whose mother brought him to Norwood to get him out of Boston, but he was murdered visiting his grandparents on a weekend. Very tragic story that hit many students very hard. Sometime after the comfort dogs visited the school, Officer Baguma brought forward a proposal that we rethink the issue of a comfort dog. I'm glad he did, because having given it more thought I now see the great value in having one. Quite frankly, she is a bigger hit than I even imagined."

Although Mustang Sally is an officially on the Norwood Police Department, she is still in training, but that is not to say she is not already fulfilling her duties or responsibilities.

"Best I can tell, her job is to be calm and furry," Chief Brooks said. "But seriously, she will interact with children, and in some cases adults and senior citizens. (She has already been to the senior center where she was also a big hit.) I believe, as the term implies, she will be a comfort to people who may be in distress, particularly children in a school setting. She is also a natural draw.

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walking straight for her, wanting to pat her and take a photo. So she has that effect of drawing people to her, and therefore, towards us."

While the original proposition to bring on a comfort dog was came from Officer Baguma and Chief Brooks was able to clearly see the benefits of a comfort dog, there were other government officials who were brought into discussions.

"I discussed it first with Deputy Chief Padden, and then he and I met with Officer Baguma," Chief Brooks said. "And since

talk about the importance of a comfort/therapy dog, then make it a reality," Officer Baguma said. "Once again, I tip my hat to the Chief, the Deputy Chief, the Norwood Police Association, the Town Manager, and the School Superintendent.

Early on, several of us suggested the name Sally," Chief Brooks said. "It's a pretty name for a pretty girl, and the mustang connection seemed natural. But we were committed to asking the children and the people of the town for input. And as it turns out, Sally was the clear front runner as we gathered input."

Mustang Sally is partnered with Officer Baguma, both on duty and at home as she will live with Baguma and his family while she is 'off' duty. But their days are not just spent visiting the

community, there is a lot of work done behind the scenes by this new dynamic duo!

"I have already mentioned that Sally has been a big hit, but I want to talk about what a great job Officer Baguma has done with her and with this project," Chief Brooks said. "As I mentioned, she lives with him, and his family, which must have taken some adjustment on their part. And there is a training regimen, which requires him to train three hours per day with her for four days every week."

It feels pretty awesome having a really well behaved dog as a partner," Officer Baguma said. "It almost feels like I/we won the lottery. I am pleasantly surprised to see how her popularity is absolutely skyrocketing, both in and outside of the town.'

Norwood residents have welcomed Mustang Sally with open arms. Everywhere she goes, she seems to draw a crowd, and happy faces. She already has an ice cream flavor named after her at Daddy's Dairy and her puppy cards almost sold out immediately, even with a double order!

Mustang Sally met with her siblings at last month's Coffee with a Cop, at Perks, last month. And while she was smaller than others in her family, she was definitely the spunkiest! Her ease with meeting the public was almost like she knew her role as soon as she arrived.

"We believe that she was the pick of the litter," Officer Baguma said. "And also believe that she actually chose us in the end.

# **Keeping Pets with Families**

It can be heartbreaking to hear. Someone has to give up a member of their pet family due to financial or hardship constraints or an unexpected setback. The volunteers, and specifically CAPI founder and President Kandi Finch, have stepped up to try to assist their owners in order to keep beloved pet.

The name of this newly formed non-profit organization is Charley's Angels Pet Initiative (CAPI). Based right here in Norwood, the goal and mission of the group is simply: keep families and pets together through hard times. This will hopefully be done initially with donations of pet food and accessories through food pantry bins; long term, assistance with medical expenses, and much more. CAPI is definitely a moving force. Volunteers will also reach out and relationships with local Councils on Agings, housing authorities, and rescues/shelters to provide direct, personal assistance.

"It breaks my heart every time I hear about someone having to surrender rehome, or euthanize their pet because they cannot afford to keep it," Finch said. "I feel that the people who need a pet the most might not be able to afford to have one."

While CAPI is a register 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization run exclusively by volunteers, they are not your typical animal group and are filling a very specific and needed niche in pet ownership.

