# **California Eliminates 7,112 Nonessential Vehicles**

Department of General Services today announced that Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr.'s Executive Order to eliminate unnecessary state vehicles has led departments to cut 7,112 vehicles from the state fleet.

The reduction included 4,204 passenger cars and light duty trucks, which alone is expected to save the state more than \$12.6 million annually in fuel, insurance and depreciation costs. "We have made tremendous strides examining every mobile asset and cutting the size of our state fleet," said DGS Director Fred

"Moving forward, we will use the methodology established to drive this reduction to help prevent unnecessary increases to the state fleet in future years." The Governor's order also called on departments to eliminate all nonessential and cost-ineffective permits that allow thousands of state employees to commute to and from work in a state vehicle.

The cuts resulted in 3.246 vehicle home storage permits being eliminated, a 45 percent reduction from the number of permits departments had issued in January 2011, and eliminating more than 1,000 permits than were called for in the Executive

These cuts are expected to save an estimated \$3 million annually in fuel costs, as employees are no longer commuting in those vehicles. Governor Brown's fleet reduction Executive Order called on the Department of General Services to conduct the first-ever examination of all mobile assets within the state fleet and eliminate any nonessential vehicles.

The eliminated vehicles include passenger cars, trucks, vans, buses, heavy equipment, boats, trailers, planes and other mobile assets. The cuts represent a 14 percent reduction of the state's fleet.

When combined with cuts made by the prior administration in 2010, more than 20 percent of the state fleet has been eliminated in four years.

The largest reductions come from the following 10 departments:

Department of Corrections & Rehabilitation 2,263 California Department of 1,322 **Transportation** California State Parks California Department of Fish & Game 494 California Highway Patrol 457

Department of **Developmental Services** 240 CAL FIRE California Department of General Services California Department of Water Resources

Prison Industry Authority The Department of General Services acts as the business manager for the State of California. DGS helps state government better serve the public by providing services to state agencies including procurement and acquisition solutions, real estate management, leasing and design services, environmentally friendly transportation, and architectural oversight and funding for the construction of safe schools.

### *Illegal Fire Tax* Bills on Their Way

Despite my efforts to stop it by referendum and legislation, the illegal fire tax is being assessed on more than 825,000 rural Californians starting this month, including 1,199 in Sacramento County.

This so-called fee was passed in 2011 to extract up to \$150 per habitable structure from property owners. The tax will not provide any more fire protection and will actually make it harder for local fire agencies to raise the money they need to keep people safe. It's a lose-lose proposition for the people in my district and for anyone concerned with public safety and the rule of law.

This tax should have been subject to a 2/3 vote in the legislature just like every other tax, but the Democrats called it a fee to get around that requirement. The Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association is planning to file a lawsuit disputing the fee's legality and I hope it gets overturned as soon as possible.

Until that happens, though, the State Board of Equalization (BOE) has already begun mailing the first bills for the new fire tax this month and hopes to have all bills sent by December. The BOE has also begun mailing an advance notice to the affected property owners to warn them that the bills are coming, and to provide them with a brochure explaining the "fee."

No matter how many mailers or explanations or warnings any agency sends out, it doesn't make this tax any more right or more legal. It was, is and always will be a shakedown of rural property owners that takes their money every single year but gives them zero in the way of additional fire protection.

Wildfires are currently raging out of control across the North State and they won't be put out by the phantom protections promised in this bogus tax. We need more firefighters, bulldozers, trucks and the other equipment that does the hard work of fighting these wildfires and protecting us, our homes and our property. This tax leaves us no safer, only poorer and more skeptical than ever of a government that takes and spends taxpayer dollars with no regard to the law or to fairness.

# **New Law Requires Out-of-State Retailers to Collect Use Tax**

Consumers to See Tax at Point-of-Sale for Online Purchases

SACRAMENTO – Beginning September 15, 2012, a new law takes effect (Stats. 2011, ch. 313 (AB 155) that expands the types of out-of-state retailers required to register with the California State Board of Equalization (BOE) and requires them to begin collecting and remitting use tax on sales of tangible personal property to California consumers. The law applies to out-of-state retailers that have substantial nexus with California consumers. This includes any

out-of-state retailer that has sold more than \$1 million to California consumers in the past year and has had more than \$10,000 in sales referred by an affiliate operating in California.

