**ELK GROVE, CA (MPG)** -The city of Elk Grove announced on Jan. 10 that it has reached a tentative settlement in a lawsuit filed by the developer of the proposed Oak Rose Apartments. Details remain sparse as negotiations continue, but the agreement would move the development out of Old Town Elk Grove to a different part of the city.

Elk Grove City Council

in July 2022 denied an appeal asking for expedited review of the 67-unit, three-story Oak Rose development. The low-income apartments would have been located on a 1.2-acre lot at 9252 Elk Grove Blvd., just west of Waterman Road. This affirmed a similar decision reached by the Planning Commission.

The developer, Oak Rose Apts LP, subsequently sued, alleging inconsistencies in how the city applied *Continued on Page 3* 

## No Foul Play in Local Man's Death

**ELK GROVE, CA (MPG)** -Investigators have ruled out foul play in an Elk Grove man's death, which coincided with an electrical fire that ignited ammunition, piercing a neighbor's wall.

Elk Grove Police Department received a call at about 6:30 p.m., Jan. 11, from a resident of a duplex on Aizenberg Circle who had discovered a bullet hole in their wall, the agency reported in a post on social media. "As officers were on their way, the caller stated they could smell smoke and see flames coming from the neighbor's (residence)," the post read. "Cosumnes Fire Department arrived and was able to put out a small fire inside the house." Inside the residence, fire personnel found an unresponsive man, who was transported to a local hospital, where he later died. He "did not have any obvious signs of trauma," the police said. The Sacramento County Coroner's Office identified the man as 30-year-old Alexander Lowton of Elk Grove. As of Jan. 16, his cause of death was listed as "undetermined." In an update on Jan. 12, the police said arson investigators had determined that the fire originated from an "electrical source," and the heat caused ammunition in the residence to explode and shoot through the duplex wall. "Following a thorough investigation, detectives have concluded that the death of the 30-yearold man, who was the sole occupant of the residence, is not suspicious, and foul play has been ruled out," the post read.

## Historical Society Kicks Off Speaker Series

**ELK GROVE, CA (MPG)** -The Elk Grove Historical Society held the first in a series of presentations on Elk Grove and California history with a travelogue inspired by the last known member of a Native American tribe.

The talks are held on

the third Monday of the month, January to June and September to October. They start at 6:30 p.m. in the Elk Grove Presbyterian Church at 8153 Elk Grove Blvd.

David Stuart gave the first presentation of the year. He has held leadership positions at various museums, including the Sacramento Science Center and the Sacramento History Museum, and before retirement he led San Joaquin County Historical Society and Museum. This was his fourth talk for the Elk Grove Historical Society.

He recounted a trip to the foothills north of Chico, to the region where the last known member of the Yahi Native Americans was born and lived. He was accompanied by Stewart Barber, who regularly spent time in the area as a child.

Ishi, of the Yahi people, was born in roughly 1861. The Yahi had traditionally lived along Mill Creek, a tributary of the Sacramento River, but massacres by white settlers in the 1860s

Continued from Page 1 and 1870s, as well as disease, drastically reduced their numbers. The remaining Yahi hid at the nearby Deer Creek, where thick brush concealed them from settlers.


However, the area was not as resource-rich as Mill Creek, and the survivors eventually revealed their presence by stealing food. By 1906, only four Yahi were left alive, including Ishi.

In 1908, settlers stole the Yahi's supplies. What happened next is unclear, Stuart said, but eventually Ishi was left alone at Deer Creek. He appeared, emaciated, in Oroville in 1911. His hair was short, possibly a sign of mourning.

He was housed by anthropologists a t University of California, Berkeley, where he lived the rest of his life. He was known to carve arrowheads for children visiting the university's museum.

Ishi died of tuberculosis in 1916. While Ishi's body was cremated, his brain was preserved and sent to the Smithsonian Institution. It was not repatriated until 2000, when Native tribes protested. Numerous indigenous remains are still in the possession of universities in the United States.

Remarking on the environment of Mill Creek, Stuart said that Black Rock, a "beautiful" landmark, "towers over Mill Creek and this campground." He said the area is characterized by volcanic soil and the "beautiful stream" that persists even with low water levels due

to California's drought.

