WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Earth Day in West Sacramento involved more than just planting some trees.

April 22, the annual day dedicated to the planet's health, involved a comprehensive tour of the Southport Levee Improvement Project. Officials, including the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Sacramento District Commander Col. Chad State to immediately begin man-Caldwell, Congresswoman Doris Matsui and Mayor Martha Guerrero, gathered to enjoy the fresh land and

fruits of the city's labor.

"More than 77,000 plants, trees, and shrubs were planted during construction of the setback levee, creating a 120-acre ecosystem for critters and waterfowl," West Sacramento public information officer Paul Hosley said.

The Disaster Preparedness and Flood Prevention Bond Act of 2006 quickened cities all over the Golden aging their levees. One of those cities is West Sacramento. The West Sacramento Area Flood Control

Agency reports that it "is working quickly and efficiently to face the challenges of stricter flood control standards imposed by the state in 2006 that must be met by 2030," according to the city website.

Greg Fabun, City of West Sacramento Flood general manager, said the Southport Levee project is vital to West Sacramento's overall, "providing an increased level of flood protection that incorporates modern levee design standards and recent climate change modeling."

The city currently has two ongoing levee projects, the Yolo Bypass East and the Sacramento River West North, along with other completed projects, including the Southport Levee, which is 5.6 miles long and extends from river mile 57.2 to river mile 51.6.

The \$80,000,000 construction created flood risk-reduction measures, addressing "deficiencies of through-seepage, under-seepage, slope stability and geometry, erosion, encroachments, and non-compliant vegetation," according to the city website.

When the project was underway, it promised a greener future, stating that "it would provide opportunities for ecosystem restoration and public recreation," as well as meeting federal and state levee design criteria.

The promise was kept and displayed during the Earth Day tour, which was attended by Councilmembers Verna Sulpizio-Hull, Quirina Orozco, Dawnte Early, and Assistant Secretary of the Army Michael Connor. Fabun said the levee improvements provide at least 200 years

of flood protection for West Sacramento residents.

"The floodplain and habitat restoration components of the project allowed for on-site mitigation for the Southport Levee Improvement Project, with additional habitat available for future levee project impacts," Fabun said.

According to Fabun, the levee project's significant financial sponsor is the federal funding made possible through the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, which paid up to 65% of the project costs. The remaining 35% was paid for by the State of California and the West Sacramento Area Flood Control Agency, 70% and 30%, respectively.

"Without the United States Army Corps of Engineers and its contributions, plus support from Congresswoman Matsui, these projects would not be feasible," Fabun said.

Officials say even greener pastures are to come. The top of the setback levee will have pavement and an additional 5.6 miles of Class 1 bike lanes, adding to West Sacramento's 61-mile-long trail network.





Social Security Matters

Minister Wants to Maximize Social Security Benefit

Dear Rusty: I want to apply for Social Security, but I want to make sure I get all the benefits I have earned. I am a veteran with a 10% disability rating (not sure if that matters). I am 68 years old. I am a minister and have been exempt from Social Security taxes for most of my income since I was about 30, but I still have the 40 quarters needed. I have also worked off and on in the secular workplace and continued paying Social Security taxes.

One hears a great deal about those who want to "help" us apply for Social Security, but which turn out to be a scam or want a fee. How do I apply and maximize my benefits with my unique situation? Signed: Seeking Answers

Dear Seeking: Don't worry about fees here at the AMAC Foundation – there is never a fee for the services we provide (we are non-profit). And I want to thank you for your military service - you may find the "For Veterans" section at our AMAC Foundation website interesting - www.amacfoundation.org.

To your question: Your VA disability rating does not affect your Social Security benefit. At 68 years old, your Social Security benefit payment has been earning Delayed

Retirement Credits (DRCs) since you reached your full retirement age (FRA) of 66 years and 4 months in July 2022. That means that your benefit, if you claim now. will be about 13% more than it would have been had you claimed at your FRA. FYI, if you continue to delay, your SS benefit will continue to grow (by 8% per additional year you delay), up to the month you turn 70. At that time, your SS benefit will be 29% higher than it would have been at your FRA. Nevertheless, if you wish to claim a smaller amount now, you can do so in a couple of ways:

• You can call Social Security (at 1.800.772.1213, or your local SS office) to request an appointment to apply. They will most likely set a date/time to call you to take your application over the phone (they discourage office visits these days). Once you have applied, it typically takes a month or two to process your application, but they will pay your benefits effective with the month you say you want them to begin. Note, they will likely also offer you six months of retroactive benefits but be aware that if you accept that offer your monthly payment will be permanently reduced by 4%.

