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Alexandra Yakovleva says to experience art

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Alexandra (Sasha) Yakovleva has always loved art. As a child in Kaliningrad, Russia, Yakovleva was always drawing and painting so her mother enrolled Yakovleva in art school.

Yakovleva fondly remembers the exciting school field trips that presented a variety of subjects to draw.

Yakovleva occasionally drew and painted. At age 20, Yakovleva came to America as an adventure to see a new land, new people and new cultures.

Yakovleva officially immigrated to America at age 21 to South Lake Tahoe.

"There was a strong interest in pursuing an independent lifestyle and exploring personal identity and career aspirations without the influence of societal pressure of the country I grew up in," Yakovleva said. "Which

wasn't bad by any means but the breath of fresh air in your 20th is much needed."

Nine years later, at age 30, Yakovleva relocated to Sacramento and for the last seven years, has lived in West Sacramento where her artistic practice has flourished. Yakovleva began to paint in segmented abstract.

"Experiencing separation from family as an immigrant, I started paying closer attention to how the world directly impacted my life," Yakovleva said. "Dealing with family situations, aging parents and

Nonprofit **Sector Report** Released

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG)

- The Yolo Community Foundation's 2024 State of the Yolo Nonprofit Sector report showed that growth in nonprofit organizations' expenses outpaced growth in revenues again last year, just like the year before.

The report, made possible by a Teichert Foundation grant and released March 26, enables the Yolo County community to understand the needs and concerns of local nonprofit organizations and how to support the organizations. The report is available at http://bit.ly/ YCFStateoftheSector2024.

An extensive overview of the Yolo County nonprofit landscape is provided, including data on revenue and expense changes since 2022, nonprofit economic projections for 2024, staffing and volunteer trends, and a description of the significant needs and challenges of the Yolo nonprofit organizations.

A key finding is that 45% of nonprofit organizations surveyed are volunteer-led with no paid staff and 81% of volunteer-led nonprofits have annual revenues less than \$100,000.

Another finding is that smaller, volunteer-led nonprofits are experiencing a slower recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Furthermore, 46% of nonprofits with paid staff reported increasing their staff in 2023, while only 17% reported decreasing their staff.

Nonprofit staff reported financial sustainability and funding among their organization's most significant needs; and they worry most about the social and emotional well-being of members in the vulnerable groups that they serve.

This year's report focuses on how nonprofits have a strong desire for expansion and what their greatest concerns are for their next fiscal year.

Main report themes include an underrepresentation of BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and people of color) representation in local nonprofit leadership and staffing, despite Yolo County's population diversity, and that nonprofits do

FOLSOM, CA (MPG) - SAFE Credit Union will participate in this year's annual SacTown Run on Sunday, April 7, in downtown Sacramento benefiting Children's Miracle Network Hospitals. This event is open to the community.


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Sen. Dodd: Get Free Tax Help, Credits

- With this year's April 15 tax filing deadline approaching, Sen. Bill Dodd, D-Napa, reminds taxpayers of two key benefits they may take advantage of to ensure they get back any money they earned:

Free preparation assistance is available from California's Franchise Tax Board's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program and a Tax Counseling for the Elderly program to help individuals with limited incomes complete their tax returns.

And families should apply for the California Earned Income Tax Credit, a benefit worth thousands of dollars for working people who earn low or moderate incomes. Starting this year, Cal EITC has

expanded eligibility to low-income workers aged 18-24 and individuals 65 and up.

"I want to make sure every eligible person is able to receive the benefits provided by the state's Earned Income Tax Credit, which I was proud to help create," Sen. Dodd said. "It's easy to become lost in the maze of forms and rules when you are filing your taxes. Fortunately, there are teams of qualified volunteers out there ready to help."

People seeking help with their taxes can visit https:// www.ftb.ca.gov/help/freetax-help/index.html.

Assistance is available through April 15 and is limited to full-year residents. The VITA program specializes in assisting disabled taxpayers, those with low to limited income and non-English speaking taxpayers. The TCE program

provides free income tax assistance for middle- or low-income taxpayers, giving special attention to those 60 and older.

