Placer Resident Helps Bring Medical Care to the Arctic Circle

Kotzebue, Alaska - The son of a Placer County couple braved the bitter cold and high winds of the past winter's last rages to bring medical care to Alaskans living above the Arctic Circle.

Air Force Reserve Maj. (Dr.) Michael J. Dailey, son of Charles and Carolyn Dailey of Granite Bay in Placer County, is a dentist with the 940th Aerospace Medical Flight at Beale Air Force Base in California. He recently offered his expertise in support of Operation Arctic Care

"As a dentist, my duties are to

diagnose and treat dental problems. I do this by screening the kids in the schools to find the ones who have immediate dental needs, as well as treating adults who have signed up for an appointment," said Dailey, a 1988 graduate of Lincoln High School. He went on to receive his Doctorate of Dental Surgery degree from the University of Southern California in

During Operation Arctic Care medical, dental and veterinary teams from the Air Force, Army and Navynational guard, reserve and activeduty -provided no-cost medical care to Alaskans living in remote villages who rarely get the chance to see a

medical doctor. This was the 16th year Operation Arctic Care was held in Alaska as part of the Department of Defense Innovative Readiness Training Program and the first time Air Force Reserve Command had the lead. "

Arctic Care is important because these villages do not have access to regular dental care services and many of these people have been living with pain from bad teeth until we can get here to help them," said Dailey.

Dailey and the other members participating in Operation Arctic Care worked hard to make sure care got to everyone in the villages around Kotzebue. During the operation, the teams saw more than 1,675 medical patients, treated approximately 1,400 dental patients, created and distributed more than 900 pairs of glasses, and vaccinated more than 730 dogs.

Residents of those villages made sure to show the teams their appreciation. Often, local communities held dinners and lunches for the service members, serving up local flavors including caribou stew, muktuk (whale blubber) and sheefish. They also demonstrated several sports activities that originally developed as survival techniques over centuries in the harsh arctic climate, as well as a number of native dances.

Taxpayers Can't Afford State Overspending

State Senate to Take Up Dueling **Budgets & Double Visions**

Sacramento - Senator Sam Aanestad (R-Grass Valley) will not support any new taxes or additional burdens placed on state taxpayers to help close an estimated \$19 billion state budget deficit. The North State Senator made his position on the state budget clear after he learned that a vote on a state budget plan had been scheduled for next Tuesday - when two different budget plans will be taken up on the Senate Floor.

"Let me be clear with this there is no budget agreement between Senate Republicans and the Majority Party," said Senator Aanestad. "The budget vote that has been scheduled for next week will show the true difference between those who want to increase the tax burden on all California families and those who believe that government should impasse much earlier if they had live within its means.

Senator Aanestad says he does not support the billions in new taxes that all Californians will be forced to pay under the complicated tax-switch plan that the Majority Party will bring to the Floor next week. Senate Republicans will instead counter with an amended version of the Governor's May Revision which contains spending cuts and other reforms that will ensure the State Legislature never spends more than it has.

"Hard working California families can no longer afford

Sacramento's ravenous overspending habits," said Senator Aanestad. "The Majority Party could have solved this budget taken action to curb spending and

Senator Aanestad says the budget actions currently scheduled for next week will represent two different views for how California taxpayers should be treated.

"Senate Republicans believe in cutting spending and making government live within its means - not sock it to the taxpayer," said Senator Aanestad. "I would urge the Majority Party to come back to the negotiating table so we can continue to work on a spending plan that all sides can agree

Placer County District Attorney's Office Gets High Marks for Suspect Identification Policies

Placer County - A California group that investigates cases of wrongful convictions based on eyewitness misidentification has praised the Placer County District Attorney's Office for initiating policies to ensure innocent people aren't being pros-

ecuted or convicted. Northern California Project Innocence, based in Santa Clara, singled out the Placer office for adopting policies for photo lineups, live lineups and in-field showups

In addition, the Placer office developed a training video to assist law enforcement agencies in how to conduct identification procedures, the group noted.

The policies, developed by Senior Deputy District Attorney Garen Horst, have been wellreceived by the Placer County Sheriff's Office and by police departments and other law

enforcement agencies within Placer County.

Maitreya Badami, supervising attorney for Project Innocence, said her group has requested identification policies from more than 400 law enforcement agencies in California for a survey. She said the best policies came from Santa Clara and Placer

"You would expect Santa Clara to be in there because that's where our group is located and we've made a lot of noise about making identifications," Badami said. "We also liked Placer County because they sent us a power point presentation of their policies and later sent us a video

that can be used for training. "I also liked that at the beginning of Placer's presentation, Mr. Horst mentioned the goals of their identification policy. He

said the most important goal was

accuracy, or the protection of the innocent.

