Making Space For Everyone

Former A.D., his wife, start nonprofit

When former Ashland High School Athletic Director Stephen Marks, and his wife Jamie, were looking for summer camps for their 5-year-old son Lincoln, they found very few options.

The couple wanted Lincoln, who is non-verbal, diagnosed with autism, and has significant developmental delays, a camp that was fully inclusive.

"We are strong advocates and believe wholeheartedly in the benefits of fully inclusive programming and as we began searching for opportunities for Lincoln to attend summer camp with his brother and peers last summer, it became apparent that there were very few opportunities. The handful of opportunities that were available, came at a significant additional cost for families and many camps were



unprepared to support and navigate the experience for campers with disabilities," he said.

Rather than accept the fact that there were few options for Lincoln, the Marks took matters into their own hands.

"Earlier this year, we founded Linclusion, a nonprofit organization dedicated to facilitating the integration of children aged 3-15 with disabilities into traditional summer camps. The organization's mission and name

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

Family-run Affordable Junk Removal takes the stress out of cleanups

Whether it's one old fridge in the garage or an entire home of unwanted goods, the team at Affordable Junk Removal offers a cost-efficient, stress-free approach to waste management. "You don't lift a finger," says owner Jason Schadler, who started the company along with his wife Christine in 2005.

The business offers same-day service for both residential and commercial clients across eastern and central Massachusetts and northern Rhode Island. In addition to junk removal, the company rents 15-yard dumpsters.

As a family-owned and operated company, Schadler says Affordable Junk Removal has lower overhead costs and is more accessible than national competitors. "I answer my phone 24 hours a day," he says. "I was on vacation in Italy and Portugal, and I was still answering my phone on the beach. When you call us, you get me — not an automated machine!"

Schadler says the company has an environmentally friendly approach to disposal in which it recycles items when possible, properly disposes of non-recyclables and resells many items at the Schadlers' secondhand store, Resellables. "We opened that store in Bellingham because we hated to see things thrown away," Schadler says. "We have four kids and sustainability is extremely important to us."

During the business's early days, Schadler provided junk removal on nights and weekends when he wasn't busy working at



a machine shop. Eventually, the business grew into a full-time endeavor, and the Schadlers invested back into the company with new equipment and techniques. "When I first started, for example, we didn't have any tarps. I'm driving around and things are flying out of my truck," Schadler laughs. "I'm like, 'Oh my god, I need a tarp."

Schadler says his wife Christine "was equally as involved" in getting the business off the ground. "She handled the backend while I did the heavy lifting, all while she was working at EMC," he says. "Fast forward 17 years, and we both work full time managing the company as well as other endeavors. Business is doing great; it has grown tremendously to a fleet of trucks and dumpsters, and we've also been able to buy a pizza place, The Corner Market in Holliston."

In addition to delivering an in-demand service to the community, Schadler is appreciative that Affordable Junk Removal has helped provide a work-life balance that suits his family. "It allows me to be able to do what I like doing and spend time with

my kids," he says. "I'm home to see my babies play softball and do all that stuff. We are also able to give back to the communities we serve."

As for Ashland in particular, Schadler says they are proud to have many repeat customers and friends in the area. Prior to owning Affordable Junk Removal, Schadler was a chef at Stone's Public House, and he also has relatives in town. The Schadlers also sponsor Ashland's girls high school hockey team.

One of the best parts of his job, Schadler says, is meeting and getting to know new people and developing relationships with returning customers. "We are really grateful for the repeat business and the chance to form connections with residents across the MetroWest area," he says.

is inspired by our amazing son Lincoln," said Marks.

The organization integrates the children in camps, with the help of one-on-one aides at no cost to families.

How it began

*I stepped down from my dream job as the Ashland Athletic Director so that I could spend more time with my family and be available to help with both of our children; especially given all of the therapies and appointments that our younger son has.

"Additionally, our older son is beginning to play sports himself and now I can be available to coach/watch him. My wife was basically doing it all herself while I often worked 12-14 hour days, and was on call 24/7," said Marks.

The couple runs the nonprofit from their house in Ashland, but partnered with local existing camps.

"Our office is in our house in Ashland, however the camps we have partnered with for the first summer are in Framingham (Pilgrim Day Camp) and Ashland (Ashland rec center)," he said. A couple is busy, raising funds to higher than necessary staffing, and any facilities needs to accommodate campers.

Marks said children with disabilities and their families will benefit from this nonprofit.

"The kids can experience the magic of summer camp with their peers in a fully inclusive setting. It also serves the camps and other campers as we fully believe that campers of all abilities benefit from being together," he said.

