Gobble Wobble Aids Chicks in Crisis in Biggest Year Yet

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - What better way to give thanks is there than to walk and run on a Thanksgiving morning to help support a good cause?


For the past seven years, Chicks in Crisis has sponsored the Elk Grove Gobble Wobble Fun Run with additional sponsors from Sky River Casino, Body Fit Training, Grocery Outlet, K&A Spease Foundation and many more.

There was an increase in participants from the previous year, said Chicks in Crisis Co-Director Mayra Cooley. Last year's event had 1.300 runners. This one had 1,500 runners.

"This is our biggest year yet," Cooley said. "We have raised over \$100,000, which is the most we have ever raised. Our average is \$80,000." Chicks in Crisis CEO

and Co-Director Inez Whitlow said the organization is helping more people than ever and also has a mobile unit now, which they funded for the previous year. It had made organization.

out on the road, which we've had since April, giving out baby wipes, formula and diapers to communities that can't get to us. So it's been a huge blessing for us to have a mobile unit."

Whitlow said the mobile unit relieves pressure on their donations.

"What people don't realize is that it costs \$1,800 a day to open the gate to help people for free," Whitlow said. "So this money continues to keep the gate open in helping people until our (Big Day of Giving) in May."

Elk Grove Mayor Bobbie Singh-Allen said she was proud of the Elk Grove community for stepping up in supporting an

Elk Grove Birthrate Decreases in 2022

Parent, Former School Official Point to Rising Cost of Living

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - The number of babies born to parents in Elk Grove dropped 8% from 2019 to 2022, according to the latest figures from the California Department of Public Health.

This drop mirrors a more than 6% drop in births statewide.

A parent and a former Elk Grove Unified School District (EGUSD) official blamed the drop on the rising cost of living in Elk Grove, including increased costs for child

care and housing. Alicia Thaver-Gonzalez. the mother of two preschool boys, spoke about why she decided to have kids in spite of the decline.

"I always wanted kids, but it was just the question of whether I'd have my own or if I end up with adoption," Thayer-Gonzalez said. "More or less, it was my partner and the fact that we were more financially stable than not, we could manage it."

Thayer-Gonzalez also spoke about some of the other barriers she sees to having kids while needing to participate in the workforce, including finding child care. She acknowledged her situation was an outlier because she has family available to assist in caring for her sons, but she says she has coworkers who aren't so lucky.

"I work with somebody who's late to work on certain days because he can't drop his kid off at school any sooner than he does," Thayer-Gonzalez said.

In an email, EGUSD **Public Information Officer** Lisa Levasseur said, "We acknowledge this is a state wide trend, but here in Elk Grove Unified we have several new housing developments being built and don't see this as a concern."

EGUSD is the fifth largest district by enrollment in California with an area of 320 square miles. With much of the area undeveloped or underdeveloped,

Galt Resident to Face Matsui in House Race

GALT, CA (MPG) - Tom Silva, a Galt resident and former trustee in that city's elementary school district, has announced his candidacy to represent California's 7th Congressional District, which includes Elk Grove. In the March 2024 primary election, he will face incumbent Rep. Doris Matsui, D-Sacramento, and Ralph Nwobi, a Sacramento attorney.

Silva made his announcement on social media on Nov. 22, citing his veteran status and his past role on the Galt Joint Union Elementary School District board of education, where he served for four years, with two years as board president.

"As a School Board Trustee I fought hard for parental rights. I will fight to protect Californians from inflationary policies and will support our Nation's Veterans and First Responders," Silva's statement read. He added, "It is time for new leadership in Washington."

He also noted endorsements by the Sacramento County Republican Party and the California Republican Party.

In 2022, Silva mounted an unsuccessful campaign for Galt City Council, running on a platform that prioritized transparency; improved government budgeting; public safety; and homelessness, particularly aid to homeless veterans.

Matsui won reelection to Congress in 2022 and is representing Elk Grove for the first time after redistricting shuffled the district lines. The 7th Congressional District includes West Sacramento and southern Sacramento County. She received 68% of the general election vote, compared to 32% for Republican businessman Max Semenenko.