"We are not a rescue," Finch said. "We are here to help support anyone trying to keep pets and their humans together. We will partner with any agency, clinic, veterinarian, ACO (Animal Control Officer), or shelter where we can to help."

While CAPI is just in its infancy stage, the idea has been swirling in Finch's head for quite some time. For the past few years, she has been known to transport small, hurt wildlife across the state for either rehabilitation or medical care. This is her chance to bring it home and help family pets.

"I am doing this for my love of animals," Finch said. "I have been thinking about it for several years and decided after talking to like-minded friends, to stop talking and do it. Way too much sad news about animals in the news lately."

Many may relate to the Charley's Angels reference to the tv show of days past, but the name of the organization has a much deeper meaning to Finch.

"I rescued my dog Charley in August of 2016," Finch said. Over the years, I have noticed how gentle he is.

He seems to know when he is around people who are challenged in any way, whether it's wheelchairs, cane/crutches. He is also sensitive to seniors. He is training to be a therapy dog; he already achieved his Canine Good Citizens certification.

When I was trying to think of a name it occurred to me that (a little cheeky) he is an angel and hopefully he will be helping us to help other animals who are in need. What a better name than Charleys' Angels? These angels come in 2 and 4 legged versions."

CAPI will initiate its assistance in Norwood, Westwood, Walpole, and Canton, but that list will hopefully grow throughout most of Norfolk County.


CAPI is currently accepting donations in the form of food, toys, blankets, bowls, etc, in addi-

# You Have To Learn to Live With It!

We all look for balance in our lives, but achieving it is a more difficult task. It's not uncommon that when a specific health challenge occurs and has been interfering with our life, for many, they seek their primary doctor's advice. But after going through many tests and/or imaging they may get the answer "Great news, all your tests and images are normal." That is great, but that doesn't answer the question, why do I still feel this way?

Over 80% of our understanding of the world is through our eyes. Visual impairment not only affects individuals and their loved ones, but also poses an annual economic burden exceeding \$100 billion in the US alone.

The human body is a marvel of interconnected systems and extensive research has demonstrated that comprehensive eye care is a vital component of overall healthcare.

Serious eye conditions, including ocular tumors and infections, can jeopardize systemic health and are detectable through a thorough ocular exam. Lifestyle factors, including diet, exercise, alcohol, and tobacco use, have a significant impact on ocular conditions like macular degeneration, cataracts, and thyroid eye disease. Discussing these factors with your doctor and working together to mitigate risks is essential.

The good news is that preventing or mitigating the effects of systemic conditions on ocular health, and vice versa, is straightforward. The best method for preserving eye health and vision is through regular, medicallyfocused eye exams, adherence to treatment plans, and lifestyle adjustments. Recognizing the interplay between systemic health and eye health enables us to take proactive steps toward early detection, prevention, and overall well-being.



**the Norwood Senior Center** We've been doing a lot of work the past year on traffic enforcement. During COVID we backed off because we didn't want officers interacting with motorists too much, for everyone's safety. But as traffic volume decreased, speeds and crashes increased.

So now that COVID is somewhat behind us, our officers are back at traffic enforcement at even higher levels than before. But most of our efforts are focused on violations that cause crashes - speed, red lights, stop signs, not stopping for pedestrians and texting while driving - and at places where crashes occur. We call this data-driven enforcement. And after we've run what in the old days we used to call a "trap" (we don't call it that anymore), we often advertise on Facebook, Twitter etc. that we were out there and what we were doing.

If only the person stopped knows we're out there, there is a limited educational effect. But if we let our 10,000 followers know, it has greater impact.

You may know that Massachusetts police officers are required to train at least 40 hours every year after they graduate the police academy. But did you know that we average about twice that? We are very proud of our high training standards, and we believe they help us achieve the high rate of success that we and our community enjoy.

This month, we're back at the range under the guidance of our firearms training team led by Lieutenant David Benton. Not only do we line up to qualify, but we also shoot "on the move," in and around our radio cars, working as pairs, shooting offhand, way up close, way back, etc. As long as I've been a cop, I've always loved the range. But I also love what our officers and community get from our commitment to quality training.

