Ashland launches inaugural "Community Hero Award"

Izzy Assencoa and Joanne Duffy receive posthumously

Igidio "Izzy" Assencoa and Joanne Duffy have each received, posthumously, one of Ashland's first Community Hero Awards. Both recipients died in 2023.

"On behalf of the Council on Aging, we could not have two more appropriate and deserving recipients of the inaugural COA Community Hero Award," announced Ashland Council on Aging Vice Chair Steve Mitchell at the Jan. 17 meeting of the Select Board.

Mitchell said the purpose of this new award "is to recognize and acknowledge Ashland seniors who have demonstrated public service and volunteerism in support of the Ashland community; and individuals,

groups, and/or organizations

who have demonstrated and



supported advocacy for Ashland seniors regardless of age or residency."

Mitchell and COA Chair John "Fran" Blake presented the awards to the families of Assencoa and Duffy.

Historic district proposed to govern future aesthetics of downtown Ashland

For the last few years, Jim Neilsen of the Ashland Historical Commission has been thinking about the demolition of buildings in town and how to preserve the character of the downtown area.

Neilsen said creating a local historic district (and related preservation bylaw) "is the only guaranteed way to have some say over what goes in in the downtown."

Currently, said Neilsen, "There's nothing really preventing anybody from taking anything [historic buildings] down if they really wanted to (the demolition delay is for a set period of time). I looked around at what other towns did for conservation and preservation, and what our mission is, which is the preservation of historic and cultural artifacts and buildings in the town of Ashland."

Neilsen said, even though there are signs on Main Street that say "Welcome to the Historic District of Ashland" – "Those signs are just signs, we do not have a local historic district."

He and his board have met with the Massachusetts Historical

Commission, and have worked with an historic preservation consultant to draw a map of the proposed district.

Neilsen said, "The proposed district literally starts at the Ashland Historical Society (the Ocean House), it continues along Main Street to the mill buildings...then down to The Corner Spot, the building next to the church, down that side of the street all the way down and around to where Erica's is right now (the restaurant) — that includes the library, that includes all those buildings on Front Street right there. And across the street, it goes from The Corner Spot all the way down to the Post Office which includes the Town Hall, John Stone's, the fire station, around the corner to the Post Office, across the street to the old pharmacy, the building next to it, then across the street to the railroad station, and back around."

Neilsen said that not all buildings in the district are historical but if a building were to be torn down,


any new construction would have to abide by the guidelines of the proposed bylaw which would influence the exterior architectural aspects of buildings within the district.

"There's nothing about use or anything like that, people can do whatever they want with their buildings or properties; what this is, is strictly for what you can see from the street. So, if there's something behind the building, or backyard, or something like that, it wouldn't be historically relevant, it doesn't matter - it's what you can see from the street."

Neilsen said that none of the buildings within the proposed district are on the National Register of Historic Places except for Town Hall.

Ashland Historical Commission member Helen Nickole said, "We do want to install, in the community itself, a sense of history and a sense of place that you have when you belong in a community, and when you have the history of the community sitting right there so that you have - what is the downtown historic district, or the downtown village area – it's very important for it to remain in character and this will greatly help towards that end."

The Historic Commission should soon receive a final report from the historic preservation consultant; they will work with town counsel to draft a bylaw for fall town meeting (which will require a two-thirds vote to pass); they will meet with various town boards and hold public forums to discuss the proposal.

Ashland Police welcome Jail Diversion Program clinician

At its meeting on Jan. 3, the Ashland Select Board welcomed Kirsten Quern as the town's new Jail Diversion Program clinician.

"The Jail Diversion Program has been an important component of our public safety strategy over many years," said Town Administrator Michael Herbert at the meeting. "Over the last couple of years, we've had difficulty finding and retaining a JDP clinician so I'm pleased to say we do not have that issue any more and we've contracted with Riverside [Community Care] and we have Kirsten Quern here who has accepted that job."

Chief of Police Cara Rossi said the Jail Diversion Program

of hers for more than 10 years. "It is such a vital program for literally every aspect of our community from children to the elderly and everyone in be-

As way of explanation, Rossi said that, "On a typical day, she'll cull through the log and see what transpired the night before and what she could follow up with. So, there was a resident who was having issues with domestic violence last week that she followed through with. There are a lot of people suffering from substance abuse disorder that Kirsten went to a home and assisted with...The hope with Kirsten is that she will cut down with the amount of calls for service because we will get people to the appropriate after-care or services that they need...we're trying to solve the problem."

