## It's All About Teamwork

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On March 7, a press conference was held at the West Sacramento Walmart to announce a new tool that will aide in this the fight against theft. Yolo County District Attorney Jeff Reisig, in collaboration with Yolo County law enforcement leaders and asset protection professionals from Walmart, announced the launch of a new Direct-to-DA retailer reporting program designed to dramatically expedite the investigation and prosecution of retail crimes, called "FastPass".

"Over the past few years, I have consistently heard community members express concerns about the disruptions and blatant, bold thefts that many of them have witnessed at some of our

retail businesses," said West Sacramento Police Chief Rob Strange. "D.A. Jeff Reisig was hearing these growing concerns as well. With many daily use items now getting locked up to prevent theft, the shopping experience for our residents has become

increasingly inconvenient at best and fear-provoking at worst. Reisig and I knew that we had to try a different approach to have a better impact, so the Fast Pass program emerged."

"In just the past week, our officers and the loss prevention staff across our

city have been assaulted with weapons twice, including a suspect who fought officers and loss prevention in an attempt to obtain his firearm," Strange said. "In both cases, the offenders were previously convicted felons, one who Continued on page 6

## **Property Tax Delinquent** if Not Paid by April 10

**Yolo County** News Release

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) -The Yolo County Tax Collector's Office reminds taxpayers who own property in Yolo County that the second installment of 2023-24 Secured Property Tax, due February 1, 2024, will be delinquent if not paid by April 10, 2024.

To avoid a penalty, property taxes must be paid by 5 p.m. on Wednesday, April 10, 2024, after which time, a 10 percent penalty will be added. Envelopes must be postmarked no later than April 10, 2024, if taxes are paid by mail. It is recommended that payments be mailed a few days before the April 10 deadline to ensure the envelope will have the proper postmark. The only acceptable postmark for deadline payments is a U.S. Postal Service postmark.

Taxpayers have the option of paying property taxes by credit card (incurring a 2.34% convenience fee) or electronic check (no fee incurred). These payments can be made online at www.YoloCounty.org by selecting the Pay Property Tax icon, or by phone at (877) 590-0714. Payments made using either of these two systems must be completed by 5 p.m. on April 10, 2024, to avoid

## **Regional Business Broadband Master Plan**

**Background & Purpose** Valley Vision has received a grant from the U.S. Economic

Development

Administration (EDA, Department of Commerce) to identify recommendations and create a roadmap for urban, suburban and rural areas in Sacramento, Sutter, Yuba, and Yolo Counties. The priorities set by this plan will accelerate broadband adoption and implementation of cutting-edge internet-based tools and platforms for business operations and assist communities in economic recovery.

#### **Project Activities**

The project activities include connecting with regional Internet Service Providers to identify business internet service levels and collaborating with regional stakeholders on local broadband and digital service needs. Another activity is conducting a business tier broadband gaps/needs analysis of future proof broadband services, digital and online tools, platforms, resources, and digital training to enable businesses to adopt and implement cutting-edge online business operations. Lastly, the project activities involve developing and disseminating a multi-stakeholder Strategic Business Broadband Adoption Plan with resource materials and capacity assistance for organizations working with target businesses and agricultural operations.

Valley Vision, a civic leadership organization serving the Sacramento region, has received a grant from the U.S. Economic Development Administration to research the availability and quality of broadband and Internet service for local businesses and

their digital needs. This analysis will be used to develop a Regional Business Broadband Master Plan to identify strategies, tools, and solutions.

For this analysis, Valley Vision is surveying businesses of all types in the four-county region. The online survey takes just a few minutes and offers an important opportunity to provide input on your existing broadband and Internet conditions and needs. It can be completed on any computer, laptop, smart phone, or device connected to the Internet. County Tax Collector's office will be open until 5 p.m. on April 10, 2024.

Property taxes are a critical funding source for local governments including cities, school districts, local cemetery districts, community colleges, rural fire districts and more. For example, more than half of property taxes received go to local school districts while the property tax portion that rural fire districts receive helps to fund over 90% of their revenue each year. Yolo County receives about 9% of property taxes, which is 9 cents of every dollar. ★

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


#### WILLIAM (BILL) FRANK DELUCIA - 2/17/2024

## **City Council Highlights**

WEST SACRAMENTO. CA (MPG) - Two community members spoke during the public comment section of the March 6 West Sacramento City Council regular meeting.

Guy Stevenson addressed the council members' professionalism and conduct in meetings. When councilmembers have disagreements during meetings, Stevenson said, take the disagreement to the back where the public can't see it. Stevenson also told the council that increased public safety is needed.