The Cal EITC program can be a game-changer for many low-income families. Those who are eligible may also be eligible for other programs including Medi-Cal, CalFresh and CalWORKS.

February New Home Sales Were the Best in Region for Month Since 2005

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- Sacramento-area new home sales continued at a fast pace in February as area homebuilders recorded the region's highest February sales totals since 2005, the North State Building Industry Association reported today.

BIA members sold 762 homes during the month, the best February sales volume since 2005 when 908 homes were sold during the height of the housing boom. The average sales total for the month is 504.

February's sales were up 31% from January and 37% from February 2023. During the first two months of the year, 1,342 homes have sold – 28% higher than last year's total for the same period.

Chris Norem, the BIA's political director and senior policy advisor, said the continued strong demand was fueled by the benefits of new homes, the fact relatively few existing homes are on the market and gradually decreasing mortgage interest rates. He added the scarcity of existing homes for sale is likely to continue.

"The latest inflation report actually

ticked upward, which will likely cause the Federal Reserve to hold off on interest rate cuts," Norem said. "That will likely mean that the number of existing homes on the market will continue to be well below normal, making the availability of new homes a great choice for prospective homebuyers."

As usual, the most sales took place in Roseville with 184, followed by Elk Grove, Sacramento, Folsom and Rancho Cordova. (See charts below.) The BIA's sales figures cover 190 active new home communities in Sacramento, Placer, Yolo, Yuba, El Dorado, Amador and Sutter counties.

turned to art sketching that came out compartmentalized. My first sketch was a segmented drawing of 'Girl with a Pearl Earring' in pencil. Later, I began incorporating chess figures and profiles into my artwork."

Yakovleva paints oil paintings that she describes as "selected images that are infused with personal meaning or memories and then dissected into harmonious segments."

Yakovleva focuses on color and on texture. Within each segment of the piece, she builds texture with a pallet knife and then fills in the segments with rich, bold colors. Her desire is to ensure visual attractiveness by allowing the eye an assortment of depths to enjoy.

The inspiration for segmented abstract painting can be traced back to a trip to Germany that she took some 20 years ago. While sightseeing, she visited beautiful cathedrals.

"I was mesmerized by the breathtaking

beauty of stained-glass windows. They were stunning and unique," Yakovleva said. "Each color occupied its own designated space on the panel, resembling a harmonious mosaic."

Yakovleva considered the beautiful stained-glass windows as a life lesson as she learned to compartmentalize feelings and emotions in her everyday life. "

Each color is separated, just like feelings, conflicting thoughts, experiences," Yakovleva said.

Yakovleva's work is on display from April 4 through April 26 at Gallery 1075 in the West Sacramento Community Center, 1075 West Capitol Ave. The public is invited and encouraged to visit this free art display. Serial Sex Offender Sentenced to Multiple Life Sentences

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - On March 25, Miguel Garcia, a 30-year-old Woodland man was sentenced for the sexual assaults of four minor female victims.

The victims were abused at the home of a family member over a period of many years and ranged in age from 5 to 11 years old at the time they were abused. Judge Samuel T. McAdam sentenced Garcia to two indeterminate life sentences in state prison, totaling 30 years plus an additional term of 10 years after his lifer sentence is served.

Statements written by the victims were read in court at the sentencing hearing. The victims expressed to the court that they were sad, angry and scared that Garcia would get out of prison and hurt them again.

the victims, McAdam remarked how brave each of them was to come forward to tell what happened and reassured each victim that they had done the right thing by speaking up. The victims were supported throughout this legal process by the Yolo County Multi-Disciplinary Interview Center and victim advocates from the Yolo County District Attorney's Office.

Attorney's Office. Garcia pled guilty on Jan. 29, on the morning of trial as opening statements were set to begin. As to the first victim, Garcia pled guilty to committing a Sexual Act with a Child 10 years of age or Younger. As to the second victim, Garcia pled guilty to committing a Lewd or Lascivious Act Upon a Child Under 14. As to the third victim, Garcia pled guilty to committing a Lewd or Lascivious Act Upon a Child Under 14. As to the fourth victo committing a Lewd or Lascivious Act Upon a Child Under 14. Garcia admitted a special allegation to committing Lewd or Lascivious Acts upon more than one victim. Garcia also admitted the victims were particularly vulnerable.

