# Valentine Estate Public Forum Expected in November

#### By Theresa Knapp

A public forum is being planned for early November to discuss renovations to the Valentine Estate property.

At its meeting on Sept. 6, the Ashland Select Board express support for the vision Town Manager Michael Herbert discussed regarding a multifunctional space that could include an agricultural center, community garden, indoor farmers market, program collaboration with the Council on Aging, walking trails and more.

"It's got the potential to be a real gem, not just for us but for the region," Herbert said.

He described the latest proposal as "an amalgamation of the ideas and the programs of

different properties both in the MetroWest region and also within and outside of the state. By drawing from this diverse set of influences, we can develop our own unique property and our own unique offering here for the town and also the region. It's really important that we do something that complements, and doesn't necessarily compete with, others for a variety of different reasons."

Select Board member Brandi Kinsman asked Herbert if there is a market for such a project; he said there is and hopes to hear from people at the public forum.

Said Kinsman, "We can come up with all these ideas and it doesn't necessarily mean it's going to resonate with people that are actually willing to come to Ashland or to do those things. I think an event space that's multi-purpose is the way to go because I think we do need a place that we can have events, to have it be flexible is key...I don't

know what that kind of market looks like or what the appetite is."

#### Barn

Herbert told the board, "What the property would be an agricultural center, which is actually an idea that Kate Valentine came up with. Essentially, it consists of a barn that is a multifunctional space that could be used for town meetings, musical performances, artist bazaars, town get-togethers [and] it could also be rented out for things like weddings and private parties... It's really going to be around the events at the barn that are really going to generate the enthusiasm and also the revenue."

#### House

Herbert said the house would be set up into two distinct purposes, a community space (including a commercial kitchen and restrooms) on the first floor to help support the functions of the barn, and a series of rooms with different purposes including bridal parties and perhaps a room dedicated to the Valentine family.

Herbert suggested the second-floor space could be used by the Parks & Recreation person(s) who would be responsible for management of the property, events, and marketing.

An on-site caretaker was also discussed.

#### Grounds

Herbert suggested a series of self-contained walking trails could be established on the property, like those at the 'Cadillac Paint' property. The proposal also includes maintaining an all-natural wildlife corridor "for wildlife to continue to use; there's a lot of deer, a lot of turkeys, a lot of other animals."

It was noted there could be no formal fields on this property due to a land restriction, topography, and wetlands on the site.

#### Programs

Herbert envisions the agricultural center would offer "cool things" in the barn such as classes and artist programs that center around metalsmithing, textile fabrics, woodworking, wood turning, and the like - options that are not available in the region.

"I will tell you, we will not compete with HCA [Hopkinton Center for the Arts] doing traditional pottery, painting arts, things of that nature [and] we won't be able to do a real music venue like Amazing Things or TCAN [The Center for Arts in Natick]."

#### Parking

The issue of parking would need to be addressed. Suggestions included parking at the Community Center or Ashland Middle School which are nearby and accessible by sidewalk.

#### Finances

Town officials have received a very rough estimate of \$4 million to complete renovations to the barn and house. In order to get a better idea of cost, an architect would need to be hired to create various design options for the property. That could occur after the public forum. According to "Valentine Property FAQs" at bit.ly/AshlandValentineFAQ, the town purchased the 7-acre property five years ago for \$3.5 million, "comprising of \$600,000 of CPA funds and the remainder funded through a debt exclusion."

Town Manager Michael Herbert says, "The town purchased the property in 2018 and didn't necessarily have a plan but really, the reason we went ahead to purchase it, is (1) because we wanted to stop the development of 120 units at the location, and (2) we wanted to preserve our right essentially to have a plan and make use of this property...Since that time, we have gone through a long and winding road of what we're going to do with this property. We've received a ton of public input through three [Select Board] public forums, [and] numerous emails from residents."



Herbert said the town has approximately \$2 million in grant funding, including American Rescue Plan Act funds (which must be spent by 2026), but the town would need to cover the "delta of \$2 million dollars" which he said could come from various sources including Community Preservation Act money or the general fund. There could also be a fundraising arm to the property. The board expressed general support for the multifunctional concept.

"I think this is good forward progress," said Select Board Chair Robert Scherer. "I think you're moving in a good direction.