Historical society board member Louis Silveira said he draws on his connections to people interested in local history to find speakers for the series.

"Personally, I think history does a couple things," Silveira told the Citizen. "It binds us; it's something we all have in common. And second of all, I think people learn from history, the good and the bad. And the topics are wide-ranging, and there's something that will interest somebody somewhere."

Author Amy Gorder will give the next talk in the series on Feb. 19. She will discuss her historical

mystery novels, "Ghosts of Autumn" and the upcoming "Ghosts of Winter," which are written for elementary-school and middle-grade readers. The plot kicks off when plans are announced to turn the Gold Rush-era Elk Grove Hotel into a golf course.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - SMUD's Board of Directors elected Gregg Fishman as Vice President of the Board, effective January 1, 2024, through December 31, 2024. Gregg was first elected to the SMUD Board of Directors in January 2015 and represents Ward 3, which includes East Sacramento, much of the Arden-Arcade area, and the Campus Commons, College Glen, and Rosemont neighborhoods, as well as parts of Carmichael, Florin, Fruitridge and Vintage Park.

Vice President Fishman has been a clean energy advocate for much of his career. As a former SMUD employee, he promoted wind and solar energy when they were in their infancy. ## **CSD Lifeguard Training Starts Next Week**

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - A series of upcoming academies will train those interested in working as a lifeguard for Cosumnes Community Services District (CSD). The Lifeguard Start Academies are "designed to help train participants to pass the American Red Cross Lifeguard Course prerequisites," according to the CSD's description.

Those prerequisites include a 300-yard continuous swim (freestyle or breaststroke); two minutes treading water; and a one-minute,

40-second timed brick retrieval in deep water. The CSD course will also give instruction on rescue skills, first aid, CPR/AED and the responsibilities of a professional lifeguard.

There are three sessions available, each taking place on two consecutive Saturdays: Jan. 27 and Feb. 3, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.; Feb. 24 and March 2, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.; and March 30 and April 6, noon to 4 p.m.

Enrollment is free of charge, and participants should be at least 15 years old. To register and get more information, visit CSD's activities website at bit.ly/3tOqr3O (case sensitive).

Continued from Page 1 its development code. The California attorney general filed a lawsuit the next year, saying the rejection was in violation of state law.

In a prepared statement, Elk Grove Mayor Bobbie Singh-Allen spoke about the agreement, which she said came "after months of negotiations."

"This is a positive and encouraging development. I am pleased with the constructive discussions with the applicant which includes a relocation of the project. We are still working through the final details for a formal settlement," Singh-Allen said.

A readout on the meeting that Singh-Allen posted on social media also noted that the "settlement in principle ... would involve relocation of the project to an alternative site in the City outside of the Old Town Special Planning Area. The settlement is not final. The details and formal settlement documents still need to be prepared and finalized."

The settlement concerns only the lawsuit filed by Oak Rose, but Singh-Allen told the Citizen that the city is in talks with the state.

In a statement to FOX40, a California Department of Justice spokesperson said, "We are supportive of the collaboration between Elk Grove and the developer of Oak Rose Apartments and optimistic that their agreement is a positive step toward building badly needed supportive housing units."

Oak Rose proposes providing permanent housing for homeless people, along with case management services to help find employment and education, and develop life skills.


The dispute stemmed from questions over how to implement the city's building code in light of a state law intended to help address the state's housing shortage. Senate Bill (SB) 35 provides a streamlined approval process, called ministerial review, for proposed residential developments that meet objective housing standards set by a jurisdiction.

In rejecting ministerial review for Oak Rose, Council focused on its inclusion of first-floor residential units, which it argued was a violation of the building code for the Old Town Special Planning Area.

Oak Rose said the requirement — that the ground floor be reserved for pedestrian-oriented commercial uses - was applied inconsistently, with flexibility granted to an earlier market-rate project. The developer additionally said it invoked a provision of SB 35 that should have compelled the city to approve ministerial review, regardless of the city's ground-floor regulation.

