Construction in the Village **Expected to Start Next Month**

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - At the March meeting of the Measure J Bond Oversight Committee (BOC), Fair Oaks Recreation and Park District (FORPD) Administrator Mike Aho provided an update about the upcoming projects funded by the bond.

Staff organized a Bid Walk on March 3 for six pre-qualified general contractors to view the Village project site—which includes improvements at Village Park, Plaza Park, and the Community Clubhouse, as well as the renovation of the Veterans Memorial Amphitheatre. Interested contractors will have until March 23 to request any additional information before submitting their bids on the project. All submitted bids will be reviewed by staff

on April 12, and the recommended contract will go before the FORPD Board of Directors on April 20 for a vote. If approved by the Board, the construction phase would begin on April 22, with the installation of construction fencing around the site and equipment mobilization.

Construction in the Village is expected to take approximately 18 months, with the work completed by October 14, 2023. To ensure the project is completed on time, the construction contract will include a penalty of \$2,000 per day for each day of work beyond the completion deadline—barring "acts of God," said Aho, which would include issues beyond the control of the contractors and subcontractors, like material

shortages or another pandemic.

Aho also gave an update about plans to build softball fields on surplus property at the La Vista School site. San Juan Unified School District (SJUSD) submitted a draft agreement to FORPD, but Aho said that the terms need to be adjusted. SJUSD offered a lease period of just 25 years and specified that they would handle the maintenance and reservation services for the fields. FORPD wants to handle the maintenance and the reservations and wants a lease of at least 75 years to protect what would likely be an investment of millions of dollars into the

The BOC concluded their annual Expenditure Review to ensure that all costs associated with

Measure J projects are supported by the bond language. The review was continued from the December meeting, with some additional information requested on specific costs for the new PG&E gas service to the site of the Amphitheatre. The overall cost "to put the trench lines in, is just over \$16,000. We will get \$9,000 of it back immediately," said Aho, because the District is selecting the 10-year advanced refundable option. This option also ensures that rather than having to meet projected usage costs, and potentially pay substantial additional costs due to periods of usage deficits, the District will only pay actual usage costs. While there were other options in which they might save money, those options

Green Energy Mania **Threatens Grid Reliability**

California is failing at the government basics. Public safety, homelessness, roads, and water storage are all in shambles. But as long as that shameful list is, it's about to get longer. With summer around the corner, when demand is at its zenith, our energy supply will not be up to the task.

California's headlong rush towards zero-carbon power will cost consumers through wildly expensive electricity rates and lower grid reliability. That's a lose-lose for California families and businesses who want to avoid blackouts and avoid energy poverty.

Golden State politicians and Progressives – groups with an almost total overlap - live in dread fear of possible changes in weather decades in the future. Instead of planning for localized mitigations to deal with changing climate, they've decided to remake our entire energy sector, replacing affordable, dependable sources with their opposites.

A case in point is the closing of the Diablo Canyon nuclear power plant, scheduled to stop operations in 2025. Despite disingenuous claims that PG&E is choosing to close this facility, they are being forced into closure by California regulators who can make relicensing extraordinarily time consuming and expensive.

How important is Diablo Canyon? It currently produces about as much power as all the rooftop solar in the entire state. And unlike solar and wind, this power is available on-demand, 24/7. PG&E, the plant's owner, alleges it will replace all the lost power with so-called green, renewable resources, but what if it can't?

The North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC), a non-profit dedicated to promoting grid reliability, thinks it won't. NERC notes that California already has insufficient reserve power to meet demand during a

Shelter Dog Goes from Rescued to Rescuer

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County's Bradshaw Animal Shelter intakes thousands of pets in the community each year. Most of these pets are reunited with their owners or are able to find loving forever homes to be adopted into. However, some shelter pets have a difficult time finding a normal adoptive home which is where the shelter's foster and rescue program comes in. The foster and rescue program works with local foster and rescue providers in the community to help shelter pets that need a little extra assistance on the way to their happy ending.

Foster care providers provide temporary care outside of the shelter to animals such as those too young for adoption, needing to recover from an illness or injury, for behavior modification, or just because they need a break from the stresses of shelter life. Rescue group partners are also a huge help as they pull shelter animals who otherwise have a difficult time being adopted due to age, medical condition or the need for behavioral modification that cannot be resolved in a foster home.