"This new law may require some out-of-state online retailers to start collecting tax, but others will remain completely unaffected," said Board of Equalization Member George Runner. "The good news is that rather than engage in a costly, drawn-out legal fight, Amazon.

com has decided to voluntarily invest in California and bring thousands of jobs to our state. I applaud their decision and hope other out-of-state companies will consider doing the same." The BOE is sending letters to

more than 200 out-of-state retailers notifying them about the new law. Retailers will be able to easily register online with the BOE's secure and innovative electronic registration system (eReg) and remit the tax collected by e-filing their returns. AB 155 does

not create a new tax — the report and pay their use taxes. California Use Tax has been on the books since 1935. It expands the types of out-of-state retailers required to collect the tax.

When AB 155 takes effect September 15, some additional out-of-state retailers, including Internet retailers, will collect the use tax at the point of sale, and California consumers will begin to see a tax on their bill. However, if out-of-state retailers do not collect the tax, California consumers must continue to

Consumers can pay directly

to the BOE using eReg or pay on their California income tax returns with the option of using the Use Tax Lookup Table.

AB 155 is expected to help the BOE collect tens of millions of dollars in use tax that will help pay for services such as public safety, schools and health care. The BOE does not have a precise estimate because AB 155 is a new law.

### **County Sheriff's Receives Grant to Combat Underage Drinking**

PLACER COUNTY - The Placer County Sheriff's Office recently received a grant from the State of California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control for 2012-2013. Agencies who will participate along with the Sheriff's Office in the grant are Auburn, Lincoln, Rocklin, and Roseville police departments.

The grant, totaling \$99,760, will be used to combat underage drinking and alcohol sales to minors countywide. The grant will also assist the Sheriff's Office in providing awareness crimes and their impact for school staff, parents, students and the community.

Throughout the year, the Sheriff's Office will aggressively target problematic ABC licensed establishments that sell alcoholic beverages to minors and obviously intoxicated adult patrons. Minor-decoy and shoulder-tap operations will also be conducted countywide to minimize alcohol access to minors.

Deputies and police officers Source: Placer County Sheriff will also identify problematic

areas and businesses where alcohol use is causing problems. They will inspect operations at those locations and at randomly selected establishments to ensure licensees are operating within the standards required by ABC.

Two training sessions will also be held for businesses that possess alcohol licenses. These sessions will provide a review of the rules and regulations governing the service of alcohol.

Brown Jr.recently announced the appointment of Mark Starr, 56, of Rocklin, as deputy director of the Center for Environmental Health at the Department of Public Health. Starr has been the director of community health, clinics and animal services for Placer County since 2007. He served in multiple positions at the California Department of Health

Care Services from 1995 to 2007, including chief of the Division of Communicable Disease Control.

Starr has been a volunteer clinical professor in the Master of Public Health Program at the University of California, Davis since 2004 and was a lecturer on Health and Safety Studies at California State University, Sacramento from 1996 to 2000. He was chief epidemiologist at the Sacramento County Department of

Health and Human Services from 1990 to 1995. Starr. He earned a Master of Preventive Veterinary Medicine degree and a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree from University of California, Davis and is board-certified by the American College of Veterinary Preventive Medicine.

This position does not require Senate confirmation and the compensation is \$140,004. Starr is a Democrat.

# Tax Hikes Don't Level the Playing Field

I can think of a lot of things that might help level the playing field for California businesses. A billion dollar tax hike isn't one of them. But supporters of Speaker Perez's legislation, AB 1500, would have you believe

In 2009, the Legislature adopted a tax cut that actually did help level the playing field for California businesses.

That change allowed companies to choose from two corporate tax formulas commonly used in other states: one based on property, payroll and sales; the other based on sales only.