#### Can the Fire Department Easily Enter Your House?

What if there was an emergency and the fire department had to enter your home? In order to avoid breaking in a window or door, try purchasing a firefighter key box outside your home. Just put an extra key in the box and then call the fire department so they can make note of where the box is and the combination. You could also ask them if a traditional lockbox (like a Realtor uses) would be a good solution.

In the unfortunate occasion an emergency occurs, Norwood FD will be able to get into your house quickly to assist. You can find a fire emergency box or lockbox at your local hardware store or on Amazon.com and search for fire department box or lock box.

#### **Still Beware of Scams**

There has been a lot of information lately warning not only seniors, but all ages, to beware of scams, phone, online, mail, etc. But always be aware of your surroundings from people looking to steal directly, such as pickpocketing or grabbing wallets from purses from distracted shoppers.

Years ago, I was pickpocketed in Paris when I was in my early 20's. I was on a bus with a friend and two young girls began kissing my hand and talking in French. I had my bag around my neck and through arm as we are suggested to do, however, they put a piece of paper over my bag. The point was to distract me while they did their job. When I finally realized what was happening, they had already unzipped my bag!

The point of kissing my hand and talking very fast in a language I was unfamiliar with was to distract me! I learned a very valuable lesson that day. And by the way, the same girls tried the very same thing a few hours later to me on a sidewalk. Apparently, they did this so often they didn't even recognize me from before!

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# **Norwood Sports** Norwood Girls Track Looking Toward The Future

Participating in the Tri Valley League is never easy, and it becomes even harder being a girls track team in Norwood. The Mustangs have had a difficult time going up against the likes of Medfield, Westwood, and Hopkinton, to name a few over the years. And although Norwood Track Coach Alanna Keady knows that Norwood will never be on the same level as some of the TVL powerhouses, she is hoping to get her girls involved on a competitive basis.

"We didn't have the greatest of seasons with only one win, but it's tough when you're going up against schools with huge numbers ii the TVL," the Mustang Coach said. "Although our numbers are nothing like the other TVL competitors, our numbers were up this year. I believe that we had the most girls take part in about five years; we were around 40 and that's a good start."

Not only are the numbers starting to improve, but the Mustangs also fielded a very strong sophomore class and will only see three seniors depart from this year's squad. Unfortunately, one of those senior runners will be Tina Fontaine, who has been a fixture for Norwood in both the 100- and 200-meter runs. Fontaine, who was the Mustangs top point scorer this year, qualified for



both events in the post season but elected not to participate. With her remarkable ability to score points on a regular basis, she will surely be missed on the track.

Another senior graduating was Payton Otto, a sprinter who excels in the 100. Despite joining the team midway through the season to hook up with her friends and have fun before leaving Norwood, she was supportive of the squad and tried to help them win. The final senior running for the Mustangs was foreign exchange student Lise Marie, from France. According to Keady, Marie was one of the team's best 200-meter runs with a time around 30 seconds.

As the seniors depart the

school, Keady has six juniors, which will be led by Jordyn Robinson, moving up to become seniors next season and taking control of the team. Norwood doesn't have captains, just senior leaders, so Keady is looking for those now seniors to step up and guide the younger girls and give them a positive mindset while looking up to them.

Robinson, who was a big point earner for the Mustangs this past year, takes part in the hurdles, sprints, and her best event, the high jump.

"She is a very versatile individual; an athlete that you can move around to help the team out on any given day," Keady said. "She can help us out in so many different ways and is one of those individuals who just wants to help the team out in any way that she can."

Emerging from the strong sophomore class this past year, Keady had two girls (Natalie Martin and Catherin Cronin) qualify for the MIAA Track and Field Division 3 Championships in their events.

Martin ran the mile and posted her best time of 5:28.84 for the year and came in seventh place during the TVL Championship Meet. According to Keady, Martin is an amazing runner with top talent and unfortunately didn't have her best performance at the Division 3 Meet running a time of 5:38.80. The incoming junior next fall will be adding cross country to her resume in addition to two seasons of track becoming a full-time Norwood runner.