SS retirement benefit online at www.ssa.gov/apply. Applying online is, by far, the most efficient method, as shown in this short video: www.ssa.gov/ hlp/video/iclaim r01.htm. However, to apply online you will need to first create your

• You can apply for your

at future ages should you plan to wait longer to claim. Your SS retirement benefit will be based on your lifetime record of earnings from which Social Security FICA taxes were withheld (or self-employment earnings on which SS payroll taxes were levied). In any case, your SS benefit will be based on your lifetime earnings record contributing to Social Security, as well as your age when you claim. You'll get your maximum benefit based on those factors. Although your situation is somewhat uncommon, it is not exceptionally unique. Your VA

account set up, you will be

able to see what your SS retire-

ment benefit will be now, and

disability rating does not affect your Social Security benefit and, because you are a member of the clergy, you are not subject to Social Security's Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) – a rule which reduces SS benefits for those with a pension earned while not contributing to Social Security. In other words, your SS benefit will be based entirely on your lifetime record of earnings from which Social Security payroll taxes were withheld, and your age when your benefit starts.



Plug In or Promote from Within?

Dear Dave,

I own a small business with about 20 team members, and we're doing pretty well. Last year, we had revenues of about \$1.2 million and profits of \$250,000. How do I find leadership within my company that cares about the vision and value of my company enough to help me grow it to the next level? I have two people in mind here who have impressed me a lot in the last two years, and I'd like for one of them to take a step up in the company. I'd like for this person to also challenge me and help me grow as a leader.

Dear Troy,

I want leaders on my team who aren't afraid to bring things to my attention. If there are things they feel I need to work on, or look at differently, I want them to let me know. I'm not perfect, that's for sure. And I've

made plenty of mistakes during my 30-plus years in business. But when it comes right down to it, it's not their job to challenge me and help me grow. As a leader, that's on me. It's my responsibility to make sure I'm constantly challenging myself and growing as a leader and businessman.

Now, developing your team members and getting them to actually care and align with your mission? That is part of your job. You don't want leaders within your organization who aren't aligned with what you're trying to accomplish. When that happens, you've got a leader working a J-O-B. And at that point, they're no longer a leader. They're just a boss. Leaders lead. They show the way, they encourage and they lead by example. A boss just tells people what to do.

Over the years, I've had more luck promoting from within than I have bringing in someone new and plugging them in. Maybe there's someone there who's smart, already showing potential and demonstrating they care about the place and your mission. That's someone you can tap on the shoulder and start to move in a leadership direction. That kind of person is already fired up and wired up, so take

the bridle off them and give them a chance to run.

Here's an easy first step: Find a really good small-business and leadership book, buy three copies and start a series of study sessions with you and the two team members you mentioned earlier. Let them know you feel they have real leadership potential, then read through the chapters together and discuss one or two over a lunch each week. Open up the discussions, and just let them talk. After a few weeks of this, it'll start to become clear really fast if either one is suited for a bigger role in the company. It'll become the ultimate interview process.

Great question, Troy. Best of luck to you and your company as you take this next big step!

California Once Led In Government Transparency. It Descended Into Secrecy and Opacity

California once was a national leader in making government more transparent, requiring state and local agencies to conduct their business in public meetings and giving Californians easy access to public records.

In recent years, however, transparency has eroded. The Legislature has retreated into semi-secrecy, particularly on the state budget but also on other major legislation. Due to a construction project, legislative offices have been moved from the Capitol to an almost impenetrable building, making in-person contact more difficult.

Behind those well-guarded doors, decisions are made and deals are cut and the outcomes are simply announced and enacted with sometimes little or no meaningful debate. In recent years, governors and legislators have been using budget "trailer bills" to pass major changes in policy with little or no notice.

The descent into secrecy has, for obvious reasons, coincided with the advent of one-party government. The dominant Democrats can ignore media and the larger public because they know their numbers insulate them from accountability.