Matsui has served in Congress since 2005.

Information about Nwobi's campaign was not immediately available. The founder of Nwobi Law Group ran as a write-in candidate for Matsui's House seat in 2018.

going but I was able to run this race with my brother, who came home from college," Ortiz said. "So I was really motivated to push forward."

Cosumnes River College student Gabriella Groves said she did well in this race despite not having run since July after finishing her time on the Sacramento City College track team. In spite of that, Groves said he didn't have much motivation to run by herself.

Groves said doing this run has been a family tradition dating back to when Elk Grove held the Turkey

"Just doing these runs and supporting Chicks in Crisis, as well as running with friends in the 'Run to Feed the Hungry' race, I feel like these runs are special because you could give thanks and show your thanks by giving donations," Groves said.

Ben Schroeder, a University of California, Irvine, student, ran with a group of friends consisting of college and high school students. Schroeder said he wasn't aiming for a particular time, but rather wanted to run as a pack with his group and have fun.

"We just wanted to have fun as a group," Schroeder said. "We don't get to see each other as much because most of us are in college now, so we just wanted to just chill and hang out." ★

In 1994, after a brief stint as an assistant coach at Bellevue High School, Dan accepted a position as head coach at Bothell High School. Dan's time at Bothell had a tremendous impact on the students he worked with, many of whom still keep in touch today.

In 2000, Dan moved with his family to Elk Grove, California, where coached at Elk Grove High School until retirement in 2011. In retirement, Dan enjoyed spending time with his family, relaxing at his cabin in Idaho, traveling, fishing, attending to ball games he wasn't coaching, cooking up gourmet dishes for the neighborhood, and honing his comic acting skills. He

stayed active and could often be seen around the neighborhood walking his beloved Golden Retriever, Beau.

Dan made friends easily and often. He was "Uncle" Dan to many and a stranger to few. Though he had an illustrious career and touched so many lives, Dan clearly knew that his greatest treasure was his family. He is survived by wife Donna, son Drew, daughter Robin, sister Bridgit Bain, nephew Daniel (Lisa), nephew Bill (Alyssa), niece Madeleine, sister Mary (Michael) Ginther, nephew Christopher (Laura), in memory of grandnephew Patrick, nephew Zachary (Rachel), grandnephew Oliver, niece Caitlin, grandnephew Vincent, grandniece Stella, nephew Brett, father and mother in-law Harry & Billie Jo Hopla, brotherin-law Steve (Holly) Hopla, niece Clare, nephew Shane.

Trustees Reappoint Espinoza to CA School Board Group

Community Outreach Program Lauded at EGUSD Meeting

ELK GROVE (MPG) - At the close of the Nov. 14 Elk Grove Unified School District board meeting, President Nancy Chaires Espinoza was reappointed as representative to the California School Boards Association Delegate Assembly.

The board voted in favor of reappointing Espinoza despite vocal objections and no votes from Trustees Carmine Forcina and Tony Perez.

As he has in the past, Board Member Sean Yang said Tuesday night he thought the meeting was to follow a democratic process, and could not understand why big deals were made of what could be simple votes.

On the sexually explicit library books, public commenter Gary Hickman told the Board that the majority of books are not focused on LGBTQ+ topics.

Commenter Elba Ortiz listed her complaints and said parents should have more formal input on book selection and urged



Espinoza to be more "professional" and listen to her fellow trustees.

Forcina criticized staff, which was supposed to bring him a list of three rating services. Forcina said one was just an extension of the American Library Association ratings he previously criticized. Outside ratings were dismissed in a blanket criticism as being by non-objective paid critics, which wasn't refuted. Forcina said others were engaging in "selective transparency."

Speakers Emelina and Heidi both asked the board to pull an item containing policy updates from the consent calendar. The item was pulled, and along with a handful of others was discussed. Forcina moved that it be tabled to the next meeting

but was voted down. All consent items were uniformly passed.

Commenter Rhett Pennell told the board that principals still were not doing anything to school bullies.