## New David E. Mindess Elementary School opened in Sept.

The brand-new David E. Mindess Elementary School at 90 Concord Street was ready for the first day of school, and on Sept. 5, when it opened its doors to hundreds of Ashland 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders.

The new building replaces a previous structure that was 69 years old, beyond capacity, and not ADA compliant. The project was approved in Jan. 2021, cost approximately \$80 million, and was completed at the 11th hour.

According to the Mindess School Building Project webpage at www.ashland.k12.ma.us/domain/1647,

"The tight building schedule has been exacerbated due to delays related to some trenches at the base of the foundation, which contained asbestos. Due to the location of the asbestos, the delay impacted the site work and paving for the main entrance,

which is critical for the first day of school scheduled on Sept. 5."

The webpage said "previous delays and recent poor weather" caused the team to work nights and weekends so the school could open on time.

A grand opening, which included building tours, was held on Sept. 9.

## Discover when and how to install plantings in your yard

#### LANDSCAPE INSIGHTS

Summer has come to an end and fall is officially here. When is the best time to install new plantings? In the spring or fall? There is no simple answer, but by evaluating your needs you can make an educated decision based on several factors. Where and why-

You're looking through your favorite gardening magazine and you come across a plant you are not familiar with. It seems like it would be the perfect fit for an open space you are looking to fill in. When we are looking at what to install in our garden we often focus on color and texture. While those are key factors, there are other things we need to consider as well. One of the most important factors is the hardiness zone (Natick MA. 6a and 6b) (Ashland 6a) and why selecting a plant from your zone is so important as well as other characteristics to keep an eye out for. Before choosing a plant, you must consider wind, soil condition, sunlight, drainage, soil PH, and nutrient availability. It is also important to factor in what size space you want the plant to fill, maintenance needs, pest resistance and functionality.

your area. Plants with no significant pest problems, drought tolerance, and beauty in at least two seasons are top of the list.

#### How-

Once you have selected a plant, it is important to install it properly. Improper planting, particularly planted too low, or too high are found to be major causes of tree mortality in managed landscapes. When planting the hole for the new plant it should be 2-3 times the size of the root ball and the root ball itself should be installed on undisturbed ground. While backfilling with native soil, the plant should be watered when halfway through, the water should be allowed to drain and rewater when backfilling is complete. In some situations, you will want to mix in some peat moss or compost. Once the plant is installed it is important to keep a proper watering regimen based on existing weather conditions.

#### When-

Planting broadleaf evergreen shrubs in the fall might be better avoided until spring planting is possible. Mostly because they need more time to prepare for winter sun and strong winds. The stress of these elements can be extremely hard on the plants. When planting evergreens, you want to make sure they are installed by mid-October, ideally six weeks before the ground freezes, and you want to be careful not to disturb the root ball to give your new planting the best chance to survive. Deciduous plants on the other hand can be installed if the ground is workable. Warm air in the fall and damp soil conditions promote vigorous root growth. Select trees and bushes are considered a fall dig hazard and should only be installed in the spring.

## **Own a business? Consider these retirement plans**

If you own a small business or are self-employed, you've always got plenty to do, but you can't forget about the days when you'll be less busy — that is, when you're retired. How can you prepare for that time of your life?

One key step is establishing a retirement plan for your business or yourself. And thanks to the 2022 SECURE 2.0 Act, you can now receive tax credits for opening and administering a 401(k), SEP-IRA or SIMPLE IRA. These aren't the only plans available for small businesses or sole proprietors, but they are among the most popular.

Let's look at each of them:

• **401(k)** – A 401(k) offers several key benefits: First, any earnings growth is tax deferred, and your contributions can be tax deductible. (Taxes are due upon withdrawal, and withdrawals prior to age 59<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> may be subject to a 10% penalty.)

If you choose a Roth 401(k), your contributions aren't deductible, but your earnings and withdrawals will be tax free, provided you meet certain conditions. And a 401(k) offers a variety of investment options. If you have workers, you'll need to consider whether to offer matching contributions, which are tax deductible to you, up to the limit of 25% of compensation paid to eligible employees.

But even if you're self-employed, with no employees other than your spouse, you can establish what's known as a "solo" or "owner-only" 401(k). In 2023, you can put in up to \$22,500 as an employee, plus a catch-up contribution of \$7,500 if you're 50 or older, for a total of \$30,000. Plus, you can contribute an additional 25% of earned income as an employer, up to an overall employee and employer maximum of \$66,000 (or \$73,500 if you're 50 or older).