Cronin will once again run the 800 for Norwood. This past year she had a qualifying time of 2:29.77 in the event, but much like her teammate, she too didn't have one of her better performances at the Divisional Meet. She crossed the finish line with a time of 2:34.84.

"As sophomores, just to get there was a big accomplishment and hopefully it will help them in the future," Keady said. "Natalie and Catherine will be our leaders in the distance category and hopefully will once again qualify in their individual events. Having a partner to train with helps push you and both girls are up for the challenge."

As for next spring, Keady is hoping that a sprinter emerges for the Mustangs and steps up to take Fontaine's spot, although they will be big shoes to fill. The Norwood coach is also hoping that the team can improve upon their one-win season, although she knows it will be tough, in addition to finding a diamond in the rough with the incoming ninth graders as well as boosting the team's numbers (Keady is wishing to get to 50 girls next year).

Over the past years, Norwood has not had huge numbers, if any at all, in the field events and the coach wants to try to expand those events.

"We had no throwers at all this year and that puts you in a bind right away during a meet as you are already finding yourself down 20 points or so," Keady said. "We need to try to grow the numbers and get some girls in those events. For some reason, Norwood girls are scared of the throwing events. We will be looking for some help in this area so that we can build upon that for the future; you can't win if you're already down in points because you don't have any bodies to take part in those events."

# Hamwey to be Inducted into Bellingham's Hall of Fame



Bellingham Bulletin sports writer Ken Hamwey will be inducted into the Bellingham Athletics Hall of Fame on Friday, Nov. 17, at the Coachmen's Lodge.

The 80-year-old Hamwey, a Bellingham resident who's worked for the Bulletin for 16 years, was a unanimous choice of the selection committee. In addition to the Bulletin, the veteran sports journalist continues to write feature stories in semiretirement for Local Town Pages, focusing on seven communities — Medway, Millis, Norfolk, Wrentham, Holliston, Natick and Franklin.

Hamwey, who's been a Bell-

ingham resident for 51 years, graduated from Natick High before earning a bachelor's degree from Babson College. He started his newspaper career in 1967 with the Framingham News, now the Metrowest Daily News. During his first year as a sports reporter, his stories focused on Bellingham's new football program that achieved varsity status in 1967 and was coached by George Anderson. Early on, his reporting ranged from high school and college sports to the professional beat where he covered the Boston Celtics and the New England Patriots.

"I'm honored and humbled to be selected for induction into

Bellingham's Hall of Fame," Hamwey said. "It's heart-warming to have a wonderful community like Bellingham recognize me for my reporting. Some of my fondest memories during a 56year career involve Bellingham's athletes and teams."

Hamwey covered the Blackhawks's baseball and softball teams in 2014 that won state championships on Flag Day, June 14.

"It turned out to be a banner day for the town," Hamwey said. "The baseball team defeated Monument Mountain Regional and the softball team upset twotime champion Grafton. Both triumphs were in Worcester. The boys competed at Holy Cross and the girls captured their crown at Worcester State."

Hamwey also covered many of the high school's elite players and coaches. He broke the story on Rick Santos when he was chosen to compete in the Hula Bowl after a dynamic career at the University of New Hampshire. He was on the scene when the Blackhawks won two state titles in field hockey during the coaching reign of Ron Bonollo. He also covered the BHS boys basketball team that defeated Bromfield for a state championship in 2003.

# **Norwood Sports** Norwood's Jammalamadaka Proving His Worth

Norwood's Partha Jammalamadaka has been playing tennis since the sixth grade when his dad got him into the sport. Immediately, he fell in love with the sport and found it satisfying when he made a shot. Since that day, he has continued to improve his game, so by the time he got to high school, he wanted to join Norwood Tennis Coach John Churchill's squad.

The then freshman figured that he'd be able to make the team in some aspect, most likely down the ladder somewhere. Following the tryouts Jammalamadaka was totally beside himself when the coach told him that he'd be playing first singles as a freshman.