Robyn Davis, the second speaker, thanked the council for the continued work regarding tiny homes on wheels and addressed the need for more sustainable housing plans and projects. Davis also said more apprenticeship programs are needed in West Sacramento to fix the shortage of construction workers.

Future Agenda Items - Mayor Martha Guerrero requested discussion on increasing the size of the Parks Commission from seven to nine members. The town continues to grow, Guerrero said, and parks is one area that the community is very engaged. She wants one of the new members to be a youth. City staff recommended that the commission not increase in size but that they investigate other ways that a youth member can be included.

Mayor ProTem Quirina Orozco stepped down and was replaced by Mayor ProTem Dawnte' Early. "I am deeply honored and proud to have been voted by my esteemed City Council colleagues as mayor pro tem, marking a historic moment as the first African American to hold this position in our city," Early said. "It is a privilege to represent and serve the West Sacramento community, and I am committed to upholding our values and aspirations as we work together to build a brighter future for all. This milestone isn't just about me; it signifies progress and opens doors for those who will follow, and I hope it inspires future generations to come."

Also during the meeting, the West Sacramento City Council presented a proclamation declaring the sixth day of March as Women's History Month. The council proudly announced that the City Council made entirely of women and also six out of nine city departments are led by women. City Council proudly supported this proclamation as they gathered



## Fewer Students And Higher Absenteeism Plague California's Public School Financing

California's public schools live – or die – by the numbers.

They are utterly dependent on how much money the state budget allocates each year under Proposition 98, a formula adopted by voters in 1988 that only a few wonks in and around the Capitol profess to understand - and even they often disagree.

Prop. 98 computations are also subject to political horse-trading during each budget cycle. Whatever number emerges is then distributed to school districts, primarily based on "average daily attendance."

California is one of only a few states that use attendance to distribute state aid and a perpetual debate over whether it should continue is becoming more intense because two major factors in school attendance - enrollment and student absences have been regressing.

California experienced rapid population growth over the last two decades of the 20th century, due to a wave of migration from other states and a baby boom. That translated into a 50% increase in K-12 school enrollment, eventually topping out at 6.3 million kids.

After reaching a plateau, however, enrollment started declining as the state began

losing population, thanks tends to have a snowball largely to movements to other states, and as the state's birthrate dropped dramatically.

"Demographic projections suggest enrollment will continue to decline across the state over the coming decade," according to a recent report by the Public Policy Institute of California. "The California Department of Finance (DOF) projects that declines will persist at roughly 40,000 to 60,000 students per year, resulting in enrollment levels below 5.2 million by 2032."

The inexorable decline in enrollment is exacerbated by a startling large number of students who may be enrolled but are chronically absent what once was known as playing hooky.

During the early months of the COVID-19 pandemic almost all of California's schools were closed, but even with online classes, attendance took a nosedive. After schools were reopened, however, chronic absenteeism students missing from the classroom 10% or more of the time – continued to be a problem. Prior to the pandemic 12% of the state's students were chronically absent, but in the first year after schools reopened the rate was 30% and since then has declined marginally to 25%, according to a new PPIC study.

PPIC researchers learned that the most absence-prone children these days are in kindergarten or the early primary grades while, prior to the pandemic, high schoolers

were most likely to be missing classes. "High levels of absenteeism among the youngest

students is particularly con-

cerning since absenteeism

effect: a student is more likely to be chronically absent in later grades if they are chronically absent in earlier ones," PPIC's report noted.

During the pandemic, school finances were bolstered by billions of dollars in federal relief funds and a temporary respite from attendance-based state aid. but both of those programs have expired, so districts are beginning to feel the full impact of enrollment declines and absenteeism.

As the gaps between income and outgo widen, school officials throughout the state are contemplating school closures - which almost always generate neighborhood opposition - while pressing the state to change the attendance-based system.

"Between 2012 and 2021, nearly 700 schools across the state were closed, resulting in roughly 167,000 students being displaced," Policy Analysis for California Education, a multi-university research project, reported recently, adding that "Black students were more likely to experience school closure than any other racial subgroup. Black students represent nearly 14 percent of the student body in schools that were closed."

Demography is destiny and California's school conundrum of declining enrollment, high absenteeism and unstable attendance will become more intense. It warrants urgent attention by the state's political figures, from the governor downward.

I'm trying to work my way out of debt, but it seems like something always happens to stall things or knock me backwards. I make \$55,000 a year, I'm single and I have \$15,000 in debt, along with a mortgage payment of \$1,224 a month. I've been trying to live on a budget, but I'm still not sure where all my money goes. Can you help?

Dear Lindley,

I know living on a budget can be hard at first. And honestly, it usually takes folks who are new to doing it about three or four months of practice before they start getting it right and seeing the results.

