Agency, we greatly appreciate your help. If you are interested in learning more about volunteer opportunities, contact us at communications@westmont.il.gov.


Community development



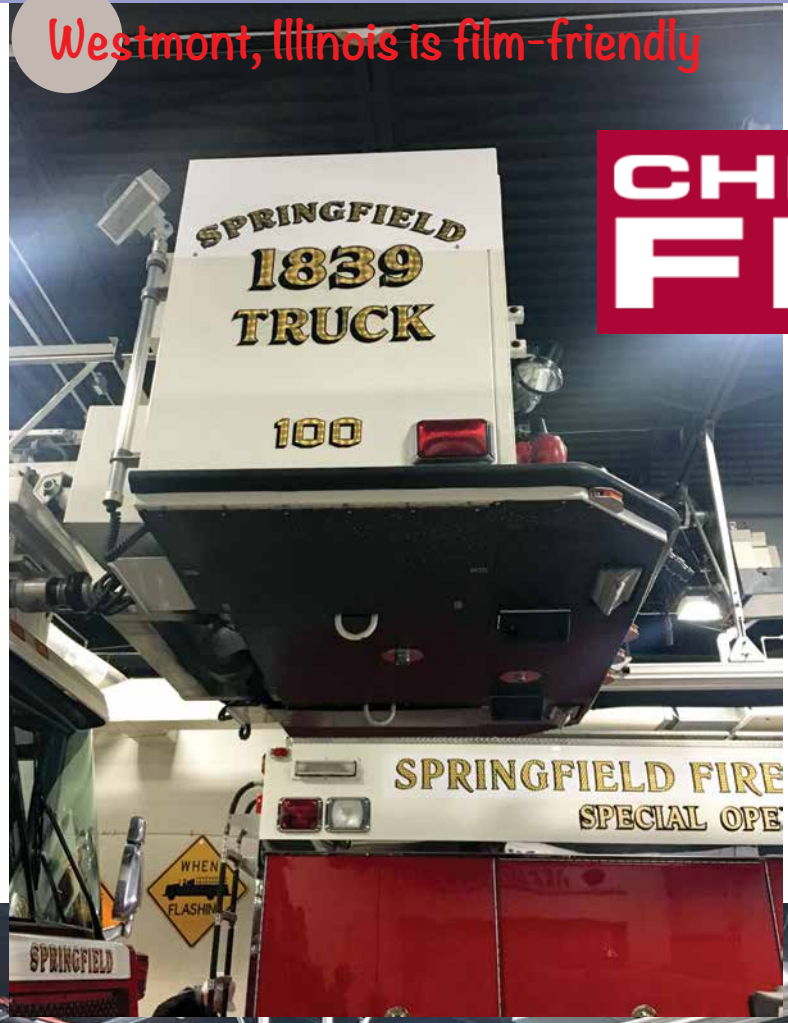

The NBC *Chicago Fire* TV series recently filmed in Westmont for the third time in three years. And they are currently scouting Westmont for another episode that they are working on.

The *Chicago Fire* TV show filmed in Westmont for two days this past November. The episode that features the Westmont Police-Fire Facility at 500 N. Cass is scheduled to air on Jan. 15, 2020 on NBC.

"I'm a huge fan of the show, so I think it's great to have *Chicago Fire* in Westmont," said Westmont Fire Chief Steve Riley. "All of the actors and the crew are down to earth and easy to talk to. We hope that they will consider coming back out to Westmont to shoot future episodes."

Martin Wilborn, the locations manager for *Chicago Fire* and Westmont resident, has been working in the film industry for more than 30 years. Prior to working on *Chicago Fire*, Martin worked on some major productions such as *Backdraft* and *The Fugitive*. He says that Westmont has earned a very positive reputation in the filming community.

"I don't think you can do anything better," said Wilborn referring to Westmont's hospitality. "We ask for a lot, and Westmont didn't even blink. That's what makes it easy to decide to come back to shoot. We've had a great experience in Westmont."

Village of Westmont Police and Fire personnel got

to see first-hand how much work goes into a film production. Typically, the crews start before sunrise and end after dusk. "It's a solid 12-hour work day," said Wilborn, who has now worked on *Chicago Fire* for 7½ seasons. Wilborn is a member of the Directors Guild of America. His main role with this production is location scouting and advance prep.

