LETTER Dignity Health Celebrating **New Surgery Center**

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) -

The Citrus Heights Surgery Center, in affiliation with Dignity Health and United Surgical Partners International (USPI), hosted a grand opening event today to give community members, medical staff and media their first look at a new 16,000 square-foot ambulatory surgery center in Citrus Heights. Unanimously approved by the Citrus Heights Planning Commission, the \$13 million project will provide patients in Citrus Heights with a range of outpatient

specialty surgical services. The new state-of-theart Citrus Heights Surgery Center will be utilized for outpatient general surgery, otolaryngology, orthopedics, gastroenterology, pain management, podiatry and procedures. This is a joint venture between Dignity Health, USPI and local physicians. The facility will feature three operating room beds, three treatment bays and 11 recovery unit beds for patients undergoing same-day surgeries. The surgery center is expected to have approximately 70 physicians on its medical staff.

"Providing high quality, compassionate care is what Dignity Health is known for and where we

provide that care continues to vary as technology and the needs of our community evolve," said Michael Korpiel, President of Dignity Health Mercy San Juan Medical Center. "By partnering with USPI, the ability to increasingly provide care in an outpatient setting is made possible thanks to significant advances in surgical techniques, medical technology, and pain control which results in many benefits to patients including faster recovery times, significant cost savings and historically fewer complications."

Construction Bid Approved for Village **Renovations**

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - On April 20, the Fair Oaks Recreation and Park District (FORPD) Board of Directors approved the lowest construction bid for the renovation project in the Village, which will include updates to Village and Plaza parks, the Veterans' Community Amphitheatre and the Community Clubhouse.

Bobo Construction of Elk Grove has been approved as the general contractor for the project, with a full bid of \$21.7 million, which includes a \$1.8 million bid allowance to cover costs or additional work that becomes necessary as the project moves forward. The initial cost estimation for this project was \$18 million, but it is not unexpected that the lowest bid would come in higher than that estimate due to significantly rising costs in the last year, such as for fuel and materials.

Most of the funding for the project will come from Measure J, at \$20 million. The rest is coming from new-development impact fees and several grants including \$560,929 for ADA access improvements to the Community Clubhouse from the U.S. House Appropriation awarded through Congressman Ami Bera.

And additional ADA improvements will be made to all the facilities under renovation. District Administrator Mike Aho explained that at this time, there isn't any official ADA access for these parks and facilities, and it was critical to ensure that everybody can access the park. Once the renovation is complete, Aho said, "It will be fully accessible, and that is incredibly exciting."

In addition to the ADA updates, the Community Clubhouse will get new lighting and sound systems, "Bringing it up to today's standards," Aho said.

At the Veteran's Memorial Amphitheatre, the outdoor amphitheatre seating will remain, while the new theater building will feature new restrooms, dressing rooms and a stage that can be enclosed as a black box theatre for smaller performances in winter weather. This space will also feature multi-use community rooms available inside.

Both Plaza Park and Village Park will be improved, and a new and expanded playground will feature a slide hill.

'Debatable' Quality Lunches

ORANGEVALE, CA (MPG)- Casa Roble freshman Catherine Patton is unsatisfied with the meals available to students at her school.

"Here at Casa Roble High School, the quality of school lunches is debatable," Patton wrote in an essay titled, "Health is Wealth" that she recently wrote for one of her classes. "The salad bar was removed and there isn't a large variety of fruits and vegetables. Your school lunch should contain the five food groups: fruits, vegetables, protein, grain and dairy. Most of the lunches consist of pizza, hot pockets and more processed foods.

"The school isn't exactly lifestyle-friendly for those with eating disorders, allergies, diabetes, or other unique circumstances. Often, the portions in food they give are too little, not enough for the students who do choose to eat school lunches, still leaving them hungry after lunch."

Raj Rai, Director of Communication for the San Juan Unified School District, explained that the lunches currently available to students are within the recommended guidelines.

"School meals meet or exceed the latest federal and state requirements and are designed to ensure that students receive a balanced meal low in fat and sodium," Rai said via email. "Current guidelines for lunch require that we offer five components daily: fruits, vegetables, whole grains, meat/meat alternatives and milk. A student must take at least three of the five required components and at least one of those three must be a fruit or a vegetable."

