Superintendent Gets Vote of No Confidence

This week, Holliston educators took an overwhelming vote of 'no confidence' in Dr. Susan Kustka as the Superintendent of Holliston Public Schools.

Citing the Superintendent's failure to provide a supportive work environment within Holliston Public Schools (HPS) where educators feel safe and can flourish, 98% of the voting members of the Holliston Federation of Teachers voted "no confidence" in Dr. Kustka as the Superintendent of Holliston Public Schools. The vote, held by secret ballot over the past week, was 303 votes of "no confidence" to just seven votes of confidence.

"Holliston educators care deeply about the future of our school district. Our school community deserves a leader who is able to prioritize developing relationships and can effectively collaborate with all members of our school community," said Holliston Federation of Teachers President Jaime Cutone. "The membership of the Holliston Federation of Teachers is united in our view that we have no confidence in the leadership ability of Dr. Susan Kustka. It is time that the School Committee hear our concerns and take action to address the issues brought forward."

"Holliston Public Schools raised me. Our teachers, our support staff, and our administrators worked as one to serve the students," said a Robert Adams Middle School educator who wishes to remain anonymous. "Never did I ever imagine feeling the tension and sadness our Superintendent fosters; and that's exactly what our students are being exposed to now."

"Students are no longer at the center of decisions being made at the administrative level," said a Placentino Elementary School educator who asked to remain anonymous. Their sentiments were echoed by another Placentino colleague, who said "Holliston Public Schools deserve a leader whose main priority is helping the kids, not their own agenda."

Educators say that major issues with the Superintendent's leadership include:

- Educator Voice: Dr. Kustka has demonstrated an unwillingness to value educator voice, by not addressing concerns brought forth by educators that directly impact students and by not including educator voice in decision making.
- Collaboration & Communication: Dr. Kustka has demonstrated an inability to take responsibility for and effectively acknowledge and resolve work-related issues.
- Professionalism: Dr. Kustka has demonstrated an inability to consistently maintain the professionalism that is expected by public school educators.
- Retention Crisis: Dr. Kustka has demonstrated an inability to take responsibility for the high rate of loss of valuable educators within Holliston Public Schools, and has been unwilling to create a plan that addresses significant retention issues throughout the district that are leading to high turnover rates. In a school district with 375 staff positions, we have had 216 new staff members in the past 2 ¹/₂ years.
- Equity: Dr. Kustka has demonstrated an unwillingness to create and uphold an equitable work environment by making decisions that promote deeper inequities.

"A leader's number one responsibility is to foster connection, trust, deep listening and tion. Dr. Kustka not only falls short, but she openly denies these duties as her responsibility," said a Holliston High School educator who wishes to remain anonymous. "Our students and our town deserve better."

"I joined the Holliston Public Schools with enthusiasm, understanding that it is a collaborative and student-centered environment," said an HPS educator who asked to remain anonymous. "I have seen staff morale plummet in the past two years as educators' voices have been stifled, their expertise questioned, and their creativity stripped away. Educators who work in fear of the administration are not able to teach effectively or innovatively: ultimately, student learning outcomes suffer."

The members of the Holliston Federation of Teachers expect the School Committee to take immediate action to address these issues and make the following suggestions:

- Educator Voice: Require the Superintendent to value the professional opinions of staff by working with staff in an equitable way to identify issues and seek solutions that address their concerns.
- Collaboration & Communication: Expect that the Superintendent actively engage in perspective-taking to understand that work-related issues are shared issues that all stakeholders must prioritize. Enroll the Superintendent in a communications course and hire a consultant to provide training on effective communication with stakeholders. Establish a plan for resolving issues in a more efficient manner. Engage the Superintendent, School

Committee and Union leadership in training through Federal Mediation Conciliation Services.

