# **Development Proposal Found Inconsistent**

**RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)** - Trumark Homes has spent several years planning the development of the former Kassis property – 41 acres of undeveloped open space along the American River in Rancho Cordova. Their initial application was submitted in April 2019, proposing the development of 245 single-family homes. There was some opposition to the project because the property is beloved by many locals in the area, as public access easements traverse the site, and it provides habitat for



"inaction" by the Planning Department of the City of Rancho Cordova. Rancho Cordova's Communications and Public Affairs Director Maria Kniestedt explained that City staff was "in the process of reviewing the technical studies and preparing the environmental document required by CEQA [California Environmental Quality Act]" when the application as withdrawn. Trumark then submitted a new application - now proposing 441 homes on the site (of which 242 *Continued on page 2* 

### **FBI Warns of Charity Scams in Israel, HAMAS** Conflict


SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Sacramento Field Office is warning the public that criminals are soliciting donations during the Israel-HAMAS conflict. These charity scams victimize both well-meaning, local communities, and the vulnerable populations impacted by life-changing catastrophes.

Scams are especially prevalent during times of increased conflict such as war, natural disasters, or epidemics. Criminals often use these crises as opportunities to exploit individuals seeking to support humanitarian efforts. Perpetrators claim to be associated with established charities or creators of new charities associated with emergent conflicts.

Local communities may be targeted by individuals claiming to collect funds for victimized families while using the donations for their own personal gain or in support of domestic or international criminal enterprises.

Foreign terrorist organizations often establish fake charities using social media platforms to misdirect unwitting donors to subsidize their operations. Solicitations are then coordinated via social media posts, e-mail, cold calls, or crowdfunding website requests.

To avoid becoming a victim:

Approach all unsolicited communication including direct messages, calls, and e-mails with suspicion;

Visit the official website of a charitable entity directly to obtain contact information rather than clicking on links in e-mails or assuming the unsolicited call is from an official source;

Thoroughly research new charities online and verify phone numbers or e-mail addresses before donating. Be sure the named charity is not associated with scams and uses funds as they claim;

Ensure that you are using the official website of a well-known charity. Criminals may create lookalike, "spoofed" websites with URLs similar in appearance to those of known organizations;

Visit the California Attorney General's Charitable Registry Search tool to ensure a charity is registered in the State of California;

Visit the IRS Tax Exempt Organization Search to see if a charity donation to the Continued on page 5

LOS ANGELES, CA (MPG) On Monday, November 13th, The Council of State Governments West (CSG West) conferred its prestigious Bettye Fahrenkamp Award for Distinguished Legislative Leadership on behalf of Western States to retired California Assemblymember Ken Cooley.

The honor was bestowed amidst the first day's proceedings as CSG West kicked off its 76th annual meeting in Los Angeles.

The annual Fahrenkamp Award presentation recognizes leaders whose legislative careers display an ability to see and work beyond the border of their own states in the interest of the West. The award honors Senator Bettye Fahrenkamp of Fairbanks, Alaska, who served with distinction in the Alaska State

Senate from 1979 until her untimely death in 1991.

During Ken's time in the California Assembly, he was regularly active in CSG West and in 2015 was among the

"by-invitation-only" participants in its Western Legislative Academy. (The WLA is held annually at conference facilities in Colorado Springs, Co.)

This year's Fahrenkamp

Award presentation highlighted Ken's leadership role in Chairing, during 2019-2020, the inaugural Legislative Oversight Working Group at CSG West. In December 2020, the working group published for use by the CSG West member states a firstever Western Legislative Oversight Handbook. (The western states making up CSG "West" are Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, New Mexico, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming.)

Ken is often quoted to the effect "effective oversight is the most vital superpower the Legislature must exercise on a bicameral and bipartisan basis to fulfill its "People's House" duty." He believes legislative bodies must be the eyes and ears of the public they represent to perform their "check and balance" role ensuring executive *Continued on page 5*

# **Kassis Property Found Inconsistent with City Standards**

would be designated as low-income housing): "The Kassis property's location near the river, regional recreation, and light rail direct to downtown Sacramento, makes the site ideal for new home construction, bringing new families to an area that needs retail and community support."

The new formal application was submitted under the protections of Senate Bill (SB) 330 – State legislation that attempts to address the lack of affordable housing by mandating a streamlined review process for new housing. SB 330 restricts local governments from downzoning properties and from attempting to apply subjective design standards when considering new projects.