"In recent years, we've tried to brand ourselves as a film-friendly community," said Westmont Communications Director Larry McIntyre, who used to work on feature film productions in the early 90's. "Word is getting out that Westmont is a good place for film production, so that's good for our community and brings positive attention to our town."

Several movie productions have filmed in Westmont including *Rookie of the Year*, the John Cusack movie *Grace is Gone* which earned two Golden Globe nominations, *Witless Protection* featuring Larry the Cable Guy, the John Hughes movie *Reach the Rock*, as well as a number of TV shows.

"For each of the past four years, artist Fanny Moy has presented the community with a mural depicting a different era of Westmont's history," said Larry McIntyre, co-chair of the 100th Anniversary Committee. "The first mural featured Westmont prior to its incorporation in 1921 while the next three murals focused on the last 100 years. The final mural is intended to depict the future of Westmont, and this is where we need help from the community."

Westmont citizens are asked to create and send their written or visual arts interpretation of Westmont's future, specifically, the year 2121, which will be Westmont's 100th Anniversary. Submissions will be reviewed and then forwarded to Moy, who will use the information to create the final installment of the **98th Anniversary mural unveiled**

Also at the Nov. 7 meeting, Moy revealed the fourth installment of the Westmont Historical mural series, which covered Westmont's history from 1980 to present. A number of items featured in the mural are still popular today, such as various community events, local businesses, community parks, and more. The mural

Chicago Fire films in Westmont

"It brings positive attention to Westmont when we're able to be part of something like this. And based on the number of residents who stopped by to watch the filming, it was fun for them as well." Being a fan of the show, Chief Riley was able to get a few photos with the cast.

Past productions that have filmed in Westmont include the movie Rookie of the Year, a Larry the Cable Guy movie, and a John Hughes production.

Westmont introduces career opportunities in public works to Westmont students

Westmont Public Works Director Mike Ramsey has been working with Westmont High School on an Operator In Training (OIT) Program since 2018. Ramsey brought this program to the school to offer students the chance to learn about the water industry as a career choice.

Currently, the program has three Westmont High students who work with Ramsey on Fridays and one Saturday a month. The students must complete 890 hours of hands-on training to become fully certified.

Students must also complete an online course and work as a seasonal paid intern to help achieve the number of hours needed. When the students complete and pass the course, Ramsey will arrange for the Illinois EPA to come in and proctor the State Certified Water Operator Class *D* exam. If the students pass the exam, they will be considered Class *D* "Water Operators in Training" in the State of Illinois.

"This program is the first of its kind in the nation," said Ramsey, who began his career in the water profession in the Village of Westmont at the age of 15 and working as summer part-time help. "We are hoping to expand this opportunity throughout the state in the coming years."

Over the years, Director Ramsey has been very active in the water industry and is responsible for starting several innovative programs. In 2013, Mike launched Hydrant Hysteria, a state-wide competition in which teams of two race to assemble a fire hydrant. In 2015, Ramsey was awarded the AWWA Gimmicks & Gadgets Award for developing the light up valve key, and in 2017, he started the Model Water Tower Building Contest here in Westmont.

Ramsey also received the George Warren Fuller Award in 2018 from the American Water Works Association. The award was given in recognition of Mike's commitment to the improvement of the water industry and for his outstanding leadership in the AWWA.





Sister City program introduces Taiwanese students to Thanksgiving holiday

“When we first created our Sister City program, we considered the best time of year to have exchange students visit Westmont,” said Sister City Co-Chair Larry McIntyre. “It worked out that Thanksgiving was perfect for a variety of reasons. This is the third year in a row in which students from Liou Jia High School

in Hsinchu County have come to Westmont.”

During the two week visit, the Taiwanese students will shadow local students while attending Westmont High School, participate in local events such as Holly Days, and experience the Thanksgiving holiday firsthand with their host families.

“We want to give a big thanks to all of our generous host families for embracing this program,” said Westmont High School Teacher Pete Landreth, who coordinates the exchange program along with Sister City Ambassador Angela Yang. “This has been a great opportunity for everyone involved.”

Snow shoveling demonstrates respect for community

The Village of Westmont encourages all of our citizens, including residents and business owners, to be respectful of their neighbors and the entire community by taking the responsibility of shoveling snow from their sidewalks so that pedestrians have a clear and safe path when walking through our community.

