FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - The 28th annual Taste of Fair Oaks was held on May 19 at North Ridge Country Club. More than 500 ticket holders came out

to celebrate in style and taste the flavors of Fair Oaks and the surrounding communities.

Hosted by the Fair Oaks Chamber of Commerce (FOCC), this event is the Chamber's largest

fundraiser of the year with a portion of proceeds going to the Orangevale-Fair Oaks Food Bank.

Planning for the 2023 event began in January. "I want to share my sincere appreciation to the many volunteers who spent countless hours before, during, and after to help make this event possible," said Kimberley Pitillo, FOCC Executive Director.

Sacramento County Hires New Shelter Operator

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County has hired a new non-profit shelter operator to take over operations of the Full Service Rehousing Shelter (FSRS) program. FSRS provides low-barrier sheltering and re-housing services for highly vulnerable adults experiencing unsheltered homelessness that may not be served successfully by traditional sheltering programs. FSRS provides 24-hour interim housing, meals, case management, transportation, and support services. Currently, this program is being operated by Sacramento Self-Help Housing, Inc. (SSHH) through a scattered-site model using approximately 23 single-family homes. Due to ongoing financial concerns with SSHH, the County will not pursue a contract renewal with SSHH for the Scattered Site Shelter program after the contract's end on June 30, 2023.

The County has entered into an agreement with City Net, a non-profit homeless services organization that has a history of collaborative success in several communities in California. City Net is an organization that provides street outreach, case management, housing navigation, bridge housing, shelter operations, census coordination, and more through coordination with local service partners and community-based organizations. For this contract, City Net will manage the day-to-day operations and provide wrap-around case management and supportive services for program participants. Additionally, City Net will lease sites for use in this program and manage landlord relationships. City Net held a hiring event this past Saturday to identify staffing for the expansion of work in Sacramento.

"City Net is pleased to have been selected as the new Sacramento County scattered site project lead," said Brad Fieldhouse, President, and Executive Director for City Net. "We recognize and share the commitment by all parties involved to continue this important work, and our team is looking forward to jumping in and giving it a fresh start."

Many of the current property owners and landlords who have been leasing scattered site housing to SSHH are owed



Continued from page 1 several months of unpaid rent. In anticipation of closing its doors no later than June 30, SSHH has been in communication with landlords to ramp down leases formally used for sheltering and to share the opportunity for potential continuation with a newly selected provider. These units are vital to the longterm success of the FSRS program, and County staff have been working directly with landlords to identify the amount of arrears owed, repairs in need and continuing relationships for future collaborative opportunities.

To expedite the start date for City Net to begin work, the County has executed a short-term contract to ensure that City Net has a three-month overlap with Sacramento Self Help Housing before fully taking over the program for a multi-year term beginning

July 1, 2023

"We appreciate the County's diligence in finding an operator that can help transition the clients without risk of them losing shelter," said Sacramento Self Help Housing Board Chair Ethan Evans. "Our number one priority is the safety and security of this vulnerable population, and we trust the County and City Net will provide them with what they need to succeed."

The intent of this agreement is to bridge the ramp-down of this program with SSHH in regard to program participants, and the ramp-up of City Net as the operator moving forward. During this transition period, no new clients will be enrolled in the program; services under this contract are intended to minimize displacement due to the ramp-down of SSHH and to provide smooth transitions for those

clients that will be receiving services from City Net. The County has already started to pay unpaid lease balances, utilities and damages to property owners and property management companies and plans to pay future rents for the months of May and June 2023, if the landlord is interested in remaining in the program.

"The County has been working tirelessly to ensure none of our clients go unsheltered during this transition," said Director of Sacramento County Homeless Services and Housing Emily Halcon. "This program has had a lot of success in the past, and we know that once it gets running again at full capacity, we'll see positive outcomes for our unhoused population."

