

A message from our city

A uthoring this article at the start of the 2019 Batavia summer season I feel compelled to share with you the very real and serious concerns I have as Batavia's mayor over the rapid spread of troubling drug usage throughout our town. Time after time in recent months I have been advised by our police department administration of reports of illegal drug dealing or overdosing drug use taking place. The younger ages of many of the victims who are the subjects of such reporting is a further fact of great dismay.

Given constraints created by enacted state and federal laws which restrict the release of health related details found in such troubling news, it follows that most aspects of these stories go totally unreported to the general public. Thus, many residents are totally unaware of problems which may be within their own neighborhoods.

On the front line of what seems to be a regular routine of individuals who are experiencing some sort of drug related problem are the dedicated and caring members of the Batavia Police and Fire Departments. What appears to be happening here is that a wide assortment of dangerous drug substances are being found to be in use in our town. The non-stop professionalism in responding to this string of drug related emergencies by the chiefs and staffs of both the Batavia Police and Fire Departments is noted with great appreciation and admiration by myself.

In recent years the daily call volumes of the Batavia Police and Fire Departments have skyrocketed. Thus in today's world, it seems to be normal that the number of ambulance calls for our fire department on a daily basis generally exceeds 10+ different emergency response runs. Many of these are for ambulance requests to evaluate drug users or treat and transport a victim who is having some sort of drug related issue. Unfortunately, the drug scene in our town has served to be the cause of multiple tragic deaths involving local residents, many of whom were under the age of 25. The opioid problem has truly left a tragic sense of sorrow throughout our town in more recent times.

Most recently I took note of the lead headline on the June 2 edition of *The Beacon News* which reported, "Sudden hike in heroin overdose deaths." The story noted that Kane County officials have been faced with a sudden increase in heroin deaths, with six deaths in the last six weeks in the county. It was further related that Kane County Coroner Rob Russell and Sheriff Ron Hain are introducing several new strategies within their offices to combat and counter respond to this troubling news. I would note that both the coroners office and the Kane County Sheriff have been key public safety partners in



dealing with the drug challenges found within Batavia. From both offices, they have been ready responders in dealing directly with many of the most tragic aspects created by the spread of illegal drugs

To further compound the never ending tales associated with local drug use, the Illinois General Assembly has approved the sale to those over the age of 21 what is being termed as "recreational marijuana" at licensed dispensaries starting next year. I would note that the legalization of prescription marijuana has seemingly been handled with careful review by the medical community and thus far has been helpful for those having medical issues and who receive their ability to use such drugs under a doctor's care. I have requested our city attorney and his staff to closely review the enacted legislation to ensure that the city council can take any steps allowed by this new law to utilize any provisions that will permit local control over recreational marijuana in our town.

Additionally, I have been in communication with a number of other mayors in our area who share many of these same concerns when it comes to the introduction of recreational marijuana. I can assure you we will be actively monitoring this General Assembly action and will be making "loud and clear" observation of what we see happening in the coming days.

I regret that the message of this column has been a disturbing report. Given the apparent growth of the drug issue in our region, I felt it necessary to relate to our citizens the actions being taken by the city's administration to ensure that we stand ready to deal with this sad tale. Hopefully, in the times ahead, members of the Illinois General Assembly will take steps to insure the municipal governments of our state have the legal tools at their command to assist in controlling the expanding issues of illegal drugs.

Looking forward to seeing many of you around town in the events of the summer season, I am hoping that we can have "rain free events" for the 4th of July, Windmill City Days and the Community Dinner Table on N. River St., unlike the weather events which struck each of these last year. See you about town in the days ahead.

Celebrating moments of success

Vou are truly a gentleman," I told him. Later, I began to wonder if it had been a mistake.

L twas early morning on the final day of a recent trip to Ireland. I had just finished a session on the treadmill in the hotel's fitness center and was returning to our room. To my delight, as I wandered through the lobby, I discovered a small stand offering complimentary coffee; for me, the perfect end to a morning workout. As the steaming beverage filled my cup, a smartly dressed hotel employee adorned with



a cheerful smile strode over to wish me a good morning. When I thanked him for the coffee, his smile broadened, he looked me straight in the eye and said, "I make sure our guests get fresh, hot coffee every morning." I was taken by his sincerity and intimacy. It was at that moment I made the mistake of telling him he was a gentleman.

