Free Skills **Training Opportunity** with Yolo **County**

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - Yolo County residents impacted by layoffs are encouraged to take advantage of a free skills training opportunity with the Yolo County Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act (WIOA) Program. The program supports displaced workers by offering financial support for vocational training and certification programs to enhance job prospects. The deadline to engage with the program is April 15.

The Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act Program collaborates with eligible training providers to support dislocated workers with receiving training. Vocational schools in this network include AAA Academy, Asher College, Cal-Trade Welding, California Human Development, Campus, Charles A. Jones Career and Education Center, Colusa County Office of Education, Curam College, Dronitek Flight Academy, Elk Grove Adult and Community Education, Fair Oaks Massage Institute, I-Tap, MIS Iraining Academy, National Career Education, New Horizons, Security and Firearms Training Academy, UC Davis Continuing and Professional Education. Western Truck School and

The Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act Program offers the Yolo County workers who meet eligibility requirements funding of up to \$7,000 for eligible training and education programs; leads regarding employment opportunities and events; guidance in career development and interview preparation; and referrals to support services.

Some eligibility requirements include being a Yolo County adult (18 years old or older) laid off from an employer in the surrounding area and, for males only, being registered for the Selective Service (or have a documented exemption).

Sip and Paint to Raise Youth Funds SACOG Receives \$22.5 Million for Green Means Go Program

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The U.S. Department of Transportation's Reconnecting Communities Grant will advance transportation design and planning projects to address barriers in disadvantaged areas.

The Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG) has received \$22.5 million from the U.S. Department of Transportation to fund the next phase of SACOG's award-winning Green Means Go program. The planning investment will accelerate infill development in ten areas across the region in designated Green Zones, or areas that have been identified for infill development, to reimagine neighborhoods and address transportation needs. By pairing transportation planning and housing investments together in Green Zones, it will help build more complete communities where residents can meet their daily needs more wholistically within their neighborhoods.

The planning projects span various rural and urban areas within the counties of Sacramento and Yuba, and the cities of Citrus Heights, Isleton, Marysville, Rancho Cordova, Sacramento, West Sacramento, Woodland, and Yuba City. These ten areas share similar issues, busy roadways that limit the ability of community members to safely walk, bike, or roll in their neighborhoods and connect to services and jobs without a car. These investments will help increase connectivity and reduce the reliance on driving, which helps the region meet greenhouse gas reduction goals.

Equitable community engagement is a significant emphasis of the project to ensure the involvement of communities who have been traditionally left out of planning processes. SACOG will create a Community-Based Organization (CBO) Working Group and leverage the model created by the agency's Engage, Empower, Implement program to build capacity, trust, and partnerships with CBOs from across the

development in which Community Connectivity Valley Vision, a nonprofit focused on building a livable region, is leading the efforts to create a pipeline of skilled workers. This effort aligns with the region's Prosperity Strategy and considering the long-term needs as development ramps up in Green Zones once planning has been completed, ensuring that available jobs go to our local skilled workforce.

"Our region is like many in the nation struggling with aging infrastructure that no longer serves us, and local governments who want to reinvest in areas to meet the needs of communities today and into the future," said Michael Saragosa, SACOG board chair, and councilmember for the City of Placerville, "A huge thanks to the U.S. Department of Transportation for recognizing Green Means Go efforts and for investing in the Sacramento region."

About Green Means Go

Green Means Go is the Sacramento region's commitment and solution to California's housing, climate, equity, and transportation problems.

The program aims to lower greenhouse gas emissions within its six-county region by accelerating infill development and reducing and electrifying vehicle trips. Green Means Go is a mechanism to target investment in locally designated Green Zones - areas that cities and counties have identified for infill development that also show a reduction in vehicle miles traveled (VMT). Since launching the program in 2018, twenty-six SACOG member jurisdictions have identified and adopted Green Zones. To date, SACOG has deployed over \$38 million in state funds to support Green Zone investments that explore the intersection of land use, housing, economic and workforce development, transportation investments, equity,

and travel choices.

