number of years ago, when I was a graduate school instructor in the area of leadership studies, I used to ask each of my graduate classes to respond to what they thought is meant by the concept of "legacy" and how it might apply to their lives. Most of them looked at me with blank stares following my question, while others answered that legacy is a concept that applies to individuals in their later years who were retiring or possibly honored for some special service; it was not something they felt applied to them.



Jim Kouzes and Barry Posner proffer the thought that a legacy is not something reserved to describe an end of life or career synopsis, but rather something we each contribute to in our daily lives. As Kouzes and Posner state, "we leave our legacy daily. The people you see, the decisions you make, the actions you take—they are what tell your story. It is the sum of everything you do that matters, not one large bequest at the end of your tenure."

So you may be asking, how does this apply to me, how do I view my legacy as a resident of the Darien community? The answer lies in how you see your role as a contributor to our city. Do you contribute to the daily life of our community through a civic, social, recreational or religious organization, or do you simply sit back and enjoy the benefits of our fine community?

Kouzes and Posner use a "campsite" analogy to illustrate how each of us might view our role in our community. Do we say, "Hey, I'm here only for me, so I won't clean the campsite or put out the fire. What the heck, I won't be back here again, so why should I care?" On the other hand, are we like others who say, "Those who follow me will want to enjoy this beautiful campsite. What can I do to ensure that their experience will be even better than mine?"

As we reflect on how much we give back to this community, are we consciously aware how any small contribution we make will somehow lead to a better future for our children, our families or future Darien residents? Do we do what we do out of obligation, or because we know our contributions are our way of giving back to a community that enriches our lives? Do we give thought to the fact that every day we are building our legacies through our actions or inactions? My hope is that everyone who resides in our fine community chooses to build a legacy based on giving back, toward ensuring that the "campsite" will be enjoyable for the next camper. The question is, what kind of "camper" will you be?





This report is intended to provide you with important information about your drinking water and the efforts made by the **Darien** water system to provide safe drinking water. The source of drinking water used by **Darien** is purchased surface water from the City of Chicago, Illinois.

We want our valued customers to be informed about their water quality. If you would like to learn more, please feel welcome to attend any of our regularly scheduled meetings held at city hall. Source of drinking water.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pickup substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 800- 426-4791.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which may be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. We cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to two minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at *epa.gov/safewater/lead*..

community water supply to be susceptible to potential pollution problems. The very nature of surface water allows contaminants to migrate into the intake with no protection

only dilution. This is the reason for mandatory treatment for all surface water supplies in Illinois. Chicago's offshore intakes are located at a distance that shoreline impacts are not usually considered a factor on water quality. At certain times of the year, however, the potential for contamination exists due to wet weather flows and river reversals. In addition, the placement of the crib structures may serve to attract

waterfowl, gulls, and terns that frequent the Great Lakes area,

thereby concentrating fecal deposits at the intake and thus compromising the source water quality. Conversely, the shore intakes are highly susceptible to storm water runoff, marinas and shoreline point sources due to the influx of groundwater to the lake.

Water Quality Test Results

Definition of terms (the following tables contain scientific terms and measures, some of which require explanation):

Maximum Contaminant Level or MCL: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCL's are set as close to the Maximum Contaminant Level Goal as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal or MCLG: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLG's allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum residual disinfectant level goal or MRDLG: The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Maximum residual disinfectant level or MRDL: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

ppb: Micrograms per liter or parts per billion—or one ounce in 7,350,000 gallons of water.

Avg: Regulatory compliance with some MCLs are based on running annual average of monthly samples.

ppm: Milligrams per liter or parts per million—or one ounce in 7,350 qallons of water.

na: Not applicable

pCi/L: Picocuries per liter, used to measure radioactivity

ug/I = micrograms per liter or parts per billion or one ounce in 7,350,000 gallons of water

Level 1 Assessment: A Level 1 assessment is a study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine (if possible) why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system.

Level 2 Assessment: A Level 2 assessment is a very detailed study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine (if possible) why an E. coli MCL violation has occurred and/or why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system on multiple occasions.

mrem: millirems per year (a measure of radiation absorbed by the body).

Treatment Technique of TT: A required process intended to reduce the level of a contamination in drinking water.

Turbidity

The purpose for monitoring this contaminant is to assist USEPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water, and whether future regulation is warranted.

Fluoride

There is no state or federal MCL for sodium. Monitoring is required to provide information to consumers and health officials who have concerns about sodium intake due to dietary precautions. If you are on a sodium restricted diet, you should consult a physician about the level of sodium in the water.

Source Water Location

The City of Chicago utilizes Lake Michigan as its source water via two water treatment plants. The Jardine Water Purification Plant serves the Northern areas of the City and suburbs, while the South Water Purification Plant serves the southern areas of the City and suburbs. Lake Michigan is the only Great Lake that is entirely contained within the United States. It borders Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin, and is the second largest Great Lake by volume with 1,180 cubic miles of water and third largest by area.