Fortunately, shelter staff was so impressed by her high-toy drive that they contacted the National Disaster Search Dog Foundation (NDSDF). The

NDSDF is an organization based in Santa Paula, California that strengthens disaster response across America by rescuing and recruiting dogs and partnering them with firefighters and other first responders to find people buried alive in the wreckage of disasters. They have been a long-time rescue partner of the Sacramento County's Bradshaw Animal Shelter.

"Groups such as NDSDF give dogs that have no chance of placement in a normal pet home an opportunity for a great outcome and a chance to truly thrive in the world," said Shasta Stratton-Quirk, who works on the shelter's foster and rescue team. "Because some dogs are not able to be adopted out through normal routes, it is the job of the foster and rescue team to find an outlet

and partnering them with where they can reach their firefighters and other first true potential.

Dora's natural abilities made it clear that the NDSDF made the right choice in bringing her on the team. Six years later, the rescue partner is happy to report Dora is working diligently with the San Diego Fire Department and California Task Force 8 alongside her handler, Joe Zakar, and has truly gone from rescued to rescuer.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -

For more than 30 years, thousands of lives have been touched by Sacramento County's Gifts from the Heart program, an annual holiday gift-giving initiative that runs from October until mid-December and serves those within the Child Protective Services and Senior and Adult Services divisions of the Sacramento County Department of Child, Family and Adult Services.

In 2021, the program provided gifts to more than 2,500 youth, adults and seniors at an estimated cash value of \$152,040.

They got Nerf balls, art supplies, scented candles, Disney princess toys, basketballs, Bluetooth speakers and more! The youngest recipient, Karl, age 1, received finger puppets, wooden puzzles, and a Lego train. The oldest, Quang, age 91, received

queen bedsheets, postage stamps and a gift card to Wal-Mart.

Best of all, these foster youth, disabled adults and homebound seniors got a reminder over the winter holidays that they were not forgotten.

More than 80 individuals and corporate sponsors from

businesses, government agencies, service groups and families donate gifts that allow the program to continue.

A team of 57 volunteers managed the pick-up, distribution, and delivery of gifts from community and private sponsors. The volunteers, many of whom return year

after year, spend three weeks in the warehouse organizing toys and gifts. In 2021, volunteers logged in almost 10,000 hours.

Donations come in other forms, too. Jackson Properties donated warehouse space; and Sourdough & Co., Roma 2 Pizza, Pizza Guys and Subway provided

lunches to hungry volunteers.

"This was our second year of taking precautions due to COVID-19, but we didn't let it stop us," said Tonja Edelman, Volunteer and Student Intern Services Coordinator. "We required volunteers to be fully vaccinated and we wore masks, and we got it done. We are so thankful for our volunteers and for the contributions from local community partners that make the program possible."

The total cash value of the program – volunteers, donations, gifts - is estimated to be \$476,612.

And the look on gift recipients' faces? Priceless.

Students Speak on Changing Lives through Service





FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - The Fair Oaks Rotary Club hosted their annual Speech Contest for local high school students on February 28 at the VFW hall near Phoenix Park. Four students competed this year, speaking on the topic "Serve to Change Lives."

Morrigan Hines, a junior at Meraki High School, opened the contest with a speech that was a call to action. She advocated fighting for a "brighter world," even if that fight risks your safety or your life. Hines pointed to the rampant hate and bigotry in society and said that there are many who have died fighting for justice. And many more, she said, are killed "by indifference" when people don't stand up against that hatred, instead remaining "caught in the web of inertia." Hines described service as an "act of love" by those who fight to change the lives of vulnerable and marginalized groups. She urged everyone to use their words and their actions to push for a

"brighter future." Noah Wright, a senior at Bella Vista High School, said he's been volunteering in the community since he was nine years old. When volunteering at the local food bank, he said he most enjoyed delivering food to clients, because that "seemingly small act" made such a significant impact on those families and their futures. Wright said that even small interventions, simple acts of service, can change the course of someone's life. And that service also changes the lives of those who serve - Wright said volunteering has given him

confidence and has become like a "compass" for him: "I have a purpose when I'm helping others."

