSLB licenses, were violating various aspects of the state's Contractor License Law.

Statewide CSLB's Investigative Fraud Team (SWIFT) arrested eight individuals invited to a home near Maidu Park August 27, 2013, to bid on awning, wood flooring, concrete, landscaping, and painting projects. Those suspects were given Notices to Appear (NTA) in court to face misdemeanor charges that involve contracting without a state license, and illegal advertising.

SWIFT investigators posing as homeowners were assisted by the Roseville Police Department

and Amador County District licensed to do that particular type Attorney's Office, whose investigators are part of a multi-agency workers' compensation unit.

Investigators noted a higherthan-usual number of legitimate licensed contractors who were not abiding by the license terms. Violations included using a business name not listed with CSLB, failing to include license numbers in advertisements, and submitting a bid for work outside the job classification. In one case, a licensed electrician submitted a bid for painting. The licensees caught now face possible administrative citations.

"Part of the responsibility that goes with a contractor license is following its rules," said CSLB Registrar Steve Sands. "This sting reinforces why it's so important for consumers to check a contractor's license before hiring them. With a simple check they'd be able to determine if the person is properly licensed, if they're of work, and if they have insurance to cover workers who're going to be on your property."

The eight unlicensed suspects received NTAs for contracting without a license (Business and Professions Code section 7028). Only CSLB-licensed contractors can accept projects totaling \$500 or more in combined labor and material costs. The eight will also face a charge of illegal advertising (Business and Professions Code section 7027.1). State law requires that unlicensed operators state in all forms of advertising that they aren't licensed.

The suspects are scheduled for arraignment on October 2, 2013, in Placer County Superior Court, 10820 Justice Center Drive,

The suspect fled the bank



What *The Butler* Gets Wrong about Ronald Reagan and Race

One cold evening in Dixon, Ill., in the early 1930s, a young man known as Dutch Reagan brought home two African American teammates from his Eureka College football team. The team was on the road, and the local hotels had refused the two black players. So Reagan invited them to spend the night and have breakfast with his family.

In November 1952, in one of his final meetings as president of Hollywood's Screen Actors Guild, Ronald Reagan called upon the entertainment industry to provide greater employment for black actors. His stand went against the times and received national media attention.

As president, in the same March 1983 speech in which he called the Soviet regime an "evil empire," Reagan decried "the resurgence of some hate groups preaching bigotry and prejudice" in America. And at a reception for the National Council of Negro Women in July of that year, Reagan declared: "I've lived a long time, but I can't remember a time in my life when I didn't believe that prejudice and bigotry were the worst of sins."

These are just a few examples of Reagan's sensitivity to racial discrimination. This attitude was instilled by his mother, who was deeply involved in the Disciples of Christ, and his father, who refused to allow him to see the movie "Birth of a Nation" because it glorified the Ku Klux Klan.

But you don't get any sense of that in the film "Lee Daniels' The Butler."

Based on an article by The Washington Post's Wil Haygood, adapted for the screen by Danny Strong and directed by Daniels, "The Butler" is the story of Eugene Allen, an inspiring African American who worked under eight presidents in the White House, Reagan among them. As historians of the 40th president, having written more than a dozen biographies between us, we are troubled by the movie's portrayal of Reagan's attitudes toward race. We are especially concerned because many Americans readily accept Hollywood depictions of history as factual.

Two particular incidents in the film concern us:

The butler character (played by Forest Whitaker) is invited by the Reagans to a state dinner, a gracious move wholly typical of the first family. The butler's wife (Oprah Winfrey) clearly enjoys the evening, but the butler is portrayed as uncomfortable. He feels he's being used as a political tool, a prop, a token African American. Shortly after this supposed humiliation, he resigns from his White House job.

In reality, Allen felt no such thing. As noted by Religion News Service, "He was especially fond of the Reagans." A member of Allen's church recalled that "he often talked about how nice they were to him." Allen did leave the White House during the Reagan administration, but as Haygood's profile mentioned, he received a "sweet note" from the president and a hug from the first lady.

Republican congresswoman that he will veto any sanctions against South Africa. The lawmaker pleads with the president, insisting that sanctions are the moral course and that Republicans are on board. Reagan refuses to budge, offering no reason for his stubborn support of the racist regime, apparently unsympathetic to black suffering.

The unfairness of this scene can be demonstrated by any number of historical facts. In June 1981, still recovering from an assassination attempt, Reagan sent his closest foreign policy aide, William Clark, on his first official trip; it was to South Africa to express America's disapproval. An unsmiling Clark told Prime Minister Pieter W. Botha to his face that the new president and administration "abhorred apartheid." Clark walked out on Botha.