'That's not necessarily the first thing that law enforcement agencies would think about. Most of the time, a police agency has identified a suspect and they're looking to prove the person guilty. I certainly understand that. But before you go too far, you have to make sure you are protecting the innocent."

Two other goals in the Placer presentation included producing admissible identification in court and the producing of identification that is persuasive evidence for a jury, Badami said.

Horst said Placer law enforcement agencies did not have a uniform policy on the identification of suspects. Each department had been operating with its own set of lineup procedures and policies, he said.

The differing policies had the

potential to make prosecution difficult for the District Attorney's Office, he said.

With encouragement from Roseville Police Detective Doug Blake, Horst developed policies to aid and instruct law enforcement agencies to conduct live lineups, photo lineups and infield showups, in which a victim or witness might be able to identify a suspect at a crime or arrest

After receiving the training from Horst, Detective Blake has been "instrumental in implementing the new procedures throughout the Roseville Police Department," Horst said.

Roseville Police Lt. Mike Doane said his department welcomes the new policies.

"The nice thing about this is that any of our local law enforcement agencies can go to the policies, and in every live lineup,

every photo lineup or every infield showup, it will be done the same way," he said.

Horst also drew up admonition forms, which are to be used by victims and witnesses in the lineups. The forms stress that the victim or witness is under no obligation to pick someone from a lineup and that investigation into the crime will continue, regardless of whether the witness or victim can choose someone in the lineup.

Doane said witnesses sometimes feel that since they're in a police station and are being shown photos of suspects, they can't leave the station without selecting a photo for the officers.

"Crime victims want to cooperate with the police and they may feel the pressure to select someone from a photo lineup," Doane said. "The new policy

will help relieve some of that pressure, focusing on accuracy and reminding them that it's okay not to identify a photo."

In the training video, Horst urges officers not to influence victims or witnesses by their comments or conduct, and to watch out for inadvertent things that they might do that could be suggestive.

The new policies have also paved the way for a return to the old-fashioned police live lineup

Until a month ago when Rocklin police employed a live lineup, veteran peace officers in Placer County couldn't recall the last time any of their agencies had used a live lineup so that a victim or witness could pick out a suspect.

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

Gaines Urges Governor to Sign IOU Taxpayer Protection Bill



Assemblyman Ted Gaines

Assemblyman Gaines is urging Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger to sign Assembly Bill 1506, which passed the Senate unanimously recently and would protect taxpayers from "forced borrowing" should the state issue IOUs.

"Last year, Sacramento refused to accept its own IOUs, yet still demanded payments from and issued hefty fines against thousands of individuals, charities and businesses throughout California," Gaines said. "I encourage Governor Schwarzenegger to require Sacramento to do what it forces everyone else to-accept IOUs as payment."

The bill, authored by Assemblyman Joel Anderson, R- La Mesa, protects taxpayers by allowing them to continue to play by the rules and pay their state taxes and fees on time. If signed into law, the state would be forced to accept its own IOUs as payment for state taxes and fees.

Last year, California issued 450,000 IOUs totaling \$2.6 billion to individuals, charities and businesses. Recently, State Controller John Chiang said that he will soon be printing IOUs again if the Legislature cannot come together and pass a

"Sacramento got itself into this mess by spending money it doesn't have and hardworking Californians shouldn't be held responsible for the Legislature's mistakes," Gaines said. "It's time the Legislature makes the difficult decisions necessary to bridge our \$19.1 billion budget gap and stops spending the people's hardearned dollars on programs we can't

On July 21, Rocklin used a lineup consisting of five possible suspects at the Placer County jail in Auburn. A witness, looking through a twoway mirror, identified a person whom police had pegged as their primary suspect.

Rocklin Police Detective Brad Alford said two witnesses previously had been unable to identify the suspect in a traditional photo lineup. The live lineup proved beneficial, he

"I definitely would do it again if a case came along where we were having trouble getting an identification," Alford said.

Also instrumental in making sure live lineups at the county jail are performed without a problem is the Placer County Sheriff's Office,

"They were extremely cooperative and creative in modifying their facilities to accommodate a live lineup," Horst said, giving credit to Sheriff's Sgt. Rabinder Sandhu, who is the point person for the live lineups in the jail.

Horst developed uniform policies after reviewing the 2008 report of the California Commission for the Fair Administration of Justice and its recommendations.