Since the tax cut just became jobs. effective last year, we have yet to see its full impact. But there's no doubt it's helping many companies brave enough to do business in California.

Conversely, AB 1500 picks winners and losers. It eliminates the older property, payroll and sales formula and leaves the newer sales-only formula as the mandatory one-size-fits-all option. Not surprisingly, the only CEOs applauding AB 1500's recent approval by the California State Assembly are the ones who won't be forced to pay higher

But that's okay, according to the bill's supporters, because the

o make sure those you care about are a ways cared for

companies using the older formula don't count as California businesses since their corporate headquarters are located out-of-state. Imagine how high California's unemployment rate would be if we drove out all "non-California" businesses—like Barnes & Noble, Home Depot, Microsoft, Starbucks, Target and Wal-Mart.

By imposing a billion dollar tax increase on "out-of-state" businesses like Chrysler, General Motors, International Paper and Kimberly-Clark, AB 1500 seems to miss the fact that these "outof-state" companies employ thousands of middle-class Californians in good-paying

How many Californians care whether their company is headquartered inside or outside the state? Few, if any. Most are just happy to have a steady paycheck and health coverage. But if they lose their jobs as a result of this legislation, they'll start caring.

Proponents of AB 1500 claim that somehow raising taxes will create more jobs in our state. Next time someone says that, ask them to provide a specific example of a company that will create one more job in California if this bill passes. They can't.

What's more likely is that companies faced with a higher tax bill will downsize their Californiabased operations, costing us jobs we can't afford to lose.

In short, AB 1500 grows government and punishes the very job creators we should be trying to attract to our state.

If Democratic lawmakers really want to level the playing field for California businesses, they could do it anytime—and they'd have plenty of Republican support. They could start by repealing California's onerous greenhouse gas regulations, which are driving up energy costs for all Californians.

They could lower California's corporate tax rates, which are the highest in the West. They could repeal labor laws found only in California that make running a business in our state more costly than just about anywhere else on the planet. They could also enact real regulatory reform to streamline government and reduce needless burdens on the small businesses owners who power much of our economy.

AB 1500 doesn't accomplish any of these needed reforms. In the meantime, the playing field for California businesses remains anything but level.

# NID: 4% Rate Increase for 2013

GRASS VALLEY - Nevada Irrigation District water rates will increase by an average 4 percent at the first of the year but will remain among the most affordable in the region.

The NID Board of Directors on Wednesday (Aug. 22) reaffirmed their support for the modest rate increase as called for in the district's five-year financial plan, which is designed to bring NID's revenues more in line with its costs, and to more evenly balance rate structures among treated water and irrigation water users.

The board also voted to conduct new water rate and cost of service studies and authorized staff to seek proposals from independent consulting firms. The studies are expected to begin in early 2013.

Under the 2013 rate schedule, which takes effect Jan. 1, a typical treated water customer using a standard 5/8-inch meter will pay a base rate of \$18.55 per month, up from \$17.84. The usage rate (per hundred cubic-feet) will increase from \$1.47 to \$1.53.

Increases for irrigation water in the \$24 million range. customers will average 4 percent for all but the smallest and largest users, who will average slightly more. The increases vary as NID seeks to flatten the curve among smaller and larger users. A typical raw water customer using 1 miner's inch of water will pay \$573.90 for the entire six-month irrigation season, up from \$551.52.

Board President Nick Wilcox said the district would continue to offer its existing 5 percent discount to irrigation water users who pay for the season in advance.

Even with the rate adjustments, NID water rates compare favorably in the region. Finance Manager Jim Malberg said the district's rates for treated drinking water are lower than those charged by Nevada City, Grass Valley and the Placer County Water Agency.

The rate adjustments are projected to raise \$637,000 toward NID's 2013 Water Division operations and maintenance budget, which is expected to be

directors: • authorized staff to contract with Rocklin-based consulting firm ECORP to conduct instream flow and sediment studies on the Bear River and Deer Creek. The studies are needed as part of NID's ongoing effort to license its permitted water rights on the two waterways.