\$55,000 a year. I generally recommend keeping your mortgage or rent payment at about 25% of your takehome pay. Sometimes you can slide by paying a little more, but in those cases, you'd really have to be on top of your finances. So, the biggest thing you can do right now is take control of your money, instead of letting it-or a lack of it—control you. And the best way to make all this happen is by consistently living on a realistic, written monthly budget.

Once you start doing this, you've taken your first big step toward having a real gameplan for your money. At that point, the idea of trying to live on a budget ends, and the fact that you are living on a budget, and telling your money what to do-instead of a lack of it dictating what you can do-becomes more of a reality.

Remember the Star Wars movie "The Empire Strikes Back"? At one point during Luke's training, Yoda tells him, "Do, or do not. There is no try." In a larger sense,

Yoda is urging Luke to focus and work harder, instead of continuing with half-hearted attempts and giving up easily. If you want to accomplish a difficult task, Lindley, you have to throw yourself into it completely. You must fully commit, and stop making excuses. You have to focus, and fight to make it happen.

It's no fun waking up broke at the end of every pay period. We both know this. So, put your head down and get your mind in gear. Make. This. Happen.

You can do it!

Continued from page 1 was even on active parole. I am hopeful that the voices of communities across the state will be heard in a manner that recognizes these realities and that effective policy-level change will occur in the current legislative and election cycle."

FastPass is a program that allows retailers to report theft crimes directly to the District Attorney. The theft crimes have already been investigated and documented by store loss prevention or asset protection teams.

"By utilizing the FastPass to prosecution model, we are able to dramatically expedite the investigation and filing of criminal cases and reduce the delay between the time of the crime, the arrest and prosecution. In some cases, it will cut the delay down from months to weeks or even days," Reisig said.

The FastPass program is not designed for first-time offenders but rather for repeat offenders. FastPass is focused on improving collaboration between retailers, prosecutors, police, social service organizations, local policy makers and civic and business groups to tackle systemic drivers of retail crimes, enhance information sharing, prosecute habitual and violent offenders, and propose second-chance opportunities to reduce recidivism.

Since FastPass launched last fall, the Yolo County District Attorney's Office reported that the office has filed criminal cases against 49 suspects, including dozens of felony cases (60%), with total losses exceeding \$100,000. The 49 individuals combined have more than 134 previous theft convictions and 93% of all the offenders have previous arrests, including theft, burglary, robbery, violent assaults and family

"The FastPass to Prosecution project led by D.A. Jeff Reisig and his team in Yolo County is a perfect example of how retailers and law enforcement can collaborate to make communities safer. Every jurisdiction in the country is struggling with limited resources and limited personnel to address the problem of organized retail crime and habitual theft. FastPass can serve as model for prosecutors across the country for how to focus the limited resources of government in partnership with retail asset protection

teams to target high-profile, prolific, and violent criminal actors in the community," said Lisa LaBruno, Retail Industry Leaders Association's senior executive vice-president of retail operations.

FastPass partners currently include Best Buy, CVS, IKEA, Lowe's, Nugget Market, Raley's, Rite Aid, Safeway, The Home Depot, The TJX Companies, Walgreens, and Walmart. The list of partners continues to grow. ★

## **Study Finds Significant Disparities in Diagnosis and Treatment of Dementia**

University of California - Davis Health News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A new study from UC Davis Health and Oregon Health & Science University reveals significant disparities in dementia care. The researchers found that people living with dementia from minoritized racial and ethnic populations are less likely to receive an accurate and timely dementia diagnosis compared to non-Hispanic whites. They were also less likely to be prescribed anti-dementia medication or use hospice care. Minoritized populations are those marginalized due to systemic oppression.

In addition, the study found the same populations have a higher risk of hospitalization and receive more aggressive life-sustaining treatment in end-of-life care. The study was published in Alzheimer's & Dementia: The Journal of the Alzheimer's Association.

"Reducing disparities in Alzheimer's disease and related dementias and receiving timely, high-quality health care services is essential to advance health equity," said Ladson Hinton, first author of the study and a professor in the UC Davis Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences. Hinton is also associate director for research in the Family Caregiving Institute at the Betty Irene Moore School of Nursing at UC Davis.

The researchers conducted a scoping review, identifying and analyzing the results of 71 research studies conducted between 2000 and 2022. The studies examined health care access and quality for people with dementia and their caregivers. The studies reported findings related to race and ethnicity.

"Our review provides timely and compelling evidence of disparities in health care quality and access for people living with dementia from minoritized populations," Hinton said. "It also highlights significant gaps in data, particularly for Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders and American Indians and Alaska Natives populations

#### Statistically significant differences

Of the 71 studies identified, all but one reported one or more statistically significant differences between racial and ethnic groups. For example:

-85.9% of the studies reported findings for Black

-57.7% for Hispanic Americans.