"San Juan Unified is committed to serving healthy meals that support students' academic efforts and a healthy lifestyle. As a result of the USDA's extension of special COVID-19 waivers, we have been able to offer free meals to all students in the district this school year."

The 15-year-old Patton argues that students with financial difficulties are unable to choose what they eat which is why schools should make an effort to serve healthy food.

"Some students have no choice but to eat school lunch, due to it being free," Patton wrote. "If students have low-income families, they're forced to get what's cheap, whether it's healthy or not, because their families cannot afford it."

Patton believes Casa can do more to educate students about what they're putting in their bodies outside of school as well.

"Casa could do a presentation to educate our students on nutritional value, health risks and spreading awareness," Patton said. "In the mornings, kids will bring Starbucks, Dutch Bros and energy drinks, using them to cope, to stay awake during class and (they) often experience withdrawal. If students had a better outlook on what it was doing to their bodies, and the effects it could have on them in 10 years, it might change their mindset."

An educational presentation isn't the only idea that Patton had on how Casa can improve the food being served to students.

"Although we have a cooking class, it isn't required," Patton wrote. "A cooking class could be beneficial for knowing how to cook and for the healthy eating aspect. Our school could also start a gardening class and teach students to grow their own organic food and use that fresh food as ingredients in the cooking class."

Patton argued that if

the school had the funds for it, some things students would enjoy include a smoothie bar and snack boxes that are like bento boxes filled with fruit, vegetables, organic hummus, juice, milk, water and a little desert

"If you give kids pizza and burgers every day, 80% of the students will get sick of that," Patton said. "You could have vegan food, a salad bar, Chinese food, sushi, smoothies, veggies, and fruit and 90% of the students would prefer it over the unhealthy food."

However, Rai argues that some suppliers may be facing difficulties due to food shortages.

"Many of our food distributors are facing challenges in manufacturing and product unavailability or shortages may necessitate menu substitutions from our published menus on occasion," Rai said.

Following a review of the SJUSD middle and high school lunch menus for April, chicken nuggets and patties, bean burritos, mini cheeseburgers, and pizza are offered on the menu daily. Fruits, vegetables and milk are also offered on the menu as part of the five meal components required by the school district.

"There are several health risks that come with the school lunches being served nowadays, like the high amount of salt, fat, sugar, and empty calories the foods contain," Patton said. "Diabetes, obesity, cancer and more can all stem from school lunches. If we don't make a change, the numbers for obesity and diabetes will just keep rising higher.

"It's up to us to change the food we are consuming, to have healthy eating habits, to better our schools and our students."

Do You Have an Uncashed Sacramento County Check?

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Currently, the County has nearly 6,000 uncashed checks, totaling more than \$2.1 million. How does this happen and could this be your unclaimed money?

If a Sacramento County issued check goes six months without being cashed by the rightful payee, the information becomes available in a PDF document on the Unclaimed County Warrants (checks) webpage. The data is also searchable on the County's Open Data portal.

Think you might have an uncashed check with Sacramento County? Here are quick and easy ways to find out:

From the Unclaimed County Warrants webpage, scroll through the check numbers on the Unclaimed Warrant listing PDF document (use the Find feature [Ctrl+F] to search names or other terms in the PDF).

Go to the Sacramento County Open Data portal. Once on the portal, click the "Finance" icon; click the "County Outstanding Checks" link; then either use the "filter" cone-shaped icon for specific value sorting, or the column headings for alpha/numeric listings to get ascending or descending sorts.

If you find your name or business on the data listing, go to the Unclaimed County Warrants webpage to find out about the documentation and information needed to

validate that you are the rightful payee to receive the funds.

More Unclaimed Monies

The Revenue Recovery Division of the Department of Finance has unclaimed payments that are a result of not having a current address for the recipient. On the Open Data portal, under the Finance category, check out the Revenue Recovery Unclaimed Payments data and search for your name. If you locate a claim due to you, contact Revenue Recovery at (916) 875-7815, and provide the following information:

- Claimant's Name
- Date of Birth
- Address (Current and Previous)
- Phone Number
- Amount of the claim
- DRR Account Number
- Court Docket NumberDate of Order
- Defendant's Name
- Proof of Identity (Driver's License or ID Card)
- Proof of Payment: Copy of check, money order receipt or credit card confirmation number
- Information regarding the incident (case information)

Sacramento County makes this data easily available on its websites, Open Data Portal and other measures to ensure the information is accessible and the monies go to the rightful payees.