When shoveling sidewalks, it is recommended that citizens clear paths the full width of the sidewalk so to allow everyone the ability to travel freely using the sidewalks instead of the streets.

Additionally, when our snow plows are clearing the roadways, some snow gets pushed back into driveways. Please make sure to not return this snow back into the street, but instead try to shovel snow to the parkways. Working together, we can make sure that our roads and sidewalks are safe for everyone.

Westmont property owners are asked to clear sidewalks adjacent to their property at their earliest convenience keeping sidewalks, parking lots, and all common areas, including open stairwells, free from ice and snow.

Also, remember to use salt in a proper and responsible way by removing snow prior to applying a deicer, using just enough deicer to reduce safety hazard. You can also sweep up and properly store road salt after a snow storm for reuse, and using a hand-held spreader to apply a consistent amount. It is also important to use less than four pounds of salt per 1,000 square feet. One pound of salt is approximately a heaping 12-ounce coffee mug.

Village holiday schedule

The Village Hall and Department offices will be closed on the following days in observance of various holidays: Tues. and Wed., Dec. 24 & 25 in observance of Christmas; Wed., Jan. 1 in observance of New Year's Day; and Mon., Jan. 20 in observance of Martin Luther King Jr. Day. Westmont Village Hall and department offices will resume normal business hours one day after the observed holiday.

When the village hall is closed, bill payments can be dropped off via the drop box located across the street from village hall near the entrance of the train station on W. Quincy St. or in front of the Westmont Police Department, 500 N. Cass Ave. These payments will be processed on the next business day. Also, bill payments can be made via our village website using the MAKE A PAYMENT link.

Additionally there will be no recycling or waste collection on Dec. 25 or Jan 1. Collection will be one day late for the remainder of the week.

Christmas tree collection

Christmas trees will be picked up in Westmont during the first two full weeks of the new year, Jan. 6-17. All trees picked up during this timeframe will be composted.

Trees should be put out with your other recycling and waste on your typical pickup day. Trees MUST be free of decorations, tinsel, and lights to be picked up and composted. Also, trees should NOT be placed in garbage bags or liners of any sort. Trees taller than 6' should be cut in half for easier disposal.

Trees put out after the first two full weeks of the year will be considered garbage and may be subject to a fine. For more information, please contact Waste Management at wm.com or 800-964-8988.

Police Chief presents awards

Westmont Fire hosts training for area first responders

In November, area fire departments participated in training exercise in downtown Westmont. Fire departments from Downers Grove, Hinsdale, Oakbrook, Pleasantview, and Westmont trained for several different scenarios utilizing the structures on the west side of Cass Ave. south of Quincy St. that were scheduled for demolition. The training did not involve real fire or smoke, but

there were simulations to create a low visibility situation.

"This is a great opportunity for our fire personnel to simulate a wide array of firefighting scenarios," said Westmont Fire Chief Steve Riley. "We appreciate everyone's patience during these exercises. Our goal is to provide the best training possible for our first responders."



Rep. Mazzochi receives Friend of Infrastructure Award

Rep. Deanne Mazzochi, 47th District, received a Friend of Infrastructure Award today from the Transportation for Illinois Coalition (TFIC) for recognizing her support to improve Illinois infrastructure.

Mazzochi expressed appreciation for the fact that the ceremony was held at the Westmont train station. "Westmont is working hard to support our commuters and local businesses in the downtown core," said Mazzochi, "but the State of Illinois needs to do its part too, and keep our roads and facilities in good repair." Noting that the Westmont train station is in need of numerous repairs, Mazzochi observed, "Illinois has not had a major capital and infrastructure package since 2009. Westmont is an ideal place where some State investment in infrastructure rail and facilities can deliver better value and quality of life for our district residents for decades to come, particularly as our population continues to rise."

Mazzochi was a supporter of a \$45 billion capital infrastructure plan that passed the legislature during the last weekend of the legislative session. The plan will provide \$33 billion in funding specifically for transportation, including road repairs around the State,



train line extensions, and new locomotives. This is the first infrastructure investment of this kind in over 10 years. Locally, the Regional Transportation Authority is receiving \$2.2 billion to distribute to Metra, the CTA, and Pace. Additional funding has been earmarked for additional projects. During a special event held in downtown Westmont, the Illinois Tollway announced the winners of their 2020 Illinois Tollway Map Cover Art Contest, which honors the service and sacrifice of the Illinois State Police.