BARBARA BETTY BUNTING BAKER -12/17/1920-2/29/2024

Barbara Betty Bunting was born December 17, 1920 in Bakersfield, Kern County, California. The third child and only girl in the Bunting family. Senator Dodd Names Yolo County Woman of The Year

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sen. Bill Dodd named Rhonda Morningstar Pope Flores on March 7 as Yolo County's Woman of the Year.

Dodd represents portions of Napa, Solano, Sonoma, Contra Costa, Sacramento and Yolo counties.

"Rhonda has dedicated her life to empowering Native Americans and preserving cultural traditions," Dodd said. "Through perseverance and commitment, she's now provided this vital resource for West Sacramento, which will greatly assist our youth and seniors, among others. I am honored to know her and to present her with this well-earned recognition."

Morningstar Pope Flores is chair of the Buena Vista Rancheria of Me-Wuk Indians, a tribe that her great-grandfather founded. Morningstar Pope Flores has played a central role in improving services for Native Americans and West Sacramento residents.

Growing up in West Sacramento, specifically Broderick, Morningstar Pope Flores has actively helped communities for years. She formed the Jesse Flyingcloud Pope Foundation, in honor of her father, in 2007 to support programs designed to help community members with educational opportunities, bringing tribal traditions and cultural awareness to the community. In 2008, Morningstar Pope Flores opened Little Big Time Child Development Center to serve low-income Native American families with a curriculum based in Native American culture.

Morningstar Pope Flores developed plans for the construction of the Upusani Cultural Center that was completed in 2016. She led the tribe in a legal fight against Amador County to allow the development of a casino in 2016. In 2018, Morningstar Pope Flores secured financing for construction of Harrah's Northern California casino.

Morningstar Pope Flores actively participates in community events. She is a financial supporter of the annual Native American Indian Day at the State Capitol, where Little Big

Time has been showcased. Morningstar Pope Flores hosts the annual Elders Dinner. Morningstar Pope Flores also hosts an annual Children's Christmas Event for low-income Native American children and foster care children.

In 2019, Morningstar Pope Flores joined the BBcan (Bryte & Broderick Community Action Network) to advocate for bringing a recreational pool back to the Broderick/ Bryte area. As the Buena Vista Rancheria of Me-Wuk Indians chair, Morningstar Pope Flores advocated the Buena Vista Community Fund to donate \$20,000 to the West Sacramento Police Department in 2021 for the Mercy Housing Project and other programs as well as \$185,000 toward the construction of the Broderick/ Bryte pool.

In 2022, Morningstar Pope Flores utilized resources from the Me-Wuk tribe to purchase the former Bryte Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) on Lisbon Avenue and turned the building into a community center. The community center will provide free tutoring, games and socializing for children. The center will also offer activities, including free yoga classes, free CPR classes and family dances.

"When you see needs in your community, you

inspire one another to bring about the positive changes needed for your community," Morningstar Pope Flores said.

West Sacramento community members familiar with Morningstar Pope Flores are not surprised that she was named Woman of the Year.

"Rhonda deserves this award because of her determination. She is someone that does not back down," said Joe Ramirez, her former softball coach. "It is nice to have someone in our Northside corner. She is someone that is so small with so much courage. She is a great inspiration to Bryte and Broderick. A little keg of dynamite."

West Sacramento Mayor Martha Guerrero was pleased with Dodd's announcement.

"I was delighted by Senator Dodd's announcement honoring Chairwoman Rhonda Morningstar Pope Flores as Yolo County's Woman of the Year,' Guerrero said. "Rhonda embodies the spirit of community by continuously extending support and love to neighbors in need and giving her time and energy to projects that exemplify the words of John F. Kennedy of a rising tide that lifts all boats. Congratulations, Chairwoman Morningstar Pope Flores, on this well-deserved recognition of your accomplishments!"

An adequate blood supply must be ready for patients every day before it's needed. Spring storms can cause blood drive cancellations and keep donors from coming out. March is Bleeding Disorders Awareness Month, a reminder that blood donations are needed not just for emergencies, but for patients who have ongoing needs. The most common bleeding disorder, von Willebrand disease, affects the blood's ability to clot and can cause excessive bleeding and pain.