Rossi said that Quern "has the time, the bandwidth, the training to follow up with these people...hopefully she'll get them the services they need."

Quern told the Select Board, "'Jail Diversion' is a little bit of a misnomer in a way because it's really 'mobile crisis,' and the ability to go to where the issues are happening and respond either in the moment or, as the Chief said, that follow-up piece

of just making sure that we're checking in and getting people connected because I know that the police officers don't have the time for that."

Quern is a licensed social worker and previously worked with Riverside in a mobile crisis

The position is grant-funded.

Your Money, Your Independence

Frugal February... A Different Take, One That's Sustainable.

Seen the "Frugal February' challenge recently?

The main idea is following holiday indulgences and resolutions being forgotten, use February (only 28 days) to do something difficult but important – get your finances back on track.

Popularity has grown amongst the F.I.R.E. (Financial Independence, Retire Early) bloggers. You know, the supposedly "retired at 33" gurus that post multiple times a day to promote a website with 6 Google ads and links for annual subscriptions payable to their LLC.

The challenge with this challenge?

Many use Frugal February as a month to not spend. While noble, how sustainable is this for improved outcomes, "Wow, \$2,200 saved last month, we deserve a vacation in the Caribbean!"?

Instead, let's discuss actions that provide yearlong benefits plus a better time to start.

Finding Time to Focus.

Weekends are likely full of family activities, kids sports and honey-do lists. Add an unofficial national holiday, Super Bowl

Sunday, and it's easy to be derailed.

So wait, start February 12th and go through March 11th. Kids activities have a break between winter to spring and family activities may be in a lull.

Focus One: Credit Utilization.

Run your annual credit report. If not above 780, plan to fix so it improves your future cost of borrowing.

Next, review your terms (interest rates, fees, available limits) of credit cards, loans and HELOCs, including the zero balances.

Also consolidate to 2-3 credit cards with high limits, then use one primarily that's paid off monthly. Now it's easier to track expenses for budgeting and maximizing rewards.

Speaking of rewards, shift from air/hotel rewards to cash back automatically used the following month on purchases. Consider how often air/hotel programs update for a destruction of stored value. A \$400 flight now likely needs 25,000 miles, whereas get 5% cash back on annual \$25,000 spend, \$1,250 was used on following month purchases.

Focus Two: Shop Insurance.

Been 3 years since shopped home, auto, umbrella and/or pet insurance? Good chance it increased over +30% without any claims to "cover increasing costs".

While partially true, consider, "We noticed you're still here, so we're betting on autopay and inertia to increase profits."

Focus Three: Your Automatic Payments.

Review all automatic payments and use of those services/products.

Yes, it's easy to cancel Peacock after a NFL playoff game. But what of subscriptions on products shipped by Amazon, Instacart, DoorDash? Are you still using it, how frequently and can it be found at a lower price?

What of new bundles offered to better meet your needs? Talking about subscription plans for your cellphone, internet, cable/streaming, music, fitness, data storage, kids gaming, kids activites, club memberships, pet supplies, etc.

Focus Four: Organize to Live with Less.

Declutter, purge, or just throw (bleep) out. Feng Shui touts the benefits of energy and flow, but to me it reduces the need to buy stuff that will re-clutter your space.

Speaking of space, if paying for a storage unit, please stop. At \$200 a month, \$2,400 annually and \$12,000 over 5 years, is the crap not good enough to be in your home worth \$12,000?

How about even \$1,000? Prove it by listing for sale.

Get \$600, then a \$3,000 win/ win (or 3X return) over next 12 months.

Select Board found in violation of open meeting law due to untimely minutes

Members to attend specialized training due to 'intentional violation'

At a meeting of the Ashland Select Board in January, Town Manager Michael Herbert said the Massachusetts Attorney General's Office had found the town in violation of the open meeting law.

Herbert said, "As an overview, we did receive correspondence from the AG...they did find that the [Select] Board had violated the open meeting law by failing to timely approve five sets of minutes."

The original complaint, dated June 8, 2023, referenced seven sets of minutes but the Attorney General's Office found that two sets had been filed appropriately.

Herbert said the AG's office "did determine this was an 'intentional violation' only in the sense that they had talked to us about this before and so it was a repeat violation. They did acknowledge the fact that, what we were trying so do is we were trying to reconcile some older meeting minutes that we were trying to clean up, and so therefore they did not issue a civil complaint."