Update on Homicide Investigation at Fair Oaks Park

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - On Monday, April 18, 2022, at approximately 6:56 p.m., Sheriff's Communications Center received several separate calls regarding a shooting that just occurred at the park located on the 11,000 block of Fair Oaks Boulevard. The callers advised that someone had been shot and was lying in the parking lot. Additional callers stated the shooter, an adult male, left the park on foot traveling northbound through the park to Madison Avenue across the street and into the City of Citrus Heights. A short time later, callers traveling on Madison Avenue just west of Fair Oaks Boulevard reported hearing several gunshots and seeing an adult male on the ground at the north side of the street.

Deputies responded to the park and located an adult male suffering from at least one gunshot wound to the upper body. Deputies pronounced the subject deceased at the scene. Deputies then responded to the north side of Madison Avenue and located a second gunshot victim who was transported to a local area hospital and later pronounced deceased. Deputies secured the Madison Avenue scene until Citrus Heights Police Department arrived to take

over.

Homicide detectives and Crime Scene investigators responded to the scene, interviewed many witnesses and gathered evidence. No further information or suspect information is available at this time. The Sacramento County Sheriff's Office Homicide Team will handle the investigation for the park shooting. Citrus Heights Police Department will conduct the Madison Avenue shooting investigation.

The identity of the park shooting victim will be released by the Sacramento County Coroner's Office after identification and notification of next of kin.

CHPD Community Update regarding a homicide that took place on April 18, 2022.

On April 18, 2022, at approximately 7:00 PM, the Citrus Heights Police Department received numerous 911 calls regarding a shooting on Madison Ave and Fair Oaks Blvd in the City of Citrus Heights.

CHPD officers quickly arrived and located an unconscious male subject with multiple gunshot wounds to his body. That subject, later identified as 41 year-old Jerzain Trenado Orozco, was transported to a local hospital where he was pronounced deceased.

During the investigation that followed, it was determined that Orozco had shot and killed another subject at Fair Oaks Park moments before his own death.

During the past week, Citrus Heights Detectives conducted a thorough investigation into the homicide of Orozco. Through the collection of numerous pieces of evidence, witness statements and forensic analysis, Citrus Heights Detectives obtained an arrest warrant for 39 year-old Jose Maldonado for the murder of Orozco.

On April 27, 2022, Maldonado turned himself into the Sacramento County main jail and was arrested for PC 187 – Murder.

The Citrus Heights Police Department would like to thank the community for their support and cooperation in solving this homicide. Additionally, the Citrus Heights Police Department appreciates the ongoing regional partnership with the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office whom we routinely collaborate with during serious criminal investigations.

Continued from page 1 Directors to a chamber member who demonstrates outstanding leadership by going the extra mile and making a difference in the community.

"Vanessa is a bright light and shining star in the community," said FOCC Executive Director Kimberley Pitillo. "She was referred to us by several people last year for the outstanding work and service she continually provides, and in 2021 she adapted her business to become an essential resource in the community.'

We recently caught up to the busy business owner to learn more about her.

It Started with a Vision

In 2012, while working locally as a staff pharmacist, Vanessa envisioned expanding her healthcare expertise into the Home Medical Equipment (HME) industry. With minimal training on the medical supply side, her desire to switch careers stemmed from a realization that many of her customers — who were aging in place — needed help in ways pharmacies couldn't provide. After diligently researching about the HME industry, she learned that by the year 2030, one in five Americans will be over 65 years old and will most likely need various supportive medical devices

to age in place safely. Seeking to be a bridge for an aging demographic, in 2016 Vanessa opened HealthQuest, a medical supply shop catering to customers who could see, touch, and learn about the products her store carries. Although the company does support some online business, it is not their main focus.

"When you buy online, you remove dollars from the community," expressed Vanessa. "The community flourishes when you invest in supporting the 'mom and pop' shops—and right now there are a lot of small businesses that need help!"

Dot Boyd, Senior Safety Specialist, has known Vanessa for five years as a colleague and friend. "In an age of online shopping, way too much gets missed when it comes to the knowledge and personal touch Vanessa brings to the table," said Dot. "I think what's remarkable about Vanessa is her determination to be a local resource for people with an old-fashioned standard of caring and personalized service even if she doesn't always have what the customer is looking for."