• heard a presentation from Stuart Satow, senior executive recruiter with CPS HR Consulting in Sacramento. Directors are expected to contract with the firm to conduct an executive search for a new general manager to succeed Ron Nelson, who has served as the district's chief executive for the past decade and plans to retire later this year.

The next regular meeting of the NID Board of Directors will be held at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 12, at the NID Business Center in Grass Valley. NID board meetings are open to the public.



# The Environmentalists' Misguided Plan to Repeal and Replace' Fossil Fuels

The Republican slogan for what to do about President Obama's health care reform is "repeal and replace." Similarly, environmentalists have long engaged in their own repeal-and-replace effort.

They want to "repeal" traditional energy sources—coal, oil and natural gas, which are abundant and economical—and replace them with so-called green energy sources, such as solar and wind power and biofuels.

But exactly how realistic is the environmentalists' vision? At least for the next quarter-century, not realistic at all.

According to the federal government's Energy Information Administration, oil, natural gas and coal were responsible for 83 percent of U.S. energy consumption in 2010. Nuclear power accounted for 9 percent.

Biofuels made up 1 percent and all other renewable sources represented 7 percent, for a renewable energy total of 8 percent—not much with which to build a dynamic, competitive economy.

But at least green energy sources will grow, right? Probably, but not by much. The Energy Information Administration estimates that by 2035, biofuels will provide 4 percent of U.S. energy consumption and renewable sources like solar and wind will make up 11 percent—for a total of 15 percent.

These estimates, meanwhile, come from the same administration that thought we would have 1 million electric cars on U.S. roads by 2015. Thus there is reason to doubt whether we will come anywhere near those Energy Information Administration projections by 2035.

Let's see why.

- Solar Power: Solar is the clean-energy darling. On the positive side, the solar industry predicts that the U.S. will install about twice as many solar panels this year as in 2011. Prices have been declining rapidly, thanks largely to an explosion of Chinese-made panels.

There's trouble ahead, though. The Obama administration says the Chinese are dumping cheap solar panels in the U.S. market and has slapped on new tariffs ranging as high as 250 percent, according to a Wall Street Journal report.

Never mind the political embarrassment for an administration that has poured billions of tax dollars into subsidizing our own solar industry, often with disastrous results like the Solyndra bankruptcy. Increasing

the price of Chinese-made panels will depress the solar-power expansion the Obama administration is depending on.

- Wind Power: If you are driving in places like West Texas, you will likely encounter a convoy of trucks hauling massive wind turbines to their destination. But take a closer look and you'll notice they always seem to be heading in the opposite direction of the nearest urban area.

Most people don't like seeing or hearing those huge wind turbines. The not-in-my-backyard problem for wind power is especially acute.

Then there's the inefficiency. Because the wind doesn't always blow, the turbines produce only about 20 percent of the energy they could if they were able to operate 24/7. During calm intervals, the power companies have to turn to more reliable sources—traditional fossil fuels.

Plus, the wind turbines have become a bird-killing night-mare. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service estimates that wind turbines kill about half a million birds a year, including raptors like eagles. That carnage is another, albeit indirect, cost of this as yet inefficient and expensive energy.

- Biofuels: Congress has mandated the use of corn-based ethanol as an additive to gasoline for years. Ethanol was supposed to be cleaner than fossil fuels. But then we learned that producing ethanol requires a lot more water, which is often in short supply. Plus it takes fossil fuels to harvest and transport it

supply. Plus it takes fossil fuels to harvest and transport it.

Oh, and using so much corn for fuel drove up demand and therefore the price, which made it unaffordable for millions of poor people in countries that

depend on corn products, like

Mexico.

In order to find another source, President George W. Bush, along with a Democratic Congress, decided to mandate the use of cellulosic fuel such as from switchgrass–500 million barrels by 2012. But then the central planners discovered that the industry simply couldn't meet any of its goals, even with billions of taxpayer dollars in subsidies.