District Attorney Jeff Reisig said, "Today, four young victims faced their abuser and bravely shared how sexual abuse can tear a family apart. Each victim endured years of abuse behind closed doors while Garcia took advantage of a position of trust, committing his crimes through secrecy and deceit. We stand with the victims in deep gratitude that the court sentenced Garcia to a term indicative of the seriousness of his offenses. We hope that the bravery of these young victims here serves as a sign of hope and encouragement for other survivors to come forward to report their own abuse."

Yolo County is Working to Empower Socially Disadvantaged Farmworkers

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) -The Yolo County Board of Supervisors is deeply committed to supporting and empowering socially disadvantaged local farm workers. In line with this commitment, the county recently collaborated with the Ujamaa Farmer's Collective, in partnership with the Centers for Land Based Learning (CLBL), to address the needs of underserved individuals passionate about agriculture. Through an agreement with Yolo County, utilizing \$1.25 million in state funds, the collective procured local farmland and essential equipment for the operations of an educa-

tional farm. "Many facets of Yolo County collaborated to make this possible, including the General Services Department and County Counsel, who worked with the California Department of Parks and Recreation," explained Yolo County Supervisor Jim Provenza. "This agreement underscores our dedication to promoting education and empowerment among socially disadvantaged farmworkers to ensure a more equitable agricultural landscape."

After the conclusion of several pandemic-era programs intended to mitigate the disproportionate impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on local farmworkers, leadership across the county intensified efforts to enhance support for the local farming community. This initiative led to the creation of the YoloWorks! Agricultural Labor Program, through which dedicated county staff identify and offer educational, financial, housing, and nutritional resources to local farmers, ensuring their stability, with a particular emphasis on support at regional migrant centers.

Last August, Yolo County proudly hosted the inaugural Yolo County Farmworker Day Resource Fair, a significant event celebrating local farmworkers and providing essential resources to their families. Additionally, the program supports local farmworkers' professional development through initiatives like the Northstar Digital Literacy Program and community engagement activities such as the Long Sleeve Shirt Drive. By addressing farmworkers' needs and empowering them to thrive in Yolo County, the program plays a crucial role in nurturing a resilient agricultural community.

Yolo County Supervisor Angel Barajas expressed appreciation for the collaborative efforts aimed at supporting the local farmworker community. "Our ongoing initiatives

demonstrate our commitment to standing in solidarity with our farmworkers, acknowledging their invaluable contributions to our agricultural sector," remarked Supervisor Baraias.

The Yolo County Board of Supervisors encourages community engagement and invites residents to stay informed about the progress of these initiatives as the county works towards empowering socially disadvantaged local farmworkers. Additionally, the board is excited to announce that YoloWorks! Agricultural Labor Program has partnered with the California Employment Development Department to host a Farmworker Resource Fair this April. Residents of Mutual Housing at Spring Lake can expect support from an array of community resources, including career guidance, agricultural rights and safety information, support from local service providers, refreshments, a raffle, and much more.

Ellie Haycock is Totally Normal



"The Breakfast Club meets Five Apart."

Ellie Haycock's life has never felt normal, even though it's her greatest desire. Torn between two lives'- one as a typical teenager at high school with her friends and the other at the hospital and living in the Coffman Family Care home. Ellie knows where she would rather be.

Just when Ellie thinks everything is perfect, between her high school debate team and her boyfriend, Jack, Ellie's lungs bring everything crashing down. Now, back at Coffman Home, Ellie spends her time between doctors she doesn't trust, her hospital friends, and trying to hide from her mom's constant updates and posts on her blog. However, this stay suddenly becomes different when Ellie meets firsttimer Ryan, whose optimism is nauseating. What starts as open banter quickly becomes the thing

she needs most. As Ellie tries to juggle all the aspects of her so-called "normal" life, she realizes she can't do it alone, but not before everything falls apart. Now Ellie is left with a choice. Ellie can take the advice of her hospital friends Ryan and Caitlyn



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to stand up for herself and voice how she is feeling, or allow everyone else, including her parents, to have control. Then, of course, there is what to do about Jack, her upcoming surgery, and her new friendship with Ryan. Whatever she chooses, Ellie will indeed find out that life is anything but ordinary.