Vanessa has a close relationship with her customers and considers them neighbors or good friends. Her shop provides a serene and cheerful space for customers to safely address their health needs. "I never got into this business just to sell a lot of things," she said. "My main focus is to help my customers find the best products to meet their needs."

Opening a **Vaccination Clinic**

In 2020, the Grenyions made the difficult decision to close the store like so many small businesses (deemed 'non-essential') had to do at the time. Vanessa recalled how many of her customers expressed fears about leav-

ing home. "People still needed medical supplies that were necessary for the care of their loved ones. If we cut off access, where would

they go?" she said.

business as 'essential.' the Grenyions reopened HealthQuest, and Vanessa continued to be a resource for seniors, their families, and others looking for

home health tools. In early 2021, prior to the release of Covid vaccines, Vanessa discovered another way to give back to the community where her pharmacy skills would come in handy. After dedicating hours of her own time and expenses, Vanessa opened an onsite vaccination clinic at HealthQuest.

"I'd been a pharmacist for more than 16 years and I know how to set up a vaccination clinic," she said. "I thought by becoming a vaccination hub for my customers and local residents, people could get back to living again."

Dot recalled being among a team of volunteers who helped Vanessa and Kevin on the clinic's opening day. "I helped with the check-in process so they could focus on administering vaccines," said Dot. "Appointments were timely, people were treated with kindness and care, and the Grenyions took the time to answer questions and address concerns."

Just under 100 people were vaccinated that first Saturday and returned a month later for their boosters. "It was pretty special to be a part of those two days," said Dot.

Overall, the clinic has administered more than 1,300 vaccinations in the community. Now that the clinic has wound down, Vanessa is able to refocus her energy back into her business – and after six years of running HealthQuest on her own, she's ready to hire an assistant manager. The Grenyions live in the community and have three children ages 13, 10, and 7. Vanessa feels the additional help will allow her to spend more quality time with her family and be a better resource for her customers.

Women's Empowerment recently received \$25,000 from Kaiser Permanente to empower women experiencing homelessness in Sacramento with the tools to secure a stable job that leads to a livable wage so they can provide a healthy home for their families during the pandemic. Funding will support Women's Empowerment's employment-readiness program, including mental health assistance as well as domestic violence and substance use support groups.

that kind of amenity happen here in the park," Aho said.

The area will also gain expanded park space, outdoor seating areas and increased perimeter parking.

The work will take approximately 18 months, and all the park facilities in the Village will be closed during that time.

But when everything reopens after project completion, estimated in October 2023, Fair Oaks residents will enjoy a fully integrated park complex with interconnected walkways, new landscaping and new amenities.

Board member Ralph Carhart said, "It is a beautiful and amazing project that will revitalize the Village center."

Dixon came into the match-up already having clinched the Golden Empire League Championship with an undefeated record in league play.

In a battle of the Rams, Casa Roble pushed Dixon to its limit. For the first time since March 15 against Davis, the Rams conceded a set to their opponent. In fact, they lost two after not giving up even one for nine straight games and all season to league opponents. Casa Roble came out aggressive and determined to pull off the upset and snap Dixon's 12-game winning streak, winning each of the first two sets by a tight margin at 25-22.

However, Dixon refused to go down without a fight, prevailing in a tough third set 25-21. After recapturing the momentum by staying alive in the match, Dixon cruised to a fourth set victory 25-14 and in the decisive final set, 15-6.

Casa Roble had two players record kills in the double digits with senior outside hitters Easton Kimm and Gage Sjolin. Kimm led the way with 13 kills and Sjolin followed closely behind with 11. Kimm tallied five serving aces. Senior setter/right side Mark Dyachuk led Casa Roble in total blocks with two. Two Rams had digs in the

double digits as Kimm had a team-high with 18 followed by senior libero Michael Jordan (no, not Jumpman) who had 15.

The numbers don't lie when it comes to the Dixon Rams' dominance in league play. Dixon lost two sets to league opponents all regular season. The next closest team are the Mesa Verde Mavericks who lost 11, however, six of them were to the Rams.