Financial abuse can include someone stealing money or credit cards. It can also occur when an older adult is forced to sign a document related to finances or property. If you or someone you know has experienced

elder financial abuse, contact law enforcement and Sacramento County Adult Protective Services. Any member of the public, including an older or dependent adult seeking help, or family members and friends, can make a report to Sacramento County's Adult Protective Services (APS) at (916) 874-9377. When crimes do occur, Sacramento County's District Attorney works closely with victim advocates to provide confidential support and assistance.

"Our victim advocates provide crisis counseling, assistance with emergency protective orders, advocacy and support through the court process, assistance in applying for victim compensation, and referrals to community programs and resources. Our office is also very active in educating seniors and the general public about the types of elder and dependent adult abuse, how to recognize signs of abuse, how to prevent it from happening, and how to report it when it does occur," said Assistant Chief Deputy District Attorney Dawn

If you are unsure of a situation involving an elder or dependent adult, but have a feeling something might be wrong, APS workers can investigate and help them figure out the best way to respond. According to Sacramento County's Deputy Director for Senior and Adult Services Melissa Jacobs, 25% of the allegations reported to APS in the last 12 months were related to financial abuse/ exploitation.

'Sacramento County Senior & Adult Services is continuing to strengthen our partnership with the local Agency on Aging/ Area 4 and other partners to provide additional resources and supports for our community of older adults," said Jacobs.

The older adults in your life likely spent many years working hard, caring for others and contributing to their community. This Older Americans Month, take the time to say thank you and celebrate aging. It is a time for friends and family to reach out to the older people in our lives to let them know how much we love and appreciate them. Supporting Foster Youth Through Health Services

Sacramento County News Release

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - May is National Foster Care Month. The recognition month brings awareness to the issues foster kids face. The month also highlights the work done to help children who enter the foster system. This year's theme is "Strengthening Minds. Uplifting Families." The theme highlights the need to take both a holistic and culturally responsive approach to support the mental health needs of foster youth. In Sacramento County, there are dedicated staff members who uplift families by making sure youth in Sacramento County's Child Protective Services (CPS) get access to health care. Staff members also help make sure foster youth have access to mental health services.

Within Sacramento County's health services departments, many different resources are dedicated to providing the best care possible to children in Child Protective Services. These services include Emergency Response, Informal Supervision, Hearts 4 Kids, Courts/Permanency, Psychotropic Medication. These programs cover a broad number of services that collaborate with social workers to ensure that children at risk have a strong advocate for their health and well-being.

Public Health Nurses in the Emergency Response program provide direct services to families as well as consultations with Social Workers. These Public Health Nurses conduct assessments, provide interventions and make referrals for services. Public Health Nurses work with families to make sure developmental issues are addressed.

Informal Supervision serves children with open cases who remain with their biological parents. The goal of this program is to keep children in their homes with their biological parents if possible.

Hearts 4 Kids is a program that visits children and their siblings at their foster-care placement. During this visit, the Public Health Nurse conducts assessments. provides guidance, and links families to resources.

The Public Health Nurses in Courts/ Permanency provide assistance for children placed in foster care. The Courts/Permanency nurses interview biological families to get health history and then focus on access to care and help coordinate primary, dental, and specialty care if needed. They collaborate with CPS and advocate for the child until the case is closed or the child is adopted.

If children in foster care are prescribed psychotropic medications, they are followed by a nurse who ensures the medications are court approved and collaborates with the Social Worker and foster parent to monitor for side effects in the home.

See's Candies Moves Ahead

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Construction of a new See's Candies megastore at 5499 Sunrise Boulevard in Citrus Heights, which was formerly home to a 10,621-square-foot Patelco Credit Union branch continues to move forward with both interior and exterior construction improvements well underway.

The building's exterior was recently repainted in the black and white See's company colors, and two former drive-in banking kiosks which were left in place by the former credit union have been removed.

Two white banner signs, announcing See's Candies are visible to drivers on both Sunrise Boulevard and Uplands Way.

Portions of the parking lot where drive-in teller machines once stood have been repayed and a new sidewalk has been poured along Uplands Way where its primary street entrance will be.

Visible progress on interior construction work on the upper floor of the building is visible at night which is illuminated where new second level offices are being built out. On the ground floor, new walls and trim for a retail space are going up.

