





to those in need. In every town in this region, there are families lacking food, seniors who would appreciate conversation or help shoveling snow, students needing school supplies, and much more. All of them benefit from ordinary people in the community providing time, skills, and goods or funds.

In Mendon, the Senior Center and its advisory board, the Council on Aging, rely on volunteers so they can in turn give help. They run the local food pantry and provide other vital services. "The pantry serves residents of all ages who are in need," said Amy Wilson Kent, the center's director. "We appreciate people donating unexpired items for the pantry. And we appreciate the seniors, students, and other volunteers who stock the shelves. Our staff distributes the goods, ensuring confidentiality for recipients."

"We also work with Tri Valley to serve a lunch twice a week,

Recipies for the season

Irish Stuffing

(aka fancy-for-holidays mashed potatoes)

A family variation of Colcannon (Irish mashed potatoes) Contributed by Mary Dalton

Ingredients

- 6 cups boiled potatoes, peeled and diced
- 34 cup butter
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- ½ teaspoon ground sage
- 2 teaspoons salt
- ½ teaspoon pepper
- ½ cup chopped parsley

Directions

Pass the potatoes through a ricer or food mill then place them in a large bowl

- 2 cups bourbon, vodka or any liquor

Soak cherries in bourbon or liquor of choice for 1 hour in the refrigerator. Remove cherries and pat dry with a paper towel.

Heat chocolate chips in the microwave in 20-second intervals, stirring in between, until fully melted.

Dip each cherry two-thirds of the way into the melted white chocolate, twisting it slightly to help the chocolate stick. Dip the cherry in red, green, or white sanding sugar, coating it halfway up the white chocolate coating.

Chill in fridge 20 minutes before serving.

Heat oven to 350. Place roast flat side up, on rack in roasting pan; discard marinate.