• **SEP-IRA** – An SEP-IRA may be attractive to you if you're self-employed or if you own a business but have few or no employees. That's because you must contribute an equal percentage of your own compensation to every eligible employee. In 2023, you can contribute up to \$66,000 or 25% of your income, whichever is less.

• SIMPLE IRA - A SIMPLE IRA is easy to establish and administer. As with an SEP-IRA, earnings in a SIMPLE IRA can grow on a tax-deferred basis. If you have employees, they aren't required to contribute to this plan — but you are. You must match up to 3% of employees' contributions or provide 2% of their annual salaries, although you do have some flexibility. If your business goes through a rough patch, you can temporarily decrease SIMPLE IRA contributions to 1% for up to two years out of the previous five. Your contributions to your employees' accounts are tax deductible, but in in terms of building resources for your own retirement, a SIMPLE IRA

may be less appealing because of its contribution limits, which are relatively low compared to a 401(k) or SEP IRA. In 2023, you can put in up to \$15,500, or \$19,000 if you're 50 or older.

You should consult with your tax advisor to determine which retirement plan is right for you. Your financial advisor can also help you explore your options. And the sooner you put a plan to work, the better.

## **Special Town Meeting warrant open until Nov. 1** STM will be held on Nov. 29

At its meeting on Aug. 16, the Ashland Select Board voted to open the warrant for the Special Town Meeting to be held on Wed., Nov. 29.

Assistant Town Manager Jenn Ball said people will have until Oct. 6 to submit a Notice of Intent to her so they can start building the warrant, and will then have until Nov. 1 to submit their final documentation. The plan is to have a finalized Special Town Meeting packet available for the public by Nov. 14. Ball said a articles could include:

- Sustainability Committee's enhanced stretch code
- High Street easement for access
- Possible road acceptance
- Community Preservation Committee funding for dog park
- Senior tax exemptions

Town Manager Michael Herbert said, as a proactive measure, there could be a request to borrow funds to do work related to "a potential issue with our water treatment plant; nothing that can impact the safety of it or safety of our water source, but it could impact the color and taste. Again, nothing to do with safety, but those are important qualities."

He said "This isn't an emergency situation, we're trying to take care of it before it becomes an issue," but noted that, if the town does not do the work, the water's color and taste would eventually be impacted.

## Downtown streetscape work could be done in October

The downtown streets of Ashland have been freshly paved and new sidewalks, plus the crosswalk at Town Hall, have been installed

At the Sept. 6 meeting of the Select Board, Town Manager Michael Herbert explained the sidewalks are actually stamped asphalt.

"The way they do it is incredible," he said. "They'll be finishing up the crosswalks and then moving on to doing the medians, that will be done as cobblestones.'

After that, guardrails will be installed and landscaping will be done. Herbert says the streetscape work could be done by Oct. 31. The next phase, he said, is connecting the buildings to utilities underground and moving the poles.

Additional projects will include the sluiceway project where

the observation platform will be rebuilt and the former sluiceway will become a walkway with exposed granite edging on either side.

"It's coming together nicely," reported Herbert. "So you see that, and you see what we did recently with the Mill Pond Park renovation and everything, and you're just like 'Oh, it's all coming together' and it gets you excited."

## Update: Changes to 2024 Catch Up 401(k) Contributions

Since 2019, Congress continues to place a growing number changes as well as restrictions on Americans' retirement planning.

Passed in December 2022, Secure Act 2.0, which stands for "Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement," was designed to further improve retirement-saving opportunities.

One would believe expanding personal choices would be an enhancement.

Think again.

#### Planned changes for 2024.

For Secure Act 2.0, when lawmakers drafted changes to 401k catch-up provisions (currently \$7,500 additional to 401k plans by those over age 50) they "mistakenly" left out specific language. As a result, under their original Section 603, no participant could make catch-up contributions whether on a pre-tax or Roth basis starting in 2024.

This was a big problem.

Congressional leaders said this was not the intended outcome, but instead to broaden the amount of employers offering a Roth option in their 401k

plans. Interesting, cause simply mandating a Roth option in 401k plans does this and provides more choice for everyone.

Instead, Congress determined it was best to require individuals who earned more than \$145,000 in FICA wages the previous tax year to make all catch-up contributions on a Roth basis only. Meaning, it eliminated the choice of taking upfront tax break on catch-up contributions for "higher earners" by only allowing these deposits in after-tax Roth accounts.