Trumark also asserted that because the site was zoned to meet the City's low-income housing obligations under the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) as determined by the State, their application must be allowed "by right." Under that provision, Trumark proposed that while design review could still be required, the City could not require discretionary approval for the project under CEQA.

Trumark's application package was deemed complete on August 25, 2023, which triggered an accelerated 60-day timeline for the City of Rancho Cordova to review the project and determine if it complies with the City's adopted objective standards.

While the City was conducting their review, a group of concerned homeowners adjacent to the site, Tiffany Farms Homeowners' Association, hired the law firm Soluri Meserve to assess the project proposal. Attorney Patrick M. Soluri submitted a letter on their behalf, outlining various instances of inconsistencies between the proposal and the City's codes and standards.

Specifically, and most glaringly, Soluri wrote, "The Project

is inconsistent with the City's General Plan by constructing homes in a floodway and 100year floodplain." The Trumark proposal acknowledges that the lower terrace of the site, closest to the American River, is within the 100-year floodplain, and they propose to use infill to raise the ground level, removing that section of property from the floodway. But Soluri contends first that the General Plan specifies that the City shall "preclude development within the 100-year floodplain," and further that the City will "discourage the use of fill to create buildable area within the 100-year floodplain, except in extreme circumstances consistent with all other applicable policies and regulations, and after review to determine potential impacts on wildlife, habitat, and flooding on other parcels." Soluri states that any such "extreme circumstances' are not met by the Project."

In the City's Review, released on October 24, Senior Planner

Arlene Granadosin-Jones wrote that Trumark's assertion that their proposal should be processed by right was "incorrect," as Trumark was attempting to apply legal provisions for which the site was not eligible. "The City will process your application in accordance with the requirements of the Rancho Cordova Municipal Code, SB 330, and the Housing Accountability Act. As part of that process, the application is required to undergo complete and thorough environmental review as required by the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)," wrote Granadosin-Jones.

The Review concluded that Trumark's proposal was inconsistent and not in compliance with many standards and policies of the City of Rancho Cordova. In particular, the Review found Trumark's proposal to be inconsistent with adopted General Plan policies because part of the site is located within the 100-year floodplain, where development is precluded by the City and infill use is discouraged.

The Review also found that the project is not consistent with the City's objective zoning, development, and design standards – citing 40 different issues with parking allowances, bicycle facilities, outdoor lighting, walls and fencing, pedestrian pathways, seating, various landscaping guidelines, etc. Further issues were identified in the proposal's street standards, bicycle standards, drainage requirements, and traffic standards - all of which were not consistent with the City's objective design standards.

The Kassis site is located within Erosion Zone 4 of the Parkway Overlay Zone, and the City's Review found that the proposal did not meet various building requirements that would ensure erosion risks are mitigated. The proposal was also inconsistent with the City's requirements for the preservation and protection of trees, because the proposal did not include an updated arborist report or meet the necessary tree replacement guidelines. The project would require a conditional use permit from the City, for which Trumark has not applied. And finally, the project did not comply with the City's parkland dedication requirement for new developments.

Trumark still has the option of modifying their proposal to bring it into compliance with the City's applicable standards, as specified in their Review. Then the City would again have 60 days to review a modified application. If the proposal were deemed consistent, the CEQA review is still required to determine the project's environmental impacts; as Granadosin-Jones wrote in the Review, "Complete environmental review is necessary before the City will make a decision regarding the project."





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# Local United Way Takes on Sacramento Housing Crisis

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - United Way California Capital Region is now directly addressing Sacramento's housing crisis with the formation of its new Community Support Services department that will include housing navigation services through the California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal program (CalAIM) for people on Medi-Cal who are unhoused or at risk of losing housing.

"Our local United Way has always focused on our community's biggest needs, and currently the housing predicament we are in is so great that we know we have to do our part to help those impacted by rising rent costs and increased risks of being unhoused," said Dr. Dawnté Early, President and CEO, United Way California Capital Region. "We are investing in our families and utilizing this program as another tool in our box, ensuring those who are unhoused, or at risk of being unhoused, and on Medi-Cal, can get the help and resources they need to find or maintain housing."