"It was our experience where our idea would provide a platform for children with disabilities to be able to attend traditional summer camp while taking the financial burden off families began to form.

"We were fortunate to be able to hire a one-on-one aide for Lincoln and saw the absolute joy he had this past summer alongside friends, peers, and his brother, Logan. The feeling we would get when we would pull into camp and a group of campers would run over screaming "Lincoln is here!," cannot be adequately captured in words. That is the magic of camp!

"We also experienced the financial hardship and stress that providing one-on-one support caused our family and can only imagine how others in similar situations felt. Lincoln was not defined by or labeled as the "kid with special needs," at camp, he was simply a member of his group. He participated in all of the activities with his cohort with his aide by his side, and we saw how powerful and meaningful this experience was for campers of all abilities," said Marks.

How it's going

Marks said the short term goal is to get kids signed up for the summer of 2024.

"Our goal for Linclusion is to provide the financial resources and partnerships with summer camps to support children with disabilities attending. We have secured partnerships with 2 camps already and after our soft launch on social media, have been approached by numerous others. We are aiming to send as many campers as possible to camp, free of financial obligations for added support services in the summer of 2024," he said.

Down the line, he and his wife hope to push the brand out to several camps, offering the option for as many kids as possible to enjoy summer camp without barriers.

"We would like to have a successful model that can be taken and used at other future partner camps; the Linclusion brand. We want to be able to send unlimited numbers of campers to



a number of partner camps. We have been approached by camp directors in other states who have heard about us, and want to partner with us, so potentially expanding to other parts of the



country," Marks said.

Should you invest ... or speculate?

You'll find some big differences between traditional and speculative investments — and knowing these differences can matter a great deal when you're trying to reach your financial goals.

To begin with, let's look at the basic types of traditional and speculative investments. Traditional investments are those with which you're probably already funds, government securities, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on. Speculative investments include cryptocurrencies, foreign currencies and precious metals such as gold, silver and

Now, consider these three components of investing and how they differ between traditional and speculative investments:

The first issue to consider is risk. When you own stocks or stock-based mutual funds, the value of your investments will fluctuate. And bond prices will also move up and down, largely in response to changing interest rates. However, owning an array of stocks — small-company, large-company, international, etc. — can help reduce the impact of volatility on your stock portfolio. And owning a mix of short- and long-term bonds can help you defend yourself somewhat against interest-rate movements. When interest rates fall, you'll still have your longer-term

familiar: stocks, bonds, mutual bonds, which generally — but not always - pay higher rates than short-term ones. And when interest rates rise, you can redeem your maturing short-term bonds at potentially higher rates.

> With speculative investments, though, price movements can be extreme as well as rapid. During their short history, cryptocurrencies in particular have shown astonishingly fast moves up and down, resulting in huge gains followed by equally huge, or bigger, losses. The risk factor for crypto is exacerbated by its being largely unregulated, unlike with stocks and bonds, whose transactions are overseen by well-established regulatory agencies. There just isn't much that investors can do to modulate the risk presented by crypto and some other speculative in-

> A second key difference between traditional and speculative investments is the time horizon involved. When you invest in stocks and other traditional investments, you ideally

should be in it for the long term it's not a "get rich quick" strategy. But those who purchase speculative investments want, and expect, quick and sizable returns, despite the considerable risk involved.

A third difference between the two types of investments is the activity required by investors. When you're a long-term investor in traditional investments, you may not have to do all that much, once you've built a portfolio that's appropriate for your risk tolerance, goals and time horizon. After that point, it's mostly just a matter of monitoring your portfolio and making occasional moves — you're not constantly buying and selling, or at least you shouldn't be. But when you speculate in crypto or other instruments, you are constantly watching prices move — and then making your own moves in response. It's an activity that requires considerable attention and effort.

One final thought: Not all speculative instruments are

necessarily bad investments. Precious metals, for instance, are found in some traditional mutual funds, sometimes in the form of shares of mining companies. And even crypto may become more of a stable vehicle once additional regulation comes into play. But if you're investing for long-term goals, such as a comfortable retirement — rather than speculating for thrills and quick gains, which may disappear just as quicklyyou may want to give careful thought to the types of investments you pursue.

Make Sure You're Set for the Season

LANDSCAPE INSIGHTS

Recent New England winters have become famous for their temperature fluctuations – but it's still good to have your outdoor space set for whatever Mother Nature brings.