With this as the only catch-up option available, lawmakers know this pressures employers to update both retirement plans to allow the Roth option AND align payroll service capabilities with retirement plans to identify those who earned more than \$145,000 in FICA wages the previous year.

The cynic in me asks:

- Why is this link being established?
- What's in future laws given these new aligned capabilities?
- When did \$145,000 become the new \$400,000 for "high earners"?

#### It gets complicated.

Beyond employers, plan administrators and plan/payroll service providers having to update capabilities at additional costs, there are several unanswered questions on how to execute.

For example, what's in place to allow an employer to verify a new employee's FICA wages made the previous year at a former employer? Or what of those

who don't have FICA wages and are omitted from the new law, like state and local government employees or partners at a law firm? Ironic or mistakenly omitted?

This led to over 200 entities made up of Fortune 500 companies, firms, and public employers, plus the American Retirement Association and plan administrators including Schwab, Vanguard, and Fidelity to ask Congress for a two-year delay to the Roth catch-up rule to 2026.

#### IRS delays changes until 2026.

On August 25, 2023, the IRS released Notice 2023-62 which pushed enactment of Section 603 out to January 1, 2026.

Thus, it is business as usual for 2024 and 2025, while stakeholders work behind the scenes to get compliant. It also gives time for revised Congressional legislation.

#### Your next steps.

If over age 50, you can continue making catch-up contributions to 401k plans based upon your personal choice of what's best for you now and later in retirement, regardless of income.

Now, don't get me wrong, the Roth 401k selection can have tremendous benefits.

Furthermore, I've actively illustrated to clients the potential benefits and drawbacks to switching to the Roth 401k option. But in the end, it should be about choice for the individual to do what is best for them in planning for their retirement.

## **Marathon Bib Applications Due Oct. 15**

The Town of Ashland is now accepting applications for bibs for the 2024 Boston Marathon, and the applications are now just limited to Ashland residents.

Every year we receive 22 Invitational Entry Forms from the Boston Athletic Association as a courtesy since the Marathon runs through Ashland. The town typically distributes those entry forms to runners by giving 10 to the non-profit "NORD" (National Organization of Rare Diseases) and the remaining 12 through Town Hall.

Applications are due by Oct. 15 and are open to anyone, not just Ashland residents.

"Anybody can apply," explained Ashland Executive Assistant Susan Robie at the Sept. 6 meeting of the Select Board. "What we do is we give preference to employees and Ashland residents. Everybody's name gets drawn; they either get awarded a BAA invitational bib or they get waitlisted."

Everyone who receives one of these bibs must raise \$3,000, according to the application.

The application form can be found at bit.ly/AshlandMarathonLottery2024 and is due on Oct. 15. For more information, com. Robie will place the entries into the lottery, draw names randomly and place them on a waitlist, and distribute the bibs accordingly.

# Ashland 2023 Hall of Fame

Ashland High School has announced the Hall of Fame Class of 2023.

Entering the halls will be Richard Martin (Class of 1964), Tim Walsh (2005), Russ Baker (1953) and Jerry Hanna (1966).

In addition to the four individual Clocker athletes, two amazing teams, the 1998 softball team, and the 1967 baseball team, will also be honored.

The banquet will take place at 2pm on Nov. 19, at La Cantina Italiana in Framingham. Tickets for the event will be \$40 and should be ordered as soon as possible as there is a cap for 150 participants; if the cap is not hit the ticket sales will close on Oct. 19.

Richard Martin was an athlete who excelled in three sports for the Clockers. He was a fouryear varsity starter on the diamond and was captain of the 1964 squad that captured the Dual County League Championship. As a first baseman and star pitcher, the southpaw finished his career with 16 wins including a no-hitter against Wayland during his junior campaign. On the gridiron, Martin was a twoyear varsity starter for Ashland at quarterback and safety, where he was a captain during the 1963 season in which the team finished 7-1-1 and capped off the season with a 21-6 Thanksgiving Day win over previously undefeated Hopkinton. Martin was named MVP of the game. On the basketball court Martin was a varsity starter all four years and was the first Ashland's first player to record 1,000 career points. He captained the 1962-63 and 1963-64 teams and was named a two-time DCL All-Star.