The day may come when we can transition to clean energy, but not for decades. Until there is a real "replace" vision, environmentalists should quit trying to "repeal" fossil fuels, which are cheap and abundant, create real high-paying (non-subsidized) jobs, and are getting cleaner all the time

# Governor Brown Announces Pension Reform Agreement

LOS ANGELES—Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. outlined on August 28th a sweeping pension reform agreement that saves billions of taxpayer dollars by capping benefits, increasing the retirement age, stopping abusive practices and requiring state employees to pay at least half of their pension costs.

"These reforms make fundamental changes that rein in costs and help to ensure that our public retirement system is sustainable for the long term. These reforms require sacrifice from public employees and represent a significant step forward," said Governor Brown.

"If the legislature approves these reforms, public retirement benefits will be lower than when I took office in 1975," said Governor Brown. "Additional changes would require a vote of the people," he added.

The pension reform agreement includes substantial benefit rollbacks for public employees. It requires all current state employees and all new public employees to pay for at least 50 percent of their pensions and establishes this as the norm for all public workers in California. Importantly, these new reforms eliminate state-imposed barriers that have prevented local governments from increasing employee contributions.

Further, it bans abusive practices used to enhance pension payouts.

"No more spiking, no more air time, no more pensions earned by convicted felons," said Governor Brown. "We're cleaning up a big mess and the agreement reached with Legislative leaders today is historic in its far reaching implications."

Public Employee Pension Reform Act of 2012

### Caps Pensionable Salaries

Caps pensionable salaries at the Social Security contribution and wage base of \$110,100 (or 120 percent of that amount for employees not covered by Social Security).

### Establishes Equal Sharing of Pension Costs as the Standard

California state employees are leading the way and are paying for at least 50 percent of normal costs of their pension benefits. Requires new employees to contribute at least half of normal costs, and sets a similar target for current employees, subject to bargaining.

Eliminates current restrictions that impede local employers from having their employees help pay for pension liabilities.

Permits employers to develop plans that are lower cost and lower risk if certified by the system's actuary and approved by the legislature.

Provides additional authority to local employers to require employees to pay for a greater share of pension costs through impasse proceedings if they are unsuccessful in achieving the goal of 50-50 cost sharing in 5

Directs state savings from cost sharing toward additional payments to reduce the state's unfunded liability.

Unilaterally Rolls Back Retirement Ages and Formulas

Increases retirement ages by two years or more for all new public employees.

Rolls back the unsustainable retirement benefit increases granted in 1999 and reduces the benefits below the levels in effect for decades.

Eliminates all 3 percent formulas going forward.

For local miscellaneous employees: 2.5 percent at 55 changes to 2 percent at 62; with a maximum of 2.5 percent at 67.

For local fire and police employees: 3 percent at 50 changes to 2.7 percent at 57.

Establishes consistent formulas for all new employees going forward.

### Ends Abuses

Requires three-year final compensation to stop spiking for all new employees. Calculates benefits based on

regular, recurring pay to stop spiking for all new employees.

Limits post-retirement employ-

Limits post-retirement employment for all employees.

Felons will forfeit pension benefits.

Prohibits retroactive pension increases for all employees.

Prohibits pension holidays for all employees and employers.

Prohibits purchases of service credit for all employees.

When I was a young college student I had the opportunity to go with a friend to a "revival" in the town of Hollywood, Georgia. That's right, there is such a place: Hollywood, Georgia. As I made my way to the front door I passed by a long line of Harley Davidson motorcycles. These were not the Baby Boomer playthings so many graying men and women ride today as a hobby or youthful escape. No, these were hardcore, gang-style

And just inside the church, occupying the back pew, lo and behold, there sat the gang. Leather, studs, rippling arms, ponytails, tattoos: It was the complete Hell's Angels package, sitting in a Baptist church in Hollywood, Georgia. Being a young, eager revivalist myself, I said to my friend, "Good. Maybe these heathen will get saved tonight." And I meant it.