On Jan. 9, Oak Rose asked the judge in the lawsuit to order the city to approve its application. The city council had planned to review the application again at its Jan. 10 meeting, with a recommendation from city staff to approve the proposal; however, with the tentative settlement, Council continued the matter to its Jan. 24 meeting. The agenda for the meeting, along with further details on the settlement, was set to be published on Jan. 19. ★



## Property Rezone and Subdivision Approved in Area on Bader Rd

**ELK GROVE, CA (MPG)** - After a Special Meeting on January 9, 2024, the Elk Grove City Council announced that the City had reached a tentative settlement with the developer for the Oak Rose Apartments project—which has been the subject of a lawsuit against the City of Elk Grove after the City Council denied the project at the proposed Old Town location.

The settlement would involve relocating the project to an alternative site, outside of the Old Town Special Planning Area. The details and formal documents for the settlement still need to be finalized.

At the January 10, 2024, Regular Meeting, the Council was scheduled to reconsider the Oak Rose project, but they continued the item in light of the tentative settlement agreement. The agreement will now be considered at a future meeting, scheduled for January 24, 2024.

The Council then considered a rezone and tentative subdivision map for 8651 Bader Rd., which is located on the south side of Mix Ln., north of Sheldon Rd. and east of Bader Rd, within the Elk Grove Rural Area Community Plan. The property is just over 10 acres and contains one existing single-family residence that will remain on site.

The current zoning for the property is Agricultural Residential-Minimum 5-acre (AR-5). The proposed rezone would change the designation to Agricultural Residential-Minimum 2-acre (AR-2), and the subdivision would split the property into four parcels ranging in size from 2.3 to 3.6 acres. The General Plan land use designation of Rural Residential (RR) will be retained, so connections to public water and sewer facilities will be prohibited on the new parcels. Instead, private wells and septic systems would need to be installed for any future residences.

Access to the site comes from Bader Rd. via Mix Ln, which extends across the property's northern edge from east to west. The site is surrounded by AR-2 and AR-5 properties, with single family residences to the east, west, south, and north. No new construction is proposed as part of this subdivision and rezone, but any future development will have to comply with the City's Climate Action Plan measures for new single-family dwelling construction.

The Planning Commission reviewed the application in December, and they received two written comments from the public, which expressed concern that Mix Ln. needs improvements if there will be more traffic traveling on it. There was also concern about potential light pollution from future development on the new parcels. The applicant has agreed to make improvements to Mix Ln., and any lighting issues will be reviewed as part of the building permit process for future construction.

A portion of the property's northeast corner is located in the 100-year floodplain, so any construction on that new parcel would need to be elevated above the floodplain level. But Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) enacted a moratorium in July 2023 prohibiting fill within the floodplain. So, until that moratorium is lifted or revised, no building permits will be issued for that parcel.

During Public Comment on this item, Shawn Somers with CWE Engineering spoke on behalf of the property owner. Somers said he is the civil engineer on the project and has been working with the owner for a couple years on this proposal. He said that it seems like a "fairly straightforward subdivision," but dealing with FEMA's new moratorium did complicate things somewhat. But he said he's "excited to move it forward."

The Council voted unanimously to approve the rezone and subdivision map for 8651 Bader Rd.

## DWR Announces Initial State Water Project Allocation of 10 Percent for 2024

#### DWR News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On December 1, 2023, the Department of Water Resources (DWR) announced an initial State Water Project (SWP) allocation forecast of 10 percent of requested supplies for 2024. The SWP provides water to 29 public water agencies that serve 27 million Californians. The December 1 initial water supply forecast is the first allocation of the new water year and is based on current reservoir storage and an assumption of very dry conditions. So far in October and November, storms have not brought as much rain and snow. "California's water year is off to a relatively dry start. While we are hopeful that this El Niño pattern will generate wet weather, this early in the season we have to plan with

drier conditions in mind," said DWR Director Karla Nemeth. "California's water supply continues to benefit from our aggressive efforts last season to capture record rain and snow melt in our reservoirs and

2.7 million acre-feet in allocated water plus an additional 400,000 acrefeet of supplemental water to SWP contractors in 2023:

To date, Lake Oroville. the SWP's largest reservoir, is at 133 percent of average. San Luis Reservoir, jointly operated by the SWP and Central Valley Project, remains at 109 percent of average. Water stored in San Luis also includes water from 2023 being stored by water contractors for use in future dry years; In coordination with the Metropolitan Water District (MWD), DWR provided water to fill up Diamond Valley Reservoir for the first time in three years. The facility is a critical part of the Southern California water delivery system;

DWR has estimated more than 3.8 million acre-feet of recharge capacity in 2023, including more than 1.2 million acre-feet of groundwater recharge permitted by State agencies, 390,817 acre-feet of flood water recharged using the Governor's Executive Orders, and millions more acre-feet of managed and naturally occurring recharge.