While accurate in depicting Reagan's opposition to sanctions against South Africa, "The Butler" does not explain why he opposed them. Reagan saw sanctions as harmful to the poorest South Africans: millions of blacks living in dire poverty. He also feared that the apartheid regime could be replaced by a Marxist/totalitarian one allied with the Soviet Union and Cuba and that communism would spread throughout the continent. South Africa's blacks were denied rights under apartheid, but communism would mean no freedom of speech, press, assembly, religion, conscience, emigration, travel or even property for anyone. Moreover, in communist nations such as Cambodia and Ethiopia, people had been slaughtered and starved on mass scales. Nearly a dozen nations had become part of the Soviet orbit in the immediate years before Reagan became president. He didn't want South Africa to undergo the same catastrophe.

Reagan adopted a policy of 'constructive engagement," seeking to keep South Africa in the anti-Soviet faction while encouraging the country toward black-majority rule — no easy feat. In one of his finest speeches, he told the United Nations on Sept. 24, 1984, that it was "a moral imperative that South Africa's racial policies evolve peacefully but decisively toward ... justice, liberty and human dignity." Among his administration's successes was the Angola-Namibia agreement, which led to the withdrawal of the white South African regime from Namibia and paved the way for that nation's independence.

"The Butler" doesn't deal with any of this complexity. Instead, it perpetuates an ahistorical caricature of Reagan as racially insensitive.

For decades, Reagan's legacy has been unfairly dogged by claims that his 1980 presidential campaign was marked by the use of code words and symbols that accommodated white racists. Critics point, for instance, to his post-convention appearance at the Neshoba County Fair in Mississippi. Civil rights workers James Chaney, Andrew Goodman and Michael Schwerner had been killed in nearby Philadelphia, Miss., in 1964, and some commentators say Reagan was insensitive to this tragedy when he said, "I believe in states' rights; I believe in people doing as much as they can ... at the private level." But

strong believer in federalism, had been talking about states' rights since the early days of his political career.

Two days after his appearance in Mississippi, Reagan affirmed his position on civil rights. "I am committed to the protection and enforcement of the civil rights of black Americans," he told the Urban League in New York City. "This commitment is interwoven into every phase of the programs I will propose." He received generous applause from the predominantly black audience.

Reagan didn't make much headway with black voters during his presidential campaign, but he certainly tried, holding the Republican National Convention in Detroit (the first time either party had done so) and campaigning in the Bronx with a message of hope. He was endorsed by Hosea Williams, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s top deputy in the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, and by Charles Evers, brother of slain civil rights leader Medgar Evers.

While president, Reagan didn't help his case with black voters when, in an October 1983 news conference, hefumbled a question about whether King had been a communist sympathizer. However, Reagan called Coretta Scott King to apologize, and the next month he signed Martin Luther King Jr. Day into law in the presence of King's widow and children.

Few in today's civil rights community will admit it, but the Reagan administration rescued civil rights law from the political and constitutional dead end of quotas and racial redistribution. For example, the Reagan Justice Department applied a higher threshold of proof of discriminatory intent before an employment discrimination case could be brought to court. Previously, companies were presumptively guilty of discrimination if there was a statistical disparity between the racial makeup of that company's workforce and the demographics of the surrounding labor pool. It was difficult, expensive and cumbersome to challenge this presumption, which is why most companies settled with Justice quota schemes.

The Reagan administration's civil rights policy was guided by the notion that remedies should be directed toward individual victims of discrimination rather than to classes or racial groups. In some areas of the law, such as employment discrimination cases, civil rights enforcement activity increased relative to its pace under the Carter administration.

Films like "The Butler" can be good opportunities for a healthy consideration of our troubled racial history, but not if they persist with inaccurate portrayals. Rather than advancing a flawed portrait of Reagan on race, perhaps "The Butler" can start the process of getting Reagan right on race.

PLACER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Following a tense, armed standoff in the woods in Foresthill, Placer County Sheriff's deputies took an intoxicated, suicidal man into custody after being called to a domestic dispute at his home this morning.

Residents of the Cedar Grove Mobile Home Park called 911 to report a physical fight between Earnest C. Larimer and a woman at his home on Racetrack Street. The woman was able to leave the home before deputies arrived, but Larimer stayed inside and fired a round from his pistol-grip 12-gauge shotgun.

Eventually, Larimer exited the rear of the home carrying the gun and fired two rounds after entering the woods. Deputies arrived and formed a perimeter around the wooded area. They negotiated with him

to drop his weapon for about 30 minutes. Deputies showed great restraint in a tense situation and were able to disarm Larimer and take him into custody without further incident

warning to nearby Foresthill residents to lock their doors and remain in their homes. Nearby schools were notified of the incident, and they went into lockdown.










Dare to Live Without Limits