According to Tallen's project description, the new Citrus Heights See's Candies will consolidate three other locations within its trade area for its first of a kind combination facility which include a traditional See's Candies retail store, their corporate sales facility (business to business unit) and their regional offices.

A building permit application by San Diego-based Schuss Clark Brandon Architects Inc. for interior improvements was filed on August 11, 2020, on behalf of their client, See's Candies, headquartered



recently repainted black and white See's company colors.

in South San Francisco, describing the work as "tenant improvements to an existing building."

Interior construction is separate from overall exterior grounds improvements which are concurrently being performed by the landlord-tenant, Citivest Commercial a n d Residential Real Estate of Newport Beach, Calif. and Tallen Capital Partners, LLC, of Del Mar.

Tallen Capital Partners has leased the entire building to Berkshire Hathaway owned See's Candies under a new 15-year lease agreement.

"Interior construction work is proceeding towards a target summer completion date, and there have been no delays in that process," said Jeff Brandon, partner of Schuss Clark Brandon Architects in San Diego.

While See's Candies is one of his firm's major clients, the construction of the new Citrus Heights store location is an unusual "first" for his firm where a former credit union branch is being repurposed for a different use, Brandon said.

The new See's is situated at the corner of Sunrise Boulevard and Uplands Way across the street from nearby Boston's Pizza Restaurant and Sports Bar.

When it opens, it will have a new business neighbor directly behind it, as a new Milano Nail Salon has been announced to open in what was the site of a long-shuttered restaurant building in the Sunrise Village Plaza.

Window signage in the new salon has been posted by the plaza's owner/developer, Merlone-Geier of San Francisco, which is completing a comprehensive renovation of the Sunrise Village shopping center.

Public relations representatives from See's Candies corporate office did not respond to a request for comment concerning the likely summer opening date of its new Citrus Heights location.

See's Candies, owned by Berkshire Hathaway, was founded by Charles See, his wife Florence, and his mother Mary in Los Angeles, California in 1921. Its retail shop locations typically feature a candy counter where customers can either create their own custom-mixed box of chocolates and candies to order or purchase boxed chocolates, truffles, nuts and chews, lollipops, and sugar-free candy.

Patelco Credit Union in Citrus Heights closed its two-story branch office at 5499 Sunrise Boulevard at the corner of Uplands Way last July and has since moved to a new location in the Marketplace at Birdcage, 6100 Birdcage Lane, Suite 125.

like replacing the parking lot or updating the community's clubhouse. Even then, that's crazy! On top of all that, it devalues your condo. Nobody wants to buy a \$260,000 condo with a \$650 HOA fee every month, especially when the fee has gone up that much for no apparent reason.

There's always the possibility the company is building up a war chest for improvements in the next year or so. But you have a right to know exactly where the money you pay in HOA fees is going. Ask to see a copy of their financials, and if they won't do that-or explain why the fee is so high and where the money's goingyou need to sell the place because it's being poorly managed.

You've got to get an explanation. You're owed one. And, if you try to sell the place, you're going to have to tell prospective buyers why the HOA fee is so high. Maybe there's a good reason for it buried somewhere. But without knowing more, as a buyer, there's no way I'd take this thing off your hands.

SacRT Awarded Millions by FTA for New Light Rail Vehicles

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento Regional Transit District (SacRT) was awarded on May 5, 2023, a \$45.1 million grant from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) to support the purchase of 16 new light rail

vehicles. The grant through the FY22/23 Rail Vehicle Replacement Program, a new program created by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, will help SacRT towards the purchase of 16 new lowfloor light rail vehicles from Siemens Mobility in south Sacramento. SacRT is one of six transit agencies nationwide and the only in FTA Region 9 to receive this grant. SacRT previously purchased 28 new low-floor light rail trains from Siemens Mobility and has a contract to order up to 76. Those vehicles are currently undergoing a testing process before they can be put into service early next year. With the order of an additional 16 new low-floor trains, SacRT will have 44 new low-floor vehicles, which is close to two-thirds of all the vehicles needed to

provide 15-minute service to Folsom area stations. "The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law is delivering federal dollars across the nation and here in Sacramento our innovators at SacRT are ready to capitalize on its benefits for the community," said Congresswoman Doris Matsui (CA-07). "I was proud to fight for this infusion of federal funds that will replace 35-yearold light rail vehicles with new modern trains built

right here in Sacramento by Siemens Mobility. This \$45 million grant is helping us build Sacramento's future and will enable us to continue leading the way on sustainable, clean, and equitable public transportation."