It is easy to confine a human being with a careless, poorly considered word. Not long ago, I had a long conversation with a young woman who was imprisoned by the word "worthless," the moniker her parents etched on her psyche throughout her childhood. "Nothing I ever did was good enough," she explained, fighting back tears. It broke my heart to hear this bright, articulate, caring young woman tell me over and over how, even in those moments when she knew in her heart-of-hearts she was kind, generous, hard-working and determined, she could not shake the feeling she had not a shred of true worth.

But isn't it different to use a description like "gentleman" that conjures images of generosity, care and nobility? How could that possibly confine or imprison a person?

When I turned a kind, early morning gesture of a hotel employee into a description of him as a human being, I imprisoned him. No human being is perfect...there are moments in every life during which we fail to live up to the high standards to which we ascribe. No doubt, there will be moments in which he fails to live into what it means to be a gentleman. In those moments of self-disappointment, I imagine him looking in a mirror and thinking, "That guest who told me I was a gentleman, was so very wrong. I am nothing of the kind."

A moniker is a title we either accept or reject, and, due to our imperfections, even the kindest, most lovingly offered labels can end up on the rubbish heap of our lives.

In a book I read recently, the author advocates for unconditional self-acceptance. We should always endeavor to exceed high standards and celebrate those moments in which we do. But, can we learn to be gentle with ourselves when we inevitably fail to live into the person we hope to be? Can we recall our worth even when we misstep?

Whenever we encounter a moment of grace with another person, might we comment on what was achieved, and refrain from turning a kind gesture, moment of brilliance, or extraordinary accomplishment, into a confining description of a person's humanity?

I wish I could return to my encounter with a truly wonderful human being in a hotel lobby in Dublin. I would, instead of commenting on the entirety of his humanity, have simply commented on his act of kindness and generosity. Thanked him for the way in which his manner, brilliant smile and words, made me feel as though I was the most important person in his life; at that moment, I believe I was. Then, at some future time, should he fail to live up to his high standards, he will always be able to recall an early morning encounter in which he succeeded...and celebrate.

Spaces in transition

Downtown Batavia is in transition. In just a few years, when you are enjoying a summer concert at the Peg Bond Center things will look impressively different around you.

owntown Batavia is in transition. In just a few years, when you are enjoying a summer concert at the Peg Bond Center things will look impressively different around you. To the west, across Depot Pond, an expanded Depot Museum will grace the shore of the sleepy pond. A few hundred feet away, between Peg Bond band shell and city hall, you will see a towering American flag at the center of a new national monument, Flag Day Monument. Both bring history and purpose together at Batavia's favorite gathering park to enjoy music, art and festivals.

To get to Peg Bond, you might walk down the multi-purposed River St. Saturday mornings this "no-street" street is a farmer's market. On one evening it is an outdoor "Farm-to-Table" dinner for 200 (Aug. 4); and in the fall it is Oktoberfest (Sept. 27–29). Most other times it is a place for automobiles, people and bikes to share, with restaurants and retail of distinction. To cross the Fox River, you can use the covered walkway. Perhaps you will stop to listen to the calming hum of the river flowing over Batavia's North Dam.

You may be on your way to an event at Peg Bond, or heading to Appleton Park behind city hall for Cocktails in the Park (July 20).

This area most central to Batavia is identified by a peninsula of sorts: a treasured piece of land bordered by water with Depot Pond to the west, Fox River to the east. Water rushes down the Fox River and when it reaches the Batavia dam (one of 15 dams in mainstream Fox River), the built up pressure creates a convenient opportunity to fill and create Depot Pond.

Someday this will change, too. All of the dams along the Fox River are in need of repair. These power generating structures, many built in the 1800's, are primarily aesthetic landscape features today. They provide little other value. Whether the dam is repaired or removed it is an expensive undertaking. Batavia has a unique quandary when it comes to the future of the dam. If the dam is removed, what will become of Depot Pond? If nothing is done, the pond as it is today may be a marsh (or less) tomorrow. Building a system to continue to feed water off the Fox River is




an added expense. Removing the dam and maintaining Depot Pond has been estimated to exceed \$10 million with little, if any, federal or state support.

The Batavia dam is in need of repair. Its future is under debate. But dam or no dam, Batavia is moving forward with its downtown revitalization plan.

The Depot Museum expansion and the Flag Day Monument are independent, privately funded projects. Batavia Park District in partnership with the Batavia Depot Museum is on target to complete the museum expansion by 2021. To date they have raised more than \$700,000 toward the \$2 million cost. The Flag Day Patriotic Organization (FDPO) was founded to create the Flag Day Monument. The property for the monument was donated by the City of Batavia. The FDPO has raised

nearly \$300,000 toward the total estimated project cost of \$991,000 (\$891,000 for construction plus \$100,000 endowment for long-term maintenance).