Casa Roble came into Wednesday's season finale seeking to bounce back from the heart-wrenching loss suffered against Dixon. Casa Roble took on the winless Woodland Wolves to end the season.

The Rams cruised to a first set victory, 25-11. The second and third sets were much tighter as the Wolves prevailed in both, 25-23 and 25-19 respectively. This may have shocked Casa Roble who expected to run over Woodland, but the Wolves wanted to end their season on a high note with an upset. Casa Roble responded to the adversity extremely well, controlling the last two sets and going on to win, 25-11 and 15-7.

Dyahuk recorded a team-high 12 kills. Dyachuk and Marquez each tallied seven aces. Dyachuk and seniors, middle blocker Chase Allen and OH Adrian Perez, each recorded one solo block. Jordan led the way for the Rams not in dunks, but in digs, with eight.

With the 3-1 win, the Rams streaky season comes to an end. Casa Roble lost its first three games in a row, then won five straight and proceeded to follow that up with three more consecutive losses. The Rams ended their latest streak on April 8 with a road win at Pioneer, lost the next two including against Dixon, then were victorious in their final game of 2022. ★

Sacramento County Project Roomkey Houses Hundreds

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -Project Roomkey (PRK) was launched in Sacramento County in April 2020 in response to the growing concern of vul-

nerability to COVID-19 our unhoused population was facing. PRK was introduced as a statewide solution to an emergency situation and the County, City of Sacramento and Sacramento Steps Forward pooled their resources to bring it to fruition.

The program was intended to be shortterm, to allow for the COVID-19 virus to run its course and then ramp down the sheltering efforts as community efforts lessened. As we now know, the program has been running for nearly two years and has served more than 2,000 people - having provided isolation for persons who contracted the virus and private units for people to safely shelter in place. As a result, of these efforts, hundreds of people have exited to stable and safe locations.

Due to the unexpected duration of COVID response, state and federal dollars were made available for use to extend local PRK efforts. With state and federal funding running out, the threat of COVID-19 waning due to increased vaccination rates and lower transmission rates, Sacramento County and its many partners are ramping down the prevention and isolation units and working closely with community providers to transition PRK participants into long-term housing solutions.

The PRK program was never intended as a long-term solution to homelessness and is not a sustainable sheltering model as the program is incredibly expensive – more than \$4000 per person a month and relies on resources that were only available due to the community-wide shutdown. Hotels that offered up their space need to resume their place in tourism, and Goodwill employees reimagined as shelter staff need to return to their chosen field of work.

Project Room Key by the Numbers through January 2022:

Total sheltered: 2,051; Total exited to stable housing: 425; Total exited to temporary housing or emergency housing: 361; Still in PRK motels: 335; Average length of stay: 7.5 months; 88% have been there for more than a month; 63% have been there more than 3 months; 27% have been there over 6 months; 21% have been there over a year.

PRK Program ends at La Quinta

The PRK program at La Quinta closed on March 15 and all participants were provided shelter or housing options; with many having received many options over the course of their stay. While the County has taken the lead on managing operations and funding the shelter components, re-housing involves many public and private partners.

Over the last month, housing efforts have intensified across PRK to ensure connectivity to community-based programs that will carry them well beyond their time at PRK. With the closure of the first site, County staff and partners have ensured all participants had a safe place to transition to. At the February presentation of the ramp-down plan there were 121 participants at La Quinta, of those: 55 participants have moved to the two remaining PRK motels; 53 participants will receive 21-day motel vouchers (which will be extended when housing has been identified and participants have continued to work on next steps with their community-based housing provider); 6 have moved into housing; 2 chose to exit voluntarily; 5 were exited for egregious program rule violations.

Federal Reimbursement **Funding Extension**

DHA was recently informed that FEMA's non-congregate shelter reimbursement will be extended until June 30, 2022 (formally scheduled to end March 31, 2022), and the CA Department of Social Services has also confirmed that Counties can request additional Emergency Solutions Grant funding for continued PRK efforts. As such, DHA will be reevaluating the closure dates of the final two motel locations in concert with our partners from the City, Sacramento Steps Forward and SHRA, who provide critical re-housing supports for those in PRK, and will determine how best to use the funding options now accessible for this purpose.