Steward Fang, a junior at Sacramento Waldorf High School, spoke of the Butterfly Effect - the idea that small actions like the fluttering of a butterfly's wings can have a ripple effect, causing larger impacts across the world. He said he knows that one person can change the world, because when he moved from the Sichuan Province in China to the United States six years ago, "one person changed everything for me." When he arrived, he couldn't speak, read, or write English, which made integrating into the school system incredibly difficult. But a tutor worked with him every day, often staying after school to make sure his skills were improving. Fang said that act of service "changed my life" and taught him that he too could change the world. During the pandemic, many students struggled with remote learning, so Fang joined a tutoring group to give other students that same gift of time and attention that made such a difference for him. By showing those students

he "trusts their potential," Fang said he is changing the world "one fourth-grader at a time." For Fang, changing the world starts with serving those around us, and he asked, "Which lives will you change this year?"

Jocelyn Monroe-Holder, a sophomore at Meraki High School, said that her own experiences as a Black person in this country have made her yearn for a world where everyone is treated with respect and given equal opportunities. She pointed to the struggles faced by homeless people in the community and the impact of laws that often criminalize their existence. And despite various well-intended organizations, Monroe-Holder said the hands-off approach of charity isn't working. While donating food, clothes, or money is nice, she said those actions don't bring any "fundamental change." She said it's important to actually speak to those in the community to ask what kind of help would be most impactful, like making systemic changes to provide consistent access to needed resources. Monroe-Holder urged everyone to find ways "to do good things."

Nick Broad, Chair of the Fair Oaks Rotary Club Speech Contest, said he was proud of all the contestants. He said, "To the parents, you've raised four good ones. They've said their truth."

Hines and Wright tied for third place in the contest, each earning an award of \$50. Monroe-Holder won second place, with a \$100 award. First place was taken by Fang, who was awarded \$200 and will go on to compete in the Rotary District 5180 semi-finals in April. ★

Continued from page 1 risk the possibility of substantial additional payments, which makes those options a gamble. "This is a guarantee for us," said Aho. "We think it's better to project and forecast our budget on a stable situation."

With the conclusion of their Expenditure Review, the BOC members agreed to report their results to the Board at the April 20 meeting.

Another item continued from the December meeting was the question of whether to continue

holding virtual meetings or to return to in-person meetings. Most members said that virtual meetings are more convenient, so a consensus was reached to continue the virtual meetings.

The next meeting is scheduled for April 5. ★

It has been a busy few weeks in Sacramento County and in Washington, DC. That's why I wanted to send you a quick update on how I'm serving you in Congress.

Russian Invasion of Ukraine

I join Americans across the country in expressing outrage and horror at Vladimir Putin's unprovoked and deadly invasion of Ukraine. This invasion is not only an attack on Ukraine's sovereignty and independence, but also an assault on global peace, international law, and the values and freedoms we cherish as Americans.

As the world's longest-standing democracy, the United States must stand up for freedom and democracy world-wide. The Ukrainian people have now lived in a democracy for 30 years and have shown that they will not accept authoritarian leaders who seek to destroy and reverse the important progress they have made.

I was proud to visit Kyiv, Ukraine with a bipartisan Congressional Delegation in

February. During my visit, it was clear to me that the people of Ukraine want a future of freedom, sovereignty, and the ability to choose their own path forward. I spoke on the House floor about my visit to Ukraine–I encourage you to listen.

As Chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Asia, I'm closely following the situation in Ukraine and am receiving regular briefings from U.S. officials.

I fully support the Biden Administration's decision to implement strong and severe sanctions on Russia, including on the country's oligarchs and financial institutions which have already isolated Putin from the world stage. We must also continue to support the Ukrainian people with humanitarian aid and military assistance.

Sacramento County is the proud home to one of the largest populations of Ukrainian Americans in the entire country. My office has been working around the clock to assist Americans trapped in Ukraine.

heat wave. Closing Diablo Canyon will only contribute to declining reserve margins, according to NERC.

All of that is to say that blackouts are coming when it gets hot in California, as it does every summer. Don't be surprised when your AC won't click on, or you're burning candles for light in this supposedly advanced state. The blackouts are entirely predictable and a direct result of California energy policy making our grid unreliable by replacing on-demand resources with intermittent ones.

And remember, California is pushing people into electric cars through incentives and government decrees. Many people will be charging up those EVs when they get home from work, right after solar energy production peaks. We are creating dreadful imbalances that will lead to energy rationing in one of

the wealthiest areas in the world.