The Illinois Tollway worked with Westmont property owner and real estate developer Bill Kalafut to hold the event at 22 N. Cass Ave. Kalafut and his company Realty Concepts has hosted several art-related programs over the past year.

Dozens of people attended the Nov. 21 presentation including representatives from the Illinois State Police, Illinois Tollway, Mayor Ron Gunter, and participating artists and their families. Syrena Feustel from Bolingbrook High School was the grand prize winner.

"We are pleased to showcase the excellent artwork created at schools

throughout Northern Illinois and recognize the talent and creativity of the students and their teachers," said Illinois Tollway Executive Director José Alvarez.

This year more than 70 student artists from more than 20 high

schools throughout Northern Illinois submitted artwork in the contest. More than 17,000 votes were cast online and via Facebook and Instagram to determine the finalists.



Westmont Strategic Plan Update

“There are many important development projects in Westmont at this moment,” said Westmont Mayor Ron Gunter. “Currently, we have over \$250 million worth of economic development investment under review or already underway. It’s an exciting time for the community.” Following is an update regarding some of Westmont’s current economic development projects:

FMC Natatorium at Ty Warner Park—

Construction on the Natatorium project at Ty Warner Park is on schedule and will continue through the winter. The project developers plan for the facility to be completed in the Spring of 2020 and the first formal swimming competition is slated for next summer.



Medical office on Ogden—

A new multi-story medical building has been approved for the 300 block of W. Ogden Ave., west of Park St. The development will include the corner property and the adjoining strip mall. The project is planning to begin demo in the early spring. The village is working with current businesses to relocate within Westmont.

N. Cass Ave. townhomes—

The new townhomes development at 414 N. Cass Ave., just south of the Westmont Public Library, is well underway and units are now available for purchase. This residential project is comprised of 22 luxury townhomes. The development is expected to be completed within the first half of 2020.

Oakmont Point—

The Oakmont Point project, located on Oakmont Ln. off Pasquinelli Dr., initially consists of the redeveloping an existing structure, which was previously owned by the Sirva Company. The structure has been divided into two separate buildings, and as of November, the business Jones Lang LaSalle (JLL) has taken occupancy. Future plans include utilizing a portion of the current parking lot to build a third building. The multi-building project is expected to provide 275,000 sq. ft. of office space.

One North Cass—

Village staff is working closely with a developer regarding the property at the northeast corner of Cass and Burlington. The preliminary plans for this proposed development include a mixed-use building with first-floor commercial space, structured parking, and several floors of apartments. Development details will become available once the project is formally submitted to the village.

In addition to the economic development projects listed above, the Village of Westmont is actively seeking out new commercial and residential projects for Westmont. Quincy Station at Cass & Quincy—

This development recently held a ground-breaking ceremony, and demolition of existing structures has now been completed. Quincy Station will be a five-story, 94-unit luxury apartment building that will bring more residents and footsteps to downtown Westmont. The project is expected to be completed and ready for residential occupancy by the fall of 2021.

Market Centre at 63rd & Cass—

Both L.A. Fitness and Raising Canes restaurant expect to be completed and occupied in 2020. In September, the developer obtained approval for a change in uses within the project. The change included a 35,000 square-foot space intended for retail use instead of the originally-proposed movie theater. Also, a newly approved lease for a Starbucks Coffee has been finalized.

Mariano's expansion—

Westmont Mariano's at 150 W. 63rd St. has received approval from the Village of Westmont to construct and operate a fueling station on their existing property. The fueling station will be built along the 63rd St. side of the property. The construction and completion of this new business is scheduled for 2020.

Westview South & North Plaza residential project proposal—

The village is reviewing a proposal to construct a residential project on the west side of Cass Ave., both north and south of 61st St. The proposal calls for the removal of existing buildings and the construction of new residential buildings.

Westmont Junior High physical education

When we think of technology and teens, the assumption can be a more sedentary time in front of a screen, but Westmont Junior High School is using technology in creative ways to engage and empower students towards heart health and fitness.