- Professionalism: Work with the Town's Human Resources Director to educate the Superintendent on how to act professionally with all employees. Update the HPS policies to include an antihostile work environment policy that includes addressing aggressive behaviors that can lead to a toxic work environment, and include steps for reporting such violations made by the Superintendent directly to the Town's Human Resources Department. Investigate all claims of unprofessional and hostile behavior by the Superintendent in the same manner as claims are handled for other staff members
- Retention: Establish a subcommittee of stakeholders that addresses the reasons why staff are leaving HPS and create a plan that promotes a quality work environment to retain valuable staff. Enroll the Superintendent in leadership training to educate them in how organizational leaders impact workplace culture, how to lead with integrity and compassion, how to inspire staff, and effectively gain buy-in when making major decisions. Require the Superintendent to create a plan on how to gain regular input from staff as it relates to culture and morale and create a process to routinely address issues that lead to turnover.
- Equity: Require the Superintendent to practice equitable treatment of staff and require the Superintendent



to be trained on how differential treatment of staff negatively impacts the work environment.

The feelings of the membership are summed up by Holliston Federation of Teachers Vice President Amanda Rivera, who said: "This is a difficult day for the Holliston community. No educator wanted to have to take this vote in order to get action on these leadership issues that are negatively impacting students and staff. The Holliston Federation of Teachers has been trying for the past two years to explain to Dr. Kustka and the School Committee our concerns with her leadership style, her opinions about our district and its educators, her educational priorities, and the direction she is taking our schools that have always been treasured for their creativity, innovative programming and longstanding expert staff. Our hope is that this vote gets the School Committee to take seriously the voices of the educators in Holliston who are deeply committed to the success and well-being of their students and colleagues."

Any change to building leadership at the high school will lead to further instability and could diminish student outcomes, decrease staff morale and take years to return to making effective progress," Cutone said during the meeting. "Holliston High School is a safe space for educators to take risks, be innovative, prioritize student agency and to collaborate with colleagues in meaningful ways."

The Holliston Planning Board will hold a continued public hearing on June 22 related to CRG Acquisition LLC's application for a Special Permit to build a 550,000 square foot warehouse at 555 Hopping Brook Road.

At the board's April 13 meeting, the meeting was continued to the June date when it is expected to be the sole item on the agenda.

In previous hearings related to building on this parcel, resi-



dents have had concerns about 24-hour access to the site; deterrents and enforcement of truck traffic on town streets; overall impacts to the town; and, in general, whether this is the right location for the proposed facility.

The public hearing was continued to June 22 at 7:02 p.m.

Your Money, Your Independence

Establish Access When Things Are Good, Not When Times Turn Bad

Planning for the unexpected when things are good is a necessary evil.

This is true for electing work benefits, insurance, estate planning and access to equity.

When engaging in discovery with new clients, I often encounter misconceptions or bias against Home Equity Line of Credit (HELOC).

Their mindset is to seek one only when there is a large home repair or renovation project. True, it can be used for this purpose and the interest could be tax-deductible. But there's other benefits to consider in using access to the equity you've built as a tool.

Let's take a step back, make we sure understand the tool.

What's a HELOC? - A second mortgage that allows you to borrow money using the equity in your home as collateral - a secured line of credit. There is an underwriting approval process with a hard credit pull and home appraisal, which determine terms including duration (usually 10-15 years), variable rate benchmark (-/+ Prime Rate) and credit limit.

Most banks/credit unions allow 70% or 80% Loan-To-Value (LTV) minus mortgage balance. For example, your house now appraises for \$800K. At 70% LTV is \$560K less mortgage balance of \$400K means potential \$160K HELOC. At 80% LTV, \$640K - \$400K = \$240K HELOC.

Upon closing, you're provided a checking account to move money into and out of the HELOC as you please. If you do borrow, you will only owe interest for a monthly payment. However, keep the balance at \$0, then no interest or fees.

And that's the strategy - keep the balance at \$0 for the "what ifs" in life.

Take a dual-income household with slightly positive cash flow each month. When bonuses or RSUs vest, they build savings, pay cash for big expenditures, take vacations, etc. They could be approved for ~\$150K HELOC but choose not to plan and apply.