"I really thought that I'd be playing doubles that first year," Jammalamadaka said. "Whenever I played with my dad, we always played doubles, so I was not used to playing singles at all. During the Covid year, a lot of kids moved on from tennis to other sports; it was nerve wracking to be playing first singles. I was not sure what to expect that year."

To be thrown into the number one position on the team was stressful for Jammalamadaka as he was unsure of the situation that he was getting into with the high school team. He found it to be somewhat crazy as he didn't believe that his talent was that of a number one singles player, especially as a freshman. Playing in that top spot saw the first-year high school player squaring off against a majority of talented seniors who were much more experienced in his opinion.

"He was our strongest player on the team as only a freshman and was awarded the top position," Churchill said. "He finished the year 6-10, which is remarkable for a freshman. He had wins over six different seniors that year and went to extended matches four times."

Although he put together a rather successful first season, Jammalamadaka was not quite on par at the beginning of the season playing singles. After he recorded his first win against Westwood, he realized that things weren't that bad and that he might actually have a chance of picking up some more wins. That win not only got the freshman excited, but also raised his expectations hoping to go at least .500 for the season.

"I was not exactly thrilled with my six wins as I did not meet my goals," Jammalamadaka said. "I wanted to work on my game, but my family went to India that summer so there was no chance of practicing, but as soon as I got back I worked on my technical issues and raised my confidence.

This past season, the now sophomore found that his confidence and mental game on the court were much better and that his technical skills had improved. He found, however, that the competition was still tough as he was still facing seniors in the number one singles position. Jammalamdaka went 9-7 this past spring.

"The competition was still tough, but I felt that it was a little easier than last year," Jammalamadaka said. "The victories I did get were earned and not freebees. Coming into this year, I was better prepared to who I was going up against while last year I had no idea what I was up against. I knew more about the teams and the types of players they had; my confidence was also high."

According to Churchill, the sophomore was much more dominant this year. Within his nine wins, eight were in straight sets (last year he only had two straight set wins); the other win was decided in a Super Tie Breaker in which he won 10-5. Over his last seven matches of the season, Jammalamadaka won six of those matches with his only loss coming against Hopkinton, a team that was seeded fifth in the Division 2 State Tournament.

"He did have some early trouble with a high number of double faults, but he worked hard on being more reliable with that first serve," the Mustang Coach said. "He did a much better job over the last part of the season by not making those unforced errors. He continued to improve over the course of the season and found the kind of shots he could use to win matches."

"Originally I was too worried about my opponent and how they were going to take advantage of my serves, especially those players that were backboards and sending my serves back," Jammalamadaka said. "It was frustrating and annoying, but it was basically my own fault and not playing consistent. I was continually playing over aggressively."

The opponents that had success against the sophomore were athletes that were able to neutralize his power and go at him with a more offensive game.

"Partha has a lot of potential, and if he works to improve his game during the off-season he should come back even stronger," Churchill said. "He needs to work on his backhand and mental hurdles. He should be in a better space come next year, but that is not anything against the season he had this year. It was a big accomplishment to have a Norwood player go over .500, I have never seen anyone do it and I've been here since 2009."



Jammalamadaka already has recorded 15 wins over his first two years on the team playing in that number one position. Churchill noted that to do so is remarkable.

With the year having gone by the wayside, the now incoming junior will be looking to continue to improve his game, which in retrospect improve his record. As for continuing to play tennis after high school, things are still too far away for him to start considering. However, he would like tennis to be a part of his future in some way or another, but right now he's looking toward his final two seasons with Norwood.

Others to be inducted include Carrie Wernig (field hockey), Mike Trudeau (baseball), Justin Bernard (football), Bob McManus (hockey), Justin Park (hockey), Beth Thornton (field Hockey), Joanne Paquette (field hockey), Joanne Paquette (field hockey), Coach), Dave Gibbs (basketball coach), Rick Smith (contributor) and the 1996 field hockey team.

Hamwey, who'll be inducted as a contributor, left the Metrowest Daily News in 1973 and was hired at the Providence Journal where he spent the next 35 years working for the four-time Pulitzer-prize-winning newspaper. He finished his career there as the paper's Night Sports Editor, retiring in 2008. On Hamwey's last day in Providence, the Rhode Island State Senate read aloud a citation for his efforts and contributions to R.I. athletics. Two years later, in 2010, he was honored by the Mass. Interscholastic Athletic Association (MIAA), which presented him with its Distinguished Friend Award.