The commission stated that mistaken eyewitness identification

was a factor in 80 percent of DNA exoneration cases. The exonerations prompted studies regarding the ability of witnesses to make identifications.

One misidentification in 2007 in Sacramento resulted in a 24-year-old man sitting in jail for 53 days for a crime he did not commit. Five witnesses using photo lineups picked the wrong man.

Badami said she hopes Placer County's identification policies will become an example for the state.

"California is not cleaned up. There are a lot of agencies falling short on their identification policies," she said. "We hope they take Placer's lead and get it done."

Logue Investigation into Department of Consumer Affairs Produces Results

Logue was responding to reports that agents from the Bureau of Home Furnishings and Thermal Insulation were entering businesses without just cause and removcompensation to the business owners.

John Maloof, the constituent who first contacted Assemblyman Logue regarding this issue, has received a personal call and apology

from Rick Fong of the Department of Consumer Affairs (Chief of the Home Furnishings Bureau).

"He offered the apologies of the BCA. He also told me the Bureau has suspended any further investigations of retailers involving the conduct I was subjected to, and that he anticipated legislative changes would be made to current regulations under which the Bureau opering furniture for "testing" without ates," stated Maloof. "I was pleased to hear him acknowledge that basic Constitutional issues are at stake."

> Assemblyman Logue has expressed his appreciation for the Department of Consumer Affairs' quick and decisive

action in this matter. When asked to comment, Logue stated "I'm glad that these unconstitutional practices have been stopped, and that Californians will have their rights protected. I also want to thank Bill Leonard, the Secretary of the Department of Consumer Affairs, for working with us in getting to the bottom of this."

"I will work to ensure that this does not happen again by any state agency," added Logue.

Assemblyman Logue represents the 3rd Assembly District in the California Legislature, which includes the communities of Butte, Lassen, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, Sierra and Yuba.



Finish Baby Step 3 First

Dear Dave,

When is it okay to buy toys for the lake - things like boats and jet skis when following your plan?

Dear Anonymous,

I'm a lake guy, too. So, you've hit a soft spot with me on this question. Still, you have to be an adult about these things, and here are a few

First, you should be completely debt free except for your house. Second, you need to have your fully funded emergency fund—that's three to six months of living expenses—in place. In other words, I want you to

have completed the first three Baby Steps. And remember, no matter how shiny and cool it may look, buying a Sea-Doo is *not* an emergency! Save up and pay cash for your toys.

Remember this rule of thumb when it comes to toys. With the rare exception of collectibles, anything with an engine goes down in value. You should never have more than half of your annual income tied up in the total of all your vehicles. It would be pretty stupid to make \$60,000 a year and have \$40,000 tied up in cars, boats and other toys. That's way too much money tied up in things that go down in value the wrong way.

Always make sure your family is well taken care of before you go out buying toys!

Dear Anonymous,



Some people will go out and borrow \$500,000 or more to start a business. Then, if the business doesn't do well and you can't make the payments, you're bankrupt. There's really no in-between, and that's a bad

It's just a dumb idea to do these "all or nothing" business deals. Even if owning a business is your wildest dream, there's no point in taking risks like that. It's just not necessary!





Is a Roth IRA Conversion in Your Future?

Congress desperately needs tax revenue to pay for their spending habit. For tax year 2010 they tweaked the Roth Conversion rules by allowing those with modified gross income greater than \$100,000 to make the conversion. You will normally pay income tax on the converted amount at ordinary income tax rates. However, Congress is helping out a little by allowing you to spread the tax bite over two years.

Potential Benefits ...

• A larger sum to bequeath to heirs. The required minimum distribution rules do not apply for Roth IRAs. Therefore, at age 70 ½ and beyond, your Roth can remain invested, which may grow and become a larger sum to leave to your heirs.

• Tax-free withdrawals on qualified distributions. Withdrawals from a Roth IRA are tax-free for those who have had the money invested for five years or more and have reached the age of 59½, or have attained another qualifying

... and Drawbacks

· The tax bite. Investors who convert assets from a traditional IRA to a Roth IRA are required to pay taxes on the amount that is rolled over. If you have a nondeductible traditional IRA, investment earnings will be taxed but the amount of your contributions will not. The conversion will not trigger the 10% penalty for early withdrawals.

ROCK DOC

The disaster in the Gulf has been plenty grim. I don't envy paymaster Kenneth Feinberg who has now taken over BP's \$20 billion compensation fund. Feinberg is no stranger to trying to compensate those who have lost much, including the families affected by September 11th and a somewhat lower-profile project to compensate victims of the shootings at Virginia Tech.