Then the following happens:

Job-Loss - Instead of coming from a position of strength, you're now at the mercy of a lender - good luck on those terms, even if approved. **Bank Balance Sheets Gone Mad** - Fall 2008 saw banks stop issuing new HELOCs almost 2 years. Some tried to reduce, even close HELOCs, but regulators stepped as it is secured line of credit. As long as the collateral (house) and borrower uphold terms of agreement, the banks couldn't change terms - even if you lost your job. Same is not true for credit cards.

World Gone Mad - Remember when we'd shut down for 2 weeks to end a pandemic but instead laid off 38 million by end of April 2020? Banks stopped issuing new HELOCs and slowed new mortgages until October. And those with high limit HELOCs at \$0 balance became cash buyers of vacation homes from cash-seeking sellers. More opportunistic planning occurred using cash-out refi in 2021 on new property to lock in a low, fixed rate.

Economic Downturn - Banks reduce lending in anticipation of economic slowdowns. Regardless of your opinion on recession, we can all agree banks need deposits in order to underwrite new loans/lines. What's been a recent problem banks are having to maintain? Deposits. Declining deposits equals declining new lending applications.

There are more strategies to consider for HELOCs. Like using as an emergency savings proxy to reduce opportunity costs or delay/spread out taxation from selling investments over calendar years to meet unexpected cash needs. Talk to your Certified Financial Planner to learn more.

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Cookies and Community

Gaetano's Bakery Brings North End Quality to Holliston

Nestled at the junction of 16 and 126 is Holliston's answer to the best Italian pastries and cookies.

Gaetano's Bakery highlights their fancy Italian pastry, cookies, and cakes, but this unassuming shop holds so much more. "We make everything here," says Gaetano. "Cakes and cupcakes, cream puffs, cannoli. We've got pizzas and calzones if you want to stop by for lunch. A lot of people who want Italian food will go to Bertucci's for dinner and come next door to us for dessert."

Bakery assistant Amber Rose adds, "Plus, Gaetano makes the best cup of cappuccino in town."

Gaetano (that's his first name, by the way) moved to Holliston in 2017, and he's been a part of the community ever since.

Gaetano has been professionally baking for over 40 years. He began as a young boy working with at his father at a bakery in the North Shore. "Summertimes, with no air conditioning, it used to be a thousand degrees in back." He laughs when he remembers. "We'd spend the whole day hauling bread in and out of ovens, but I found something there that never let me go."

For Gaetano, the joy of baking is not just in the cookies, but in the community. The bakery has a family atmosphere, with lots of laughter and regulars known by name. "We get to know our customers," says Gaetano. "They tell us about their lives."

"Gaetano talks to everyone as if he's known them all his life," says Amber. "You could be the pope, or you could be walking in the store the first time, and he talks to you the same." Gaetano says that's because he's Sicilian. "It's a comfortable atmosphere. We're always laughing about something, joking around, just making everyone feel welcome."

Customers tend to stop in the first time for coffee and a cookie, just to try it. "But then they start coming back for everything," Gaetano says. "Birthday cakes, cookie trays for parties, wedding cakes—whenever they're getting together with family or friends, they think of us first."

Amber says, "My favorite customers are the ones who want a box of cookies and then go back and forth in front of the cases. 'A few of these. Some of those. Oh, do you have these, too?' They get so excited. For some customers, these cookies are nostalgic, and tasting them again brings them right back to their childhood."

A sign over the display case says, "I'll have one of everything." It's a gift made by a loyal customer.

The biggest sellers are the pistachio macaroons. Gaetano says, "Come Thanksgiving and

Christmas, people stand in line out the door, waiting for cookies to come out of the oven. Customers will be walking outside with the box lids open and the hot cookies steaming in the cold."

Amber adds, "One customer brings them to tailgate parties." It turns out, he brought them once, and ever since, everyone demands he bring nothing else. "He came in asking for five pounds to take on a plane to Philadelphia. The host said, 'You're bringing those pistachio cookies, right?' and he said, 'I guess I am."