Polar Heart Rate Monitors were purchased through a Play 60 grant and enable the students to get immediate in-class feedback about just how hard they are working in PE classes. Each monitor is worn on the left forearm of each student. It is linked to a program that accesses personal information and projects their progress on the board in the front of the room. The colors range



from "Very Light" to "Moderate" to "Maximum." Varying levels of challenge will mean different colors based on each student's needs. The monitors help the students have a communal effort to all work together towards their goal to get in the green zone while offering important individual assessments and challenges as well.

Ms. Emily Hillertz, a PE teacher at the Junior high shares that she loves seeing the students challenge themselves and work together



through the use of heart rate monitors, "It is great for the students and myself as an educator because we all get immediate feedback. The monitors have brought up a great conversation about heart health and how individual students can work towards their goals."

Another PE teacher Mr. Richard Cornacchia led his students through various stations during his class time. "Since we've instituted this (the heart monitors), students have been more active because they have live feedback, and they are excited to use the monitors. We,

as the teachers love it because it gives them all accountability and responsibility for their daily activity as well as giving us information of how best to help each student meet their fitness goals," Mr. Cornacchia

explained. The monitors give individual feedback for each student based on their personal information and help them stay working out at an optimal and fat burning level to promote heart health.

Westmont High School garden

Lisa Hootman shared the high school garden totals now that the growing season has come to an end. It was a great year, and our students were once again amazing at planting, caring for, harvesting, and amassing all of our gardens produce. During each of the previous two years, the students and teachers harvested about 900 pounds of produce from the WHS garden, so this year Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Finlayson challenged the students to harvest 1000 pounds of produce! Well, the students took on the challenge, and they intercropped, put in multiple plantings during the summer, and even added some cool weather crops later in the fall to maximize the space and growing season.



The result was that WHS students brought home the gold and harvested 1098.5 pounds of produce this year! They also harvested, filtered, and bottled 40 pounds of honey from our two beehives. That brings the total to 1138.5 pounds of harvested produce and honey! Out of the total, 470.5 pounds of produce was donated to The People's Resource Center this year, the highest amount ever. We donated 42.8% of our harvest to people in need. It was a great year and was only possible because of Lisa Hootman, Mr. Chamberlain, Mr. Finlayson, and all of our WHS students putting in hours of time and effort to reach our goal.

Community Unit School District 201 schools continue to excel

On Oct. 31, 2019, the Illinois State Board of Education released the school report cards for Illinois schools. The ISBE has a new for tiered rating system. Schools can receive a rating of exemplary, commendable, underperforming, or lowest-performing. Westmont High School has achieved the highest rating and received an exemplary rating. High Schools rated as exemplary have a graduation rate greater than 67% and must perform in the top 10% on the SAT statewide.

Manning, Miller, and Westmont Junior High were all designated as commendable. Schools rated as commendable have no underperforming groups of students and is the second-highest rating Overall, CUSD 201 schools outperform most school in the state with similar demographics.

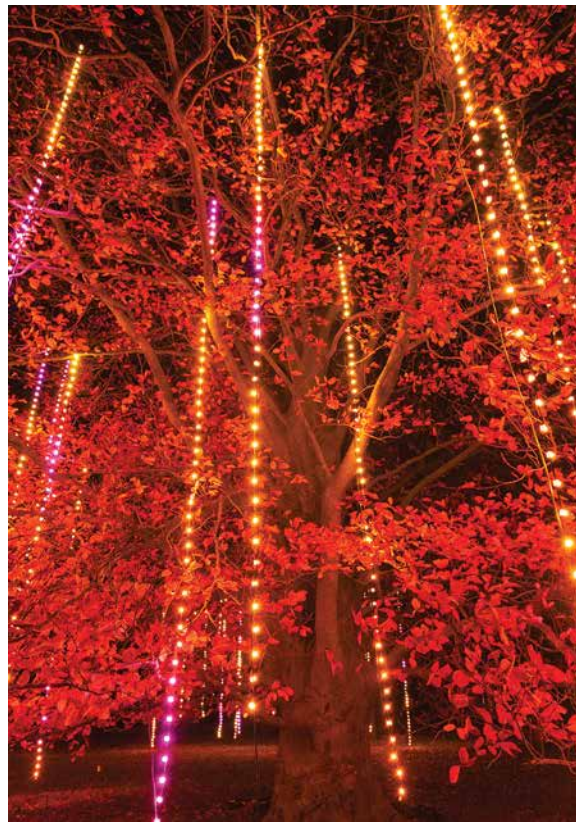