Filled with wit, candor, and real-life feelings, Ellie Haycock is Totally Normal is the story readers have been waiting for. Gretchen Schreiber brings real-life feelings, emotions, and vulnerability to a teenager living with the unknowns of a mysterious illness and the disabilities that come from it. In a story that follows a

real-life timeline along with real emotions and reactions, even if they aren't the "right" ones. Refreshing, unique, and well-thought-out characters add to the story, lending a realistic view to teenagers dealing with medical issues and cancer. Ellie Haycock is not reserved, doesn't always say the right things, and is even emotional, which allows readers an inside peek at what life may look like for the teens who get the outside stares. While Ellie has found security with her hospital friends, nothing makes them immune from their overwhelming feelings, fears, and how others look at them.

Gretchen Schreiber wonderfully highlights the relationship between daughter and mother and the powerful feelings that come from making a personal medical journey into a public one. Schreiber showcases the range of emotions along with the negative effects of social media delicately displaying the balance between empowering and healing versus detrimental and invasive. A stand-out story full of honesty and heart, Ellie Haycock is Totally Normal is a story readers can't help but fall for.

efit of them calling in and actually wanting help. These folks care about what I think, and in most cases, they realize things aren't working for them. I don't just walk up to people and say, "You know, what you're doing is really stupid. Let me fix you." I think that's kind of the situation you're in right now. So, before anything else, I'd begin to pray for him. Ask God to bring people into his life who will have a positive impact on him.

One of the worst things

about these situations is watching people you love do bad things to themselves and the people around them. Honestly, I don't know there's really a lot you can do without becoming the enemy to some degree. You can always try to hold him to a higher standard, and refuse to tolerate immature, irresponsible behavior when you're around him. You might even look for opportunities to use yourself as an example. I'm not talking about puffing out your chest and pretending to be perfect. I'm just saying maybe point out areas in your life where you made mistakes in the past

and how you fixed the problems. But going out and trying to actively intervene in his life without permission, or shaming him in hopes it'll make him grow up and be a man, would probably do more harm than good.

Approach him in a gentle, caring way. Again, not like some know-it-all, but just let him know you care and you're there to help if he's having difficulties. Take him out to lunch once in a while, or invite him over, and let him know you're there for him if he needs to

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Matsui Statement on New Tailpipe Emission Standards

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG) - Congresswoman Doris Matsui (CA-07) released the following statement in response to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) finalizing new light-duty vehicle tailpipe emission standards for cars and SUVs, model years 2027 and beyond.

The transportation sector is the largest source of greenhouse gas emissions in the United States, accounting for 27% of all greenhouse gas emissions. Congresswoman Matsui has been one of the foremost voices in Congress calling for new, stronger emission standards for passenger cars and light-duty trucks. In March of 2023, the Congresswoman led 54 lawmakers in urging EPA to issue and swiftly finalize a new emissions rule for light-duty vehicles. In July of 2023, after EPA proposed a new rule, the Congresswoman again led 91 colleagues in urging EPA to swiftly finalize a strong

emissions rule

"Today's announcement by the Biden Administration is an unprecedented step toward a cleaner, safer, and more resilient future," said Congresswoman Matsui. "The new emissions rule for light-duty vehicles announced today will cut emissions from passenger cars and trucks by more than 50%, helping America and the world avoid the worst consequences of climate change and delivering \$13 billion annually in public health benefits. I have fought for years to see this day, and I applaud the President and the EPA for taking this historic leap forward."