Shelters and housing programs

The programs, services and funding offered through the County of Sacramento is dynamic, but below is a partial list of the programs the County funds to help shelter, house and care for our community members experiencing homelessness. The programs are often a collaboration between many County departments, including Human Assistance; Health Services; and Child, Family and Adult Services.

Sheltering (Capacity per night)

Emergency Family Shelters: 40 families; Mather Interim Shelter: 140 individuals; North A Street Shelter: 80 adults; Scattered Site Shelters: 115 people; Domestic Violence Shelter: 162 women/children.

Transitional Housing (Capacity per night)

Adolfo Transitional Housing for Foster Youth: 68 youth households; Mather Family Transitional Housing: 25 families; Youth Transitional Housing: 12 Youth.

Permanent Housing (Yearly Capacity)

Flexible Housing Program: 300 households; Flexible Supportive Rehousing: 250 households; MHSA Built Permanent Supportive Housing Units: 221 households.





First Responders Training Facility | Sac County DA Association Backs **Requires More Investment**

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) -The approaching summer in California means to government officials and first responders that a potential season of large fires and large-scale disasters lies just ahead. Which is why Assemblymember Ken Cooley and Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District announced at a press conference on Friday, April 15, a request for funding for the expansion of the Zinfandel First Responder Training Facility on 3801 Zinfandel Drive in Rancho Cordova, CA.

Approval would authorize that building at the existing training facility could commence Phase 3 of the development of the 53-acre site, purchased by Sac Metro Fire in 2008–approximately 2.7 miles from their headquarters.

Earlier in the year, on March 30, 2022, Cooley submitted a onetime state funding request for \$44 million to begin construction at the Zinfandel First Responder Training Facility in order to make it a "central hub" and help increase the resiliency of trainees. Cooley said the proposal, which is expected to be voted on in June of this year, has "strong bi-partisan support... [including] the Governor who encounters largescale disasters in his watch.'

Assemblymember Cooley wrote in a letter submitted to the Assembly Budget Subcommittee, "The unprecedented demands currently placed on emergency responders, combined with the lack of adequate training facilities, are increasing the risks faced by local first responders."

"This facility will facilitate joint

training in firefighting, urban search and rescue, and mutual aid coordination, including enhanced skills in interoperability of fire equipment, by Northern California fire agency personnel," added the office of the assemblymember.

According to Sac Metro Fire Chief Todd Harms, the property signaled for the increased development, located adjacent to Mather Airport in Sacramento County, is strategically placed at a good junction near the intersections of Highways 50, 99 and Interstates 5 and 80 and "is a perfect location for resources to be staged for anything on the northern side of California."

Assemblymember Cooley wrote in his letter, "The training facility would be available to public safety agencies in the Sacramento region and throughout Northern California... The size and scale of the facility, after the completion of Phase 3, will accommodate large scale multi-agency and multidisciplinary coordinated training, which is not possible with existing facilities in the region."

Specifically, the funding would go to commence construction by adding: A) 40,000-50,000 square foot multi-purpose Administration/Classroom/Staging Building; B) 1,000 square foot Outdoor Classroom/Storage/ Restroom/Decontamination Structure; C) 4-acre Emergency Vehicle Operations Course (EVOC);

Ask Toni

Losing Employer COBRA with Dental Benefits and Enrolling in Medicare ... What Do I Do?



Toni:

I will be eligible for Medicare in July and am now receiving cancer treatment from MD Anderson. I am currently on my ex-employer's COBRA and searching for den-

tal care when I go on Medicare in July. The only dental/vision plans I am finding are in Medicare Advantage plans, but MD Anderson has advised me to not go in that direction because many Medicare Advantage plans are no longer accepted at their facility.

Is there a dental plan that Medicare offers? Please advise.

~ Tammy from Alvin, TX

Tammy:

"What's NOT Covered by Part A & Part B?" is explained in the Medicare & You handbook. It states... "Original Medicare does not cover everything and if you need certain services that Medicare Part A and Part B doesn't cover, you will have to pay for them yourself unless:"

- You have other coverage (including Medicaid) to cover the costs.
- You are in a Medicare Advantage Plan that covers these services.

Some of the items and services that Original Medicare does not cover include:

- Most dental care.
- Eye examinations related to prescribing glasses. • Dentures. • Cosmetic surgery. • Massage therapy • Routine Physical Exams • Hearing aids and exams for fitting them. • Long-term care.
- Concierge care (also called concierge medicine, retainer-based medicine, boutique medicine, platinum practice, or direct care).
- Covered items or services you receive from an opt out doctor or doctor not accepting Medicare.