During an update on the district's family and community engagement (FACE), board members lauded the program, some saying they had attended one of the triannual dinner sessions where families were invited for a meal and discussion on student needs. Staff explained Family Teacher Academic Team meetings. Trustee Michael Vargas commented on the program's gearing toward parents who need attention and support to benefit students. Spokespeople said they continue evaluate and research how the program can function. For example, they found deaf and hard-of-hearing families not receiving the help they needed, so they created a program for that. This is a social support program for students and their families, the presenters said. ★





Continued from Page 1 the district is ripe for expansion.

EGUSD has experienced a drop in enrollment of more than 4,000 students since the start of the pandemic.

Odie Douglas, retired former associate superintendent of secondary instruction for EGUSD, said that while he was employed the district had planned for rapid expansion.

"The Elk Grove Unified School District because of its landmass, 320 square miles, has been one of the fastest growing districts in the area," Douglas said. "When I was in the district it was projected to have over 80,000 students by now. I believe the district has close to 63,000 students."

Douglas spoke about how the district has historically worked with demographers to predict the needs of the community it serves, as well as with builders and the local governments to assess expansion.

"You have to plan, I'm gonna say, 10-plus years out," Douglas said. "It takes a while to get things in place and funding and just dealing with environmental impact, all of that that it takes to construct a school and then correlational impact upon the existing schools and the need to change boundary lines."

Both Douglas and Thayer-Gonzalez agreed that increased costs of housing and goods are

birthrates.

Thayer-Gonzalez said that it was having more than two incomes in the household that made the difference in her feeling financially secure enough to have children.

"We live with his sister and parents, and so there's more than two incomes in

contributing to lower the household," Thayer-Gonzalez said.

Douglas said that California was "a very expensive state to live in." Douglas continued by saying that "the prices are getting to be prohibitive," for young buyers but that homes are "still somewhat affordable" for now.

GRAND FORKS, N.D. (MPG) - The Sacramento State offense scored six touchdowns and the defense tallied three sacks in the final two drives of the game to help the Hornets to a 42-35 win at No. 12 North Dakota in the first round of the NCAA FCS Playoffs on Nov. 25 at the Alerus Center.

Sacramento State improved to 8-4 on the season and will now play at South Dakota next Saturday. The game against the Coyotes will mark the fourth straight season in which the Hornets have played in the second round of the playoffs. North Dakota finished its season at 7-5.

Kaiden Bennett broke a 35-35 tie with a 4-yard rush up the middle with 4:54 remaining in the game. During that drive Marcus Fulcher rushed for 12 yards, Anderson Grover had a 23-yard reception and Bennett had three rushes for a total of 20 yards.

UND started its drive at its own 32 and gained five yards on the opening play. Brock Mather sacked Tommy Schuster for a 3-yard loss on second down and nickelback Dorian Pollard followed with a 9-yard sack forcing the Fighting Hawks to punt. The Hornets were able to run out the clock on the next series behind a pair of first downs to close the game.

Sacramento State's offense was near perfect in the first half. The Hornets scored touchdowns on their first four drives of the game and amassed 313 yards in the half. Sacramento State took the opening kickoff and drove 75 yards on seven plays capped by a 1-yard run from Bennett.

The loss was just the 30th for the Fighting Hawks at the Alerus Center in the last 21 years. However, Sacramento State has accounted for three of those defeats with wins in 2013, 2017 and

Sac-Joaquin Section Championships **Pride Takes Early Lead, But Hughson Roars Back for D-VI Banner**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) Bradshaw Christian walked into Hughes Stadium Nov. 25 off the momentum gained in an exciting last second win the week prior at Sonora and built a seemingly insurmountable 31-13 lead four minutes into the third quarter of its Sac-Joaquin Section Division VI championship game with Hughson. Their running attack looked unstoppable by the Huskies.