As co-chair of the Sustainable Energy and Environment Coalition (SEEC), Congresswoman Matsui has long been a champion of bold climate action and the adoption of ambitious vehicle emission standards. In addition to light-duty vehicles, last September, Congresswoman Matsui led a letter urging EPA to finalize the strongest heavy-duty vehicle emission standards. **

Teens Who Use Both Cannabis and Tobacco Have Lower Grades, More Absences

- More and more states in the U.S. are legalizing recreational cannabis, leading to concerns that teen use will increase. Tobacco consumption among high school students, including vaping and e-cigarettes, is a concerning 12.6%, although trending downward.

Researchers at UC Davis were interested in learning how the combined use of these two products — cannabis and tobacco — might impact high school students in California.

In a new study published in The Journal of Pediatrics, they found high school students who use both tobacco and cannabis products miss more school and have lower grades compared to students who don't use either product or who use the products individually (tobacco or cannabis) but don't combine them.

"Substance use is a main predictor of educational outcomes, including absenteeism," said Melanie Dove, an assistant adjunct professor in the Department of Public Health Sciences and first author of the paper. "These results highlight the need for comprehensive efforts to prevent and reduce substance use from both cannabis and tobacco products among youth."

California survey reveals students' tobacco and cannabis use

The researchers analyzed data from the 2021-22 California Healthy Kids Survey. The anonymous, confidential survey administered by the California Department of Education asks questions about wellness, resiliency, school climate and safety. The study reviewed responses from 287,653 high school students in ninth and 11th grade.

The researchers found

that among high school students in California:

- -3.7% use tobacco and cannabis
- -3.7% use cannabis only -1.7% use tobacco only
- Students who used both tobacco and cannabis reported the highest percentage of absenteeism. On average, they missed three days of school in the past month almost one and a half more days of absenteeism than teens who didn't

Students who co-used tobacco and cannabis were also more likely to have lower grades than students who did not use either product.

use both products.

Using an 8-point scale with an 8 representing mostly A's and 1 representing F's, they found the average grade for students who did not use cannabis or tobacco was 6.24, or mostly B's.

By comparison, average grades for students who used both cannabis and tobacco were about half a grade lower, at 5.08 or mostly B's and C's.

Students who used either cannabis or tobacco, but not both, also had slightly lower grades than nonusers: students who only used tobacco had an average grade of 5.61 (mostly B's), and students who only used cannabis had an average grade of 5.54 (mostly B's).

Harmful effects on student health

The U.S. Surgeon General released a report describing the health risks of e-cigarettes on youth and young adults. It explains how habits formed in youth, when the brain is still developing and learning, can result in

"We know that using tobacco and cannabis puts young people at risk for longer-term addiction, behavioral issues and respiratory health problems," said Elisa Tong, a co-author of the study. Tong is a physician at UC Davis Health

and director of the Tobacco Cessation Policy Research Center. "For young people who are not current users but are exposed to use by others, the aerosol from these products is not harmless, and contains potentially harmful chemicals, heavy metals and fine particulates," Tong said.

Schools and parents can

help prevent tobacco use

The researchers noted some limitations of their study. The survey is not representative of all high school students in California. Students who were absent on the day of the survey were not included. Another limitation is that the data is based on students' self-reported responses; even though the survey was anonymous, students may feel uncomfortable sharing their actual substance use or absence patterns and may have underreported them.

Another consideration s that the percentage of California high school students who report using any tobacco product is 6.6%, according to the 2022 California Youth Tobacco Survey. This percentage is well below the national average (12.6%) and may reflect California's rigorous anti-smoking campaigns and the adoption of non-smoking public spaces dating back to the mid-1990s.

"While certain school factors — like peer pressure — can contribute to teen tobacco and cannabis use, schools also play a critical role in prevention, especially in partnership with families," said Kevin Gee, a professor at the UC Davis School of Education and senior author of the paper. "One important tool available to California's schools is the Tobacco Use Prevention Education program that, when strategically invested in intervention and cessation activities, has shown promise in reducing tobacco use among teens."

Social Security Matters

When Should We Claim Social Security?