At the Metrowest News, which included editions of the Milford News and Country Gazette, Hamwey wrote a popular weekly column — "Yesterday's Heroes" — that focused on athletes' and coaches' past achievements. Many of Bellingham's top-notch coaches and athletes were featured in that column.

In 2007, Hamwey began covering sports for the Bellingham Bulletin. As Sports Editor at the Bulletin, he launched a column similar to Yesterday's Heroes called "Where Are They Now," reporting on former Bellingham athletes. For the next 16 years, he extensively covered Bellingham sports while also filing stories for Local Town Pages.

Hamwey's upcoming induction will be his second Hall of Fame honor. He was inducted into the Millis Athletics Hall of Fame last year.

Hamwey and his wife Pauline, who taught at Macy School for 35 years, have been married for 34 years. His son, Travis, is a 1989 graduate of Bellingham High and a 1993 graduate of UMass-Dartmouth.

# Type of Land Plans Available at Norfolk County Registry of Deeds

Norfolk County Register of Deeds William P. O'Donnell recently reminded homeowners that only a certain type of land plan is recorded at the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds, and it is not a plot plan.

"One of the questions we hear frequently from homeowners at the Registry of Deeds is, 'Can I get a copy of my plot plan?"" O'Donnell said. "Plot plans are not recorded here at the Registry. What is recorded are land plans, which simply provide the overall dimensions of a property. Sometimes a land plan may get recorded that shows a structure on the lot, but more often than not at the Registry of Deeds it does not.

There are times when homeowners require a plot plan when doing a capital improvement, such as an addition to their home or installing a swimming pool. A plot plan, or site plan, contains retained and proposed buildings. Again, the Registry of Deeds does not record these types of plans here in Norfolk County. There are communities where the building department may have filed plot plans showing the locations of structures as well as various dimensions of those structures and the dimensions of the structures relative to the lot.

"Plot plans are not always available to the public," O'Donnell said. "In some cases, they may only be accessible to the property owner or a licensed surveyor. Also, remember that these plans may not be up-to-date or accurate as changes to the property may have been made since the plan was filed. It is always best to consult with a licensed surveyor or other professional before relying on any plot plan for legal or construction purposes."

Many times, a mortgage plot plan will be compiled as part of a real estate transaction or mortgage refinancing. Homeowners should check their records first if they are in need of a mortgage plot plan. Also, in some cases, town building departments may have an accurate copy of a property's plot plan and/or the property's as built plan. If not, the homeowner would have to contract a surveyor if they need to have a plot plan created.

Land plans, which are recorded at the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds, provide the overall dimensions of a property.

"On property deeds, there is a section which lists the metes and bounds (description) of the property," O'Donnell noted. "Most deeds also contain a cross reference to a land plan Book



and Page number recorded here at the Registry. Land plans can be useful if there is a question amongst neighbors about a property line or just highlighting other dimension issues that relate to the property.

The Norfolk County Registry of Deeds has available for view-

ing documents and plans going back to the Registry's beginnings in 1793. Non-certified copies of our documents and plans can be viewed and printed free of charge via our website, www.norfolk-

Copies of land plans that do not contain non-certified copy language are available for a fee of \$1 per plan (size 8  $\frac{1}{2}$  x 11 inches) plus an additional \$1 per plan for postage. Larger plans, 11 x 17 inches or 18 x 24 inches, cost \$2 per plan plus an additional \$1 per plan for postage. If you desire a copy of a plan from the Registry and you know the plan Book and Page number, send in a mail request to the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds, 649 High St., Dedham, MA 02026, along with a check made out to the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds for the appropriate amount. If you are not sure of your land plan Book

and Page numbers or have further questions about land plans, you can call the Customer Service Center, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. As always, the Norfolk County Registry of Deeds is more than able and willing to assist our customers, the citizens of Norfolk County."