Source Water Assessment Summary

The Illinois EPA implemented a Source Water Assessment Program (SWAP) to assist with watershed protection of public drinking water supplies. The SWAP inventories potential sources of contamination and determined the susceptibility of the source water to contamination. The Illinois EPA has completed the Source Water Assessment Program for our supply. Further information on our community water supply's Source Water Assessment Program is available by calling the City of Chicago, Department of Water Management at 312-744-6635.

Susceptibility to Contamination

The Illinois EPA considers all surface water sources of community water supply to be susceptible to potential pollution problems. The very nature of surface water allows contaminants to migrate into the intake with no protection only dilution. This is the reason for mandatory treatment for all surface water supplies in Illinois. Chicago's offshore intakes are located at a distance that shoreline impacts are not usually considered a factor on water quality. At certain times of the year, however, the potential for contamination exists due to wet-weather flows and river reversals. In addition, the placement of the crib structures may serve to attract

waterfowl, gulls and terns that frequent the Great Lakes area, thereby concentrating fecal deposits at the intake and thus compromising the source water quality. Conversely, the shore intakes are highly susceptible to storm water runoff, marinas and shoreline point sources due to the influx of groundwater to the lake.

2018 Voluntary Monitoring

The City of Chicago has continued monitoring for *Cryptosporidium*, *Giardia* and *E.coli* in its source water as part of its water quality program. To date, *Cryptosporidium* has not been detected in these samples, but *Giardia* was detected in 2010 in one raw lake water sample collected in September 2010. Treatment processes have been optimized to provide effective barriers for removal of *Cryptosporidium* oocysts and *Giardia* cysts in the source water, effectively removing these organisms in the treatment process. By maintaining low turbidity through the removal of particles from the water, the possibility of *Cryptosporidium* and *Giardia* organisms getting into the drinking water system is greatly reduced.

In 2018, CDWM has also continued monitoring for hexavalent chromium, also known as chromium-6. USEPA has not yet established a standard for chromium-6, a contaminant of concern which has both natural and industrial sources. Safety focus

Darien School District #61 is required to notify all parents, guardians, faculty, and staff of asbestos containing building materials present within the school buildings. Over the years we have undertaken removal of these materials, however, some still remains in various locations within the buildings.

The materials are periodically inspected and maintained intact and are safe to the occupants. If you desire more information regarding these materials, please contact your school office and they will provide you with the information. In addition, Kurt Stadtler, Director of Buildings and Grounds, can be reached at the district office.

Managing pests

According to provisions of Public Act 91-0525 and Public Act 91-0099, the school will notify parents, guardians, and school employees two buisness days prior to pesticide applications on or in school property. Antimicrobial agents, insecticide baits, and rodenticide baits are excluded from this notification requirement. Currently the district only uses traps provided by Anderson Pest Control. Dennis Forst, Chief School Business Official, is responsible for the oversight of pest management.

Special Education services available

Darien Public Schools District #61 offers a full continuum of special education services in the least restrictive environment (LRE) in accordance with the provisions of the Individuals With Disabilities Act (IDEA). The district provides free and appropriate education (FAPE) for all individuals with identified disabilities.

A continuum of services is available to support the education of children with disabilities. Services are provided for children three (3) through twenty-one years (21) of age who meet federal guidelines for one or more of the following categories:

- Autism
- · Cognitive Disability
- Deaf/Blind
- Deaf
- Developmental Delay
- Emotional Disturbance
- Hearing Impaired
- Multiple Disabilities
- · Orthopedically Impaired
- · Other Health Impaired

- Visual Impairment Social work, speech and language therapy, and occupational and physical therapy are some of the related services provided for individual students as appropriate.





The economy—where do we stand?

Tariffs, and their effects on future earnings, are the unpredictable scenario

which the first quarter earnings already in the books and showing overall a steady trend the chances of an earning recession, (defined as two consecutive quarters of year-over-year earnings decline), has drastically reduced. The reported earnings from Q1 and the declarations of changes to forward estimates can be classified as good, considering that following the market decline during the last of quarter of 2018 expectations were much weaker.

Tariffs are the unpredictable scenario and its effect on future earnings. If the addition of further tariffs is imposed it could hinder the chances of further growth in earnings during the second half of the year. Further escalation of the tensions surrounding the trade talks with China could provide more negative sentiment with investors and also begin to impact investment decisions by fund managers.

Stock valuations remain modest and are in line with the average readings that we have seen over the past several decades. The S&P 500 Index PE (price-to-earnings) ratio currently stands at 16.4, which is slightly above the average of 16 (25 year average). These indicators show that although we are in the tenth year

of this bull market, the end is not imminent. However stock market volatility might remain elevated and we will continue to monitor the conditions of the markets in order to make any necessary adjustments along the way.

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
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