Dear Rusty: I am almost 63 and my husband will be 61 soon, and we are looking to see when our best time would be to start our Social Security benefits. We would like to know if one of us qualifies for benefits from a previous marriage from 1984 to 1995. And we are wondering if I can start drawing at age 65, in two years, or if it is better that I wait until 67 because my spouse is 2 years younger than me. Also, if I were to continue working limited hours after 65, what would my earning limit be? Signed: Almost Ready

Dear Almost Ready: The first thing to understand is that full retirement age (FRA) for both of you is 67. If either of you claim before that, your monthly benefit amount will be permanently reduced and, because you are working, you will be subject to Social Security's "earnings test."

If you claim your benefit at age 65 your monthly payment will be about 87% of what you would get if you claimed at age 67. If your husband claims at age 62, his benefit will be about 70% of his FRA amount. The only way to get 100% of the benefit you've each earned from a lifetime of working is to

claim at your FRA. You can choose to claim at age 65 as long as you're comfortable with the benefit reduction which will occur, and as long as your annual work earnings do not significantly exceed the earnings limit for that year. In any case, when each of you claims will not affect the other's retirement benefit amount.

Social Security's "earnings test" for those claiming before FRA sets a limit for how much can be earned before some (or all) benefits are taken away. The earnings limit for 2024 is \$22,320, but it changes yearly. If you claim early benefits and your work earnings exceed that year's limit, Social Security will take away \$1 in benefits for every \$2 you are over the limit. They take away by withholding future benefits long enough to recover what you owe for exceeding the limit. If you significantly exceed the annual earnings limit, you may be temporarily ineligible to receive SS benefits until you either earn less or reach your FRA (the earnings test no longer applies after you reach your FRA). I cannot predict what the earnings limit will be two years from now, but it will be more than the 2024 limit and published at that time. FYI, in the year you turn 67 your pre-FRA earnings limit will be much higher, and when you reach your FRA the earnings test no longer applies.

Regarding your previous marriage, you cannot receive spousal benefits from an ex-spouse while you are currently married. But when to claim may also be influenced by whether either you or your current spouse will get a spousal benefit from the other. If the FRA (age 67) benefit amount for one of you is more than twice the other's FRA entitlement, the one with the lower FRA amount will get a "spousal boost" to their own amount when both of you are collecting.

Spouse benefits reach maximum at one's FRA, but each person's personal SS retirement amount will continue to grow if not claimed at FRA. Waiting past FRA to claim allows the SS retirement benefit to grow by 8% per year, up to age 70. So, with an FRA of 67, claiming at age 70 will yield a payment 24% higher than the FRA amount, 76% more than the age 62 amount, and about 37% more than the age 65 amount. But waiting beyond FRA is only smart if financially feasible and life expectancy is at least average (about 84 and 87 respectively for a man and woman your current ages). And, as a general rule, if one's spousal benefit at FRA (50% of their partner's FRA entitlement) is highest, then that spouse should claim at FRA to get their maximum benefit.

Court Upholds Flows Plan for San Joaquin River Tributaries

A state plan that requires leaving unimpaired flows of 30% to 50% in each of three San Joaquin River tributaries—the Stanislaus, Tuolumne and Merced rivers—can move forward, according to a court ruling. More than a dozen lawsuits, including one filed by the California Farm Bureau, challenged different aspects of the state's first phase of the water quality control plan update. Water districts, farmers and residents in the region protested the plan, saying it would do little to restore salmon and other fish populations, while cutting water supplies to the northern San Joaquin Valley.

California Water Chief: State Must Manage for Weather Extremes

The state's water chief last week emphasized the need to better manage flood flows and groundwater during wet periods to improve water supply reliability during dry periods. During the California Farm Bureau Capital Ag Conference in Sacramento, California Department of Water Resources Director Karla Nemeth highlighted work underway and outlined long-term plans to help the state adapt more broadly. She also acknowledged that investments in water infrastructure—which farmers have urged for years—have been slow coming.

Farm Delegation Advocates at State Capitol

Farmers and ranchers gathered at the state Capitol in Sacramento last week to advocate on policies impacting agriculture, from groundwater management to wildfires to technology. As they met with lawmakers and staff during the annual Capital Ag Conference, which marks the start of the legislative year, the delegation of California Farm Bureau members focused particular energy on trying to rescue a program that provides financial compensation to ranchers whose livestock are impacted by wolves. Amid the state budget deficit, money ran out for the pilot program.

