Local escapes

(under 2 Hours)

Within a relatively short drive from home, you can find some incredible events and great places to stay...for a complete escape.

North Aurora North Aurora Days, Aug. 2-4

Even the shortest drive from home will bring you a fun-filled weekend at the 10th Annual North Aurora Days. The festival brings the community together with endless activity for all ages. It's family-friendly with a rock-climbing wall, balloon artists, petting zoo, face painting and fishing derby. There's also live music every day. Hear popular country music on Friday with Billy Croft and the 5 Alarm and have a 90's dance party, Saturday, with Fool House. The weekend convenes with margaritas. food and 70's music in Riverfront Park, featuring the band Strung Out.

Be engaged! (but you don't have to get married)

ere is some advice. Be engaged with your financial

I do not mean promise to marry the person. I mean engage in ongoing meaningful conversations with him or her and engage in the decision-making process as well.

By doing so, you can potentially increase your advisor's ability to provide investments that are suitable for you. You also just might increase your ability to understand which advice and investments are appropriate for you as well as whether or not your advisor is working in your best interest.

So, what is a meaningful conversation made up of? There are many factors. Here are just a few of them to help you get started.

Let your advisor know your full financial situation. Where are you financially? Where are you in your career? What are your prospects for continued employment? What are your prospects for finding a job if you become unemployed? Are there health issues to be concerned about? Consider and convey all aspects of your current and possible future financial scenarios.

Communicate your financial goals. When considering long-term goals, consider beyond the first few years of retirement. Consider your potential needs for your entire life. Also, consider medium term, short term, and immediate needs. Needs for a larger or smaller home, a car, education, and many other large expenses should be part of your plan. Your immediate and future monthly budget is important as well. Unexpected contingencies and emergencies should also be part of the conversation and plan. Ask yourself and your advisor if your goals are reachable within your circumstances. Ask for a plan to get there. Be engaged in the planning process as well.

Some people worry about their

investments' potential to lose money. Others worry that they are not invested in risky enough assets and that they might miss out on potential growth. Maybe you are somewhere in-between. Talk at length regarding all of the types of risk that exist and the concerns that you have about them. Your financial advisor needs to know about your concerns in order to increase his or her ability to provide investments that are fitting for you.

In addition to telling your advisor about yourself, ask questions about the advice that you receive. Ask a lot of questions. Ask what are all of the costs, potential risks, and potential benefits of an investment. Ask what alternatives are available and ask the same questions about them. Why might the investment be good for you? Why might it be bad for you? Study any related printed material regarding the investment. Be aware that printed brochures possibly present information in a favorable manner. Be sure that the information that you receive is balanced, and get clarification for all of your questions. The money that you are investing belongs to you. It is your savings. Be sure to understand whether or not the investment is suitable for you.

Understand your advisor's motives. Ask how your advisor gets paid, and how much. Does your advisor suggest changing investments periodically when commissions are involved? Even if a one-time change is suggested, what does your advisor gain if you move forward? Be sure that the investment or advice is suitable for you regardless of your advisor's potential motives. Asking questions and understanding the answers can possibly help you make decisions that are good for you instead of someone

Consider postponing your decisions. Under many circumstances, you might want to take time to

reflect upon the information and advice that your advisor provides before deciding whether or not to accept it. Does what he or she says make sense? Giving yourself enough time might provide the ability to ask further questions and gain a better understanding.

Know your constraints. Your ability to save for retirement is likely constrained by your income producing ability and your spending needs. Time is another constraint to consider. Starting your savings as early as possible is advisable for several reasons. Be aware of all of your constraints.

Learn what you can and be involved in the decision-making process. Not everyone has an interest in financial matters. If you understand the impact that financial matters can have on your life, you might be more motivated to understand them. Simply letting your advisor choose your investments invites the potential for conflicts of interest. Knowledge and understanding can possibly make you a more powerful part of the decision-making process. It might increase your potential to protect vourself.

Engaging in conversation and the decision-making process does not guarantee any level returns and does not automatically remove risk. However, developing knowledge and a common understanding with your financial advisor might increase your ability to choose investments that are suitable for you. Maybe you can use that knowledge and understanding to your advantage.

Food for thought: For some, the

hardest part of conversation is talking. For others the hardest part is listening. Try to find a balance. All parties might benefit.






