As part of the public input process for the Dracut Master Plan, the Northern Middlesex Council of Governments (NMCOG) worked with the Dracut Master Planning Committee to schedule the Dracut Master Plan Visioning Session at Harmony Hall. The purpose of the Visioning Session was to provide an overview of the Master Plan process, discuss the Visioning Process and then begin the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats (SWOT) Analysis exercise, in order to receive input from the participants as to the priorities for the community. The results of the SWOT Analysis exercise will be used in conjunction with the feedback from the community survey to determine the priority concerns to be addressed in the updated Master Plan. Additional input will be provided through the review of the Goals and Strategies, as well as the responses from the Dracut Master Planning Committee on the individual Technical Papers and the final sections of the Master Plan.

The Dracut Master Plan Visioning Session was held on October 5, 2017 and thirty-five (35) Dracut residents participated in the session. Phil Thibault, Chairman of the Dracut Master Planning Committee, welcomed the participants and Introduced Beverly Woods, NMCOG Executive Director, to provide an overview of the Master Plan process. Jay Donovan then proceeded to discuss the Visioning Process and begin the SWOT Analysis. The SWOT Analysis exercise provided an opportunity for the attendees to voice their opinions on the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats associated with Dracut. NMCOG staff recorded their thoughts, opinions and ideas on large sheets of paper, and after the discussion, participants were given an opportunity to indicate their priorities by placing colored dots next to each idea on the sheets of paper. For this exercise, red dots (4 points) indicated their first priority, green dots (3 dots), indicated their second priority, blue dots (2 points) indicated their third priority and yellow dots (1 point) indicated their fourth priority.

Based upon the tabulated point totals for each idea, the top five priorities for the Visioning Session for each category were as follows:

Strengths

- Low property taxes
- Natural open space
- Proximity to cultural assets in Lowell
- Proximity to higher education
- Local food

Weaknesses

- Quality of education
- Inadequate funding
- Lack of things to do

- No curb appeal
- Lack of community events/harvests or festivals

Opportunities


- Dog park
- Community center or visitor center with information on resources & activities
- Farmers market
- Walking trails & bike paths
- Develop a downtown with commercial businesses and downtown identity

Threats

- Exodus of young families due to poor schools
- Lack of special education
- Voter apathy
- Resistance to progress
- Lack of opportunities to socialize

The results are summarized by category and the ideas are listed by total dots and points based upon the values assigned to each dot. While these results do not represent a scientific sampling of local opinion, they do represent the views of the participants who attended the Visioning Session.