Study Results are Unclear on Whether Grass-fed Beef is More Sustainable

With California set to become a leader in grass-fed beef production and demand, researchers at University of California, Davis, reevaluated grass-fed production systems in the western U.S. The results? There was neither a clear winner nor loser. According to their study published in the Journal of Animal Science, the conventional beef system had the lowest greenhouse gas footprint but the highest energy-use and smog footprints. "This study illustrated the complexities underpinning beef sustainability," the report concluded. The findings were outlined at a recent UC Davis field day

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California Insurance Market 'In Chaos'

With more California homeowners just discovering their insurance policies are getting canceled — and hundreds of thousands of others stuck with a pricey option of last resort state Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara's efforts to fix the home insurance market can't come quickly enough.

Lara has introduced two main regulations, with more to come. The first, unveiled last month, aims to streamline rate reviews. State law gives the Insurance Department the power to approve or deny insurers' requests to raise premiums. Insurance companies complain the process has been holding up the increases they seek as a result of what they say are increased costs due to rising climate-change risks and inflation.

The second regulation will let insurers use catastrophe modeling — which combines historical data with projected risk and losses — along with other factors when setting their premiums. California is the last state to allow for catastrophe modeling.

"We're undertaking the state's largest insurance reform," Lara said during a press conference earlier this month. "We can no longer look solely to the past to guide us to the future."

He said catastrophe modeling will lead to "more reliable rates," "greater insurance availability" and "safer communities," because he said it would further encourage and reward wildfire mitigation by homeowners and communities. Insurance Department spokesperson Michael Soller said success will mean fewer homeowners needing to turn to the FAIR Plan, the state-mandated insurer of last

Insurance trade groups, which stand to benefit most from the new regulations, agree with Lara's support for catastrophe modeling and support his so-called sustainable insurance strategy. So do fire chiefs, to an extent. But almost everyone else — homeowners, consumer groups and former insurance commissioners — has lingering

U.S. Rep. John Garamendi, a Democrat representing parts of Solano and Contra Costa counties, had two stints as state insurance commissioner in the mid-1990s and early 2000s. He says the insurance market is "in chaos" — and that Lara should be holding public hearings and demanding insurance company executives testify to explain to Californians why

their premiums are rising.

"One of the critical things a commissioner does is to analyze the market and provide the public with information," Garamendi said in an interview with CalMatters. "(Lara) didn't use his power to control the industry and second, to inform Californians."

The criticism drew a retort from Soller: "Commissioner Lara is fixing decades-long neglected issues that have led to this crisis. He is focused on safeguarding the integrity of the state's insurance market, not second-guessing from predecessors who had their chance and failed to act."

Dave Winnacker, chief of the East Bay's Moraga-Orinda Fire District, said the upsides of catastrophe modeling include being able to credit what home owners, communities and governments do to lessen wildfire risk. That includes being able to account for the numbers and proximity of firefighters in certain areas, Winnacker said.

"Depending on where you are in a state, and that's tied to population density, the number of firefighters available could affect the outcome (of a wildfire)," he said, adding that catastrophe models should reflect that.

He also said he and other fire chiefs are working to make sure the interests of consumers, fire professionals, insurers and the state are aligned. Insurers may not know what homeowners, communities and local fire departments are doing to reduce wildfire risk. One idea: a database to share that information.

"There is no future in which we can price our way out of this crisis with just premiums," Winnacker said, adding that everyone needs to work together.

Dave Jones, the state insurance commissioner for eight years before Lara took over in 2019, said he is "trying to avoid looking over the shoulder of my successor."

Jones is now director of the Climate Risk Initiative Center for Law, Energy & the Environment at UC Berkeley School of Law. He said it is good for consumers that the catastrophe-modeling regulation could take forest management into consideration. But he said he's not sure Lara's actions will be sufficient.