But, Hughson thought differently and executed much differently in the final 20 minutes of the game. The Huskies scored 27 points in a row and held on for a 40-39 victory and set a date to return to the CIF Northern California Regional championships on Dec. 2. They'll host Palma in the Division 4-A NorCal championship

Hughson is the defending state champions in Division

The Pride's downfall actually started on a drive right after the Huskies' top running back Alex Villarreal scored on a three yard run which capped a seven-play, 80-yard drive to narrow the margin to 31-19, Bradshaw Christian. The Pride was called for a false start which made a third and short turn into a fourthand-eight at the Hughson 43.

"They call a false start on us, won't give us a (uniform) number and then say it was our wingback who was in motion," Rickert explained. "Yeah, no doubt he's in motion, we motioned him. That was a big play for us. Instead of a second and four, it's a third down on a call on a wingback. I don't get it."

Despite Rickert's appeal to the officials, he decided to go for the first down at the Huskies' 43. Ethan Rickert dropped back to pass was pressured on both sides, moved up the pocket and in desperation tried to lateral to a teammate but the ball bounced backwards to the Pride 36 and they gave up the ball on downs.

Hughson took advantage of a short field and score eight plays later on Robert Mcdaniel's seven-yard TD pass to David Delgado. The Huskies were to within five points, 31-26, with 27 seconds left in the third quarter.

Then, Hughson surprised half the crowd at Hughes Stadium with an onside kick which they recovered at the Bradshaw 36. It was something Huskies' head coach Shaun King said was planned.

"We needed a stop and they were ahead on possessions in the game and I wanted to get the ball back to get it into our favor," King

Villarreal scored on the first play of the fourth quarter on a 21-yard run. The extra point kick was blocked but Hughson had the lead at 32-31.

Quarterback Ethan Rickert, who had gone the entire season without tossing an interception for Bradshaw threw a ball intended for Devyn Mcdonald on the ensuring drive but was cut off by Delgado at the Hughson 40 and returned it to the Pride "That was something

we were working on all week and we set up David Delgado against him," King said. "It was something we saw on film and we took advantage."

Rickert explained. "He's

been awesome all year long,

"I think he second-guessed himself, he pump-faked it and should have just thrown it," Coach



Last Monday my golfing buddies and I were playing Cordova Golf Course, a simple par-66 layout on the Jackson Highway in Rancho Cordova. As a bunch of older guys typically do, we don't play that quick and three of us like to walk 18 holes. So these two young men were quickly moving up behind us. We decided to tee off on hole No. 4 and then let them play through.

I told my partners I'll walk back to the No. 3 green and talk to these two young men. As I neared the green one of them chipped his ball out of the sand to about two inches from the cup. When I looked to him and said, "Hey, great shot" I recognized him.

It was Spencer Levin.

As often as I wrote about Levin and his feats and defeats on the PGA Tour I felt like I really knew him. We only talked about three times on the phone, but if you've been a regular reader of this column you know I wrote about him often. He is about the only guy from Elk Grove to make it to the Tour.

Levin knew who I was and with a big grin said I wrote something incorrect about him. It was about a year ago when Levin made the cut at the Shriners' Children's Open, the first cut he made on the Tour in five years. He said I wrote in my column his best year he earned \$230,000 and quickly told me his best vear was 2011 and he earned \$2,388,000.

I didn't know what to say except that I am sure I didn't make up that \$230,000 figure but would check our Citizen archives and make a written apology, if needed.

Spence, I am truly sorry.

On Oct. 10, 2022 I did indeed write in this column that his best year was 2008 when he earned \$236, 185. I was wrong (I've sure I got that info off PGATour.com). Levin's best year was indeed 2011 when he earned, more correctly, \$2,388,038. In fact in his best years, between 2010 and 2015, Levin was a regular entrant on the Tour. According to PGATour.com and Spotrac.com, his career winnings total \$8,236,107. His resume on the Tour includes one runner-up, two third-place finishes and nine top-five and 17 top 10 finishes

Watching him briefly as he and his playing partner, who Levin introduced as a fellow touring pro (sorry, I didn't write down his name), were teeing off and passing us by on No. 4 at Cordova, it was evident he can still play excellent golf.