I sat several pews away from them and found myself piously praying for their salvation because I just knew they were seconds from splitting hell wide open. After the service got started, the pastor called on one of the deacons of the church to come forward and offer a prayer and word of introduction. One of those wicked bikers rose from his seat and started down the

At first I thought the call of his bladder had merely coincided with the pastor's invitation. 

The day will also feature music, food and a beer garden. Participants and spectators are encouraged to spend the day at the park enjoying the race festivities and the many other fun features of the park.



# **Have No Pity on the Working Man**

It's the Oxymoron Holiday. Labor Day, and almost no one is working.

I am one of the exceptions... doing this. But this is a labor of love, so it doesn't count. Have no pity on this working man.

The three-day holiday weekend (for most) is a good time to take a short break and a long, deep breath, just in case you are not quite ready for some football... and some more football... and some more and more and more...

Of course, we realize the football has already started. But the NFL preseason isn't real football. And the first week of college games are usually pretty dubious affairs as well.

Thought defending national champion Alabama against No. 8 Michigan might be a game to watch. Recorded it. 'Bama blew 'em out, 41-14. Didn't watch. Erased it.

That's how most of Week One goes. The nine winners in the top ten in preseason polls crushed the opposition by a combined score of 392-142. It would have been more than a 30-point-average differential had not the Oregon Ducks removed their webbed feet from the throat of Arkansas State after leading at the half, 50-10. None of that was very interesting.

It was a bit unnerving that the Andrew Luck-less Stanford Cardinal barely got by San Jose State, 20-17, and Cal's enigmatic Bears fell to Nevada, 31-24, in the first game in renovated Memorial Stadium, disappointing a capacity crowd of 63,186. Go, Bears!

The real thing kicks in this coming weekend when the San Francisco Forty Niners open the season at Green Bay, Sunday,

and the Oakland Raiders host San Diego on Monday night.

Facing a first-place schedule after winning the West and advancing to the NFC Championship Game while going 13-3 last year, the 49ers will be hard-pressed to duplicate that record this season. They must face top quarterbacks Aaron Rodgers (Packers), Drew Brees (Saints) and Tom Brady (Patriots) all on the road. The good news is that they will do so with a top-rated defense that returns all eleven

The Forty Niners have risen from the depths of a 2-14 record just four years ago to being tabbed as a 7-1 probability to reach the Super Bowl.

"We must always be humble. We can't get ahead of ourselves," star tight end Vernon Davis said on a season preview show.

"You're only as good as your last game," said quarterback Alex

The Niners lost their last game, that NFC title game to the New York Giants, in disappointing fashion. So improvements had to

It's clear the defense will still be strong and deep. That unit led the league in takeaways and rushing defense a season ago, was a close second in fewest points allowed, fourth in total yards allowed and seventh in sacks. The pass defense was a middle-of-the-pack 16th, but with added experience and a full preseason with the coaching staff (something missing in the staff's first year due to the lockout) it could be improved, making the total defense an ominous group.

The offense, which had its

struggles on third down and in the Red Zone, and ranked 29th in passing yards, added multiple threats in the off-season, led by the signing of 35-year-old wide receiver Randy Moss (153 career receiving touchdowns, second all time to Jerry Rice at 197). Also added were WR Mario Manningham and RB Brandon Jacobs from the Giants, and draft picks RB LaMichael James

Led by QB Smith, who had a career year last season (99.7 QB-rating and only five interceptions, though just a modest 3,144 passing yards in a pass-happy league), and stars RB Frank Gore and TE Vernon Davis, along with rising stars WR Michael Crabtree and RB Kendall Hunter, the offense may be on the verge of surprising its many critics.

The Raiders, meanwhile, will be adjusting to new leadership since the passing of long-time owner Al Davis, including his son, Mark, new GM Reggie McKenzie and new head coach Dennis Allen.



You know what you want to do, and you have defined success for you. Then why can't you lose that extra ten pounds or make that career change? All you have to do is change your behavior, but easier said than done. You have to know how. That's where Beverly Flaxington comes into the picture. 