Tim Walsh, another threesport athlete, captained the soccer team in both his junior and senior season. During his four-year varsity run with the soccer team he played both forward as well as center midfielder. The Clockers captured three Tri Valley League Championships and two Division 3 South Sectional Championships during his tenure. As a senior, Walsh was the league MVP and garnered first team honors on the TVL All-State team. On





the court, the point guard continued his success of being named a captain for both his junior and senior seasons and was an important part of the 2005 Clocker squad that finished the season as Division 3 South Sectional Finalist; he was also named a TVL All-Star that campaign. On the diamond Walsh found himself patrolling left fielder for the Clockers and once again earned TVL All-Star recognition as a senior. Throughout his three sports during his time at Ashland Walsh amassed a 49-19-2 record across as a senior, playing in 12 state tournament games and winning 9 of them.

Russ Baker starred for legendary coach "Grump" Walker in basketball and baseball and as a senior was a member of the 1952 undefeated football team. On the diamond, he starred defensively at shortstop and was a consistent hitter at the plate batting an even.300. His greatest achievements, though, came on the basketball court where Baker completed his senior season knocking down a record 187 points in only 8 games. He averaged an astounding 23.4 points per game in a time when the





3-point era had not yet been established. His best performance came at Hopkinton when he drained 21 baskets and 4 free throws for 46 points, which not only set a court record at Hopkinton, but also a school record for the Clockers that stood for over 40 years. Baker continued his contributions to the town as a youth hockey coach and he played an integral part of establishing the Demons Hockey program in the mid-1980s.

Jerry Hanna was another three-sport athlete for the Clockers, lettering in football, basketball, and track and field. He captained the track and field team, placing 4th in the low hurdles in the Class E State Meet. On the gridiron Hanna made his mark as the only player to be named to both the First Team Offense and the First Team Defense as a Framingham Area All-Star. As team captain, he was considered a "small, mighty, and shifty" halfback, while defensively he anchored a Clockers secondary that recorded three shutouts. Hanna was able to score points in just about every phase of his



game during his senior campaign, while finding the endzone five different ways. He crossed the goal line on rushes, receptions, an interception, a fumble recovery, and a kick return. His best effort came in a 24-20 win over DCL rival Wayland in which he recorded a touchdown run, a touchdown catch, and a fumble recovery for a touchdown. Hanna finished the season with 44 points, good for top 5 overall in the Framingham Area.

The 1998 Softball Team amassed a 20-4 record (14-2 in the Tri Valley League). Coached by Ginny Walsh and Charlene Carabello. The girls finished the season as TVL Champions, Division 3 South Sectional Champions, and Division 3 State Champions. Going into the tournament the squad was seeded #5 in the South bracket. Once there they capped off a 6-0 playoff run with a 3-1 State Title victory over Frontier. Co-captains Amy Curlett and Leah Kamataris led the way for the Clockers. Kamataris anchored the defense at SS and batted .322, while Curlett finished the season with a 13-3 record, a 0.68 ERA, and went a perfect 6-0 in the playoffs. Keri Giangrande performed sensationally in the circle as well, posting an 8-1 record with a 0.34 ERA. Upperclassmen Brooke Perry, Michele

Leporati, and Becky Karb all contributed to the successful season. Lauren Vendetti and Becca Marks performed above their freshman status.

The 1967 Baseball Team amassed a 16-2 overall record under the leadership of Massachusetts' Hall of Fame Coach Clem Spillane, Assistant Coach Joe Apicella, and co-captains Bob Mucha and Pat Fitzgerald. The Ashland nine finished the season as Dual County League Champions on their way to capturing the Class C State Championship. Joe Markarian was the MVP of the title game, pitching a 2-hitter and hitting a grand slam in the 7th inning to lead the Clockers to an 8-0 victory over Dartmouth. Markarian (8-1) and Mike Trychon (7-1) starred on a Clockers pitching staff that finished with a 2.27 team ERA. During that season Ashland recorded an incredible 21 double plays in the field. Veteran catcher Steve Willard led the team in numerous offensive categories posting a .418 batting average, recorded 26 hits and knocked in 23 RBI. Other major contributors to the 1967 season included Earl McLaughlin, Mark Iarussi, Larry Piccioli, Dennis Fairweather, Tom Pandolfi, Billy Ellsworth, Ernie Sannicandro, Lonnie Hart, and Jim Calhoun.