United Way's housing navigation program works with local individuals and families currently unhoused or at risk of being unhoused to help them find housing, receive deposit assistance and sustain their housing. Through referrals, the program's housing navigator works with each eligible client to identify barriers and housing needs, find housing options, assist in the application process, and obtain assistance for move-in costs such as security deposits, first and last month's rent, utility deposits and medically necessary aids. Once suitable housing is determined, United Way works with newly housed clients to identify the root causes of them being unhoused or at risk of being unhoused, and then addresses their needs and goals to maintain stable housing, including health care, education, substance use treatment, financial literacy or counseling services.

"United Way is proud to enter this important space helping Sacramento residents embark on a path of sustainable housing," Early said. "We understand that to eliminate poverty, education is key to building a stronger, healthier and more compassionate Capital Region. For kids to excel in school, they cannot be worried about where they are going to sleep at night. That's why this investment in local families is important both in the fight to end this housing crisis and to build future opportunities for children to break the cycle of poverty."

Housing navigation program participants must live in Sacramento County, be unhoused or at risk of losing housing, and be a Medi-Cal member with Health Net, Molina Healthcare or Anthem Blue Cross. 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# Sheriff Jim Cooper's Open Letter Regarding Retail Theft and the CRA

Dear Constituents,

The California Retailers Association (CRA) has made several misleading and inconsistent statements regarding a pending ballot initiative to address California's retail theft crisis.

**CLAIM**: On August 22, 2023, the CRA president, joined prosecutors in filing a ballot measure to address retail theft. Details of the proposed ballot measure can be found at

The CRA president was an officer of the committee supporting the ballot measure and has repeatedly stated her support for this initiative. As recently as November 10, 2023, she told local media that she has been working "so hard" to fix Proposition 47 and put this initiative on the ballot.

FACT: In direct contradiction of this claim, in a November 15th Sacramento Bee article, the CRA president stated, "passing a ballot initiative isn't the solution," suggesting that the crisis can be cured by simply making retail theft misdemeanors subject to a mandatory appearance in court.

Anyone with experience in this realm should know that a misdemeanor approach will solve nothing. Existing law already requires individuals to appear in court when cited or arrested for misdemeanor crimes. In fact, thousands of individuals in jurisdictions across California fail to appear on misdemeanor crimes following the issuance of a citation, arrest, or even court order. In Sacramento County alone, we have over 33,000 outstanding misdemeanor warrants. The volume of misdemeanor warrants issued for those who fail to appear is enormous and already unmanageable for law enforcement.

As a result of Proposition 47 ("Safe Neighborhoods and Schools Act"), individuals who repeatedly commit theft and drug crimes suffer no consequences. People with drug and mental health issues, therefore, have no incentive to get treatment. Proposition 47 clearly states that any effort to increase penalties related to theft or drug crimes requires voter approval.

Per Proposition 47, the legislature has no power to make any meaningful change to address the retail theft crisis California faces. Given the extraordinary losses suffered by the retail industry and the significant impact it has on the consumer, I express my deepest concerns about California Retail Association President Rachel Michelin's willingness to misrepresent to the public the facts on these critical matters.

While I still have my reservations because of their past history, I am hopeful we can find some common ground with the big box retailers and work together to resolve the crisis of retail theft.

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

Dear Dave,

We're following your Baby Steps plan, and we've paid off all our credit cards. But when I talked to my husband the other day about cutting up the cards and closing the accounts, he said he would rather keep the accounts open, and the cards locked away in a drawer for use as an emergency fund. He says this will help us have an emergency fund in place quicker than saving for one. I think there's more behind his reasoning, though. He grew up in a very poor family, and I wonder if he's not afraid of somehow ending up in that kind of situation again. What can I do to convince him to follow your advice?

### **Dave Ramsey Says**

I think you're a very perceptive lady. You said your husband grew up in poverty, right? So, what I'm hearing is the cards represent almost a security blanket for him—a financial security blanket. I get that, but here's the thing. If you had a fully funded emergency fund of three to six months of expenses sitting in the bank, I'm talking about hard cold cash, you'd have the security of knowing that the expense of a new air conditioning unit or transmission for the car would only be a minor inconvenience. And, you'd be able to cover it easily without going back into debt.

Instead of actively trying to convince him of something, a better route might be to sit down together and talk through the whole thing. Explain to him you think you know why he feels the way he does, and that it's understandable. Then, ask him if there's a reasonable amount you two could have in the bank that would help him stop worrying. Discuss it, agree on an amount and then agree to cut the cards up and close the accounts when you reach that figure. Remind him, too, you'd still have your debit cards in hand in the event of an emergency.