Here are some tips:

1) Yard clean up — allowing leaves and yard waste to sit on lawns and flowerbeds inhibits

spring growth and can allow disease to take hold. It's time to get your yard pristine for the dormant season. Plus, with unwanted critters looking for winter nests, you need to keep the leaf piles to a minimum. Store yard furniture under cover or in the garage so your space is clear for snow and ice removal.

2) Tree and shrub pruning —

Trees and shrubs represent a big financial investment. Protect that investment with regular maintenance. Broken or damaged branches are an obvious place to start, but trees require pruning every 1-2 years for proper structure and growth. And if your tree is within 10 feet of utility lines or from your house, it absolutely needs to be pruned regularly.

3) Winter lawn care — Yes, lawns are dormant right now, but that doesn't mean they couldn't benefit from some TLC. Keeping your lawn free from leaves and other yard debris discourages disease and pests when the weather starts to warm. And

less lawn debris keeps the grass dryer and prevents snow mold build-up. Plus some types of weeds: chickweed, henbit, and shepherd's purse, actually thrive in the cold and begin their germination in early winter.

4) Protect plants & evergreens — Want your evergreens to stay greener all year round? You need to protect them from New England's harsh winds and colder temperatures. If you have flower or vegetable beds protect the topsoil with mulch. Consider tying up small tree branches for extra support against heavy snow loads and covering plants with burlap to protect them from woodland creatures and winter burn.

5) Check all sprinkler systems are winterized — sprinkler heads and irrigation lines can freeze and burst if they aren't winterized.

6) Gutter cleaning and pressure washing — Our homes took a beating this summer. Gutters and siding need regular cleaning to prevent mold and mildew.

Plus, freezing winter months can turn debris into ice dams so act now to avoid costly repairs in the future.

7) Celebrate the season — chase away the winter chill with holiday lights and festive garlands. Hanging lights throughout your garden turns bare, leafless trees into magical wonders you can enjoy all year. Make sure you get help hanging anything on the higher branches.

If You Fail To Plan, You Are Planning To Fail.

Making New Year's resolutions to improve your financial wellness in 2024?

Do they look familiar to last year's?

As Ben Franklin repeatedly said, "If you fail to plan, you are planning to fail".

Let's help you start by recognizing questionable resolutions, including three destined for failure plus what should be considered for successful planning outcomes.

Bad Resolution: Need to start buying "X" to grow my money.

Before buying "X", how does fit into your investment strategy within your financial plan?

Over the last 4 years, crypto, I bonds, meme stocks and cash have had their shiny object moments with investors chasing.

If to start 2023 one moved their investment strategy to cash based on 2022 performance of stocks and bonds, well... past performance is no guarantee of future results.

Yes, interest rates rose, and one could find ~4-5% CD's. Yet, through December 15, 2023 on Year-To Date returns, several equity indices have significantly outpaced, and certain bond indices have done as well or better.

Recall as treasury yields fall in anticipation of Federal Reserve

action and/or economic outlook, bond funds and ETFs participate in this inverse relationship - interest rates fall, bond prices rise. When bond prices rise, this increases the value of bond funds/ETFs. Just like in 2022, when rates rose, value of bond funds/ETFs fell.

Better Resolution: Need to save ______ % and take ______ risk with investments to reach ______ goal.

To truly build assets, you need to save a specific percentage each year, take opportunistic or measured (less) risks AND invest towards your established goal(s), not performance that occurred the year before or one market benchmark.

Bad Resolution: Pay down debt.

Sounds important, but is it? It depends. Tax deductions, interest

rates, duration, fixed or variable, inflation, deflation, depreciation, and impact to your future cash flow ensure all debt is not equal.

Better Resolution: *Execute a debt reduction plan.*

Access all debt, then prioritize on high-interest debt, variable rates, and unsecured. If down to a 3% or lower mortgage, 2% auto loans, and a MassSave at 0%, then maintain required payments, reap benefits of low, fixed rates in an inflationary environment and allocate towards investments outpacing those rates over time.

An exception, if not at $\sim 40\%$ home equity ownership, can make a case to get there and open a HELOC. Beyond flexibility to access equity built and lower total interest paid, can eliminate the opportunity costs of a large cash position for the "what ifs" in life.

Bad Resolution: *Do more for my retirement.*

Buy a lottery ticket, as greater chance of success than this vague "lose weight" resolution tossed by January 10th.

Better Resolution: *How do I retire at 55 or semi-retire in 5 years.*

Now you're analyzing cash flows, balance sheet, contribution rates, investment allocations, taxation, work benefits, college funding, planning for the unexpected and desired lifestyle with expenses in retirement. You'll establish a set of base facts, allowing to then create scenarios, see projections, reverse engineer action steps, and track goals within timelines.