But the magnitude and complexity of the Gulf disaster is second to none. From what I can see, there's just no good way to distribute the money to those who have lost so much in different ways in various places.

Still, there's some good news. Since petroleum stopped flowing from the Deepwater Horizon site, oil at the surface has been harder and harder to find. And microorganisms look to some scientists as if they may be poised to eat up a lot of the underwater oil quite quickly.

According to ScienceNOW, the first peer-reviewed study to come out of the Gulf indicated the natural oilloving "bugs" weren't doing as much as might be hoped. But the second one published last week looked at the microbes themselves and found much more reason to be optimistic.

Eating Up the Mess emulsified that it's permanently mixed

Some bacteria in the seas have evolved over time to make a living on the seepage of oil that has always occurred naturally on the sea floor. The ScienceNOW website quotes NOAA marine ecologist Alan Mearns on the matter. "With all of the seepage, including the 40 to 50 million gallons a year that seep naturally into the Gulf, we'd have oceans covered with oil slicks if they weren't naturally degrading," Mearns said.

The bacteria in question consume hydrocarbons and oxygen, producing carbon dioxide as waste. The most recent study is based on samples of ocean water from a depth of more than 3000 feet, both in an oil plume and outside it. The good news is that the study reports the concentration of the bugs inside the plume is twice as dense in the water as outside it. And the bugs in the plume have more of the genes needed to eat up the oil.

It's still an open question exactly at exactly what rate the bugs are consuming the oil in the underwater plumes. Crude oil is a complex soup, made of many different types of molecules. The encouraging study concentrated on the alkanes, a type of molecule that's generally among the first to naturally degrade.

Another factor is that the petroleum mixes with water in complex ways. The term for the globs of oil in the water you've seen in the news is "emulsion." Emulsions are what results when two liquids that won't mix in chemical terms are physically blended together. You make an emulsion each time you shake up vinaigrette salad dressing, blending the oil and vinegar. Homogenized milk is a mix of fat and water so thoroughly

together, with no separation down the road as in the vinaigrette case.

In the Gulf of Mexico, crude oil and seawater have been mixed together in a messy emulsion in the weeks following the disaster. What we don't know is how readily the globs of the emulsion will now break apart. We should keep our fingers crossed that they do so, because smaller and smaller bits of oil will give the bacteria a greater chance of being able to quickly eat up the crude.


One worry has been that, as the microbes in the Gulf go to work, they might use up the oxygen in the waters around them. That would create a "dead zone," like having too much fertilizer escape into waters with resultant algal blooms. Dead zones in the Gulf would be disastrous for fish that blundered into them. But the two scientific reports to date don't show that the oxygen has fallen to dangerous levels.

Considering the magnitude of the spill, the current scientific news from the Gulf is really quite good. Marine ecologist Mearns is hopeful that the oil plumes will be gone quickly.

Thursday night at 10:47 p.m. after homeowners on Lakeshore Drive discovered a suspect inside their house.



Placer County - Placer County Sheriff's detectives are asking the public's help in identifying a woman who may be involved in a large-scale burglary from a Roseville home in July.



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

Sir Winston Churchill said, "Never give in—never, never, never, never, in nothing great or small, large or petty, never give in except to convictions of honour and good sense. Never yield to force; never yield to the apparently overwhelming might of the enemy."

What strikes me about this statement is he said 'never give in' - he didn't say 'never give <u>up</u>' which seems to be a more common phrase. So what did Churchill really mean by choosing the word 'in' instead of 'up'.

I'm sure it's only me – and you may come to a completely different conclusion, but I take his words to mean not to give in to ourselves -

Never Give In

to selfishness, self-centeredness, and most of all to self-doubt, which has plagued me for way too long.

Churchill was more than just a British politician – he served in the military, he was an artist and writer. He was a brilliant statesman and his speeches were inspiring. He won the Nobel Prize for Literature and the list goes on and on.

But Churchill didn't start out any different than you or I. In fact, he had many obstacles to overcome including a speech impediment. He was sent away to school and rarely saw his parents. And as an adult he and his wife lost their three-year old daughter, Marigold.

I can safely say I am no Churchill, but I don't have to be. If I decide to never give in to self doubt—if I decide never to give in to negative thinking, I can be as successful as Churchill in my own individual way – and more importantly, so can you!

There are so many voices telling us what we can't do—that things will never change—that life is too hard or that one person cannot make a difference. I have listened to those voices and given up on myself time and time again – but **no more**.