Another customer came in with an emergency request for a wedding cake. "Normally there'd be no way to do this," says Amber. "We need at least a week's advance notice. But because it was such a unique circumstance, Gaetano got it done in a few days. The community is that important to him."

A glance at the online menu shows an overwhelming selection

of cookies, pastries, and cakes that rotate through the bakery. While not every option is available every day, if a customer knows they're coming in for one specific item, they can call ahead. "We're flexible," says Amber. "Moreover, if it's not on the menu, just ask. Nine times out of ten, Gaetano can make it."

One break with tradition is the list of allergy-friendly offerings. The menu offers gluten free bottomless cheesecakes, gluten free cannoli, gluten free cakes, and even vegan options for froyo. The famous pistachio maca-roons? Also gluten free.

"It's about making what people love, in the way they need it, when they need it." says Gaetano. "People tell me what they want, and I'm here to bake it for them."

Panthers' Frassinelli would Welcome Deep Tourney Run

Lacrosse Captain A Top-notch Defender

Bobby Frassinelli is a topnotch defender for the boys lacrosse team at Holliston High and there's no doubt that his leadership, instinctive nature and intensity has played a key role in the Panthers' quest for another berth in the state tournament.

A senior captain, the 6-foot, 170-pound Frassinelli wants another opportunity to compete in the playoffs after Holliston split a pair of matches last year. The Panthers, who finished their regular season at 5-13, defeated Lenox, which had a 16-4 record, then bowed to Hanover. The new tourney format allows teams with sub-.500 records to qualify based on strength of schedule and margin of defeat.

At Local Town Pages deadline, Holliston was far better off than last year, not relying on its strong schedule or its margin in defeats. The Panthers' record was 8-6 and they're in good position to land a favorable seed in the playoffs.

"At the start of the season, my goals were for our team to improve daily, get to the tourney again and go deeper than last year," Frassinelli said. "We're a super young team that has freshmen and sophomores in the rotation, but we're talented. We can not only qualify for the playoffs, but also advance if we continue to give 100 percent, remain cohesive and stay healthy."

Frassinelli's personal goals speak volumes about his team-first nature.

"I want to help the players around me and leave the program in good hands," he emphasized. "Another objective is to improve my defensive ability."

Holliston coach John Mulvaney was eager to get Frassinelli back in action last year after he played in only one match as a sophomore. The Holliston native suffered a dislocated shoulder in the opener against Norwood and the injury forced Frassinelli to the sideline for the rest of the season. He underwent physical therapy and it took five months of rehab to regain his health.

"Bobby has many strengths," Mulvaney offered. "He's got a

strong work ethic, he's intense, coachable and instinctive. His lacrosse IQ is high, he's coachable and technically sound. On defense, he's a step ahead of his opponents. A team-first player, he does what's needed and he knows how to adapt. When he was injured, he still came to every practice and every match."

A captain who leads by example, Frassinelli also takes that role to another level. "I try to be supportive of every teammate," he said. "I'm always positive, encouraging and willing to help our young players to improve."

The 18-year-old Frassinelli likes defense — a lot!

"Technique and strategy are always in play," he said. "There's a reliance on footwork and positioning. Instincts and intelligence are needed to stop an attacker and communication is a must. The key to success is to be disciplined and patient, avoid giving up your position and know that you can trust your teammates to protect your back."

Two matches in his junior year remain memorable — an 8-6 loss to Dover-Sherborn and a 7-6 double overtime victory over Assabet Valley.

"Dover-Sherborn is a powerhouse team but we played them close all the way," Frassinelli noted. "I guarded their best attackman and held him scoreless until he got his only goal in a scramble. The Assabet game was a back-and-forth battle. Our midfielder, Nick Cotting, scored, giving us a hard-earned victory."

Frassinelli is acutely aware that the Panthers lost 13 seniors to graduation, leaving the team a bit inexperienced. But, he greatly admires three junior teammates and the attributes they possess.