Before he went forward to the green at No. 4, I had to ask the obvious, "I find it unusual that the first time we meet in person on a golf course, it's at Cordova. Why are you here being a touring pro?" (No offense, management of Cordova Golf Club)

The response was simple: his dad, Don, teaches lessons at Cordova and he got Spence and friend out on the course for a few quick holes.

At age 39, Levin is still touring, now on the Korn Ferry Tour where he's competed in 118 events with a win, two runner-ups, a thirdplace finish and 12 finishes in the top 10. His lone victory was this summer at the

NOTEBOOK Weritex Bank Championship in Arlington, Tex. He fired a

final round 63, eight-underpar, to finish with a minus-20 and a one-stroke victory over Brett Drewitt.

Levin had a good year in 2023 finishing 50th in the Korn Ferry points total. If he ends up in the top 30 next year, he'll earn back his PGA Tour card.

Updates:

It's been a while since we've written about our local sports professionals and it's time we get updated:

Rowdy Tellez – The 2013 Elk Grove graduate was recently "non-tendered" by the Milwaukee Brewers and is now a free agent. After a career-high 35 home runs in 2022, injuries and a big slump dotted his 2023 season. He batted .215 and had just 13 home runs in 106 games. Interestingly, some iournalists in the Nation's capital think he might look good in a Nationals' uniform in 2024.

Derek Hill - The former Elk Grove H.S. outfielder was released by the Washington Nationals on Oct. 6. A year ago he signed a minor league deal with Washington and started the season in Triple-A. Hill got a chance to play with the Nationals this season, batted .170 in 13 games but was designated for assignment on July 5, going back to the minors. Now, his future seems to be up in the air.

Nick Madrigal - Another Elk Grove infielder who played in 92 games for the Chicago Cubs and batted .263. He's signed through 2024 at an estimated salary of \$1.9 million, according to Spotrac.com. Because he almost never strikes out, it's likely Madrigal will see

plenty of time in the Cubs infield again this season.

Ty Madrigal – Nick's twin brother. He's a pitcher who threw quality innings this past summer in Mexico. Got to think he's not done playing baseball.

David Freitas - Earlier this year he signed a minor league deal with the Dodgers, the ninth organization he's played for. Freitas had a good year in Triple-A and will probably return in 2024, unless his pork business in Wilton really takes off (it's already doing well). He's 34 now and a catcher yet wants to keep playing until he physically can't do it. That's something he told me a few years back and he means it. Yes, he, too, played at EGHS.

Matt Manning - let's get away from all the Thundering Herd guys for a moment and talk about this Sheldon High School righthanded pitcher. At age 26, Manning looks like he's got a spot in rotation for the Detroit Tigers. This vear he played under a oneyear contract for a reported \$729,200, according to Spotrac.com. Twice he took a line drive off his foot and spent a total of 102 days on the injury list. Still, Manning was solid with a 5-4 record and a 3.28 ERA in 15 games.

Dylan Carlson – Spotrac writes Carlson will earn \$2.1 million in 2024 as he comes off an oblique injury that happened in August. He also spent time on the injury list in May because of an ankle. It hurt Carlson's numbers; he batted .219 with five homers in 76 games. Rehabbing in the off-season will probably lead to potentially a very good 2024 at age 25.

Dom Nunez - This Elk Grove catcher spent 2023 between the Cubs and the Pirates' farm systems. He last played in the Majors in 2022 with Colorado. Hard to

say right now what Nunez' future is in baseball.

J.D. Davis - "J-Dizzle" looks like he is now a solid member of the San Francisco Giants' infield. His play, evaluated as being one of the top-10 third baseman in the Majors, has earned him a spot with the Giants, now under new manager Bob Melvin.

Spotrac estimates he'll earn \$6.9 million and he's proven he is worth every nickel. He led San Francisco is games played in 2023 with 144. He batted .248, which by Davis' standard isn't that great, but his 18 homers and a .737 OPS shows he's a threat at the plate.

Chase Davis - the Franklin Wildcat was the top draft choice by the Cardinals in July and that earned him a \$3.6 million signing bonus. He finished the summer in Class A ball and likely will move up to "High-A" or possibly "Double-A" ball in