Many Californians Rely on this Farmers Market Program. Newsom Wants to Cut It

When we think of a farmers market in California, we usually picture vibrant displays of beautiful, albeit expensive, fruits and vegetables, and perhaps a tempting array of pricier prepared foods. However, the roots of farmers markets in California trace back to the late 1970s, when they first emerged in low-income areas.

They were designed to facilitate a direct connection between farmers and consumers, an arrangement that proved to be a win-win for both small-scale farmers and those seeking affordable, fresh produce.

Today, farmers markets may be more prevalent in affluent neighborhoods, but a key program has been working diligently to uphold their original spirit, making fresh fruits and vegetables accessible to all Californians. The Market Match program has successfully placed fresh produce into the shopping bags and kitchens of low-income Californians at more than 293 farmers markets across the state. Since 2010, this program has empowered shoppers who receive CalFresh benefits, allowing them to double their funds for exclusively California-grown fruits and vegetables.

Frank Tamborello, the executive director of Hunger Action Los Angeles, aptly describes the Market Match program as a "win-win-win." It helps fight hunger while promoting healthy eating habits and supports California farmers, boosting the small-farm economy and contributing to environmentally sustainable agriculture.

Despite its evident benefits, the program faces a looming threat from budget cuts as state leaders work to close a multibillion-dollar deficit. Gov. Gavin Newsom proposed a \$33.2 million cut from the three-year, \$35 million California Nutrition Incentive Program, a move that would effectively end Market Match once the remaining funds dry up. Since 2015, the state has supported the program by matching federal funds through a grant from CNIP, enabling substantial expansion over the past nine years.

Market Match has routinely reported increases in low-income shoppers using their benefits at farmers markets. Last year, 9% of the roughly 574,000 visits were first-timers, underscoring the program's positive impact on both consumers and local

The potential loss of this program threatens low-income Californians' nutrition, especially those who live in food deserts where corner stores and vacant lots are more prevalent than full-service grocery stores. In such neighborhoods, an orange can cost more than a soda, highlighting the disparities in accessing affordable, nutritious food.

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The proposed cuts would also significantly impact rural farmers who rely on the revenue generated from weekly market sales. It's a steady source of income in an era defined by its unpredictability.

In the wake of the pandemic, the number of food-insecure households in California surged as costs for fresh produce increased. A USC study last year revealed that 1 in 3 households in Los Angeles County experience food insecurity, indicating a dire need for programs like Market Match. Cutting this essential program would exacerbate the challenges faced by low-income shoppers in bringing home nutritious food for their families, compounding the intense pressure to simply put food on the table.

Access to healthy, affordable and culturally appropriate food is a fundamental human right. As Californians confront the potential loss of the match program, we must recognize its profound impact. In a state known for its agricultural abundance, we cannot allow budgetary decisions to compromise the well-being of others in our community. *


Fortune favors the bold in this high-stakes, middle-grade adventure where turning back is not an option.

The "Delta's," Sarah, West, and Hannah, were masters of escape rooms, landing on many leaderboards above adult teams. But they are about to face their toughest challenge

When Sarah discovers a yellow slip of paper taped to her front door, her life quickly changes. Now, with her family's impending move, Sarah knows she will have to come up with something big to save her house. As big as the legend of "The Triplet Treasure-" A fun house created decades before with an unknown famous prize for anyone who solves it. But tragedy struck before the completion, and all that is left is an abandoned house and a decades old legend.


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Well-Meaning, **But Misguided**

grades will go down if he holds a job while in school. Research actually shows that, on average, kids who work while in college carry higher grade point averages than those who don't.

The reasons for this differ, depending on who you ask, but I think a lot of it has to do with them having to learn to manage their time—and their lives more effectively. Lots of kids could pay their way through school, and not have to worry about student loans, if they just used some of the time they spend watching television and on social activities at a job.

We never required our kids to work during the school year, but they were self-starters. And when they came home for the summer, there was no such thing as just lying around the house all day. They had jobs, and they made money. Of course, some of it went toward having a little fun during their time

off. But we made sure they set some aside for the next school year, too.