Churchill was just one man, but he made a difference. He was

a man of convictions, honor and good sense. He refused to yield to force and to the apparently overwhelming might of the enemy. He spoke out and stood fast against fascism and he brought his country back from the brink of destruction.

I don't believe our country is on the brink of destruction—not yet. But if we stand by and do nothing, it will be there soon. The first thing that has to change is the way we talk to ourselves. We cannot waste time beating ourselves up over our past mistakes or dwelling on things we should have done differently. We have to start fresh each day with new perspectives and a greater resolve.

A good friend gave me an affirmation I try to say to myself at least once each day. It goes like this, "Every day in every way I'm getting better and better". If I'm getting better-inside of me, then other things can get better too – including things outside of me. All I have to do, all you have to do is 'never give in - never, never, never, never.'

What and Where is North Park?

Auburn - Your local Auburn Rec District Board member Scott Holbrook here, again sharing another personal view on how our Supervisors & county management are handling local mitigation fees. While this is a personal opinion, I have a feeling most if not all on the board share my thoughts on this issue. I have attempted on numerous occasions to contact "County Recreation Area 5" representatives to the board of supervisors Holmes and Montgomery, but they have chosen to not reply to questions and suggestions on this issue. The money has not been spent yet, and I am hopeful that folks will encourage their representatives on the Board of Supervisors to re-think this expenditure, it is not too late.

The Board of Supervisors has approved \$75,000 in local park development fees, to apply a rubber surface to the playground at North Park. What & where is North Park you ask? Well it is a small neighborhood park located in North Auburn, just up the street from ARD's Regional Park. This and Plaza Park are the 2 "parks" within the County Recreation Area 5 / ARD boundaries that the County maintains. (What is Plaza Park you ask again-look behind Big 5)

The justification of this project is that it will save county on maintenance costs. But come on folks-is this really the best use of the precious few dollars for recreation facilities?

I am not against putting rubber surfaces at playgrounds. This is a needed component for a fully ADA compatible playground-but if it is a priority of the county, does it make sense to do this at North Park? I would think rubberizing one of the highly used and well-known parks the ARD maintains in the area would make much more sense. The playground at Regional Park, just down the street from North Park is situated next to thousands of residents; on any given day the playground gets extensive use. If you want to get the best bang for the buck on a" rubberization project", the cost / benefit ratio re-doing the Regional Park Playground makes incredibly more sense when it comes to serving the people, not to mention the savings on maintenance cost for taxpayers.

Please remember, the funds in question are development impact fees (Quimby Act / AB1600). Fees the county is required to collect to address the impact on local recreation facilities by new development. Does a huge project like this make sense at North Park?

Recently some \$13,000 + dollars was spent at this park to address 49 Fire damage. I supported this 100%-It was a great and needed project. Local service clubs & neighbors also donated a great amount of labor. This was a perfect use of mitigation fees for rehabilitation purposes. And note the special State of California Approved "Bark" (refined woodchips) were part of the rehabilitation! These chips have a life expectancy of around 5 years. This is just one more reason to re-think the \$75,000 rubberizing project for this park, which now brings recent funding up to \$86,000 for this little neighborhood park. Again while nice, there are some 55,000 residents served by these mitigation fees! I think the county needs to take a

better look at meeting the true needs and wants of "Area 5". While I know county facilities puts a priority on their wants, they need to remember the residents of "Area 5" overwhelmingly voted to create the ARD to serve their recreation wants & needs. The County board and staff needs to respect the residents wishes, and allow for the funding of the ARD as intended.


There is a project application to rehabilitate the Meadow Vista Park, pending with them they cannot fund at this time. This project will allow hundreds of local kids now banned from organized play at the park to use the field, yet the county feels putting a rubber surface in North Park is a priority for "Area 5" / ARD residents??

The money tree in Placer County is struggling for life; funds are trickling in at best. It will likely take 2 or so vears to collect enough new mitigation fees to replace this \$75,000. No, this is not a good use of public funds & we need to stop this project & the county should return the funds to the "pool" for consideration for projects that will truly serve the greater community. While this amount of money may seem trifle to the big guns at the county, it is a huge amount for your local rec district. During tough times priorities need to be reconsidered this \$75,000 is one of them.

Sorry to ramble, but I am increasingly getting frustrated at the way "our" (taxpayer) funds are being handled. I am hoping that be it this \$75,000 or maybe a multi-million dollar project elsewhere that folks will speak up and demand "they" (The county in this case) stop wasteful spending & do all they can to get the most out of our money.