The increasing opacity of state government decision making is compounded by its having data systems that

only outdated information. Cal-Access, the system that contains political information, such as campaign contributions and lobbying expenditures, is especially difficult to use and efforts to improve it have themselves been sporadic.

Projects to modernize the state's information technology have been underway for decades, but have experienced numerous delays and failures despite costing billions of dollars.

A poster child for the data shortcomings is the Financial Information System of California, which has the catchy acronym of FI\$Cal. It was envisioned many years ago as a comprehensive financial management tool for all state agencies but is only partially operational.

One aspect of FI\$Cal's situation is that California is chronically tardy in reporting its financial picture. State Controller Maila Cohen recently released the state's "Comprehensive Financial Report," a nearly 400-page document required by law to be prepared each year. It was a report on the 2021-22 fiscal year that should have been issued a year earlier, but wasn't because FI\$Cal and other data systems could not generate timely and accurate numbers.

Cohen acknowledged its tardiness in a cover letter, saying it "will mark the fifth consecutive year that California has published its financial statements well beyond the regulatory deadline of nine months after the fiscal year end," and blamed it on FI\$Cal and other technical shortcomings.

The state auditor's office, which is charged with reviewa series of audits for the Legislature. Three years ago, the office issued a report saying that FI\$Cal's deficiencies were chronically delaying the state's annual economic reports, and noting that delays were hindering the state's ability to borrow money and execute funding agreements.

Obviously little has happened since to rectify that embarrassing failure. The 2022-23 financial report should have been released this month, but it will probably be a year late as well.

California's shortcomings in transparency have not gone unnoticed outside the state. This week, an organization called Truth in Accounting, which monitors financial information management across the nation, issued a 50-state scorecard on transparency and California scored third from the bottom.

States were graded on such issues as the timeliness and accuracy of their financial reports, and their candor or lack of it – in reporting financial obligations such as unfunded liabilities of their public pension systems.

A perfect score would have been 100. New York was rated No. 1 with 86 points, followed by Wyoming and Hawaii. California's score was 48, higher than only Illinois and Georgia.

That's shameful.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On Tuesday, April 2nd at 10:00 a.m., Congresswoman Doris Matsui (CA-07) held a press conference with local leaders to discuss the future of the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) and her efforts to close the digital divide.

Last Congress, Democrats established the ACP through the enactment of the American Rescue Plan and the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. The ACP provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward internet service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on Tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a

one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers. A household is eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program if the household income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines.

The ACP currently helps ~23 million households afford an internet connection, including over 100,000 households in the Sacramento region. However, without additional funding, the ACP is at risk of expiring in April. As Ranking Member of the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Communications and Technology, Congresswoman Matsui is one of the leading national voices calling for a continuation of this vital program.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) Salmon Poisoning Disease is a potentially fatal condition seen only in dogs after they eat certain types of raw or cold smoked fish like trout and salmon that are infected with a bacteria-like organism, Neorickettsia helminthoeca, which is transmitted by the parasitic flatworm (or "fluke") Nanophyetes salmincola.

Nanophyetes salmincola occurs naturally in waters of northern California and most of the north state can be considered the native range for the fluke. But dogs throughout the state are susceptible. Dog owners are advised to be cautious and to keep their dogs away from salmon, steelhead, trout and other freshwater fish carcasses. The parasite cannot survive in cooked fish, is not harmful to humans and does not affect pets other than dogs.

If your dog has eaten or is suspected of eating raw fish, watch for signs of the disease. Symptoms are similar to distemper and may include some or all of the following: a rise in body temperature, loss of appetite, vomiting, diarrhea, listlessness and/or rapid weight loss. If signs of the disease appear, promptly take your dog to a veterinarian. Salmon Poisoning Disease is treatable if caught in time. If untreated, death usually occurs within two weeks of eating the infected fish. Without treatment, 90 percent of dogs showing symptoms die.

While all fish caught or originating from streams in California could potentially be infected, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) cautions that trout stocked in some waters in CDFW's North Central Region are more likely to be infected with the flukes that cause Salmon Poisoning Disease.

Weekly fish stocking information is publicly available at CDFW's Fish Planting Schedule web page.