Above all, Ramona, make sure you work together. Be patient and understanding. If he has recognized the wisdom of getting rid of debt and taking control of your finances, he's moving in the right direction!

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
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# **Roller Derby Community has Bright Future Ahead**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - While speaking with Amanda Dunham and Christina Watts from Sacramento Roller Derby, one theme was consistent throughout the entire conversation - Roller Derby isn't just a sport – it is a family with so many positives for Sacramento youth and women.

The two skaters, who always go by their derby names LOLz Lemon and Jessamine Killawatts at the rink, are passionate about roller derby in a way that is so contagious it compels the listener to want to strap on some skates and give it a go.

Now, Sacramento Roller Derby is gliding towards a new era of excellence – rebuilding its teams post-COVID, and looking forward to their future home facility.

Sacramento Roller Derby was founded in 2018 as the result of two different leagues merging after skating as separate entities for over ten years. The leagues realized that they were better together both functionally and financially, and united to form the current team. The current league welcomes over 100 participants, of which approximately 50 are adults and the rest children and various officials including referees.

The group currently uses the Andy Morin Sports Complex in Folsom for their practices, but there are big dreams ahead.

"We have a facility in downtown Sacramento that we are working on," says Dunham. "We purchased it with a donation someone made to us.'

That donation was no small gift - the donor, who wishes to remain anonymous, gifted the group up to \$2 million to build their facility. The excitement and relief of finding a permanent home was evident from both women

"It's been a struggle – Sacramento doesn't have a lot

of affordable facilities. The landscape of Sacramento has changed - the town is so much larger and venues we have rented in the past have quadrupled their prices," said Dunham.

The new rink will be located near the Blue Diamond almond factory.

Both the generous donation and influx of new participants post-COVID are two examples of how the Sacramento community is embracing a sport that once had a reputation in popular media for being aggressive and less than ladylike. Today, roller derby carries a reputation of strength, togetherness, and courage for many.

Watts, who is a board member for the team, recently lost her husband and found support within the derby community.

"The whole derby community helped me to find a new normalcy," says Watts. "Everybody has been really positive and will check up on me. Everybody in the community binds together to help people in a time of need."

Dunham seconds the fact that roller derby isn't just about the game. "That's the most rewarding thing – the growth and the community that supports that growth. A lot of people come to roller derby during a hard time in life. They know the community of roller derby will be there."

Sacramento Roller Derby has no paid employees and finances are always a challenge. A lot of the players within the league are also the ones running the entire show.

"There are challenges on and off the track when you play roller derby," explains Dunham. "We have both the typical athlete struggles plus business struggles. Most recreational sports don't have both. For us, it's really serious – it is comparable to minor league sports. But there's the added pressure of running it. Most sports have administrative oversight – that's not us. We are off the track running the game and then we put on our skates and play the game. You're always doing two things at the same time."

But is it worth it? Dunham absolutely believes it is.

"It makes you grow in ways you never thought you could. In myself I've grown a lot in confidence."

She also mentions that derby skaters not only grow in what their bodies are capable of, but also personally and professionally. Confidence found in roller derby can lead to the courage for everything from pursuing job promotions to leaving harmful relationships.

Also notable is Sacramento Roller Derby's junior program. Children as young as eight years old can join the team.

"The kids find their own way there," says Dunham when asked how they recruit children to the program. Current league kids share with friends via word-ofmouth, and the league's numbers have also benefited from a popular graphic novel featuring a roller derby girl.

However, the junior program is hardly new. "We've had a juniors program for as long as Sac Roller Derby has been around."

Safety comes first, and just like the adults, junior skaters wear helmets, mouth guards and pads. And they aren't afraid to completely wipe out and try again.

"The kids are super resilient and dedicated," says Dunham. "They are just like Gumby and fall in weird ways that make my heart stop and then get up and skate away.'

"They are all amazing," adds Watts. "They are always striving to do better."

Perhaps that's the true magic of roller derby. Beyond the sport itself, skaters are inspired to do better both on and off the rink.

Those who would like to watch a game can head out to the Andy Morin Sports Complex on December 2 for the Red Red Tournament – a chance to see not only Sacramento Roller Derby but other leagues play on mixed teams. Or, take things a step further and consider trying out for the league next spring. Anyone can try out, and skating experience isn't necessary. The tryouts include everything from skating lessons to teaching the rules of the game. The junior program is for boys and girls aged eight through seniors in high school. Females aged 18+ make up the main league.