Aggressive timelines create urgency, leading to actions that bring you closer the ultimate retirement accomplishment choice

Now ask yourself, are your resolutions the same as last year?

What different actions are you going to take to make a difference?

Know what Einstein said about doing the same thing over and over and expecting different results

Maybe it's time to socialize your goals, set monthly action items to create fresh start moments and leverage an accountability partner (i.e. Certified Financial Planner) to make your 2024 resolutions happen.



Ashland Fire Dept. member Kirk Thomas one of 35 firefighters to graduate from Firefighting Academy

In November, State Fire Marshal Jon M. Davine and Massachusetts Firefighting Academy Director Jeffrey P. Winn announced the graduation of 35 firefighters from the 50-day Career Recruit Firefighting Training Program.

Among the graduates was Kirk Thomas of the Ashland Fire Dept.

"Massachusetts firefighters are on the frontlines protecting their communities every day, and today's graduates are needed now more than ever," said State Fire Marshal Davine. "The hundreds of hours of foundational training they've received will provide them with the physical, mental, and tech-

nical skills to perform their jobs effectively and safely."

"Massachusetts Firefighting Academy instructors draw on decades of experience in the fire service to train new recruits," said Director Winn. "Through consistent classroom instruction and practical exercises, today's graduates have developed the tools they'll need to work seamlessly with veteran firefighters in their home departments and in neighboring communities as mutual aid."

The graduating firefighters of Class #315 represent the fire departments of Ashland, Attleboro, Beverly, Concord, Fitchburg, Harwich, Haverhill, Hopedale, Hopkinton,



Manchester-by-the-Sea, Marlborough, Methuen, Orleans, Revere, Seekonk, Tewksbury, and Weston.

Basic Firefighter Skills

Students receive classroom training in all basic firefighter skills. They practice first under non-fire conditions and then during controlled fire conditions.

To graduate, students must demonstrate proficiency in life safety, search and rescue, ladder operations, water supply, pump operation, and fire attack. Fire attack opera-

tions range from mailbox fires to multiple-floor or multiple-room structural fires. Upon successful completion of the Career Recruit Program, all students have met the national standards of NFPA 1001, Standard for Fire Fighter Professional Qualifications, and are certified to the levels of Firefighter I/II and Hazardous Materials First Responder Operations by the Massachusetts Fire Training Council, which is accredited by the National Board on Fire Service Professional Qualifications.

Today's Firefighters Do Much More than Fight Fires

Modern firefighters train for and respond to all types of hazards and emergencies. They are the first ones called to respond to chemical and environmental emergencies, ranging from the suspected presence of carbon monoxide to gas leaks to industrial chemical spills. They may be called to rescue a child who has fallen through the ice, an office worker stuck in an elevator, or a motorist trapped in a crashed vehicle. They test and maintain their equipment, including self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA), hydrants, hoses, power tools, and apparatus.

At the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy, recruits learn all these skills and more, including the latest science of fire behavior and suppression tactics, from certified fire instructors. They also receive training in public fire education, hazardous material incident mitigation, flammable liquids, stress management, and self-rescue techniques. The intensive, 10-week program involves classroom instruction, physical fitness training, firefighter skills training, and live firefighting practice.

The MFA provides recruit and in-service training for career, call, and volunteer firefighters at every level of experience, from recruit to chief officer, at campuses in Stow, Springfield, and Bridgewater.



State Tournament - the Ultimate Goal

Cam Antoniuk has advanced into the State Wrestling Tournament the past few years for Ashland.

Unfortunately, both times he found himself losing in the first round. As a sophomore he fell to Norton's Jason Winston in his first State appearance and last year Oisin Cullen of Wakefield ended his season.

Along with the other Ashland grapplers, Antoniuk finished second in the Division 3 Central State Tournament, five points behind the leader Tri-Country.

The Ashland resident didn't begin his wrestling career until he was in eighth grade. Prior to stepping onto the mat, he found himself participating in football, a sport he has played since the third grade.

"Cam is a two-sport athlete for Ashland. On the football field this past season, he was named to the Tri-Valley League All Star team as well as being the school's top passer and either the second or third best rusher, wrestling coach Peter Zacchilli said. "His competition level is so high on both the field and the mat; it sets him up to be an athlete. He's not that big, strong or a real phenomenal athlete, but he outcompetes everyone he goes up against."