Some of my most rewarding years in chaplain work were those I spent as the Chaplain for Women and Children at Sutter Medical Center in Sacramento (2002-2008).

It was there my rounds often took me onto the high-risk maternity unit. Rooms in this unit were filled with scared pregnant women whose doctors had confined them to bed rest in hopes of avoiding a miscarriage.

One afternoon, our unit secretary, Jeannette, told me about a patient who was expecting twins, but her 23-week pregnancy was being threatened by severe complications.

"Her husband is a youth minister, so she has a lot of church friends in her room now," Jeannette said.

Jeannette's unusually quiet demeanor told me she was worried. "Maybe you could go introduce yourself. Might help if things go south."

## When Faith Doesn't Meet Our Expectations

Inside the room, the minister greeted me with the typical chorus of religious platitudes.

"These twins are in God's hands. I'm not worried," he said in a dismissive manner. "We know God will heal these babies."

The atmosphere of the room had me nearly convinced. It was adorned with religious books, greeting cards and Bibles. The family played sacred music and wore pious jewelry on their necks and earlobes.

So I took the minister's hint and excused myself, figuring my time would be better spent elsewhere.

Forty-eight hours later, I returned to the nurses' station where Jeanette whispered, "They're really going to need you now, chaplain. The twins didn't make it."

"They'll need me, but will they want me?" I muttered.

Jeanette dared me to "give it a shot."

I tapped my watch. "I'm betting they don't give me five minutes."

Prayerfully, I entered the room. It's a risk going where you aren't wanted, even when you wear the chaplain's badge.

Nevertheless, I entered the room and found it in stark contrast to its previous state of smiling church visitors and religious music.

The couple remembered me and invited me to sit.

"We've been in church work for years," the pastor said. "Why couldn't God help us?"

For a moment, I assumed they didn't want a chaplain so I leaned forward to signal my willingness to leave. Yet, amazingly, they continued to unload.

"No, chaplain, stay," insisted the grieving mother.

They seemed to want someone to hear the case they'd built against God, so I stayed and listened.

They sincerely believed God had shortchanged them. They swore they'd never return to church. God wasn't fair. We deserve better. Is God really love? If God loves us, why does he hurt his children?

I was plenty uncomfortable, but I stayed through the barrage, listening to it all with the tenacity of a soldier in a firefight.

I lost my bet with Jeanette. My visit lasted 45 minutes and during the next few days, I was invited for more visits.

On the day our patient was discharged, her youth-pastor husband said to me, "You probably wonder why we let you stay after we'd dismissed our congregants."

I did.

"You were the only one willing to listen to our gripes about God," he said.

"I was taken by your honesty," I said. "You voiced your complaints directly to God. Often people aren't that authentic. Instead of telling God exactly what they are feeling, they talk smack about God behind his back.

"I think God understands your talk. After all, God saw his son die, too."

They nodded, thanking me for not trying to change their minds or judge them.

"Just make sure you keep up the conversation with him," I said with a cracked smile.

I phoned their home a few times in the weeks that followed and found that they were still having daily conversations with God. And while those conversations didn't sound much like their usual church prayers, I know God heard every word.

I'd bet Jeanette that I wouldn't be allowed into the couple's room, much less their lives. But because I listened to them without trying to defend or explain God, the couple allowed me a place in their sacred grief.

In the end, that's a gamble I'll take every time.



Derek Hill – signed a minor league/non-roster invitee contract with the Rangers, Dec. 27. Was released by the Washington Nationals Oct. 6 after spending a year with the club.

Dom Nunez - last season was in Triple-A with the Pittsburgh Pirates. Has not signed any contract for 2024.

David Freitas - nothing is for certain for Freitas in 2024. Last year he played at Triple-A Oklahoma City in the Dodger organization. 
one point last month, the Wildcats lost five games in a row.