Since Medicare does not cover dental. I would recommend that you talk to your dentist and see which dental insurance plans he/she prefers.

There are 2 types of dental plans:

1)Traditional or indemnity dental insurance plans which is generally higher in premium, and the preventive services are usually covered at 100%, basic restorative is generally covered up to 80% and major procedures at 50%. Recently, new dental plans have been released which help with the costs of dental claims such as fillings, crowns, and root canals. A major surprise is that these plans begin immediately with no wait. Many of the older traditional/indemnity dental plans may have a wait for services such as fillings, root canals, bridges, crowns, etc.

2)Discount dental plans are generally less expensive than traditional dental plans. These plans provide a discount for services, but your dentist must be part of the plan's network and agree to give the dental discount.

In the Medicare & You handbook, it talks about eyeglasses (after cataract surgery) which is a limited benefit because Medicare will cover one pair of eyeglasses with standard frames (or one set of contact lenses) after cataract surgery that implants an intraocular lens. The Medicare Part B deductible will apply for the cataract surgery, and you will pay the 20% of the Medicare-approved amount unless you are enrolled in a Medicare supplement then your out of pocket may be low.

Medicare defines purchasing glasses and hearing ais as an elective. Which means you will have to pay for them. "Medicare covers the hearing exams if your doctor or other health care provider orders them to see if you need medical treatment. You pay the 20% of the Medicare-approved amount and the Part B deductible applies."

Social Security Matters Payroll Tax and Income Tax on Social Security

Dear Rusty: Is it possible for you to go over how the Federal withholding tax is computed on Social Security benefits? Signed: Curious Taxpayer.

Dear Curious: I'm not sure if you're asking about how FICA (or self-employment) tax on your earnings from work is determined, or if you're asking about how much income tax to have withheld from your Social Security benefit, so I'll address both:

The 7.65% FICA tax withheld from your earnings by your employer consists of two elements -6.2% is for Social Security and 1.45% is for Medicare Part A. Your employer pays an equivalent amount on your behalf. This is a standard amount that all American workers pay, which - after enough credits are earned - enables you to collect Social Security benefits when you retire and permits you to enroll in Medicare Part A for free when you're 65. If you are self-employed, you pay a "self-employment tax" on your net earnings instead of a FICA tax, and you must pay both the employee and employer portion of the tax (15.3%). The only exception

to this is that certain U.S. income you may have had. states have opted out of participation in the Federal Social Security program, thus exempting some state employees from paying the Social Security portion of the FICA tax (they must still pay the Medicare Part A portion). These percentages are set by Congressional legislation and will not change unless Congress enacts future legislation to do so.

Determining how much income tax to have withheld from your Social Security is something best discussed with a qualified Tax Advisor with access to all your income data. Your recommended tax withholding rate for income tax purposes depends upon your overall taxable income level and the tax rate which results from that income (considering your dependents and your tax filing status (single or married)). Having income tax withheld from your Social Security benefit is optional, but if you choose to do so you must submit IRS form W-4V to your local Social Security office. Form W-4V permits you to specify that either 7%, 10%, 12%, or 22% of your SS benefit be withheld for income tax purposes. Here's a link to IRS form W4-V: https://www.irs.

gov/pub/irs-pdf/fw4v.pdf. The IRS may levy income tax on a portion of your Social Security benefits depending on your combined income from all sources. Your "combined income" consists of your Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) on your tax return, plus 50% of your Social Security benefits received during the tax year, plus any other non-taxable

Tax on your SS benefits is computed at your normal IRS tax rate and based on your tax filing status.

If you file your income tax as "single" and your combined income from all sources exceeds \$25,000, then half (50%) of your SS benefits becomes part of your overall taxable income. And if your combined income from all sources as a single filer exceeds \$34,000 then up to 85% of your SS benefits become taxable

If your income tax filing status is "married-filing jointly" and your combined income is over \$32,000 then 50% of your Social Security benefits received during the tax year becomes part of your taxable income. If, as a couple filing "married/jointly," your combined income exceeds \$44,000, then up to 85% of the SS benefits you received during the tax year becomes part of