Long story short, the philosophy of not wanting kids at college to work so they can spend all their time studying is well-meaning, but misguided. For the most part, kids who work while they're in school will make better grades and develop into more mature and well-rounded individuals.

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - In a joint effort to preserve the natural beauty of the region and protect the environment, the Yolo County Department of Community Services' Integrated Waste Management Division teamed up with the Sacramento Regional Conservation Corps (SRCC) in February.

Together, they undertook a multi-day cleanup effort to restore the Tule Canal area, located east of Woodland along County Road 22, from litter and illegal waste dumping.

The cleanup effort yielded impressive results, with more than 3,900 pounds of waste collected. Among the waste were 29 tires, four TVs, a mattress and 165 pounds of hazardous materials, including paint, fluorescent bulbs and motor oil.

This collaborative effort underscores Yolo County's commitment to environmental stewardship and highlights the importance of responsible waste management practices for residents. Yolo County encourages residents to utilize the opportunity for hazardous waste disposal, available every Thursday, Friday and Saturday, at the Yolo County Central Landfill, 44090 County Road 28H in Woodland. The landfill also offers free disposal services daily for mattresses and TVs to all California residents and businesses.

Yolo County Supervisor Mary Vixie Sandy emphasized the multifaceted repercussions of illegal dumping in Yolo County, stating, "Illegal dumping is not only unsightly and casts a perception that people do not care enough about their community to properly dispose of waste. It also can be harmful to our wildlife and their ecosystems when hazardous waste gets washed into our waterways after a big storm. I am very proud of our team at the landfill for taking the initiative to clean up this area."

In a proactive measure to deter future illegal dumping, the Yolo County Central Landfill is pursuing funds under

CalRecycle's Farm and Ranch grant to deploy surveillance cameras along County Road 22. These cameras will monitor the fishing access area along Tule Canal and deter further illegal dumping in the Elkhorn vicinity. The landfill will collaborate with the Yolo County District Attorney's office to identify and prosecute offenders as necessary.

"As we work tirelessly to protect and preserve the natural beauty of our region, it's imperative that we address the issue of illegal dumping head-on," said Supervisor Angel Barajas. "Together with the Sacramento Regional Conservation Corps, we've shown what can be achieved through collaborative efforts. Let's continue to champion responsible waste management practices and safeguard our environment for future generations." WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The city of West Sacramento is looking for local businesses to participate in the Home Run Internship program. By participating in the program, companies will help youth gain work experience and become a productive part of the local work force.

New Exhibition Opens Social Security Matters

How Do Survivor Benefits Work for a Married Couple?

Dear Rusty: How does Social Security handle the death of one spouse? Say, for example, the husband receives \$2,000 per month in Social Security and his wife receives \$1,000 per month. How is the death of either spouse handled? Signed: Concerned spouse

Dear Concerned:
Benefits to a deceased beneficiary stop as soon as Social Security (SS) is notified of the death (notification usually done by the funeral director who handles arrangements). Benefits are not paid for the month of death, only for the preceding month when the beneficiary was alive for the entire month.

A surviving spouse is entitled to the higher of two benefits - their own personally earned SS retirement benefit, or an amount based on the deceased spouse's benefit at death. In the example you cite, and assuming the surviving spouse has reached full retirement age (FRA): if the husband dies first the wife will receive the husband's \$2,000 monthly benefit instead of her previous \$1,000 amount. But if the wife died first, the husband would continue receiving only his \$2,000 monthly amount because that is more than his deceased wife was receiving. Note in either case, the surviving spouse would be entitled to a one-time lump sum "death benefit" of \$255.

The surviving spouse

would need to contact Social Security to claim the "death benefit" and - unless the surviving spouse was previously receiving only a spousal benefit – also to claim the higher monthly amount, if eligible. If the surviving spouse was previously receiving only a spousal benefit from the deceased (and not entitled to SS retirement benefits on their own), then Social Security would automatically award their higher survivor amount when notified of the death.