Select Board Chair Robert Scherer said the infraction was not intentional. Select Board Vice Chair Yolanda Greaves agreed. "It wasn't 'intentional.' We didn't purposely forget, we didn't. But I do know that, through the years, we've had sometimes difficulty getting our meeting minutes done and updated and approved; so I think now we're on a better schedule, we're getting them done on a timely basis, and I think that our goal has to be to maintain that schedule."

The AG directed Select Board members to attend a webinar related to the open meeting law.



Ashland's 100% Green Energy Program

Ashland is continuing the Municipal Aggregation Program for residents and businesses. The Program rate will be \$0.15988 per kWh and uses 100 percent green energy which is MAReq and 25% MA Class Recs. The basic Eversource service rate is \$0.17215 per kWh.

"We're pleased to continue offering an electric supply price that is less than Eversource's basic service rate. As Eversource costs continue to rise, participants in the program should see even more savings in the future." said Town Manager Michael Herbert.

No action is required by individual consumers. All accounts currently enrolled in the Program continue to be enrolled.

There are no enrollment, early termination, or cancellation fees attached to the Ashland electricity program. Residents who choose to opt-out can also opt-in at a later date if they so choose at no cost. However, anyone switching from a contract with a third-party supplier may be subject to penalties or early termination fees charged by that supplier. Ratepayers should verify terms before switching.

Basic Service rates change twice a year or more, depending on rate class. As a result, the aggregation rate may not always be lower than the Basic Service rate. The goal of the aggregation is to deliver savings over the life of the program against Eversource Basic Service. However, such savings and future savings cannot be guaranteed.

How would you handle forced early retirement?

When you plan to retire at a certain age, you can follow a strategy that incorporates your investment moves, your health insurance and other factors. But what happens if you're forced to retire earlier than you anticipated?

Unfortunately, this situation is not that uncommon. About 40% of Americans say they have been forced into retirement, according

to a recent survey from Edward Jones and Morning Consult, a research firm. If this were to happen to you because of a layoff, company downsizing or a health issue, would you be prepared to maintain your lifestyle today — and in the future?

Everyone's situation is different. If your forced retirement happened only a short time before you actually expected to retire, you might not need to take any steps at all. But if it was a matter of a year or more, you may need to look into the following areas:

• Cash flow – Obviously, a sudden, unexpected loss of employment will affect your cash flow. And if yours was the only source of income for your household, the situation could be especially concerning. Still, you may well have options that can help. You might find a part-time job, for one thing — many employers hire seniors for various types of service-oriented work. And if you've built an

emergency fund containing several months' worth of living expenses, now might be the time to tap into it. You also might need to start withdrawing funds from your IRA and 401(k), though, ideally, you'd like to delay this move as long as possible, as these withdrawals may be taxable.

• Health insurance - Health insurance can be a major concern if you face an unexpectedly early retirement. Once you're 65, you'll be eligible for Medicare, but what if you haven't reached that age? Through the COBRA legislation, you might be able to remain on your employer-based health insurance for a while — typically 18 months after your job ends. However, COBRA is expensive: If you're qualified, you might have to pay the entire premium for coverage, up to 102% of the cost of the plan, according to the U.S. Department of Labor. If you're

married, you might be able to get on your spouse's health insurance, but if this option isn't available, you could explore a Marketplace plan by visiting the healthcare.gov website.

• Social Security - A forced early retirement could affect your decision on when to start taking Social Security. You're eligible to begin collecting payments at 62, but your checks will be considerably bigger if you wait until your full retirement age, which is likely between 66 and 67, depending on when you were born. If your sudden retirement puts you in a real cash crunch, you might have to start taking payments regardless of your age, but if you have enough in savings, or your spouse's income is enough to keep you afloat, you may want to wait as long as possible so you can get the larger checks. Of course, if your retirement comes while you're still several years away

from Social Security eligibility, you won't have to make this now-or-later decision right away.

Being forced to retire before you planned can certainly be challenging. But by looking at the options available to you, in terms of finances and health insurance, you may well find choices that can help you minimize the disruption to your life.

Its mission is to serve as a catalyst for developing awareness, understanding, and informed opinion on U.S. foreign policy and global issues. Each year The Foreign Policy Association selects critical topics related to major issues in the areas of US Foreign policy and international affairs. They publish the Great Decisions briefing book with chapters on the selected topics written by diplomats, policy experts, academics, and foreign-service professionals who are experts in their field. These articles provide background information, current data, and policy opinions and serve as the focus for each Great Decisions group meeting.