Before the end of the year, Lara is also expected to issue a regulation that will allow insurers to factor reinsurance costs into their rates. Reinsurance is insurance for insurance companies in the event of large payouts. That plus the other new regulations may "help in the short

to mid term," giving insurance

companies the ability to raise

premiums, Jones told CalMatters.

But he said those actions may "ultimately be overwhelmed by our failure to stop the fossil-fuel industry, which is contributing to rising temperatures" and therefore insurance losses.

Jones also pointed out that Florida has long allowed insurers to use catastrophe modeling and has let them factor in reinsurance costs in their rates — yet its insurance market is in worse shape than California's.

"Florida has done what insurers are asking for," Jones said. Yet "Florida's rates are three or four times the national average."

Mark Friedlander, spokesperson for the Insurance Information Institute, an industry group, confirmed that the group estimates that Florida's average home insurance premium was \$6,000, or three-and-a-half times the national average, in 2023.

In addition, Jones said Florida's version of California's last-resort FAIR Plan — called the Citizens Property Insurance Corp. because it's funded with a surcharge on policyholders has more than 1 million policies. California's growing FAIR Plan, run by a pool of insurers, has 373,000 policies, its president told state lawmakers recently.

"That raises the question," Jones said. "Giving insurers (higher rates) and shifting the burden to all Californians... whether that's going to be enough in the face of growing background risk associated with climate change."

Meanwhile, last week State Farm said that it is not renew-

ing policies for 30,000 California

homeowners, as well as refus-

ing to cover all commercial

apartments by not renewing 42,000 of those policies.

This is happening despite California approving State Farm's requests to levy double-digit premium increases last

"One of our roles as the insurance regulator is to hold insurance companies accountable for their words and deeds," said Soller, the Insurance Department spokesperson. "State Farm General's decision... raises serious questions about its financial situation — questions the company must answer to regulators."

State Farm spokesperson Sevag Sarkissian would not comment beyond the statement the company put on its website last week, which read in part: "This decision was not made lightly and only after careful analysis of State Farm General's financial health, which continues to be impacted by inflation, catastrophe exposure, reinsurance costs, and the limitations of working within decades-old insurance

regulations." Sarkissian also referred CalMatters to the Personal Insurance Federation of California, which counts State Farm as a member. The industry group's president, Rex Frazier, said in an email last week that allowing insurers to use catastrophe modeling would help with insurance availability. Yet in its statement, State Farm acknowledged the actions Lara is taking to try to fix the insurance availability and affordability crisis in California, even as it announced its decision not to renew tens of thousands of homeowners.

June Lake in Mono County,

Joyce Kaufman, a retiree in

recently got a notice of non-renewal for her homeowners insurance with Farmers, which she said she and her husband were dreading but expecting.

"I'm not really sure what the state's trying to do, both at the commissioner and legislative level," Kaufman said. And losing the ability to renew her policy is affecting her other insurance needs, she said. As her broker helps look for an alternative, her auto premium is now going up about \$300 a year because it will no longer be bundled with home insurance.

As the new regulations give insurance companies what they had asked for, one part of Lara's strategy — which he first laid out last year after an executive order by the governor — is conspicuously missing. Lara had said insurance companies would be required "to commit to writing at least 85 percent of their statewide market share in wildfire-dis-

tressed underserved areas." That provision is nowhere in the text of Lara's unveiled regulations so far — an omission not lost on consumer groups or for-

mer commissioner Jones. "Where is that 85 percent?" asked Carmen Balber, executive director of Consumer Watchdog. Soller, the Insurance Department's spokesperson, said that part of the commissioner's strategy is coming.

Balber also said she is concerned that the catastrophe-modeling regulation 'appears to not comply with the transparency requirements of Prop. 103," the voter-approved law that regulates the insurance industry.

According to the text of the regulation on catastrophe modeling, the public will be able to take part in reviewing catastrophe models before they're deemed acceptable. But anyone who helps review the models will be required to sign a nondisclosure agreement.

"If a big chunk of your insurance rate is behind a 'black box,' then that's not what the voters passed," when they passed Proposition 103 in 1988, Balber said. "At the end of the day, if the commissioner passes something that hides something behind closed doors, we'll have to consider challenging it."