Regional Transit is crucial for mobility in the Sacramento region, but the current light rail cars have reached the end of their useful life, said Congressman Ami Bera (CA-06). "I am proud to have helped secure funding through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law for

"I am proud to have helped secure funding through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law for a new fleet of low-floor cars that will enhance the rider experience and make light rail accessible to all, including those with mobility restrictions, parents with strollers, and cyclists."

"As we celebrate SacRT's 50 years of service to the region we can also look to the future," Senator Alex Padilla said. "I have been proud to support and see SacRT's efforts over the finish line to secure federal funding for new, modern light rail cars. Today's grant announcement is a major investment in regional mobility, making light rail cleaner, safer, and more accessible for everyone."

"I want to thank Senator Padilla and Representatives Matsui and Bera for championing the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law that created this new grant program, said SacRT Board Chair and Sacramento County Supervisor Patrick Kennedy. "This significant funding award will help accelerate SacRT's light rail modernization program and puts us one step closer to replacing our aging light rail fleet with entirely new and modern, low-floor vehicles that will improve accessibility for all riders. These new vehicles are being built by Siemens, right here in Sacramento,

so this is also a significant boost to the economic prosperity of the region."

"We are very grateful to the Federal Transit Administration, FTA Administrator Nuria Fernandez and FTA Region 9 Administrator Ray Tellis for their extraordinary leadership for recognizing how important it is to replace our aging fleet of light rail vehicles," said SacRT General Manager/CEO Henry Li. "We also owe our gratitude to Senator Alex Padilla, Representative Doris Matsui and Representative Ami Bera for supporting this grant opportunity and SacRT in general. We are a stronger community because of the work they do on our behalf, and we will be even better when these new, modern low-floor light rail trains are in service early next year."

This new FTA funding along with other grant funding from the Sacramento Area of Governments (SACOG) and the state is being used for the new purchase of 16 low-floor light rail trains.

At the end of April, the state of California awarded SacRT \$8.5 million in grant funding through the Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) to help support improved train technology, including real-time train arrival, passenger announcement system and more. Furthermore, this week the SACOG Transportation

Committee approved their 2023 Regional Funding recommendations which include nearly \$6.5 million for SacRT's Light Rail vehicles replacements and \$5 million for station conversions to accommodate the new vehicles. No Criminal Charges Warranted for Homicide at Dahboy Way

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - At approximately 8:45 A.M. on Monday, April 17, 2023, Sacramento County Sheriff's deputies responded to a residence on Dahboy Way in Orangevale regarding a family disturbance. The caller said their 36-year-old son-in-law was vandalizing the family's home and vehicles. Additionally, the caller confirmed that the son-in-law did not live at the residence.

When confronted by neighbors, the son-in-law told neighbors he was trying to kill himself. As the son-in-law's aggression escalated, the caller and his family retreated inside their home and stayed on the phone with 9-1-1.

The son-in-law continued throwing

rocks through windows and forced entry into the residence. Fearing for the safety and welfare of those inside, a household member shot the son-in-law. Deputies arrived on scene moments later and began life-saving measures, simultaneously requesting the fire department to enter the scene. They began life-saving measures as the fire department arrived, but the victim was pronounced deceased at the scene.

Sheriff's Homicide Detectives and Crime Scene Investigators responded to the scene a short time later, interviewed witnesses, and gathered evidence. Based on their investigation, Sheriff's Homicide detectives determined that no criminal charges were warranted.

The Sacramento County Coroner's Office will identify the deceased subject. ★