For the Love of the Game

In the past, the Ashland Youth Softball program was an important part of the feeder program to the high school.

However, a few years back, it seemed to go away, and the two entities were separate units. That is until last year when not one, but both groups found themselves with new leaders. Matt Matsen took over the high school softball team and Sean Weglage became the Vice President of the youth softball program in town. Together the two formed a bond that would eventually unite the programs once again.

"After deciding to build a partnership last year in our first years, we wanted to take it to the next level this year and do more," the second-year Softball Coach said. "This year we're looking to have clinics with youth coaches. All of our high school players have gone through the program and our future players are going through it now."

According to Weglage, it will be the first time in some five or six years that Ashland will have winter clinics with the high school's involvement. The Clocker athletes will be helping out the youth program looking to bring synergy back.

"Matt and I seem to be cut out of the same cloth so joining forces shows that the high school and youth softball programs in Ashland can come together," Weglage said. "The youth program is supposed to be the feeder program to the high school in addition to showcasing the program and how the players are moving up the ladder and eventually into the high school."

Over the past few years lacrosse has been pulling athletes from the softball field during the spring while club soccer and flag football have been taken athletes during the fall season. Weglage also noted that as the kids get older, the softball numbers have seemed to dwindle.

Matsen had coached 18 years in the Shrewsbury youth program before coming to Ashland to take over the Softball Coaching duties and he realized there needed to be a partnership.

"We are looking to get kids interested in the sport at a younger age once again and have them continue to play while high school players are now able to give back to the youth programs that they came up though," he

Matsen believes that the high school program will benefit from joining forces with the town's youth league. The Ashland coach noted that by the time that athletes arrive at the high school if they have any type of mechanical issues, it is usually too late to fix. However, if they catch it early on in the program it becomes not only better for the athlete but also the program down the line.

The two have also added fundraising to the partnership as there are always things that you can do outside of the normal ways of raising money. This year they have combined used equipment swap in addition to fund raising for the programs. "For the Love of the Game" will be held on March 2, and is organized in memory of Coach Andy Lymburner, a longtime Vice President, and Coach of







."By joining forces once again we want to show the kids how great it is to be playing a sport in a season for a team," Weglage said. "But it is much more than that - it's more about becoming a family."

Ashland Youth Softball. Weglage also noted that although they cannot name a field after the coach, they have been able to dedicate the Warner School field in his honor with a sign.

Having started on Jan. 10 and continuing through March 13, the two programs will be having all sorts of clinics with MetroWest providing the facilities and Planet Fast Pitch the instructors. Pam Curtis, a softball player and the first female to play baseball in Ashland will also be helping out to give the kids the opportunity to learn the game. On March 30 they will host a softball Jamboree that began three years ago a pre-season tournament hosted by Ashland. Last year it was cancelled due to rain.

The two groups will also hold a mock middle school tryout showing the athletes that is not just something that you show up for, but how to prepare and get ready to take part in one.

Opioid Use Disorder

Signs of opioid abuse may be hard to see clearly, especially in someone close to you. Taking potentially addictive drugs not as prescribed or for an extended period of time increases the risk of misuse and addiction. Studies suggest that up to one-third of people who take opioids for chronic pain misuse them, and more than 10 percent become addicted over time.

If you have someone close to you who obtains opioids without a prescription, he or she is at increased risk of addiction. Persons using opioids that are obtained from unregulated sources are at increased risk of drug-related death. Drugs that pass hands illegally, such as fentanyl, may be

laced with life-threatening contaminants or much more powerful opioids. And people who use opioids illegally often turn to heroin, a cheap replacement with similar effects.

If your intuition is telling you there's a problem, speaking up could save the life of someone close to you. Reach out to your loved one's doctor who may be a critical partner if you determine it is time to take action. You may also contact SAMHSA (https://www.samhsa.gov/find-help/national-helpline) or SAMHSA's National Helpline at 1-800-662-HELP (4357) for confidential, free, 24-hour-a-day, 365-day-a-year, information service for individuals and family members

facing mental and/or substance use disorders. This service provides referrals to local treatment facilities, support groups, and community-based organizations. You may also reach out to Ashland's Department of Prevention and Human Services at 508-881-0140.

Narcan is a life-saving drug that reverses the effects of opioids like heroin and fentanyl. Giving Narcan restores normal breathing and can prevent death of a loved-one, co-worker, neighbor...anyone who is experiencing an overdose caused by prescription narcotics or heroin.