If a surviving spouse has reached full retirement age (somewhere between 66 and 67 depending on year of birth) and is eligible for a survivor benefit, the amount of the survivor benefit will be 100% of the deceased spouse's benefit. But if the survivor claims the benefit before reaching FRA, the amount of the survivor benefit will be reduced (by 4.75% for each full year earlier). The survivor's benefit reaches maximum at the survivor's full retirement age.

If a surviving spouse has not yet reached their FRA, and if they are entitled to (not necessarily collecting) their own Social Security retirement benefit, the surviving spouse has the option to delay claiming the survivor benefit until it reaches maximum at their full retirement age. And if the survivor's personal SS retirement benefit will ever be more than their maximum survivor benefit, the surviving spouse also has the option to claim only the smaller survivor benefit first and allow their personal SS retirement benefit to grow (to maximum at age 70 if desired).

With Social Security there is hardly ever a simple answer to a question but, in the example you use, if both are over their SS full retirement age:

• If the husband dies first, the wife will get 100% of the amount (\$2000) the husband was receiving, instead of the small amount (\$1000) she was previously receiving.

• If the wife dies first, the husband's monthly benefit will remain at \$2000, and he will get no increase in his monthly amount.

• In either case, the surviving spouse will be entitled to a one-time lump sum death benefit of \$255...

Five Solutions to Some of California's Woes

California's biggest problem is up for debate. Sadly, there are many contenders vying for that dubious distinction. But instead of focusing on the problems, we need to be focused on solutions. Without rank, here are five chronic California problems where state leadership has completely failed and one simple idea for each to help improve governance and boost our quality of life.

boost our quality of life. Budget: This budget year, California faces a nearly \$40 billion deficit. To avoid such massive shortfalls, California should adhere to the state's "Gann Limit," a law passed by the voters in 1979 that limits annual budget growth to a combination of population growth and inflation. The Gann Limit is ignored or avoided by legislative trickery, but it provides a simple structure that would avoid the massive budget growth that contributes to massive deficits whenever state revenues drop. Gann addresses California's spending problem.

Housing: One of many reasons housing is so expensive is excessive government fees, which can

building a single-family residence. Right now, an El Dorado County man is battling these fees in his Sheetz v. County of El Dorado, California case currently before the US Supreme Court. I hope he wins, but the state doesn't need to be forced into fairness by a court decision. Developer fees serve a specific purpose but have morphed into a revenue source for governments. They should all be reviewed to ensure they are meeting their purpose only and not as a backdoor funding source for general government operations. This could help lower housing costs.

Crime: California's empowered criminals do not fear punishment and retailers are paying the price. Governor Newsom just recently witnessed this himself at a Target store. Thieves can afford to be cavalier, and casually stroll out of stores with arms full of merchandise because we've essentially eliminated punishment for shoplifting anything under \$950 in value. I'm encouraging Californians to sign the petition to repeal Prop. 47 that has wreaked havoc on our state and give prosecutors the ability to charge smaller retail thefts as felonies once again.

Insurance: The only thing leaving the state faster than its residents might be its insurers, who are pulling out of all or some of California's markets seemingly by the day. California must repeal Prop. 103 and make it easier for insurance companies to adjust rates and offerings. While

this may lead to some price

increases in the short term, providing a framework for more insurers to write policies here will lead to more competition, more choice, and more options for consumers.

Homelessness: This

problem may be most emblematic of the California Way, where taxpayers pay the most but get the least. Cities in some of the state's most beautiful and valuable areas have been overrun by a permanent cadre of homeless, many of whom are obviously mentally ill and who, by their own admission, are addicts. The state must dramatically expand the concept of forced care in Governor Newsom's "Care Court" proposal, to promote the health and safety of the homeless, but also to reclaim our streets, parks, and sidewalks for their intended purposes.

President Reagan once said there are no easy answers, but there are simple answers. And it won't get better overnight. California holds all the promise it ever did and it can again be a national leader in all that is right and good. It has been in decline, but this can all be turned around by showing the political will to implement simple ideas that would reverse some of the state's chronic problems. With the right choices, our future is

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
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
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Kings Korner By V.G. Harris