Venture capitalist Marc Andreessen recently tweeted about the Ukrainian crisis and its effect on our energy markets and independence, "Build 1,000 new state of the art nuclear power plants in the US and Europe, right now. We won't, but we should." He's right all the way around regarding energy independence and reliance on aggressive rogue states such as Russia for our energy.

But it's the last line that hits closest to home in California. We need to reverse our green energy mania that prices electricity like a luxury good and guarantees blackouts. Dependable, affordable energy is within our grasp if we commit to predictable, on-demand resources such as nuclear and natural gas. We won't, but we should.



Feinstein Now Must Decide Whether to Retire

Whither Dianne Feinstein? California's senior U.S. senator, a California political fixture for more than a half-century, was facing a turning point even before her husband, financier and philanthropist Richard Blum, died on Sunday of cancer.

The Senate's oldest member at 88 and the state's longest serving senator has clearly fallen out of favor with voters, even her fellow Democrats.

A new poll by UC-Berkeley's Institute of Governmental Studies found that after years of steadily eroding popularity, just 30% of the state's registered voters now approve of her, including just 45% of Democrats. Meanwhile, 49% said they disapproved.

"The five-term senator now receives more negative than positive job ratings from strong liberals, women, voters of color, younger voters, as well as voters in Los Angeles County or the San Francisco Bay Area," the poll noted.

Feinstein has been a senator for nearly 30 years, following two decades of public service in San Francisco, including a stint as mayor. She was once one of the state's most popular politicians due to her centrist, pragmatic approach,

groups with issues in Washington.

However, political polarization has left her drifting in political no-man's land, reflexively despised by Republicans because she's a Democrat and increasingly alienated from a leftward-drifting Democratic

As Donald Trump's presidency widened the ideological divide, Feinstein' centrism, particularly her willingness to cross the Senate aisle and do business with Republicans, made her a pariah to the Berniecrat wing of her party. Four years ago, as she was seeking another Senate term, the state party endorsed rival Kevin de León.

Feinstein easily defeated de León in 2018 but her popularity continued its downward course, not only because she's out of step with her party but due to her age and media reports that she may be suffering the cognition effects of old age. She must now – and soon – decide whether to seek still another term in 2024.

Feinstein has said she's running again, but she would say that under any circumstances because that's what politicians do. Were she to announce retirement, her clout in the Senate, which already has waned somewhat, would vanish and there would be a feeding frenzy among California's ambitious Democratic politicians.

That said, it was at least a 50-50 bet that Feinstein wouldn't seek another term in 2024 even before the

and was the go-to person devastating poll and her for California's interest husband's death. There's now a strong probability she won't run, approaching near-certainty.

As that probability sinks in, those ambitious politicians will be maneuvering to become her successor and all eyes will be on Gov. Gavin Newsom.

Newsom won't have any trouble winning re-election this year, barring some cataclysmic x-factor, but what then?

Had Trump won a second term in 2020, the door would have been open for Newsom to make a run for the White House in 2024. But with Joe Biden's victory - and more pointedly, Californian Kamala Harris' elevation from the Senate into the vice presidency - a 2024 presidential run by Newsom seems highly unlikely.

Newsom wears ambition on his sleeve and if he wants to extend his political career, the next logical move would be into the Senate, and there's no better springboard than a landslide re-election as governor this

Newsom is certainly not the only California politician who might want to succeed Feinstein. There are probably several dozen Democratic members of Congress who see a senator staring back when they look in the mirror, plus some other statewide officials and big city mayors.

It all hinges on whether Feinstein is ready for a wellearned political retirement.

Thinking about this and looking back over the last few years some of my encouragement has come from people who I first thought were just being crazy. Sometimes crazy does have a purpose.






50-Yard Challenge Gone Worldwide

Rodney has traveled to every state in our country and has now gone to 8 other countries to deliver the equipment to children that have

completed the challenge. He makes all deliveries himself.

"Even though we are called Raising Men, we are Raising Women too". Rodney says, "Three years ago I realized that there were not as many girls signing up for the challenge and that those that did were wearing Raising Men t-shirts. That did not sit well with me, so we created Raising Women Lawn Care Service". Now young ladies receive Raising Women t-shirts.

Raising Men is a 501(c)3 and relies completely on the generosity of supporters for the equipment, the shirts, hats and travel expenses. You can donate and learn all about the group on weareraisingmen.com. You can also purchase adult sized shirts and hats in support of your kids and the program. In addition, you can see video testimony from the kids and view news stories that have been done.