The Depot Museum is already rich in historical artifacts. The problem

is that most of these artifacts are locked away, with no place to display. With the expanded museum many of these hidden historical secrets will come to life in displays for all to experience. The existing "depot" is on the national registry of historical places, so it will remain exactly as is. The train caboose and water tower will be moved to the west side of the river walk and the museum expansion will be added to the north side of the existing building.



Although not specifically planned, the completion of the museum expansion and the Flag Monument may both happen in 2021.

"The Flag Monument has been a personal passion of mine for five years," says Austin Dempsey, CEO, Batavia Enterprises. "Our plan right now is to have a ground breaking ceremony on Flag Day 2020 (June 14), and a grand celebration dedicating the monument on Flag Day 2021." The project timeline is driven by fundraising progress noted Dempsey.

"The monument idea started as a conversation about how we could celebrate Flag Day every day, and honor Dr. Bernard Cigrand, a Batavian who had the vision to make the day happen. But this monument does much more.

"The flag tells the story of our nation's history. It celebrates the arrival of new states, is lowered to honor our dead, and marks significant events in time. The design of this monument captures these stories and events in a way that is beautiful and educational.

"The monument unfolds our nation's history beginning in 1776 and continuing through 2016, marked by 25 year increments. The design features a 40' diameter helix monument with 6' wide walkway around the perimeter. The flag pole is 50' tall and will display a 10' x 18' flag," Dempsey explained.

Like the river that flows through it, Batavia is moving along. River St., Peg Bond, Depot Museum expansion and the Flag Day Monument, are impressive examples of a community forged through the collaborative efforts of private citizens, government and business...working independently and together.

Streets to be resurfaced

Construction of the 2019 Street Resurfacing Program is underway with completion anticipated by the end of September. This year's program includes asphalt pavement resurfacing, sidewalk repairs, curb repairs, and landscape restoration.

If your property is being directly affected by this work you will receive a door hanger at least 24 hours in advance explaining the work that is to be done in front of your house and instructions as to what you may need to do. For example, if the sidewalk or curb thru your driveway is being replaced you will be without access for a period of time until the work is completed and you will need to park on the street. A contact name and phone number will be included with the door hanger if you have any questions.

The goal of this project is to resurface the pavement surface and repair the failing concrete infrastructure in the public right-of-way. To accomplish this, deteriorated curb through some driveways and storm structures on your street will be removed and replaced before the street is resurfaced.

Street repairs begin in September

The City of Batavia will be starting its annual street crack filling project in September. Each year, the city evaluates its streets and selects cost-effective maintenance treatments to enhance and extend the useful life of the pavement. When a pavement is relatively in better condition, crack fill is applied to extend the life of the pavement and reduce spot repairs such as potholes. The crack fill program is a very cost effective program and is performed each year on a number

of city streets to prevent water from entering the pavement and reduce the spread of cracking.

The program includes cleaning and sealing cracks, voids or joints in the street that are two inches (2") in width or less with a fiber-reinforced asphalt cement product.

Crack filling is a mobile operation that results in minimal disturbance to residences, businesses and motorists, however, lane closures may be required when the contractor is working along major

thoroughfares. The roadways will remain open to at least one lane of traffic in each direction at all times and any lane closures will occur between 9am to 3pm to minimize the impact during peak travel times. Parking may be restricted for short periods of time when the contractor is working along local streets.

Household hazardous waste front door collection service available

The City of Batavia now offers a new Household Hazardous Waste Collection service to its residents. The city's third-party provider, U.S. Ecology, will provide front door collection of many items that should not be placed in the regular weekly refuse collection. The City of Batavia provides residents with an opportunity to purchase a parkway tree, as part of its commitment to reforestation in Batavia. The available species are locally grown, quality trees that do well in city parkways. We offer a variety of species each year to provide a diversified parkway tree

population for our community. Residents pay one-half of the tree cost, which is posted on the city's website. The cost covers the tree, planting, and mulch. Residents will be invoiced for their share of the tree cost after planting.