The Clocker Coach went on to say that during Bellingham this year Cam, the Ashland quarterback, could find no one open and when the pocket broke down around him, he was forced to run. Run he did, causing six different Bellingham players to miss tackles as he scampered into the endzone for a touchdown.

"That Bellingham game was what he does – he wears his opponents down," Zacchilli said. "On the mat he'll grind for the full six minutes and when the time is up, there is no one that wants to be on the mat with him."

Antoniuk got involved with wrestling as he found that many people around him looked up to the sport and Coach Zacchilli convinced him to get on the mat and give the sport a try. Although it was an immediate love and connection for the sport, it was also very intimidating to the then young wrestler.

"It's not like football, you're on that mat all by yourself and everything is on you. Not only that, but everyone is focusing on just you and that puts a lot of pressure on you to do well," Antoniuk said. "The very first time I wrestled in a varsity match was definitely weird. I really don't remember anything about that first match or how I did; it was probably not that good."







Following that inaugural season, the Ashland wrestler began staying after practice working harder while pushing himself to become a better wrestler. He also began to run to increase his stamina, which helped him tremendously with his energy throughout his matches.

"I believe that with all my hard work I had gotten an advantage on the mat. It keeps me going mentally as well as physically," he said. "During my first tournament, although I didn't come out on top, I did have the stamina to continue. My opposition would beat me up it eh first period, but I seemed to be able to use my skill to comeback."

Last winter Antoniuk was more offensive minded on his feet and able to score points; his style was very tough for his opponents to keep up with him. "His intensity as well as his level of toughness began at the start of the match and continued right to the to the end," the Ashland Coach said. "It was not easy on the kids he was wrestling — Cam was non-stop and put forth a relentless pursuit on the mat. I can't wait to watch him perform this year.

Last year the then-junior was wrestling at 145 pounds, but he put on about 30 pounds to help him succeed in football which will put him in a great position to wrestle this season.

"Putting the weight on allowed me to perform better on the football field," Antoniuk said. "It was also really nice to be able to eat once the wrestling season ended last year."

The senior is looking for not only his team to win a State Tournament, but he also wants to capture a championship for himself in whatever weight class he happens to wrestle in this season. He feels that he has worked hard during the off-season once again and believe that it is absolutely possible.

"I have been playing football for a very long time and when I was younger, I'd have to say it was my top sport," he said. "But I think last year as a junior, wrestling took over that number one spot due to all the extra work that I have put into the sport; it's become a bigger part of my life."

Now all that is left to do is for Antoniuk to go out and wrestle the best to his ability and hopefully that will not only help his team to a State Title but will also allow him to stand atop that stand following the Championship match.




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The Importance of Home Inspections

Home inspections are an invaluable part of the home-buying process when you're making a decision on one of the biggest investments in your life.

Your real estate agent can tell you things like how a house is priced in relation to "comps" (comparable properties) nearby, or which financing programs a house might qualify for. But a state-licensed home inspector is trained to find the things that might not be obvious to you or your real estate agent. Your home inspector will be able to find problems such as faulty wiring, foundation cracks, mold and more, so you won't have any unwelcome surprises once you settle into your new house.

While a home inspector can't diagnose or fix a problem, knowing there's an issue gives you leverage to negotiate a lower price or ask the seller to pay for needed repairs, as well as make sure your new place is safe. For example, if your home inspector finds a mildew-like substance in the attic, they typically would suggest contacting a mold specialist to investigate further. If the heating system isn't working properly, they would advise calling in an HVAC specialist. Home inspections are a prime opportunity for buyers to perform due diligence before purchasing.

Home inspectors are required to objectively report on a checklist of items, including structural, safety and mechanical items. The inspection generally takes about two to four hours and is a great chance for buyers to learn more about their home, its systems and its equipment. The inspector will walk through the entire house and examine the foundation, roof, exterior walls and siding, windows and doors,

plumbing and electrical systems, HVAC system, fireplace and chimney, attic and basement, and major appliances.

Sellers also can opt for a prehome inspection before putting their house on the market. For sellers who have the budget to fix any problems that crop up during an inspection, this helps ensure that the buyer's inspection will go well and greatly decrease the possibility of the buyer backing out of the deal. A pre-home inspection also is an attractive option to buyers in markets with high demand or where multiple offers are expected, because it can help buyers feel more comfortable about waiving their own inspection to expedite the process. However, pre-home inspections aren't right for all sellers. If a problem

is found, not fixed and reported to your real estate agent, the agent then is liable to disclose the problem to prospective buyers, which could affect the marketability of the property.