"Co-captain David Villa leads by example and by being vocal," Frassinelli said. "A defender, he's got great stick skills and is very physical. Sean MacLeod is our goalie and he's got good composure and instincts. He clears the ball very effectively. Midfielder Harry Smith is quick, good in transition and his shot is fast and accurate."

Frassinelli also admires Mulvaney and his son Ryan, who is the Panthers' defensive coordinator. "Coach Mulvaney is an excellent leader who's positive, encouraging and motivating," he said. "He knows how to help us improve. And, Ryan has a high lacrosse IQ on defense, knows the technical stuff and he promotes cohesive play."

Frassinelli, who started playing lacrosse at age seven in Holliston's youth program, is a National Honor Society student who will attend Purdue University next fall and major in computer science. He plans on playing club lacrosse there.

Calling his parents (Michael and Katie) role models for emphasizing leadership and showing support and encouragement, Frassinelli relies on an athletic philosophy of winning, reaching one's potential and having fun. "It's important to be your best self," he said. "Losing motivates me because I like to win."

Life lessons that Frassinelli has learned from playing lacrosse and basketball should be valuable going forward.

"I've learned to stay calm and composed in pressure moments, to communicate with teammates and to overcome adversity, he said. "I've also learned to be mentally tough and how to be a leader. Our team has matured a lot and it's hard work and being flexible that are important."

A deep tourney run would be a welcomed situation for the Panthers. And, it would also be greeted by Frassinelli with great joy and satisfaction.

Bobby Frassinelli's team-first approach and the supportive style he so often displays with teammates are attributes worthy of reward.

Stylist: "Ok, we can highlight your hair a number of ways. What kind of look are you going for?"

Client: "Oh no, I don't want highlights, I just want a blonde balayage."

Balayage or Highlights? Confused about what to ask your hairstylist for? You're not alone. If you're fretting on which service is best for you, stop worrying! Here's something I bet you didn't know:

Balayage is simply a highlighting technique to get you to the desired look you want. In recent years, though, the word Balayage has become synonymous with dark-rooted, blonde hair, and most clients that request it are actually just looking for that specific style. In reality, multiple techniques are used to attain that look. Balayage, Foilayage, Baby lights, Teasylights and Foil Highlights are all just different names for coloring techniques used to lighten (and sometimes darken) your hair.

These techniques aren't just for blonding anymore. The brunette Balayage is huge this summer and the perfect way for all you darker haired beauties to boost your brown tresses.

With that, let's chat about our two most popular coloring services - Balayage and Foil Highlights.

Balayage, pronounced BAH-LEE-AHGE, means "to sweep" in French, and is, by far, the most requested color service at The b.LUXE Studio. Highlights are hand-painted directly on the hair to create a natural gradient from dark to light. The lightened pieces appear more naturally placed and lived-in, which mimics what the sun does to our hair naturally. This free-form color application can be heavy or subtle, depending on how the stylist sections your hair. But, (and this is a big but) Balayage is not for everyone and can only lift (lighten) hair about 3-4 shades. So, if you're a dark brunette looking for light, honey-blonde highlights, this technique is not for you.

But, fear not, blonde-seekers! The Balayage "look" you so desire is still well within your reach.

If your hair does need a considerable amount of lift, your stylist will need to use foil highlights.

- Takes between 2 to 5 hours, depending on the length and thickness of your hair.
- Maintenance: Every 12-18 weeks with a gloss/toner refresh around the 6-8 week mark to revive your blonde tone. With the darker root and no obvious demarcation line of regrowth, Balayage is considered a more lowmaintenance highlighting technique with more time between appointments.

FOIL HIGHLIGHTS:

- Foiling is the preferred method for that all-over, big, blonde look.
- Color is usually placed evenly along the whole section of hair, from root to tip.



- Sheets of foil are used as a platform for color and lightener. They encapsulate and separate highlights to boost lift while processing.
- Your stylist may choose to use one color or multiple colors for a more multi-dimensional result.