-25.4% for Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders.

-2.8% for American Indians and Alaska Natives.

-32.4% reported aggregate categories for non-white populations.

The most frequently addressed topics in the papers were medication treatment (38%), end-oflife care (22.5%), health service use (18.3%), diagnosis (15.5%), family caregiving (7%) and longterm care (5.6%).

Some of the key findings related to diagnosis and treatment found that compared with non-Hispanic white Americans:

-Minoritized populations received less optimal care and experienced delays in how long it took to receive a diagnosis. In one large, recently published study, it took 11% longer for Black Americans and 40% longer for Hispanic Americans. -Asian American

older adults were less likely to receive a diagnostic work-up for cognitive impairment.

Black and Hispanic American patients were less likely to be referred for neuropsychological testing.

-Minoritized populations had lower rates of prescriptions for anti-dementia medications like cholinesterase inhibitors and memantine.

-Hispanic and Black American older adults had higher discontinuation rates of anti-dementia medications.

#### Disparities in end-of-

There were also disparities in living conditions and end-of-life care. Compared with non-Hispanic white Americans:

-Black Americans with dementia were more likely to have increased hospital admission rates, longer lengths of stay and higher

-Minoritized populations living with dementia were less likely to be in longterm care facilities with special memory care units.

-Caregivers of Black Americans with dementia were less likely to fill out advanced care directives.

Black Americans with dementia were less likely to receive hospice care and more likely to receive feeding tubes and mechanical ventilation during end-oflife care.

"The results of our study highlight the importance on race and ethnicity," said Oanh Meyer, co-author and associate professor in the UC Davis Department of Neurology. "Understanding where the disparities exist will help us address why they occur and how to remedy them at the individual, clinical and health-system level."

#### Achieving equity and closing gaps in health outcomes

The researchers recommend monitoring for disparities at the local level, educating and training clinicians to reduce bias and improve communication, and enhancing the cultural and linguistic competence of clinical care. They also support developing targeted initiatives to empower people with dementia and family caregivers as they navigate the health care system.

The authors also point out that recognizing existing disparities can prompt policy change at the health system level to address systemic racism and promote health equity.

The researchers noted several limitations of their study, including that some studies may have been missed for inclusion and that the underlying factors responsible for the identified differences are unclear and need further research. They note the study also did not include other potential disparities for people with dementia, such as those identifying as LGBTQ, or geographical inequities faced by those living in rural, urban, and suburban areas.

"Ultimately, it's critical that the best available dementia care is attainable and offered to all Americans, particularly those who are left out of novel research innovations because of their race, social standing or place of residence," said Ana R. Quiñones, senior author of the study and an associate professor at Oregon Health & Science University. "To make real progress in achieving equity and closing the gaps in outcomes for Alzheimer's disease and related dementias, we must do more to ensure the most promising interventions are aimed at those who need them the most."

Additional authors of the study include Duyen Tran at UC Davis Health and Kate Peak at Oregon Health & Science University.

### Matsui And Latta Urge Biden Administration to Evaluate All Options help provide certainty for

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG) - Today, House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Communications and Technology Ranking Member Doris Matsui (D-CA) and Chair Bob Latta (R-OH), sent a letter to National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) Assistant Secretary Alan Davidson and Department of Defense (DoD) Chief Information Officer John Sherman, requesting the agencies outline their process for the studies of the lower 3 GHz band as required by the

National Spectrum Strategy. "Clearly articulating the processes your agencies will use to study this band will both federal and non-federal users," wrote the lawmakers.

The National Spectrum Strategy establishes a roadmap to enhance innovation and U.S. leadership in wireless technologies through careful planning and cooperation among government agencies and the private sector. Implementation of the Strategy will promote private-sector innovation and further the missions of federal departments and agencies. The National Spectrum

Strategy requires the NTIA and DoD to co-lead additional studies of the lower 3 GHz band to evaluate opportunities for private-sector access while ensuring vital federal mission capabilities are preserved. A comprehensive study of the lower 3 GHz band will help maximize efficient use of our nation's spectrum resources.

"NTIA developed the National Spectrum Strategy consistent with its statutory role as the sole agency responsible for authorizing Federal spectrum use," the lawmakers continued. "For the lower 3GHz band studies, the NSS directs NTIA and DoD to jointly establish processes that promote the pillars and strategic objectives of the NSS, consistent with the guidance in the Presidential Memorandum." As bipartisan lead-

ers of the Subcommittee on Communications and Technology, the lawmakers seek important clarification from the agencies on how this process will move forward.

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
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
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## Kings Korner By V.G. Harris


## Egg Artists Raise Funds for Shriners Children's Hospital


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