To apply for a tree: please submit the online request form (form available at cityofbatavia. net/parkwaytree). We will accept requests until Sept. 13 for fall trees (or while supplies last). Curbside brush pickup continues

Curbside residential brush pickup is provided to residents that pay the monthly leaf/brush fee on their utility bill. Brush/limbs are to be at the curb for collection no later than 7am on Monday of your scheduled week, but no sooner than the weekend before that. Crews will make only one pass by each residence. Brush placed out after our crews have passed will not be collected until the next scheduled pickup date. **New for 2019:** *Residents can view the status of the current brush collection cycle on an electronic map.* Updates are posted on the city's website by 9am on weekdays from Tuesday through Friday and will show all areas collected as of the end of the previous day for the side of town in progress.

Brush Collection Schedule

East Side Collection	West Side Collection

The following procedures must be followed to ensure the collection of your brush:

- Maximum diameter is 6" (logs cannot be split); maximum length of limbs is 12'.
- Brush should be stacked into one large pile in the front/side parkway with cut ends facing the curb, and placed away from parkway trees, mailboxes, utility poles/boxes, hydrants, and parked vehicles. Brush will not be collected from alleys or vacant lots.
- Brush/limbs must not be tied, bundled, in containers, bagged, or put on the street.
- Brush pile should contain only brush. Foreign objects will not be collected.
- Program is for residentially-generated brush only, not contractor tree removals or trimming.
- Brush left out on the parkway between collection dates is subject to a possible code violation citation.

The amount of brush that has been placed out citywide in any given month dictates how quickly your area will be reached, but each side of town is typically completed by Friday of the scheduled week. Major storms may affect the schedule, and notice of any special brush collection will be posted on the city's website. The monthly collections are intended to handle most storm damage limbs that fall during the season, and special collections are done very rarely. If your brush was out at 7am on Monday of your scheduled collection week and not collected by the end of the workday on Friday, please notify the Batavia Public Works Street Division at 630-454-2400 no later than the following Monday.

If you have any questions, please call the Street Division at 630-454-2400 weekdays from 7am–4pm or visit the website at *cityofbatavia.net/brushcollection*.

For materials that do not meet the above specifications:

- Advanced Disposal will collect yard waste bags/32gallon cans (not to exceed 50 pounds per bag/32gallon can) consisting of twigs, evergreen clippings, roots, stumps, and plants on your regular trash collection day, beginning in April. A refuse sticker should be attached to the yard waste bag or 32-gallon can. If a can is used, it should be clearly marked "Yard Waste" on the side facing the street.
- Residents with limbs/brush exceeding the requirements for the program can contact a private service to have it removed at the resident's expense.
- Unincorporated residents should contact their township offices regarding brush collection services that may be available to them.

Use water wisely outdoors

Water your lawn only when it needs it. A good way to see if your lawn needs watering is to step on the grass; if it springs back up, it doesn't need water and if it stays flat, it does need water.

- Avoid watering on windy days. Wind will carry water away from the intended area.
- Water during the coolest part of your scheduled day to avoid excess evaporation and to help prevent the growth of fungus.
- Deep-soak your lawn when you do water to get down to the roots.
- Position sprinklers so water lands on the lawn, not on paved areas.
- Install a rain shut-off device on your automatic sprinklers to eliminate unnecessary watering.
- Adjust your lawn mower to a higher setting. Longer grass shades root systems and holds soil moisture better than a closely clipped lawn.
- Put a layer of mulch around trees and plants. Mulch will slow the evaporation of moisture and discourage weed growth.
- Wash the car using a bucket of water, using the hose only to rinse and wash less frequently during dry, hot weather.

- Use a broom rather than a hose to clean driveways and sidewalks.
- Check for leaks in outdoor faucets, pipes and hoses.

Except for the period of July 1 through Aug. 31 of each year, water from the city water distribution system may be used for the establishment of sod and/or seeded turf lawns. If you have a newly sodded or newly seeded lawn you must obtain a watering permit which allows for more frequent watering. These permits are available at city hall, 100 N. Island Ave.

Sod laying, lawn seeding, and the planting of other landscaping for the establishment of a new lawn or new landscaping is prohibited from July 1st through August 31st each year, unless the source of watering is derived from a private well or other imported water source other than any municipal water source.

Reminder: Only water your lawn on your scheduled day between the hours of 6–9am & 6–9pm.

Even number addresses may water on even numbered calendar days Odd number addresses may water on Odd numbered calendar days Thank you for doing your part to conserve water.

Test your irrigation system before it's turned on

If you use lawn a irrigation system testing is required when the system is energized. Cross Connection Control devices (backflow preventers) are mandatory for underground lawn sprinkling systems according to the Illinois State Plumbing Code. Each spring when you turn your sprinkler system on you must have the backflow device tested. This testing is required on an annual basis, even if you do not use your lawn irrigation system. The city's backflow program administrator, Aqua Backflow, Elgin, IL. will send out reminder notices.

The Batavia Cross Connection Control Program is designed to safeguard public health. We ask for your complete cooperation with our program, its enforcement, and any requests for information that come from Aqua Backflow or Batavia Water Division staff.

New rates for garbage and yard waste effective July 1

On July 1, the cost for refuse disposal will be changing for Batavia residents. Residents can continue to use the red stickers for either refuse or yard waste. This is the second year of a five-year contract with Advanced Disposal.

Refuse/Yard Waste Sticker: \$3.00 Half-Refuse Bag (Yellow): \$2.04 95-Gallon Refuse Cart: \$25.50/mo. 65-Gallon Refuse Cart: \$23.72/mo. 35-Gallon Refuse Cart: \$22.44/mo. 35-, 65-, or 95-Gallon Recycling Cart: No charge Additional 35-, 65-, or 95-Gallon Recycling Cart: \$1.22/mo. 65-Gallon Yard Waste Cart: \$30.41/mo. (service runs 4/1-11/30 and is billed only for these months)

Any toters in poor condition will be replaced by Advanced Disposal at no expense to homeowners. If you need an additional recycling cart, they are available from Advanced Disposal for an additional \$1.22 per cart/ month. Collection days will remain the same.

The contract includes yard waste collection for the first two weeks of the season without stickers in March (see services calendar on the City of Batavia's website next spring for these specific weeks). Residents may also add food scrap items to yard waste bags/cans (fruits, vegetables, grains, and pastas).

Prepare for disaster



Countless residents throughout our state have experienced the challenges of rebuilding their lives after a disaster or other emergency. In these stressful situations, having access to personal finance, insurance, medical and other records is critical for starting the recovery process. When a disaster strikes, your immediate focus will be on safety. Building a culture of preparedness, provides the peace of mind that is needed as you begin the task of rebuilding.

Here is some guidance on how to quickly and efficiently recovery from disasters such as floods, fire, earthquakes or severe weather.

Get organized. Secure and organize financial and critical personal, household, and medical information.

If your sewer backs up...

If your residence experiences a sewer back-up please call the city first at 630-454-2000. The problem might be in the city's main line. By calling the city first, it could save you the price of hiring a private plumber. If the problem is in your own service line, the city can provide guidance in hiring a plumber. The city has emergency response personnel 24 hours per day.

Check your insurance policy to determine if you are covered for sanitary sewer back-up and/or sump pump failure. Many homeowners' policies do not cover sewer back-ups or water damage unless you have purchased a special provision for this purpose.

If you experience a sewer back-up follow these guidelines for repairs and clean-up.

Always call your insurance company *first* to report

Having these items in a safe place can expedite insurance claims and other emergency expenses.

- Savings. Saving is the best financial defense against disasters. A little bit at a time goes a long way. A rainyday fund can help you invest in your family's safety.
- Insurance. Obtain property (homeowners or renters), health, and life insurance if you do not have them.
- Inventory. Make an inventory of your possessions using photographs and/or videos of your belongings.
- **Communication.** Your family may not be together when disaster strikes. Develop a Family Communication Plan. This will outline how you will contact one another when disaster strikes.

The City of Batavia's insurance company will make a determination if the city is responsible for damages caused by a sewer backup.

The year of Mark Twain

In November 1868, Samuel Langhorne Clemens, alias Mark Twain, launched a major lecture tour, "The American Vandal Abroad," which recounted his adventures in Europe and the Middle East. As part of that tour, Clemens, then 33 years old, gave an evening lecture "to a crowded house" in Batavia 150 years ago on Jan. 26, 1869. Twain was then anticipating the publication of *The Innocents Abroad* in July 1869.

Fast forward 150 years to 2019. Batavia Public Library has initiated a year-long, collaborative, community-wide celebration in honor of the sesquicentenary of Samuel L. Clemens' visit to Batavia and is working with other local agencies to produce activities to celebrate this milestone in Batavia's history.

The celebration began on Jan. 22 when Mayor Jeffery D. Schielke officially proclaimed 2019 as "The Year of Mark Twain in Batavia."

We encourage you to take selfies with Mark Twain in old Batavia at the Library's entrance and share the photographs on social media. Then pick up your very own Mini Mark at the Library or the Batavia Depot Museum—or at the Batavia Farmers' Market on Sat., July 13, during the Windmill City Festival and post his adventures on social media.
